We don't normally comment on matters involving other communities or the way they are run. We figure by and large that is the concern of people living there. But when their decisions affect our own constituency, as is the case with what goes on in Washington or Austin, we have been known to offer comments from time to time.

That is becoming the situation here, relative to what has been going on in Plainview and Lubbock.

We suppose it is no secret that a sort of tug of war has been going on between those two communities for some time. Essentially it involves each town trying to grow bigger than it already is, which is not at all unusual. But, as nearly everyone knows, when elephants fight, little people are likely to get stepped on, particularly if they are in the vicinity.

Local residents may remember the contest between Lubbock and Plainview over where Wal-Mart was going to locate its regional distribution warehouse. In the final analysis, after all the wheeling and dealing was done, the City Fathers in Plainview won (and local businesses all across Plainview and in the surrounding towns lost.) There was certainly no net gain in economic activity for the region or the city. The action merely relocated, and redirected, some of that economic activity. The political leadership of Plainview dug deep, affording Wal-Mart tax advantages they would not have given established businesses, people who had weathered the ups and downs of economic life in the town. Shrewd deals like that have made Sam Walton the richest man in America and one of the richest in the world. No one can blame him for trying. He is merely taking advantage of P.T. Barnum's dictum that "there's a sucker born every minute." He knows that sometimes they end up on City Councils, in places like Plainview.

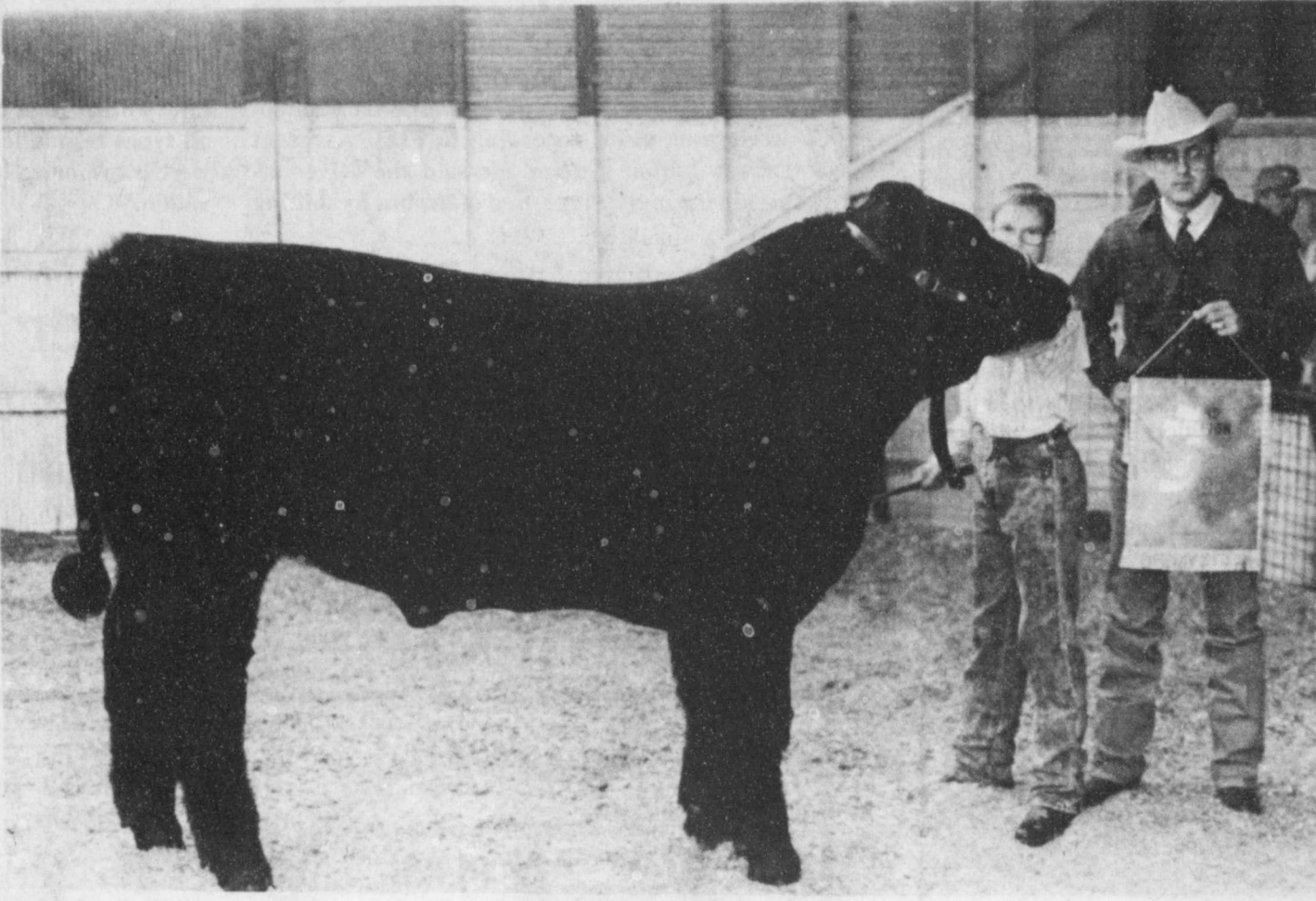
The people over in Lubbock have just turned down a proposal, put forth by the City Fathers and championed by the city's paper, to boost the city sales tax. At the same time they abolished the city's previously established Board for City Development, and passed up an opportunity to lower property taxes slightly. The proposed sales tax increase was to have been used to take up the slack caused by the reduction in property tax, with the rest going for some unspecified effort to boost the city's economy through the growth of new jobs.

All in all it was not a bad proposal, although we must say we are not unhappy it did not pass in the present circumstance. Obviously a lot of people hereabouts shop in Lubbock occasionally, as they do in Plainview. Every time they spend a dollar in either place, a portion of that sales price ends up in the coffers of each city, where it is used, hopefully, to make life better for the people who live there. (It also makes dollars a little less abundant here, a problem we have ranted and raved about for years, but that's another story.)

We would have to say also that we have a better feeling about the political leadership in Lubbock than we do in Plainview. By and large the people who run Lubbock seem to have a more sympathetic understanding of the plight, and the value, of surrounding small communities. Plainview's leadership, and here we would include that town's newspaper, have exhibited a predatory nature over the years. Lubbock seems to understand that their own businesses will suffer if the area's smaller communities wither away. They do, after all, depend on the smaller communities for a good deal of their economic activity. No such attitude is exhibited by Plainview, or we should say by the political leadership of Plainview. They consistently utilize the "beggar thy neighbor" approach to economic development. The Wal-Mart matter was a case in point. They wanted the tax revenue a Wal-Mart enterprise

Grand Champion honors at Floyd County's 48th Junior Livestock Show were given to Amber Womack, Lacey Aston and Todd Hinsley. The Reserve Grand Champion Honors were given to Tara Mallett, Leigh Dawdy and Ryon Smith.

The 128 lb. heavy mediumweight Hampshire shown by Amber Womack, Floydada, was named the Grand Champion lamb during Saturday's show. The winning Grand Champion swine belonged to Lacey Aston of Lockney. She won the honors with her 229 lb. light heavyweight cross breed. Floydada's Todd Hinsley, took the Grand Champion honor with his 1259 lb. light heavy cross steer.

Ryon Smith, of Floydada, took the Reserve Grand Champion honors with his heavy weight Hampshire lamb, and Leigh Dawdy, of Floydada, won the Reserve Grand Champion swine honors with her 235 lb. light heavyweight Cross Breed. Lockneyite Tara Mallett's 1218 lb. medium cross was named the Reserve Grand Champion steer.

Senior Showmanship honors were given to Clay Golden, of Lockney, in the Steer Division; Melissa Griffith, of Lockney, in the swine division and Kori Kellison of Lockney was recognized for her Showmanship in the lamb division.

Junior Showmanship awards were given to Kelli Bertrand, of Floydada, in the swine division; Leslieanne Hickerson, of Lockney, in sheep and Corbin

Kellison of Lockney was recognized as the Junior Showman in the steer division.

Three hundred and seventy-one animals competed in the 4-H and FFA Livestock Show, held Saturday and Sunday at the Floydada Show Barn.

This year, instead of the showmanship awards being handed out at the 4-H & FFA banquet, the Showmanship honors were awarded after each division and were picked by an out of town judge, Ronnie Ragland. Dale Droomgoole judged the steers, Jim Bob Tucker judged swine and Scott Doss judged lambs.

Grand Champion honors were awarded to Amber Womack, with her 128 lb. mediumweight Hampshire.

Ryon Smith's 130 lb. heavyweight Hampshire won the title of Reserve Grand Champion.

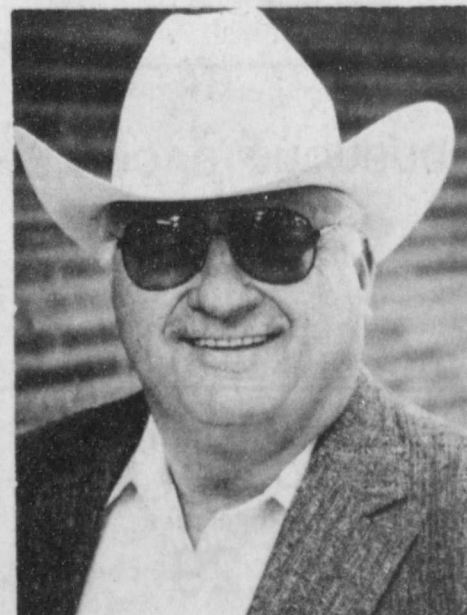

could drain from the surrounding communities, no matter its impact on those communities, or their own business community for that matter.

We do not know exactly why Lubbock people turned down the proposal put forward. We think, we do not know, that the manner in which it was presented to the voters had something lacking. And it had an element of fuzziness about it that simply should not have been there, given these economic times. One could not help feeling, for instance, that the editors of the Lubbock paper were saying "Listen up, you bunch of dummies, this is gonna be good for you." People tend to resent that approach to political guidance, even from a world traveller.

There could have been a little more listening, and not quite so much preaching.

We think the City Fathers in Lubbock would be well advised to sit down with those who led the charge against the proposal and come up with something everyone, or nearly everyone, can support. That should probably entail spelling out just what sort of new businesses would be targeted and sought, should the sales tax be increased. The average citizen, in Lubbock or elsewhere, may not be politically sophisticated in terms of world politics, but they understand their own personal finances pretty well. We believe they would support efforts to attract real job producing industries. We think they know the difference between that and flashy, zero-sum enterprises that may make the "leadership" look good, but which produce no net community gain.

# Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor:

Whatever happened to common sense and decency? Ordinarily I have nothing against those who are trying to do their job, but a recent example has me wondering about some of our "laws", and those chosen to interpret and carry them out.

We recently received a letter with an order for our 16-year-old son to appear in our county court for an Administrative Hearing at which they tried to show "just cause for suspension" of his driver's license. Last May (1991) he had received a ticket (in front of our farm home) for driving with only a permit. He had done nothing to warrant being stopped except he looked too young! The fact was, we had been trying for six weeks to get his license at Floydada (10 miles for us instead of the 30 to Plainview.) I had called at least six or eight times to set an appointment, but the DPS officer was only there on Fridays and not after 3:30 p.m.! I didn't get off work until 3:00, and of course, there was school! But they had no time to take him in the afternoon. Sure enough, the day came when, with his father gone on his job and me at work, there was no one to drive him where he needed to be and I told him to go ahead and drive. (A circumstance many farm families face, I'm sure). He was stopped and given a ticket. He paid the fine - and a few days later, we took him to Plainview where he obtained his license (at 4:00 p.m. - after work and school!) Since that time he has not received a violation of any kind. He is an "A" student, works six days a week after school and weekends, and local authorities assure me he has never given them any trouble. So - why the hearing? Are you ready for this? And I quote: "Well, we just need to put a "scare" into these kids so they won't be getting so many tickets!"

This "scare" for our son cost my husband a week's time and wages! Someone else had to take the truck on to where it needed to go while he stayed here to be with our son for the hearing. It was either that or my having to juggle my responsibilities at the hospital, and my husband preferred to be with our son than not.

It is certainly a significant loss for our family - all for a hearing - for one violation! (Fine paid) And no violation in the seven months since that time and getting his license! Oh yes, the day for the hearing? (a 12 hour work day for me) and time? 1:00 p.m. during school hours! Our request for a later time was denied! The DPS officer wasn't going to be there after 3:30 p.m.! (Have we heard that before?)

First thing at the hearing, we were accused of teaching our son to disobey the law! The DPS officer was negative

and hostile and didn't even know what the violation was, for sure (he accused our son of driving without his glasses). He was not present when the citation was given and evidently didn't even have a copy of it! He stated we should have obtained a hardship license for our son, when in fact we had been denied that privilege the previous year because our situation was not hard enough! This is the same DPS officer who can not make time for teenagers to get their license after school hours or who seems not the least bit interested or willing to help or encourage them and the families of this county to keep the law!

What about praise and encouragement to our teenagers for their good efforts rather than try to "scare" respect into them? Do you not think that such tactics only cause more disrespect, resentment and contempt, when there is not even a just cause? What about penalties for those who deserve them? Do other taxpayers really appreciate all that time, effort and money for nothing? I don't! All that over one violation (some wouldn't take time to issue a license!) and the fine was paid! There has been much less effort put out for much more important things (like robbery and a taking of a life - with little or no investigation!) Is it decent or right to ask a struggling family to give up \$400 - \$500 in salary to appear in court for such as that?

We have no intention of teaching our children to willfully break the law. But without some consideration and help we sometimes have no choice in that particular situation. We will get through this, our bills may be paid late (or later!) Our son will prove himself through the probation time because he's that kind of young man.

But I thought perhaps others might like a glimpse of some of the "law keeping" efforts in our county and another "idea" passed on to us from Austin! Threaten and "scare" em and they'll behave?"

If a boy who works hard in school and at his job and has already proven over several months that he's not a reckless driver, nor law-breaker, nor habitual offender, still has to fact a hearing and probation or suspension - what happens to the rest out there? Why should we pay to have a DPS office open if they are so restricted to days and hours that most find it impossible to get what they need there and have to go on to Plainview?

How can parents teach their kids to obey laws when there is no help on the other side to do so?

I have many questions - Does anyone have any answers?

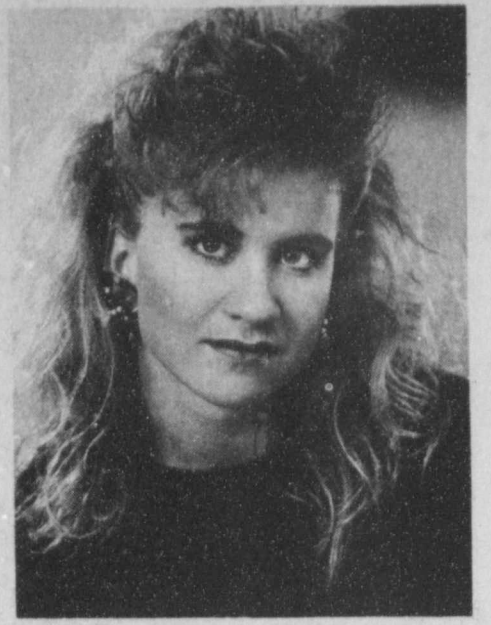

## Results of TAAS test heard by Lockney trustees

Lockney School Counselor, Charlotte Mitchell, presented the results of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test to members of the Lockney I.S.D. School Board at their January meeting.

She told the group that school personnel were pleased with the progress shown by Lockney students. She also noted the high percentage of students passing the EXIT test required for high school graduates.

She told the board members that 96 percent of the Seniors have passed all portions of the EXIT test.

The state averages for students passing all portions of the exam were: Grade 3 - 61 percent; Grade 5 - 46 percent; Grade 7 - 35 percent; Grade 9 - 35 percent; and Grade 11 - 39 percent.

TAAS 1991 Percentiles for the Lockney students are:

3rd Grade: Writing 48; Reading 77; Math 85; All 44.

5th Grade: Writing 63; Reading 70; Math 45; All 40.

7th Grade: Writing 59; Reading 66; Math 56; All 41.

9th Grade: Writing 74; Reading 57; Math 39; All 35.

EXIT Test: Writing 81; Reading 63; Math 45; All 37.

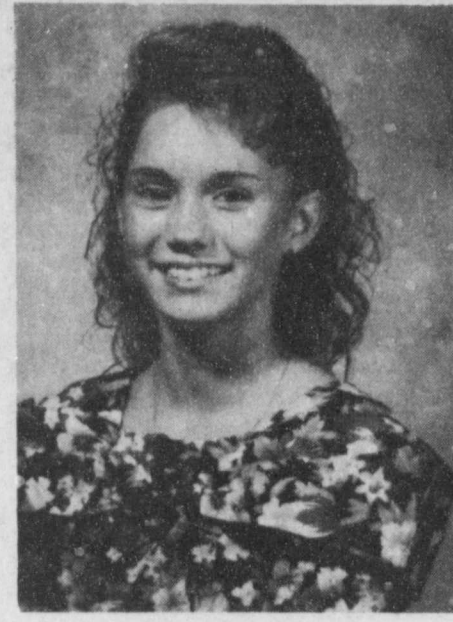

## Lockney Police Department Report

On January 23 Lockney Police were summoned to the Lockney Hospital to take a report concerning a child who had been bitten by a dog. A 9 year old boy was bitten by a dog which was chained up in a backyard. The boy was chasing a ball and ran into the area where the dog was fastened. The dog was confiscated by the police and later destroyed.

State law requires that when a dog bites someone the owner is required to have insurance coverage in the amount of at least \$100,000.00. The owner of the dog chose to allow the dog to be destroyed in lieu of purchasing insurance on the dog. The dog had not had his rabies shots as required by law. Police Chief Lennie Gilroy stated, "We realize that in this case the dog was not necessarily at fault, but dog owners need to be aware that they are ultimately responsible for the actions of their dogs. We would like to remind pet owners to get the shots (rabies) required by law. This may keep some child, or adult, from having to take the painful rabies shots."

The Lockney Police Department was contacted by the Floyd County Sheriff's

Office on January 24 to be on the lookout for a burgundy 1979 Olds Cutlass. The driver of the vehicle was reportedly

driving while his license was suspended. The Lockney Police observed the vehicle and subsequently Matthew Aday

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

## Social Security News

### By Mary Jane Shanes

Social Security beneficiaries who have not notified Social Security of a change of address risk having their checks stopped. It is not enough to report your address to the post office, you must report it to Social Security also. If you're receiving Social Security checks by mail, you must report it to us directly.

It is particularly important for direct deposit beneficiaries to also give us their current address. Since they have their benefits deposited directly to a bank account, they often forget to notify Social Security promptly of their new address. If we try to reach them about their benefits and are unable to do so, we may have to suspend benefits until we get a current address and validate it with the beneficiary.

Social Security will be sending out year end benefit statements (Form 1099) in January indicating the amount of benefits paid in 1991. If the Form 1099 is returned to Social Security by the post office, a process will begin which could result in benefits being suspended, unless we can locate you.

First, Social Security will check its records to see if a new address has been reported since the mailing. If so, the statements will be mailed a second time.

If it is returned again and direct deposit is involved, the financial institution where the check is sent will be contacted for a current address. (This is permissible under the "Right to Financial Privacy Act") If the financial institution cannot, or will not, provide the address, the phone company and the post office will be contacted. If all else fails, a letter will be sent to the last known address of the direct depositor and benefits will be suspended until the beneficiary contacts the agency and provides his or her current address.

So, if you have moved recently and not notified Social Security, now is the time to do it.

## PCG Director to be elected at Stricklands February 4

Floyd County cotton and agribusinessmen will elect a Businessman Director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. at a 7:00 a.m. breakfast meeting on Tuesday, February 4. The meeting will be held at Strickland's Restaurant in Lockney.

Announcement of the election comes from Dan B. Smith of Lockney, Floyd County Producer Director to the 25-county cotton organization, and Steve Lloyd of Floydada, current Businessmen Director.

Each of the counties in PCG territory has two directors, one a businessman

and the other a cotton producer. They are elected on alternate years for two-year terms. Each is eligible for re-election every second year.

All producers and businessmen are invited to the meeting. However, under PCG By-laws, only current dues-paying members of PCG will be eligible to be elected a director or to vote in the election. This provision of the by-laws will be fully explained at the meeting.

A PCG representative will conduct the election, review and answer questions about recent and planned PCG activities.

## FCIC deadline moved back

Due to excessive recent rain and snow, many producers have been unable to complete their cotton harvest. The wet weather has also delayed the ginning and timely availability of grade cards in most areas.

The end of the insurance period for these areas is January 31, 1992. FCIC has extended the filing of a claim until March 31, 1992. The proof of loss worksheet must be signed before March 31, 1992 or the claim will be considered late

filed. All producer's who believe they have suffered a loss should immediately notify their agents. It is important that the notice is filed timely. For producers that have completed harvesting and feel that they have a loss the notice needs to be submitted at this time. Producers that are still harvesting and feel that they have a loss also need to submit a notice at this time.

The March 31st deadline is the final filing date for the 1991 crop year only.

## Pesticide law changes and new regulations adopted

A number of changes were made in the Texas Pesticide Law by the Texas Legislature in 1989, and regulations to implement those changes and new U.S. Environmental Protection Agency requirements were adopted in early 1990. One of the changes involves Senate Bill 489 passed by the 71st Regular Session of the Texas Legislature requires that late fees be collected. The late fee schedule is on your application for license which you should have already received from the TDA.

You should return the license renewal as soon as possible and no later than February 28, 1992 to avoid the late fees. Your application will not be considered complete unless the front and back are completed and your signature is on the application. Some of the changes as mentioned are as follows:

\* Licensed applicators are now required to ensure that unlicensed applicators under their direct supervision are knowledgeable the laws, regulations and proper use of the particular pesticide being used.

\* Verification of such knowledge must be documented by signing and dating an appropriate pesticide label by both the licensed and unlicensed applicator or completion of a verification

form available from TDA.

\* Licensed commercial applicators must be physically present whenever supervising use of restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticide by an unlicensed applicator.

\* Also, Section 7.18 of the Texas Pesticide Regulations has been amended to require additional information on applicator records. New Pesticide Application Record forms (TDA Q 527C) are available from TDA Regional Offices.

Your license renewal form indicates the number of recertification credits that the TDA records show have been received to date. In the event that you believe the TDA records are incorrect, you should contact Elizabeth Perkins at (512) 475-1657. Remember that a minimum of five credits must be obtained for each year's license renewal. Only persons first licensed after September 1 may apply credits to the following year's minimum.

You are encouraged to read and keep for a reference a revised copy of the Texas Pesticide Law and Regulations. You should check with your nearest TDA Regional Office for copies of these publications. If you have any questions, you can contact the County Extension Office.
