in our county court for an Administrain our county court for an Administra-
tive Hearing at which they tried to show "just cause for suspension" of his just cause for suspension" of his
driver' license. LastMay (1991) he had received a ticket (in front of our farm home) for driving with only a permit. He had done nothing to warrant being stopped except he looked too young! The fact was, we had been trying for six wecks to get his license at Floydada (10 view.) I had called at least six or eight view.) that called at least six or eight
times to set an appointment, but the DPS officer was only thereon Fridays and not after $3: 30$ p.m.! I didn't get off work until 3:00, and of course, there was school! But they had no time to take him
in the afternoon. Sure enough, the day in the afternoon. Sure enough, the day
came when, with his father gone on his job and me at work, there was no one to drive him where he needed to be and I told him to go ahead and drive. (A circumstance many farm families face, I'm sure). He was stopped and given a ticket. He paid the fine - and a few days
later, we took him to Plainview where he obtained his license (at 4:00 p.m. - after work and school!) Since that time he has not received a violation of any kind. He is an "A" student, works six days a week
after school and weekends, and local after school and weekends, and local
authorities assure me he has never given them any trouble. So -why the hearing? Are you ready for this? And I quote: these kids so they won't be getting so many tickets!"
This "scare" for our son cost my husband a week's time and wages! Someit needed to go while he stayed here to be withour son for the hearing. It waseither that or my having to juggle my responsibilities at the hospital, and my husband preferred to be with our son than not.
It is certainly a significant loss for our family - all for a hearing - for one viola-

Lockney School Counselor, Charlote Mitchell, presented the results of the Texas Assessment of Academic
Skills (TAAS) test to members of the Lockney I.S.D. School Board at their January meeting.
She told the group that school personnel were pleased with the progress shown by Lockney students. She also noted the high percentage of students passing the EXIT
school graduates.

Pesticide law changes and new regulations adopted
Submitted by Mike Mallett, CEA-Ag. A number of changes were made in the Texas Pesticicid Law by the Texas Legislature in 1989, and regulations to
implement those changes and new impiement those changes and new U.S.
Environmental Protection Agency requirements were adopted in early 1990. One of the changes involves Senate Biil 489 passed by the 71 st Regular Session
of the Texas Legislature requires that of the Texas Legislature requires that
late fees becollected. The late fee sched ule is on your application for license which you should have already received from the TDA.
You should return the license renewal as soon as possible and no later than
February 28, 1992 to avoid the late fees. February 28,1992 to avoid the late fees.
Your application will not be considered complete unless the front and back are completed and your signature is on the application. Some of the changes as mentioned are as follows:

* Licensed applicators are now required toensure that unlicensed applicators under their direct supervision are
