from the previous week's season-high from the previse
120,124 bales.
Average daily prices received for cotton sold on the electronic marketing
system for the five trading days ending January 30 failed to surpass the 40 -cent
level. Average gross premiums over the adjusted world price, or loan repayment rate, declined steadily from a high of 1,006 points to a low of 941 . This was a
departure from the previous week when departure from the previous week when
premiums remained consistently above 1,000 points.
The falling prices and premiums
caused some producers, especially those with higher quality cotton, to withdraw lots losted for sale in simply refused to lower their asking prices to prevailing levels. Another with current prices is the increased movement of marketable cotton into the
government loan. Last week, cotton government loan. Last week, cotton
placed in TELCOT's Loan Advance Program (LAP) increased 21,735 bales. bales, 16.8 percent of all cotton offered for sale on TELCOT this season. The increased LAP entry also probably is a
