A view from The Lamplighter

We had a very long, and very interesting, telephone discussion the other day with a member of the Plainview City Council. He was very unhappy. He had before him a copy of our paper. It was, he said, attractive, well laid out, full of interesting stories and ads. But our recent column that dealt with the relation of smaller towns in the area to the larger towns in the area caused him great difficulty. We invited him to lay out his views in a letter which we offered to publish, in order that there be no misunderstanding of his position.

He declined, saying that would only serve to "sell papers" for us, and he suggested, wrongly, that was probably the reason we wrote the column in the first place. So in the absence of a letter from him, we will try to summarize and relay some of his concerns.

He felt we were unfair to his Council on the Wal-Mart matter, saying that while they "aggressively" sought the wholesale warehouse operation, they had nothing to do with the decision of Wal-Mart to locate their retail outlet in Plainview. That may be entirely true, and we will accept the Councilman's word. We will also accept, and acknowledge, the contention that we should have made the clear distinction, in our column, between that company's wholesale and retail operations and the circumstances surrounding the location of each. But from the standpoint of Wal-Mart's governing board, they would have had to be somewhat dense not to see the advantages of having a retail outlet in the immediate proximity of the distribution warehouse. He acknowledged that the retail outlet had been a tremendous boon to City government in Plainview, providing them with additional tax revenue which made it possible to hold their tax rates stable. He also acknowledged that a good portion of that revenue came from surrounding towns, which was our point in the first place.

He made no apologies for being "aggressive" in the search for new industries, and we told him we did not think any apologies were needed or due, that they were to be commended for aggressively seeking new industries. Our concern was that those industries be truly job-creating endeavors, not merely business enterprises that would drain revenue from existing businesses in Plainview or surrounding towns. He said that was what his Council was trying to do and we will accept his state-

At one point in the discussion the Councilman implied, or I thought he implied, that the desire for more tax revenue from surrounding towns was not of primary importance to them, that the principal effort was job creation. Very well. Would he then support a proposal to return the tax revenue to those towns that provided the additional taxes? Certainly not, he said, that would be "socialism." We've been called many things, but it was the first time we've ever been accused of promoting socialism.

The Councilman said he thought our column was "vicious," that it implied that members of the Council were stupid, and a few other things. We did not share his opinion on those issues. Governing boards, whether public or private, are constantly called upon to make decisions. They must make those decisions based on the facts before them at the time. Seldom do those decisions affect all people the same. Usually some people are helped, and some are hurt. That does not make the decisions stupid, nor does it mean the people who made those decisions are stupid. If some members of the Plainview City Council felt we were implying that, we offer them our apologies. We said we thought he was being overly sensitive to criticism, that if he intended to stay in politics he had to learn to live with that Continued On Page 6

The spring trustee election has been set for May 2, 1992, by the board of trustees of the Floydada Independent School District. During the regular session for February, a motion by Michael Hinsley with a second by Don Hardy was unanimously approved to specify the date and election procedures.

February 17, 1992 will be the first date a potential candidate may apply for a place on the ballot. The final deadline for filing as a candidate will be March

Early voting (formerly called absen-

tee voting) will begin on April 13 and end on April 28. Ballots may be cast in person at the Administrative Offices. Darlyn Hambright will serve as election official for the early voting.

Family loses everything in fire

A defective hot water heater erupted in flames Tuesday morning, in the home of Buddy and Debbie Wiley, of Lockney, resulting in extensive smoke and heat damage and the loss of all the Wiley's possessions.

Lockney firefighters were called to the home, located at FM 378 and Highway 70, at approximately 8:52 a.m. Approximately 12 firemen responded and with the assistance of several employees from Lockney Meat Company (located across the road), extinguished the blaze and cleared the home of

"I was on my way to the shower when

the fire broke out," said Debbie Wiley. "I tried, but I couldn't stop it."

Debbie was alone in the home when the fire started. She was able to escape the blaze unharmed. The Wiley's children were in school and her husband Buddy was at work at Jackson Tire

The fire started in a hot water heater which the Wiley's stated had caused them some recent trouble. "We were getting a new one and we just turned it on to heat the water for everyone to take a bath and wash dishes. The flames shot out and I couldn't stop it."

"Most of the structural damage was

contained in the closet where the heater was located," said Fire Marshall Lonnie Hooten. "There is also structural damage where we had to cut into the roof to fight the fire in the attic. Most of loss suffered by the Wiley's will be from smoke, heat and water damage. The heat melted appliances and destroyed furniture, pictures, etc."

A love fund has been started at the First National Bank in Lockney for the Wiley family. The family is also in need of linens, appliances, dishes, furniture, etc. Debbie believes that much of the families clothes can be salvaged when washed.



County Treasurer Glenna Orman presented her financial reports for the previous month, stating that the county began the month with \$115,682.74 in county accounts and received \$397,170.19 during the month. Transfers in were \$209,928.25 and transfers out equalled that figure. Disbursements were \$139,218.52, leaving the county fund balances with a total of \$373,634.41 at the end of January.

Of this amount, \$325,000.00 is being held in reserve to fund future months of county operational cost and these funds have earned \$5,948.73 in interest to date. Orman also reported that the installment indebtedness of the county now totals \$35,784.05.

Farm work contracts were approved for three individuals. These included contract #1145 in Precinct 2 for L. B. Brandes-clear out tail water ditch; #1135 in Precinct 3 for J. C. Andersonwork feed road; and #1137 in Precinct 3 for Alfredo Arredondo-work feed road. One contract, #1037 in Precinct 2 for Bloom Dairy-cover wash, was voided. Motion for the action came from Jackson with a second from Bishop.

Other matters handled by the court included the inspection and approval of monthly bills for payment.

Funds awarded to develop Floydada's Napoleon Park U.S. Senator Phil Gramm announced Washington are returned by the federal government to make permanent im-

in a news release, February 2, that the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has been awarded \$42,688 in federal matching funds to develop Napolean Park in Floydada.

The funds are provided by National Park Service, an agency within the U.S. Department of Interior. The city of Floydada applied for the grant, in January 1991. The application for the grant was developed by Floydada City Secretary Sharon Quisenberry and Floydada City Manager Gary Brown.

"We plan on using the grant money to remove old picnic tables, build four new covered picnic tables on slabs, renovate the tennis courts, put in an underground sprinkler system, put all the overhead electricity underground, and develop a playground area with new equipment," said Brown. "We will also plant approximately 50, 6-8 ft. trees.

"We will match the funds with equipment and labor. We hope to be in place by late Fall of '92, providing we get the go ahead to start. The funds have to be given to us first and the spec's for the park have to be approved by Parks and

The park is located in the 200 block of W. Tennessee and Georgia.

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

Maye Williams gave the program on China, discussing the dense population of the country, even though it was so large. The climate is very hot in summer, very cold in winter. The soil is very good for growing crops, farming is difficult due to not enough rain fall.

Under the soil is great mineral riches. One of natures gifts to the Chinese people is the bamboo plant. They eat the sprouts, use the reed to make furniture, build houses and boats, weave sandles and hats and make pulp which is rolled into writing paper.

Conservation is very important to the Chinese for two reasons, as a means of living and it is also a deep feeling of the people that one particular spot of land is home to a man and his family.

China has the largest population of any country. The chief products they raise are rice, wheat, tea, mulberry leaves, cotton, tobacco, soy beans, mellet, maize, sweet potatoes and peanuts. Their minerals are coal, iron, tungsten, koalin, tin, lead, zinc, gold and magnesium. They chiefly manufacture silk, laquer, porcelain, cotton cloth and

iron. The Chinese people are like Americans in many ways. They are happy people. Home life is important and families are closely bound together. The average are very poor. Their homes are small and their farms are very small and they own very little land. They eat the food they grow. Their eating habits are not healthful and the average length of life is about one half that of most Americans.

Their homes are built of mud, often in winter they are cold. Some spend a lifetime living on boats because space is so limited.

In the 1930's to 40's area colleges were built, some 20,000 received college degrees and many came to Great Britain and the U.S. to school. Some are artists, writers, architects, make jewelry

and china painting.

There are two kinds of government, communist and nationalist.

Tea is the most important product, most of it is sold to the United States and Canada. Cereals grow well and most of the worlds camphor comes from the country too. This story of China was enjoyed by all.





possibility, just as we learn to live with it in this business. We tried again to make the central point to him, as we thought we had tried to make in the column, that since the lives of the bigger towns are so closely tied to the fate of the smaller, surrounding, towns, that fact ought to be recognized when policies are undertaken, or endeavors are pursued, that might have an impact upon those communities.

One further point. The Councilman said, during that part of the discussion in which he rejected so forcefully the idea of returning sales taxes to those who pay them, rather than those who collect them, that if smaller towns did not also: become aggressive, if they merely wanted to "sit on their . . . rest on their laurels" they were going to suffer. But he quickly added that he thought the folks in Floyd County need have no fears in this regard, that he regarded this as a stable, progressive community that was going to make it. With that, we agreed, in spades. And, like his own council, we will be "aggressive" in trying to see that this happens.

At any rate we appreciate the Councilman's call. (In fact we have since visited by phone with other members of the Council as well.) We will try to take note of his and their concerns, and we hope they will likewise take not of our own concerns, which we will try to spell out in one simple sentence, or one simple paragraph.

We are of the firm belief that this state, this nation, this society, would be far better off with a multitude of small, thriving communities, rather than a few big cities, where populations are piled atop each other with all the attendant problems, and where the countryside is dotted with dying, decaying, villages that were once thriving in their own right. And we believe governmental policies ought to encourage the survival and well being of those small communities, for the good of the nation if for no other reason.

We know, as well as anyone, that times have changed during the nearly 70 years we have been on this earth. We know the economy of the nation has changed, the nature of our society has changed. But we also know that if government has any validity other than the defense of the nation and the personal security of our citizens, it is to "promote the general welfare." That, to us, involves the adoption of policies that effect that ideal.

That general belief is what led to our suggestion, some time ago, that this state's political leadership explore the possibility of changing the procedure of remitting sales tax rebates to the various communities. We believe that would be just one governmental policy that could help revitalize the infrastructure of many smaller communities, thereby promoting the general welfare without harming in any way the larger cities. We do not see that as "socialism" and we do not believe those who support the concept are socialists.

Another change in tax policy that would help all Texans, in small towns, large towns, and in the countryside, would be to begin taxing the billions of dollars that flow, tax free, into the coffers of out-of-state mail order houses who have no "real property" presence in this state. Sears must collect the tax. Montgomery Ward must collect the tax. Local businesses must collect the tax. Why should a multitude of others, who do not pay property taxes here, who do not employ local citizens, have a taxfree advantage? But that particular problem will have to be addressed in Congress, not the Texas Legislature. A few years ago, then State Comptroller Bob Bullock launched a crusade, of sorts, to address this concern. A bill was even introduced in the Congress, where it languished and died. And given who runs the Congress, and given who owns the out-of-state mail order houses, and how much they pay to help keep Congress running the way it is, that is not likely to change.

So in summary we would say we are not, and were not, trying to pick a fight with a neighboring town. Nor were we trying to "sell papers." We now have approximately 76 percent of all households in Floyd County as paid subscribers or newsstand sales, and quite a few in other counties as well. We could hardly hope for more, although we welcome any reader, anywhere. Nor were we trying to curtail business traffic between the towns. None of us live in sealed communities, and it would be a sad world if we did. We were merely trying to make a point by stating an opinion relative to the association of communities to each other. We had no idea we were striking such a sensitive nerve.

At the council's regular meeting held on Thursday, February 6, Lockney City Council members discussed the upcoming election and set the date for the beginning of sign-ups on Monday, February 17. The election for Lockney City Council aldermen will be held on Saturday, May 2.

Terms will be up for J.D. Copeland, Gary Marr, and Jim Doucette. Also the seat held by Ronnie Aston will have to be filled. Aston is moving to the farm. He has served one year of a two year term. Jim Doucette announced that he will also be moving out of the city limits and will not be a candidate.

Qualified candidates wishing to run for any of the positions can come by City Hall during regular business hours and

The council voted to ask those who have served as election judges in the past to do so for the May election.

W.H. Hallmark, Superintendant of the Lockney Independent School District met with the council to discuss the purchase of lots 5, 6, and S 1/2 of 4, Block 8, Walling Addition. The lots are owned by the taxing entities in the district. The lots adjoin school property and according to Hallmark would be used for a parking lot or as a possible construction site at some time in the future. He stated that the school board would offer \$12,000.00 to the other taxing entities for the property.

According to Hallmark the \$12,000 would be divided equally between the City of Lockney, Lockney Hospital District, Floyd County and the Mackenzie Water Authority. Each entity will have to agree to let the school board have the property at the proposed price.

The motion to accept the offer was made by Gary Marr and all the aldermen voted for.

Jamie Johnson, engineer with Ober J. Engineering, asked the council to purchase a computer generated map of Lockney to use in the re-numbering of streets and showing the location of water and sewer lines. J.D. Copeland made the motion to purchase the map and it was seconded by Gary Marr. All voted for.

The council heard a request for a street light at the corner of N.E. 1st and Washington. The aldermen voted to install the light as there are no lights on that street.

CHANNEL 1 TV

FISD board members agreed Monday evening to allow the installation of Whittle Communications Channel 1 TV in the Floydada High School and if possible, the Junior High. No vote was taken on the matter after it was deemed unnecessary.

According to Joe Christian and Bruce Bramlet, who investigated the service, The installation and equipment (including a satellite dish and at least 15 monitors, along with VCR equipment and wiring) will be provided to the school for free and will be maintained at no expense to the school. The three year agreement cites only that schools utilize the programming for 12 minutes per day at least 90 percent of the time and may be cancelled by either party at any time.

Programming is a 12 minute world news broadcast geared toward young people. Included in the broadcast are national brand name sponsor commercials. Building principals may monitor the broadcast each day prior to airing it at school. The option may be exercised to not air the program if something deemed inappropriate will be included. The school can also prepare and air their own programs as well as utilize the

additional educational programming available through the system.

Fall installation is expected. Floydada will join more than 1,000 Texas schools that participate in the Channel 1 TV networking.

Kathy Becker is this week's feature teacher at Floydada High School.





Effective parenting program offered in area

Improving parent-child relationships will be the focus of a series of discussion sessions beginning February 20, 1992, at 7:00 p.m. at First United Methodist Church Lockney. The discussions will be based on Systematic Training for Effective Parenting (STEP), the most

widely used parenting education program in the country.

More than two million people throughout the United States, Canada, and other countries have participated in STEP discussion groups and used the accompanying Parent's Handbook since American Guidance Service (AGS) introduced the program in 1976.

STEP encourages mutual respect between parent and child, increased cooperation, more effective communication, and a more responsible, self-reliant attitude among children.

Rules are designed to protect game officials

Protection and Courtesy to game officials. All schools, when they join the League are assigned to a district and the school accepts the athletic plans. The code states in part "To accept decisions of officials without protect; to see that officials are extended protection and courtesy, by players, school personnel and laymen; to treat your opponents as your guests and to put clean play and real sportsmanship above victories."

The State Executive Committee has accessed more penalties to coaches, players and fans for abuse of game officials than for any other one rule violation. There can be no athletic activities without officials. Unless they are protected, the educational achievements in athletics could be denied to high school pupils. Officials must be mutually agreed upon in advance. If no prior

game constitutes agreement.

It is recommended for all UIL athletic contests that a designated administrator be appointed to act as security and hospitality aide for officials. Official's chapters should be notified prior to the season or game as to procedures for items such as parking, dressing rooms, security and method of payment.

If an attack should occur on a game official, the school administration and the school board should take immediate steps to see that the person or persons making the attack on the official or officials is arrested and prosecuted. The school must see that the guilty person or persons are brought to justice. Token punishments by school officials will not satisfy the State Executive committee.

Schools must take proper precautions

agreement is reached, beginning the to see that all game officials are protected and extended courtesy. In case of any misconduct by a fan, player or a coach the school should prosecute this person to the legal limits. Proper preparation can prevent most misconduct

relative to officials.

If continuous or extreme verbal abuse is directed toward an official or if an official is struck, pushed, bumped, or handled in any way, there shall be a penalty assessed by the State Executive committee. This penalty will be either: 1) public reprimand; 2) disqualification.

> THINK BEFORE YOU SPEAK OR REACT

The trend in parenting education is a result of many social changes in the United States.

The parents who participated in STEP groups said they found the program beneficial for many reasons. High on the list was the opportunity it provided for them to share experiences and learn from others. Others said that STEP enabled parents to "learn new ways to handle persistent problems" and to overcome a sense of guilt and develop a sense of confidence and self-esteem. STEP was also credited for improving participants' relationships with other people, including husbands and wives, employers and employees. Benefits cited for children included the opportunity for children to take more responsibility for their own behavior, a calmer, more relaxed environment in which to develop emotionally, and less spanking and parent "snooper-vision."







For Agriculture water conservation equipment

Water district accepting applications

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 is now accepting applications from producers wishing to obtain agricultural water conservation equipment loan funds to upgrade their current irrigation systems to more-efficient Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) systems.

The Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) approved the Water District's application for a \$1 million loan to fund the program on January 15th.

The funds available for use in the District's Agricultural Water Conservation Equipment Loan Program are from repayments to the state on previous loans made during the pilot ag loan

Because funds are limited, priority will be given to producers who have not yet obtained an agricultural water con-

Financial alternatives to be topic for seminars held for farm families

Many farmers are having trouble obtaining financing for their 1992 crop. "Factors beyond their control, such as last year's weather and the depressed cotton market, are impacting opportunities to acquire financing," says Dr. Jackie Smith, agricultural economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension

If you find your family caught in this situation, plan to attend one of a series of meetings offered by the Extension Service, Smith suggested. "Financial Alternatives for Farm Families" sessions will be held in Lubbock, Abilene and Amarillo. There will be no charge for these programs, which are co-sponsored by the Extension Service and the Agricultural Economics Department at Texas Tech University. The Extension Service is an agency of the Texas A&M University System.

Topics to be discussed will include loan restructuring and cash flow analysis by Dr. Danny Klinefelter, Extension Service agricultural economist and management specialist at College Station. The mediation process in resolving distressed loan situations will be explained by Dr. Gary Condra, director of the Ag Loan Mediation program at Tech. Also included will be a description of the various bankruptcy alternatives by Walter O'Cheskey, Chapter 12 Trustee from Lubbock, and the tax implications of loan restructuring.

The Lubbock program will be held Feb. 13 from 9 a.m. to noon at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center. The center is on FM 1294, just east of the Shallowater exit on I-27.

servation equipment loan from the District. Also, new loans are limited to 75% of the purchase price of the aboveground equipment of LEPA center pivot sprinkler systems. LEPA systems are the only equipment that will be funded under this new ag loan program.

To apply for a loan, producers must complete an application, a financial statement, have an irrigation dealer contract, and pay a non-refundable \$250 application fee. Applications are available from the Water District's County Secretary in your area or by contacting the District headquarters in Lubbock.

Loans will be secured by a first lien on the equipment. In addition, the landowner will either sign a Deed of Trust giving the District a lien on the land, arrange for a letter of credit, or assign assets as additional security for the loan.

During the pilot ag loan program that operated from 1986 to 1990, 11 of the 15 counties within the High Plains Water District had borrowers participating in the program. Approximately 165 borrowers received 284 loans totalling \$5,409,664.21 for purchases totaling \$7,696,848.18.

A total of 208 quarter-section center pivots and six full section pivots were purchased. Of the quarter-section pivots, 47 or 22.6 percent were true LEPA

With an average purchase price of \$36,000 per center pivot system, the 208 quarter-mile pivots added about \$7.5

million to the area economy. Using a total of \$500,000 for the rest of the equipment purchased, the total economic infusion into the area is about \$8 million. With a multiplier of three, the pilot ag loan program pumped about \$24 million into the High Plains economy during its 46 months of operation.

Most important is the water savings resulting from use of the upgraded irrigation application and distribution equipment.

Converting to center pivot sprinkler systems helped eliminate 21.5 miles of open, unlined ditch which saved an estimated 1,491 acre-feet of water per year. The purchase of surge valves and other equipment during the pilot ag loan program eliminated tailwater waste and saved approximately 1,967 acre-feet of water per year. Water savings due to improvement in system efficiencies saved about 14,713 acre-feet of water

Cumulative water savings from the beginning of the pilot program through September 1990 amount to about 43,880 acre-feet—enough water to supply a city of 200,000 for one year!

Texas farmers must act now to cont the spread of red-horned poppy in their wheat crops, according to Barron Rector, range specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Rector said that the red-horned poppy is a recently discovered prolific weed that can spread long distances through contaminated harvesting equipment or

The weed clogs combining equipment, competes with winter wheat and may be mildly toxic to grazing animals,

Researchers have found the poppy in Kansas, 12 Oklahoma counties and six counties in the Texas Panhandle and Edwards Plateau region.

"It seems to be well adapted to wheat fields in this part of the country," Rector

Additionally, he noted, Oklahoma State University researchers have found that each plant can produce up to 70,000 seeds that are capable of germinating in both fall and spring seasons.

For these reasons, experts recommend treatment of any red-horned poppy outbreaks with a herbicide labeled for use in wheat.

Brent Bean, Extension Service agronomist for the Texas Panhandle, said that Buctril has been the most effective herbicide in controlling the red- the soil. horned poppy.

Farmers must act to control spread of poppy

is applied in the spring when the plant is in the rosette stage of development, he said. Banvel, 2,4-D amine and to a lesser extent, 2,4-D ester also may be used, Bean said, but they have not been as

Bean said that although use of Buctril is expensive, farmers would otherwise have difficulty in harvesting and may find wheat yields reduced. The problem is not yet widespread, but the weed is continuing to infest more acres every

Rector said the key to controlling this aggressive weed is to prevent the development of a large population through early identification and early herbicidal

The plant is best controlled during the winter months when it has rosettes that measure up to 14 inches in diameter Rector said. These rosettes lie flat on the ground and have a waxy cuticle that sticks up on the surface.

Dean Cornett, Extension Service agent in Hemphill County, said that farmers with small infestations can eliminate them by "hand grubbing" the

plants to ensure that no parts are left in Washita, Harmon, Jackson, Tillman and

with numerous branches that have stiff hairs. The poppy is best identified in its flowering stage. During spring, it produces four bright, scarlet or orange-red petals that each have a black spot on its base. The red color fades to yellow during summertime. Each petal is about

the size of a nickel or quarter Another identifying characteristic is the poppy's long, hairy seed pod, a slightly curved cylinder that can be 10 inches long.

Rector said that as many as 17 poppies can grow in every foot of a row, with each plant having a stout taproot. That's why it should be controlled immedi-

Researchers believe the red-horned poppy was first brought to the United States as an ornamental plant. It is native to the Middle East and Eastern Europe.


