Three citizens bestowed awards

Floydada citizens gathered once again for the annual chamber of commerce banquet, to show their support for their chamber of commerce and express their appreciation to the deserving individuals recognized for their community achievements.

Taking the community's top honors

during the Saturday night banquet, were: Jimmie Lou Stewart, Citizen of the Year; Anne Carthel, Extra Mile Award, and Bruce Bramlet, Employer of the Year.

Bill Hardin, the recipient of last year's Citizen of the Year award, presented Stewart with her award. "The recipient

of Floydada's Citizen of the Year award has loved and helped many in this community for many years," said Hardin.

Stewart was born in Floydada, attended the Floydada schools, graduated from Floydada High School and attended business school in Lubbock. She worked for a time as Deputy Tax Asses-

sor-Collector and was hired in 1949 by the City of Floydada. She became the City Secretary in 1965 and served in that position for 42 years.

"She was honored by the Texas Municipal Clerks Association," said Hardin, "when she was selected as Secretary of the Year for the State of Texas in 1973. She was nominated as Outstanding Employer of the Year for 1988-89.

"She has been active in professional organizations and has served in the church nursery for many, many years. She retired from the City of Floydada, January 31, 1992, and continues to volunteer for worthwhile community projects, by serving as the billing clerk for the Floydada EMS."

A view from The Lamplighter

For the past several months our scouts have told us the natives were growing restless. Now it appears they are circling the wagons, whooping and hollering, testing weak spots in the enemy defenses, preparing for what may be a major attack before the next winter sets in.

The Wagon Master seems somewhat uncertain as to how he should repel the attacks. Part of the uncertainty seems to come from the fact that his own scouts were divided as the wagon train headed west. Some saw the signs, but misread them. Some saw the signs but figured the wagon train was too powerful to be attacked. Some said it really didn't matter anyway, since the tribes were so divided and leaderless that any attack could be easily repelled.

What the Wagon Master didn't count on was that he might have an insurrection within the wagon train itself. And that, in the final analysis, may prove to be the biggest threat to the security of the wagon master, if not the wagon train.

Confusion and uncertainty within the wagon train is more than matched by confusion and uncertainty among the various chiefs gathering for the attack. About the only thing that unites them is the belief that an attack must be made. Why, and to what end, is another story.

Some of the tribal chieftains urge an attack from the left, others say they no longer have the soldiers to mount an attack from the left, that an attack upon the center would find more favor in the ranks. The wagon master, seemingly unable to determine where the greatest danger lies, shores up his defenses on all fronts, right, left, and center, and hopes that the various tribes will collide with each other when the final attack comes, thereby creating an escape route for the wagon train to continue. It's a risky strategy. And it will only succeed if he makes peace within the wagon train itself before the final attack begins.

Weekend blaze destroys Edwards family home

An evening blaze Saturday, February 29, totally destroyed the wood frame home of Craig and Betty Edwards, killing the family's dogs and destroying all possessions.

Floydada Fire Department received the alarm at 4:53 p.m. and arrived at 5:13 p.m. By the time fire trucks were able to make it to the home, on county road 338, located nine miles south on Hwy. 62 and seven miles west on Hwy. 54, it was engulfed in flames.

"The roof had already collapsed and the windows had exploded," said Volunteer Fireman and Floydada City Manager, Gary Brown.

No one was at home at the time of the fire, however a friend of the family, Tate Harris, saw the smoke and tried to rescue the three dogs he knew to be inside the home. "He was able to locate only one dog," said Brown, "before he had to get out of the house. By the time he got

to a phone and the fire department could get there, it was too late for the house."

Three fire trucks responded from Floydada. Petersburg Volunteer Fire Department also responded to the scene. The cause of the fire has not been determined.

A "Fire Shower" has been planned for the Edwards' Friday night, March 6, at 8:00 p.m., at the First Baptist Church Fellowship Hall.

obviously not affected certain sectors. Mostly it has hurt those in the private sector who work for a living, and those who provide the jobs of those who work for a living. It has not seriously affected, in any adverse way, those who play for a living. Up in Arlington one of the Rangers' star baseball players is unhappy with the idea that he may have to perform for a mere \$27 million over the next five years. He says he wants \$30 million, and if they don't give it to him, he may go play elsewhere. And down in Austin, the University of Texas basketball coach also wants a little more financial security. He is now in the first year of a seven-year contract that totals about \$400,000 per year. At the end of the seven year period he comes into a mutual fund worth between \$500,000 and \$1 million according to press reports. What seems to concern the coach is that if he is reassigned (that is, if he doesn't win enough games, and if the University Authorities ask him to do something else for the remainder of his contract during the seven year period) he might have to revert to his base "guaranteed" salary of only \$115,000 per year. He would like that "guaranteed" income upped to \$300,000 per year.

And then there are (of course) the Congressmen. We noted a small item in the papers the other day indicating they have received a \$4,000 "cost of living" raise. The higher their salary, the higher the "cost of living" increase. Thus, the recent boost to \$125,000 per year that so outraged the country, continues to cost.

In the meantime the deficit that we, our children, and our grandchildren will have to one day pay, continues to mount, and the populace continued to get along as best it can. It's no wonder that those both within and without the wagon train are restless.

Letter To The Editor

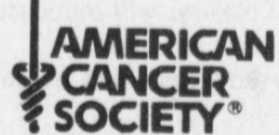
Dear Editor,

Using the clear, rich color of the Southwest as a source of inspiration, Priscilla Marsh paints award-winning

works in her home studio in Crosbyton.

Frequent deer-hunting trips to New Mexico and Colorado with her husband, Clayburn, provide her with a backlog of memories and photographs from which to paint the mountain country. Her home, in the center of cotton and wheat

producing land on the rolling plains, provides subjects for her landscapes and wildlife paintings.

Skilled use of hues and values creates in each work a vibrant focal point sparkling with jeweled highlights, allowing the viewer to savor every inch of the eye's journey to the painting's center of interest. Her work exudes tranquility, making the viewer want to "be there." She feels art is a visual reaction to line, tone, and/or color, saying skill and technique are secondary to sensitivity and individuality.

Names of residents are on unclaimed money list

A list recently released by the Texas Treasury shows several Floyd County citizens have money held in the unclaimed money fund.

Each year the Treasury publishes a list of people, businesses and organizations whose various accounts have been dormant for three years or more. Accounts in the fund include checking and savings accounts, utility deposits, oil royalties and stocks. They are turned over to the Treasury by banks and businesses.

STEPS TO FOLLOW IF YOU FIND YOUR NAME

If you find your name on the list you should call the Texas Treasury at 1-800-654-3463, or (512) 444-7891.

The office hours are: March 2-20, Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-8 p.m.
Beginning March 23, M-F, 8 a.m.-5 p.m.

If you prefer to inquire by mail, send your inquiry to Texas Treasury, Unclaimed Property Division, P.O. Box 17728, Austin, TX 78760.

If the bank or business still has your

money your name may be listed, but funds may not be held at the Treasury. If this is the case, the operator will give you instructions along with a telephone number, address, and the name of the person with the reporting company to contact about your funds.

If the treasury has your money and your information matches the owner information on the Treasury's records, the operator will mail you a claim form to complete.

You will receive postcards keeping you informed of progress on your claim. There are no charges or fees assessed by the Treasury to process and pay your claim. Returning your property is considered a public service. If you are contacted or sign a contract with an outside "Search/Heirfinder Firm" to assist you in claiming, their charges may not exceed 10 percent of the claim amount.

Your money will be waiting for you whenever you claim it. There are no deadlines to meet and no cut-off dates. If is never too late to claim your money. If you don't reach an operator right away, keep trying, or you can write to the Treasury at the mailing address above.

signed up to run for councilman at-large and Jon Nielson has declared himself as a candidate for the council seat in District 1.

The final date to sign up for a place on the ballot is March 18. Anyone interested in running for city council may obtain further information at City Hall and may sign up by contacting Quisenberry during regular business hours at City Hall.

FISD ELECTION

According to School Superintendent Jerry Cannon, no challengers have come forth to seek election to the FISD board of trustees at this time. All five incumbents have announced their intentions to

seek reelection to their trustee seats.

There are two 2 year terms and three 3 year terms on the ballot this spring. The two year terms are necessary to allow two appointed board members to stand for election. Steve Lloyd will be seeking election in District 1 and Trena Simpson will be the candidate in District 2.

The three year terms are regular terms. John Campbell in District 4, Don Hardy in District 5 and Charlene Brown as an at-large representative, will be seeking reelection to their prospective board seats for the three positions.

The deadline for filing for a position on the May 2 ballot is March 18. Anyone who wants to run for a school board position may do so by contacting the FISD administration Office prior to that date.

CAPROCK HOSPITAL DISTRICT ELECTION

Two positions remain up for election on the Caprock Hospital District board this year. Each is for a two year term. The incumbents for the trustee posts are Fred Thayer and Kenneth Pitts.

Anyone interested in running for a trustee position on the board may obtain more information and a petition at Caprock Hospital. Petitions must have 25 signatures of registered voters and need to be turned in by April 6 in order to be on the ballot for the May 2 election.

When Monty "Mac" McGavock awakens on Saturday mornings, he heads straight for his pot-nouveau

kitchen where antique, cast-iron cooking utensils hang on the walls beside aluminum muffin tins, sauce pans and glass funnels.

"Cooking may seem like a chore for some people, for me it is a hobby," the 64-year-old said.

McGavock, formerly of Lockney, lives alone in Lubbock and take a creative approach to the culinary pastime. Through trial and error, he has concocted more than 100 recipes with unusual ingredient combinations - pine-apple-olive cake, strawberry-carrot bread, cranberry-Cheddar cheese bread and broccoli bread.

"I like to create off-the-wall things," he said with a thunderous laugh. "If it sounds awful, I've got to try it."

Floydada doctor victim of robbery

A 64 year old man, Charles Day, of Abilene, has been arrested for the Tuesday morning robbery of a Floydada chiropractor, Dr. Keith Patzer.

According to Chief Deputy Charles Overstreet, "Day allegedly entered Patzer's place of business, at 317 S. 2nd., shortly before 9:00 a.m. Day asked Patzer for a \$1,000 loan and Patzer re-

fused. At that time Day allegedly knocked Patzer down and started kicking him in the chest and back until Patzer agreed to write a check for \$1,000."

According to Overstreet, Day and Patzer have been acquaintances for a long time.

After the check was written, Day left the office and went immediately to Patzer's bank, cashed the check and left town.

The Patzer's contacted the Sheriff's office and the description of Day and the vehicle he was driving was dispatched to area law enforcement agencies. Day was spotted by the Highway Patrol near Dickens, at 10:39 a.m. and subsequently arrested.

Day is currently in the Dickens County jail on \$25,000 bond, charged with robbery.

Dr. Patzer, who is 64 years old, did not require hospitalization and was not seriously injured.

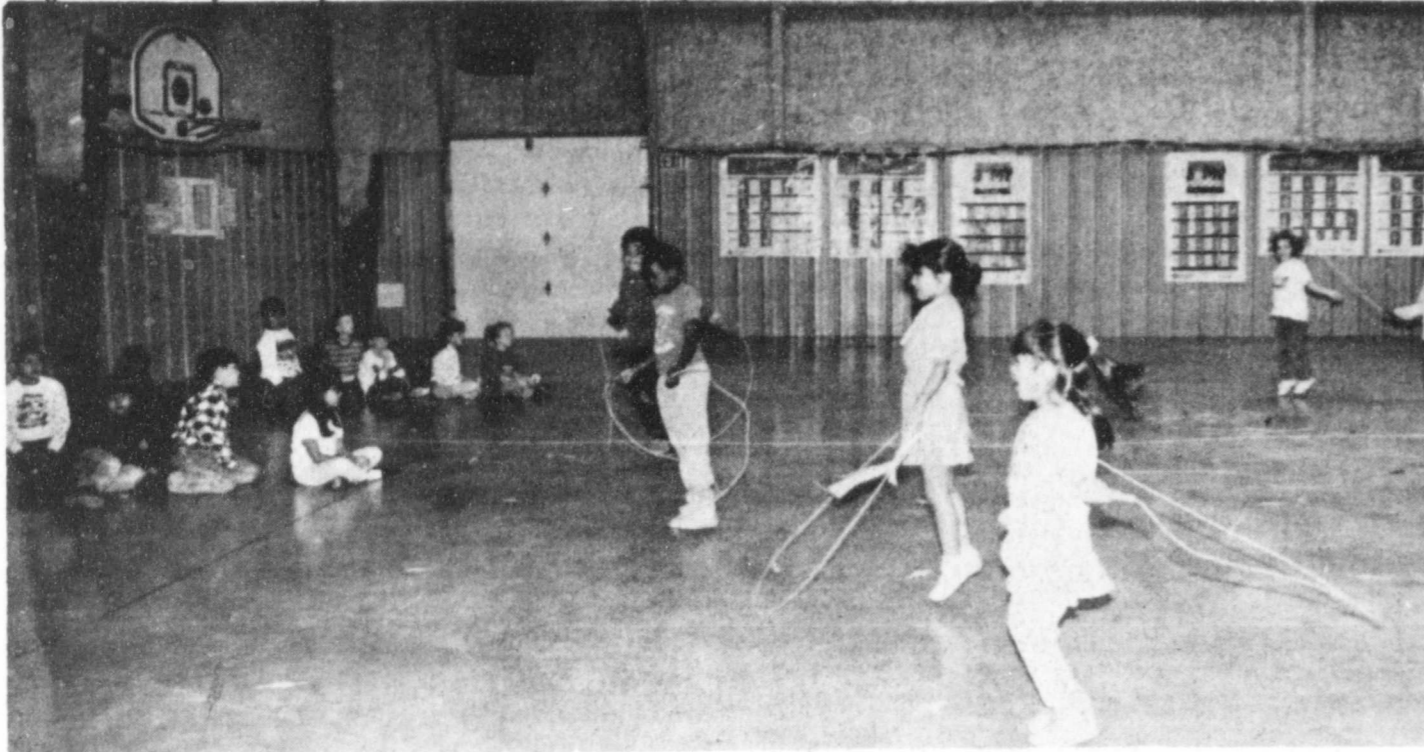

Dispelling myths about food and athletics

Whether a person is a professional football player or exercises only once a week, food is a key factor in athletic performance — but too many advertised products mislead and misinform, according to a registered dietitian.

"Everyone needs to eat a balanced

diet, which provides energy to complete an exercise routine and all the nutrients necessary for tissue growth and replacement after a workout," said Dr. Mary Kinney Bielamowicz, nutritionist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "However, there are too many misleading advertisements and fad diets that can cause consumers to stray from the healthful choice."

Many people who put their hopes in health products that claim to build their muscles and give them stamina often end up with a diet that lacks some important nutrients but has an excessive amount of others, she said. Nutritional practices based upon half-truths and misconceptions can even be dangerous if taken to the extreme.

Bielamowicz said some of the most common myths about how to get energy include:

- * Eating more protein helps build more muscle — Protein is important in building and protecting muscles, but high-protein diets or supplements have not been proven to increase muscle mass. Without proper exercise, excessive protein is often converted to fat and stored. Excessive protein intake may also strain kidney function.

- * Eat a lot of carbohydrates before each workout — A high-carbohydrate diet is not necessary for a regular workout. If preparing for a long-distance event (lasting an hour or longer) such as a marathon or bicycle race, a high-car-

bohydrate diet may be needed — starting several days before the event. For events lasting less than 90 minutes, a high-carbohydrate diet for one day can adequately fuel muscles.

- * Drinking sports drinks before and after exercise is essential for replacing lost body fluids — During activity, perspiration causes loss of water and minerals such as sodium and potassium that are important for normal body function. Under usual circumstances, the average American diet contains more than enough sodium to make up for losses. Supplements are not needed unless circumstances are unusual, such as participating in a triathlon in intense heat.

- * Consuming foods or beverages high in sugar before exercising provides extra energy — If you eat a food high in sugar 30 to 60 minutes before working out, it may actually have a negative effect on your performance. The short-term energy boost could lead temporarily to hypoglycemia, which limits the brain's ability to use its fuel (calories) to boost muscular function and mental drive. Symptoms of hypoglycemia include feeling lightheaded, disoriented, shaky, sweaty and fatigued or having blurred vision and heart palpitations.

- * Beverages that contain caffeine and alcohol stimulate the nervous system and provide energy — Drinks that contain caffeine and alcoholic beverages have dehydration effects, which offer no benefits to a person who works out regularly or an athlete in training.

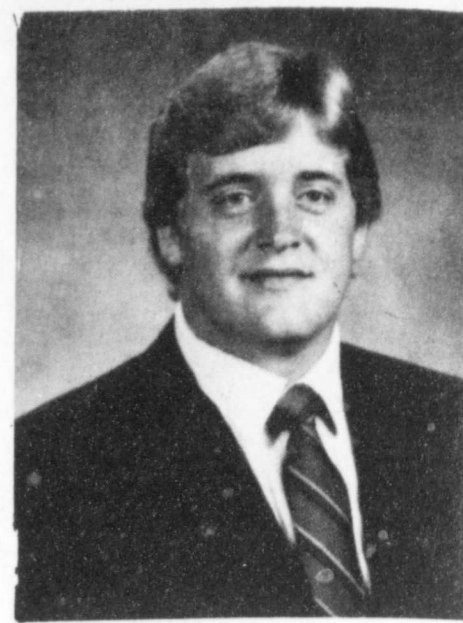

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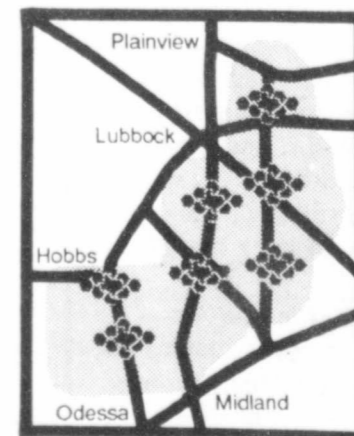
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Lockney girls win at twirling contest

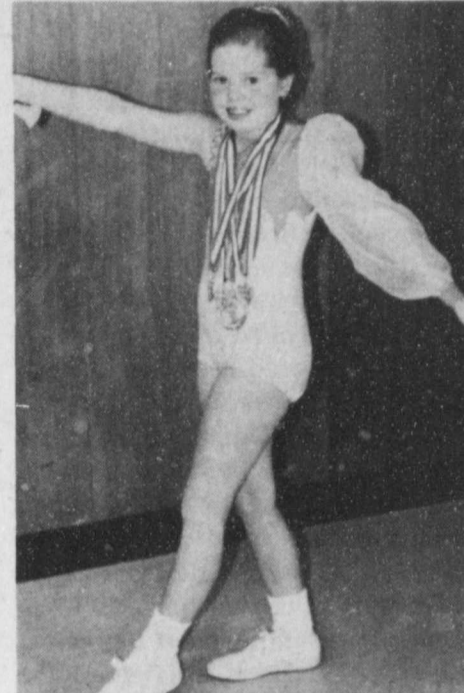

PROFILE OF LANGSTON WILLIAMS Candidate for County Commissioner Precinct 3

Langston Williams was one of eighteen children born to the parentage of Wesley and Alie Williams in the small Williams Community in Caldonia, Texas in the piney woods of East Texas. The boys did field work and the girls housework to survive. They farmed, hunted wild game and grew their own vegetables. Mr. Williams received formal education at Caldonia, but had to quit to help support his family at an early age. Most of his education was self-taught on-the-job and by the strong discipline of his parents. From conversations with my father, sisters and brothers, my dad started work for \$.50 a day as a farmer and cutting logs and pulpwood. He worked from sunup to sundown to harvest his crop with a wagon and a plow, and a mule named Old Kit. The entire Williams family shared a strong religious tradition which is still evident at the reunions which take place on the Williams land once each year.

Mr. Williams taught his children family values and hard work. I recall when I was in school, he stated that he wished he was able to send all of his children to college to get an education. I had always wanted to further my education and learn to achieve. My father and mother who worked very hard with Mrs. Annie Taylor saw to it that I got the proper training to get me into Bishop College and Texas Western in El Paso, which is now the University of Texas at El Paso. Mrs. Taylor felt that if I went to college it would inspire other young blacks to go. Our school, Old North Ward and Della Plains, closed at 11:45 a.m. so that the children could help their parents to harvest the crops for the farmers. In the fall of 1963, I was prepared and entered Bishop College and graduated with a Bachelors Degree in Sociology. My younger brother, Billy Williams, is a career soldier after attending school; my sister, Linda Jean, is in a high level position with an insurance company in Denver, Colorado; Louis served in Viet Nam along with me, Alvertis, where we both received Army Commendation Medals for meritorious service. I received a Purple Heart while serving my country. Langston Williams Jr. graduated from Wayland College and is working to become a principal and has been a coach for the past seven to ten years. John Williams is a minister in Lubbock and F.L. resides and farms in Floydada. Nannie Faye entered the medical field in Dallas and also works for a savings and loan company.

I, Alvertis Williams, have been employed for Dallas County as a Social Worker and advisor for twenty years. I do not feel that I would have achieved my goals if it had not been for the guidance and hard work ethics from both my parents. I think my dad saw that I could not be a farmer because of the many types of farm equipment that I destroyed.

My father has always stood for justice and righteousness. I recall that when we were trying to get new updated books and a warm and better school, he fought for a better school so that children of Floyd County could some day receive a better education.

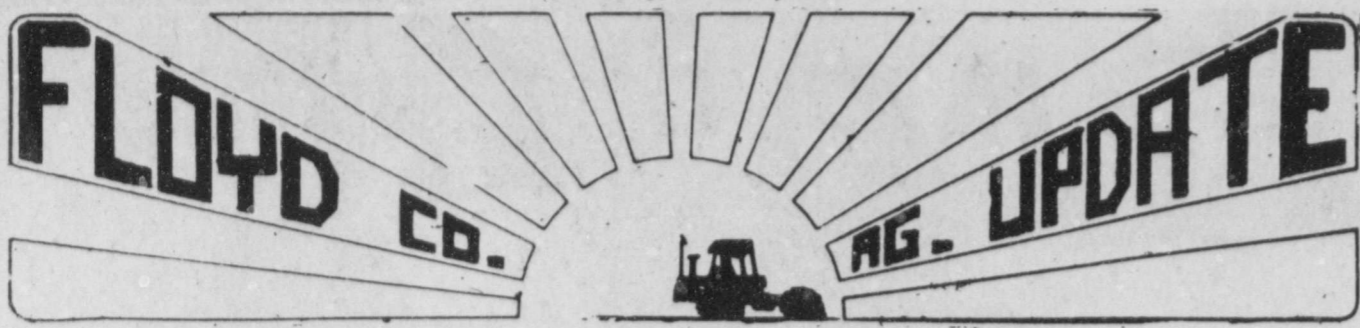
My dad, Langston Williams, helped harvest, cultivate and plant crops in the worst of times when West Texas was open plains. If he gave his word, he felt that a man's word was his bond. "If a man cannot keep his word with a plan or do the job asked of him, then he is less of a man." Many of the young farmers in Floydada and the surrounding communities respect and have worked shoulder to shoulder with my Dad to plant and harvest crops.

When I was drafted into the Army, I started not to go but after talking with my Dad, I am glad I went because he said that you have an obligation as an American citizen and by the Grace of God, you will survive, and I did.

My Dad could have left us when times were hard, but he stayed with my mother and reared us the best a child could be raised. My father taught us to get along with all people. Much of the hard work of my parents was spread from the piney woods of East Texas to the dusty plains of West Texas.

I urge you to vote for Langston Williams on March 10, 1992 as County Commissioner. You will receive honesty from someone who cares about people and will strive to make life better for the youth of tomorrow.

Aphids that attack wheat are identified

Several species of aphids can attack wheat. Wheat producers should be able to determine different species, and should be aware of the differences in the damage they can cause.

Greenbugs are pale green, approximately 1/16-inch long, and have a characteristic dark green stripe running lengthwise down the center of the back. The tips of the feet, antennae, and cornicles (tailpipes) are black. They can develop in large numbers under favorable conditions and may cause economic losses. Greenbugs inject a toxin while feeding that causes red spotting, and an eventual yellowing of leaf tissue.

The first appearance of the Russian Wheat Aphid (RWA) in the U.S. occurred in March, 1986 in the Texas High Plains. It has since extended its range throughout the Great Plains, into Canada and west to California. The RWA is relatively small, lime-green in color,

with an elongated, spindle-shaped body. It is easily distinguished from other aphids by relatively short antennae, a projection above the cauda (tail) which gives it a "double tail" appearance when viewed from the side, and the absence of prominent cornicles. The RWA injects a potent toxin into the plant. Injured plants exhibit white or purple longitudinal streaks. Flattened plants and tightly rolled leaves are additional symptoms of RWA feeding damage. They exist in higher numbers and cause more damage in small grains that are stressed.

Bird cherry-oat aphids are particularly abundant on small grains in Texas. They are yellowish-green and characterized by a normally prominent reddish-orange spot on the back end. This aphid often occurs during the time greenbugs may be present. Control of the bird cherry-oat aphid is seldom required.

English grain aphids are green to bright green in color with black legs and antennae. This aphid can cause crop

damage, but economic yield losses seldom can be attributed to the English grain aphid.

Grandson of Lockney couple wins honors at Houston with pig

Steve Hays, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Hays of Plainview showed the Grand Champion Barrow at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Steve's grandparents are Albert and Mamie Hays of Lockney.

The grand champion barrow, a Chester White named Pookie, was a heavy-weight and weighed 252 pounds. He competed with more than 3,200 pigs entered in the show and judged during a five day period.

The barrow brought a whopping \$70,000 at the sale. Hays keeps \$25,000 and the rest goes into a scholarship fund, brought about under new show rules. Last year's top barrow sold for \$57,000. Hays is a member of the Plainview FFA.

Emergency use of chemical granted

High Plains producers received word Tuesday, February 25, that a special 15-day crisis exemption for the fungicide Baytan had been issued by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) allowing producers in West Texas to use the product. The crisis exemption comes in response to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers request to make Baytan available for the 1992 planting season. The PCG request is now being considered by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

The exemption allows cotton producers in 36 West Texas counties to go ahead and treat planting seed with Baytan to help control the seedling disease black root rot. The TDA crisis exemption is effective for 15 days from the date it was initially granted. The crisis exemption will be extended on EPA approval of the request.

The PCG coordinated effort to collect the necessary information for the Baytan special exemption request, following guidelines in Section 18 of the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act, began in November of 1991. PCG was able to pool the resources of scientists from the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock, producers from across the area, and commercial cottonseed handlers to submit the final exemption request to TDA the last week of January.

"The granting of the crisis exemption for Baytan will mean a great deal to producers in the 36 counties specified by TDA," states PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson. "TDA's declaration of a crisis exemption gives producers a new tool to combat the growing problem of black root rot across West Texas."

In addition to the problem posed by black root rot High Plains producers are also taking a much closer look at aphids and what can be done to effectively combat them in the wake of 1991's

unprecedented control problems.

In the past aphid control research has been conducted despite limited funding. After the 1991 aphid population exhibited its unusual resistance to currently available control methods aphid control research went from an often overlooked budget item to one of the most urgent.

Researchers from the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas A&M University have formed the Cotton Aphid Task Force to try and come up with practical cultural and management techniques that can help control the pest.

Dr. Jeff Slosser, Task Force Chairman, recently explained that the committee has been working hard to pull together a list of preliminary management recommendations and strategies that can help control aphid populations in 1992. Announcement of these recommendations are expected as soon as March 6.

MORE COTTON NEWS

In August of 1991 High Plains producers and other residents actively took part in the Puncturevine Weevil Enhancement Program in an effort to curb the recent increase in the amount of puncturevine weeds found in the area.

Puncturevine, commonly called "goat-head", has been making a comeback in recent years and it is suspected that a decline in puncturevine weevil populations have helped further the increase. Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) is now ready to carry out a second release program to rebuild populations of the beneficial weevil.

PCG officials are targeting a release date somewhere around the first of June. Individuals interested in ordering weevils for release can do so by contacting Roger Haldenby at PCG's Lubbock office, (806) 792-4904.

"Final ordering dates have not been set at this time," notes Haldenby, PCG

Boll Weevil Control Program Coordinator. "We recommend that interested parties get their orders in as quickly as possible. We hope to release more than the 28,100 weevils we let go last August and give the puncturevine weevil population another significant boost."

AND MORE COTTON NEWS

Waste pesticides have become a serious problem for many producers on the High Plains and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Texas Water Commission are making it easy for producers to get rid of these chemicals.

High Plains residents who wish to dispose of unusable or unwanted agricultural chemicals can do so at no charge and no questions asked on Thursday, March 5 in O'Donnell at the Farmers Cooperative Gin. Chemicals will be accepted from 8 a.m. until 3 p.m. Counties specifically targeted for this collection are Crosby, Dawson, Gaines, Garza, Hockley, Lubbock, Lynn, Scurry, and Terry.

Producers interested in participating in the collection program can contact their county extension office for a list of acceptable materials and the type of information needed at the collection site as well as safety measures for transporting chemicals to the collection site. Participants are limited to producers and other private applicators.

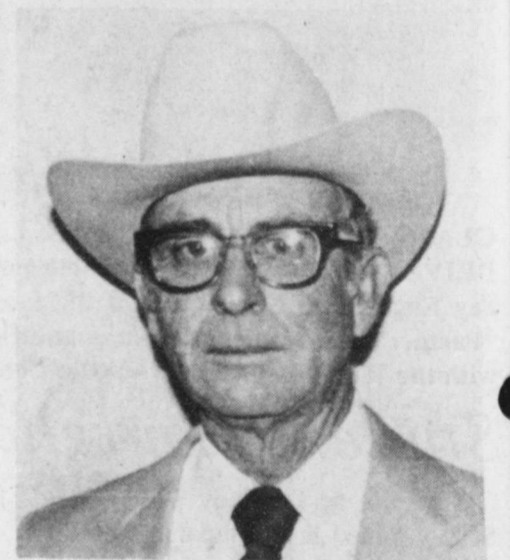

Hobbyist's recipes cater to unusual tastes

He began the hobby in 1965, about two years after he learned to cook.

"I love to eat," he said. "When I got a divorce, I had to teach myself how to cook because eating out got too expensive."

Once he started cooking, the household task grew into a love affair.

McGavock uses socials at Shepherd King Lutheran Church for taste tests.

"They're always asking, 'Mac, when are you going to try something else?'" he said.

Recently he worked on a turnip bread recipe. He has discovered that foods he doesn't like taste different baked in a quick bread - which explains the unusual combinations.

McGavock claims the broccoli bread is one of his favorites.

"I guess because it was one of the hardest to make," he said, noting the difficulty came with the green vegetable's bitterness.

McGavock worked with the recipe on paper and in the kitchen - about six weeks before achieving the precise ingredient combination.

"Oh, if my garbage disposal could talk..." he said, commenting that at least 10 early batches were thrown away.

The retired convenience store man-

ager created the broccoli bread shortly after President Bush announced his dislike for the vegetable in April 1990. McGavock sent Bush the recipe.

"I thought he might like broccoli this way," he said. "I don't know if he does; I never got a reply."

McGavock actively supports the Republican party. Several pictures of Bush and former President Ronald Reagan, as well as certificates of distinguished honor for his party work, hang on a living room wall.

Sitting in the room, he revealed one of his baking secrets.

"I mostly use cottonseed oil in my breads," the baker said. "It's healthier than regular vegetable oil to cook with."

Cottonseed oil contains 26 percent saturated fats, 56 percent poly-saturated fats and 18 percent mono-saturated fats.

The American Heart Association suggests people substitute poly-saturated fats, such as cottonseed oil, for saturated fats.

But for McGavock, taste is the determining factor.

"Sometimes I just have to use butter," he said. "In my recipes, I go for taste. If it tastes good with healthier ingredients, then all the better. Otherwise, who cares?"

In addition to his own culinary crea-

tions, McGavock avidly reads other cookbooks for ideas.

"Like other people read novels," he said.

When he's not in the kitchen, the semi-retired man works as a cashier at Western Sizzlin Steakhouse, 83rd Street and Indiana Avenue.

He is the son of the late Dimple McGavock of Lockney.

Here are a few of Monty "Mac" McGavock recipes.

SAUSAGE CAKE

- 1 lb. sausage, uncooked
- 3 cups brown sugar, firmly packed
- 1 egg, beaten
- 3 1/4 cups sifted flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 cup black coffee
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup pecans, chopped
- 1/2 cup raisins or chopped dates

Mix sugar with sausage; add egg. Sift dry ingredients together and add to sausage mixture alternately with coffee. Add vanilla and beat well. Add chopped fruit and nuts. Pour into well greased tube pan. Bake in 350 degree oven for 1

1/4 hours.

BROCCOLI BREAD

- 3 cups flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 2 cups broccoli, grated
- 3 eggs
- 2 tablespoons grated orange rind (fresh is better)
- 1 1/2 cups chopped walnuts
- 1 1/2 cups cottonseed oil
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3 teaspoons vanilla
- 1 6-ounce can pineapple juice

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Sift dry ingredients together in large bowl. Add other ingredients and stir until thoroughly mixed. Bake in loaf pan sprayed

with non-stick spray for 1 hour at 350 degrees. Let cool for 10 minutes in the pan, and then cool on wire rack.

STRAWBERRY-CARROT BREAD

- 2 cups finely chopped walnuts
- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground cardamom
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 4 beaten eggs
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 1/2 cups mashed strawberries (about 3 cups whole berries)
- 1 cup shredded carrots (2 cups whole carrots)
- 1 cup mashed banana

1 cup cooking oil
1 tablespoon finely shredded orange peel

Grease and flour two 9x5x3 inch loaf pans; sprinkle 1/2 cup of nuts in the bottom of each pan. In a large bowl, stir together flour, baking soda, cinnamon, cardamom, salt and nutmeg. Combine remaining ingredients; add to dry ingredients. Stir just until moistened. Stir in remaining nuts. Spoon batter into prepared pans. Bake in 350 degree oven for 1 hour. Let cool in pans 10 minutes. Place on wire rack to cool. Makes 2 loaves.

Infant swings being recalled

Century Products Company, Macedonia, Ohio, in cooperation with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) is voluntarily recalling its 1991 model wind-up infant swings with the "Whisper-Wind" motor. Century has received 31 reports of injuries to consumers involving these swings. Most injuries were to consum-

ers who were attempting to open the motor housing or repair swings that had stopped working.

If the plastic cover over the swing motor is removed, the powerful, coiled wind-up spring will unwind rapidly and forcefully and may cause serious injury.

The recall applies to approximately 181,000 Century "whisper-wind" infant swings manufactured during 1991. The five swing models involved were sold for \$30-\$80 nationwide (model numbers: 12-319, 12-329, 12-344, 12-345, and 12-349). Recalled units bear manufacturing date codes 9101 through 9112. The date codes are located on a white label on the bottom of the swing set. If the date code on your swing is smaller than 9101 or larger than 9112, or a circular label reading "New Improved Swing" is affixed to the motor, your swing is not affected by this recall.

Century will provide a free replacement motor to all owners of affected models. Consumers should call 1-800-446-1366 to arrange for the free replacement. Century and CPSC warn consumers not to try and disassemble the swing or remove the motor housing until the new motor and complete, step-by-step instructions are received.

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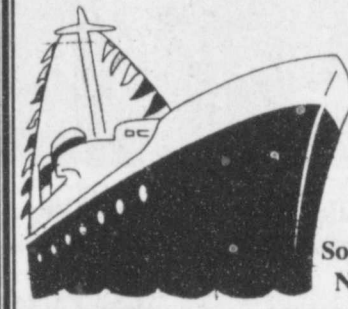

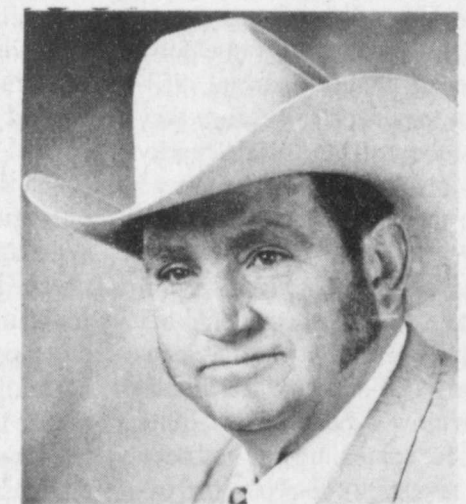

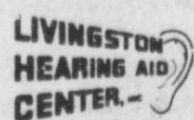

Social Security News

I am often dismayed to find elderly women having greater financial difficulties than they need to because they don't know about all the Social Security benefits available to them. The story I would like to tell you today is an example.

Recently, an elderly widow struggling to make ends meet came into our office to apply for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits. Her Social Security widow's benefit was quite small, and, for some time, she had been using her savings to help pay her expenses. Now she had spent most of her savings, and she turned to SSI for help. This is not an unusual situation and what happened next is not unusual either.

Our widow was married twice, but she had never looked into the possibility of getting Social Security benefits on her first husband's account. After her second husband died, her wife's benefit

was automatically converted to a widow's benefit by a computer that did not know she'd been married twice. If we had interviewed her for a widow's benefit application, we would have found that she was eligible on two records and paid her the biggest amount. When the widow came to our office, we checked her first husband's record and found that she could get almost twice as much on his account.

Unfortunately, many women do not realize that they can get benefits from a previous marriage, under certain circumstances. If the marriage ended in death or if the couple divorced after at least 10 years of marriage, Social Security benefits may be payable.

When a woman applies for Social Security benefits, we only consider the benefits she could receive at the time. If her marital status changes later because of death, divorce, or remarriage, a woman should contact Social Security again. That way she can make sure she is

receiving the highest benefit amount possible.

While the rules covering Social Security eligibility apply equally to women and men, almost all beneficiaries who receive benefits on a former spouse's record are women. Some men worry that their own Social Security benefit or their current wife's benefit will be lower if a former spouse applies for benefits on their record. Neither one of these will happen. Both a current spouse and a former spouse can get full benefits simultaneously.

To find out if you are eligible for Social Security benefits on your former spouse's record, call our office. We will need to know your former spouse's Social Security number, your number, and any other Social Security number you receive benefits on now. If you don't know the Social Security number, we can find it through our records.

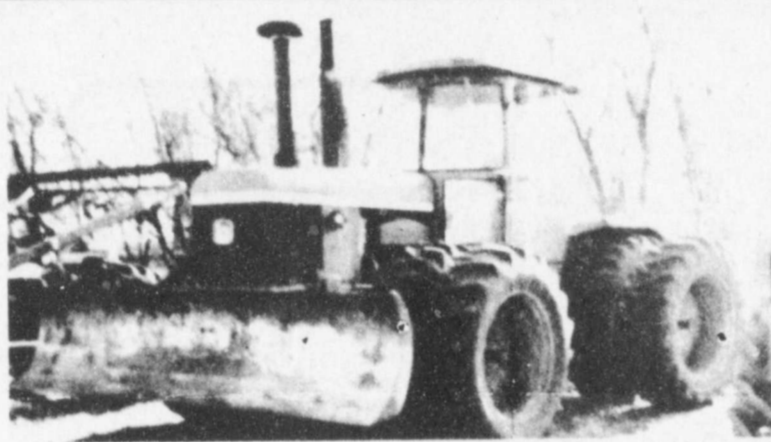

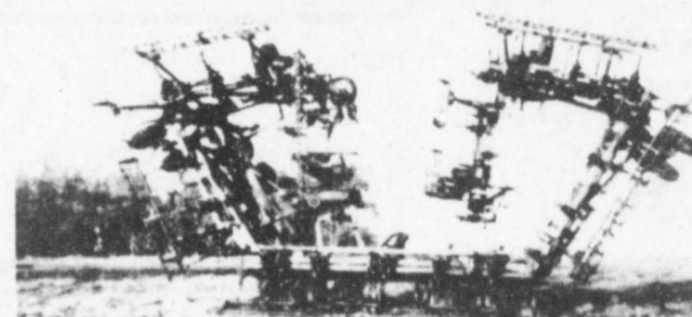

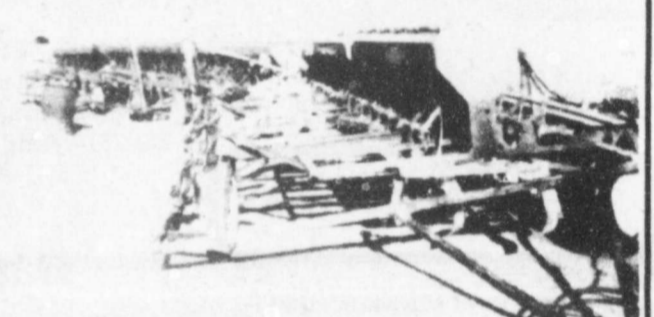
