BACK DURING THE strike by the National Football League players, I remember becoming so disgusted with the situation that I made the statement that "Even if they settled the strike, I was going to quit watching the games on television."

The first quarter wasn't even completed in Washington's game this past week before fans were holding up banners saying "We Want Dallas!"

Well, the Washington fans "got" Dallas. Here's hoping the Cowboys make them wish they had got Green Bay instead.

With the remarkable play of the New York Jets in the playoffs, the two conference final games bid to be good ones. The Jets face Miami in the American Conference finale.

Sorry to bore you football widows with all of this warmed-over football. Mainly, I wanted you to realize what YOUR husband probably meant last fall, if he made one of those hasty statements about being "off" football due to the strike.

Hance Urges Frionans To "Be Positive"

Friona's top citizens were recognized Thursday night at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet.

Honored were Charles Caudill, "Man of the Year," Lois Norwood, "Woman of the Year," Glenda Sifford, "Most Courteous Employee," June Rhodes, "Teacher of the Year," Richie Malouf and Sherri Brown, "Outstanding Young People."

Congressman Kent Hance told the approximately 300 people who braved the cold and snow to attend the annual banquet "These are difficult times for agricultural communities, but we need to keep a positive attitude."

Hance cited the Payment in Kind (PIK) program as something which could give farmers the opportunity to do better, but hoped some changes could be made in the program as it has been presented.

He said the proposed farm bill is the first to attempt to help farmers since 1966, when the farm bills began to be consumer-slanted.

Referring to President Reagan's deficit budget, Hance pointed out that he supported Reagan's budget cuts in 1982, but felt at the time that he wasn't making enough cuts.

"You can't give any agency a blank check--especially the Pentagon, because they'll spend you into oblivion," the Congressman said.

Referring to the proposed cuts in the defense budget, Hance said that the nation has a strong defense. "The Soviets may be ahead of us in numbers in some places, but our technology is much superior," he said, and cited examples where U.S.-built planes outmaneuvered Russian MIGs in the Israeli-Syrian battle last year.

In Reagan's defense, Congressman Hance said "You just can't balance the budget when the country is in a recession."

Hance concluded by pointing out that while our area is having some of its worst financial problems in history, that our country's problems still are small when compared to others around the globe.

The Congressman contributed his honorarium check for being the Chamber speaker to the Parmer County Child Welfare Board, represented by Rev. Skip Sirnic.

Caudill, the "Man of the Year" selection, has been active in Lions Club work, Boy Scout work, the Friona Fine Arts Council, the Library Board, Little League, Chamber of Commerce board and served as general chairman for Maize Days twice.

After spending 14 years with The Travelers Insurance Company, he became a partner with Ethridge-Spring Agency in 1974. He serves as deacon, teacher and song leader at the Sixth Street Church of Christ.

Lois Norwood has been an officer in the United Way, the Friona Fine Arts Council, the Red Cross, Friends of the Library, American Field Service, Progressive Study Club (where she served as president and chairperson of most committees).

She has served as secretary of the Board of Stewards for Friona United Methodist Church, where she also taught Sunday School, was a member of the choir, and held various other offices. She has been a director of the Chamber of Commerce, chairing the Industrial Committee, and has been a director for Friona, Texas Federal Credit Union.

Glenda Sifford, winner of the employee award, is Food Service Supervisor at Prairie Acres Nursing Home, where she has been employed since April of 1977.

Mrs. Sifford is an active member of Union Congregational Church, where she serves as a youth group sponsor, and has served in several official capacities within the church.

June Rhodes is a third grade teacher in the Friona system. She has

spent 25 years as teacher in the local system, and prior to that taught at Bovina for 15 years, and seven years in Oklahoma, or 47 years in all.

Mrs. Rhodes, who was selected as Friona's "Woman of the Year" in 1979, was cited for her emphasis on patriotism, teaching the students to love and respect their country.

Sherri Brown has been especially active in FHA, where she has held district offices. She is a member of FCA, and has been an officer in the National Honor Society. She was a regional qualifier in golf her sophomore and junior years.

She has been a class officer, was voted class favorite and nominated for best dressed and most beautiful as a freshman and again as a sophomore. As a junior she was class favorite and best dressed and received the Home Economics award.

Richie Malouf, the 12th child in his family, has received many honors in school, and is very studious. He is active in athletics, including football and basketball.

He enjoys riding horses, skiing and snowmobiling. He plans to attend college at San Marcos and study to become a dentist.

Nine-Inch Snow Stalls Area Again

The Friona area was hit late this week by the second major winter storm of the season, closing down schools and severely hampering travel.

Snow began to fall at about 10 a.m. Thursday and continued throughout the day and night. The accumulation by 8 a.m. Friday was nine inches. Rodney Dunnam, official weather recorder, said the moisture content amounted to .75 inches.

Friona schools called off classes, as did most of the schools in the Panhandle area.

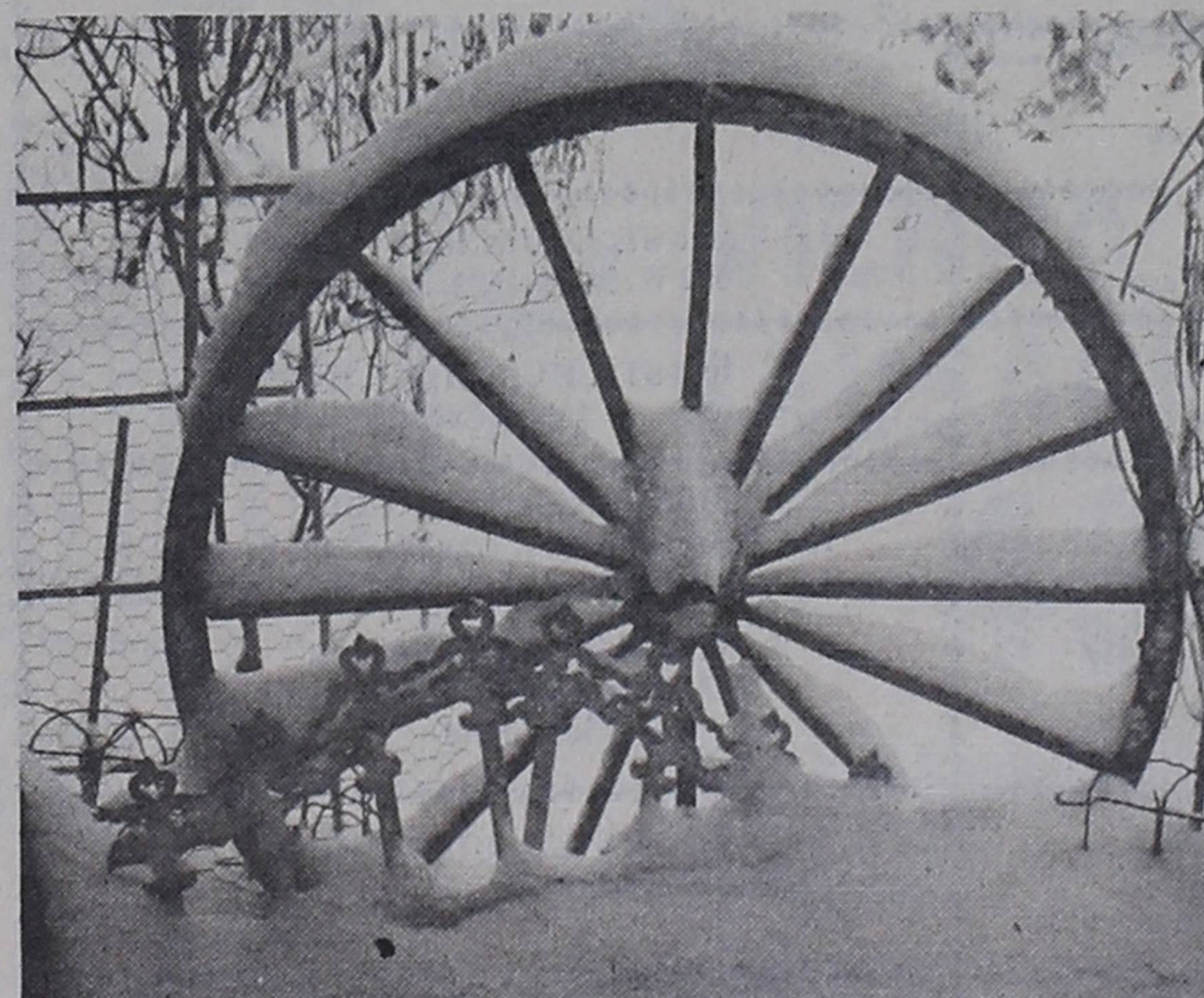
Comparative snow totals for other parts of the area, as of early Friday morning, included Dimmitt, 16 inches; Hereford, 13 inches; Lubbock, 15 inches; Littlefield, ten inches; Muleshoe, 7½ inches, .72 inch moisture.

The latest snowfall has been very similar to that which the area received the week after Christmas, when 10½ inches were measured. The two snows together total 19½ inches, which is thought to be the most snow the area has received in a month's time since February of 1956, when 26 inches fell in what has to be the "Grand-Daddy Snowfall of all time" for the local area.

Roads in the area were open Friday, although travel was slowed considerably Friday morning.

Prior to the snowfall, the Friona weather station had recorded .17 inch of moisture for the week, coming mostly from a slow drizzle on Tuesday, for a grand total for the week of .92 inch of moisture.

Schools across the area were closed Friday due to the snowstorm. All Parmer County schools were closed, along with those at Dimmitt, Hereford, Muleshoe, Littlefield, Canyon and Tulia, just to name a few.

The games will be played next Wednesday, January 26, beginning at 2 p.m., according to school officials.

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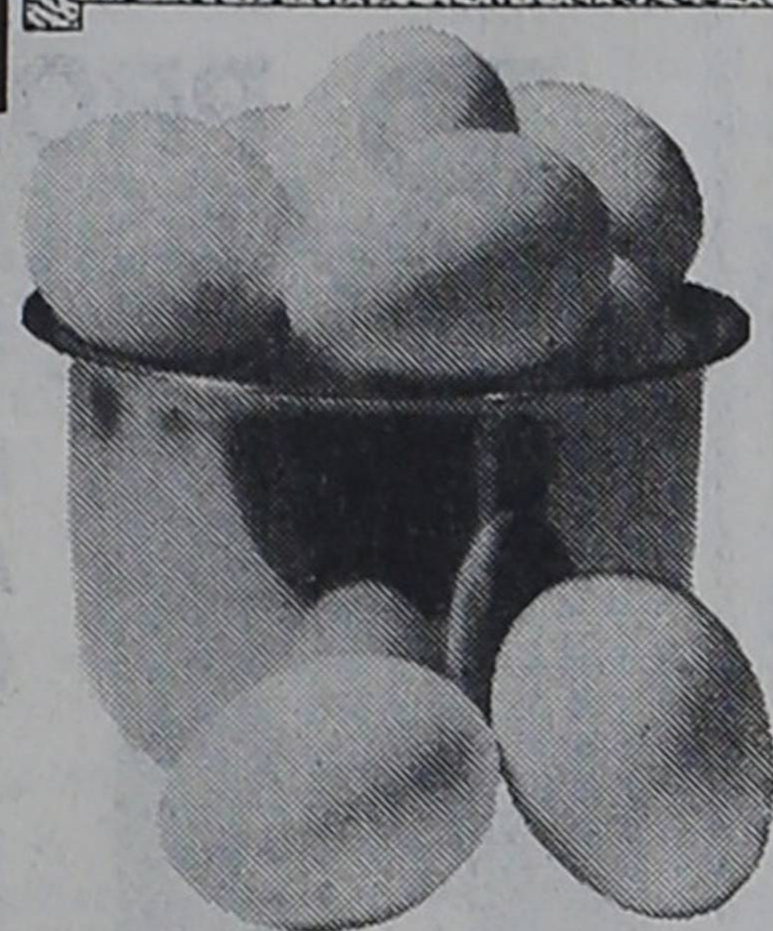

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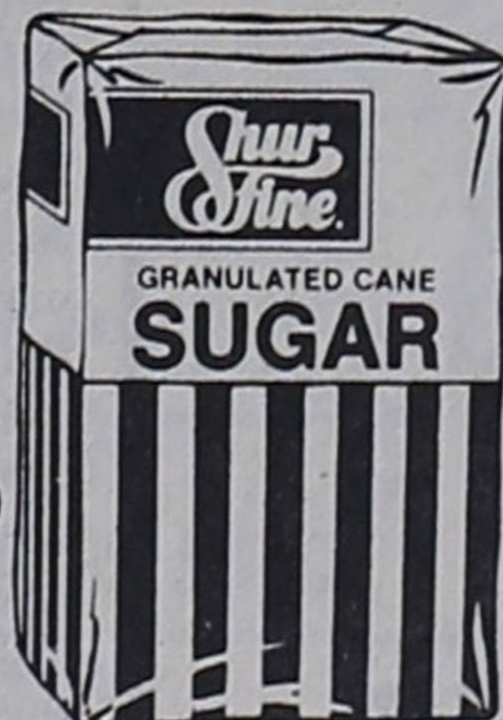

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Around The House In Parmer County

 Care & Tips On Removing Stains From Fiberglass Bathing Fixtures
 Many bathrooms today are furnished with fiberglass bathtubs, tub/shower combinations or shower stalls with either a shiny mirror-like finish or a textured surface for added safety. These molded bathing fixtures are installed without caulking and grouting. The Soap and Detergent Association advises proper care in order to maintain their sparkling new looks.
 Manufacturers of the fixtures offer the following suggestions for the regular cleaning of the bathroom units. Use a nonabrasive cleaning agent such as an all-purpose household cleaner, bathroom cleaner, liquid cleanser or baking soda. Abrasive cleaners and pads should be avoided since they may scratch, discolor or dull the surface of the fixture.
 Liquid and spray cleaners can be applied full strength to the fixture. For a powdered product, use the following method: wet the surface first. Make a water paste solution or apply the product to the fixture and let it remain on the surface for a few minutes. Then gently rub the area using a sponge, nylon brush or polyethylene pad. Rinse the unit thoroughly.
 Stubborn stains may require a little extra attention. Sponge a stained area with any of the products mentioned above. Let the cleaner remain on the stain for about an hour; then rinse. Other methods are necessary for some stains. For example, in hard water areas, a mineral deposit could build up. There are products available specifically designed to remove such deposits. Package instructions should be read and followed carefully.
 Tough stains such as adhesives, tar, iodine, gentian violet and oil-based paints can be removed with acetone (nail-polish remover) or a paint thinner such as turpentine. Saturate a clean, white cotton cloth with the solution and lightly rub the affected area until the stain disappears. Care should be taken when using these products. They are solvents that will not harm the fiberglass finish, but should be used sparingly. Solvents are highly flammable and should not be used near heat or any open flame. Do not smoke while using these products, and work in a well ventilated area. They should not be allowed to go down the drain or come in contact with a plastic drain grate. Use a dampened clean cloth or sponge to wipe off the treated surface.
 To maintain a lustrous finish, one manufacturer recommends conditioning the surfaces. Rub an automotive white polishing compound applied with a clean cloth to any scratched or dulled areas. Then buff the surface with a light application of an automotive white cream wax using a clean turkish towel. It is also suggested that this treatment be done about twice a year in order to maintain an attractive finish.

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Chiefs Drop Pair In District Play

Friona High School Chieftains dropped a pair of games in District 2-AAA play last Friday night at Tulia and here Tuesday against Muleshoe.

The Chieftains' 56-54 loss to Tulia was the hardest pill to swallow, because the deciding points were put on the scoreboard after time had expired.

The game was a see-saw affair for practically its entire duration. Friona took a 16-14 lead at the end of the first quarter, which saw first one, then the other team in the lead.

Tulia then took advantage of a cold spell by the Chieftains, and some good free throw shooting on their own behalf to outscore the Chiefs, 19-13 in the second quarter and took a 33-29 halftime lead.

Friona had a good third quarter, catching up with the Hornets and taking the lead. Richie Malouf stole a Tulia pass near midcourt and drove in

for a basket just ahead of the buzzer to give Friona a 41-39 lead going into the final quarter.

That set the stage for a heart-stopping finish by the two teams. Tulia put on a spurt and took advantage of a couple of Friona turnovers to score six quick points and take a 45-41 lead.

However, the Chieftains battled back to tie the score at 48-48. Scott Straw missed a 1-1 free shot and then fouled Matt Murff, who made both shots for a 52-48 Tulia lead.

But Joey Howard connected on a shot from the corner, and a few seconds later Malouf again stole the ball and drove for the basket. His shot rimmed out, but Howard was trailing the play. He put the ball in the hoop for a 52-all tie with 1:25 to play.

Straw fouled Jim Gleason, whose free throws gave Tulia a 54-52 lead

with 1:13 left. Michael Chaney, who had a great night at the free throw line, hitting seven of eight attempts, hit two pressure shots with 1:01 left to again tie the game for Friona, 54-all.

Tulia controlled the ball most of the remaining time. The Hornets went for a final shot after calling time with 12 seconds left, but the shot wouldn't fall. The ball rolled around on the floor for several seconds before a tie ball was called.

Tulia's Murff came up with the tip, and in the melee, was fouled by Straw as time expired on the clock. After Friona called a time out, Murff calmly made his first shot, the only one needed; then completed the 1-1 shot for the Hornet win.

"I thought the kids played a good defensive game. We caused some turnovers, but couldn't take advantage," said Coach Tom Johnson. Friona coaches and fans wondered how there could have been any time left on the clock for Straw's last foul, but that's the way the officials called it.

On Tuesday here, the Chieftains had one of their slow first quarters, scoring only six points, and Muleshoe grabbed a 12-6 lead. Friona outscored the Mules, 29-27, and pulled to within eight points in the fourth quarter, but could not make up the difference, as Muleshoe won, 55-44.

Charlie Morgan's ten points paced the team's scoring.

The Friona Squaws split two games in a week's time, falling to Tulia at Tulia, 52-41, but coming back for a 46-37 win over Muleshoe here Tuesday night.

The results of the action left the Squaws with a 1-2 District 2-AAA record.

The team engaged in a nip-and-tuck game with the Tulia Hornets in a game at Tulia last Friday, only to have the Tulia team come up with a rally in the last four minutes which resulted in the 52-41 loss.

The Squaws were in charge for most of the first quarter. Wennetter Jackson scored a layup, and Sherry O'Brian a jump shot to give Friona an early 4-0 lead. Tulia cut the margin to 4-3, and Miss O'Brian's tip-in gave Friona a 6-3 edge.

Free throws by Misses Brockman and O'Brian and one by Kristi Britting gave Friona an 18-15 lead with 55 seconds left in the first half, but Tulia scored three baskets to take a 21-18 lead at the intermission.

Tulia maintained its three-point lead throughout most of the third quarter, and stretched it to seven points at 31-24 late in the quarter. Sherry O'Brian's jump shot cut it to five points, 31-26 at the buzzer.

Baskets by Misses Brockman and O'Brian to begin the fourth quarter trimmed Tulia's lead to one, 31-30. After Tulia responded to take a 37-30 lead, Wennetter Jackson scored a pair of baskets and Miss Britting a free throw for a 37-35 deficit.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

We are most certainly aware of the changing world in which we live. Some changes are to benefit our nation, which we must all appreciate to keep our country the best in the world. Some changes are not to the general, tax paying citizen's advantage. In reading this article you will be aware what is most certainly in store for each of us, unless we ban together and reject this plan.

I want you to realize what will happen if you agree or allow the Post Office to eliminate door-to-door mail delivery and in its place require you to receive mail at neighborhood box units (NBU's). At the present time, your mail, packages, registered mail, along with advertisements are brought to your door by the mailman. This is a service our generation accepts and enjoys and has not stopped to think what mail service would be like if we did not have this. Nobody ever likes to have any kind of service reduced, but this is really more than that. Normally, this type of reduction in service is started in low income areas or public housing projects and military installations where the Postal Service may feel that the postal customer has no voice or anyone to complain to. This is most unfortunate, because historically, the Postal Service has provided door-to-door delivery to the American public at whatever the cost. Now, the Postal Service is trying to eliminate what you are paying for. This problem is most unfortunate for all Americans, but more especially, it will harm the elderly, ill and handicapped.

Mail service door-to-door would be a thing of the past. Neighborhood Box Units (NBU's) would be the new way to receive mail. Please do not think this is so far in the future that we do not need to concern ourselves. Friends, it is upon us. Take a look around and you will see these NBU's

in use many places. The Postal Service will tell you that NBU's are safer for your mail because you have a key to your box. The problem is, you have to walk to the corner or the end of the block and pick up your mail. Your packages and other signature mail will have to be picked up at the post office, because the letter carrier will not be allowed to come to your door. This is surely a cut-back or reduction in mail service. The reason you must complain while there is still time is: the Postal Service was authorized to increase first-class postage to twenty cents (20¢), then Congress has appropriated the necessary federal funds to provide six day delivery and door-to-door delivery. Furthermore, the Postmaster General has indicated that even though there was some loss of postal subsidy, the loss would be absorbed without reducing mail service. It is not fair to you, the postal customer, to be required to go to an area box for your mail. You should have the same quality service that you enjoy now, and that is door-to-door mail service. If you agree to NBU's, the next reduction will be worse. Voice your objection by writing or calling your postmaster now. Even more important and effective, write your Congressman and ask for his help before it is too late.

I am the National Business Agent for the National Association of Letter Carriers, AFL-CIO, representing letter carriers in Texas and New Mexico. Working in this capacity, I am very much aware of this danger to your mail service and feel strongly that I must warn you, the postal customer, of the plans for the near future. There is still time for you to take action to stop this. I hope you will do so.

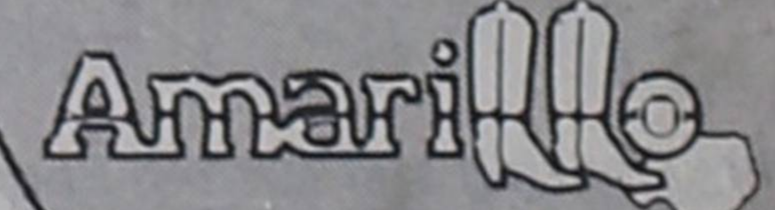
