Annual Floydada Rodeo underway this weekend

Daredevils from Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas will meet at the Floydada Rodeo Grounds, June 26 & 27, to compete in Floydada's 35th annual rodeo. Both performances will begin at 8:00 p.m.

Cowboys and cowgirls will compete in a variety of adult events including bare back riding, saddle bronc riding, novice saddle bronc, bull riding, calf roping, bull dogging, break away roping, girls barrel racing, single steer roping, team roping and the county ribbon roping. Children will be able to compete Friday and Saturday night in the Kid's

Calf Scramble.

As in previous years, the rodeo is sponsored by the Floydada Rodeo Association. The rodeo stock is TCRA approved and provided by Maverick Rodeo Company, in Tulia.

Don McCandless will return as the rodeo announcer. Admission to the rodeo is \$5.00 for adults and children under 12 are admitted free. Children must be accompanied by an adult.

The week-end events will end with a rodeo dance Saturday night after the rodeo performance. Blake Küchen's will provide the music.

Expansion plans revealed by Floydada's Pay-n-Save

In an effort to serve their customers better and add more shopping convenience, plans are currently underway to expand the Floydada Pay-N-Save grocery store.

"Construction will start in the fall of '92," said Johnny Summers, manager of Floydada Pay-N-Save.

"The building will be expanded in front and on the sides," said Summers. "The plans are to include a bakery and delicatessen. We will also expand the variety of store items and have a larger selection to choose from. The aisles will also be wider. It is going to be very nice

and we are really excited about it."

The current Pay-N-Save store was opened in September of 1985 when Roger Lowe, of Littlefield, purchased the Buddy's Supermarket at that location.

The store was expanded in October 1989 from 9,000 square feet to 14,900 square feet.

"After construction is completed, Lowe's Pay-N-Save will have close to 21,000 square feet," said Summers. "We hope this will help our customers and they will be happy with the improvements."

Producers receives first load of wheat from Hinkle

Wheat harvest is well underway in Floyd County. The first load of wheat was delivered by Joe Hinkle to Producers Cooperative Elevators in Floydada. The wheat was cut the afternoon of Wednesday, June 3 on the Q.D. Williams farm on the rim of the canyon. It was delivered to the elevator at 8:00 a.m. on June 4.

The first load delivered to an elevator in Lockney was brought in to Lockney Co-op in the afternoon on June 4 by Keith Phillips. The wheat was cut on the Herman King farm.

Combines take to the fields in-between rains and farmers are gradually getting the wheat to the elevators. Very few custom harvesters are here to help with the cutting. Rain downstate slowed

the harvest and the custom cutters skipped this area and moved on to jobs in the mid-west.

The dryland wheat is averaging 20 to 50 bushels an acre. A few acres have yielded no more than 10 or 15 bushels. Joe Nance, manager of Providence Farm Supply, reported a partial field that yielded 71 bushels.

According to Bob Vickers, manager of Producer's Cooperative Elevators in Floydada, "The quality is not as good as we would like to have but under the conditions it is about what we expected." He reported yields of 20 to 51 bushels. This included their elevators in Cedar Hill, Lakeview and Dougherty.

Lockney man injured

A 19-year-old Lockney man, Jose Louis Luna, involved in an early Monday morning car-train accident in Plainview, was listed in satisfactory condition at University Medical Center in Lubbock on Wednesday morning, according to UMC officials. He was moved from the Intensive Care Unit to a patient room on Wednesday.

Luna suffered facial and severe head injuries when the vehicle he was driving collided with a northbound Santa Fe Railroad train near the intersection of

35th and Columbia Streets. Department of Public Safety Trooper John Gonzales said Luna, had been westbound on 35th Street when the collision occurred. His vehicle was dragged about 600 yards by the train's 14th car before coming loose, Gonzales said.

The fire department received the call at 3:54 a.m. and emergency crews used the Jaws of Life to free Luna, who was pinned on the front seat of the car.

Council handles zoning items

City zoning ordinances occupied the majority of the June session of the Floydada City Council on Tuesday, June 23. The council lead off the session with a Public Hearing to determine opposition to a request for a variance on the city housing ordinance which specifies minimum size for a home in Floydada.

The request was made by Mr. and Mrs. Pedro Aguilar in May. They asked to be allowed to locate a smaller than regulation house on a lot they own and build two additions on it which would bring it up to city specifications. The city planning and zoning commission recommended that the request be denied. Following discussion at the May council session, the council returned the matter to the planning group, asking that a public hearing be scheduled to seek input from residents of the surrounding area. The hearing was set, advertised and the property owners within 200 feet of the lot were notified.

Attending the hearing in addition to council members were Pedro Aguilar, Peggy Aguilar, Joe Barrientos, Janie Barrientos, John Silva and Vicente Avila Jr. No objection was offered by anyone owning the surrounding property.

Following the hearing, the council voted unanimously to grant the variance. Motion for the action came from council member Ruben Barrientoz with

a second by council member Wayne Tipton.

ZONING VIOLATION DISCUSSED

The council again addressed the issue of a reported zoning violation at 128 W. Crockett. The resident of that home, Carlos Trevino, reportedly operating a commercial mechanic business out of the home in violation of the residential designation of the area.

During discussion, the council was all told that the man had ceased working on cars and was only doing lawn mowers at this time. Mayor Wayne Russell also told the council that the area had been cleaned up and that Trevino had stated that he would not resume the auto mechanic work on a commercial basis.

A motion was made by Barrientoz that the council take no action at this time, but that the ordinance be enforced if the commercial activity is resumed in the future. Tipton provided the second. The motion passed with council member Amado Morales abstaining.

The council also considered a recommendation from the planning and zoning commission that a variance be granted for Dora Martinez at 519 S. Main Street. Her son, Noe Martinez, asked that the city allow him to remove her current residence, a mobile home of 450 square feet and replace it with a larger, more modern trailer of 840 square feet. Although this would be

larger, it would still be below the 1000 square foot minimum required by the city ordinance.

The council decided to approve the recommendation of the planning and zoning commission on a motion by council member Clar Schacht, seconded by Barrientoz, and approved by unanimous vote of the attending council members.

Council members next deliberated the developing of a consistent code of enforcement guidelines to be used on all future zoning violations and variance requests. The consensus of the council following discussion was that a set series of responses be developed to handle any violation or request in a consistent and uniform manner.

The council asked city manager Gary Brown to work with city attorney Karen Houchin in developing procedures to insure this. Motion for the action was

Floyd County Precinct 1 and 4 Justice of the Peace Lowell Bilbrey announced his intention to resign from his elected office on Tuesday, June 23. His resigna-

tion will be effective June 30, 1992. Bilbrey, who has held the post since his appointment on January 2, 1985, stated that he was giving up the post in order to join his wife, Joy, who retired earlier this year, in retirement.

"We are going to take the time to travel and do some of the things we have been wanting to do while we still have our health and can enjoy it," said Bilbrey. "Even though we intend to travel and visit other places, this is still going to be our home."

"I am deeply appreciative of the support and cooperation I have received from the people in Floyd County that I was appointed to serve," said Bilbrey. "I know that I could not have continued to hold the office and do my job without their assistance and consideration. I hope that level of support will be maintained for the person who is appointed to fill the post of Precinct 1 & 4 Justice of the Peace."

SUCCESSOR TO BE APPOINTED

Floyd County Judge Bill Hardin told the Hesperian-Beacon that applications to fill the position by appointment would be accepted by the Floyd County Commissioners Court in the County Judge's Office at the Courthouse in Floydada until 5:00 p.m. on Monday, June 29. Applicants must be residents of Precinct 1 or 4. One of the applicants will be selected by the court to replace Bilbrey until the November General Election.

I've often wondered how that little girl

turned out.

How many of you upstanding parents have made excuses for their children when faced with teachers, principals or law enforcement officers confronting you with problems that your child has caused.

Just ask any police officer how many times he has been through this scenario. He is called to a scene of a theft, assault, or shoplifting involving a juvenile. The child is taken home with the hopes that the police and the parents can work together to stop the behavior before it gets worse (believe it or not, all police want that more than anything).

But instead of a parent standing firm and disciplining the child, the officer is met with verbal abuse from the parent for "harassing the child."

What kind of message do you think the youngster is getting from this?

What about the kid that comes home laughing to his parents about getting away from the police when they were trying to pull him over for speeding?

How many parents have bragged about that to their children?

Speeding may not be a big deal but the disrespect for authority is.

Cooperative elevators at Lockney, South Plains and Sterley is averaging 25 to 50 bushels.

Attebury Grain in Lockney reported approximately the same averages as the rest of the county. Wilson Brothers delivered the first load to their facility on June 5.

Herman Graham at the Muncy Elevator stated that yields coming in to his elevator were running between 14 and 40 bushels. Marble Brothers brought the first load across the scales on June 13.

Roger Pogue at Lon Davis Grain reported "The county started off with a real good wheat crop. The test weight was 58, 59 and 60 pounds but the last few days it has dropped off to 55, 56 and 57 pounds." He continued, "We are seeing averages of 25 to 40 bushels and I think we may be about 40 percent through." Mickey Dot Hammonds delivered the first grain to Lon Davis on June 15.

D.L. Miller at Barwise Elevator said that their wheat was averaging 15 to 20 bushels with an occasional 30 bushels. "We had hail and way too much rain," he stated. Their first load was brought in on June 5 from the Alford Farms. It was cut by Noel Brothers.

Delegates attend Republican convention

Three Floyd County delegates and one alternate attended the Republican State Convention in Dallas, June 18. Representing the county were: Albert Scheele, of Providence, Bill Hale and Dr. Randall Griffin, of Floydada, and Carolyn Hale served as an alternate.

Six thousand delegates and 6,000 alternates from across the state are eligible to attend the convention. From those delegates, three men and three women will be chosen to attend the National Convention in Houston.

"The state delegates voted on a variety of issues and adopted the platform from the Republican party of Texas," said Scheele.

"Some points of the platform that I believe people in this county would be interested in include the party's stand on prayer in the schools, local control of schools, and continues to be Pro-Life."

"The platform states that the Republican Party supports prayer in school, is opposed to pornography and believes homosexuality is a perversion of natural

law.

"It supports the right to keep and bear arms and capital punishment. It also believes that quality education is best achieved by encouraging parental involvement and maximizing local control of public schools, including textbook selection and curriculum development. The platform also supports the concept of choice in education."

According to Scheele the most heated

discussion at the convention concerned the Pro-Life, Pro-Choice debate. "We retained the Pro-Life stance. According to the platform, 'The Republican Party of Texas believes that the unborn child has a fundamental individual right to life which cannot be infringed upon except

when the mother's physical life is in danger....We oppose the use of public revenues and/or facilities for abortion or abortion-related services. We support the elimination of public funding for organizations which advocate or support abortion."

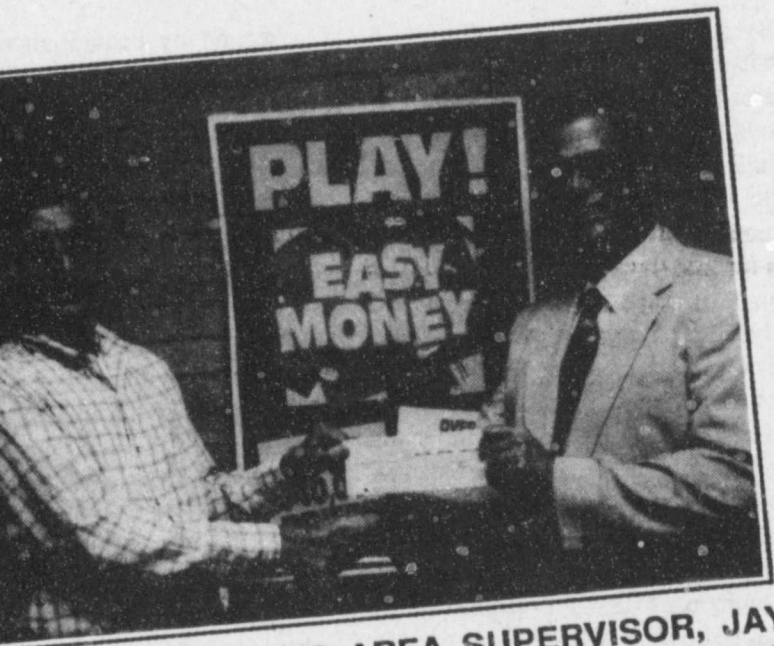

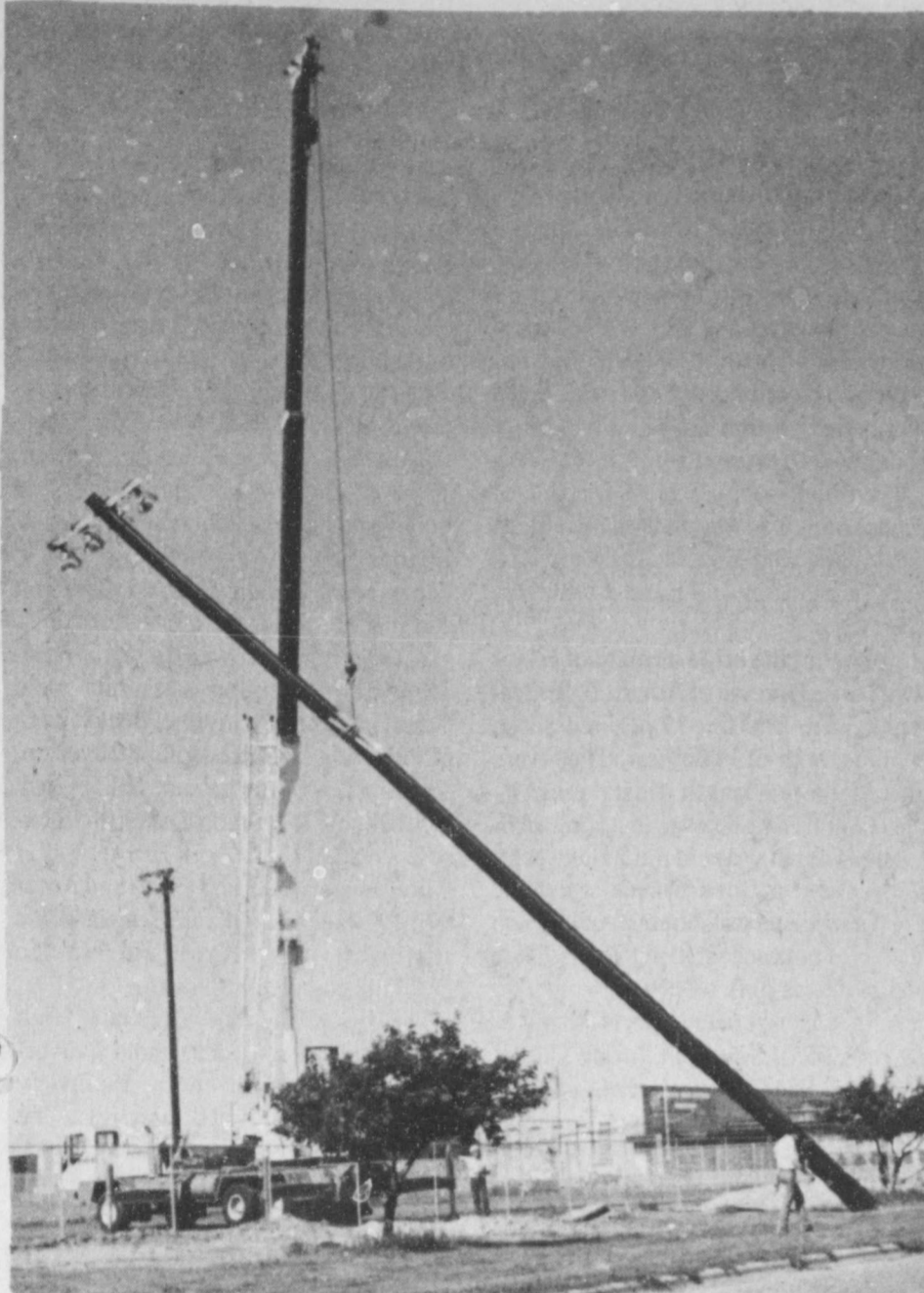

made by council man Amado Morales and seconded by Schacht. The vote was unanimous.

COURTHOUSE SQUARE TRAFFIC CONTROL

Results of a recent survey to determine public opinion concerning proposed changes to the manner in which traffic is controlled at the four intersections around the courthouse square were revealed to the council. A total of 526 surveys were returned to the city after forms were enclosed in city utility bills mailed at the end of May.

294 wanted no changes, 121 preferred adding a four way stop at Main and California, 95 wanted four-way stops at all corners and sixteen offered other suggestions.

Upon hearing the results of the survey, the council decided to look into adjusting the time delay on the street light at Main and California. The remainder of the intersections around the courthouse square are to remain the same for the time being. Motion to take no other action was made by Tipton and seconded Barrientoz. Approval was unanimous.

ELECTRIC COMPANY PROMOTIONS

Council members heard a report from Brown concerning meeting promotions currently offered by Southwestern Public

Service (SPS) in their efforts to secure additional customers in Floydada. The council voted to begin offering the same of the same promotions to Floydada Power and Light customers in an attempt to retain current customers and attract new customers.

Motion was made by Morales and seconded by Tipton that the city offer rebates on heat pumps and provide electric water heaters. The promotions would be contingent upon the customer signing a contract to utilize FP&L for a specific time period in order to participate in the promotion. No financing will be offered by the city on these promotions.

CITY ATTORNEY REPORTS ON SEMINAR

City attorney Karen Houchin gave council members a brief description of the items covered at a recent seminar she attended. The event provided continuing education for those involved in the legal aspects of city government. The topics discussed at the seminar were designed to keep city attorneys and officials informed about recent or upcoming changes in the manner in which city concerns can be handled. Among the items she was briefed on were ethics, city economic problems, employment references, environmental issues, code enforcement, tax increases and the American with Disabilities Act (ADA).

CITY MANAGER REPORT

Brown told the council that the city must submit a plan for developing compliance to the ADA by July 26, 1992 and must be in compliance by July of 1995. His report also reported that the landfill application is still in the works, but no apparent progress has been made.

Budget concerns were also on the report with Brown telling the council that they will be considering increases in sanitation, sewer and water fees in the future in order to meet government legislated mandates. He told the council that they can expect to do more with less, expect citizens to demand more and have higher expectations of what the

city can do for them as well as want to pay less for city services.

Among the routine items handled by the council were the payment of monthly bills and the approval of the minutes from the May regular session and a June 2 special session.

Attending the session were Mayor Wayne Russell, council members Amado Morales, Ruben Barrientoz, Clar Schacht, Wayne Tipton and Eric Cornelius, city manager Gary Brown, city secretary Sharon Quisenberry, city attorney Karen Houchin, Karen Lawson, John Silva, Joe Barrientos, Janie Barrientos, Pedro Aguilar, Peggy Aguilar, Vicente Avila Jr., Joe Stepp and the Hesperian-Beacon reporter.

LDRP stands for-Labor, Delivery, Recovery and Postpartum. This will be in a separate wing with its own labor and delivery waiting area.

These rooms will have the latest technology and equipment being used today. Already in use are the Hill-Rom birthing beds. The hospital has two of these beds. These are the best available beds being used today in many hospitals. They are used for all stages of childbirth.

Labor is when a woman starts contracting and the baby is preparing to be born. These beds can be positioned for the patients comfort during labor.

Delivery is the actual birth process. The rooms are equipped for normal deliveries. The birthing beds are also used for the patients comfort and also the physician and nursing personnel can breakdown certain areas of the bed for the delivery.

Recovery is necessary to monitor the infant and mother for a specified time until maternal and fetal wellbeing is established. The rooms will have all the necessary monitors and equipment for the infant and the mother.

Postpartum is the care and continued wellbeing of the mother and infant. This continues until discharge from the hospital.

All of this is done in the LDRP rooms. These rooms provide comfort

for the mothers and families. They are fully equipped for the nurses and physicians. There is no rushing from one room to another. These rooms are only for normal deliveries, patients who need a cesarean section will still have to be taken to surgery. This will be a great step for our hospital.

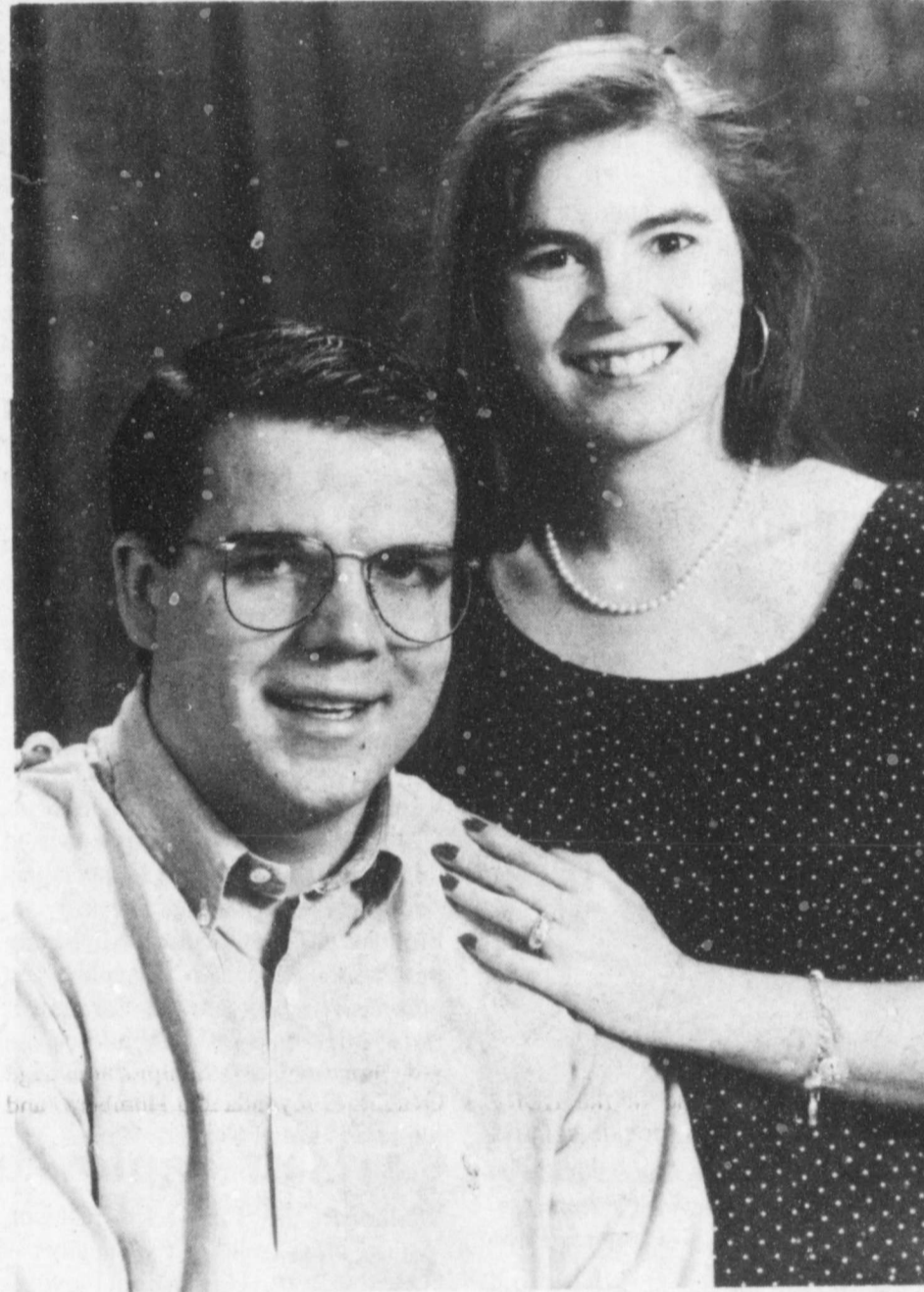

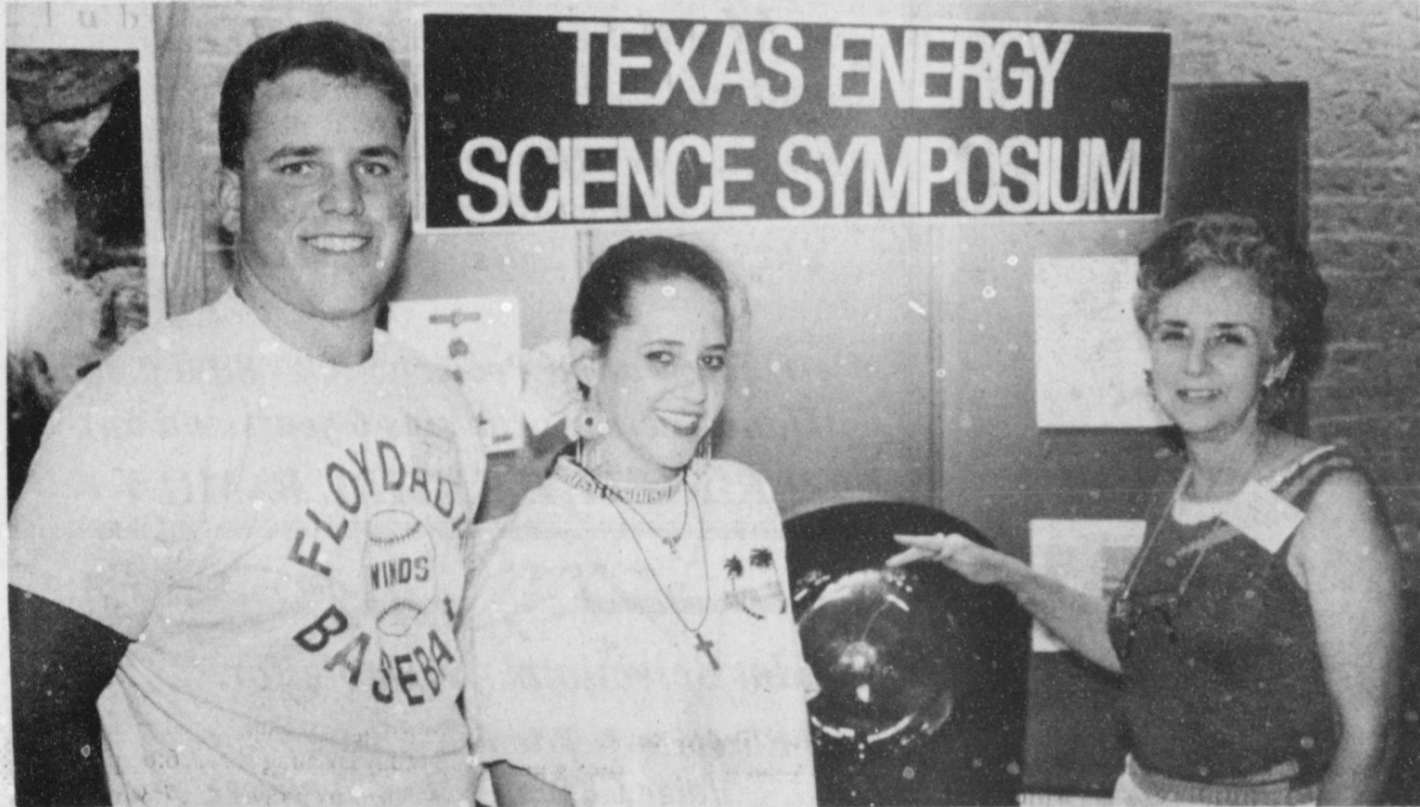

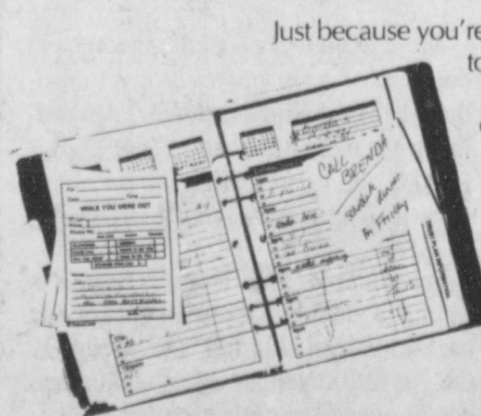

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Man mistaken for intruder, shot

DURANGO, Colo. (AP) - A 36-year-old man apparently mistaken as an intruder was fatally wounded when he entered the trailer of an acquaintance near here, the La Plata County sheriff's office said.

Mark Edward Griffith, a native of Lockney, was shot once in the chest early Sunday, June 21, authorities said.

Authorities have not ruled the shooting a homicide, and no arrests have been made.

Griffith entered the trailer where Jess Rhoades, 35, owner of the trailer, and Michelle Barrett, 29, were sleeping, officials said.

Griffith, a pipe-fitter foreman, knew both Rhoades and Barrett socially, officials said, but Rhoades awakened and mistook Griffith for an intruder.

Rhoades fired one shot from a 9mm pistol, striking Griffith in the right chest, investigators said.

Griffith was taken to the Mercy Medical Center, where he died later that same day.

Services for Mark Edward Griffith, 36, will be at 10:30 a.m. Friday, June 26, 1992, at Church of Christ, West College and Third in Lockney, with the Rev.

Frank Duckworth, officiating. Burial will be in the Lockney Cemetery under the direction of Moore-Rose-White Funeral Home.

He died Sunday, June 21, 1992, at Mercy Medical Center.

Griffith was born January 4, 1956 in Lockney. He was a graduate of Lockney

High School.

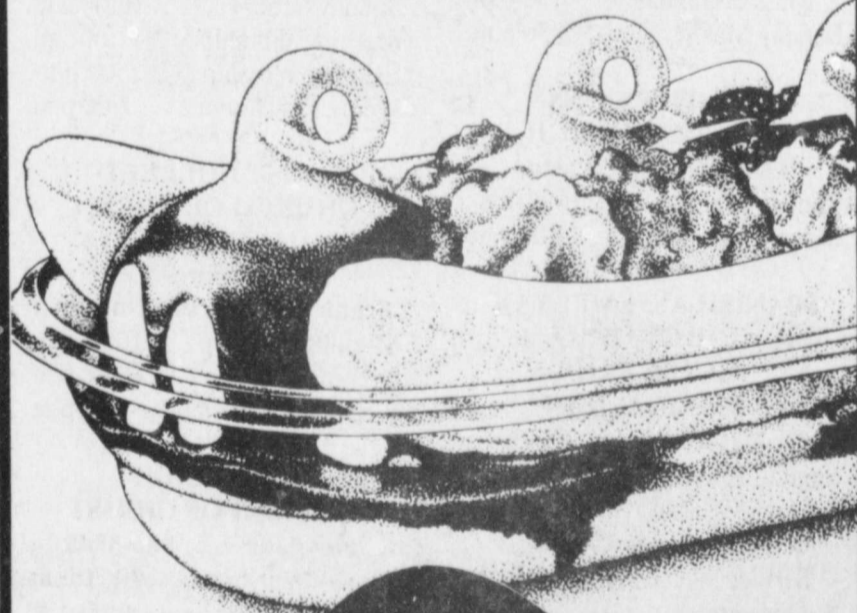

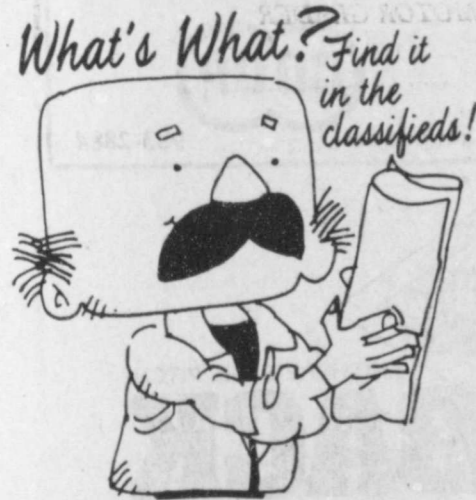

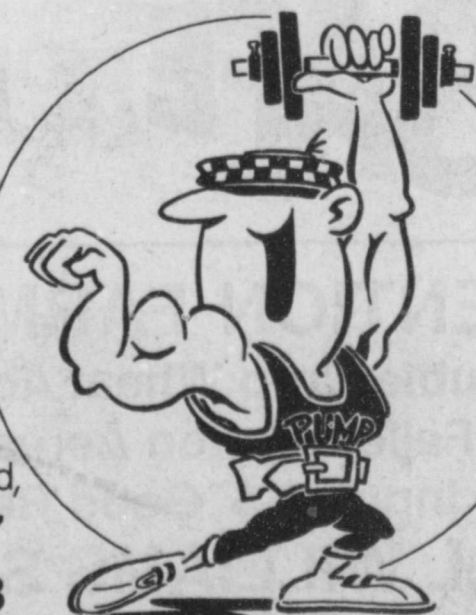

ASCS Floyd County Farm News

Floyd County Agent's Report

From Mike Mallett, CEA-Ag.

The cotton market is still waiting to see how much High Plains Cotton is replanted and what survives. On June 17, Mark Brown and this agent made a wide circle of Floyd County evaluating the county cotton crop. We estimated at that time 24,000 acres of "standing acres" of cotton (stands that will "do to keep" on this date). Since that evaluation more adverse weather has tracked across Floyd County.

As we all know, the extensive cotton crop losses will have an enormous effect on our local economy.

Farmers with crop disaster insurance who are able to "zero out" their cotton and produce an alternative crop should end the 1992 growing season with a small profit. Farmers will not spend as much in input costs, such as fertilizers or irrigation, on a catch crop.

One day of rain in the Midwest will have more effect on the grain market than if all of Texas planted grain sorghum. Texas is only a drop in the bucket in the feed grain industry. Basically, the grain and soybean market still looks good, but is dropping because of rain in the Midwest.

For small acreage crops such as sunflowers it is better to get contracts. Producers need to take time and completely review all aspects of small acreage crop contracts. In some cases, the contract specifies certain quality standards; and if the producer does not meet them, prices can be docked.

4-H NEWS

This past weekend Floyd County 4-H beef project members participated in and exhibited their cattle at state and national exhibitions.

Mark Todd Terrell was one of 100 active participants in National Junior Maine-Anjou Association. He placed fifth in the Heifer Futurity. The futurity consists of showmanship, judging of heifer classes, reasons for judging classes and a sales talk.

Cody Hayes and Cassidy Mallett exhibited at the Panhandle Parade of Breeds cattle show. Cody exhibited his progress division steer to fourth and his Limousin prospect steer to second. Cassidy exhibited Brangus and Simmental steers, and placed third and sixth, respectively. Approximately 275 steers were entered in the Panhandle Parade of Breeds.

TWC AND EDWARDS AQUIFER

In a surprise move, the Texas Water Commission (TWC) designated the Edwards Aquifer an underground river on April 15, declaring that the ground water in the aquifer is now under the laws government surface water rights and use.

BOUNDARY LAWS IN TEXAS

A practical, one-day seminar that examines the legal issues surrounding boundary law and disputes between adjoining landowners will be held in Amarillo on August 5, and in Lubbock on August 27.

"Boundary Law in Texas" is designed

to provide attorneys, land surveyors, lenders, real estate brokers and agents, and title insurance representatives with a better understanding of the legal aspects of boundary law and adjoining landowner disputes.

SPRING SEEDED CROP CERTIFICATION

Wednesday, July 15, is the final date to certify or request measurement service for all spring seeded crops and all ACR and CU not previously certified. If you do not have your appointment, please call the Floyd County ASCS office.

TEMPORARY YIELD REDUCTION

The County Committee may reduce the program payment yield for a participating crop if it is determined that the reduction is required because the producer did not plant or care for the crop in a normal manner so that under normal conditions it would produce a crop for

harvest.

FRIDAY LAST DAY FOR CRP SIGNUP

Friday, June 26, 1992 will be the last day to signup in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP).

This will be the only opportunity to offer land for acceptance into the CRP for the 1993 crop year. Producers who are interested in placing land in the 10 year grass program must submit a bid before 5 p.m. tomorrow (Friday). All land offered for the program must be measured by the ASCS prior to the submission of a bid.

Eligible cropland must have been planted to a farm commodity in two of the five crop years from 1986 through 1990. Producers must have owned or operated the land at least three years. Bids will be submitted to Washington for evaluation at the national level.

FAILED ACREAGE

In order for a producer to fail acreage you must measure, certify, and file an ASCS-574 before destroying evidence of the crop. This is a standing rule for ASCS and is always in effect. If you have not certified and are ready to fail your cotton and plant another crop, call or come by this office.

CAUTION: Always check with your Insurance Company First!!

Crops planted behind approved failed acres are "invisible or ghost acres". This means that they are not eligible for loan, deficiency payment and are not counted against your permitted.

CAUTION: When planting a crop behind failed skip row cotton, check with this office before planting with a different pattern. Anything planted on the blank row will not be invisible.

PREVENTED PLANTING

Producers who are prevented from planting cotton because of a natural disaster may apply for prevented planting credit. This application must be submitted by June 22, 1992.

Before the County Committee and District Director can approve an application for prevented planting, producers must prove that they attempted to plant the cotton. Documentation must show that the ground was worked, seed was purchased, herbicide was applied, etc. The COC is required to inspect similar farms in the area to see if they were able to plant. The COC must determine that the prevented planted was because of

Pinto beans profitable alternative

The following information was prepared by Roland E. Roberts, Extension Vegetable Specialist with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service.

Pinto beans can be a profitable alternative for producers who have lost crops to hail or excessive soil moisture. Give some thought to markets, growing time requirements, water requirements, herbicide, fertility and harvesting.

Markets are available for pinto beans. Before deciding how many acres to plant, determine the potential profit. Find several bean dealers in your area. Ask to see a contract with price, grading, handling and marketing details spelled out. Then write down all production, harvest, hauling, grading, packaging, storage, and marketing costs you will incur on an acre basis. Bean yield vary from under 1,000 lbs. per acre to over 2,000 lbs. per acre. Better-than-average yields of 1,600 to 1,900 lbs. are needed for a profitable return to management. Calculate your break-even price.

Inquire if a dealer will handle part of your crop under open market conditions to give you a chance to sell at a higher price if the market strengthens. FOB prices fluctuated between 46 and 14 cents from 1990 to 1992. Ask dealers if they have markets for other classes of dry beans like Blacks, Reds, Navys, Great Northerns, and Small Whites. Sometimes these classes bring a higher price than Pintos. All classes of dry beans can be grown here.

Determine if there are enough days to grow, mature and harvest a bean crop. Growing time requirements vary from 76 to over 90 days depending on variety.

Later planted beans take longer to mature and dry down as day lengths shorten and average daily temperatures decrease. More frequent rain in September often necessitates use of harvest aid chemical.

Pintos require good soil moisture from seeding through pod fill to make high yields. Up to 20 inches are needed if no rain falls during the bean growing

season. Critical times to have good soil moisture are germination, during major plant vegetative growth, during blossoming-pod set time, and while pods are filling.

Pintos can tolerate pre-plant incorporated Treflan, Prowl, Eptam, Cannon, and Sonalan. The herbicides: Dual, Lasso, Dacthal, and Roundup can be applied pre-emergence to the crop. Basagran, Poast, and Eptam can be applied post-emergence to the crop. These are the labeled herbicides for dry beans.

Fertilizer applied for cotton will cover beans requirements unless nitrogen has been leached by excessive rainfall. Beans require 50 to 60 pounds of nitrogen to make maximum yield.

If you plant Pintos, prepare to harvest them by learning how to do the Soak Test for detecting cracks and check coat. Start to prepare a bean combine which means slowing cylinder speed to 200 rpm, getting a flexible cutting head, installing vine lifters and possible removing concave rods and cylinder bars to treat the beans most gently.

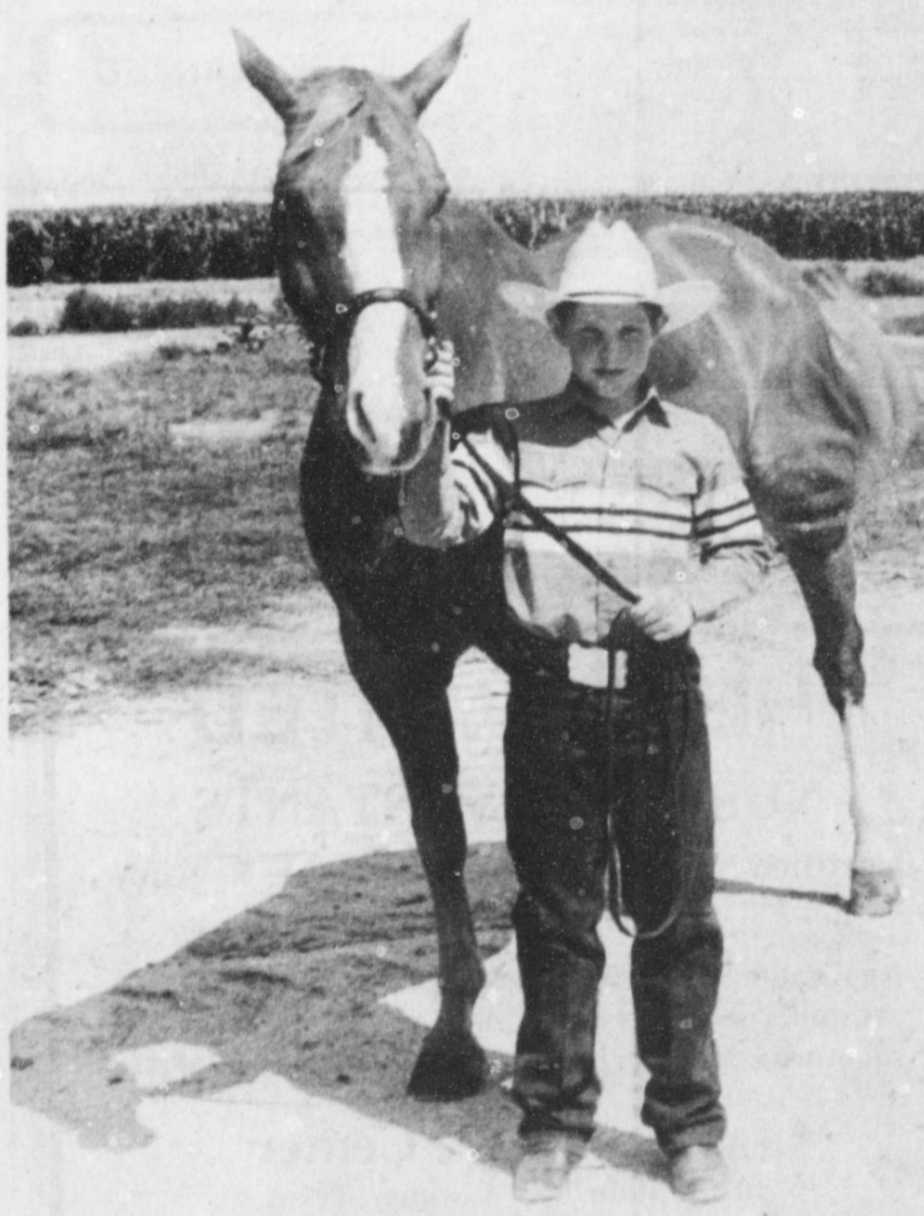
