## Redistricting committee meets

FLOYDADA — Redistricting procedures made necessary by population changes revealed in the 1990 Census has begun for Floydada Independent School District. A committee of eleven met with the FISD School Board and demographics expert Mark Turnbow on Monday, August 10, to begin the process.

The scheduled session began at 7:00 p.m. and ran nearly an hour as Turnbow, representing Sun County Reprographics, Inc. of El Paso, Texas, gave the gathering a brief synopsis of the methods used to develop a plan. The plan his firm proposes was presented to the committee and Turnbow elaborated on the need for local input and consideration prior to adoption of a plan and submitting it to the justice department for approval.

Appointed committee members Adolfo Garcia, John Dunlap, Jimmy Covington, Randy Bertrand, Ricky Vasquez, Gerry Norrell, Joe Martinez, Ralph Jackson, Carrie Davis, Billy Joe Villarreal and Steve Lloyd reviewed the proposed plan as Turnbow explained the criteria determining the divisions of the district. Three persons the school board had appointed to the committee were unable to attend the meeting. They included Nathan Johnson, Hulon Carthel and Sam Green.

According to Turnbow, the justice department will be using standards set by the Voting Rights Act of 1963 to determine if the one man-one vote principal is a factor in the districts approved by FISD. Also at issue is the voting strength of the minority community in the district. Minority areas must be preserved to facilitate the election of minority candidates to public office.

Turnbow told the group that every attempt is made to formulate districts roughly equivalent to those existing with as few alterations as possible. He indicated that disenfranchising any board member would be avoided if at all possible.

### ALTERATIONS DISCUSSED

After reviewing the plan, it was pointed out that District 5 board representative Don Hardy's residence was in District 2 under the new proposed plan and that District 3 representative Billy Villarreal's residence had been included in District 4. Alterations to the plan were made to rectify this and Turnbow told the committee that new maps with the new district lines and demographic figures would be available by the end of the week for further review.

"One of the major points to be considered in redistricting," stated Turnbow, "is the percent of deviation between the districts." He added that this meant the number of persons included in each district could not be more than plus or minus ten percent overall, calculated by

In addition to a complete plan for redistricting, Turnbow told the group that they must also submit a list of the registered voters in all the FISD voting districts. The committee must also be able to demonstrate that the community was well represented and that community view points were considered in the redistricting said Turnbow. He urged everyone on the committee to talk with their friends and neighbors and the other registered voters they know in the community concerning the plan and any ideas which might make it more equal for all concerned.

## School board awards food, fuel bids

FLOYDADA — Meeting in regular session for the month of August, the board of trustees for Floydada Independent School District approved the awarding of bids for cafeteria supplies and for transportation supplies. Assistant superintendent Jimmie Collins also made the formal budget presentation for the 1992-93 school year. The Monday evening session, nearly an hour late in starting, followed a redistricting committee meeting.

### BIDS AWARDED

Two fuel bids were received. Tipton Oil and Butane bid 92 cents on unleaded gasoline and 69 cents on diesel. Producer's Coop Fuel Division submitted a bid of \$1.07 for unleaded gasoline and 88 cents for diesel.

Each of the bids was "as is", meaning that the bid was based on the price as of the date bid. Any change in the cost to the supplying firm would be reflected in monthly billing as the year progresses. Each bid included the 20 cent gasoline tax the state collects on unleaded sales. A form is to be completed each month allowing the school to apply and receive a rebate of the tax since school districts are exempt from the state fuel tax. This effectively lowers the price of unleaded gasoline by 20 cents per gallon no matter which firm supplies it.

The bid was awarded to Tipton Oil as the low bidder on a motion made by Billy Joe Villarreal and seconded by Steve Lloyd. The vote was unanimous.

Cafeteria supplies, including food, were also on the bidding agenda. According to Collins, only one bid had been received following the published bid notice. He expected other bids to be coming in and asked the board to "approve all bids as they are submitted and authorize the buying agent for FISD to purchase each item from the firm with the lowest price."

A motion by Lloyd and seconded by John Campbell was unanimously passed allowing the requested bid approval.

### BUDGET AND TAXES

The 1992-93 budget and tax rate was

also on the published agenda. Collins passed out copies of the formal budget for the board to review and consider prior to approving it. Based on no increase in the FISD tax rate, the proposed budget estimates revenues at \$5,841,304.00 for the coming school year. County Education District revenues are placed at \$945,344.00 and FISD tax revenues at \$1,877,000.00. State revenues are estimated at \$4,100,705.00 and federal revenues from Chapter I Regular sources are expected to be \$418,797.00 while those from Chapter I Migrant sources are placed at \$162,578.00. Other local sources of income to the district from fees, rentals and miscellaneous items is placed at \$26,880.00.

Expenditures in the estimated budget for Floydada High School are placed at \$1,047,221.00 and \$424,770.00 for Junior High. A. B. Duncan Elementary's annual estimated expenditures are \$632,236.00 and R. C. Andrews Elementary are \$570,991.00.

Other expenditures include: all schools, \$281,928.00; administration office, \$518,785.00; transportation, \$208,035.00; utilities and maintenance, \$526,931.00; and \$80,000.00 for unspecified capital improvements. Additional expenditures for Chapter I Regular are placed at \$418,797.00 and \$162,578.00 for Chapter I Migrant. Special Education is allotted an estimated \$498,818.00 and compensatory has \$470,214.00.

Out of the entire budget, salaries for all personnel total \$2,628,541.00 for high school, Andrews, Junior High, Duncan and transportation. No breakdown was given for the funds allotted to the administrative office in the proposed budget passed out at the session. Maintenance and repairs consumes approximately \$115,495.00 and supplies and materials account for \$184,423.00. Travel is calculated at \$47,750.00 and furniture and equipment at \$101,972.00.

Student Insurance under the all schools category is listed as \$15,000.00 and insurance under transportation is listed as \$12,000.00. The air conditioning lease payments total \$60,000.00.

## Southwestern Bell representative reviews franchise tax ordinance

LOCKNEY — Lockney City Council met for their regular meeting on August 6. Additional sirens in town, the South-

western Bell franchise tax and ruts in the alleys were all included in the agenda.

A Southwestern Bell representative, Irasema Velasques, and an attorney for SW Bell, appeared before the council to discuss a new ordinance on the franchise tax.

In the September meeting, the council had agreed to the ordinance with the exception of omitting Section #14 in the ordinance. The city attorney, Paul Lyles, had recommended to the council that the section be omitted from the agreement.

Section #14 states: The City hereby fully releases, discharges, settles and compromises any and all claims which the City has made or could have made arising out of or connected with Ordinance Number 102 adopted November 9, 1961, and its predecessor ordinances, if any...This full and complete release of claims for any matters...shall be for the benefit of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company...and includes any and all claims, actions, causes of action and controversies, presently known or unknown...

Representatives of SW Bell appeared Thursday before the council and told them that without them being released from old ordinances SW Bell could not accept resolution.

"I cannot advise this council to waive all claims known and unknown," said Lyles. If we release any claims from previous years there might come a day when some auditor finds in 1980 (for example) that SW Bell owes the city money. The council would not be able to get that back. I don't foresee that happening, but what would the taxpayers think of a council that just gave all that money away, and what would the council...

## Area farmers may voice opinions at public hearing

Panhandle and South Plains area farmers will have a chance to voice their opinions on the Farmers Home Administration's (FmHA) Emergency Loan Program on August 24 in Floydada before a congressional public hearing arranged by Congressman Bill Sarpalius, (D-Amarillo).

The House Subcommittee on Conservation, Credit, and Rural Development will hold this public hearing on Monday, Aug. 24, at 2:00 p.m. in the District Courtroom of the Floyd County Courthouse and is open to the public.

"The purpose of this hearing is to listen to the farmers and producers of the 13th District," Sarpalius said. "It is a chance for farmers to discuss their experiences with the Emergency Loan Program and to help Congress understand the difficulties farmers are facing."

"Apparently, the federal emergency loan program is not reaching the producers that need assistance getting through weather-related disaster," Sarpalius continued.

"So, I convinced Chairman Glenn English, (D-Oklahoma), to bring Washington to Floydada and learn first-hand the problems confronting our farmers," Sarpalius said.

Representative English is the chairman of the Conservation, Credit, and Rural Development Subcommittee which oversees all FmHA programs, including the emergency loan program. In addition, the committee oversees the Farm Credit System, conservation programs, and rural development.

This field hearing will focus on the effectiveness of the Emergency Loan Program. Sarpalius added that the committee is also interested in hearing producers' opinions on crop insurance and direct disaster assistance.

"I'm bringing the committee to Floydada so it can hear the ideas and suggestions of the producers most directly impacted," Sarpalius continued, "and hopefully this will result in a legislative remedy."

"This is the American farmer's chance to be heard and make a real impact on the policies that affect the way he does business," Sarpalius added.

Representative Sarpalius invites those who wish to testify to contact his Washington office by August 19 at 202-225-3706. Written testimony of any length may also be submitted by August 21 to the Amarillo office at 817 S. Polk, Amarillo, Texas 79101 or brought directly to the hearing.

## Courtroom Activities

In County Court on August 6, Juan Carrizales, 40, of Progresso, Texas, plead guilty to a charge of DWI and was fined \$500.00 plus court costs and 6 months in the county jail probated over two years.

## Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company is asking the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to begin charging \$3.00 per bill, for duplicate paper copies of a customer's bill up to 15 pages. If the customer's bill exceeds 15 pages, an additional five cents per page will apply. If the customer's bill is lost or mutilated for reasons other than negligence by the customer, no charge for a duplicate copy will apply if a customer notifies Southwestern Bell within 60 days of the billing date. The effective date of this application is December 4, 1992.

If approved by the PUC, this application will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$835,000, which is an increase of approximately two one-hundredths of 1 percent (.02 percent) in the Company's adjusted revenue for the 12-month period ending December 31, 1991. The application could affect all of the Company's approximately 4.6 million residence customers and all of its approximately 575,000 business customers should they choose to request duplicate copies of their bills.

## Floydada ISD awards food, fuel bids

Approval was by unanimous vote.

### OTHER MATTERS

Among the routine matters handled on the agenda were the payment of monthly bills and the reading and approval of the minutes from the previous meeting. A Policy Update, the 42nd, was approved by the board for inclusion in the TASB Policy Manual maintained by the district. Motion for this was made by Lloyd and seconded by Villarreal. It passed unanimously.

### DEPUTY APPROVED

The deputation of Greg Pierce was approved by the court. Pierce joined the Floyd County Sheriff's Department on August 1 as the deputy assigned to the Lockney area. Motion to approve his employment was made by Precinct 4 Commissioner Howard Bishop and seconded by Jackson. Vote on the matter was unanimous.

### BOND TRANSFERRED

Transfer of an official bond was approved from recently resigned Justice of the Peace Lowell Bilbrey to newly appointed Justice of the Peace Tim Burge. This bond will remain in effect through the end of the year. Motion was made by Bearden and seconded by Jackson. Court approval was unanimous.

### MHMR REPORT HEARD

Seth Halbert and C. L. Abernathy, representing Central Plains Mental Health and Mental Retardation met with the court to present the annual report detailing the services the organization has performed benefitting Floyd County residents during the past year. Local representative Bob Alldredge was not present. Among the services provided by MHMR are DWI education classes, assistance with mental health problems, substance abuse problems and screening to determine problems among county children up to three years of age.

According to Halbert, MHMR provided services totaling \$240,000.00 were provided to Floyd County residents while the county contribution to the organization was \$5,424.00 toward the operating costs. Halbert indicated that the request for funding in the coming year would remain at the same rate.

### SHREDDER TO BE SOLD

The court authorized advertising for bids to sell a used offset shredder belonging to Precinct 4. Bids will be taken and opened at the next regular session of the court.

### TREASURER'S REPORT

County treasurer Glenna Orman reported to the court that the county began the month of July with \$356,857.44 in county accounts and took in receipts of \$315,308.73. Transfers in totaled \$94,407.80. According to Orman, disbursements totaled \$458,460.35 and transfers out totaled \$94,407.80, leaving \$213,705.82 in county accounts on July 31.

Installment indebtedness for the county now totals \$28,392.05 and the county has certificates of deposit totaling \$318,000.00 which have earned \$21,853.16 in interest to date this year said Orman. Orman's report was unani-

mously approved on a motion by Jackson with a second by Precinct 3 Commissioner George Taylor.

### FARM WORK CONTRACTS

Farm work contracts were approved for four individuals. Motion for approval was made by Bishop with a second by Taylor. The vote was unanimous in favor of the motion. There was one contract for Precinct 1. Delmas McCormick asked the county to clean out a drainage ditch three miles southeast of Floydada. Precinct 3 also had one farm work contract. Steve Lloyd asked that the county blade a water way for conservation at a location 13 miles northeast of Floydada.

Precinct 4 had two farm work contracts approved. Bundy H. Campbell requested that a turnrow be dragged and washes be filled for conservation 15 miles east of Floydada and 4 miles south of Dougherty. Joe Hinkle asked that the county grade a road and fill washes for conservation on the Ray Douglas' property 22 miles northeast of Floydada.

### OTHER MATTERS

Among other items handled by the county at the Monday session was the approval of monthly bills as presented. Motion for that approval came from Bearden and was seconded by Bishop. Payment of monthly bills was authorized on a motion by Jackson with a second by Taylor. Both motions were approved by unanimous vote.

The commissioners also reviewed the monthly reports from county officials whose offices collect fees and/or fines. These included the county clerk, district clerk, tax assessor/collector and two justices of the peace. The reports were accepted as presented. No motion was made on the matter.

Budget amendments were approved transferring funds between county accounts to enable the payment of items which have gone over budget with funds taken from areas which remain under budget at this time. Motion was made by Taylor, seconded by Bishop and approved unanimously.

Funds were also transferred from the Road and Bridge account into the four precincts. Each received \$7,500.00 on a motion by Bearden, seconded by Taylor.

Attending the session were County Judge Bill Hardin, commissioners Connie Bearden, Floyd Jackson, George Taylor and Howard Bishop, county treasurer Glenna Orman, Seth Halbert, C. L. Abernathy and the Hesperian-Beacon reporter.

cil think of their attorney that allowed them to do it."

After discussion between Lyles and the SW Bell attorney, both sides agreed to leave the current franchise in place until SW Bell reviews the wording on their release. They agreed to see if any changes could be made.

Fire Chief Jimmy Kemp and SPS Manager Robert Webb also appeared before the council to discuss putting in new warning sirens in the city. Webb showed a map to the council and explained the areas that a siren could be placed.

Kemp explained that the only siren in town that would work if the electricity went out in the city, was the 5 HP siren located at the water tower.

"I think we should replace the siren at the water tower with at least a 10 HP siren," said Kemp. "We could then move the old siren to the north part of town and put a new 5 HP in the SE part of town. If the electricity did go out, the 10 HP would be heard for a longer distance and placing the other sirens in those areas would alleviate the complaints of not being able to hear the sirens at all."

Councilman Sam Fortenberry was asked to work with Kemp and the fire department and find out what the cost would be on the project.

The council discussed a piece of equipment that had been shown to them in a demonstration. The equipment, a "Twin Max 1000", could be used to smooth the alleys in towns, work bar ditches, and could also be used on some dirt streets.

"I really liked the machine," said Alderman J.D. Copeland. "Getting someone in with a grader would be expensive."

"It was the only thing I've ever seen that could move the dirt and do the job without a blader," said Dickie McCarty.

"I also thought it was good piece of equipment," said Mayor Wofford. It will be here long after we are gone and it will get a lot of use besides the alleys."

After discussion the councilmen voted to buy the Twin Max 1000 at a cost of \$4,500.

Mayor Wofford brought up the ques-

tion of where the city is to buy tires needed for the city vehicles. Dickie McCarty was present at the meeting, told the council that he found the best tire for the cheapest price at Consumer's Fuel. Mayor Wofford made the suggestion to buy the tires at Consumer's until someone gets a Goodyear Dealership.

The next item on the agenda was considering to buy a utility bed for the 1987 Chevrolet Pickup. Dickie McCarty expressed that, "It would save a lot of time and trouble to get a utility bed installed because you could carry more tools and things you need. It would save us a lot of trips." It will cost approximately \$2600 for the present bed to be removed, the new bed to be installed and painted. Alderman Sam Fortenberry made the motion to buy the utility bed. The second was made by Alderman Terry Jones and the council approved the purchase.

The council reviewed the budget and

without any new proposals, the budget was amended at \$12,000. Councilman Fortenberry motioned to pay the present bills, etc. Motion was seconded by Councilman J. D. Copeland and was approved unanimously.

Towards the close of the meeting the only department report was made by Alderman J.D. Copeland. He explained that Johnson grass was getting extremely high around the road toward the dumping ground. It was growing from the bar ditches and the sides of the road. Alderman Fortenberry made the suggestion to check with Ricky Kellison and Keith Emert to see which would give the better price for spraying with Round-up to get rid of the grass.

The meeting adjourned at 11:15 a.m. Those present were Alderman J.D. Copeland, Sam Fortenberry, Terry Jones; City Attorney Paul Lyle; City Secretary Charollette Hooten; and Mayor Kenneth Wofford.

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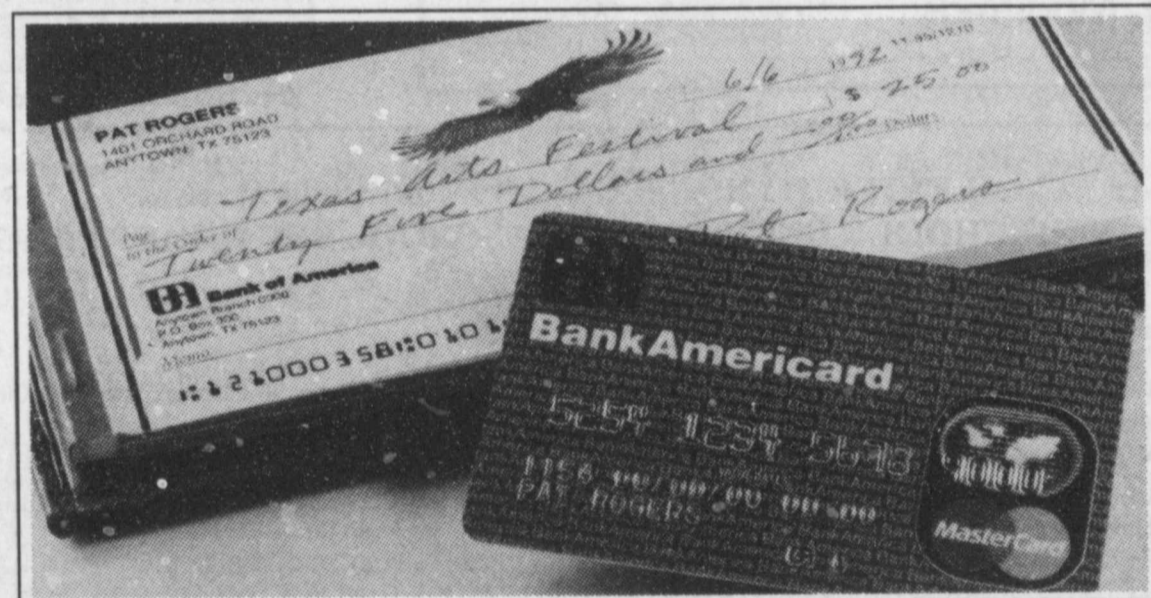

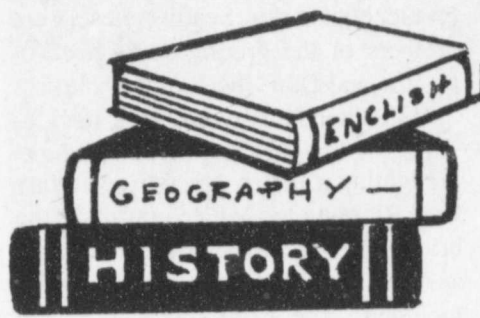

## LETTER TO HOUSEHOLDS (Multi-Child Meals) NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM/SCHOOL BREAKFAST PROGRAM

Parent/Guardian:

The Lockney school serves meals each school day. Elementary children may buy lunch for .90 and breakfast for .50. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price. For secondary, children may buy lunch for \$1.00.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is .40 for lunch and .30 for breakfast.

TO GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILDREN, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.

### HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the child you are applying for, the application must have the child's name, a food stamp or AFDC case number for that child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for the child you are applying for, then the application must have the child's name, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

**Verification:** Your eligibility may be checked at anytime during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced price meals.

**Fair Hearing:** You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing. You may do this by calling or writing:

**REPORTING CHANGES:** If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

**Confidentiality:** School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.

**Reapplication:** You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

**Handicapped:** Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

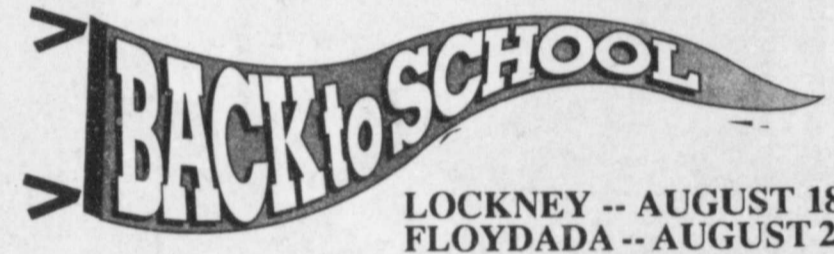

music for the show and candy sale, and provided accompaniment for the between-act vaudeville. The Grays are assisted by banjo/guitarist Doug Burns of Lubbock. Drawing on his years of experience in the tent repertoire and "Toby Show" business, Bill is also assisting with many of the technical aspects of the current production.

For the third consecutive year the Garza Theatre is presenting a tribute to the legendary Texas tent show entertainer, Harley Sadler. The three-act comic melodrama, "Too Poor to Paint, Too Proud to Whitewash," opened on July 16, and was scheduled to close on August 8. However, due to ticket demand, an additional matinee will be presented on Sunday, August 9. Information, show times, and ticket prices are available by calling 1-800-846-3706.

"Too Poor to Paint, etc." is a re-creation of a traditional repertoire classic, "The Awakening of John Slater." The production is directed by David Weaver, Jr., who also portrays "Lunk" Slater - a red-haired, freckled face country bumpkin (very similar to the "Toby" characters associated with Harley Sadler, Henry Brunk, Erman Gray, and others who helped make the touring tent shows the most popular form of rural entertainment in Texas from the early 1900s until the 1950s.)

The title role of John Slater is played by David LeMaster. Also appearing are Emily Hataway - "Ma" Slater; Bill Lanier - "Pa" Slater; Cherri Brooks - Sister Nan; Mike Toombs - Cal Henderson; Keren Weaver - Flora Wilson; and Christy Morris - Bradley the Maid. Alison Hoefler appears as John Slater's villainous wife, Adele. She is supported in her dastardly deeds by "Donald," portrayed by KCBD-TV's Michael Sommermeyer.

Charles Somerville, a Garza Theatre regular, is the master-of-ceremonies and delivers the "pitch" for the traditional candy sale. Emily Hataway and Anna Wilson (vocal duo), Peyton Fullingim (magician), and Cecil Caldwell (country fiddler and more) headline the vaudeville specialties. Lubbock radio personality Jane Prince-Jones is the managing director of the Garza Theatre.

To undertake a re-creation of show business masters of the past (such as Harley Sadler) is quite a task. Many have attempted to do so, but few have attained any degree of success. Dr. Clifford Ashby and the Texas Tech Theatre Department pulled off a good one in 1976 — complete with a big tent and all the trimmings.

The current offering at the Garza comes as close to presenting the true

flavor of the tent show days — even though it is being produced in a comfortable, air-conditioned theatre. Jane Prince-Jones is doing a superb job as managing director, stepping in after the untimely death last year of Will McCrary, the Garza Theatre's founder.

If the hands of time could be turned back 40-50 years, several of the Garza performers could have been equally at home on a Harley Sadler or Brunk's Comedians' stage. Live theatre has fallen on hard times in recent years, especially in rural communities, but the Garza's annual lineup of entertaining plays satisfies a wide range of theatrical tastes. The Garza has been a big boost to Post, and it will continue to do even more for the town.

A "tip of the hat" goes to the large number of Floydada folks who have attended the show the past three weeks. It has been great to see familiar faces in the crowds, and judging from their comments, all have been thoroughly entertained. Dell and I have had a great deal of pleasure working with Jane, David, Charles and all the gang, and we look forward to future involvements with the Garza.

It's that time again, when the leaves fall and class calls!

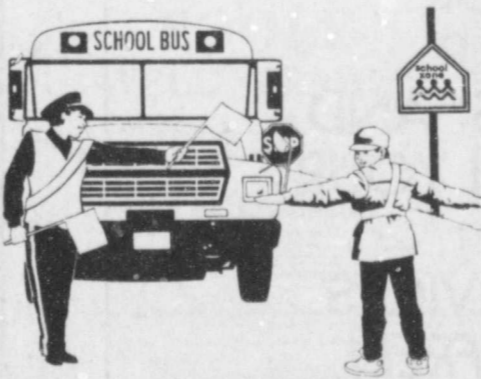

If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for the child you are applying for, then the application must have the child's name, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

## Civil lawsuits filed against produce merchants who failed to pay farmers

At the request of Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry, the Attorney General's office has filed civil lawsuits to recover more than \$65,000 owed to the Texas Department of Agriculture by nine produce merchants who failed to pay farmers for their fruits and vegetables.

Vegetable, fruit and citrus farmers who fail to receive payment for their produce may file claims with TDA. The agency investigates and conducts administrative hearings on each claim, and if valid the producer is wholly or partially reimbursed from TDA's Produce Recovery Fund. The fund's monies come from fees charged to produce handlers, dealers, brokers and retailers who must be licensed by TDA.

If a payment is made from the Produce Recovery Fund and a merchant fails to reimburse the fund for a payment made on his or her behalf, TDA may seek reimbursement through civil suits filed by the Attorney General's office in Travis County District Court. In addition, the Attorney General may seek civil penalties against merchants for failing to reimburse the fund.

\* Krio Produce for \$9,332 reimbursement and a \$7,500 civil penalty. The company is located at 3601 Bicentennial in McAllen.

\* Metroplex Produce Inc. for \$6,089 reimbursement and a \$5,000 civil penalty. The company is located at 3030 Mansfield Highway, Fort Worth.

\* Ernesto Cavazos for \$5,238 reimbursement and a \$4,500 civil penalty. His company is Ernest's Produce, 624 N. Cage, Pharr.

\* International Farmers Inc. for \$4,041 reimbursement and a \$3,000

civil penalty. The company is located at 3126 Produce Row, Houston.

Those who fail to reimburse the Produce Recovery Fund lose their license and cannot operate in the produce business for four years.

## Pest Management Report

### General Situation

Check for greenbug and midge problems in grain sorghum. Cotton aphids are building rapidly. Corn fields are in the hard dough to dent stages.

### Sorghum

Sorghum growth varies widely, from pre-boot to hard dough stages. Greenbug colonies are now building rapidly, and are reaching threshold levels in some fields. The resistance issue is certainly one of concern; however, incoming reports indicate that adequate control has been achieved in most situations. Remember that we basically have one good shot at these greenbugs if control is required. Do not use low-end rates.

Sorghum midge are coming in right on schedule. The last date to escape sorghum midge damage potential is considered as Aug. 1 in our part of the country. Fields that are presently in

bloom need to be monitored closely from now on for midge infestation. In the fields I have looked at, midge numbers have been running at 1 per 20 heads...well below threshold. However, I have received reports of some fields requiring treatment, particularly those that are more isolated. The sorghum midge has two hosts: grain sorghum and johnsongrass. This reddish-orange, gnat-like insect only lives about 24 hours, so we are dealing with newly emerging populations each day. Control is achieved primarily through residual activity. After mating, the female will lay as many as 50 eggs into flowering spikelets, from about 9 am until 2 pm. Then she dies.

Use of a clear plastic bag, quickly slipped over individual sorghum heads is helpful in detecting and counting midge adults. Don't just check the edges of the field since numbers are likely to be

The northern central portion of Cochran County, including Morton, Whiteface, and Lehman was already within the Water District service area. The newly-annexed area includes the extreme northeastern part of Cochran County, the town of Bledsoe, and the remaining southern portion of the County.

## Farm show planned in Lubbock in 1993

Officials of the Farm Progress Companies and the city of Lubbock announced that a major outdoor farm show will be held on farm property just east of the city beginning in the fall of 1993.

Both in scale and concept, The Farmer-Stockman Show will be unlike any other agricultural event ever held in the state of Texas or the Southwest. Attention will be centered on actual harvest and planting of crops and on working livestock demonstrations.

In making the announcement at a news conference, Farm Progress President Allan R. Johnson, Lubbock Mayor David R. Langston and Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Rick Perry stressed that the annual show will be a major outdoor exposition in which

farmers and ranchers will not only be able to examine equipment at close hand, but can also witness it at work.

Tom Budd, vice president and publisher of the Farm Progress Companies, which publishes farm magazines in 18 states across the nation, said that The Farmer-Stockman Show will follow the successful pattern set by Husker Harvest Days in Nebraska, and the Farm Progress Show, the nation's premier farm show held each year in the Midwest. Both of these shows are also sponsored by the Farm Progress Companies.

Texas Farmer-Stockman magazine will sponsor The Farmer-Stockman Show. Dates for the initial event in 1993 will be October 12-14.

Budd said that the dates were carefully chosen in order to be timely for actual harvest of such crops as cotton, corn, grain sorghum and soybeans, as well as for planting wheat, other small grains and forage crops.

The show site will include a 60 acre exhibit field where farmers and ranchers can examine equipment and visit educational events, and 500 acres of additional cropland where actual harvesting, tillage and planting demonstrations will take place. Exhibitors will include major farm equipment manufacturers, livestock suppliers, irrigation equipment makers, and many other companies engaged in producing and marketing of agricultural equipment and products.

The location of the show was carefully chosen. Lubbock is the center of one of the nation's most intense agricultural production areas. It and surrounding counties regularly produce a quarter of the U.S. cotton crop. It is also an irrigation, cattle feeding and grain production center.

Actual work at the show site will begin this October with the preliminary layout of streets and utilities. Tillage work will begin this winter and crops will be planted next spring for the 1993 harvest.

higher there, thus giving an unrealistic sample. Midge infestations should be checked during the mid-morning hours, and should be checked daily during peak bloom. In commercial sorghum, where inputs are limited, the most effective period for midge control is during days 5 to 12.

Remember that greenbug control can often be timed to coincide with midge control.

### COTTON

Chance of making a mature boll, Aug. 5, 100%; Aug. 10, 100%; Aug. 15, 71%; Aug. 20, 36%; Aug. 25, 20%; Aug. 30, 14%.

The pests to watch for in cotton at this time include primarily bollworms and cotton aphids. Bollworm trap catches have been high, but appear to have peaked at this time. Egg numbers in our scouting program fields have declined in comparison to last week. Worm survival has not been very significant, thus we may sneak by this first big flurry in most cotton fields. However, there are always exceptions. Pay particular attention to fields that have lush growth that offers more shading and incanopy humidity, since bollworms are most attracted to these fields and stand a better chance of survival.

Cotton aphids are increasing rapidly, and many fields will require treatment soon. Walk across the field and pull mainstem leaves, randomly, from various heights on the plants. When aphids average 50 per leaf, treat immediately. Resistance is still a major issue, and control failures have been seen with some chemical selections to the south of us. The 5-day post-treatment counts in a test conducted south of Lubbock by Jim Leser indicated the following % control: Bidrin (4 oz): 91%; Bidrin (8 oz): 99%; Lannate LV (12 oz): 92%; Cygon (0.5 pt): 68%; Karate 3.2 oz: (-18%); Karate (3.2 oz)+ Bidrin (4 oz): 97%; Ammo (3.1 oz) + Bidrin (4 oz): 96%.

From the results of this test you can see that the higher rates will be necessary. Rates may be lowered if used in combination with a pyrethroid for worm and aphid control. If aphid numbers are increasing at a point when bollworms must be sprayed, go ahead and add an aphicide to the pyrethroid.

The Miles (formerly Mobay) bug report will be aired on the following upper High Plains radio stations twice a day each week through September 21. Amarillo KGNC-AM 710; 6:10 and 12:45; and Floydada KKAP-AM-FM 900/95.3; 6:40 and 12:10.

### Pheasant Notes

Survival of roosters in hunted populations is very low, but not a concern. Hunters may harvest up to 93% of the pre-hunting season population, but such a high harvest rate is very unusual. The normal range is 45-65%. When these figures are combined with an average crippling loss of 10%, 55-75% of roosters are often removed from the fall population. In states where significant harvest occurs (Iowa, Nebraska, Kansas and South Dakota) rooster kill averages around 70%. Elsewhere, particularly in western states, fewer hunters and less interest usually mean a reduced harvest rate.



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
