## City Council addresses budget, grants and annexation

FLOYDADA -- Budgets, annexation and grants were the topics of major
interest at the Tuesday, August 18 ses sion of the Floydada City Council regu lar session. The 7:30 p.m. meeting opened with a report from John Simpso ity concerning the ent Water Author budget for the coming year. Floydada and other area cities share in the annual operating costs of the water authority which provides water to the local population. The monthly cost of this for Floydada during the 1991-92
budgetyear was $\$ 22,878.00$. According to Simpson, the monthly tab for the $\$ 1,334.00$ to $\$ 21,543.00$. He also told the group that no tax increase was anticipated for 1992. The current rate of 27.49 the rate for 1992 .

could cut that figure by one third. Balanced against the estimated tax revenue (approximately $\$ 1,550.00$ per year at the current rate) on the area, The city would not gain a significant amount on the transaction.

The residents of the area would pay $\$ 7.25$ per month, but their cost for the services they already receive would decrease if they became a part of the city. Brown told the council that the city is obligated by law to install the sewer if the area is annexed and the work would
have to be started within 36 months and have to be started within 36 months and
completed before the end of 60 months. A motion was made by councilman Wayne Tipton to table the matter until
the next regular session while it is determined just how much the sewer installa-
accomplished. Councilman Clar Schacht seconded the motion and

 PARTICIPATION DISCUSSED The council was faced with deciding funding from two different sources in the next few months. The annual application period for Texas Department of Commerce block grants is approaching and the city had to state whether they were interested in applying and whattype of project they would seek funding fype of
The council opted to apply and will be asking for funding to replace older existing two inch water lines serving about
20 blocks with a new six inch line. They also expressed their interest in trying to get part of the available funds to be HOME PROJECT grants. These grants would enable the city to provide housing rehabilitation funds to home owners in lower income areas of Floydada. Motion to pursue the acquisition of funds was made by councilman Ruben Barrientoz and seconded by councilman
Amado Morales. The vote was unaniAmado Morales. The vote was
mous in favor of the motion.

1992-93 BUDGET DISCUSSED The council discussed provisions of the proposed annual budget during the evening session. Major differences

proposed across the board cost of living increase for all city employees of 5 percent and the proposed purchase of seven new vehicles, two cars for the police department and five pickups for various departments.

to come here following his residency in OB-GYN. I am also going to contact those doctors who had previously indicated that they would like to come to Floydada, but did not want to be the only doctor. We hope that the fact that we now have one doccor wil make getting more easier for us.
Doctors are hard to find and harder at paying a recruiting fee of around $\$ 25,000.00$ to $\$ 30,000.00$ to find one and almost all of them want a monetary guarantee before they will agree tocome here to work." According to Keltz,
