

# City reviews proposed TCDP grant application

discuss the 1992 Texas Community motion. Development Program grant application proposed by the city was conducted at City Hall on the evening of September 15. The hearing, second of two, followed the approval of the minutes from two meetings held in August.

Kay Howard, a representative of the consulting firm Gary Traylor and Associates presented the specifications of the grant application, telling those present that the city will be applying for a grant of \$197,000.00 to be matched with \$30,000.00 in local funds. This amount will be used for replacing 10,420 linear feet of one inch water line with four inch line if the grant is approved. Included in the application are seven fire hydrants and 121 new connections. The project will be carried out in a section of northeast Floydada if funded.

Howard stressed that the grant application must clear a regional review committee before going to the state. She also stated that such projects are scored on a criteria which awards up to 700 points. "In the past, we have seen projects funded if they could score around points," said Howard. "We have application to garner as many points as possible."

After the closing of the hearing, Councilman Ruben Barrientoz made a motion to approve a resolution authorizing the submission of the grant application. The motion was seconded by Councilman Wayne Tipton. The vote was unanimously in favor.

Bruce Bramlet, director of the 1992 summer baseball program, came before the council to ask that the city assist the summer league in meeting expenses. He told the council that the program had come up \$1,028.00 short of meeting all expenses last summer. He attributed the shortfall to the expansion and upgrading program the league carried out this summer as well as to failed fund raisers.

Councilman Eric Cornelius arrived at the meeting during Bramlet's presentation. He joined the rest of the council in unanimously approving a city contribution to the program in the amount of \$1,028.00. Motion for the action was made by Councilman Morales with a second by Councilman Tipton.

Discussion of the previously tabled request for annexation into the city by residents of a section located along the South Ralls Highway again resulted in no immediate decision. Councilman Burns made a motion to proceed with the process of gathering the necessary information needed to determine if the area could be annexed. The motion was

City manager Brown reported that the project would cost an estimated \$4,000.00 with the city providing the labor and equipment.

She reported that the county began the month with \$213,705.82 in the accounts and had receipts of \$389,812.67 during the month. Transfers in and out were \$61,486.09 each and disbursements totaled \$454,821.25. Leaving a balance in county accounts at the end of the month totaling \$148,697.24.

According to Orman, the county also had \$321,000.00 in certificates of deposit at FNB Lockney which have earned \$23,680.05 in interest revenue to

An informal budget hearing was conducted and after a brief discussion of the proposed budget for 1992-93 a motion was made by Anderson and seconded by Marr, that the council adopt the budget. Vote on the matter was unanimously in

The budget for October 1, 1992 thru September 30, 1993, as adopted, estimates revenues at \$669,041.50. Expenditures are calculated at \$664,793.02, leaving an expected carryover in funds totaling \$4,248.48. Expenses for each department are estimated as follows: Administrative, \$110,532.00; Police, \$115,867.98; Fire, \$26,196.00; Street, \$82,050.00; Sanitation,\$91,500.00; Parks, CC, CF, MC, \$15,475.00; Swimming Pool, \$10,700.00; and Water &

Sewer, \$212,472.04. According to Mayor Wofford, this budget is lower than the budget for the current year which totaled \$779,444.00. The decrease was attributed mostly to lower payments on the city obligations in connection with Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority. Wofford pointed out that only one increase in salary had been included in the budget for the coming year and that was for a new employee. He called it "a bare bones budget."



# Couple reopens Caprock Meat

As of September 4, Caprock Meat has once again opened its doors, under new ownership.

Specializing in deer processing, beef and hog processing, the new owners John and Irene Hernandez, have also earned a reputation for their special German sausage.

Born and raised in Wilson, John, began as a freshman working after school at a meat cutting shop in Slaton. Learning much of the trade from his father, John also worked for 13 years as a meat cutter and market manager for Safeway and Furr's Supermarkets.

Irene was born and raised in O'Donnell. After they both graduated High School they were married in 1977 and lived for a time in Lubbock. They have two children, Jennifer, a 7th grader, and Jeremy, 6th grader.

Two years ago, John went into partnership with his father at Wilson Meat Processing in Wilson, before branching out on his own at Caprock Meat.

"We had a lot of customers out this way," explained Irene. "With the purchase of Caprock Meat we will be able to help out our customers and we will have a lot more room. We have built up a good business with the processing of deer meat and now our deer customers will not have so far to drive."

For the last two years the Hernandez's have participated in the Hunters For The Hungry Program. In this program the Hernandez's would process deer meat donated by hunters and then give the meat to the South Plains Food Bank.

"Last year we had 20 hunters that donated deer meat," said Irene. "That is about 300 pounds of meat.

"Deer processing is a big part of our business but of course we also process beef and hog. We have a full retail market and we like to custom cut for our customers. We bring in our own beef and because we have been in Wilson off and on with John's dad, we have built up a good retail market. We also sell all kinds of deli products and we make our own German sausage.

"John learned the art of making the German sausage from the Germans in Slaton. We make it hot or mild and we

# Brownfield holds on to upset Whirlwinds, 17-12

The Brownfield Cubs scored 17 unanswered first half points, and withstood a furious fourth quarter Floydada rally to defeat the Whirlwinds 17-12 at Wester Field on September 11. The Cubs and Whirlwinds are both now 1-1 in the young grid season.

The 'Winds were unable to generate any offense following the opening kickoff, and were forced to punt. Brownfield capitalized on excellent field position as the Cubs moved 41 yards in nine plays on their initial offensive drive. Aided by a pass interference call against the 'Winds, Brownfield's Shad Evans carried the final yard. Robert Garcia added the extra point with a perfect kick, and the Cubs were up 7-0 with 5:28 remaining in the first quarter.

Floydada was flagged for an illegal block on the ensuing kickoff and started their next series on their own 19-vard line. Brownfield's "Split-Six" defense, led by David Strickland and Bubba Marrow, played havoc with Floydada's offensive game plan.

Tyrone Henderson was called on to punt for the 'Winds, but dropped the snap. The errant ball was picked up by Brownfield's Daniel Espinosa, who also fumbled. The loose ball was finally recovered by Michael Henderson for Floydada, giving the 'Winds new life at their own 15-yard line.

The 'Winds managed their initial first down of the game, only to turn the ball over on a fumble. Noel Garcia recovered for the Cubs and they were back in business at Floydada's 25-yard line.

A second pass interference call against the 'Winds paved the way for another Brownfield touchdown on the first play of the second quarter. Noel Garcia carried in on a quarterback sneak, Jesse Pauda kicked the conversion, and the visitors forged ahead 14-0.

Following the Brownfield kickoff, the 'Winds picked up only their second first down of the night as they moved out to their own 41-yard line. A couple of Sammy Rodriquez passes fell harm-

lessly to the ground as the Whirlwind receivers had a hard time holding on to the ball. A high snap on a Floydada punt attempt set up a Brownfield field goal, as Jesse Pauda split the uprights from 32 yards to extend the Cubs' lead to 17-0.

In the waning moments of the first half, Sammy Rodriquez found a wide open Jason Pyle in the northwest corner of the end zone, but the 31-yard attempt was batted away. Most Floydada fans felt that pass interference should have been called, but there was no flag against the Cubs. Another Rodriquez pass fell incomplete, and Brownfield took over on downs as the first half came to a close.

The tide turned in Floydada's favor on the second half kickoff. Roderick Reed fumbled the return and Scott Crader recovered for the Whirlwinds on Brownfield's 23-yard line.

Consecutive runs by Michael Henderson, Mike Ochoa and Jammie Davis gave the 'Winds a first down and goalto-go at Brownfield's 8 yard line, but a fourth down pass from Rodriquez to Jason Pyle was ruled stopped just a couple of inches from the Cub end zone. Brownfield took over within their own one yard line, and three plays later were forced to punt. The short punt was returned by Gabino Suarez, and the Whirlwinds were back in business at the visitors' 29-yard line. However, a first down Floydada turnover gave possession back to the Cubs on their own 24.

A confusing, offsetting penalty on Brownfield's second play resulted in another break in the Cubs' favor as they were awarded a first down at their own 25-yard line. The Whirlwinds' defense stiffened with Ochoa, Jammie Davis and Todd Cage leading the charge.

For one of the few times all night the Cubs were "three and out" and were forced to punt. A 16-yard pass from Rodriquez to Jammie Davis highlighted a 7-play, 30-yard Whirlwind drive in the closing minutes of the third period.

Michael Henderson opened the fourth quarter with a nifty 11-yard run. A late-

Jesse Sanchez intercepted a

hit call on the Cubs moved the ball even closer to the Brownfield end zone. Two plays later Henderson scored from five yards out to finally put the 'Winds on the board. Micheal Gilliland kicked the conversion, but the point was nullified by an illegal procedure penalty. "Gill's" second attempt sailed wide to the right, and the score remained Brownfield 17,

The Cubs mounted a short drive following the ensuing kickoff, but sputtered at the Floydada 30-yard line. "Wind linebacker Israel Medrano made a good defensive play on a Brownfield fourth down screen pass and Floydada took over on downs at their own 26 yard

'Winds 6.

Following an exchange of punts the 'Winds were back deep in their own territory at the 3 yard line. Pass interference was assessed against the Cubs two plays later, moving the 'Winds out to their 22. A 17-yard scamper by Jammie Davis was all for naught, as Brownfield picked off a Rodriquez aerial two plays

Brownfield fumbled on first down following the interception, and the loose ball was picked up by Scott Crader. The senior defensive end turned running back by advancing the ball 37 yards on

Floydada fought the clock in their next drive. Henderson rushed for 14 yards on first down, and a 23-yard Rodriquez-to-Davis pass moved the 'Winds to Brownfield's 19-yard line. Rodriquez capped the 9-play drive with a 6-yard touchdown on a QB keeper. The attempt for a two-point conversion failed. The 'Winds lined up for the onsides kick attempt with three seconds remaining on the game clock.

Gilliland executed the kick perfectly and the 'Winds had one last chance to attempt a miracle play to pull out a victory. Rodriquez sent all his receivers out in a spread formation, but was slammed to the ground before he could get away the pass. The final horn sounded, the scoreboard read, "Brownfield 17, Floydada 12," and the Winds had suffered their first loss of

Seagraves, a 22-6 loser to New Deal last week, will host Brownfield this Friday as the Whirlwinds travel to Hamlin. The Pied Pipers have been ranked as high as #4 in the state in Class 2A, but lost 35-17 to 3A Abilene Wylie

I guess the bottom line is that the 'Winds have got to play well enough to overcome all the obstacles, including poor or lack of calls. The Whirlwinds did not play a good game in the first 24 minutes, and Brownfield had a good enough team to capitalize on the errors. don't think that will happen again!

The 'Winds had some bright points in the game, but almost too few to mention. Scott Crader's nice return after a fumble

recovery seemed to really pump some people up and probably helped change the momentum which led to the 'Winds' fourthquarter rally. Gilliland's on-sides kick at the end helped put the 'Winds in a position to pull out the game.

Neither team really deserved to win. I do think the 'Winds learned a valuable lesson -- they've got to do more than just show up to come out on top!

It will be a toughie at Hamlin this week. The Pied Pipers should be fired up after their loss to Abilene Wylie. But, I have a hunch that the Whirlwinds as we know them will do MORE than just make an appearance. They will deliver a strong message to the Pipers and those remaining on the schedule.



"Households must report increases of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year in household income and decreases in household size. If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the contractor. # City of Lockney sets 39.3 cent tax rate for 1992

orem tax rate for the 1992 taxing period at 39.3 cents per \$100 valuation. This is an increase of three percent over the previous year and required no publication of notices or public hearings. Motion to set the rate was made by Copeland with a second by Fortenberry.

Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority director John Simpson came before the council to present the annual report from the water facility. His report is an annual event in each of the four cities sharing the cost and benefits of the water authority. They include Tulia, Silverton, Floydada and Lockney. Lockney share of the annual operating expenses will be \$1,948.00 per month for the coming year. These expenses are calculated on a 24 month average each year in order to make the annual participation as fair as possible stated Simpson.

Jim Bob Martin appeared before the council to discuss property lines on two individual pieces of property he owns in the city of Lockney. Each has a portion of a building on what is dedicated city property. One is on an alley and the other on an unopened city street. Martin asked the city to consider exchanging crossdeeds on the areas to allow him a clear title to the properties.

Attorney Lyle told the council they would need to see a survey of the areas which should be provided by Martin and that Martin would have to discuss the situation and solution with the adjacent land owners. He also suggested that Martin inquire into the title search and possible title insurance on the properties at the time he purchased them to see if there was any problem or assistance to be had there.

A discussion concerning applying for a Texas Community Development Grant was cancelled after the mayor informed the council that Lockney was not eligible based on the 1990 Census figures depicting the city as being only 41 percent low to moderate income. Participation in the program requires that at least 60 percent of the residents be in the low income range. A survey can be conducted in the next few months to determine the income levels in Lockney at this time and the council could consider applying for grant funds next year said the mayor.

Claude Brown was appointed to a two year term as the chairman of the Lockney Housing Authority Board of Directors. Jinna Sue Turner and Pat Frizzell were appointed to two year terms as board members. Motion for the action was made by Copeland with a second by Anderson. The motion carried unanimously. Additional board members are Libby Delgado and Kenneth Tate.

Police Chief Lennie Gilroy came before the council to request that Roy Ehresman be authorized to join the department as a reserve office. Velasquez told the council that more than 288 Texas cities had already voted to implement the new ordinance as written and that Bell Telephone did not intend to remove the clause.

Implementation of the proposed new five year ordinance would mean an increase in municipal fees paid to the phone utility by city residents with phones. This fee is then returned to the city by the phone company. Currently the fee per line is 19 cents per month and yields about \$2300.00 per year to city

Under the proposed agreement, the user fee would increase to 66 cents per line per month over a period of either two or five years. The council characterized the user fee as a tax and opted to remain with the current agreement which is effective until the year 2001. The council was explicit in saying that they preferred to tax their citizens through the ad valorem taxes levied annually and not through a hidden tax even though it would appear to the citizens that the phone company was responsible for the additional cost to them.

Attorney Lyle will prepare an ordinance rescinding the previous approval of the proposed ordinance. This will be considered at the next regular council

City secretary Hooten asked that the council approve changing the employee health insurance from a \$200 deductible to a \$500 deductible and adding a prescription card feature to the plan. According to Hooten, the cost of the insurance coverage will increase by 15 percent on October 1 even if no change is made. Changing to a \$500 deductible will lower the cost of the insurance by 6.5 percent and adding the prescription feature will add 5 percent. She told the council that the employees on the policy had all agreed that this was a change they would like to see implemented.

Copeland made a motion to make the change in coverage and Fortenberry seconded. The vote on the matter was unanimously in favor.

# **Public Notice**

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has asked the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to offer new optional call management services called Caller Identification Service (Caller ID) and Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR).

Caller ID is a new optional phone service which allows subscribers to see the phone number and/or name of most local calls before they answer the phone. Caller ID also allows the recording of the date, time, name and/or phone number of calls. Currently, Caller ID would work only on most local calls, not long distance calls. It would also require that a separate display unit be connected to the telephone. These units that attach to the telephone will be available from various retail vendors, including Southwestern Bell, at a cost starting

Southwestern Bell is also proposing that all customers be able to "block," or stop their name/number from being transmitted and displayed on a Caller ID device, free of charge. You would have this option of "blocking" your name/number on each call free of charge. There would be no need to subscribe to this service. All customers would have this capability when Caller ID is

If you want to block your name or number, you need only press \*67 on your touch-tone pad (or dial 1167 from a rotary phone) before dialing the telephone number. The person you're calling would see displayed a message such as "private" or "anonymous" on their Caller ID display unit.

Southwestern Bell also proposes that qualified domestic violence and law enforcement groups have the option of free per-line blocking, or free per-call blocking

Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR or "block the blocker") allows subscribers to automatically reject all calls that have been marked anonymous, or "blocked" by the person calling. It is not necessary to subscribe to Caller ID Name/Number to subscribe to ACR. With ACR, your telephone will not ring if the person calling you has "blocked" his/her name or number. The person calling whose identification is blocked will receive a message to hang up and call back with caller identification unblocked. The former pastor, Bill Wright, has been appointed to St. Paul's Church in Amarillo.


Clark and his wife Dendy, have three children: Nick, 12, Andy, 10, and Abil

a second by Barrientoz. The vote was unanimously in favor.

Mayor Russell conducted a public hearing on the proposed budget for the 1992-93 fiscal year beginning October 1. Brown presented the budget telling those present that revenues for the coming year are estimated at \$2,203,662.00. Expenditures have been calculated at approximately \$2,848,653.00 according to Brown. The \$644,991.00 shortfall in income will be made up by transfers reserved surplus revenue funds accumulated in previous

Motion to adopt the budget as presented was made by Cornelius following the closing of the hearing. The motion was seconded by Morales and approved by unanimous vote.

Tipton next made a motion to set an ad valorem tax rate of 40 cents per \$100 valuation for the 1992 taxing year. Mayor Russell pointed out that he had been associated with the council for the past 24 years was very proud of the fact that the City of Floydada had not raised taxes during that period.

Schacht seconded the motion to adopt the 40 cent tax rate. The motion was passed by unanimous vote.

A series of motions accompanied the next item on the meeting agenda, a proposed increase in rates to customers of the city sanitation and sewer services. According to city officials, the increase in rates hinges on increased costs due to meeting conditions established by the EPA and state agencies regulating both areas of city services.

Schacht made a motion to increase the rates by \$1.50 for sanitation and by \$0.50 for sewer. The motion received a second from Tipton.

Further discussion revealed that residential rates would rise to \$10.50 per month beginning with the November billing. This cost is for one pickup of dumpster trash each week of the month, for an average of \$2.42 per pickup over the entire year.

Commercial customers would pay \$13.00 per month for one dumpster to be picked up three times a week. This is an average of \$1.00 per pickup of dumpster trash over the entire year. Commercial users are paying \$1.00 for any extra pickups in excess of the three regularly

Councilman Morales expressed his opinion that this is not fair to the residential customers. The extra wear and tear on the machinery, the extra labor from city employees and the extra handling costs at the landfill should be added into the commercial rate according to Mo-

A vote on the motion resulted in a split vote with Schacht, Tipton and Cornelius voting for the new rates as presented and Burns, Barrientoz and Morales voting against. At this point, Schacht made a motion to rescind his original motion. This was seconded by Morales and approved unanimously. A motion by Barrientoz followed, asking that the matter be tabled for further study. Morales seconded and the vote was unanimous. Brown is to prepare a report detailing the actual costs and payments involved in providing commercial service for the next council session.

Budget amendments were reviewed and voted in favor of by the four commissioners. These budget adjustments moved money from accounts with unused funds into accounts which have been depleted in order to allow the payment of current bills by the county. Making the motion was Jackson with a second by Bishop.

No objections were voiced by the commissioners to the proposed abandonment of the Plainview - Floydada railroad line. The company had submitted a letter asking for objections which would need to be made part of the legal record regarding the abandonment procedure.

A 10:00 a.m. budget hearing was held with the four commissioners, Judge Bill Hardin, County Treasurer GlennaOrman, secretary Margaret Herrera, budget clerk Jane McAnally and the Hesperian-Beacon reporter present.

The budget as presented to the commissioners by Judge Hardin included no salary increases for the coming fiscal year and added a salary of \$1.00 per year for each of two constables, one for Precinct 1 & 4 and one for Precincts 2 & 3. According to Hardin, the calculations for the budget were made based on the same revenues as the previous year, \$1,679,606.67. Adding this to the expected carry-over funds of \$217,164.01, the total revenue available for 1992-93

is estimated at \$1,854,988.85. Proposed expenditures include \$828,290.11 for salaries & wages, \$116,089.75 for benefits, \$647,277.56 for operating expenses and \$57,508.00 for capital outlay. This would leave an expected fund balance at the end of September 1993 in the range of \$205,823.43.

The proposed budget was approved on a motion by Bearden with a second by Taylor. The vote was unanimously in favor of the matter.

Setting the ad valorem tax rate for 1992 was the next order of business. Judge Hardin recommended that the tax rate be set at a level which would generate the same income as last year. this rate was calculated by the Floyd County Central Appraisal District at 36.65 cents per \$100 valuation and is a slight increase from the 1991 rat of 36.54 cents. Commissioner Jackson voiced the opinion that failure to increase the taxes by at least 3 percent would only result in financial trouble for future years and necessitate larger tax increases in the

A motion by Taylor opted for setting a tax rate of 36.65 cents per \$100 valuation for 1992. The motion was seconded by Bearden and passed on a unanimous vote.

Judge Hardin told the court that with candidates for constable on the ballot in the November General Election, he expects to have two serving after January 1. In view of this, bond requirements needed to be set for the office. He suggested that the bond be set at \$1,500.00 for each constable.


Hardin stated, "I can foresee no instance in which a constable would have to be responsible for that amount of money, but in the event that one is and the funds cannot be accounted for, the bonding company would reimburse the county up to that amount as the bond on the sheriff had when funds were unaccounted for in that department.

A motion by Jackson with a second by Bishop was approved unanimously setting the bond at \$1,500.00. The county will be responsible for paying the fee on the bond policy to protect it against losses from the two constables.

The final item handled by the court at the Monday morning session was the annual approval of an agreement to house and transport state prisoners picked up on blue warrants for parole violations. Motion for the renewal of the agreement was made by Bishop with a second by Bearden. The vote was in

The session adjourned at approximately 11:30 a.m.






