LATELY, CITIZENS have had plenty to write their congressmen and senators about. A prime topic has been the automatic ten per cent withholding from savings accounts, which seems almost destined to go into effect on July 1, 1983.

The new law will present a hardship on millions of the nation's retired people, who live off their accumulated savings and the interest therefrom. These Americans will have to file tax forms every year to have the amounts withheld from their savings refunded. In addition, they lose the immediate use or benefit from the interest, which is withheld by the government.

Like any government program, the new law will require a mountain of paperwork. Banks and savings institutions will likely have to hire additional staff members, or at least add to their already heavy load of paperwork, in order to implement the new system.

In spite of a landslide of mail and telephone calls, the supporters of this measure seem to be ignoring the public outcry and the measure may become law in spite of the huge opposition.

Not since the Panama Canal episode has there been such an upheaval by the American public on a particular issue; but apparently, just as in the Canal issue, Congress plans to ignore the wishes of the majority and rake off the tax on savings because it (Congress) "knows best what the country needs."

Where did our Democratic system go wrong? We were always taught that if the majority of Americans wanted or opposed a particular measure, and if they would contact their Congressmen, they would act accordingly.

I know one thing for sure. The Dole brand is one which we plan to boycott at our house. This may not make the empire crumble, but perhaps we can start a movement along this line.

ANOTHER ISSUE which came to light this week is one which may threaten what local cable TV companies are able to offer their customers.

Due to recent action by the Copyright Royalty Tribunal, a little-known government agency, some cable TV companies are facing 500 to 1500 per cent increases in the rates they have to pay for such additional satellite channels as WGN, Chicago, WTBS, Atlanta, and perhaps even HBO.

The increased prices would have to be passed along to customers, but Carl White, local manager, says the increase would be so prohibitive in a small market that the channels likely would have to be dropped.

Citizens need to get out their paper and pens again, and write their congressmen and senators, and tell them they want to keep these cable TV channels.

Whatever happened to the theory: The BEST government is the LEAST government?

IF YOU HAVE SEEN the pot-holes in the streets of Friona and in the roads in the vicinity, then you know what a problem the local area is facing in respect to keeping its streets and roads up to par, following a severe winter such as we experienced this year.

But if you think we have a problem locally, consider what the state's highway system as a whole is facing.

The Texas Good Roads Association says that there are approximately 250,000 miles of roads in the state which are badly in need of repair. Much of this mileage is on the state's Interstate Highway system.

The TGRA estimates that currently it costs almost \$1 million to repair or replace one mile of the Interstate Highway system. When considered in this light, and given the number of miles of Interstate Highways in the state, the problem becomes monumental.

"Texas highways, which once were considered the best in the nation, are badly deteriorating, and need attention," says a spokesman for the TGRA.

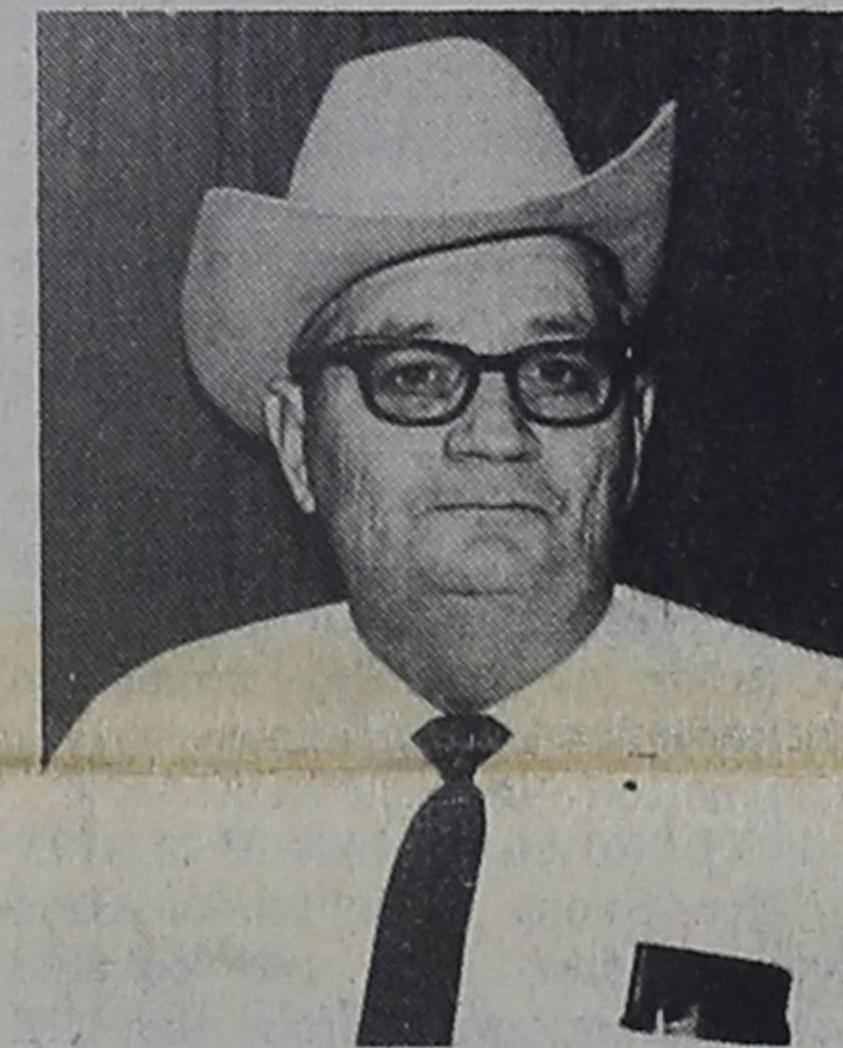

Good Neighbor Policy Displayed

An example of good old fashioned neighborliness was exemplified on Monday of this week at the Wendell Garner farm, when a huge number of friends and neighbors came to work the Garner land and get it ready for spring planting.

Wendell Garner passed away on February 17. His wife Martha plans to continue with the farming.

Garner had lived in the area for the past 23 years, and was well-liked by everyone in the community.

Some 30 farmers came to work. They brought their tractors, plows and fuel, to get the spring plowing done.

Edwin Lide, one of the neighbors who came to help, said that it reminded him of a time several years earlier, when Garner had been badly burned while burning off crop stubble.

While Garner was hospitalized, the neighbors came in to work his land on that occasion. The burning accident left Garner crippled somewhat, but he went right on with his farm work, never complaining.

"I knew him for over 20 years, and I never once heard him complain. He was one of the best," Lide said.

A number of the wives of those who helped with the work on Monday brought food and helped Martha prepare a noon meal for the workers.

"I want all of the farmers who took time off from their own work and brought their equipment to my farm to work, and the ladies who cooked food and came to serve, to know how much we appreciate it. My family and I are very grateful, and we love each one of you," Mrs. Garner said following the outpouring by the friends and neighbors.

RETIREMENT SLATED

Denney Resigns Chief's Position

H.R. (Bill) Denney, Friona Chief of Police for the past 13½ years, this week tendered his resignation effective May 31.

In a letter dated March 15, 1983 and addressed to Wright Williams, mayor, Jerry Lewis, city manager, and the City Council members, Denney stated simply:

"I am offering my resignation as the Chief of Police. I have worked for the City of Friona for the past 15 years and eight months.

"I respectfully request that you accept my resignation effective May 31, 1983, as I will be of retirement age at that time.

"Until such time, I will continue to do my duties, to the best of my ability. Sincerely, /s/ H.R. Denney"

Denney, who was first employed by the City of Friona as a patrolman on June 1, 1967, refused to comment further on his reasons for resigning, except that he could take early retirement, and he felt this would be the best thing to do.

"I hate to leave, worse than anything," Denney said.

Jerry Lewis, city manager, commenting on the resignation, said that he had asked Chief Denney for three things in recent months: (1) Twenty-four hour police protection for the city; (2) a true rotation of employees with patrolmen relieving patrolmen and dispatchers ("We have had patrolmen relieving dispatchers and vice-versa," Lewis said) and (3) for Denney to contact the Amarillo Police Academy and secure a policy and procedures manual, or "book," for the Police Department to follow.

Lewis indicated that he had given Denney a deadline of April 1 to comply with his three requests.

"Some of the other officers may feel threatened, but everyone will keep their job until it is found that they are not qualified. I'm not on a head-hunting expedition," Lewis said.

The city manager indicated that the city would be advertising in professional publications for a replacement for Chief Denney.

"I want to work with the chief of police in resolving the problems of the department," Lewis said.

55 YEARS AGO--MARCH 12, 1928

At an election held here Monday for the purpose of determining whether or not Friona should become an organized municipality or remain a mere hamlet, a good turnout assured incorporation, by a vote of 65 for and 34 against. There being perhaps 125 qualified voters in the described corporate limits, the turnout of 101 voters was considered excellent.

45 YEARS AGO--MARCH 25, 1938

An epidemic of measles has broken out in Friona and vicinity during the past two weeks, and the number of cases seems to be increasing rather than decreasing.

Mr. and Mrs. Ray Landrum have sold the Regal Theatre to Bill McGlothlin, who will take charge within the very near future, it is reported this week. Mr. and Mrs. Landrum have also sold their residence property in Friona to McGlothlin and their farm near Rhea to other parties, but have not as yet decided on their next location or plans.

35 YEARS AGO--MARCH 19, 1948

The Friona Chamber of Commerce was revived and re-organized at a meeting in Friona Monday night, when Fred Phelps, secretary-manager of the Portales (N.M.) Chamber of Commerce, addressed a group of Friona businessmen. A temporary board of directors was formed, with W.L. Edelman as chairman. Members are Nelson Welch, C.W. Dixon, Hoyt Smith, Weldon

Dickson, Otho Whitefield and Ray Landrum.

30 YEARS AGO--MARCH 19, 1953

Construction of the first drive-in theatre in Parmer County is scheduled to commence within a few days at Friona. Marvin Lawson, who will build and operate the theatre, states that everything possible is being done to provide a modern drive-in, with equipment already on order. Goal for completion date is May 15.

25 YEARS AGO--MARCH 20, 1958

Construction began this week on a 600,000 bushel capacity addition to the Black Grain Company. Completion is scheduled for June 1, in order to be ready for this year's wheat harvest.

Unplug ItAnd Be Safe!

Always unplug any small electrical product after using it, cautions the Association of Home Appliances Manufacturers (AHAM) and Underwriters Laboratories (UL).

Don't assume that if the switch is "off," there's no danger of electrocution. This may not be true if the product comes into contact with water.

Electrocutions may occur in kitchens, bathrooms or outdoors--anywhere near water sources.

Never use any electrical product while bathing or put it where it can drop or be pulled into the tub or sink. If the appliance accidentally falls into the water, don't reach into the water for it. Unplug it immediately at the wall outlet.

Never leave a small portable electrical appliance within the reach of small children. Children left unattended could pull the plugged-in, but switched-off appliance into the tub or sink and risk being electrocuted.

Rites Held Monday For W.I. Robards

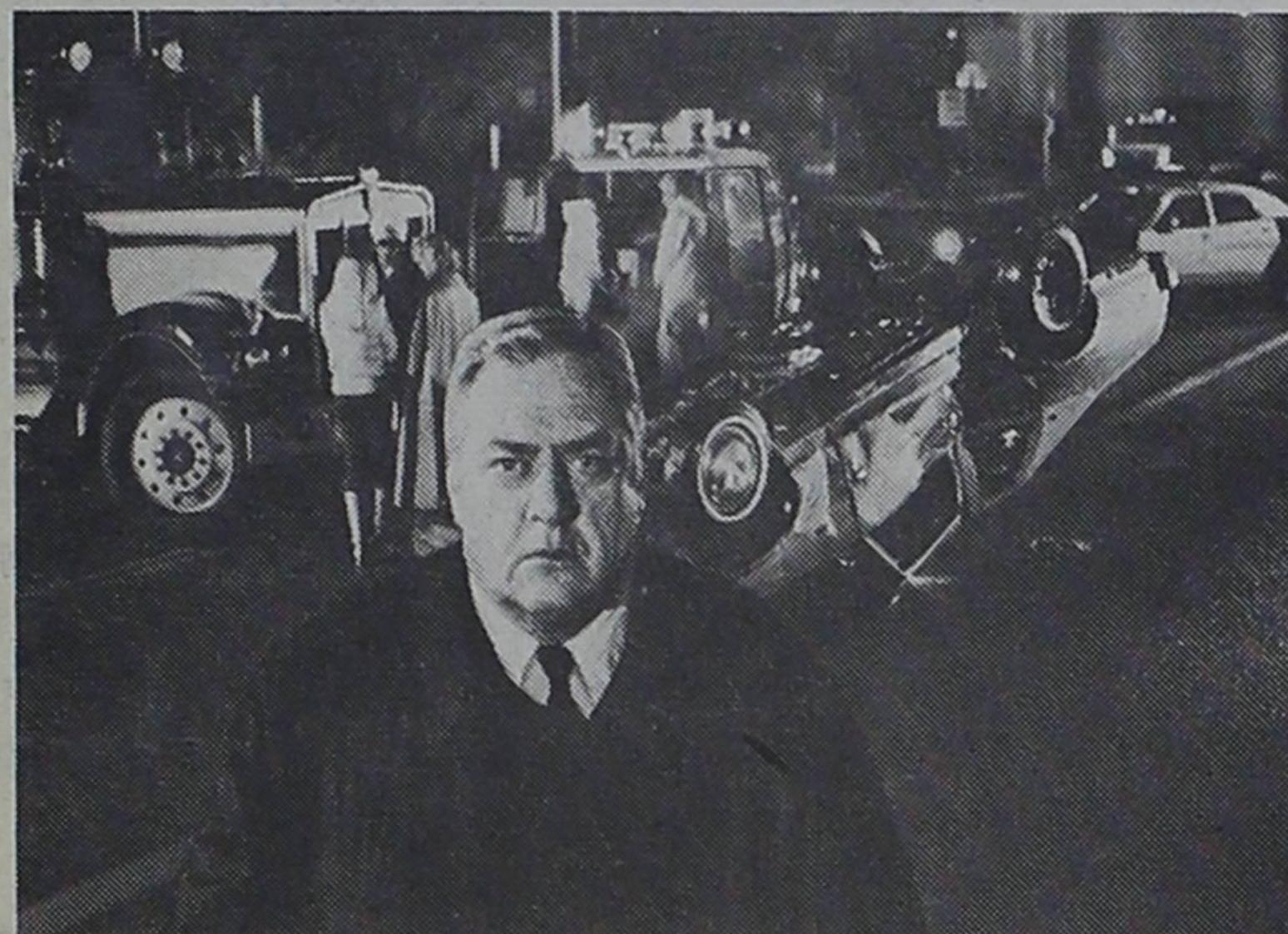

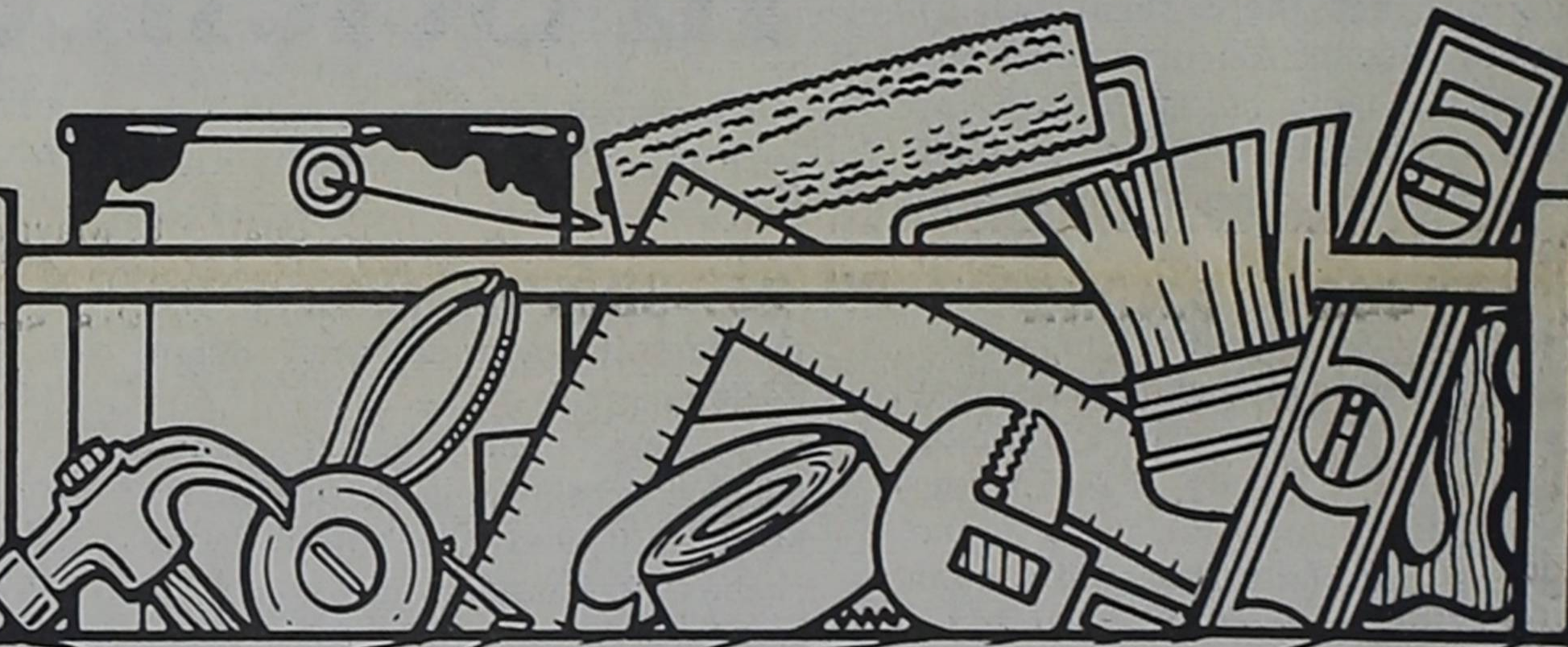
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Chiefs Take Second In Local Track Meet

Running in their own invitational meet, the Friona High School Chieftains had a successful meet in their first outing of the 1983 season last Saturday.

The meet was blessed with near ideal weather, with temperatures in the high 70s, and a light wind for the afternoon running finals.

The Chieftains won five events competing against a 15-team field, to score 80½ points. New Deal won the meet, with 99 points.

Eloy Caballero, competing as a member of the "Friona JV" team, scored another 19 points, winning the 400-meter run in 53.73; placing second in the long jump with an effort of 20-6½, and placing sixth in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles, at 44.0.

The Chieftains scored 17 points in the hurdles race, as Richie Malouf won the event easily in the time of 42.38, and John Aguirre placed third in 43.21.

Friona also ran away with the 1600-meter (mile) relay race, winning the event in 3:37.39. Members of the

foursome were Malouf, Ricky Marquez, John Aguirre and Alfredo Mata.

Javier Mata won the 1600-meter run with a time of 5:06.8, and finished fourth in the 800 meter run at 2:12.84.

The other gold medal was won by discus thrower Michael Chaney, with a toss of 139-6.

Other point-winners for the Chieftains were Alfredo Mata, second in the 200 meter dash with a time of 2:12.84; Doug Moyer, fifth in the pole vault at 9-6; Charlie Morgan, sixth in the 100-meter dash at 11.91; and the 400-meter relay team (Ricky Marquez, Alfredo Mata, John Aguirre and Charlie Morgan), fourth with a time of 46.38.

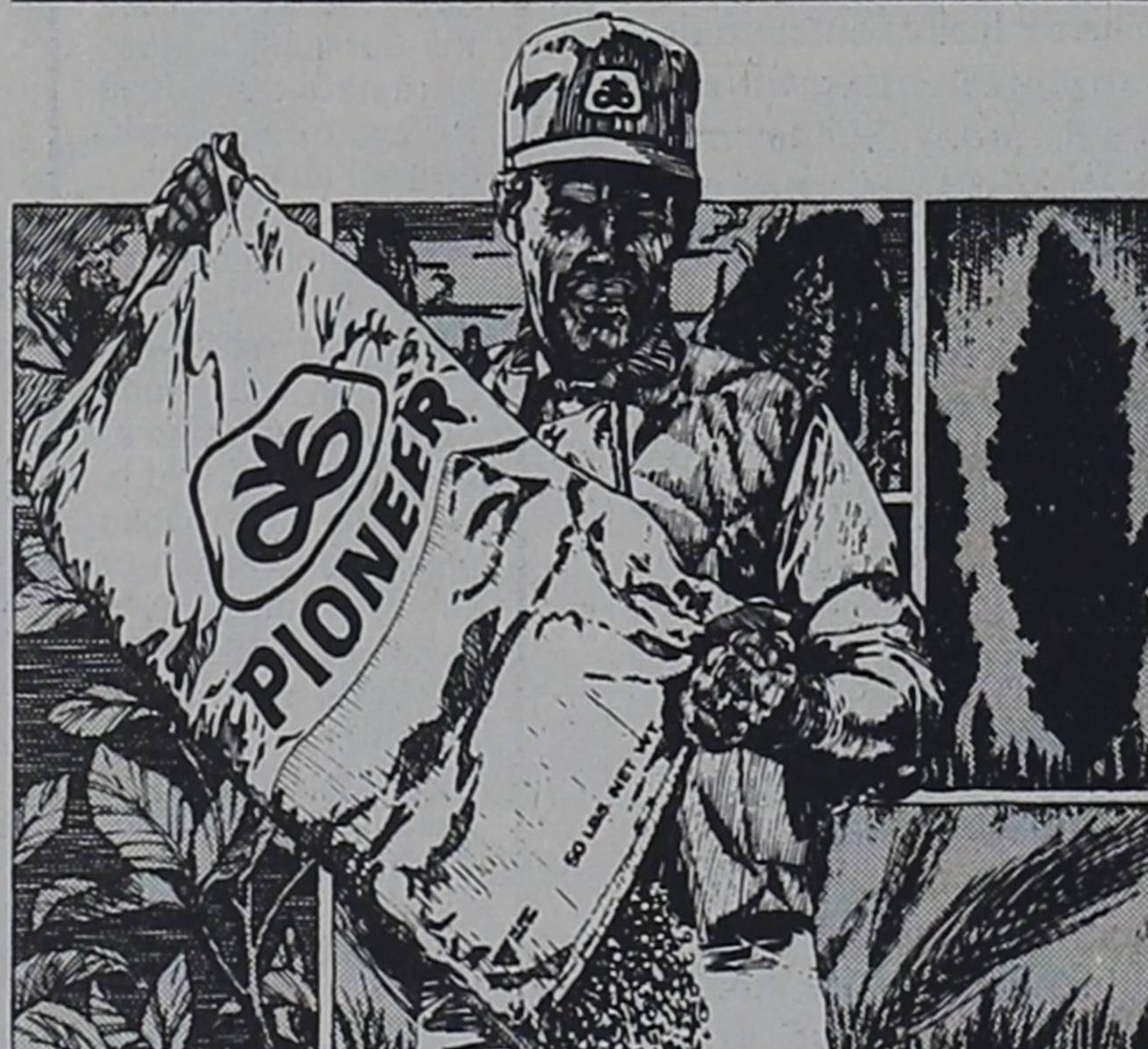
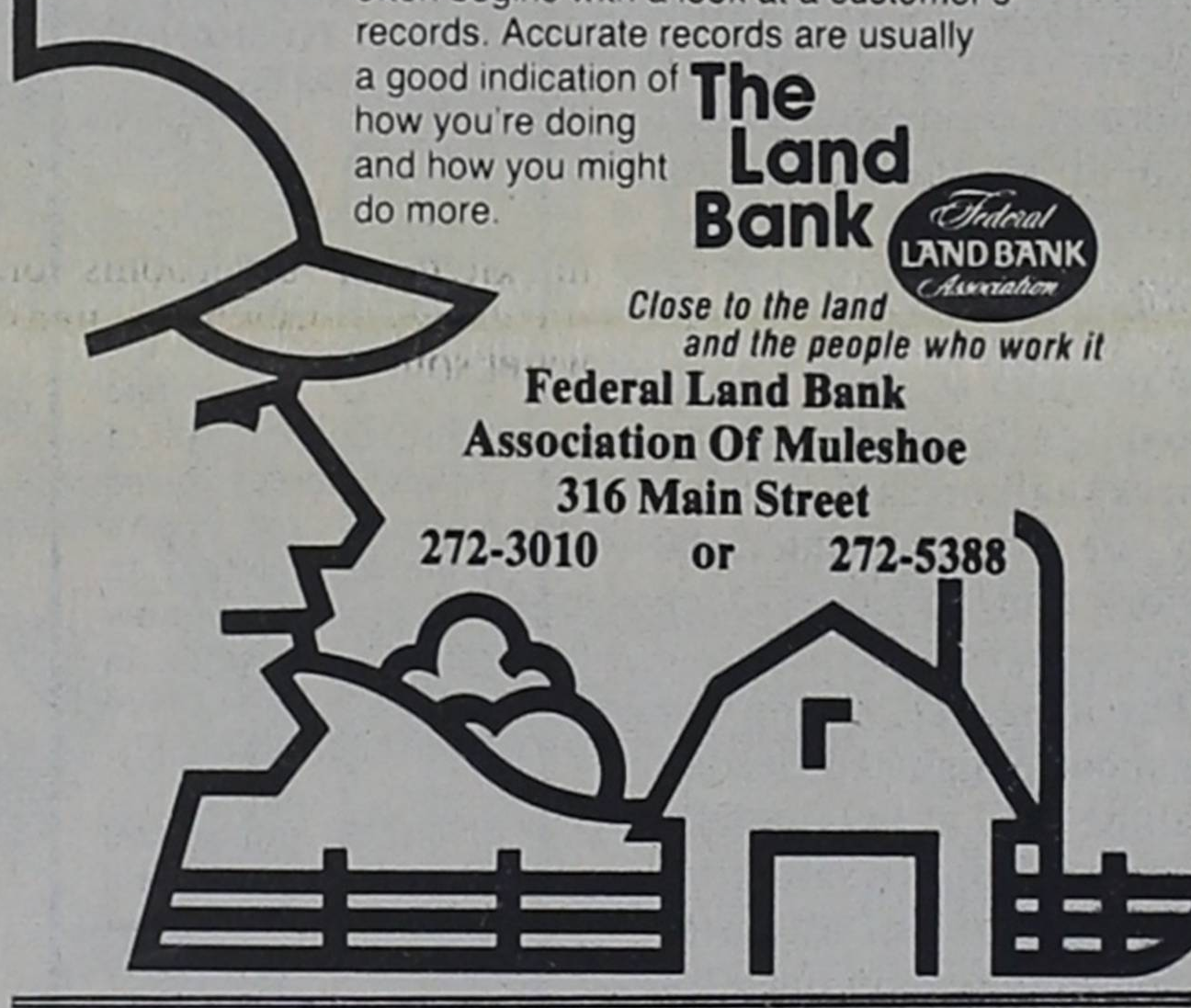

Friona Squaws Are Second In Meet

The Friona Squaws' track and field team had a good outing in their own invitational meet here March 12.

The team won four events and placed second in three others, compiling 98 and one-fifth points, good for second place behind Kress, which scored 112 points.

Wenetter Jackson was a double winner for the Squaws, taking the discus event with a toss of 111-6, and the shot put with a heave of 38-5. Both marks are new school records for the events.

Diane Johnston won the long jump in an event that almost took a microscope to separate the leaders. Miss Johnston's winning jump measured 15 feet, one and three quarters of an inch.

Second place went to Barnes of Morton, with a jump of 15-1¼, and third place to Marie Pesch of Bovina, at 15-1. Fourth place, by Todd of Happy, measured 14 feet, 11 and three-quarters of an inch. The top four places were within two inches of each other.

Miss Johnston also placed second in the high jump, clearing 4-6.

The Squaws' 1600-meter relay team, thanks to a great anchor lap by Sherry O'Brian, snatched victory away from Vega, with a time of 4:29.86. When Miss O'Brian got the baton, she was a good 30 yards behind the leader, but made up the deficit and passed the Longhorn anchor girl in the stretch.

Other members of the relay foursome were Diane Johnston, Nikki Osborn, and Diana Cruz. Miss O'Brian looked to be a winner

in the open 400-meter race, leading for the entire lap. But Segura of Kress caught the Friona runner at the end of the race, and leaned forward to win by a head. Winning time was 62:7, and Miss O'Brian's time was almost identical, 62:72.

Other point winners for the Squaws included Nikki Osborn, who won her heat of the 800-meter dash but had to settle for second when Olton's Patty Cary (daughter of former Friona residents Dale and Mary Cary), won her heat with a better time.

Miss Cary's time was 2:41.85 and Miss Osborn was clocked in 2:42.78. Due to the large field of entries, finals in some events had to be run in heats, with placing according to times.

Devera Rhodes placed third in the 1600-meter run, timed in 6:34.48; the Friona 400-meter relay team (Judy McLellan, Sherry O'Brian, Diane Johnston and Cara Brockman), placed third with a 53.87 clocking. "We need to improve on our handoffs, and we could cut our time down in this race," said coach Don Herbert.

Reva Duffey placed fifth in the discus throw with a toss of 89-4, and Amy Blankenship tied for sixth in the high jump at a height of 4-4, to round out the scoring.

Tax Relief Offered For Agricultural Land Use

Is the land you own being used for agricultural purposes? If it is, then you may be eligible for tax relief on that property.

According to Ron Procter, chief appraiser of the Parmer County Appraisal District, landowners have the option of applying either for agricultural-use valuation or for open-space land valuation of their property.

Applications must be filed by May 2 this year for any property to receive agricultural-use valuation, or for open-space land valuation on property that did not receive that type of appraisal in 1982.

Two constitutional amendments permit taxation of land on its agricultural-use, or productivity, value, Procter said. This means that taxes would be assessed against the productive value of the land instead of what the land would sell for in the open market.

It was noted that the legal basis for special land appraisal is found in the Texas Constitution in Art. VIII, Secs. 1-d and 1-d-1. The two types of land and valuation are commonly called "ag-use" or "1-d" and "open-space" or "1-d-1."

"The requirements for application and for qualification of both the land and the owner are different," Procter said.

For 1-d ag-use valuation, the owner must file an application with the chief appraiser each year. Some other requirements under this provision are

that the land must be owned by "a natural person," not a corporation, partnership, agency or organization; the land must have been devoted exclusively to agricultural use for at least three years before the year application is first made, and the agricultural business conducted on the land must be the owner's primary occupation and source of income.

Also, the chief appraiser must determine that the landowner qualifies and must approve the application, and the owner has to file a sworn statement each year he applies, attesting to the land's agricultural use.

For the other type of land valuation, 1-d-1 open-space, the land may be owned by a corporation or partnership and so on, and the agricultural business need not be the principle business of the owner. Agricultural and timber lands and ecological laboratories are eligible for 1-d-1 appraisal.

However, the land must be involved in a qualifying agricultural use to the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area; it must have been devoted principally to a qualifying use for at least five of the past seven years, and, again, the chief appraiser must approve the application.

The local team will be seeking revenge for being referred to as "over-rated and slightly overweight" by Channel 10's sportscaster this week.

Once an application for 1-d-1 valuation is filed with the chief appraiser and approved, a landowner is not required to submit another application as long as the land qualifies, unless the chief appraiser requests another application to confirm current qualification.

Procter also explained that the possibility for a "rollback tax" exists under either form of special land valuation. This liability for additional tax is created under 1-d valuation by either a change in ownership or a change in use of the land, and it extends back three years before the year of the change.

Under 1-d-1, a rollback is triggered by change in use to a nonagricultural purpose that would not qualify for productivity valuation. Taxes are recaptured for five years before the year of the change.

The additional tax is measured by the difference between taxes paid under productivity valuation provisions and the taxes which would have been paid if the land had been put on the tax roll at market value.

More information and application forms are available from the local appraisal office. Personnel there will be able to assist landowners with the information necessary for determining if their property qualifies for the program.

Land Productivity Valuation

MAY BRING YOU TAX RELIEF ON YOUR PROPERTY TAXES

Under the Texas Property Tax Code, farmers and ranchers who qualify may have their agricultural land taxed on the basis of productivity rather than market value. Productivity valuation may lower the 1983 taxes on your agricultural or open-space land.

If you have never received open-space (1-d-1) valuation on your land, or if your land has been receiving agricultural (1-d) valuation, you must make application to the appraisal district office by May 2, 1983, to be entitled to tax relief this year.

If your land received open-space (1-d-1) valuation in 1982, there will be no requirement for you to reapply for 1983 in this appraisal district. Remember, however, that annual applications are required for agricultural (1-d) valuation.

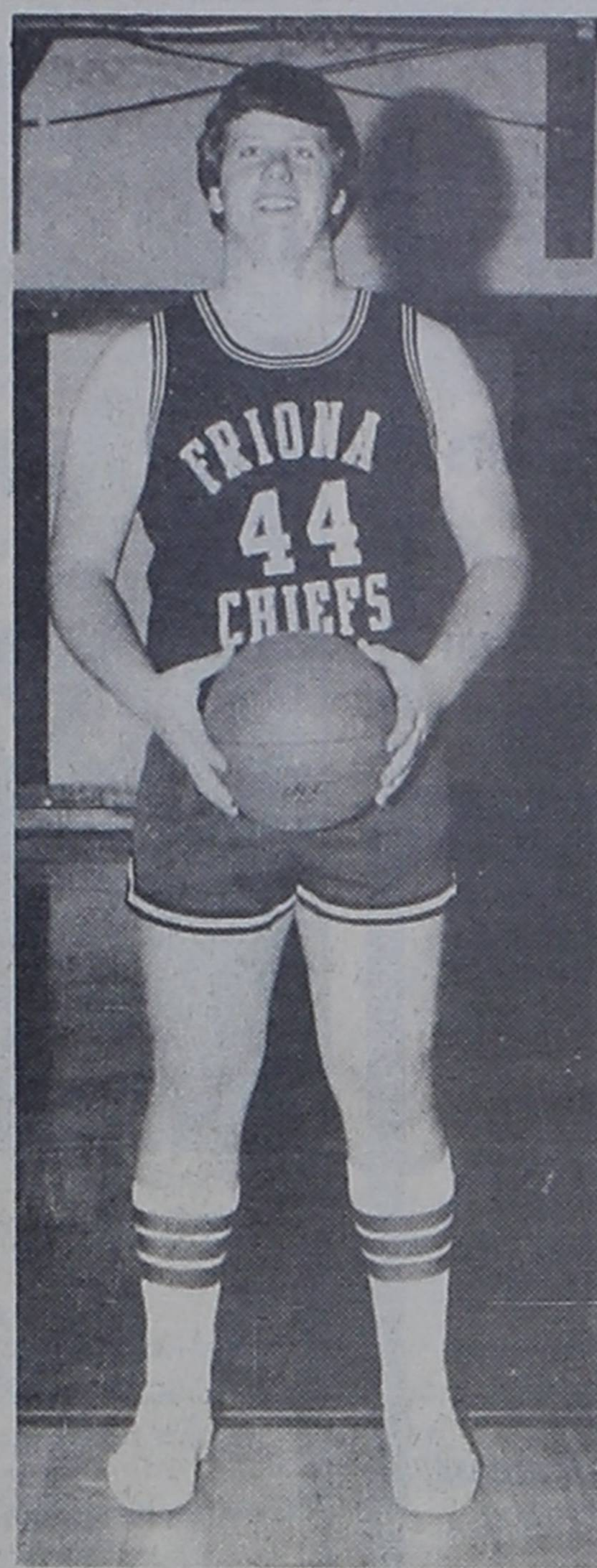

Sherry O'Brian Is Selected For All-Star Game

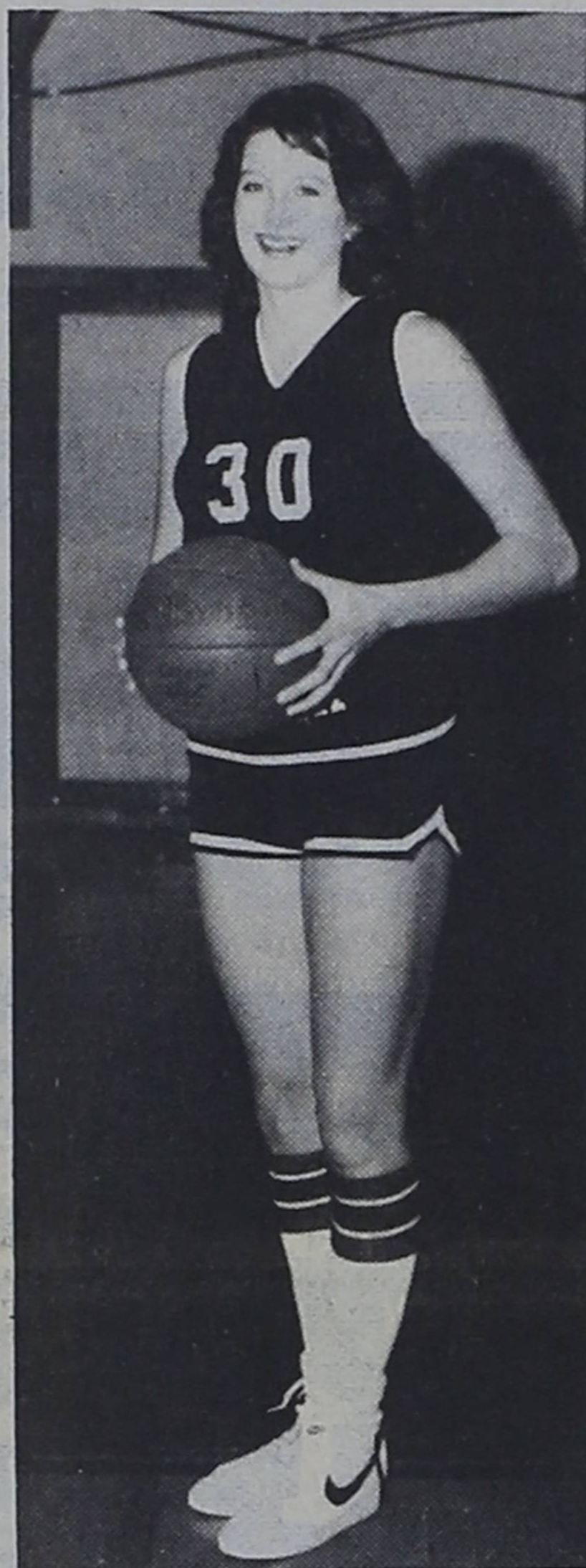

The next meeting will be April 7 in the home of Helen Fangman.

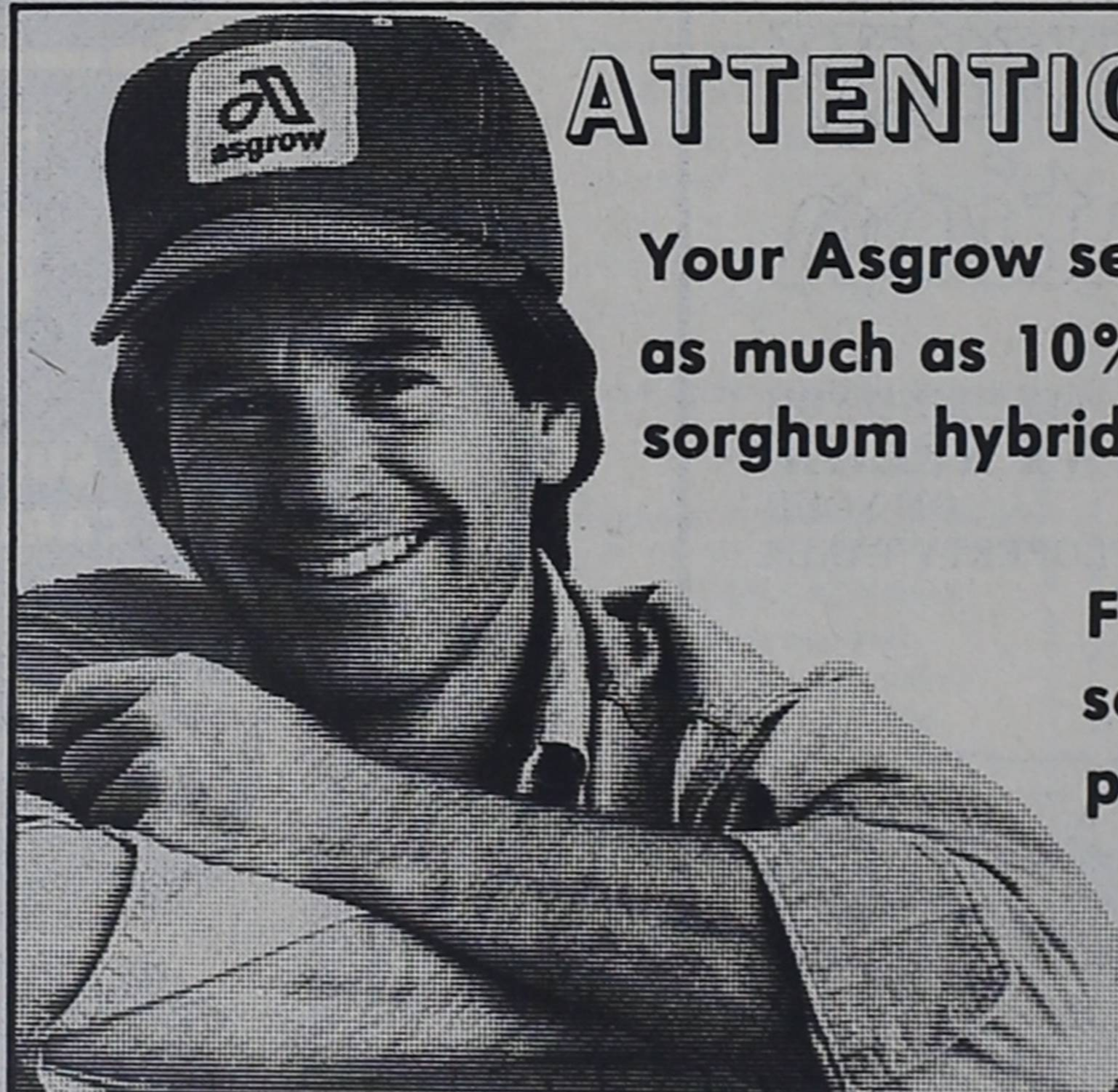
