A view from The Lamplighter

If the national polls are right, and if the national media continues to have its way, the country will elect Bill Clinton of Arkansas and Oxford as our next President.

If Mr. Clinton arises to that August position, he will do so without my own vote.

Mr. Clinton is the kind of man who, had he lived in the days of George Washington and Thomas Jefferson, would have said, "Oh, I'm very much in favor of freedom and liberty, and I think people everywhere ought to live in freedom, but I really don't want to expose myself to the dangers of the battlefield. Someone else can fight those battles. I've got so much to offer once they get through with the dirty business of fighting and dying. When that is done I'll tell them how to get organized. I'll tell them how they should lead their lives."

In some respects Clinton will be a unique President. We have had adulterers in the White House before. We have had liars in the White House before. It is possible that we have even had gutless cowards in the White House before. But this will be the first time in my own memory that all those attributes are rolled up in one individual occupying this nation's highest office. And it will be the first time the people of this country have knowingly elected someone like that to the Presidency.

Usually we have to wait years to find out that our various Presidents have even one of those attributes. A generation passed before we found out Roosevelt had a secret mistress, or that John Kennedy was bedding down outside Camelot. We didn't find out that Richard Nixon would lie to cover up the wrong doing of his subordinates until after he was elected the second time. We didn't find out that Lyndon Johnson's courage would fail him, and that he would abandon his Presidency and his post as Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces while his troops were fighting and dying, until he was already President, driven from office by people like Bill Clinton, then actively aiding and assisting the enemies of this country.

But we now know Bill Clinton is capable of all those failures, and we know it before the vote. He has already demonstrated he can and will lie if it serves his political ambitions. He has already demonstrated his lack of courage by using lies and deception to avoid military service for his country. He has demonstrated his Jane Fonda-type patriotism by going abroad and organizing, on foreign soil, resistance to the policies of America during a time of war, during a time when his countrymen were giving up their own lives in order that he might have a secure one. We know all that. And it appears he may still be elected. If that happens it will prove beyond doubt that those things we have all been taught about good citizenship no longer apply. We will then be able to tell our children and grandchildren to lie, cheat, bend the rules, hide out when your country needs you, and you too may someday be President of the United

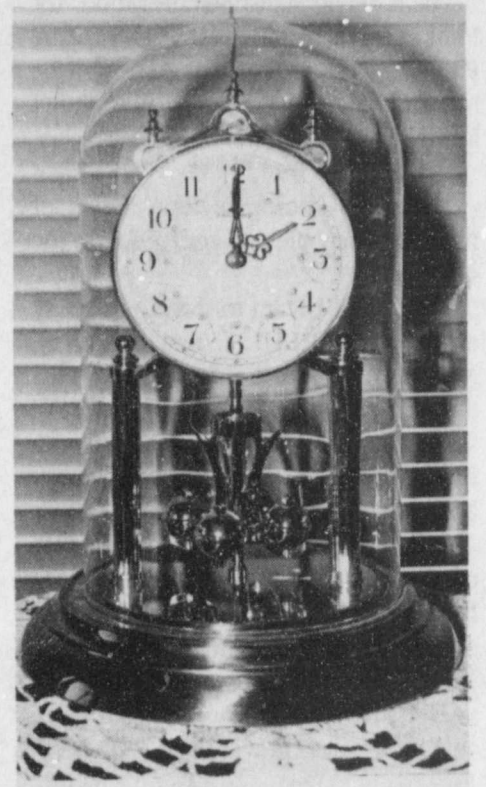

Floydada man charged with Injury to a Child following death of six-week-old

A Floydada man, Henry Fuentes Jr., 33, has been arrested and charged with the first degree felony of Injury to a Child. Bond was set at \$50,000.

A six week old baby, Latoya Capuchino, died October 10 at Methodist Hospital, from complications caused by "infection throughout her body." Autopsy reports are still pending as to the condition of the baby at the time of her death.

According to Paramedic Paul McIntosh, Mr. and Mrs. Fuentes brought the baby to the Sheriff's office, on October 7, because the baby was having difficulty breathing. "The dispatcher, Linda

Edwards, performed mouth to mouth resuscitation on the baby until I arrived and continued the mouth to mouth," said McIntosh. "We then transported the baby to Lockney General Hospital by ambulance and it was then flown by AeroCare to Methodist Hospital."

On Saturday, after it was determined that Latoya was "brain dead," she was disconnected from her life support. Paramedic Paul McIntosh and Floydada Police Chief James Hale were present for the autopsy, which was ordered by Lubbock Justice of the Peace, Jim Hansen.

LaToya was born September 1 and

was immediately signed over, by her mother, to a cousin Henry Fuentes and his wife Eloisa. After the documents were signed, the baby was released from the hospital, on September 3, into the custody of the Fuentes'.

"The baby showed no signs of ill health at the time of her release," said Becky McPherson, District Attorney for the 110th Judicial District.

"We are charging Fuentes with Injury to a Child, because of his failure to seek medical attention for the child. It is a first degree felony and carries the same punishment as murder. The case will be presented to the grand jury."

Council approves increases in sewer and sanitation rates

FLOYDADA — A short discussion period preceded the approval of new sewer and garbage rates for the City of Floydada at the Tuesday, October 20, regular monthly session of the city council. Council members approved the rate increase and dictated that it become effective with the October billing period.

Motion for the action was made by Clar Schacht with a second by Eric Comelius. The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion.

Sewer rates will be as follows: residential, \$6.75 minimum; each additional connection, \$1.00; commercial, \$8.25 minimum; each additional connection, \$1.00; and each wash trap, \$10.00. New garbage collection and disposal rates will be as follows: residential, \$11.00 per month; commercial, \$13.50 per month (covers four pickups of one container per month); each additional pickup, \$2.00; and all customers outside the city limits will pay an additional \$2.00 per month for service.

According to city officials, the increased charges are necessary to fund increased costs of operating the landfill and the sewer system due to increasing and changing EPA regulations.

COUNCIL HEARS

INSURANCE BIDS

Bids from Goen & Goen Insurance of Floydada and the Texas Municipal League insurance pool were presented at the evening session by Kyle Smith and Jack Russell. Each detailed the coverage and cost of both liability and property insurance in all areas of city operation. The bids, each in excess of \$30,000.00, were tabled for further study before a decision is reached.

AIRPORT LEASE

A recommendation from the Floydada Municipal Airport Board of Directors was acted upon in regard to the leasing of the local airport facility for the coming year. The board's recommendation was that the lease not be renewed to the current lease holder, Mrs. Grigsby Milton. The recommendation was based on the fact that the leasee is unable to meet the terms of the lease.

A motion to follow the board recommendation and deny the lease was made by Amado Morales and seconded by Wayne Tipton. Council approval was unanimous.

Other action involving the airport board was the reappointment of board members Charles Craig and L. B. Stewart Jr. Each will serve a two year term.

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Otho R. Stubbs signing books in Floydada

Otho R. Stubbs will be signing copies of his recently released book, "Otho Stubbs A Lasting Legacy", in the Floyd County Historical Museum in Floydada on Saturday, Oct. 31, from 10 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Books will be available for purchase. Those who have ordered the book by mail may bring their copy for Otho's signature. Also on display will be some of the artist's original artwork.

Disabled placards are now available

Penny Golightly, Floyd County Tax Assessor-Collector, has announced that any disabled person with the permanent disabled cards need to come into the Tax Assessor-Collector's office, Room 116 in the courthouse, and even exchange them for the new permanent disabled placards.

She stated, "Each disabled person may have one set of plates and one placard or two placards. To even exchange the cards, you must bring the old cards in. We also have the new temporary placards."

Early voting is now being held in Floyd County for the November 3 General Election. Registered voters wishing to cast ballots at their convenience prior to the regular election day on November 3 may do so at the Floyd County Clerk's Office. According to Margaret Collier, county clerk, early voting will continue on weekdays during regular office hours until October 30.

At press time this week, Collier reported 190 early voters in Floyd County.

NOVEMBER 3 POLLING SITES

There are sixteen locations throughout the county where registered voters may cast ballots on Tuesday, November 3, 1992. All polling locations will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. for the convenience of Floyd County voters.

Voters living in Voting Precinct #1 in Southwest Floydada will vote at Massie Activity Center. Those living in Voting Precinct #3, Allmon Community, will vote at the Allmon Grain Office. Voting Precinct #4, serving the Sandhill area, will be located at the Barwise Elevator. East Lockney, Voting Precinct #5, will cast ballots at Lockney City Hall.

The Lutheran Church at Providence Community will serve as the balloting

location for those living in Voting Precinct #7. Residents of Lone Star Community and Voting Precinct #8 will vote at the First Methodist Church in Lockney. Voting Precinct #9 at South Plains will vote at the South Plains Baptist Church. Cedar Hill residents, living in Voting Precinct #11, will be voting at the Cedar Hill Assembly of God Church.

Voting Precinct #13 for residents of Baker Community will vote at Producers Elevator, Booth Spur. Harmony area residents, Voting Precinct #16, will vote

Expenditures reviewed by Lockney ISD board members

Lockney School Board members discussed '92-'93 expenditures, at length, during their October 15 regular meeting. Superintendent Dub Hallmark presented trustees with a chart showing the dollar amount of the budget which had been allocated for the 92-93 school year, and the percentage breakdown of money spent.

According to the graph, \$2,060,632, or 46.88% of the total expenditure will be spent for instructional purposes. "This includes teachers salary, teachers supplies and anything else pertaining to academic subjects," Hallmark told board members.

"Sometimes we receive complaints that not enough money goes into instructional purposes and maybe too much goes into athletics. This chart will help people understand where your money is going."

Athletic expenditures for '92-93 account for 3.05% or \$134,245. "This includes all athletics," said Hallmark, such as basketball, track, tennis and baseball for boys and girls. It also includes transportation to the events, equipment and coaches bonuses.

General administration is budgeted at \$215,292 or 4.89%. "This accounts for school board liability, workman's comp, the salary for the superintendent's secretary and the superintendents salary."

Building Improvement was the second largest expenditure shown, with 15.64% or \$688,000. "This includes the new gym that will be built this year," said Hallmark.

Plant Maintenance accounted for 7.56%, or \$332,761. Principals salaries were listed at \$195,150 or 4.44% of the total expenditures.

Library expenditures are 1.86% of the budget, or \$81,944. Curriculum and Personnel Services (staff development) was \$26,884, or .61% of the total expenditures.

UIL/Co-Curricular is .31% of the total expenditures, which totals \$13,715. "This includes the dues and expenses we pay to belong to and participate in UIL activities. It also includes travel to UIL

events."

Guidance and Counseling was 1.79% - \$79,921; Health Services was listed at .92% - \$40,423; Transportation (bus transportation for school purposes) is 3.11% - \$136,637; Food Services, 4.11% or \$180,953; Data Processing (computer supplies), \$688,000 - .42%; and Flow Out, \$194,130 - 4.41%.

"Flow Out is the special education money that is returned to the Educational Coop for other uses within the Coop," said Hallmark.

In other action, board members approved the following personnel to serve on the textbook committee: W.H. Hallmark, Dana Wright, Melody Wildy, Connie Mallett, Rhonda Lyles, Tracy Long, Vickie Vandiver, Felicitia Castro, Linda Terrell, Joe Pat Wright, David Brewer, Peggy Hallmark, Ladora Aufill, Eddie Fortenberry, Craig Setfill and David Norwood.

The committee will examine and select state-adopted textbooks for LISD. Books to be reviewed will include: Basal Readers & Handwriting for grades 1-5 and 7-8; Spanish, grades 1-5; Theater Arts, grades 4 & 6; Texas History & Geography, grade 7; Computer Literacy, grade 7 & 8; Keyboarding & Word Processing, grades 9-12; Computer Science, grades 9-12; Driver & Safety Education, grades 9-12; Chemistry, grades 9-12; and United States Government, grades 9-12.

Trustees also accepted the resignation of an elementary school aide, Roxanne Hennagan. Soyla Reyna was hired by the trustees to fill the vacancy.

The board agreed that a new drivers education car was needed and voted to call for bids on a 1993 Suburban. The bid specifications will be published in the paper.

The bids for construction of the new gym will be opened on Thursday, October 22.

Hallmark also briefed school board members on the current construction of the vocational ed classroom and the special education classroom.

The meeting adjourned at approximately 9:00 p.m.

LaDelle Noland Gowens is adding a touch of excitement and anticipation for Punkin Day with her window paintings.

Gowens, an Amarillo resident who grew up in Floydada, has returned to do her part in making Punkin Day successful.

For a fee of \$15 to \$25 per window, Gowens painted customized designs for various businesses.

"It's fun for me because I'm like a little kid getting to color," Gowens said.

Weather can be a problem in ensuring a painting will last. Painting from the inside is a way to protect the water-based paint Gowens said. This technique requires her to sketch the details, first followed by the big colors and reverse lettering.

Gowens painted windows in Floydada last year for Old Settlers Day and windows in Lockney for their homecoming this month. Her mother, a Lockney High School graduate, helped her come up with several scenes for the windows.

Gowens' art training began in grade school with private art lessons. After graduating from high school, Gowens attended the Fashion and Art Institute in Dallas in 1979 for nine months. Commercial art was not as creative as she had hoped, because she had to match her art with what advertisers wanted, Gowens said.

For the past two years working as a Mary Kay consultant has satisfied Gowens' desire to be creative. She has the freedom in her schedule to make time for painting.

"I want to make people feel better whether they are looking in a mirror or at a window," Gowens said.



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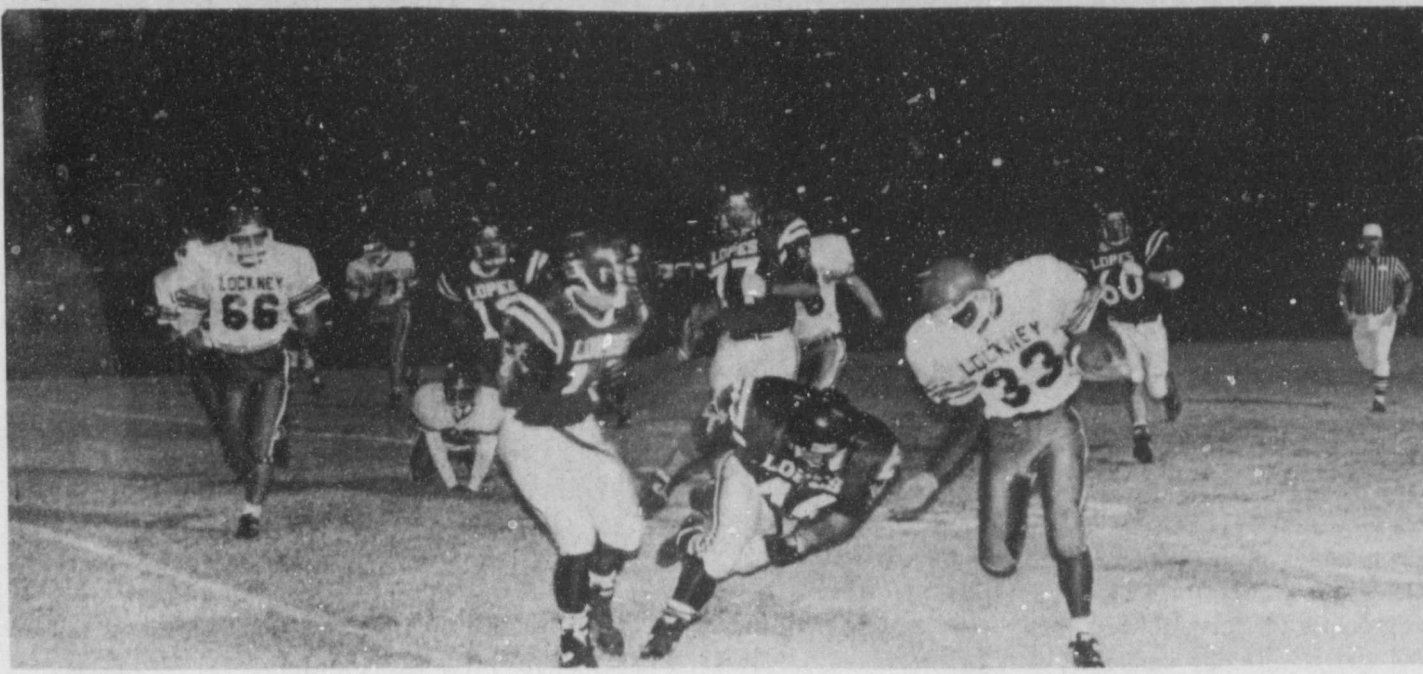

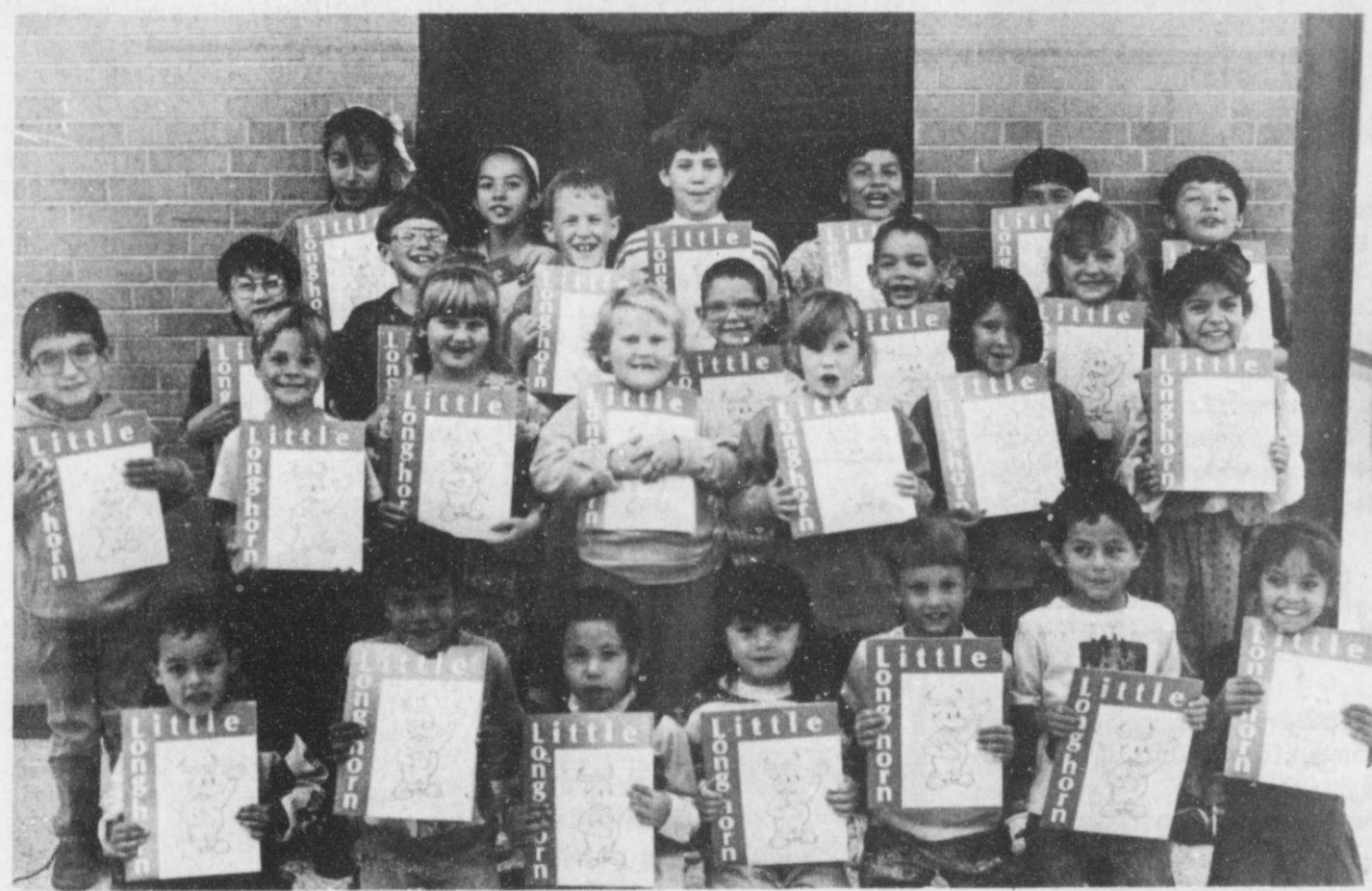

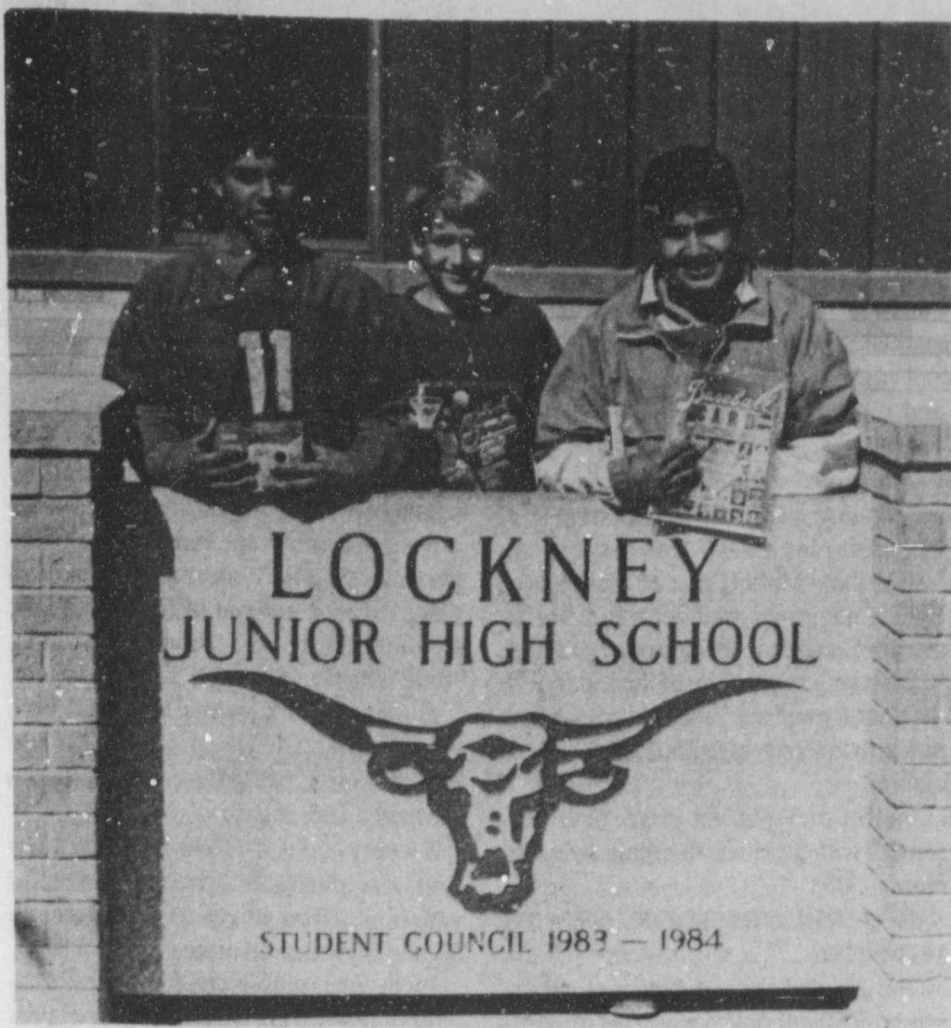

achieved high grades in P.E., Band and History. Amy Brice, Mark's History teacher, stated that "Marc is a very perceptive History student."

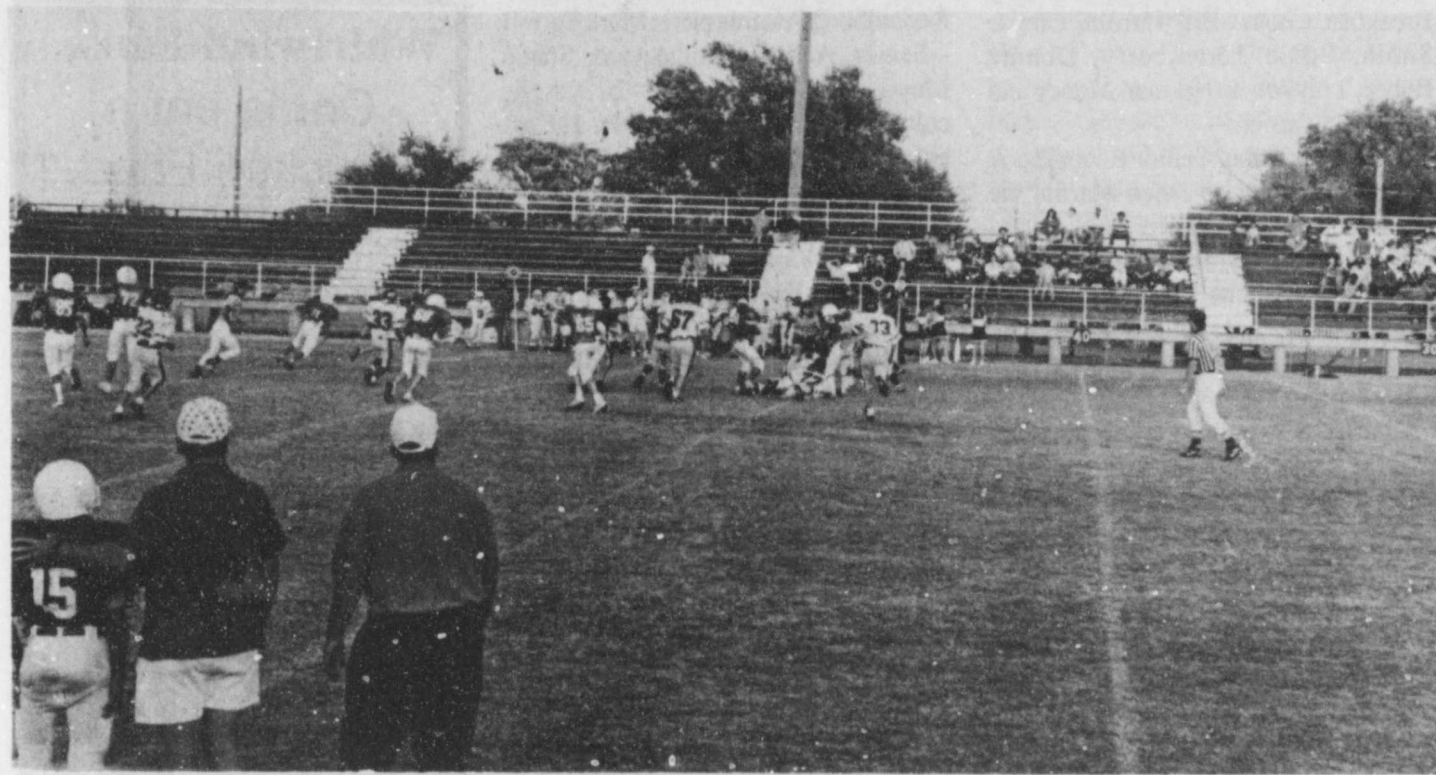

After passing the course, which includes a state test, everyone age twelve or over will be certified. They will receive a certificate to show they have completed the course.

No one under the age of 12 can be certified, but the younger youth are encouraged to attend and the Texas Parks and Wildlife will recognize their attendance with a certificate suitable for framing.

The course also meets the requirements of other states that also require a Hunter Safety Education Course. This

course will provide you with the opportunity to receive the proper certification which will allow you to purchase hunting licenses in Colorado or New Mexico. Colorado and New Mexico require everyone, of any age, to have this certification.

States of America.

Clearly there are many in America who are not concerned about such matters. They see nothing wrong with the policy of tax, spend, and let your grandkids worry about the consequences. They see nothing wrong with the Bill Clintons of this world hiding out while others shoulder the burden in time of war. They see nothing wrong with working people breaking their backs in order to keep expensive, wasteful, irresponsible Congressmen in office so long as they provides them with goodies to be paid for later, after they are gone.

But what about the rest of us? What about those of us who fought on various battlefields when our country called, or even some of us who didn't wait to be called? Or whose brothers, or cousins, or fathers fought on those battlefields? And what about those of us who have a deep and abiding sense of family, of such things as character? What are we going to do? Who are we going to vote for?

The choice is not easy. In many respects Mr. Bush has been a good President. He handled the disintegration of the Soviet Union in an admirable manner. He demonstrated astute leadership during the Desert Storm conflict. He has been on the right track, basically, in terms of international trade and in fighting for the interests of American farmers and ranchers. But in other respects he has been an inept political leader in his dealings with gutless, self-serving Congressmen. And even more inept as a campaigner. He is a good, decent, courageous man, but he has suffered by thinking he was dealing with good, decent, courageous men in the leadership of Congress. He did not see, as he should have seen, and as some advised him, that he was being taken to the cleaners by those who run the Congress of the United States. He listened too much to hypocritical editorial writers across America who urged him to sign the tax bill offered up by a Democratic Congress and who, weeks later, ridiculed him for doing so. He should have known.

The question is: should we give him another term? Has he learned his lessons? I don't know. There are those who say George Bush deserves to be beaten, but the nation does not deserve the alternative.

Then there is Ross Perot. In some respects Perot is a nut. He has some nutty ideas. But he has some good ideas as well. He knows, as every responsible citizen in America knows, and as the other two candidates know, that the national debt must be addressed. He seems to be willing to tackle the subject now, rather than later. But his solutions are so ambiguous, so off-the-wall as to cause grave concerns. Still something must be done, and his election to the Presidency would certainly stir up the status quo in Washington. Perhaps it is going to take something like that to give pause to a spend-happy Congress. Again, I simply don't know.

For myself, I will probably vote for George Bush despite all his political ineptness, and despite our own disappointment in his leadership, but we would not quarrel with anyone who sees it differently. I can see, and understand, a vote for Ross Perot, despite all his political ineptness, and I would not quarrel with anyone who cast a vote in that direction for whatever reason. But a vote for Bill Clinton would be a vote to insult the patriotism of every youngster,

of whatever generation, who put on the American uniform and stood ready to be called into action against the enemies of this country. It would be an insult, as I see things, to the honor and dignity of every mother or father, every brother or sister who prayed daily for the safe return of their own loved ones while Bill Clinton was ensconced in the safety of Oxford, organizing opposition to the very things their loved ones were fighting for and championing the cause of those their loved ones were fighting against.

Bill Clinton ought not be running for President. He ought to be spending his time apologizing to the American people.

Meanwhile, down here in Texas, Ms. Lena Guerrero has also been exposed as a fraud and a liar. After many years of claiming she is an honors graduate from the University of Texas, we discover that notwithstanding her claims, she is not an honors student, (she says someone on her staff made that claim years ago in printed material and she just never got around to correcting it) is not a graduate, did in fact fail certain courses necessary for her graduation, etc., etc., and we also discover she is surprised by all these revelations. Also, much to our own surprise, the Governor, Ms. Richards, thinks all that doesn't matter. What has truth got to do with politics. RALLS HIGHWAY ANNEXATION

Further consideration of a request for annexation into the city of property located on the South Ralls Highway resulted in a motion by Eric Cornelius that the council call for a public hearing on the matter to gather citizen input. The motion was approved by the council and a hearing will be scheduled for regular meeting night in November.

HOLIDAY HOURS

City employees will enjoy the usual four day weekend for the Thanksgiving holiday, being off from Thursday, November 26, thru Sunday, November 29. Christmas will be observed on Friday, December 25. Half of the city employees will be off from Thursday, December 24 thru Sunday, December 27 and the other half will be off December 25 thru Monday, December 28, thus allowing all city employees a four day weekend.

OTHER MATTERS

Other items approved by the council included the minutes from the previous meeting and the payment of monthly bills. Approval was also given to make a \$150.00 contribution to the Sparsely

Populated Entities Coalition to allow the organization to continue the fight for a West Texas Exemption to EPA regulations.

Council granted approval to a request from FmHA that a \$68.10 lien against the property at 702 Thornton be released. The lien was filed against the previous owner, Perfecto Morales, for the cost of cleaning up the lot in 1990. According to FmHA, Morales signed the house back to FmHA to avoid a foreclosure and the house is now being sold to a new owner. FmHA regulations prevent the sale of an encumbered title and prohibit payment of such liens.

Advertising for bids on the purchase of new pickups was also approved. The council will take bids for the proposed purchase of one to five pickups. If the price falls within the budgeted amounts, as many as five could be purchased.

City manager Gary Brown gave a short manager's report, briefly touching on the landfill, the West Texas Municipal Power Association and recent PUC action.

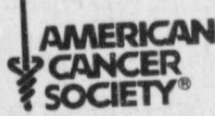

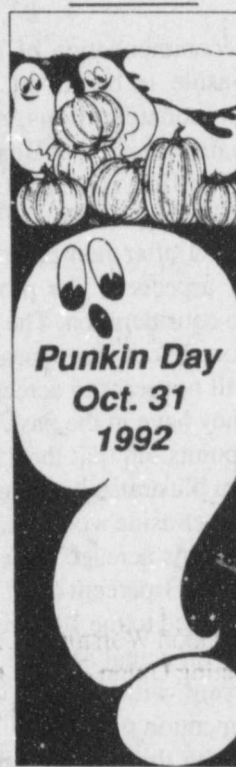

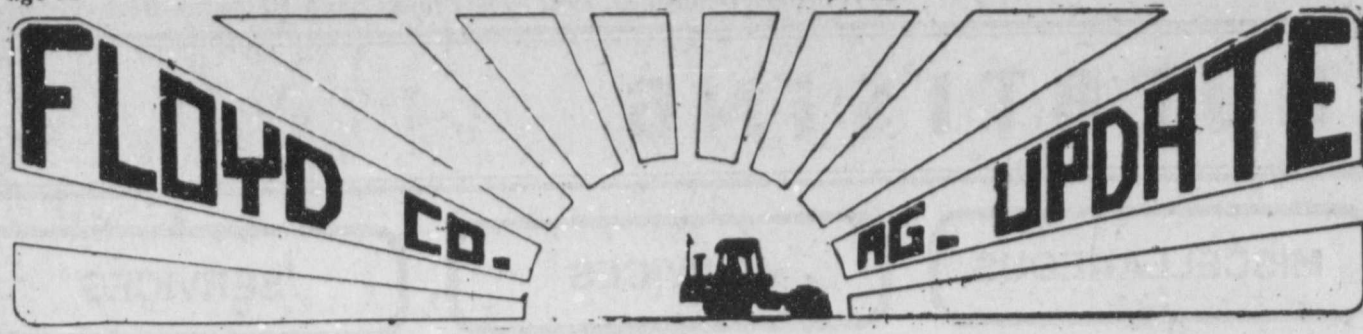

Ferguson re-elected to Floyd County Soil and Water Conservation Board

By Dora Ross

Leon Ferguson has been re-elected to the Floyd County Soil and Water Conservation Board of Directors. The purpose of the Floyd County SWCD is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters. All conservation programs managed by the district is of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

As one of five individuals serving on the District Board of Directors, Ferguson is responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

In Texas, there are 212 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State

Soil and Water Conservation Board. The Floyd County Soil and Water Conservation District was organized in 1940. Leon Ferguson's father, W.F. Ferguson, was elected to the first official Board for the Floyd County SWCD.

Suggestions made for boll weevil eradication referendum

The boll weevil is the worst economic pest of cotton. Boll weevils have been getting into U.S. cotton for the past 100 years.

A beltwide boll weevil eradication program has virtually eliminated the boll weevil from some eastern states such as Virginia and the Carolinas and also from Arizona and California. The Southeast Eradication Program is moving westward but it will be some years before it gets to Texas.

A Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Program could get underway much sooner if cotton producers in Texas were to decide this is what they want. To find out what the producers want, there has to be a vote, a referendum of cotton producers.

To have a vote, a referendum of cotton producers, a bill must be passed through the Legislature and signed by the Governor. Such a bill was put together in 1991 but there were a few problems with it.

A new Boll Weevil Eradication Bill has been put together by Texas Cotton Producers, Inc. and has the full support of the nine certified cotton producer organizations in the state. It will be

sponsored in the House by Representative Pete Patterson and in the Senate by Senator Bill Sims.

To allow the cotton producers to vote on this, we must have this "enabling" legislation pass as soon as possible. The next regular session of the Legislature starts in January, 1993. A special session may be held in mid-November, 1992. Whichever comes first, it is imperative that the Governor call for this bill at the earliest opportunity.

You can help by writing a letter to the Governor asking that she put this bill before the Legislature at the earliest opportunity.

Calling the Governor's hotline 1-800-843-5789 and asking that she put the Boll Weevil Eradication Bill before the Legislature at the earliest opportunity, and by passing a copy of this letter on to someone else involved in cotton production and get them to do the same.

This bill is "enabling" legislation only. It does not commit anyone to eradication. It simply sets up the framework for cotton producers to decide the next step.

PCG votes to support the 1993 Acreage Reduction Program

The Board of Directors of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) voted unanimously to support recommendations and comments made by the PCG Executive Committee regarding the 1993 Acreage Reduction Program (ARP) and loan level.

The Board approved the Executive Committee's recommendation that the 1993 ARP be set at no more than 5-percent. PCG comments on these issues had to be submitted prior to the regular Board meeting to meet USDA deadlines.

"The recommendation of the 5-percent set-aside is based on two very important considerations," explains PCG Chairman of the Board Steve Verett. "The first is that producer income is clearly maximized at the 5-percent level after non-payment acres and other aspects of the program are taken into consideration. The second is that cotton prices have proven they simply will not react to acreage reductions as they have in the past."

Verett points out that the 1992 High Plains crop illustrates just how ineffective a large set-aside would be. He notes that High Plains acreage losses of near 1.75 million, 13-percent of all U.S. cotton acres, added to the 10-percent ARP established an actual acreage set-aside of 23-percent with no real effect on weakening cotton prices.

"Faced with this situation producers must do whatever is necessary to maximize their income under the marketing loan program," concludes Verett.

In addition to the ARP recommendation the PCG Board also agreed to recommend that the 1993 loan rate be set at the highest level allowed.

PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson noted that the higher loan rate will hopefully encourage higher market prices for the 1993 crop. In addition to the ARP and loan rec-

Windbreak trees are available

The Floyd County Soil and Water Conservation District is accepting orders for windbreak tree seedlings and will continue to sell tree seedlings upon their availability until March 1993. All orders are filled on a first-come first-serve basis.

Windbreaks are relatively cheap to install and maintain. They provide for multiple-use benefits such as beautifying the countryside and/or farmstead, reduction of energy costs for heating and cooling buildings, reduction of soil blowing, and establishes livestock shelters.

The establishment of windbreaks around fields and farmstead provide substantial benefits to wildlife. They have been proven to be very important

nesting areas for 15 to 25 different species of song birds and critical wintering areas for many species of resident and wintering wildlife, particularly pheasants.

We encourage all CRP landowners who are incorporating wildlife habitats into CRP acreage to purchase a wildlife packet(s). A limited number of wildlife packets are available. They include quail and pheasant, turkey, deer, and squirrel. Each packet contains four species and 25 seedlings of each species (100 total seedlings).

Conifers available this year include the Afghanistan Pine Bullet, Arizona Cypress, Austrian Pine, Ponderosa Pine, Rocky Mountain Juniper, Redcedar, and White Pine. Conifers will be sold for \$72.00 for 40 seedlings plus tax. Bullets will be sold for \$36.00 for 30 seedlings plus tax. We will accept a minimum order of 25 seedlings per

species. For information and order placement, contact your local Soil Conservation Service, Floydada Field Office, USDA Building, Highway 70 East, phone number 983-2352.

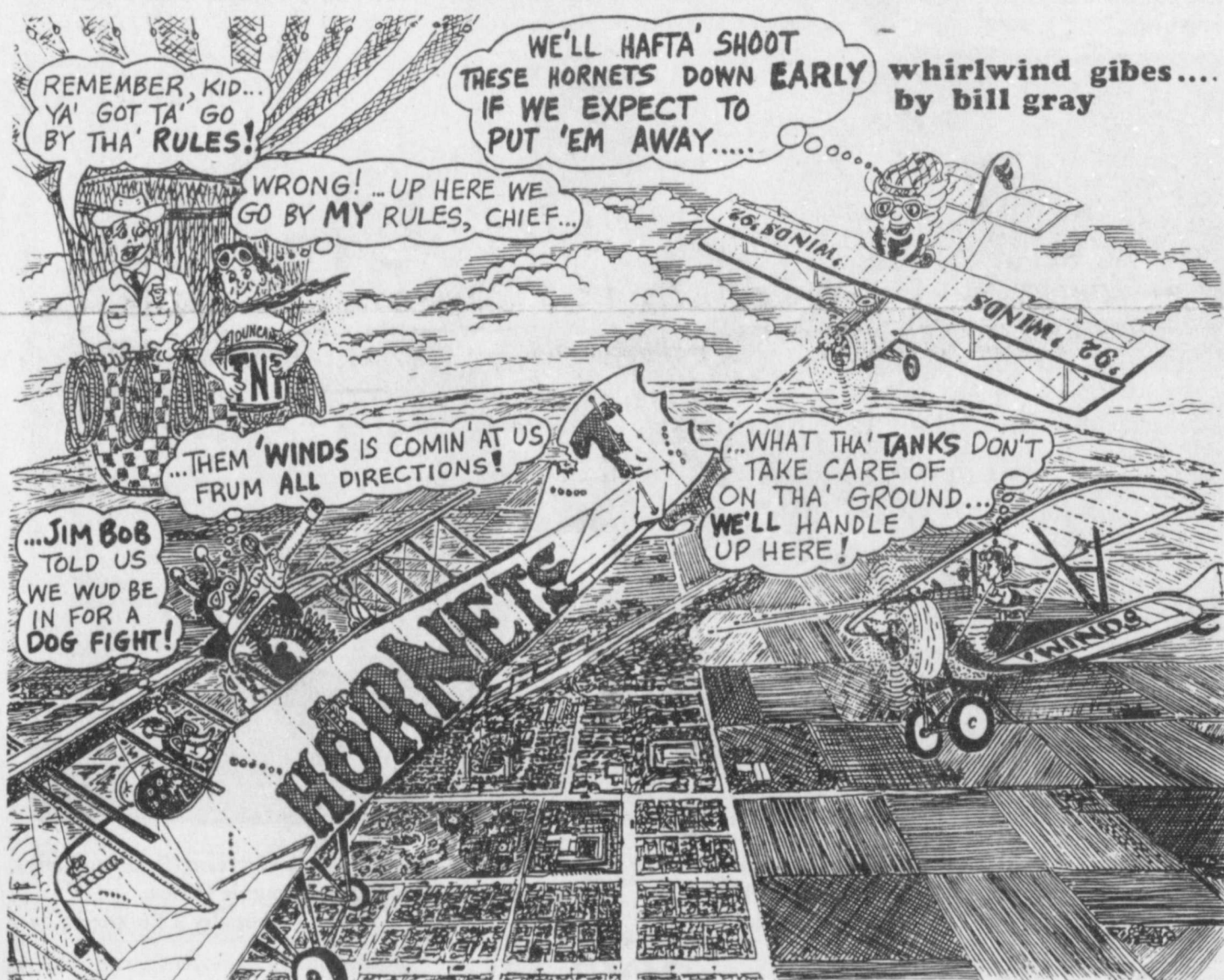

The Floydada Whirlwinds exploded for three third-quarter touchdowns to run away from an inspired band of Friona Chieftains in District 2-3A action at Wester Field on October 8. The margin of the 42-7 Floydada victory was not indicative of Friona's effort - at least in the first 24 minutes of the game.

Senior Jammie Davis had the best night of his Whirlwind career as he carried 14 times for 159 yards and four touchdowns. Teammate Michael Henderson averaged almost 7 yards-per-carry in 13 attempts for 89 yards, which included a 32-yard TD scamper. Henderson's 91-yard pass interception for a mid-third period score propelled the 'Winds from a narrow 14-7 lead over the fired-up visitors.

Floydada's overall record improves to 5-2 and 2-0 in district play. The Chieftains remain winless at 0-7, with little chance to improve their record when they host Littlefield this week. The Whirlwind victory sets up a classic battle for district unbeaten as the 6-1 Tulia Hornets come calling at Wester Field this Friday.

Floydada held the Chieftains to "three and out" in Friona's initial series following the opening kickoff. The 'Winds methodically moved 62 yards in ten plays, aided by a 36-yard pass from QB Sammy Rodriguez to brother, Jesse. It was to be Floydada's only pass completion of the evening. Jammie Davis carried in from 13 yards to put the 'Winds on the board. Micheal Gilliland kicked the conversion and Floydada was up 7-0 with 6:46 remaining in the opening stanza.

Friona was again 3 and out on its next possession, but a Floydada fumble gave the visitors new life at the Whirlwind 45-yard line. Chieftain quarterback Blair Burney passed from punt formation on fourth down, and the Chiefs moved inside of the 'Wind 20-yard line. Floydada's defense stiffened, forcing Friona to give the ball over on downs at the Whirlwind 16-yard line.

Fullback Johnny Eguia blasted into the Friona secondary for a 42-yard gainer to move the 'Winds out of poor field position and helped sustain a Floydada scoring drive late in the first quarter. Davis scored on the counter from 9 yards out on the third play of the second quarter. Gilliland's kick was perfect and the 'Winds forged to a 14-0 lead.

Both squads turned over the ball in the second quarter, but it was a high snap on a Floydada punt attempt which gave the Chieftains the opportunity they were seeking. Four plays after the Whirlwind miscue the Chieftains scored on a 14-yard Burney-to-Brian Herring aerial connection. Burney added the conversion kick and Friona was back in the game. The second quarter ended with the 'Wind lead cut in half.

Floydada fumbled the kickoff to open the second half, but Friona failed to capitalize on the turnover. Burney's second-down pass from the Floydada 42-yard line found Brian Herring open for an apparent touchdown, but a jarring tackle by safety Jammie Davis separated Herring from the ball. Michael Henderson came up with the loose ball, and the 'Winds took over at their own 4-yard line. Davis ran it out 13 yards to give Floydada some breathing room. However, three plays later Friona blocked a Jesse Rodriguez punt, and the Chieftains were back in business at the Whirlwind 24-yard line.

Micheal Gilliland did his part to help restore Floydada's momentum with a 9-yard quarterback sack on first down, but Friona fought back for a first down all the way to Floydada's 11-yard line three plays later on a 23-yard pass from Burney to Jay Belcher. The Chieftains'

scoring threat was terminated in grand fashion two plays later when Scott Crader tipped a Burney pass.

Michael Henderson picked off the deflection at his own 9-yard line and sped untouched to the north end zone for a Floydada touchdown. The scoring run was made possible by Crader's devastating block of the intended Friona receiver, who was the only person between Henderson and six points. It was a 14-point swing as Gilliland again split the uprights, and it was the last time Friona posed any serious threat of an upset.

Davis scored twice, from 9 yards and a nice 55-yard romp, before the quarter's end - to virtually put the game out of reach.

Floydada opened the fourth quarter with an 8-play, 48-yard drive. Michael Henderson scored from 32 yards out, Gilliland added his sixth successful PAT kick, and the 'Winds were on their way to their third 40-plus point output of the season.

Friona made about 55 yards in total offense (against mostly Floydada second and third teamers, in the late stages of the contest, but were unable to get near the Floydada end zone as time expired.

BILL'S NOTES

Make no mistake about it... a young, aggressive Friona bunch came to Wester Field last Friday intent on an upset. The 'Winds helped the visitors' cause by putting the ball on the ground four times. However, when the game was on the line in the third quarter, Floydada responded to the challenge.

The Whirlwinds played well at times - well enough to win big over one of the district's "weak sisters," but must make some MAJOR improvements (particularly in the turnover and pass-coverage departments) before facing playoff-caliber teams such as Tulia and Littlefield these next two weeks.

Jammie Davis easily gets my nod as the offensive player of the game with his four touchdowns and yards-rushing output. His 55-yard scoring blast not only showed us some unknown speed, but gets the vote for the offensive play of the game.

Michael Henderson, known more for his offensive prowess this year, made the defensive play of the game with his 91-yard pass interception for a score when the game was on the line in the third quarter. Friona scores there, and it could have been a totally different outcome.

Jason Pyle and Rafael DeOchoa continued to make big plays to qualify for the "Headhunter" award, but this one belongs to Scott Crader. Following his tipped pass which led to Henderson's interception, Scott really "lit up" the intended receiver (who could have taken Henderson out of the play before much yardage was gained on the turnover). It was a blast in typical headhunter fashion, and it helped turn the game around.

In the last three weeks few Whirlwinds have played with the intensity of Micheal Gilliland. Again he had a good night on his kickoffs, and his extra points were flawless (give some credit here to holds by Sammy and snaps by Scott), but his several quarterback sacks and pressures certainly earned him my choice for defensive player of the game.

The first BIG one is this Friday...the Tulia game could go a long way in determining the district champion and the #1 seed in the playoffs. Strange things have happened in the past in this league, but the winner Friday should be all but conceded a playoff berth. The 'Winds and Hornets are both among the top three offensively and defensively of area 3A teams, and it should be a "barn burner."

The Whirlwinds have some key injuries. Todd Cage will more than likely have to sit this one out. He will be missed, and it will be up to the others to take up the slack! Tulia's coach Dan Pair commented this week that

they are "all healthy." They haven't faced Floydada yet, nor have they played the caliber of teams Floydada has faced at this point in the season.

The Hornets' Corey Sanders is one of the leading 3A scorers in the area, but Jammie Davis AND Michael Henderson are right up there in that category. Tulia's senior quarterback Ryan Prater is the area's 3A passing leader, so the Floydada secondary will be put to the supreme test.

The Hornets are faring much better than their pre-season projections, so I'll take the easy way out on my game prediction. In view of Tulia's unexpected success, I'll update my 31-7 Floydada victory margin (published for all to see on August 27). I still like 31 for the 'Winds, but I see the Hornets scoring 21 in a WILD ONE. It won't be for the faint-hearted, but it will be small-town West Texas football at its best. (For those who keep track of such things, I have missed the last two weeks of wild-scoring Floydada victories by a combined total of TWO points!
