The bad part about the current dry spell is the fact that virtually every day during the past month, at one time or another, the weather has given the appearances that it might, in fact, rain!!

But, alas! Almost every time it has looked so rainy, the next time you look up, the clouds are breaking up, moving away, going up in a vapor, or whatever they do to disappear. It is almost as if they are merely a mirage to everyone wanting and needing a good rain so desperately.

Residents in the city of Friona enjoyed a good shower last Sunday-in fact, two of them. The first one was a regular "mountain shower" which started at about 9 a.m. and lasted for over an hour.

The second rain was late in the day, and was more typical of the rains we usually get, complete with a little wind. Sadly, however, the outlying area did not receive even the .45 inch of moisture which the two showers deposited on the city.

One farmer told us this week that it hadn't rained on his place since the middle of June. And, even at the time of that shower, the area wasn't exactly "plush" with moisture.

The only consolation our farmers might have is that they are not alone in their plight. Numerous areas in the country have had just as dry, or even worse, a growing season than the immediate area has had this summer. Farmers and ranchers in Southwest Texas have had a drought which is threatening their very existence.

"It always rains," someone has said, "at the end of every dry spell."

We don't know about everyone else, but yours truly is just about ready to imitate Calvin Armstrong in his fist-shaking act. If we knew what to do to end the dry spell, we'd already have done it, that's for sure.

Health Fair Is Slated August 20

The Parmer County Child Welfare Board is sponsoring a free Health Fair at the Friona Community Center on August 20 from 1-5 p.m.

Booths are being provided for free blood pressure checks, diabetes, hearing tests, vision checks and glaucoma.

Bank Adds 24-Hour Tellers

Friona State Bank is announcing this week the addition of its 24-hour teller system, which it plans to implement by September 1, 1983.

The new system uses a plastic card similar to the credit card, called an "E.S.P. Cash Card."

When implemented, those with accounts at Friona State Bank will be able to make a number of transactions anytime they choose-before or after banking hours or on weekends.

The 24-hour teller will allow the bank customer to make deposits; withdraw cash; make loan payments; make local utility payments; transfer funds between accounts; verify their account balance; and other operations.

The bank is in the process of taking applications for the "E.S.P. Cash Card," and will be demonstrating the 24-hour teller in the bank lobby during the next couple of weeks.

"We are proud to bring this convenient, new service to our customers. If you stop to think how many times you thought about needing to run to the bank, only to realize it was after banking hours, I think you will realize how handy this service can be," said Robert Neelley, president of Friona State Bank.

Those with accounts who wish to withdraw cash after banking hours will be able to get cash in multiples of \$5, just by using their cash card.

If the card is lost, it will be virtually impossible for anyone else to use the card, since each owner will be given a secret number that it must use at the teller booth, to activate the card.


Returning members and incoming freshmen are encouraged to make an effort to attend these important rehearals.

Maudie Clark's Services Held In Hereford



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

On The Farm In Parmer Co.

Some changes in the Texas brucellosis program which will allow for more freedom of movement of cattle, along with changes in procedure for establishing a certified free herd, have been approved by Commissioners of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

The changes were approved at a recent Commission meeting in Austin, says Seth Ralston, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Three changes relate to movement of cattle and include:

1. In a consignment in which there is a vaccinated animal that is a suspect on the brucellosis test will now proceed in this manner: In such a situation, negative cattle in a consignment in which there is a vaccinated card test positive but rivanol or complement fixation negative suspect, may move.

2. In a non-infected herd of cattle which has been adult vaccinated, those animals that are card test negative at the time of movement may move without restriction.

3. A change was made relating to testing requirements from a C state or area within the Texas C area. This change would allow movement of nonvaccinated cattle if they are tested negative within 30 days prior to movement and either be from a herd in which all test eligible cattle have been together for at least 120 days and have been subjected to one negative test as a herd within the previous 365 days, or be from a nonquarantined herd and have been subjected to a negative test not less than 60 or more than 365 days before the test for movement.

Changes in procedures for establishing a certified free herd concern both dairy and beef cattle operators, Ralston said.

For dairy herds, the commissioners made the change to require a minimum of four consecutive, negative milk ring tests conducted at not less than 90-day intervals. Previously, three negative tests were required.

Regulations also were changed to make it easier to establish a certified free herd of cattle originating from a certified herd as follows: all or part of a certified free herd purchased and moved directly to premises without other cattle may qualify without a test.

A proposed change yet to

be approved by commissioners relates to movement of cattle to slaughter from a quarantined herd without testing of that herd, when the cattle are to be sold exclusively for slaughter. This regulation, however, must conform to federal rules--and at present federal rules require that all cattle from a quarantined herd be tested.

Drip irrigation involved a system of plastic pipes with tiny openings called "emitters" which deliver water, drop by drop, into the soil at the base of plants along the row. The water soaks in immediately when the rate of irrigation is adjusted correctly. No water is wasted because there is neither flooding nor run-off.

Home garden drip systems operate at low pressure--4 to 10 pounds per square inch of tubing. Most gardeners quickly learn how often and how long to operate their drip systems to satisfy their plants' water needs.

Even when a drip system is on, the middles between rows are dry enough to walk on, permitting harvesting and other garden work during irrigation. On the other hand, sprinkler and furrowirrigated gardens are too wet to walk in for a day or two after each irrigation.

Drip-irrigated plants are more productive and water is not sprayed over the leaves as with sprinkler irrigation, thus reducing disease problems. Soil is not waterlogged as with furrow irrigation, so more oxygen is available to plant roots at all times. The entire soil surface can be mulched without interfering with irrigation; this stops moisture loss by evaporation.

At the current rates for city water, savings in water costs alone can pay for a drip system in less than two growing seasons. A 1,000 square foot garden, irrigated twice weekly for a month in mid-summer, requires about 10,000 gallons of water via furrow irrigation. This same garden, drip irrigated, will use less than half that amount. Thus, over a full season of gardening, water savings can be substantial.

Drip irrigation system costs vary widely but are reasonable for the home gardener. A system can last for four to ten years, depending on its care.

Widner also retired from the Imperial Valley district, where he was principal of the school and taught science. He has 28 years of teaching experience.


The Widners will begin their assignment in Samoya September 1.

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


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
