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1992: From the beginning to the final chapter

1992 was a year like most other years, containing tragedies and triumphs, new beginnings and final chapters.

The year began with an 1991 cotton bale final count of 147,717 bales, and then cotton news turned sour when a hard spring devastated the 1992 cotton

The month of April saw bad weather with rain and lots of hail. In May continuous rains and more hail destroyed most of the cotton crop. Of the 181,000 acres originally planted in cotton the ASCS office estimates that 95,000 -160,000 acres were lost.

Several gins did not open in 1992 and though much of the cotton was lost, the farmers who stayed with the crop were pleasantly surprised at the outcome.

In January, Caprock Hospital released the good news that the hospital was debt free for the first time in 27 years.

A new doctor, Dr. Hoang and his wife Lisa, arrived in town and set up practice at Cogdell Clinic in August. Caprock Hospital Administrator Terry Keltz also resigned in August and the Board of Directors of Caprock Hospital voted in November to terminate the hospital's affiliation with Methodist Hospital. The board announced they were seeking a new agreement with St. Mary's Hospital.

Although news at Caprock Hospital seemed dismal, Lockney General Hospital announcd their plans to add on to their current building. The new building would house a new hospital wing and the clinic would stay in the area where it is currently located. The groundbreaking ceremony for the new hospital was held in March.

Although the new construction was good news for Lockney General, the hosptial staff and the Lockney community was dealt a severe blow with the death of Dr. Bill Mangold. A mainstay of Lockney General, Dr. Mangold had served as a physician in Lockney for over 40 years, and as the only physician for a period of seven years.

Other tragic deaths in Floyd County included the death of 5 year old Matthew Ruddell, of Floydada. Matthew was killed in a car accident Dec. 5. Rebecca Cavazos, of Lockney, was also killed in a vehicle related accident on Nov. 30.

All the community festivities were a big success throughout the year. Floydada's Punkin Days brought an even bigger crowd than previous years and garnered more media attention throughout the United States.

The Floyd County Fair was held in September and large crowds enjoyed the cooler weather and a very organized

Both towns hosted successful Homecomings in October and Lockney held its first, but highly successful Holiday

Affair in December.

Chief Deputy Charlie Overstreet was elected as the Democratic candidate for Floyd County Sheriff in a run-off election between Overstreet and Ellis Butler in April. As there was no Republican opponent, Overstreet was elected Sheriff of Floyd County in the November general election. He will replace Sheriff Fred Cardinal who is retiring as Sheriff after more than 16 years as Floyd County Sheriff.

Railroad news was bad in the area during 1992. Burlington Northern Railroad officially abandoned the line from Estelline to Lubbock and Sterley to Plainview, in May.

In September it was announced that the 23 mile railroad line between Floydada and Plainview would be aban-

A lawsuit was filed against the City of Lockney and Lockey ISD in the month of September, by Joe S. Perez. The suit requests single member voting district for the school and city, instead of the current at-large voting districts.

A possible paving project, proposed in April, in the northeast corner of Floyd County connecting an extension off Hwy 207 with FM 1065 fell through in December when county commissioners could not agree on who would pay for the right of way.

Incumbent Commissioner George Taylor faced Langston Williams in a bid for Precinct #3 Commissioner in the democratic primary.

Court approves bonds for elected officials Hart (Precincts 1 & 4) and Ray Macha

The Floyd County Commissioners Court met in special session to wrap up end of the year business including bond approval, farm contracts and the purchase of diesel. Also on the agenda was an amendment to the contract with the Floyd County Child Welfare Board.

The routine matter of approving bonds for elected and appointed county officials took a slight twist when a taxpayer came before the court to protest the bonding of one of the officials elected in the November General Elec-

C. L. Henderson told the court that he objected to the county putting Hart on the county payroll and to the county paying for a bond on David Hart. Hart ran unopposed for the post of Constable for Precincts 1 & 4 as a write-in candidate in the fall election. He won the office by receiving 28 votes in the final

According to County Judge Bill Hardin, the commissioners have no option but to approve the bond since Hart was

Floyd County Ag Agent Mike Mallett submits resignation

Mike Mallett, Floyd County Agent, submitted a letter of resignation to Floyd County Judge Bill Hardin on Tuesday, December 29. The resignation becomes effective January 10, 1993. Mallett, who came to Floyd County from Pecos in April, 1991, revealed that he will be accepting a position in Lampasas County which will allow him to be

closer to his family said Judge Hardin.

The vacancy in Floyd County will be announced through the Texas Ag Extension Service out of College Station. Qualified applicants will be processed by that agency before a replacement agent is recommended to Floyd County

a duly elected official and a reputable bonding company had agreed to provide a bond on him. Hardin also pointed out that Hart, as a constable, would receive an annual salary of \$1.00.

Henderson pointed out that he was aware that the bonding company the county usually deals with had refused to bond Hart and another company was used for the bond. He also protested the fact that the bond fee was approved for payment during the December 14 session of the court and had already been paid prior to the approval of the bonds on the Monday, December 28, agenda.

Motion to approve the payment of bonds was made by Precinct 4 Commissioner Howard Bishop and seconded by Precinct 2 Commissioner Floyd Jackson. The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion.

Bonds were for incoming Sheriff Charles Overstreet, reelected Tax Assessor/Collector Penny Golightly, Precinct 1 Commissioner Connie Bearden, Precinct 3 Commissioner George Taylor, Justice of the Peace Tim Burge (Precincts 1 & 4), Constables David (Precincts 2 & 3), and Marilyn Holcomb, Deputy to the County Clerk.

CWB CONTRACT AMENDED The annual contract between the

Floyd County Child Welfare Board and the county which provides for the care of foster children in Floyd County was amended by the court to reword the passages dealing with discrimination and confidentiality. The request for amending the document came from the parent organization, the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services. According to Hardin, the amendment was necessary to comply with both federal and state legislation concerning the two areas of the contract.

Motion to authorize Judge Hardin to sign the amendment was made by Precinct 1 Commissioner Connie Bearden and seconded by Jackson. The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion.

FARM CONTRACTS

Farm work contracts were approved for three requests. Precinct 2 had two if

the contracts; Glenn Farms by J. D. Terrell to fill in a tail water pit to put into cultivation at a location 1/2 mile west and 1/2/ mile north of Lone Star school; and Wayne Ashburn to clean up old improvements at a location 4 miles south and 2 miles west of Lockney. ....The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is working on an investigation of the risks of taking showers. According to EPA Watch, a publication which monitors EPA's activities, the EPA's Science Advisory Board (SAB) has formed an Indoor Air Quality and Total Human Exposure Committee (IAQTHEC) to prepare a draft report containing guidance on showering with tap water which could be contaminated with volatile organic compounds (VOCs).

(In true bureaucratese, the study could, we suppose, be called the EPA's SAB's IAQTHEC VOC study.)

According to EPA Watch, the draft report is entitled, "Project Summary: company. What can you do? Guidance to Estimating Exposure to VOCs During Showering." The report notes that "although the agency (EPA) tive-level openings right now.

has well-established methods for assessing exposures from ingesting tap water, the agency does not have wellestablished methods for estimating exposure from inhalation of contaminants volatilized during other household uses (e.g. showering, laundering, washing dishes, and toilet flushing)."

The SAB, in commenting on the draft report, pointed out that "there are many factors that affect the total dose of VOC received from showering, including water temperature, droplet size, room size, shower duration, and the number of showers per day. The latter could be more important considerations for teenagers and other segments of the population.".....

The letter went on to say, "All Americans anxiously await the final report. It is not yet known if the EPA will assess the risks of not showering."

Gary Brown said he would volunteer to be the tester for the EPA checking people when they step out of the shower to see if they have been contaminated!

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

Texans have turned on their heaters to stay warm this winter. The Texas Commission on Fire Protection warns everyone to be cautious using heating

"Last year, 21 Texans died in fires caused by using heaters improperly," said Executive Director Michael E. Hines. "One fire in March killed four people in South Texas, which shows that the temperatures don't have to be below freezing for heating equipment to become dangerous."

Fire departments reported a total of almost 1,200 heating fires, with 93 related injuries and \$9 million in property loss during the year, according to the Texas Fire Incident Reporting System operated by the commission to gather fire statistics.

Deaths related to heating-equipment fires were reported in 15 counties. The fires ranged from Hutchinson County in the Panhandle to Atascosa County in South Texas. The dates spanned from September through March.

"1991 saw a full range of heatingrelated fires," Hines added. "As we've seen in recent years, portable heaters were involved in the largest number of heating fires overall, as well as the largest number of heating fires in which someone died. Otherwise, heating fires were more evenly distributed by fire cause and location than in recent years."

He explained that heating fires start in living rooms, bedrooms, heating equipment rooms, chimneys, bathrooms and concealed structural areas such as wall victim of a heating-equipment fire:

(1) Have a heater safety check. Be sure the heating equipment is safe. Have the chimney cleaned; have a qualified technician inspect central and portable equipment. Read the directions again when using the heater.

> and ceiling assemblies. The most common causes are combustible materials too close to the heating equipment; shorts, ground faults or other electrical malfunctions; fuel leaks; and improper maintenance or operation of heating equipment.

> State Fire Marshal Ernest A. Emerson said the Commission on Fire Protection recommends three steps to avoid being a

> (2) Set a heater safety zone. Keep a portable heater three feet from anything that burns. Keep anything that burns three feet away from fireplaces, wall heaters and other stationary heaters. Be especially careful near chairs, beds and walls.

> "It's easy to check the three-foot safety zone," Emerson said. "With the heater off, stand next to the heater and be sure that everything is at least an arm's length away."

(3) Be heater safety smart. Test all smoke alarms, and go over emergency exit plans. "Don't be afraid to ask for help if your heating equipment is not safe or if you don't have a smoke detector," Emerson added.

"Smoke alarms can save lives, particularly since the largest number of fatal heating fires occur at night," he said. "None of the homes where the 21 people died in heating fires last year were reported to have operational smoke detectors. Perhaps some could have survived if their homes had had working smoke alarms.'

The Texas Commission on Fire Protection is a state agency involved in numerous aspects of fire protection. Its duties include conducting fire investigations and fire safety inspections, administering standards for fire service certification, licensing several firesafety industries, conducting fire safety information programs, and administering an emergency funding program for fire departments. Through the Texas Fire Incident Reporting System, the commission collected fire information during 1991 from 350 Texas fire departments, representing about 75 percent of the state's population.






