Cody Hayes, Corbin Kellison and Heath Stoerner carried home grand champion honors from the 1993 Lockney Livestock Show. The animals were judged at the livestock barn located at the Floyd County Fairgrounds on Saturday, January 9th. The show was sponsored by the Lockney Chamber of Commerce.

Hayes claimed the grand championship in the Steer Division with his 1126 lb., Medium Weight Crossbreed, steer. Kellison garnered the purple rosette in the Sheep Division with his 107 lb. Middle Weight Suffolk and Heath Stoerner carried off the grand championship in the Swine Division with his 229 lb Heavy Weight Cross.

Reserve Champion honors were garnered by Corbin Kellison with his Medium Weight Crossbred steer; Corbin Kellison with his Hampshire lamb; and Eric Bartlett with his Duroc swine.

Senior Showmanship winners were Cody Hayes - Steers; Rhanda Hickerson - Sheep; Cody Hayes - Swine.

Junior Showmanship winners were Carson Johnson - Steers; Ryon Smith - Sheep; Lacey Aston - Swine.

The Lockney Chamber of Commerce furnished the prize money, ribbons, rosettes and judges fee for the event. Ronnie and Treena Aston donated \$100 to the Grand Champion exhibitor in the Steer Division. Louie and Cynthia Bybee and Martin and Robin Stoerner added \$100 to the Grand Champion Exhibitor in the Sheep Division. Dickie and Peggy Lambert donated \$100 to the Grand Champion exhibitor in the Swine Division. Warren Mathis gave each exhibitor five dollars for exhibiting.

Banks deposits increase

Floyd County banks joined other South Plains banks in boasting an increase in deposits at the end of 1992.

The First National Bank of Floydada showed an increase of 4.37% over last years deposit. December 31, 1992 deposits for FNB were \$60,499,682.00, an increase of \$2,538,407.00.

At Lockney's First National the year end deposit totals were \$34,240,860.00 which is a 7.06% increase over last years \$31,982,839.00.

The presidents of both Floyd County

banks attributed the increase to ag related deposits and a surprisingly good second crop.

"It looked like it would be a terrible year this summer," said Tom Farris, president of the First National Bank in Floydada. "However, the farmers had an exceptionally good milo crop, and government payments were good."

"The government paid out loans through crop insurance, disaster insurance and deficiency payments."

When asked how the area retailers fared during 1992, Farris said, "Agriculture related businesses that did not re-

ceive government assistance, such as agins and chemical companies were hurt. However, when the farmer does well in a community supported by agriculture it always helps retail businesses."

Ronnie Hardin, president of Lockney's First National Bank echoed Farris' observations.

"Ag related loans turned out better than we thought," said Hardin. "The second crop was good and we had more than normal loan paydown and an increase in deposits. What's good for the farmer is good for us."

Highway resolution approved

Floyd County Commissioners Court approved a resolution in support of a proposed farm-to-market highway in northeastern Floyd County at the January 11 regular monthly session of the county official. Passage of the resolution will allow the officials to present the proposed project for consideration by state officials later this month.

Motion to approve the resolution was made by Precinct 3 Commissioner George Taylor. County Judge Bill Hardin provided the second and the vote was unanimous in favor. The only question asked by the other commissioners came from Precinct 4 Commissioner Howard Bishop who asked, "If we pass this resolution, does it mean that we are committing any funds to purchase the right-of-way at this time?"

Judge Hardin told Bishop that there is no commitments for funds at this time, either by the state or by the county. That will come later if the project is approved

by the state and plans for construction are completed.

The resolution expresses the court's support of a proposed highway between State Highway 207 from a point approximately two miles north of the South Plains Community east approximately 16.7 miles to FM 1065 just south of the Briscoe-Floyd County line. The document also states that the county will provide the right-of-way for the paving project at no cost to the state should the project become a reality.

Commissioners will have the opportunity to present the proposed project to the Texas Highway Commission in Austin on January 26. The commission will then decide if the project will be studied and plans developed for completion.

POSITIONS APPROVED

Due to the newly elected sheriff taking office, the deputation of Floyd County Sheriff's Department personnel

was before the court for approval. Commissioners approved the continuing employment of deputies Kyle Adams, Greg Pierce and John Meador under new Sheriff Charles Overstreet. Motion for this was made by Jackson and seconded by Bishop. All voted in favor.

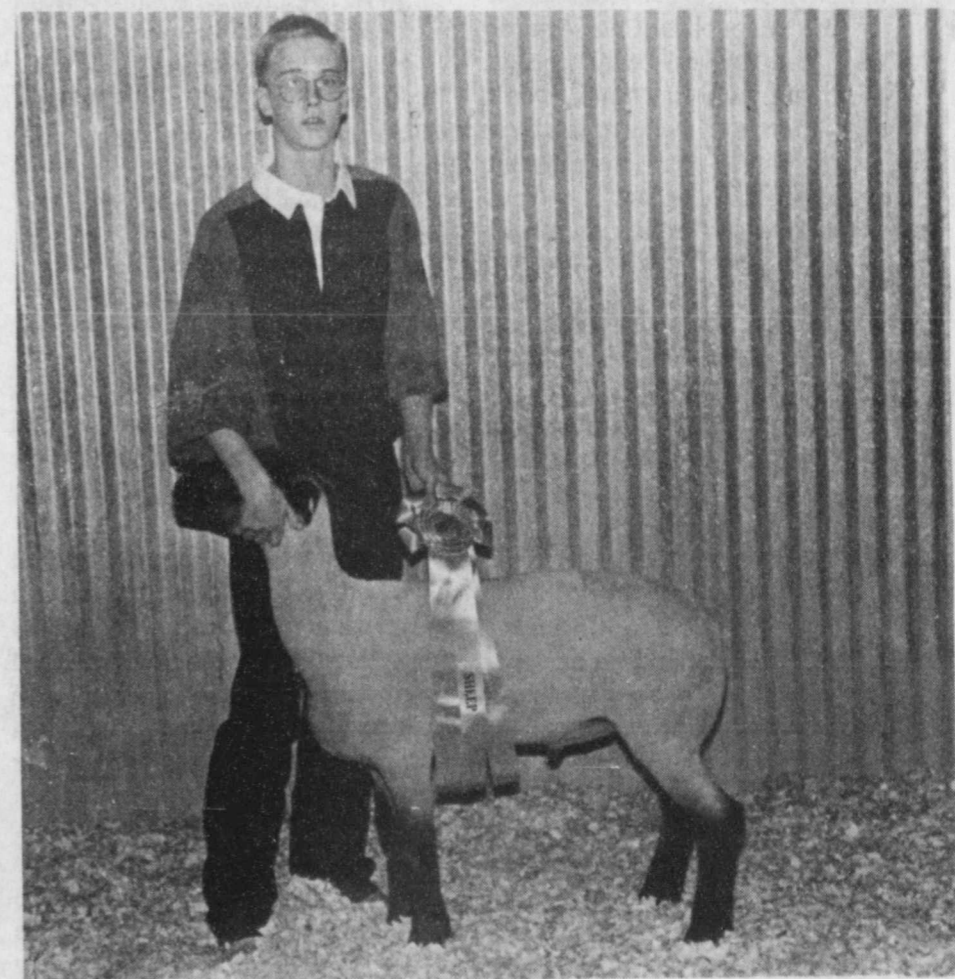
Ralph Jackson was appointed as the Veterans Service Officer for Floyd County. He will be working on a volunteer basis to assist local veterans with their veterans paperwork and problems. The county will provide him with a place to work and pay for operating expenses and training. Motion for the appointment was made by Taylor, seconded by Bearden and approved unanimously.

Judge Hardin told the commissioners that the only available space for Jackson to work in at the courthouse at this time is downstairs in the basement. The commissioners authorize Hardin to work with Jackson in implementing space and equipment for his duties in the appointed office. Hardin also told the court that Jackson will need to attend a training school in Austin January 19-21. The county has been without a Veterans Service Officer since county secretary Margaret Herrera was deemed ineligible to serve as the position must be filled by a veteran according to Hardin.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Treasurer Glenna Orman presented both monthly and quarterly reports to the court. Her reports show that the county had \$230,691.41 in funds at the beginning of October and received \$835,883.85 during the last quarter of 1992. Transfers between county accounts during the three month period amounted to \$497,448.41 and disburse-

School Board hears TAAS results

FLOYDADA — Board members for the Floydada Independent School District heard the results of the latest round of Texas Assessment of Academic Skills testing (TAAS) at the regular session for the month of January. The Monday evening session was the site for presentations by secondary school counselor Sheree Cannon and elementary school counselor Kathy Jahay, detailing the local students progress on the twice a year examinations.

Jahay reported that all the scores had improved over the previous year and that the system was very pleased with the improvement in the third graders tested. Cannon also reported good things from the students tested in seventh grade, eleventh grade and twelfth graders retaking the exams. A detailed report from the counselors can be found elsewhere in this issue.

School superintendent Jerry Cannon reported that Fisd had several calls from other area school wanting to know

how the turn around was achieved in one year. According to Cannon and junior high principal Bruce Bramlet, Floydada was out scored in only one area and by only one school in this part of the state.

SUPERINTENDENT'S CONTRACT EXTENDED

Beginning the annual process of evaluating and retaining personnel for the coming school terms, the board conducted an executive session for the purpose of evaluating Jerry Cannon, the school superintendent. Entering the closed meeting at 8:45 p.m., the board came out of executive session just after 11:00 p.m. John Campbell made a motion to extend the superintendent's contract for one year, making it effective through the 1995-1996 school year.

In light of the fact that no salary increase was made for the superintendent last year, the motion also called for a salary increase of \$5,750.00 per year on the contract. Don Hardy seconded

the motion made by Campbell. Board approval was by unanimous vote.

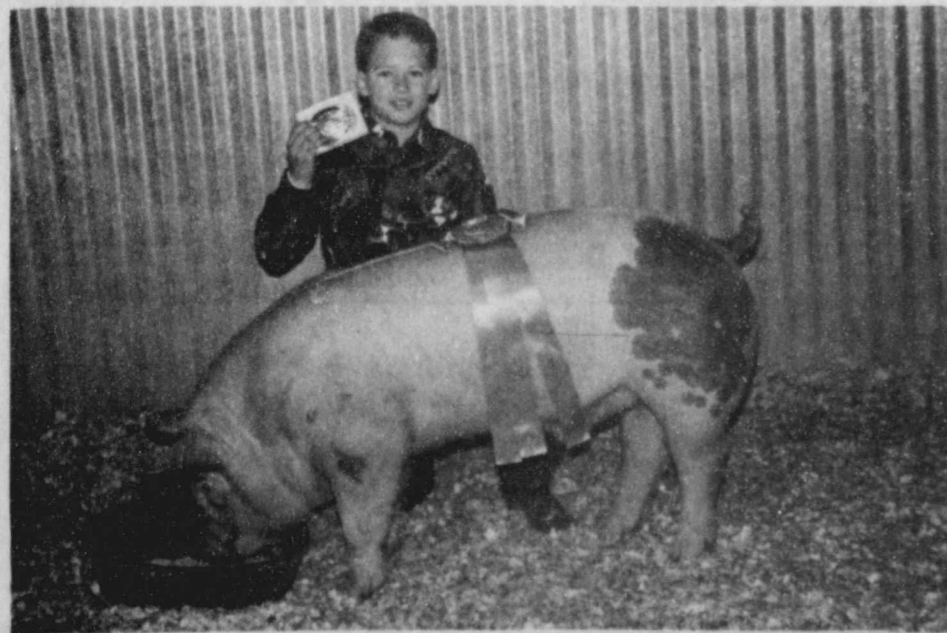

Hill named Fireman of the Year

James Hill was named Fireman of the Year at an awards ceremony held recently by the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department.

Hill has been a member of the fire department for thirty three years. He became a volunteer in 1959 and has an ECA (Emergency Care Attendant) rating.

He is the secretary for the organization and is in charge of posting the books and sending reports to the state organization. Hill stated, "I have been secretary for so long that I don't remember how many years it has been."

Hill posts each fire and ambulance run from the bulletin board onto the official books and these records are periodically sent to the state. He also makes reports on the types of drills that the fireman practice at each meeting.

"We watch training films to show new concepts and the dangers in fighting fires. We have had two EMT (Emergency Medical Technician) schools.

The twenty three members of the volunteer fire department have attended fire schools in Canyon and in Lubbock and several have attended the Agro-Rescue school at Floydada," stated Hill.

"The equipment is so much better now. When I first started we had an old fire truck with no cab. It was bad in the winter time. I remember one winter we had a fire at the gin on the corner where you turn to go to Cedar Hill. There were several men who answered the call and we took turns driving the truck. It was so cold that no one could drive it too far. After that we got together and put a cab on the truck and then later when we could we put on doors."

He continued, "Before we got the new fire station we kept the truck at the old barracks and occasionally the pumper would freeze and we would have to set a heater on it to thaw it out. Now we have a GMC for the country and a Ford for the city. The Ford is a 1000 gallon per minute pumper."

"When Lockney decides to get behind something they go to work at it. That is how we got the new ambulance and now we have a rescue truck. Next we would like to have an aluminum tanker to haul water in. We have a fund started for it. Several individuals and companies have made donations. The Lockney Co-op and Arvie Newton both have said that we could use one of their trucks to pull it with."

Hill is a native Lockney. He has lived in Lockney all of his life except for eight years in Ellis County.

He drove a maintainer for Floyd County from 1951 until 1984 when he retired from full time duty. He still works part time and fills in when needed.

Hill is a member of the Lockney Senior Citizen Center. "The Senior Citizen Center is one of the greatest things that has happened to Lockney. I'm glad we have it," he stated.

ments were \$765,940.42 for the time covered by the report. The report states that county funds as of December 31, 1992 stood at \$300,634.84.

Orman also reported certificates of deposit in the amount of \$300,000.00 which have earned \$2,195.51 in interest. Installment indebtedness in the amount of \$1,831.37 exists at this time according to her calculations.

FARM WORK CONTRACTS

Four farm work contracts were approved by the court. Two contracts were for locations in Precinct 2: Sterley Gin by Harold Ford, at a location 1/2 mile south to drain a ditch; Long & Klausung by Joe Cunyus, at a location 2 miles south and 1 west of Providence, water (stock tank). One request was from Precinct 3: Edna Gilly, at a location 3 miles west of Cedar Hill Elevator for conservation, cleaning old improvements. The last was from Precinct 4; Billy Wason, no site given, fill washes and drag ranch roads for conservation.

OTHER MATTERS

The court examined all accounts and approved payment of properly presented bills for the month. Budget amendments for transfers between stated budget accounts were also approved during the Monday morning session. \$40,000.00 was authorized for transfer from the Road and Bridge fund

to the individual precincts in the amount of \$10,000.00 per precinct. The court also examined financial reports from the elected county officials who collect fees and fines.

Jury fees for the coming year were left unchanged at \$12.00 per day. Motion for this came from Precinct 2 Commissioner Floyd Jackson and was seconded by Precinct 1 Commissioner Connie Bearden. The vote was unanimously in favor of retaining the same payment for jurors and prospective jurors when called to serve.

The commissioners each drew names from the people who have served on the grand jury during the preceding twelve months for prospective members on the grievance committee. The four drawn will be asked if they would be willing to serve before the names are announced. This should be done at the next month's court session.

The county will advertise for bids for a county depository on a motion by Bearden, seconded by Taylor and approved unanimously. Bids will be taken from banking institutions interested in serving as the repository for county funds during the next two years. This is a bi-annual process.

Bids will also be taken for the sale of two used vehicles from the Sheriff's Department. Bishop made the motion to sell the two by sealed bid and it was seconded by Bearden. The vote approving the proposed sale was unanimous.

Attending the session were Judge Bill Hardin, Commissioners Connie Bearden, Floyd Jackson, George Taylor and Howard Bishop. Also present were Glenna Orman, Virginia Taylor, Joe Taylor, Charles Overstreet, Fred Marble, Don Bean, Dwight Teeple, Kyle Adams, Eugene Beedy and the Hesperian-Beacon reporter.

Jessie Garza to receive scouting honors at banquet

Jessie Garza recently received notification that he has been elected to the 1993 Class of the Haynes District Scout Hall of Fame.

The HDSHF was established in 1992 to honor outstanding former Scout leaders. To be eligible a person must have served in a leadership position with a unit for a minimum of 5 years and be retired from leadership for at least 10 years. Garza was one of ten selected for recognition this year.

Garza served as Scoutmaster of Troop 206, in Lockney, from 1965-66, 1969-1979 and again in 1982. He was the Institutional Representative for Troop 206 in 1967, and Troop 206 Committee Member from 1980-1981. He was also the Institutional Representative for Troop 299 from 1983-1985.

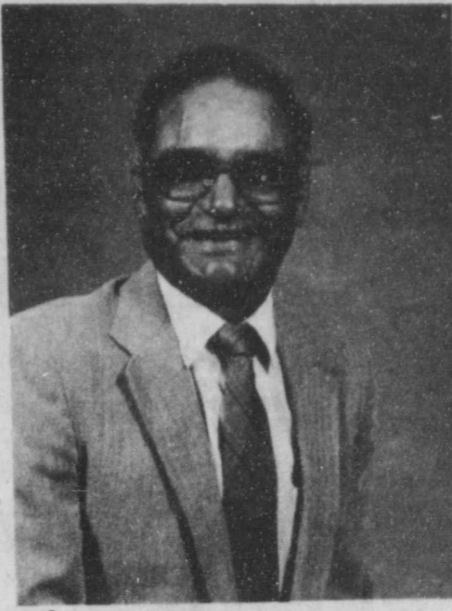
In 1973 Garza received the national

San George Award from the Roman Catholic Church which recognized his work in scouting and the church. "Only two people received this award that year," said Garza.

Also in 1973 the Lockney Chamber of Commerce named Garza the Man of the Year.

As a Hall of Fame Inductee, Garza and his wife received complimentary tickets to the annual Haynes District Recognition Banquet to be held at Wayland Baptist University McClung Center, Friday, January 22. A reception honoring the Hall of Fame Honorees, where Garza will be presented with a plaque, will be held at 6:30 p.m. This will be followed by the banquet.

Council reviews monthly business

LOCKNEY — Proposed fencing around the roll off boxes was on the agenda for the Lockney City Council January 7 regular meeting, but was not discussed as no cost estimates have been received at this time.

Problems with one of the city pickups was addressed at the Thursday morning session. Poole's Automotive has looked the vehicle over and reported that the problem is in the transmission. He also recommended that the air conditioner/heating fan and compressor as well as the muffler also be replaced at this time. Poole estimated a cost of \$850.00 for the transmission replacement.

A motion was made by council member Sam Fortenberry that the repairs be undertaken with the cost to be approved at the discretion of Alderman Gary Marr after the total cost of the work is determined. Alderman Terry Jones seconded and the council approved the motion unanimously.

Minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved. Alderman Bill Anderson made the motion to pay the monthly bills with alderman Jones providing the second and the council approving the motion on a unanimous vote. Council members also reviewed the financial statements for the month of December, commenting on the excellent financial position of the city at the

end of the calendar year.

No one had a specific item to report on departmental business, but Mayor Kenneth Wofford told the council that police chief Lennie Gilroy had approached him with the information that the stray dog problem was getting out of hand. Wofford informed the council that the police department intended to take a more strict attitude toward all dogs running loose around town in the enforcement of existing ordinances and distribution of tickets to owners whenever possible.

Council member Anderson asked that the city look into the situation concerning the cross walk adjacent to the hospital and the hospital annex on Main Street. He reported that there seems to be little regard for pedestrians in the crosswalk and that drivers are not yielding to those using the crosswalk. No one on the council was certain if the area had been designated a crosswalk or if it was just painted there for convenience.

Attorney Paul Lyle urged the council to place the item on the agenda for the next session and check into the status of the crosswalk before taking any action. Mayor Wofford suggested having police chief Gilroy assess the situation and make a recommendation for whatever action he deemed necessary to make the crosswalk a safe passage area for pedestrians between the two hospital facilities.

Wofford also brought up the fact that he had been approached by one of the farmers involved in trying to get the railroad to sell the right of way for the rail line being abandoned back to the adjacent land owners instead of to Rails & Trails for a walk/bike path. The mayor said that he was asked if the city would be willing to contribute \$50.00 to assist in covering the expenses the group is incurring in the attempt to persuade the railroad to sell them the land.

Lyle told the council that they could not donate to such a project unless the council first voted to support the group and their endeavor. Then a donation to support the cause could be made. He suggested that the item be placed on an agenda for a later meeting and discussed at that time.

The council next went into an executive session to receive an update on the pending litigation concerning the voting districts. No action was taken following the session.

Attending the first meeting for 1993 were Mayor Kenneth Wofford, councilmen Sam Fortenberry, J. D. Copeland, Gary Marr, Terry Jones and Bill Anderson, city secretary Charlotte Hooten, city attorney Paul Lyle and the Hesperian-Beacon reporter.

TAX REPORT

Administrative assistant Jimmie Collins presented the tax report, detailing tax collections for the previous month. According to his figures, the Floyd County Education District has collected 78.32 percent of the tax roll resulting in \$775,670.56 for FISD. FISD taxes collected at this time total \$214,151.80 and are 76.83 percent complete. This means that \$989,822.36 in local tax revenues has been received by the district at this time. The collection rate for property taxes in 1992 at this time was 76.61 percent complete stated Collins.

OTHER MATTERS

Minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved as read. Motion to pay the monthly bills was made by Steve Lloyd and seconded by Don Hardy. Annual consideration to the purchase of a new bus was also on the agenda. The board authorized Collins to request a new bus for the 1993-94 school year through the state bidding process.

The bus will be utilized to keep the district's fleet updated and will be a 53 passenger vehicle. Motion for the proposed purchase was made by Hardy and seconded by Villarreal. Board vote was unanimously in favor.

Auditors for the coming financial audit on the 1992-93 records were approved at the meeting. The board opted to remain with the firm of Bowers and Company for another year. The board expressed the opinion that it would be more beneficial to continue with an accounting firm which is already familiar with the district and the regulations dictating financial procedures during the year. Board president Charlene Brown made the motion to that effect and was seconded by Hardy. Other board members agreed with a unanimous vote.

Cannon informed the board that he had received a telephone call indicating that the recent TEA accreditation visit had resulted in a good report for the district. He told the board that as soon as the written results were available, he would see that each received the information.

In addition to the families, friends and teachers of the outstanding student honorees, those attending the meeting were superintendent Jerry Cannon, administrative assistant Jimmie Collins, board members Charlene Brown, Don Hardy, John Campbell, Trena Simpson and Billy Joe Villarreal. Board member Michael Hinsley was not present.

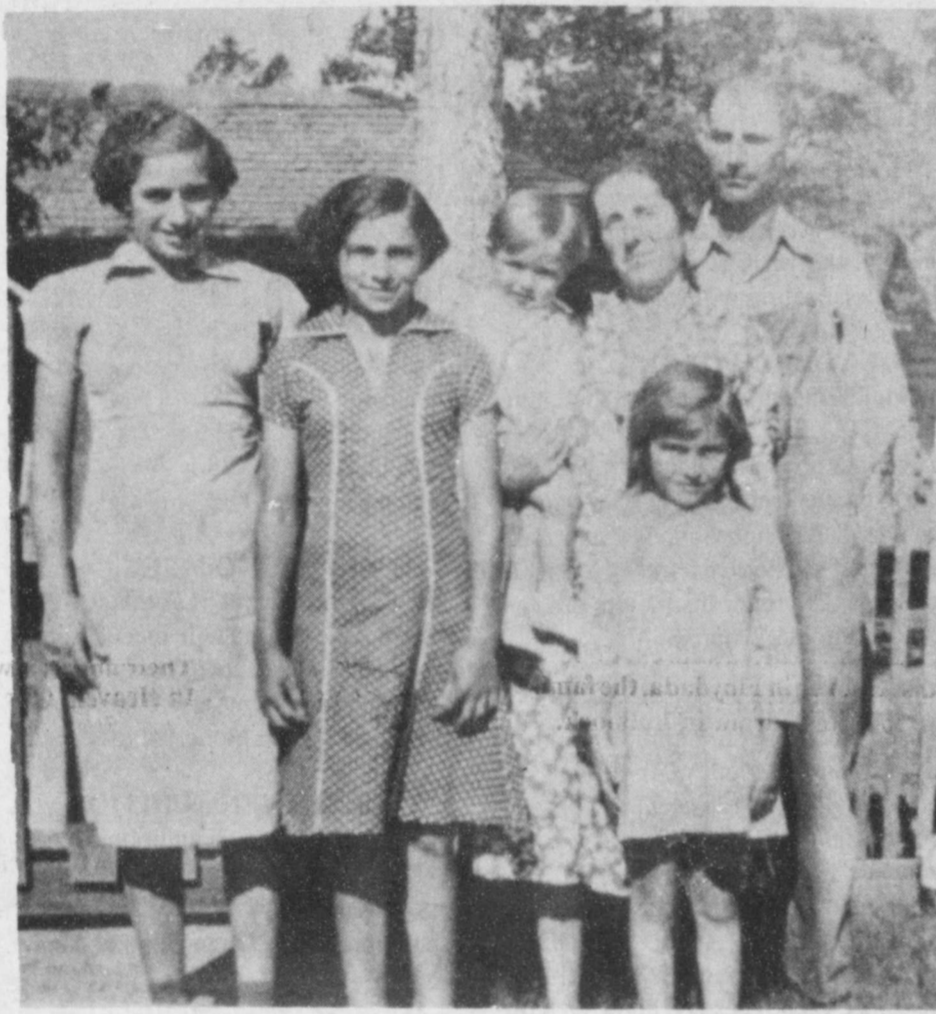

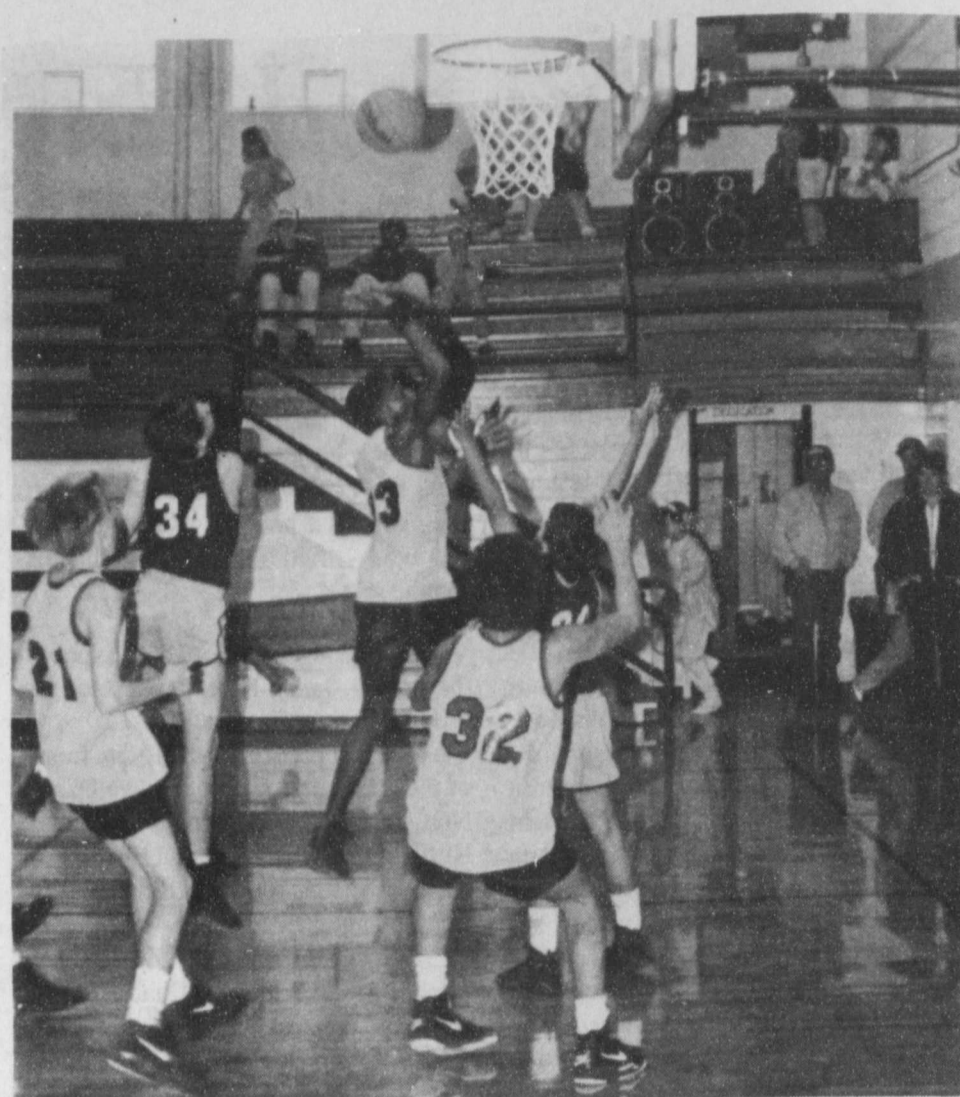

TAAS results presented to FISD board members

FLOYDADA — Floydada students in grades 3, 7 and 11 performed much better on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) tests as compared with results from 1991 and with the state averages according to figures released to the Board of Trustees Monday evening. The Board also reviewed results of current seniors who took the test. Grade 11 Exit Level results were highest in writing as 93 percent of the juniors mastered the writing section as compared to the state's average of 83 percent mastery. The most significant achievement this year was that every junior who took the writing section passed the written composition part of the test. This is also an increase of 23 percentage points above last year's writing results. Floydada juniors scored 60 percent mastery in math which is equal to the state average. Reading results were below the preliminary state results as 61 percent mastered the reading as compared to 76 percent statewide.

Students in grade 7 scored at or above state averages in all 3 areas of the tests and were much better than results in 1991. Writing scores were at the 72 percent mastery level compared to state average of 68 percent. Reading scores were at the 71 percent mastery level while the state average was 51 percent. Math scores were at the 54 percent level at the local and state level. In comparison to last year's grade 7 scores, 1992 results indicate gains of 21 percent in math, 43 percent in reading and 34 percent in writing and 27 percent in those passing all tests.

Students in the third grade showed improvement in all three areas of the test. Test results show the following: reading scores - 66 percent mastery compared to 64 percent mastery in 1991; writing scores - 49 percent mastery compared to 41 in 1991; math scores - 83 percent mastery compared to 75 last year; all tests passed - up from 37

percent mastery to 44 percent. All three groups of students in grades 3, 7, and 11 who took the tests in September and October are the last to participate in fall testing. The State's new transition plan calls for testing students in grades 4, 8, and 10 in the spring. The TAAS tests will be given to the students in these grades in early May 1993. The exit-level test which all students must pass before receiving a high school diploma will be given in grade 10 rather than grade 11. This will allow the students more opportunities to retake the tests before graduation if necessary. The new testing plan for Texas students also includes additional testing in science and social studies during the 1993-94 school year in grades 4 and 8.

The school personnel were extremely pleased with the results. Administrators stated that they feel improved scores are a result of the total school staff assuming responsibility for helping students master the TAAS. The campus site-based decision teams have also made suggestions for improvement and many of these ideas have been implemented as a result of these suggestions.

The Best We Can Be In '93

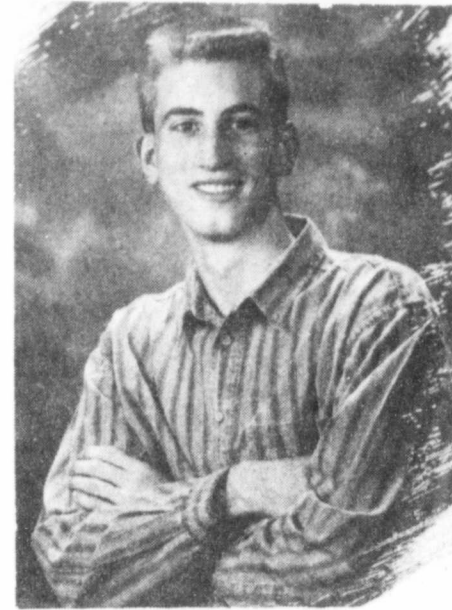

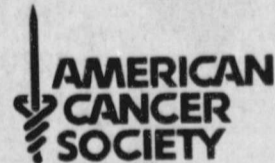

"The impact on the local area should be good," continued Tye. "This will add stability to the company and strengthen

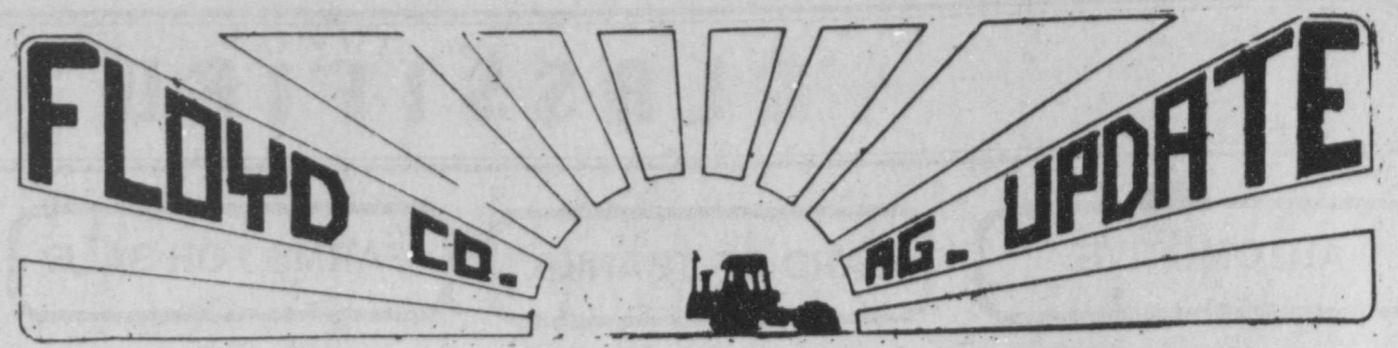
our ability to market the product. As we sell more products, we employ more people."

PCG board supports two area producers

Members of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) Board of Directors met January 6 to discuss a number of important issues that will likely be addressed in 1993. The 50-man PCG Board also went on record in their support of two area producers being considered for positions on the soon to be reappointed State ASCS Committee.

PCG Board members agreed to support Ray Joe Riley of Hart, and J.D. Smith of Sudan, for positions on the State Committee. In other business the Board was presented with a number of reports, including a wrap-up of the 1992 Boll Weevil Diapause Control Program.

PCG Boll Weevil Steering Committee Chairman Steve Verett reported that the 1992 program was very successful and that a total of 453,040 acres were treated during the program. Verett noted that the use of a satellite-based Global Positioning System (GPS) in place of manual flaggers was a tremendous success and helped provide unprecedented accuracy to the control phase of the program.

PCG Directors were given an update on collection under the Cotton Research and Promotion Program by Keith Streety, a Cotton Board member and producer from Levelland, Texas. One thing that was of particular interest was the amount of money being collected on imported cotton products, a change that both growers and importers approved in 1991. Streety noted that to date assessments on imported cotton products were averaging about one million dollars per month.

Board members were also reminded that it is time to begin setting up TCG Director elections in each of the 25 counties PCG serves. In 1993 Producer Directors will be elected to positions on the PCG Board in 23 of the 25 counties, the exceptions are Hale and Swisher Counties where Business Directors will be elected.

"Participating in the election of Directors to the PCG Board is an important way for PCG producer members to stay involved in the ongoing activities of Plains Cotton Growers," notes PCG President Wayne Huffaker, a Lynn County cotton producer.

Producers play an active role in PCG activities by staying in touch with the PCG Directors from their county and

letting them know of issues as they develop, or contacting the PCG office in Lubbock. Cotton producers across the High Plains benefit from the work PCG does adds Huffaker.

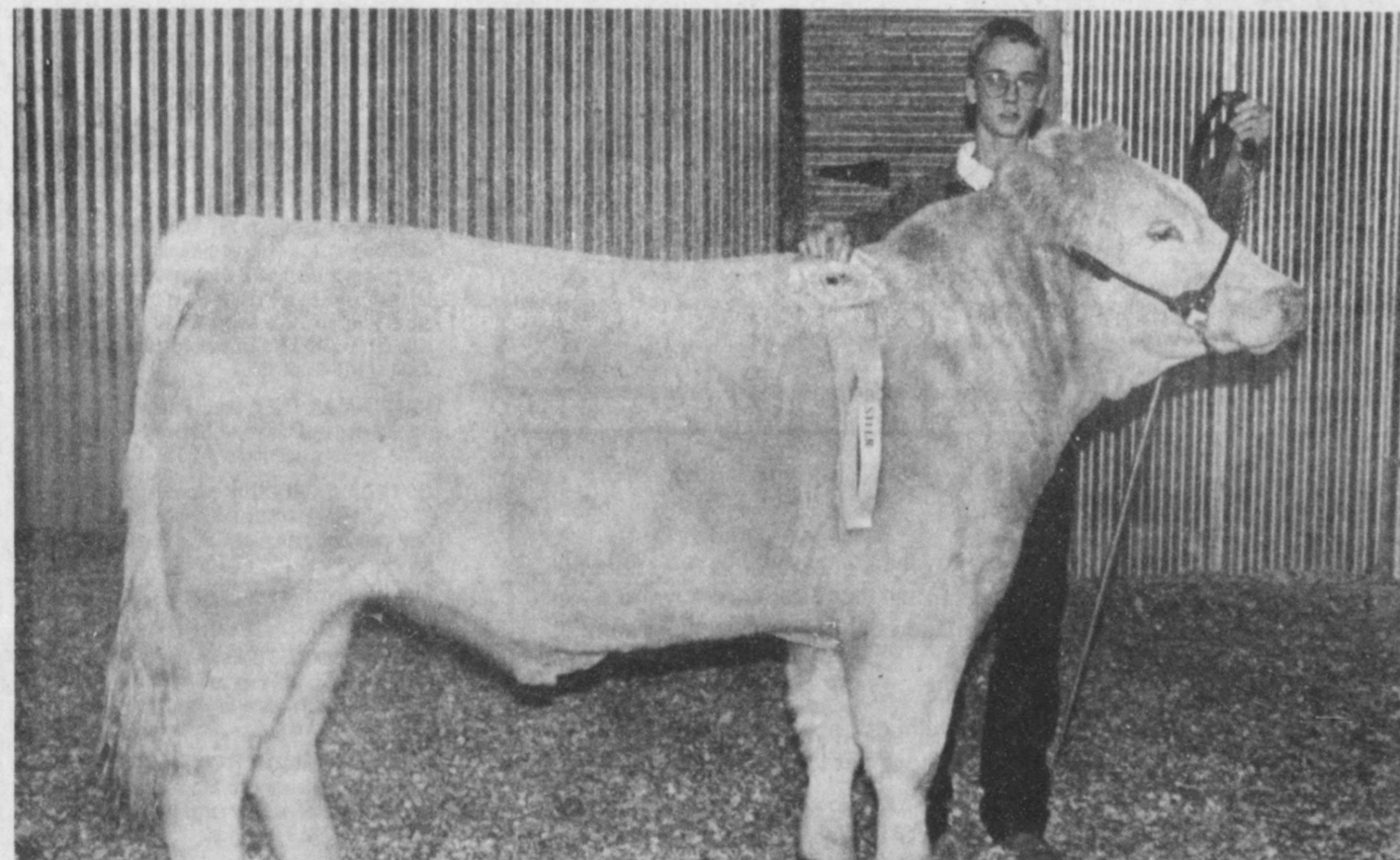

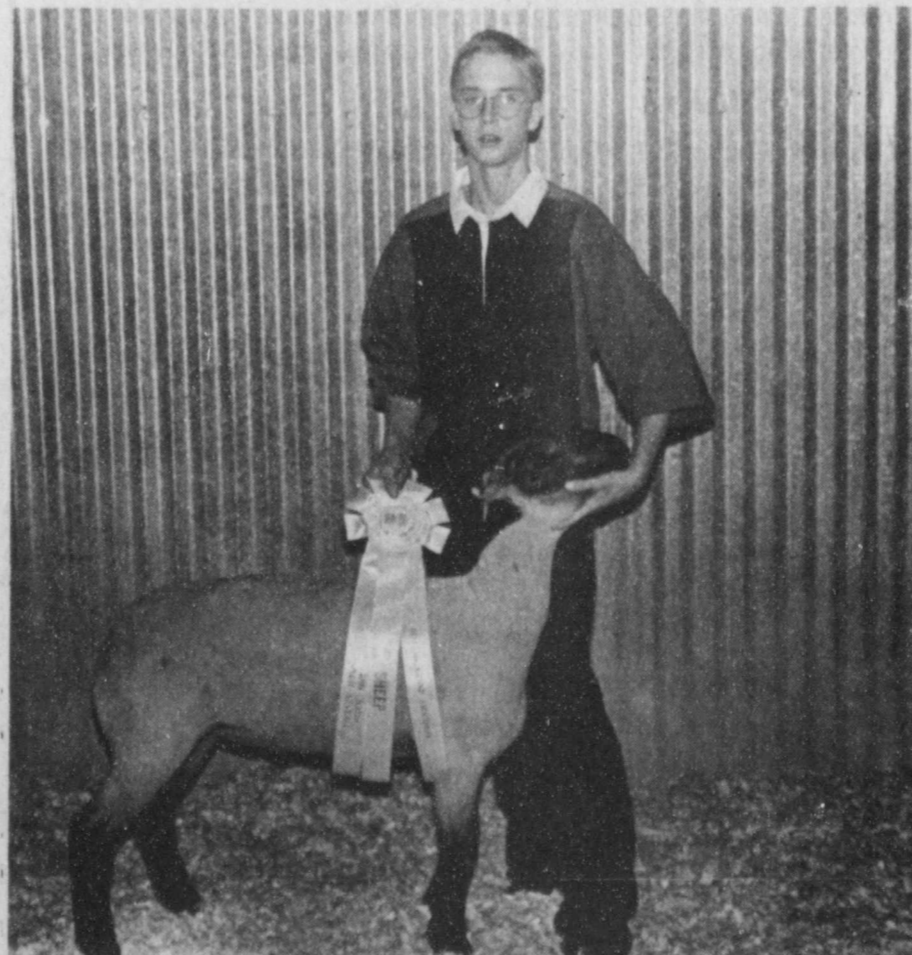
