Road construction to begin soon

Barricades have already been placed to prepare for upcoming road construction beginning at the intersection of FM 37 and FM 378, extending east to the intersection of FM 37 and US 62.

According to Donnell Gowens, supervisor of Roadway Maintenance, the road will be bladed and then incorporated in with a new base material. We will then put a new road surface on top of that.

Work on the road will begin when weather permits and will start at US 62 going west to FM 378. "We will work the road in sections," said Gowens. "Traffic will be detoured around construction."

Construction of walking path approved by council

FLOYDADA — City council members for the City of Floydada were presented with a report concerning the funds raised by the 1950 Study Club for a proposed walking path at the park near Floydada High School. City manager Gary Brown reported at the Tuesday, January 19, regular session of the council that the club had secured contributions and pledges totaling more than the \$2,000.00 agreed upon. Mrs. Milton Evans was the source of that information and she asked, on behalf of the study club, that the city now approve construction of the path as detailed in a meeting last fall.

Motion to approve the actual construction of the path was made by council member Amado Morales. The motion was seconded by council member Eric Cornelius. Vote on the matter was unanimously in favor of the construction.

BIDS TABLED

Bids for the annual seal coating project were to be opened and read at the session. Due to the icy roads, no pavers came to deliver bids. With no bids received, the city was forced to table the matter and will readvertise for bids to be opened at the February regular session of the council.

AUDIT REPORT

Council members briefly reviewed a draft of the annual financial audit submitted by the firm of Edd V. Henderson, CPA. Edd Henderson Jr. was available to make the presentation and answer any questions raised. He told the council that a final draft will be completed and ready for the February session. The process is actual complete, said Henderson, but the accounting firm is awaiting statistical data to accompany the audit report.

This data and the report will be the basis of an application by the city for national recognition as one of the few cities in the United States displaying outstanding achievement in fiscal responsibility and community well-being. The final approval of the audit by the council will be delayed until all the data is in place.

SALE OF USED VEHICLES APPROVED

A motion by council member Wayne Tipton, seconded by council member Ruben Barrientoz, unanimously approved the authorization for city manager Brown to advertise for bids on the proposed sale of used city vehicles. The city hopes to receive the new police car and new pickups before the month's end. This will make approximately five used vehicles available for disposal. Bids will be taken and opened at the next council meeting.

Caprock appoints new administrator

The Board of Directors of Caprock Hospital announced, on Tuesday, the hiring of Ronald Ammons as Hospital Administrator.

Ammons is presently the Administrator of Rotan Hospital. He is an EMT-Paramedic and works with AeroCare.

Ammons has a BS Degree in Occupational Education from Wayland Baptist University in Plainview. He graduated from Wayland in 1991 with honors. He also majored in Business with a specialty in Health Care Administration.

He is married and has two children. Mrs. Ammons is an RN with Post ISD. Ammons plans to begin work in

Floydada within 30 days and will move to the area, from Post, at the end of the school year.

The hospital board also announced that they are continuing to negotiate with another physician and hope to have a commitment within the next two weeks.

In a board meeting, Thursday January 14, the directors heard a presentation from David Warner of LBJ School of the University of Texas in Austin, on the feasibility of opening the hospital. Warner reviewed various statistics of hospitals in the area and compared the average in patient stay of Caprock with other hospitals. Warner told the board that with the county population, Floyd County could actively support 5 or 6 doctors and eight doctors were not out of the question.

He recommended that the board explore cooperation with Lockney General Hospital, a Rural Health Care option or working with the South Plains Health Provider in providing a Floyd County clinic. Warner stated that the South Plains Health Provider is in a good position to recruit physicians and they have a good federal cost reimbursement program. A Rural Health Care Clinic also has a good Medicaid Reimbursement plan for doctors and hospitals.

Warner stressed getting physicians before opening the hospital. "The long range outlook for re-opening the hospital, is that it is not feasible unless you have doctors. Those doctors should also build up a patient base first.

"You also have to turn around the trend of people going out of town for medical and hospital care. You have to keep your ambulatory care here for the hospital to work and you have to feel confident that the physicians and the citizens will use the hospital."

"Based on these statistics," said Board President Fred Thayer, "it would be less than wise to try and open this hospital in a short amount of time. It is also important for us to get a hospital administrator who can work on all these different options for the hospital."

County Education District reviews financial records

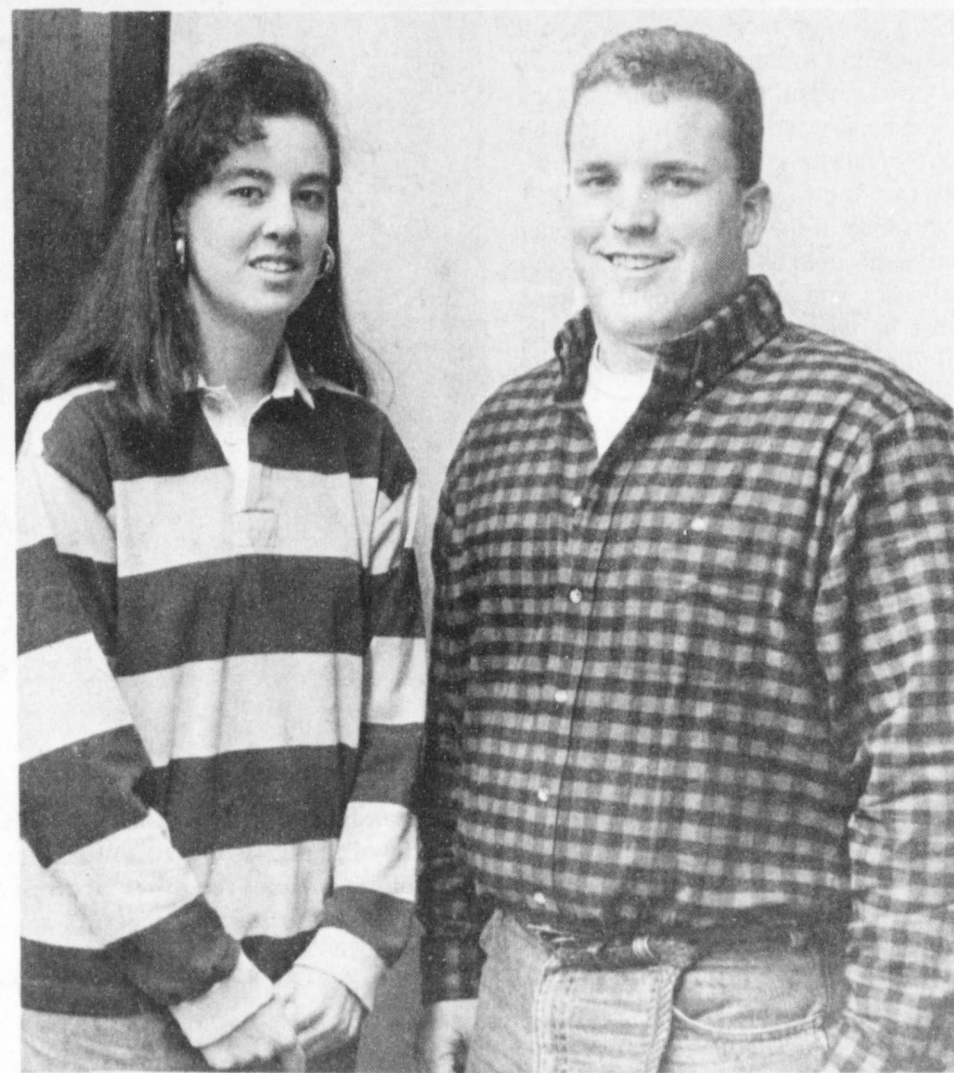
Motion to approve the report was made by Dickie Lambert and seconded by Jim Bob Martin. The vote on the matter was unanimously in favor.

Parks and Gilliland earn All State status in band

For only the third time in the history of the Floydada High School Band, there is a member who has earned the status of All State, and for the first time ever, there are two students who are eligible to attend the All State music convention. These two students are Emily Parks, senior daughter of Ron and Phyllis Parks, and Micheal Gilliland, senior son of Bobby and Barbara Gilliland. They will both attend the Texas Music Educators Convention in San Antonio on February 10 and participate in the ATSSB All State Band.

Emily had to go through two different tryouts to achieve this status. The first tryout was at the region level against other students from the Lubbock region. There she was selected as the first chair qualifier to go on to the area site. At area she had to compete against 11 other trombone players from the Amarillo, Odessa and El Paso regions. Emily and another student from Crane were selected to represent this area at state.

Emily has earned many other honors during her years in Band. She has been selected to the Region 16 All Region Band every year since seventh grade. She has been to the State Solo and En-

semble contest in Austin twice, two times with a Trombone Trio and once with a Trombone Solo.

She is also a member of the Stage Band which also has performed at the State Ensemble contest. She has performed solos with the Whirlwind Marching band and also with the Stage Band. Emily plans to attend Oklahoma Christian University in Oklahoma City after graduation.

Micheal also had to work his way through the region and area tryout process. At the area tryout Micheal had to tape his tryout music and have the tape sent to a neutral site where he was judged against nine other Contra Clarinet players from around the state. Although he was not chosen as an actual player, Micheal was chosen an alternate to the All State Band.

Micheal is one of the Whirlwind Marching Band Drum Majors this year. He has been to the State Solo and Ensemble Contest twice before with two solos and as a member of the Stage Band. Micheal has been a member of the Region 16 All Region Band for the past six years. He plans to attend McMurry University in Abilene after graduation.

Local Stock Show activities to begin Friday afternoon

The Floydada Chamber of Commerce will hold their annually sponsored stock show, Saturday, January 23.

The Floyd County Livestock Barn will open at 4:00 p.m., Friday January 22. The weighing of lambs and swine will begin at 6:00 p.m. Friday. Steers will be weighed in, at 8:00 a.m. Saturday.

The lamb show will begin Saturday morning at 10:00 a.m. Fifteen minutes after the lamb show is completed, the swine show will begin.

The steer show will begin 15 minutes after the completion of the swine show.

David McCormick, of Dimmitt, will judge the animals. Larry Ogden will serve as the Show Chairman and will be assisted by Gerald Wiles and Stan Pierce.

The sheep superintendent will be Bill Womack, assisted by Bill Hendrix, Larry Guthrie and Corky Guffee.

Franklin Harris will be the swine superintendent. Harris will be assisted by Joel Hendrix and Steve Anderson.

Kevin Nelson will serve as the steer superintendent. He will be assisted by Jeffrey Johnson, Mark Beedy and Todd Beedy.

Clar Schacht will announce the show and the Floydada Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors will operate the concession stand.

Lockney ISD to purchase new band uniforms

Trustees of Lockney School Board met for a regular monthly meeting, January 14, and devoted part of the time to an executive session with Paul Lyle, attorney.

"Lyle brought us up to date on the lawsuit pending against the school board concerning single member voting districts," said Superintendent Dub Hallmark.

"We were presented with copies of a 7-0 plan and a 5-2 plan. The 7-0 plan calls for 7 single member voting districts and the 5-2 plan is 5 single member districts and 2 at-large districts. We discussed them all but no decisions were made at this time," said Hallmark.

After the executive session the trustees were also brought up to date on the new gym construction. "I know it is hard to believe, but we are really not behind schedule on the gym construction," said Hallmark.

"We are still on schedule as far as are target date, which is May 1. If they can get the concrete poured between now and February 4 we will be OK. The framework won't be delivered until February 4.

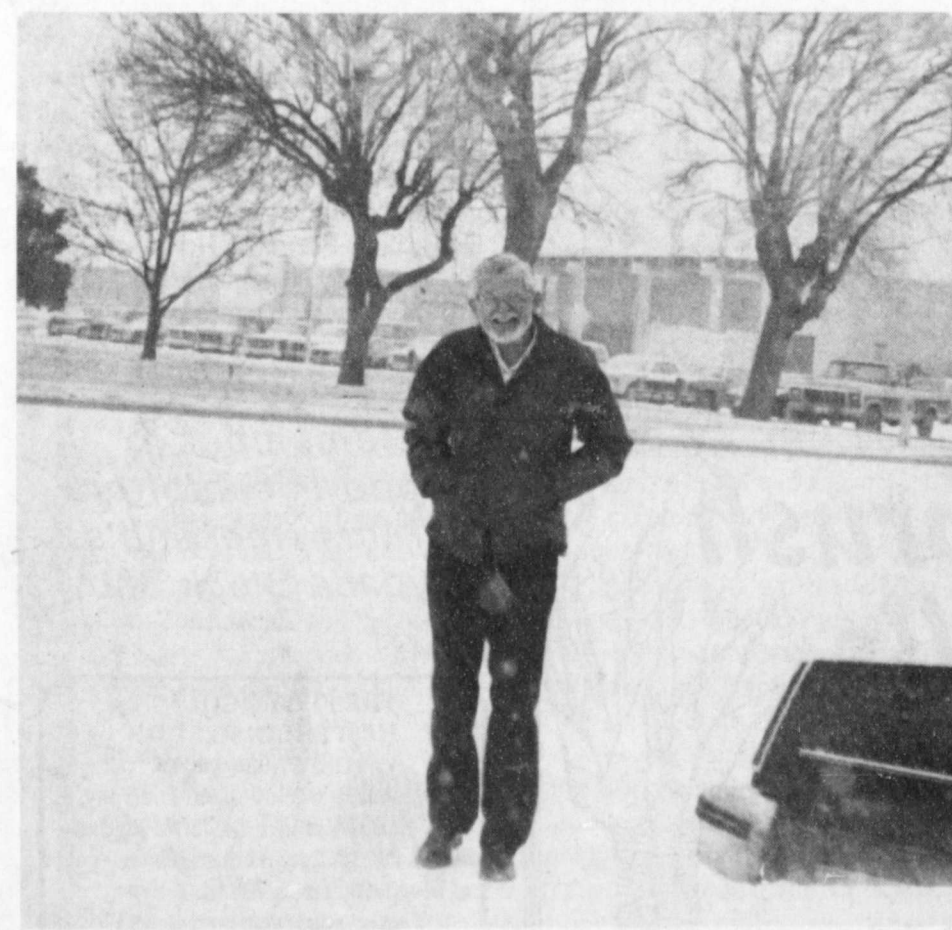
"We would like to have the gym completed by graduation date because that is the only way that this year's seniors would be able to use it."

The school board also approved the purchase of new band uniforms at a cost of \$340-\$360 each. One hundred new uniforms will have to be purchased and the old uniforms will then be passed down to the Junior High band. "The old uniforms are between 8-10 years old," said Hallmark.

The trustees approved the sale of entity owned property at the city's request. They also approved calling for bids on gasoline and diesel for second semester and bids on food and food products for the remainder of the year.

Reeda Kay Smith was hired by the board to fill the English teaching position at the high school, which has been vacated by Kay Williams. Williams has transferred to the Library where she will serve as the new certified librarian.

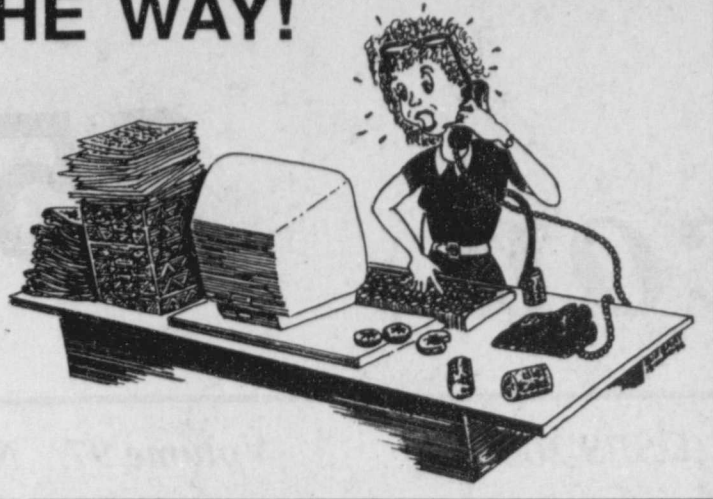
Board members also approved the continuation of Hallmark's contract with a \$2,000 yearly increase in salary.

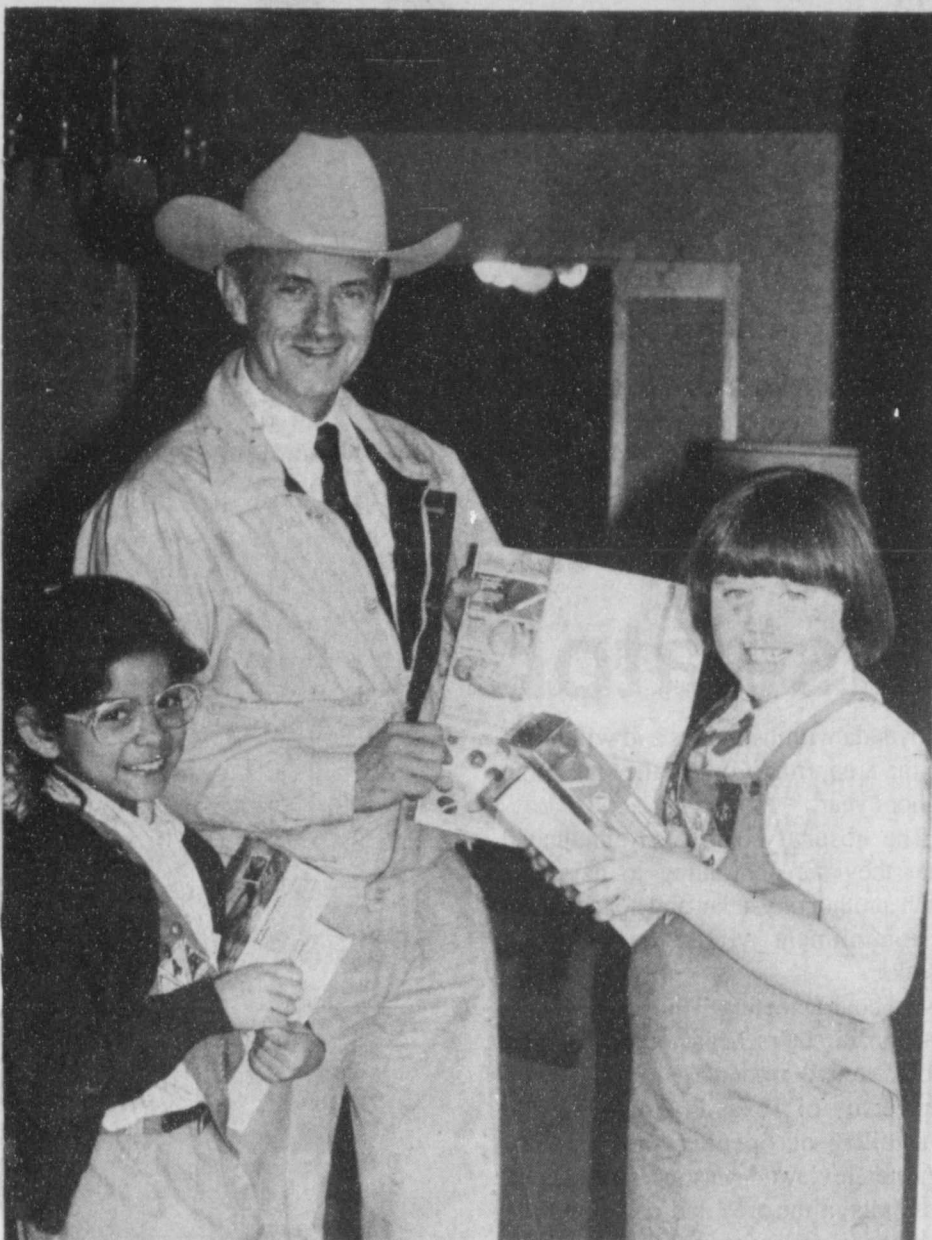
January 6 a resident on South 5th street reported someone stole a 13" TV from a storage building in her backyard. She also reported seeing juveniles running from the scene.

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Billy Marquis trains firefighters

They may only be volunteers but the Floydada Fire Department is making a name for itself around the state with the help of one of their volunteers Billy Marquis.

Marquis started as a volunteer with the FVFD in 1962 and like many other Floydada volunteers he continued his training because of his love for the work. Marquis is now an Associate Training Specialist with Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service where he has

been teaching for 19 years. He has recently received a Master Fire Fighter Certification. "That is as high as I can go and still be considered a Volunteer Fireman," said Marquis.

"I have also been certified as an Advanced Instructor Paid Firefighter which is as far as I can go and still work for a volunteer department. If I wanted to receive any more certifications I would have to go to a paid department and I don't want to do that."

As an Associate Training Specialist Marquis now gets paid for what he did for many years for free.

Technically Marquis is assigned to teach extension fire schools from Wichita Falls to El Paso, and San Angelo to Panhandle. He is currently the only one on staff who is able to teach Fire Science Class west of Ft. Worth and has also traveled to East Texas to help start an Ag-Rescue School.

"The ag-rescue school was started in Floydada nine years ago," said Marquis. "Because of the schools popularity, after three years it was incorporated into training at College Station. It is now a 30 hour course at A&M."

With 67 people on staff at the A&M school, eight of them are extension instructors who travel all over the state.

Marquis began going to College Station for summer school in 1965 and he has been going ever since. He now teaches any aspect of firefighting except Fire Prevention. Firefighting courses taught at A&M include Industrial Programs and Marine Programs such as land base and off shore drilling rig fires.

While in College Station, Marquis is in charge of officer development training in fire classes and housing and food for other instructors. He will also be the Hot Drills Coordinator for the AirCraft Rescue Fire Fighting Spring School which is held with the American Asso-

ciation of Airport Executives.

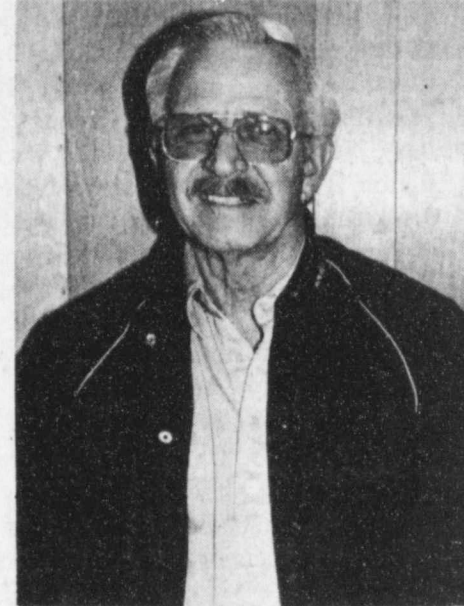
"In 1993 there are 20 weeks that I don't have something scheduled already," said Marquis.

Billy Marquis and his wife, Betty, have been married for 36 years. They have lived in Floydada since 1942 when they moved here from Matador. They have three children: Sherre Marshall of Spur, Billy of San Antonio and Kim Ditto of Lubbock. A mechanic by trade, Marquis worked most of the time with Oden's Chevrolet.

"March 3, 1962 I became a volunteer with the Floydada Fire Department and started my training and continued to work as a mechanic. In January 1975 I started full time teaching at A&M."

"I feel like I'm good at teaching," said Marquis. "I enjoy training people and passing on the knowledge. I used to train mechanics too and I just kept it up when I started firefighting."

"I travel all over the state to teach and I live where I park my trailer. I have a very nice office located in Abilene and every once in awhile I'm able to get by and see it."

Grand jury hands down ten indictments

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COMMUNITY INPUT SOUGHT CONCERNING RELOCATION OF FOOTBALL STADIUM

The Floydada Independent School District Board of Trustees is asking for input from the community regarding the proposed relocation of Wester Field. The Board believes that there are some misunderstandings about the project and its goals, rationale and funding.

The main goal of the Wester Field relocation project would be to provide a safe, functional centralized athletic facility for Floydada ISD students, parents, and patrons. A secondary goal is to finance the project with existing funds that will not affect the current tax rate in any way.

The reasons for moving the stadium seating to the current track facility adjacent to the high school are that several Wester Field structures are, at present, inadequate, needing repairs or total replacement. Also, the current stadium site has potential safety and health hazards to the teams, the fans, and the game officials. Among the concerns for player safety are the shallow end zone areas of the field where parked cars line the fence. The congested concession stand areas are prime places for threatening confrontations between rival teams, fans, and officials. Current dressing room facilities do not have adequate room for the home team, the visiting team, and game officials. Old plumbing in the restroom facilities create health hazards for home and visiting patrons. Aging light poles have made adjusting and replacing light bulbs impossible, and the replacement of these poles is essential. Patron safety is affected by the lack of parking space at the current football stadium. Many fans must use street parking when they attend the games. Transporting the Whirlwind team and band by buses from the high school to Wester Field poses another safety concern.

The proposed site next to the high school campus has existing structures that would remedy the safety and health concerns of the current Wester Field. The layout of the field within the surrounding track provides enough space for player safety. Excellent dressing room facilities for both teams and officials are already in place at the track field. The home concession stand/restroom facility was built several years ago and is also in excellent shape. This facility and the field house are at opposite ends of the complex allowing fewer opportunities for crowd interference with teams and officials. Whether Wester Field is moved or remains in the same location, new light poles must be installed. The team and band would no longer be bused to the games as their practice facilities are by the proposed stadium site. Most patrons could park on the proposed all-weather parking lot at the northwest corner of the new complex and eliminate much of the on-street parking. One drawback to the relocation will be the loss of reserved parking stalls next to the playing field; yet, no closed-in parked cars would improve player safety.

The relocation of the seating stadium to the current track field would take only a few steps. First, the stadium seats would be disassembled. Next, concrete piers would be poured at the track field. The piers would be at a height to allow for the best possible view of the playing field. Once the piers were ready and the disassembled seats moved, assembly could begin. Other current Wester Field structures that could be moved and reused at the new location are the goal posts, scoreboard, and the new concession stand. The only additions to the track field location would be the installation of light poles and lights, sidewalks, and the materials for the all-weather parking lot. The total cost of the project is estimated at approximately \$80,000.

Proposed funding for the project would come from an existing permanent school fund. Legally, this \$105,000 fund can only be used for permanent structure purposes. The expenses associated with the Wester Field relocation project would in no way affect the current tax rate of the school district.

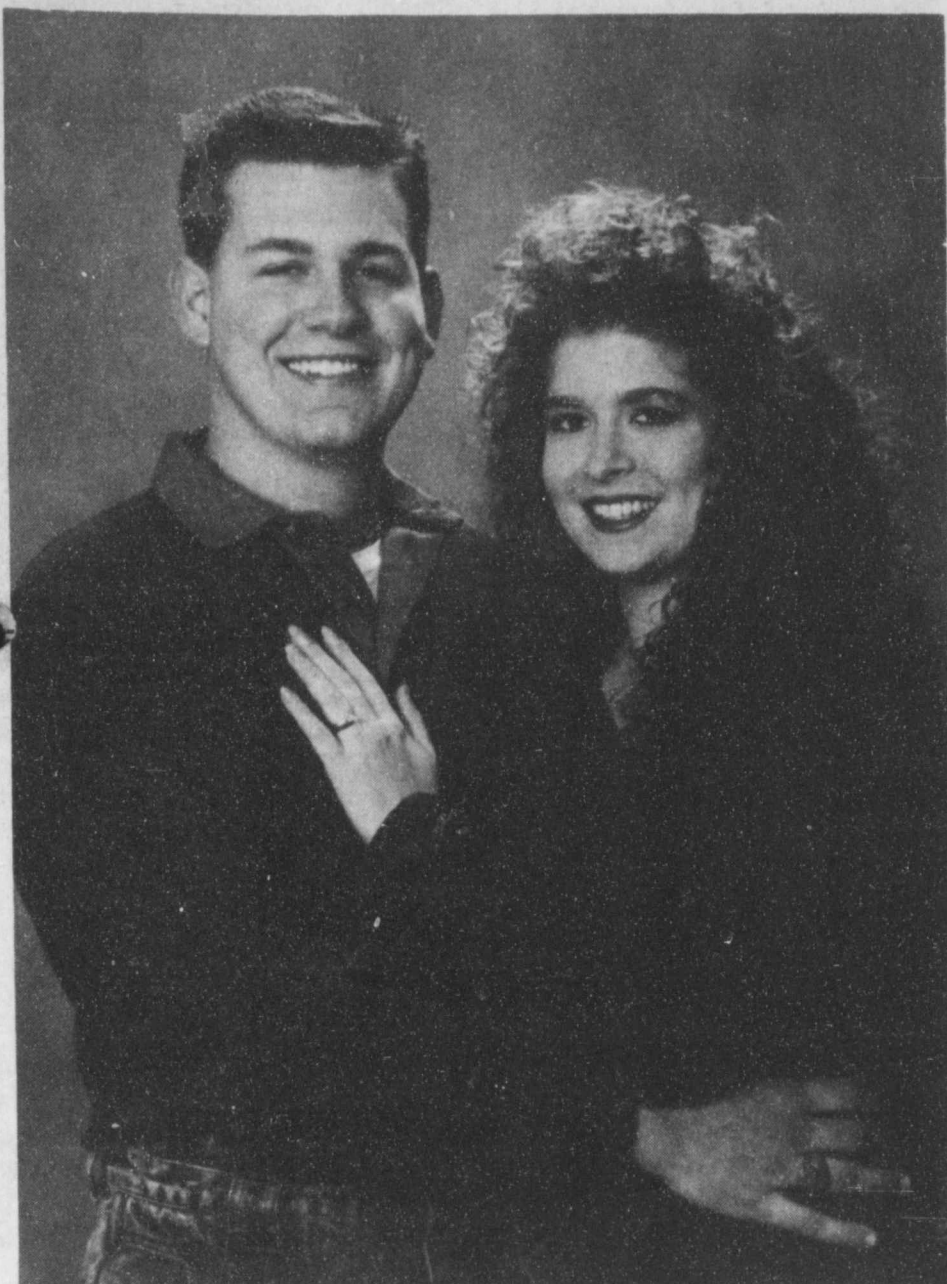

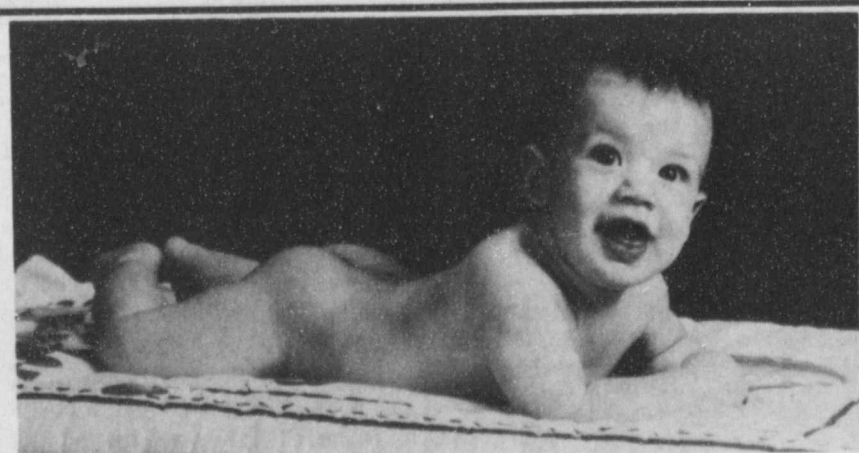

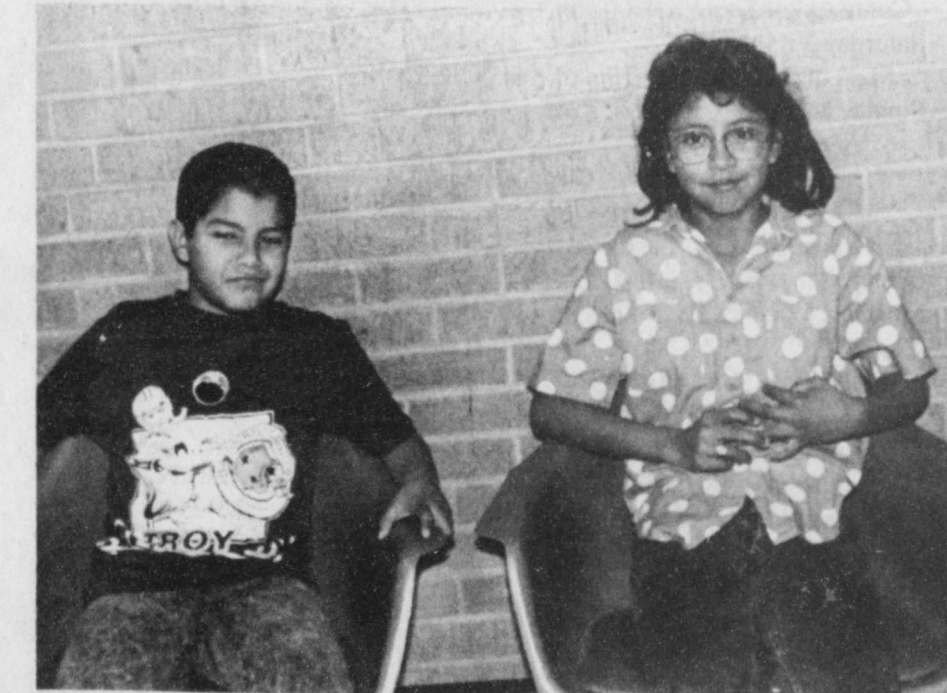

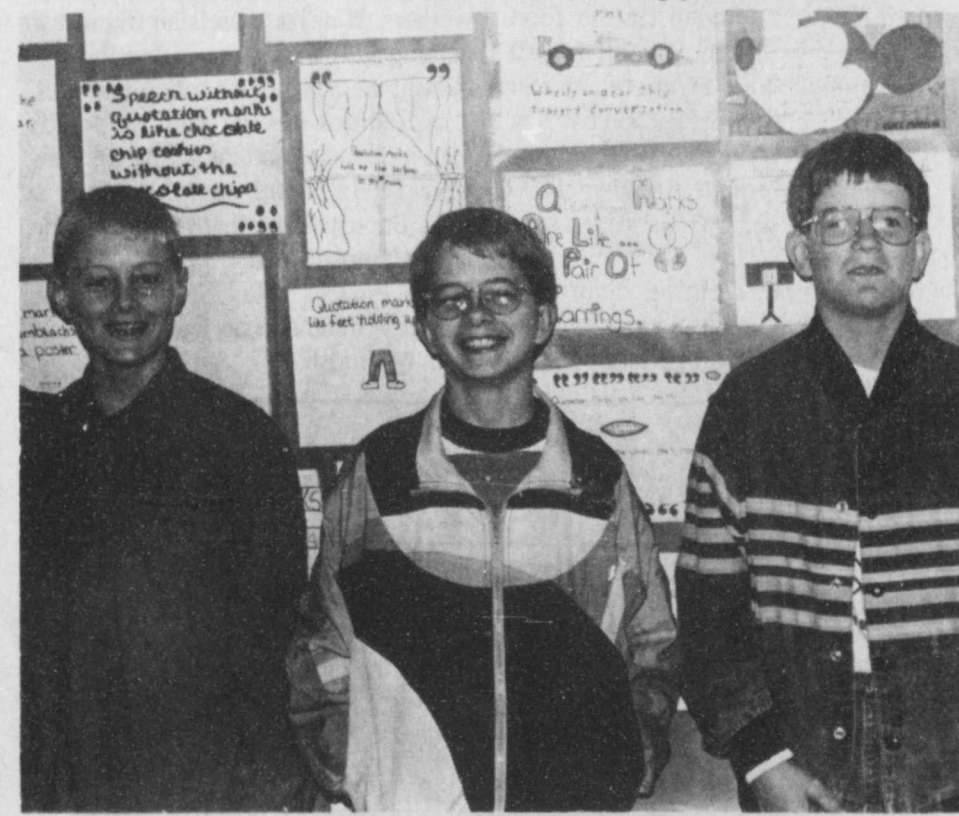

graders scored 30 points to their opponents 17.

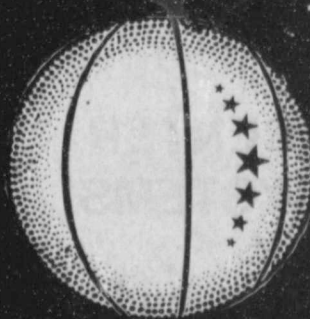

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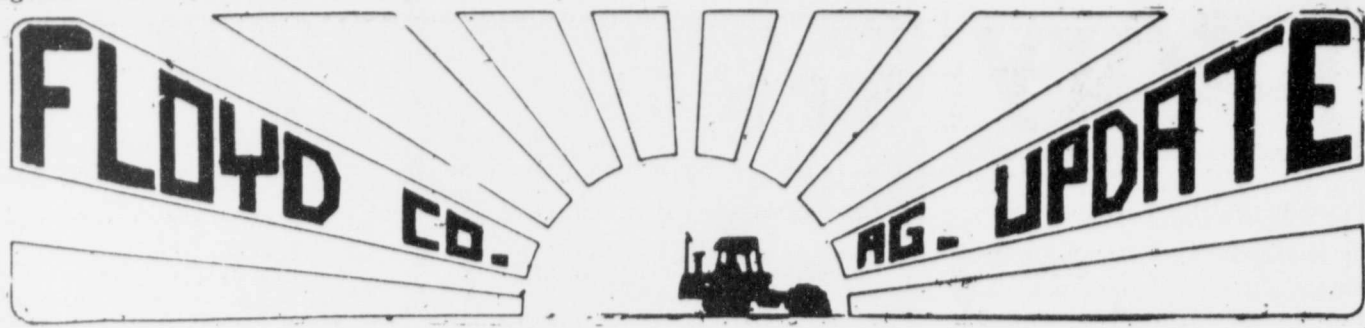
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Depth-to-water measurements underway to determine water level of the Ogallala

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 Technical Division staff are making annual depth-to-water measurements to determine the effect of 1992 pumpage on ground water levels of the Ogallala Aquifer within the 15-county Water District service area.

Measurements are taken in the District's network of more than 1,000 privately-owned observation well network. These wells are spaced at a density of about one well per nine square miles throughout the District.

Water District staff take the measurement by lowering a steel tape to the

depth of the current static water level inside the observation well. The lower ten to fifteen feet of the tape is coated with blue carpenter's chalk. When the chalked tape comes in contact with the ground water, it turns a darker shade of blue. This section of wetted tape is subtracted from the total amount of tape lowered into the well to determine the depth-to-water from land surface.

After the depth-to-water level measurement is taken, the data is recorded and a vinyl sticker showing the well number, the depth-to-water measurement, and the date the well was meas-

ured is affixed to equipment at the well site.

Water District staff are currently taking water level measurements in the northern portion of the District and will work their way south. Blue and white District vehicles are easily identified, and personnel will be glad to discuss the water level measurement with landowners and/or operators.

The observation wells are measured each year, and the data collected is compared with that of previous years to determine any changes in the ground water levels of the Ogallala Aquifer. This data is used to construct maps showing changes in water levels and the saturated thickness of the aquifer within the Water District.

Maps showing the location and well number of observation wells in each county or portion of a county served by the District are traditionally published in the April issue of the District's monthly newsletter, The Cross Section. Along with the maps, tables listing the observation wells in each county and the depth-to-water measurements for one year, five year and ten year intervals are also printed.

SCS personnel collecting data for pre-plant soil moisture survey

High Plains Water District and USDA-Soil Conservation Service (USDA-SCS) personnel are now collecting data for the annual pre-plant soil moisture survey.

The purpose of the survey is to determine the general soil moisture availability and deficit trends across the 15-county High Plains Water District service area.

Review of the pre-plant soil moisture survey information helps agricultural producers determine the amount of water they need to apply to bring their five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity without over-irrigating or under-irrigating.

Historical data shows that there is a better likelihood of producing above-average crop yields when the plant root zone of the soil is at or near field capacity prior to planting.

"The soil moisture was low at the start of the 1993 survey. Even through the 1992 growing season started out with the five-foot root zone soil profile at or near field capacity, rainfall during late summer was below normal, leaving very dry soil conditions," said Willie Crenwelge, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist. He added that recent snow and rainfall have helped reduce soil moisture deficits in some portions of the District.

Soil moisture data collection began in Armstrong, Potter and Randall Counties and is moving southward.

Soil moisture sites are selected based

upon soil types, the local saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which indicates possible well yields, and crop water requirements in the area. Each site represents typical dryland or irrigated farming conditions in the area.

Water District and USDA-SCS personnel use neutron moisture meters to gather soil moisture data.

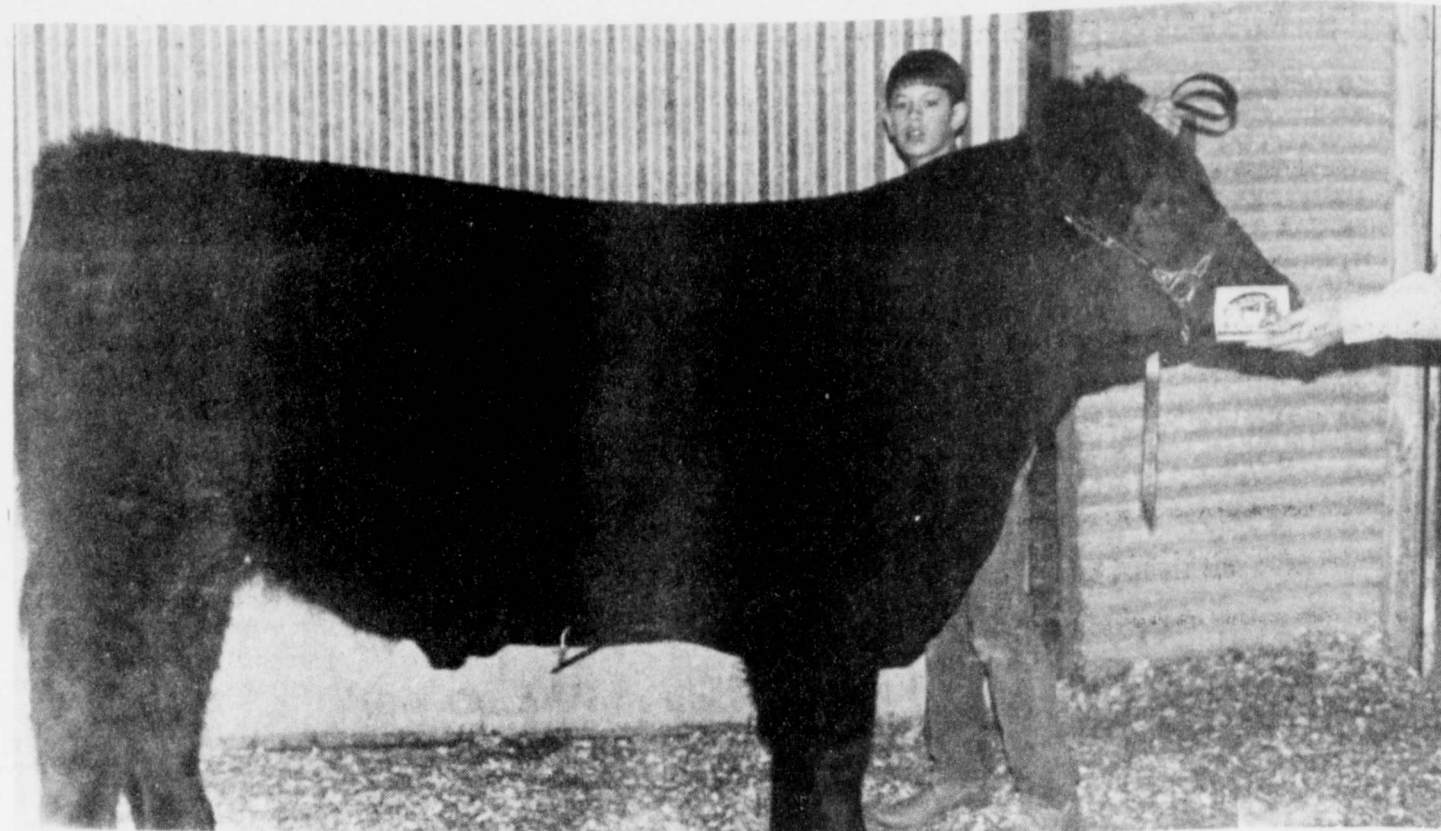
Readings are taken at six-inch intervals throughout the five-foot soil profile by lowering a neutron probe into a previously-installed aluminum access tube.

Data collected during the pre-plant soil moisture survey is then used to construct maps illustrating the soil moisture available for plant use within the five-foot root zone soil profile and the amount of water needed to bring the soil profile to field capacity.

These maps, as well as the results of the pre-plant soil moisture survey, will be published in The Cross Section before planting time.
