A view from The Lamplighter

Welcome to the new (and different) "Gay Nineties."

It is now obvious there is at least one campaign promise Mr. Clinton intends to keep. There is at least one group he intends to satisfy completely and fully. He is determined that when he and Hil-Fiary leave office four years from now there will be at least one group that will sing their praises.

It is also obvious that Mr. Clinton was honestly revealing his innermost feelings when he wrote of his "loathing" for the American military. (That feeling, you may remember, was revealed in his celebrated epistle from Oxford, or someplace, when he was doing everything he could to avoid donning the uniform of those men and women who must now look to him as their Commander-in-Chief.)

By the stroke of a pen he can accomplish two things: he can demonstrate his utter contempt for our men and women in the military, and he can claim the everlasting gratitude and support of homosexuals everywhere.


Chamber accepting applications for Employer of the Year

State holds landfill permit hearing

FLOYDADA-A small crowd gathered Tuesday, at 1:00 p.m., in the Floyd County Courthouse for a public meeting concerning the city's application for a municipal solid waste facility permit.

The public hearing was conducted by Ann Scudday and Charles Stavley, of the Texas Water Commission, for the purpose of hearing any citizens comments concerning the landfill application. As part of the small community liaison, Scudday and Stavley will pass citizens comments on to the Texas Water Commission staff.

Scudday opened the meeting by telling those present that the city's application for the landfill had been declared administratively complete and is currently under technical review by the staff of TWC. "Once the technical evaluation is complete," said Scudday, "the TWC will issue further notice of the applications and the terms of any proposed draft permits."

Scudday asked for any comments from the citizens present and City Manager Gary Brown then spoke on behalf of the city of Floydada. He said, "We began the process 4 1/2 years ago to continue our landfill and we feel that we are in a good position to carry on a solid waste landfill.

"We will be asking for area exemptions which I feel we will easily qualify for and which will enable us to economically carry out this operation.

"We have greatly improved our landfill operation and we are currently working on reaching the necessary 40% reduction in the amount of trash we put into our landfill. We are now separating tires, brush and tress and white goods (stoves, refrigerators, etc.). We have companies that pick up the tires and the white goods.

"I know that there is still trash that will blow because it is impossible to keep trash from blowing on the plains, but we have improved those conditions. We do not allow dumping of certain items when the wind is blowing hard."

Doug Jeffrey, representing Mrs. Helen Hammonds also spoke to the commission representatives. Mrs. Hammonds had filed a lawsuit against the City of Floydada several years ago protesting the location of the landfill, as it adjoined her land.

"Speaking on behalf of Mrs. Hammonds," said Jeffrey, "we want the

commission to be aware or our concerns about the future." Jeffrey complimented the city on the condition of the landfill now and called it "squeaky clean." However he stated that Mrs. Hammonds wanted to make sure that past conditions did not occur again.

Jeffrey read a letter to the commission outlining several areas of past problems with the landfill, as perceived by Mrs. Hammonds. Problems mentioned concerned blowing trash, dogs that came to dig through trash and stayed in the area and rats that "overflowed from the

Jeffrey and Hammonds were assured by Scudday and Stavley that the landfill would be inspected regularly and those problems would be taken care of.

As there were no more comments from the citizens attending, the meeting adjourned at 1:35 p.m.


Brag pages deadline Feb. 5


She says that she is going to continue doing features on people and events in the South Plains and wants everyone to keep her in mind when they have an unusual or special "happening" on the South Plains.

The program generates forms designed to be filled out by coaches. A typesetter enters the information from the forms into the program. The program sorts the information.

"It can tailor the story to fit your needs, rewrite the story if you aren't satisfied with the first version and allows you to edit if you wish..." said Brian Kuhn in the Nebraska paper.

The programs—one for football and one for basketball—are geared toward weekly newspapers and small dailies that have limited staff to cover a large number of schools or teams. (Those aren't my words-they come from the TPA Messenger—this is a common problem).

Another plus of the program: It saves and compiles information, including box scores, win-loss tallies and conference standings. It even keeps track of important plays throughout the year.


Edwards named on **A&M Honor Roll**

Union to defend Homestead Law

The Texas Homestead Law, which has protected farms, ranches, and homes from seizure for over 150 years, has been essential to protecting property owners in both good times and bad. Delegates to the 89th annual convention of the Texas Farmers Union declared they would fight any new efforts by lenders and financial institutions to change the existing law which has worked for ever since the days of the Republic of Texas.

"This is one time when the old saying 'if it ain't broke, don't fix it' really applies," stated TFU President Joe

proved that even though thousands of people lost money and property, they were able to save their homesteads thanks to this law."

The TFU convention expressed concern about new attempts on behalf of lenders in the current session of the Texas Legislature to collateralize consumer and business loans against their customers' homestead equity. Under current Texas homestead law, equity loans are limited to first mortgages, home improvements and tax payments.

In addition, other attempts may be made to pressure elderly and retired Rankin. "The real estate bust of the 80's homeowners to borrow money against

their equity. "Given the problems we have seen in other states, we don't believe it makes any sense for lenders to have this option of obtaining collateral against Texas homesteads," Rankin

"At a time when banks are showing record profits, we believe the banking industry should concentrate on supporting economic recovery in Texas by providing financing for family farms and ranchers, businesses and commerce. There is certainly no evidence that we have seen that shows that raiding the home and farm equity loans will stimulate any type of economic activity," Rankin said.

Cotton Inc. marks decade in Far East

Cotton Incorporated recently marked the 10th anniversary of its Far Eastern marketing base in Osaka, Japan.

Dean Turner, Cotton Incorporated's vice president of international marketing, says, "The Japanese, Korean and Taiwanese mills were major importers of U.S. cotton in the 1970s and 1980s, so we set up an infrastructure to provide technical, economic and fashion services to the mills in this area which process U.S. Upland cotton." U.S. cotton growers currently ship 70

percent of their exports to the Far East, with between 1 million and 1.5 million bales to Japan alone.

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
