

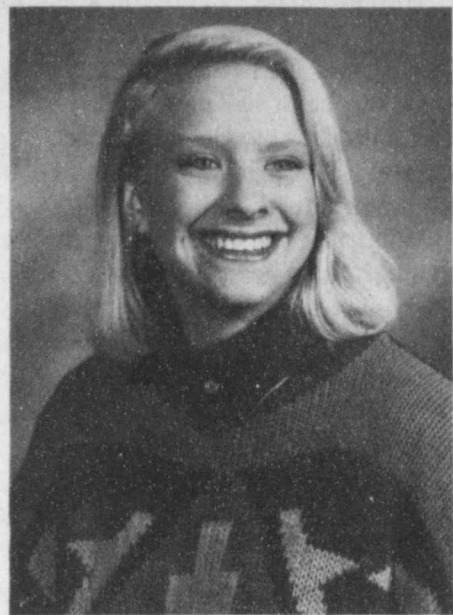
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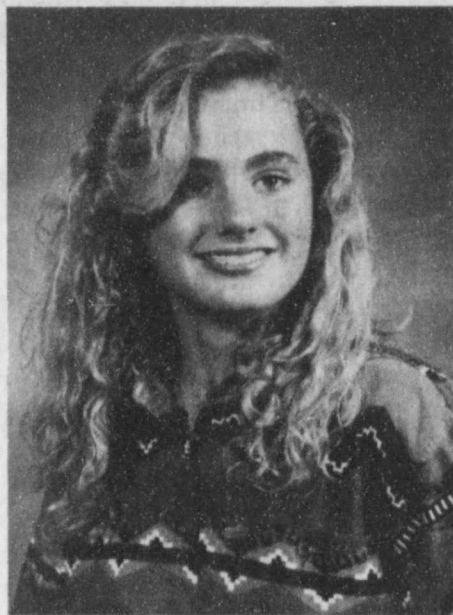

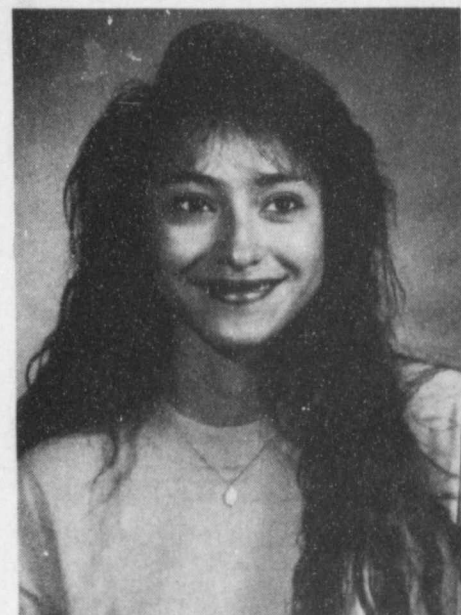

Ammons displays enthusiasm for new post

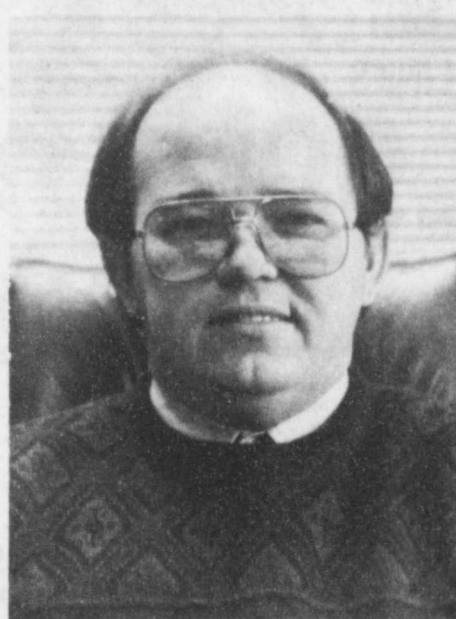

Enthusiasm is one of those things which seem to be in short supply these days, but plenty of it was in evidence during an interview with the newly hired administrator for Caprock Hospital District on Friday, January 29. Upon first meeting, one is struck by the outgoing personality and the zest with which he attacks the tasks before him.

Ronald G. Ammons, who prefers to be called Ronnie, comes to the Floydada facility after more than a year of service to the Fisher County Hospital in Rotan, Texas. He brings with him an impressive record for being able to turn around a losing situation and make it a financially sound operation. During his tenure as administrator, he took the Rotan hospital from being several thousands of dollars in debt and having no ready cash to being solvent and having funds in reserve.

Declaring that he welcomed the challenge, Ammons began work on the problems facing Caprock Hospital District on Monday, January 25. He has already confronted several of the obstacles which must be overcome before the local hospital can reopen. By week's end, he had work in progress on virtually every area needing improvement. While

continuing to assist during the transition at Rotan, Ammons is confident that he

will be able to get the hospital in Floydada open in July.

"I know that sounds optimistic to some," stated Ammons, "but they don't know me or my determination. I feel certain that I can get this done and do it by summer."

Primarily working at present to get revenue producing portions of the hospital in full operation as soon as possible, Ammons has made renovations and new equipment in the x-ray and laboratory departments a priority. Efforts are currently underway to update both departments to perform needed testing and procedures which would generate immediate revenues for the district.

"This is work which is currently being sent to other facilities by our local physician," said Ammons. "The sooner we are able to do it in-house, the faster the

coffers will begin to fill. At the present time, we are necessarily spending a lot of money to get things up and running and above all, we need to get a return on that investment beginning as soon as possible."

Ammons has been calling on his past experiences in the medical field to find ways to move things along quickly. He has been an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) since 1980 and a paramedic since 1982, working first with St. Mary's Hospital and Flight for Life. He moved into AeroCare service when St. Mary's converted a few years ago. He was a member of the board of directors of the Garza County Memorial Hospital from 1987 through 1989. In 1991, prior to accepting the administrative position at Fisher County Hospital, Ammons completed studies toward a degree in

County show names grand champions

Floyd County youth divided up the honors Saturday and Sunday during the 49th Annual Floyd County Junior Livestock Show. Taking home Grand Champion honors were Amber Womack of

Floydada, with her 128 lb. heavyweight Suffolk lamb; Jeri Ann Lambert, Lockney, with her 210 lb. lightweight Chester White; and Cassidy Mallett, Lockney, with a 1,250 lb. medium weight Crossbred Steer.

Amber Womack's 125 lb. heavyweight Cross lamb was named Reserve Grand Champion. Reserve Grand Champion recognition in the swine show went to the 218 lb. Cross belonging to Lacey Aston of Lockney. Carson Johnson of Lockney won Reserve Grand Champion in the steer show with his 1,295 lb. medium-heavyweight Cross.

For the fifth consecutive year, Amber Womack dominated the lamb show and not only brought home the champion honors but was also named the Senior Showman in the lamb division.

Derrick Martinez of Floydada was named Senior Showman in the swine show. Senior Showman in the steer show was Cassidy Mallett.

The Junior Showman in the lamb division was Desha Smith of Lockney, and Will Warren, Floydada, won Junior Showman in the swine division. Tyson Whittle, Floydada, was named Junior Showman in the steer show.

Seventy-nine lambs were shown in this year's stock show, down from last year's 131 lambs. Two hundred and four swine were shown Saturday which is one less than last year's 205 swine. Thirty-three steers were in Sunday's show, compared to four heifers and 35 steers in last year's show.

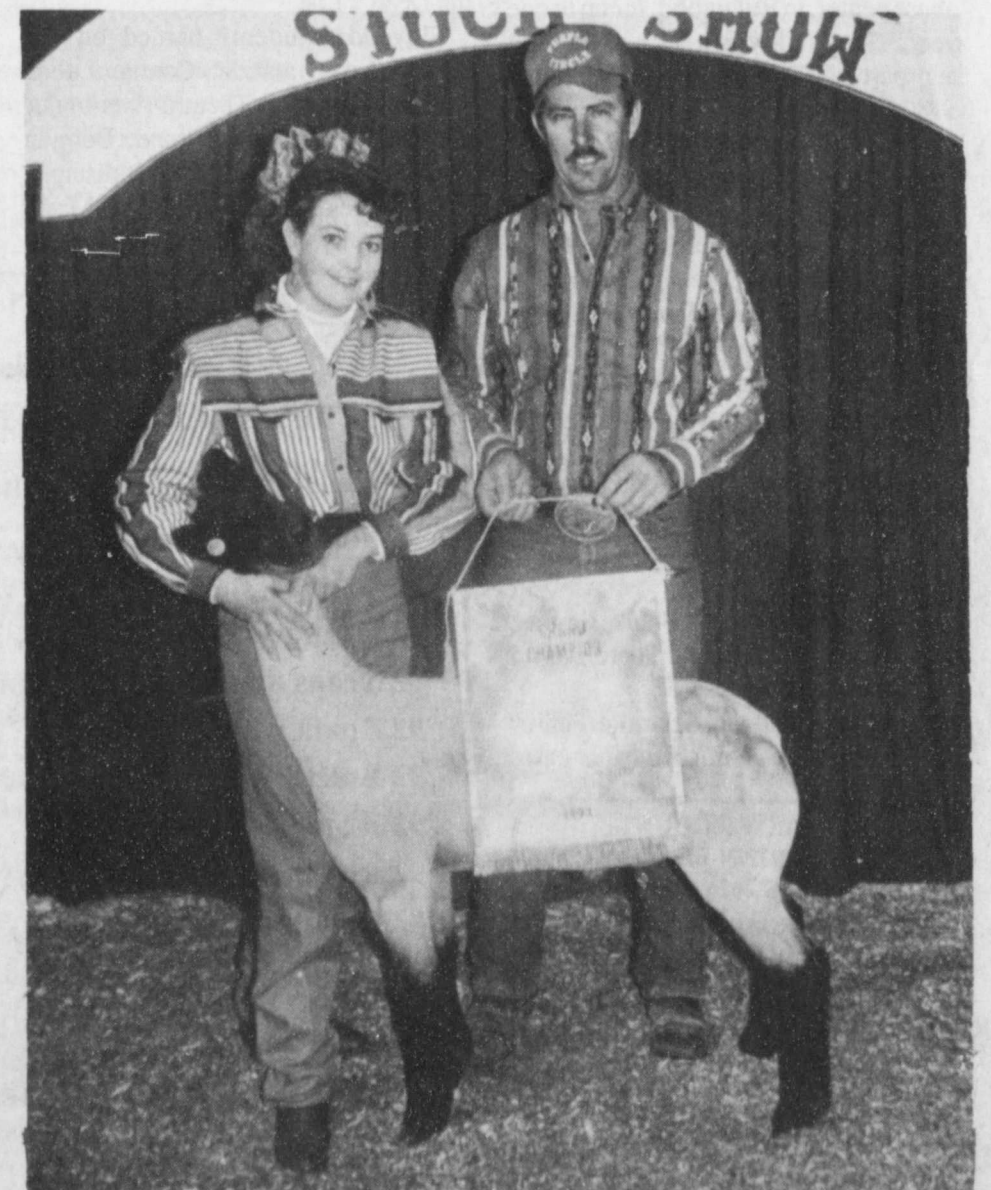

Courtroom Activities

After two days of testimony, January 26 and 27, Floyd County jurors found Jerry Calahan, 44, of South Plains, guilty of DWI. Judge Hollums sentenced Calahan to 90 days in jail which was probated for one year. Calahan was also fined \$500.00. Calahan had been arrested for DWI on June 3, 1991.

A hearing on an application to revoke the probation of Gilbert Lee Sinor, 38, of Floydada was held in District Court February 2. Sinor was on probation for felony DWI and Judge Randy Hollums ruled that Sinor had violated the conditions of his probation by consuming alcoholic beverages. Hollums continued Sinor on probation and ordered Sinor to attend the felony substance abuse center, in Richmond, for up to one year. This facility is a lock-up facility and part of TDC. Sinor must also pay \$180.00 in attorney's fees.

Also in District Court, David Pesina Mendoza, 45, of Floydada pled guilty to two cases of felony DWI. He was sentenced to five years in TDC, probated for five years. He must also pay a \$500.00 fine on each case, court costs and attorney's fees. His driver's license was suspended and Judge Hollums ruled that Mendoza must spend 90 days in the county jail.

In county court January 28, F.L. Williams was charged with Reckless Conduct. There was no disposition on this case.

Also on January 28, Frank Jimenez was charged with assault. There was no disposition on this case.

In J.P. court, January 5 through February 2, there were 76 misdemeanor cases

filed. Of those cases, Anselmo Salazar, 43, of Mexico, was charged on January 6 with public intoxication.

Questions about strokes answered

Stroke is a disease that kills 150,000 Americans a year and disables thousands more. More than 400,000 people suffer a serious stroke each year in the United States. In Texas over 8,000 deaths last year were attributed to stroke. Over 3,000 were men and 5,000 were female. After heart disease and cancer, stroke kills more Americans than any other disease.

What is a stroke? A stroke occurs when blood flow stops to an area of the brain. When cells in the brain do not receive the needed flow of blood, they may become damaged or die. When brain cells die, physical problems result. Stroke victims can have trouble walking or speaking or have memory loss.

Why are fewer people dying from stroke? Since 1972 the death rate from stroke has been reduced by half. Why?

Scientists believe it is because people are controlling their blood pressure and smoking less. High blood pressure and smoking have both been shown to cause stroke.

Does race make a difference? African-American women have a 43 percent higher death rate from stroke than white women. Among men the rate of death from stroke is 47 percent higher in African-American men than in whites. This higher rate may be due to higher rate of blood pressure and smoking in African-Americans.

How can people reduce their risk of stroke? Stroke is a serious problem. People can take two big steps to lower their chance of having a stroke. They are: have their blood pressure checked, control it if it is high. Don't smoke. If you are a smoker, quit smoking.

What are the warning signs of a stroke? Numbness, tingling, or weakness in an arm, leg, or one side of the face. These symptoms can come and go and are blindness in one or both eyes, speech problems, or loss of leg strength in an arm or leg.

Other danger signals are dizziness, unexplained headaches, drowsiness, nausea or personality changes.

State park receives title to abandoned line

Caprock Canyons State Park has received title to the abandoned Burlington-Northern Railroad that ran from South Plains, Quitaque, Turkey and Estelline. This land now carries the status of a linear state park and all rules and regulations governing state park use are now in effect.

According to Park Superintendent Rusty Sargent, development and construction will begin in the very near future, meanwhile access to the corridor is limited to authorized personnel only.

"I have had several reports of people driving their vehicles on the abandoned corridor, and for safety reasons this will no longer be tolerated. During the construction and salvage operations numerous hazards exist, so if you do not have a legitimate purpose on the corridor please stay off the trail."

It should be noted that all railroad equipment, materials, crossies, signals, etc., belong to the park, contact Caprock Canyons State Park if you wish to purchase salvage materials.

In the desire to be good neighbors, adjacent landowners to the linear state park will be invited to at least two annual operations meetings, so that those with

concerns can be addressed and be allowed to make suggestions as to future plan and operations.

If you own, lease, or operate land adjacent to the old railroad, please contact park staff at 806-455-1492 or write to Caprock Canyons State Park, P.O. Box 204, Quitaque, Texas 79255-0204 and ask to be placed on the mailing list.

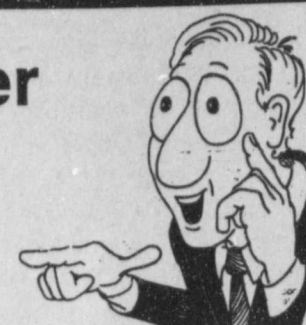

The "Gift of Life", donating organs or tissue after death, is often a double gift - those waiting for transplants receive a second chance at life, and the donor's bereaved family members are comforted in the knowledge that their loss will help save others.

As of July 1991, nearly 24,000 patients were on the waiting list of the national United Network for Organ Sharing, a clearing house for organ donations and recipients. All were hopeful that a family grieving the loss of a loved one might decide to give the gift of life. In Texas alone, more than 800 people are waiting for organ transplants, but misconceptions about organ donation charges may cost waiting transplant recipients their lives.

Donor families are sometimes unaware of the high medical costs involved with life-support or other methods used in final life-saving attempts. Often, medical bills received after a loved one's death are interpreted as organ removal costs. At no time is any donation-related cost passed on to the patient's family. The patient/family financial responsibility stops when life-saving attempts fail, the loved one expires and donation is authorized. From that moment on, the procurement organization assumes financial responsibility for any costs associated with the donation process. The law is so strict in this area that it is illegal to buy or sell human organs or tissues.

To be quickly identified as a donor, any person over the age of 18 may execute a statement of gift on a personal identification card or on the back of a Texas driver's license. Under revised Texas law, the license or card is sent to the hospital with any individual who is involved in an accident or other trauma. A person under age 18 may make a statement of gift, but it is not effective at the time of death without the approval of the minor's parents or legal guardian.

Because of time restraints, donation procurement officials suggest signing a donor card as opposed to including a statement of gift in a will. It is also recommended that family members discuss anatomical donations at length, so that those who remain may act according to the wishes of the deceased.

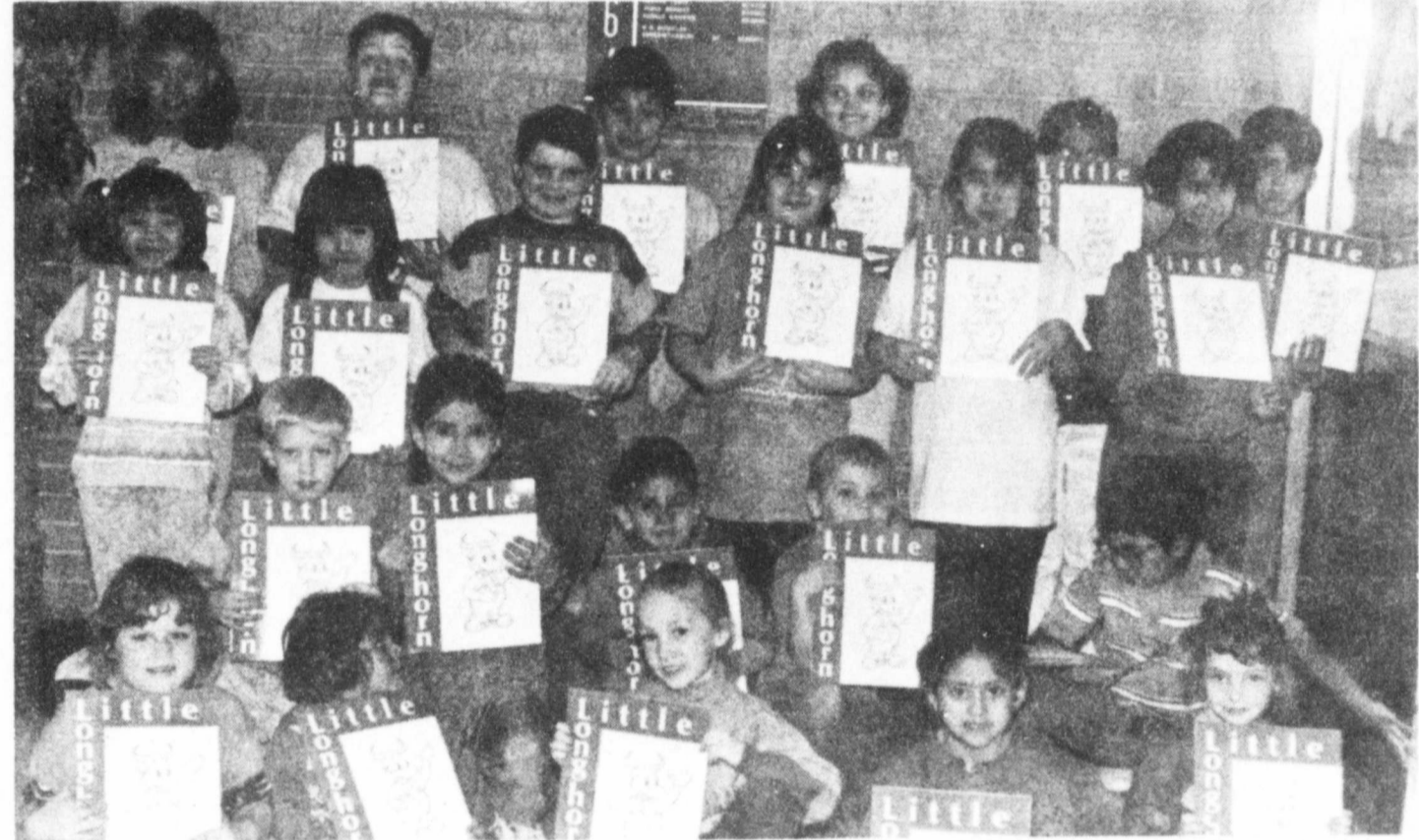

Plains Cotton Growers Inc. to elect new Floyd County director

Floyd County cotton producers and agribusiness representatives will elect a Producer Director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. at a 7:00 a.m. breakfast meeting, Friday, February 12. The meeting will be held at Nielson's Restaurant in Floydada.

Announcement of the election comes from Dan B. Smith of Lockney current Floyd County Producer Director to the 25-county cotton organization, and Steve Lloyd of Floydada, Business Di-

rector.

Each county in PCG's service area has two directors, one a business person and the other a cotton producer. They are elected on alternate years for two-year terms. Each is eligible for re-election every second year.

Hydrologic Atlas now available to public

Revised Hydrologic Atlas depicting ground water availability as of 1990 within the 15-county High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area are now available to the public.

The Atlases cover the portions of Armstrong, Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Farmer, Potter and Randall Counties within the Water District.

"The preparation of the 1990 atlases continues the effort of the Water District to provide interested persons a reasonable estimate of ground water availability within the District," said Don McReynolds, Technical Division Director.

McReynolds used water-level measurements from the District's observation well network and measurements from supplementary wells to prepare altitude-of-water table maps for 1990. These maps were used with previously constructed maps showing the altitude of the base of the Ogallala Formation to prepare saturated thickness maps depicting ground water availability as of 1990.

Each Hydrologic Atlas packet contains a descriptive booklet and four county maps. Contour lines on the individual maps depict the approximate altitude of the base of the Ogallala Formation, the approximate altitude of the water table, the approximate altitude of the land surface and the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Formation.

The maps in each county atlas provide a wide range of ground water information:

* Subtracting the value for the base of the Ogallala Formation from the altitude of the land surface gives the approximate thickness of the Formation. Knowing the amount of saturated thickness

helps landowners gauge the expected yield of a water well.

* Subtracting the value of the altitude

of water table from the altitude of the land surface gives a landowner an approximation of the depth-to-water.
