County chooses new financial depository

Floyd County Commissioners voted unanimously to accept a bid from First National Bank of Floydada to serve as the official depository for county funds during the coming two year period. The action came at the regular monthly meeting of the court on Monday, February 8. Two financial institutions had submitted bids for the period as indicated in the county's published bid request.

The Floydada Branch of the First National Bank in Lockney, which was awarded the bid for the past two years, was the only competing bid received by the court. The bid submitted by that facility quoted rates on certificates of

deposit at a slightly lower rate than did the bid from FNB Floydada. The Lockney bank offered to pay 98.5 percent of the published interest rate on T-Bills while the Floydada bank offered 100 percent of the rate. Other items addressed by the bids were virtually the same regarding benefits to and charges against the county.

A motion by Precinct 4 Commissioner Howard Bishop was seconded by Precinct 1 Commissioner Connie Bearden to award the bid to FNB Floydada. The vote on the matter was unanimously in favor of the action.

Bids were also opened and accepted at the meeting for the sale of two used sheriff's department patrol cars. Two

bids were received, one from John Campbell of Floydada for \$600.00 and one from Tony Felan of Lockney for \$305.00.

A motion was made by Bearden and seconded by Bishop that the county advertise for sale by bid the current ag pickup and a trailer owned by Precinct 3. The court will also seek bids for the proposed purchase of a new ag pickup for the Extension office. The court was unanimously in agreement on the action.

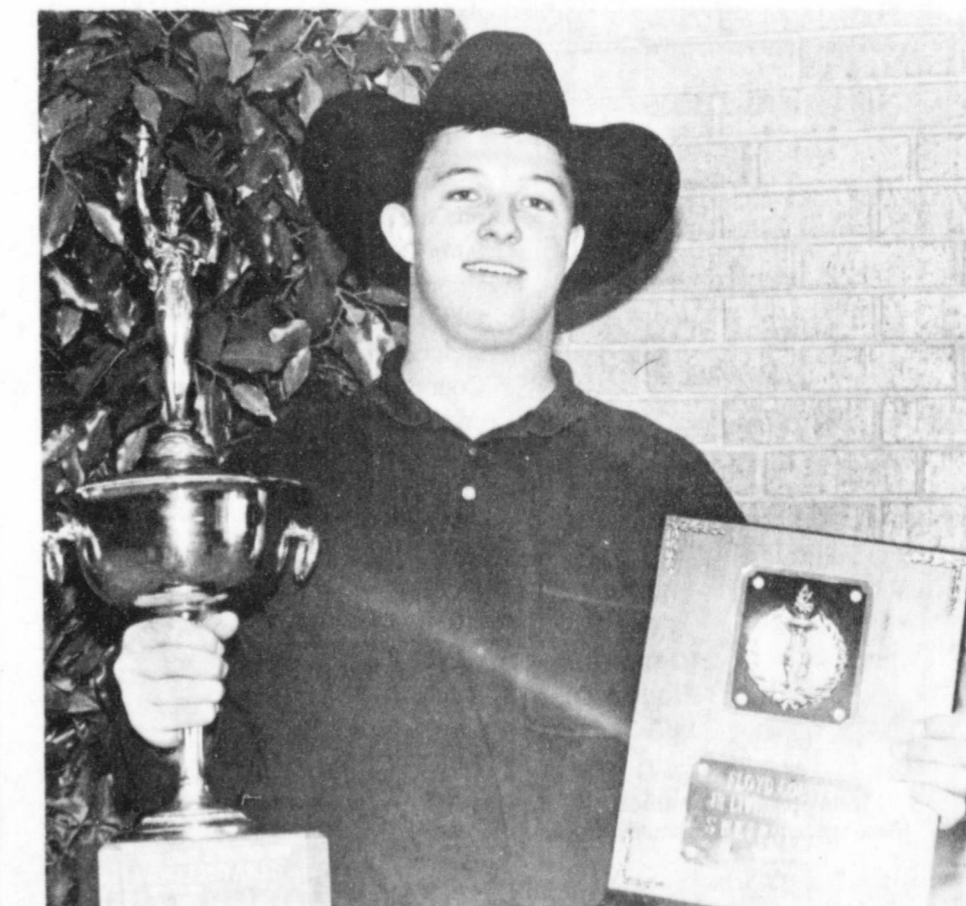
The Sweepstakes honor is based on all around involvement in the stock show over several years. Cage was recognized for his work in areas of sportsmanship,

Principal credited for saving girl's life

Shondra Emert has got some special celebrating to do this Valentine's Day and a special Valentine to celebrate the day with. Had it not been for Bruce Bramlett, principal of Floydada Junior High School, it is possible that Shondra would not have seen this Valentine's Day.

Bramlett has been credited with possibly saving the life of 13 year-old Shondra after he performed the Heimlich maneuver on the choking Shondra.

"I was eating some chicken in the cafeteria last Wednesday," said Shondra, "when some meat lodged in my throat. I drank some liquid to try and make it go down and then I really started choking. I motioned to my friend, Christy Hale, who was sitting next to me, and she called Mr. Bramlett over to the table."

"Her friends were really on the ball," said Bramlett. "They knew she was in trouble and starting waving at me from across the cafeteria. When I got to Shondra she was making a bad wheezing sound and I could tell she wasn't getting any air.

"I had to do the Heimlich three times before the food became dislodged. The third time I lifted her off the floor and that did the trick.

"I had started to get worried by that time, because I knew even if we called 911 they wouldn't be able to get to the school in time. I was beginning to wonder if I would be able to do a Tracheotomy."

Bramlett says it has been 20 years since he first learned the Heimlich and even though he has taught the procedure in Health classes, he has never had to use it.

"I'm glad I was in the cafeteria and was able to help," said Bramlett.

Bank participating in 'Cut the Red Tape Week'

First National Bank in Lockney and Floydada Branch of The First National Bank in Lockney participated in "Cut the Red Tape" Week, Feb. 1-5.

Current federal bank regulations and compliance manuals that we must contend with daily at the office total about 57 pounds, said Bank President, Ronnie Hardin.

"Most regulations start out as someone's good idea," Hardin pointed out. "But once they enter the political process, they get loaded up with add-ons and extras, and before you know it, one simple idea becomes a 200-page regulation that bankers all across the country are expected to follow."

Putting an exact dollar figure on the size of the burden is difficult. The American Bankers Association estimated that the nation's banks paid out \$10.7 billion in 1991 - a whopping 59 percent of their profits - just to keep pace with industry rules and regulations.

Another more recent study by the Federal Financial Institutions Examination Council, placed the total as high as \$17.5 billion annually. One banking information services company has stated that the cumulative stack of laws and regulations, updates and changes governing today's financial institutions exceeds 200,000 pages and is growing every day.

Moreover the banking industry could support an additional \$20 to \$30 billion of lending each year if only 25 percent of the resources banks now spend on compliance could be redirected to bank capital.

Reflecting on his own experiences, Hardin explained how well-intentioned laws often translate into hundreds and hundreds of pages of detailed regulations.

"It is a story of bankers drowning in a sea of paperwork, and of communities bearing the brunt of less and less available credit, as more and more bank resources are shifted away from the core business of banking and expended on compliance," Hardin said.

While recognizing that "safety and soundness are critical to the industry," Hardin also pointed out that "we must not lose sight of the fact that for the industry to be safe and sound, banks must be profitable. And to be profitable, they must not be weighed down by stacks of unnecessary regulations."

A study by the American Bankers Association has found that banks spend at least \$10.7 billion each year on federal paperwork. A few examples:

* When you close a home mortgage, your signature is required on several dozen documents, and each one costs the bank, and you, money.

* If you deposit a large amount of cash, the teller has to fill out a government form with 55 separate pieces of information about you, and send the form in to the government.

* When you take out a loan secured by your home, the government requires you to wait three days to actually get the money (your right of rescission).

* The traditional "character loan", where your good reputation is security

"The roof had already caved in on the home when we got there," said Lockney Fireman Johnny Dorman. "It was a very nice brick home but it was too far gone for us to save it."

The cause of the blaze is unknown.

FISD board extends principal contracts

Floydada Independent School District Trustees extended all building principal contracts for one year, making them effective through the 1993-94 school year. Those extended in action taken at the February 8 regular board meeting were Joe Christian, Bruce Bramlett, Ellen Enriquez and Bobbie Weir. Each was also granted a 5% salary increase for the coming year.

Also extended was the contract for administrative assistant Jimmie Collins who was granted a \$4,800.00 salary increase, special education director Les Ross and Athletic Director Dean Bates. Both Bates and Ross received 5 percent salary increases.

This action was unanimously approved on a motion by Charlene Brown with a second by Trena Simpson. Voting followed an executive session lasting more than four hours during which the principals each presented evaluations of their building personnel and the administrative contracts were considered. Teacher contracts will be voted on next month.

BOARD SLATES ELECTION

Board members approved May 1, 1993 as the date for the trustee election. Two board members, Billy Joe Villarreal in Precinct 3 and Michael Hinsley, at-large, will be up for election this year. Both positions are three-year terms.

February 15 is the first day for potential candidates to file for a place on the ballot and sign-up will end on March 17 according to Cannon. Qualified candidates may sign-up at the school administration office at 226 West California during regular office hours by contacting Darlynn Hambright. Early voting will begin on April 12 and end on April 27.

Trustees appointed Hambright as the election judge for the early voting period. A new judge will have to be appointed to serve on election day as Louise Turner has declined for this year and Hambright, a school employee, cannot serve as election judge on election day.

Board members also agreed to move the meeting night in May from the second Monday to the first Monday, May 3, in order to canvass the votes from the May 1 election. State laws require that votes be canvassed and certified within six days of the election according to Cannon. The regular meeting date on May 10 would be too late to comply.

1993-94 SCHOOL CALENDAR APPROVED

Cannon presented the proposed school calendar to the board for approval. He told the board that input had been solicited from the administrators, campus committees and the site based decision making committee in formulating the schedule for the next school year. The calendar provides for 180 in-class days beginning August 16, 1993 and ending May 25, 1994.

Motion to approve the calendar came from Steve Lloyd and was seconded by John Campbell. The vote was unanimously in favor of the new school scheduling.

DRUG DOG POLICY

The FISD board received copies of the new drug dog policy detailing the use of the dogs on local campuses and spelling out the manner in which a student will be handled if the dog alerts on them, their belongings, their lockers or vehicles. High school principal Joe Christian told the board that only minor changes were made in the policy which had previously been used. These changes were made necessary by changes in the law during the past year or so.

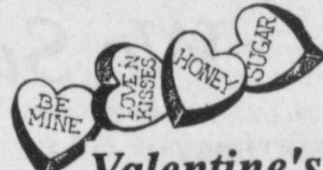

Cannon reported to the board that the written report from the recent accreditation visit had been received and contained only some suggestions for improvement. No areas of deficiency were noted and the district will be certified as

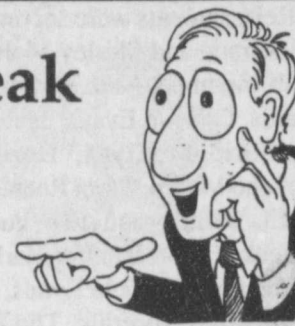
an accredited school said Cannon.

The purpose of the deployment is part of the U.S. Marine Corps' role as a force in readiness to respond to crises in distant lands, from the sea.

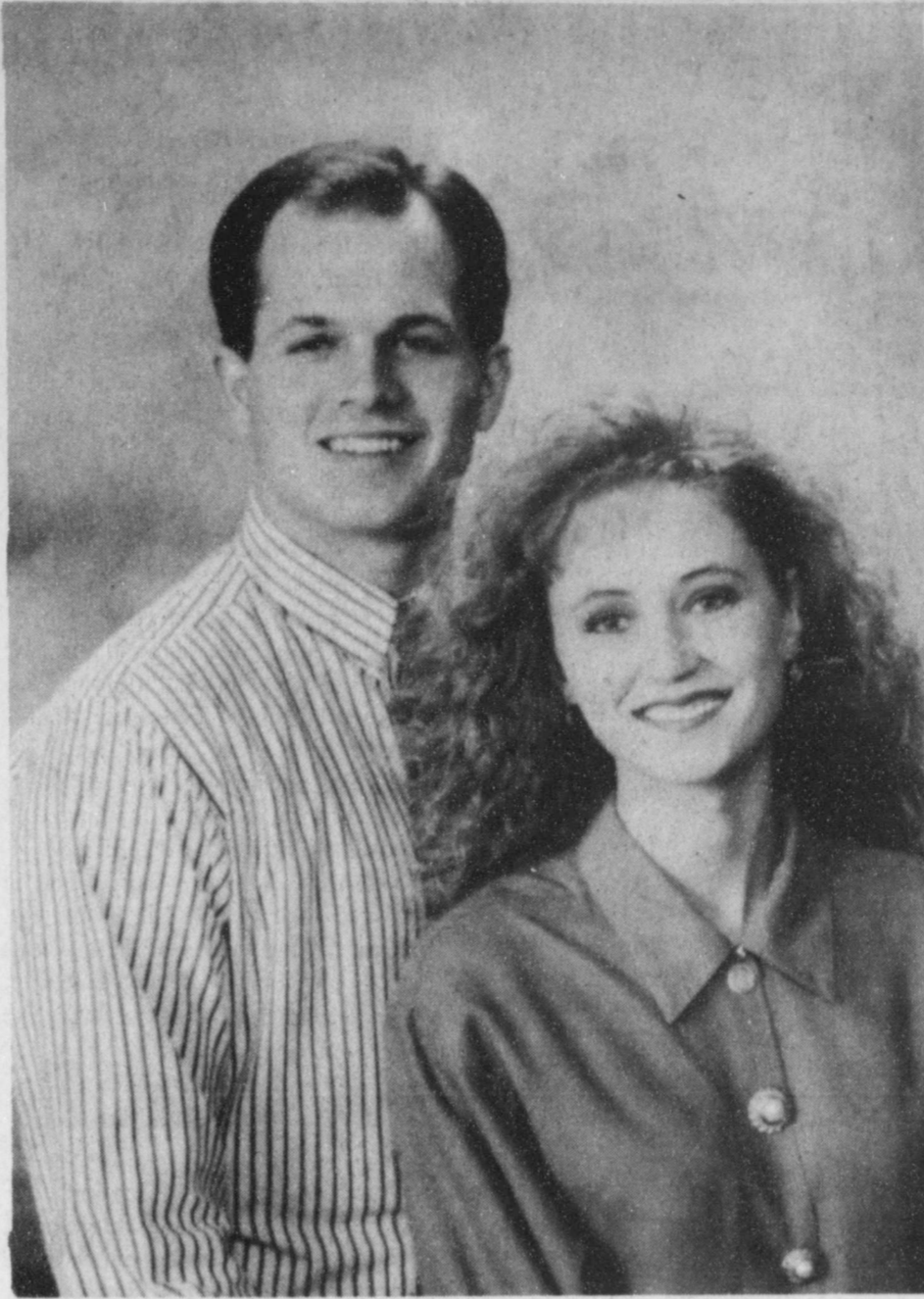

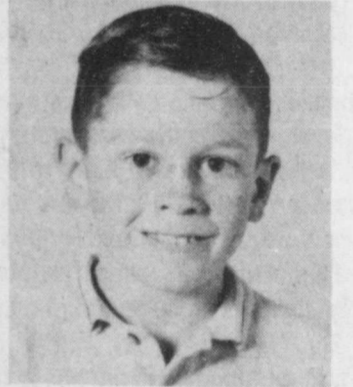



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The American Heart Association offers facts on high blood pressure

What is blood pressure? Blood pressure is the force created by the heart as it pushes blood into the arteries and through the circulatory system.

How is blood pressure measured? Blood pressure is measured by a quick painless test using a medical instrument. A rubber cuff is wrapped around the upper arm and inflated. When the cuff is inflated it compresses a large artery in the arm, momentarily stopping the flow of blood.

Why is high blood pressure bad? Elevated blood pressure indicates that the heart is working harder than normal, putting the heart and arteries under a greater strain. This may contribute to heart attacks and strokes. If high blood pressure is not treated, the heart has to work harder to pump enough blood and oxygen to the body's organs and tissues to meet their needs.

What causes high blood pressure? In 90-95 percent of high blood pressure the cause is unknown. (This type of high blood pressure is called "essential hypertension.") Fortunately, even though scientists don't fully understand the causes of high blood pressure, they have developed drugs that are effective over the long term in treating this disease.

What factors contribute to high blood pressure? Because medical science doesn't understand the causes of high blood pressure, it's hard to say how to prevent it. Nonetheless, several factors may contribute to it. Being overweight or using salt are two avoidable factors; age and heredity are not.

Do I have to take blood pressure pills

if I watch my weight and my salt and alcohol intake? If you take blood pressure pills, lose weight if you are overweight, and cut down on salt and alcohol, you will control your blood pressure even better. However, you should not cut back on your pills unless your doctor tells you. Even if your doctor says you are able to reduce or stop your pills, you should continue to take steps that can keep your blood pressure in a normal range. You can do this by keeping your weight under control, exercising regularly, reducing the salt you eat, and limiting the alcohol you drink.

Does high blood pressure go away? No, if you have high blood pressure, it must be treated for life. It does not go away, but it can be controlled. You may be able to bring your blood pressure into the normal range (less than 140/90 millimeters high) by losing weight and alcohol.

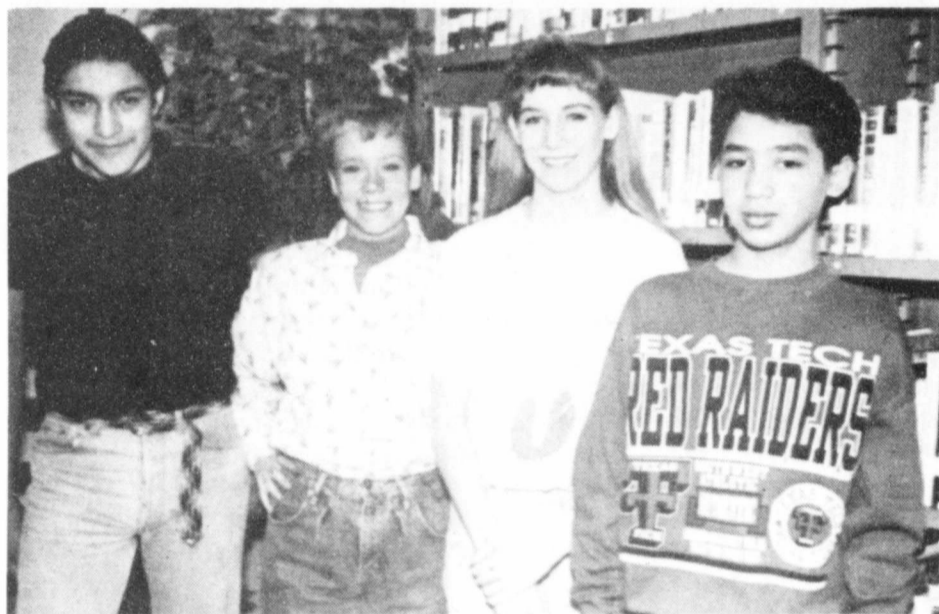

Ranch has a bright future ahead of himself.

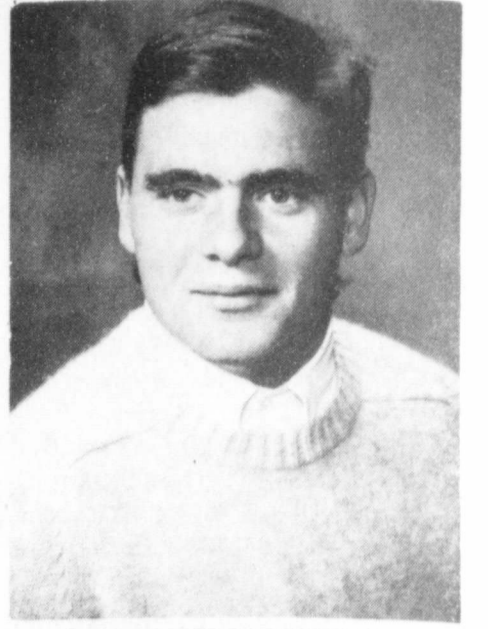

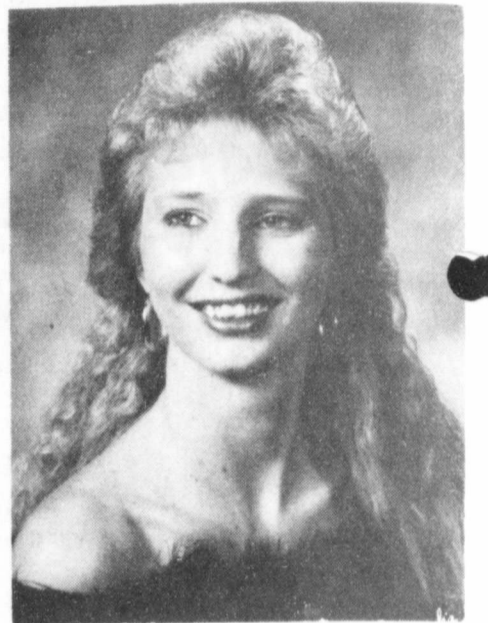
In the future Dana plans to go to Jessie Lee's to get her license in hair and nails. She also plans to get married and have at least two kids.

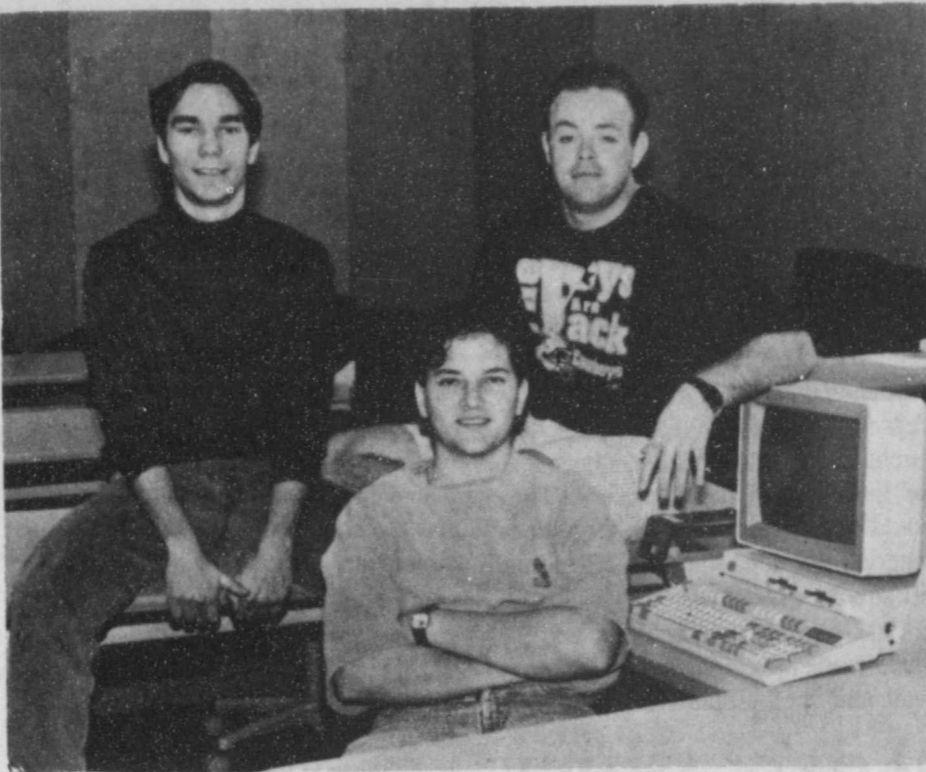

LHS computer team advances to state

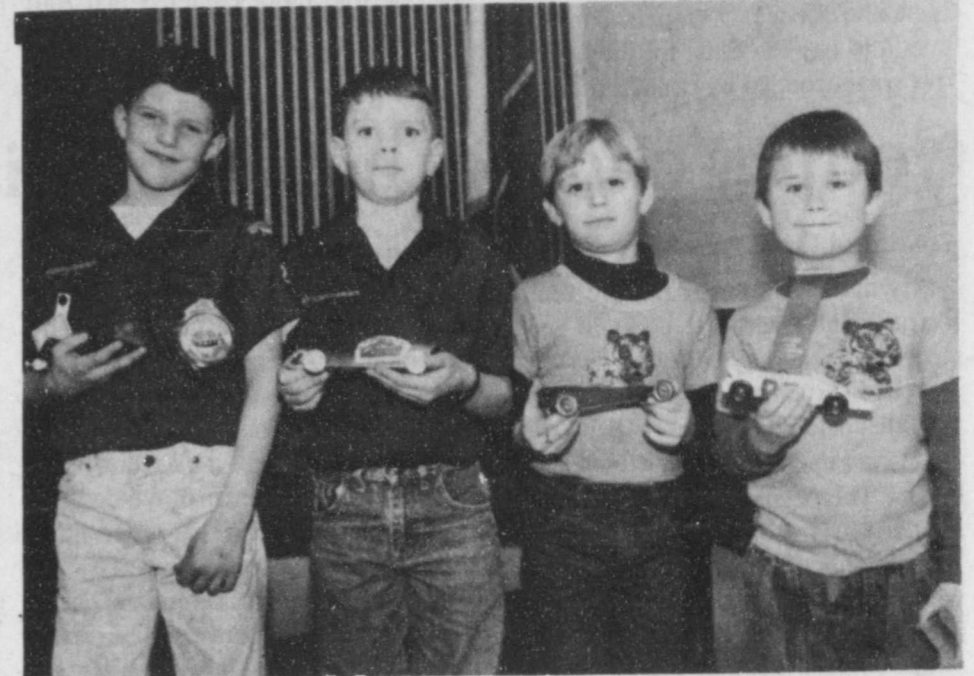

Jessie and Irene Garza were voted to be on the fair board. The next meeting of the fair board will be on February 17 at 7:00 in the ag building.



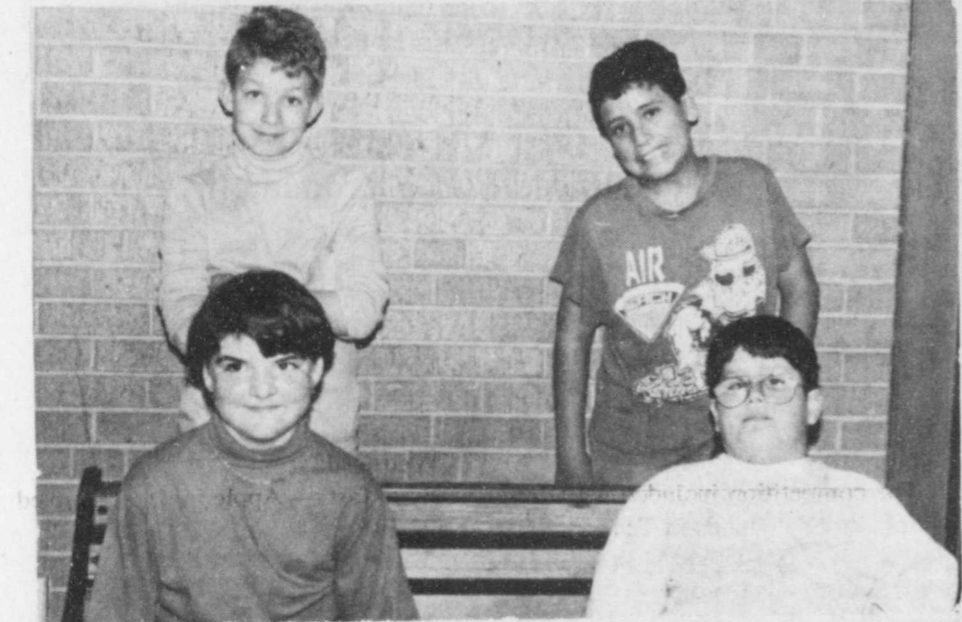

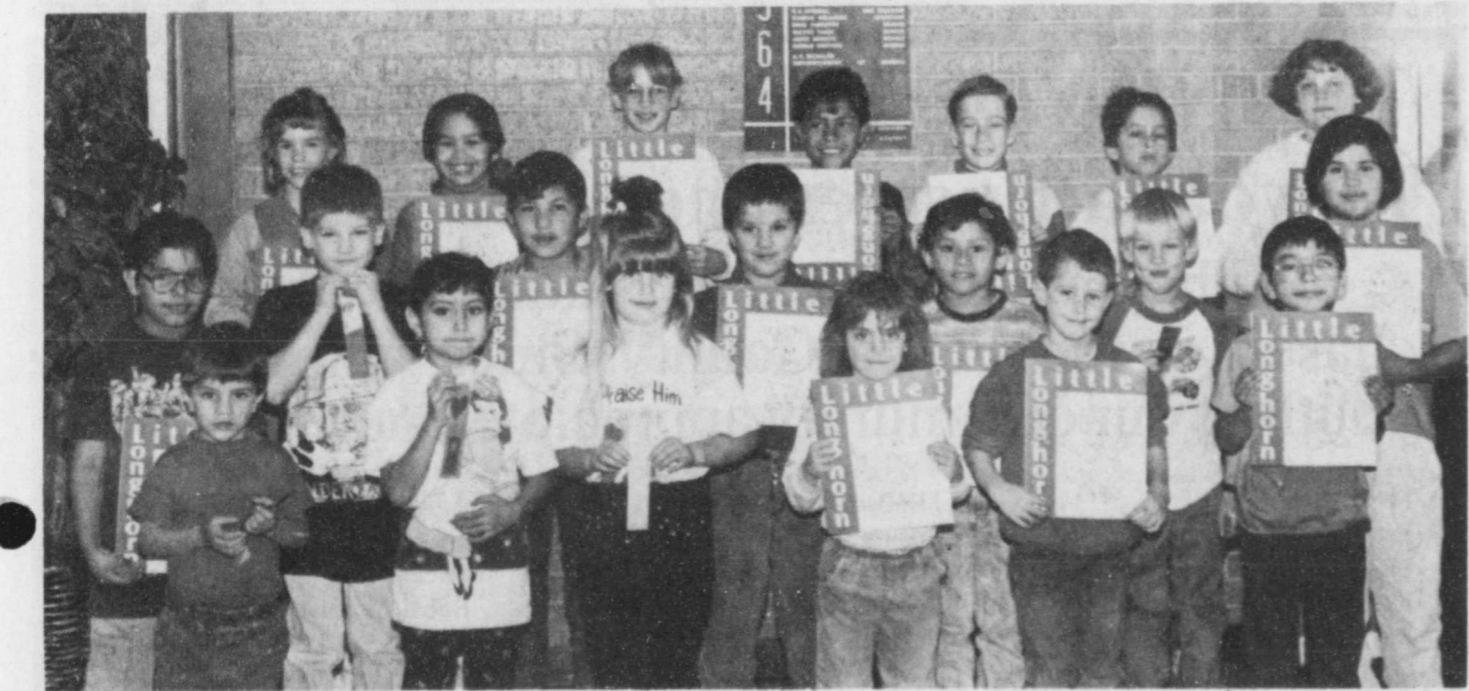

Lockney City Council gathers for February meeting

Lockney city council members were given a brief report on the status of pending litigation concerning the election of council members. Attorney Paul Lyle told the group that he had no news to report at this time. He assured the council that spring elections will not be affected by the on-going lawsuit.

Lyle also read the minutes of the previous meeting to begin the monthly council session on Thursday, February 4. The minutes were approved as read. Council member J. D. Copeland made a motion to pay the bills for the month. This was seconded by council member

Sam Fortenberry and passed by unanimous vote of the council. Councilmen reviewed and approved the monthly financial statements for the city before moving on to other business.

RAILROAD RIGHT OF WAY

Mayor Kenneth Wofford reported to the council concerning a previously discussed subject, the possibility of purchasing the right of way along the abandoned railroad line through Lockney. He told those gathered that Rail Property Management out of Chicago has acquired the property for disposal. Mayor Wofford said that he had met

with Bill Fowler, a representative of the company and learned that the asking price for the land, a 300 foot wide strip through town, was placed at "\$400.00 or \$500.00" per acre and that the plot is estimated to contain about 40 acres.

Council members agreed that the only areas the city might be interested in purchasing would be those adjacent to the landfill and the cemetery. They would like to use the railway road bed materials for repairing city alleys and dirt streets. All concurred that the current asking price is unrealistic and the council took no action, opting to adopt a "wait and see" attitude at the present

time.

STREET LIGHT AND SIGN

A motion was made by council member Fortenberry that the city install a street light on the northeast corner of the intersection of 6th and Bryant streets. His motion was in response to a request by Martha Mangold. Councilman Gary Marr seconded the motion and the council approved it by unanimous vote.

Alderman Bil Anderson made a motion for the installation of a sign designating the building under the water tower as the Police Department. Fortenberry seconded and the measure passed by unanimous vote. Police Chief Lennie Gilroy will be instructed to obtain a sign and have it installed to identify the location of his department.

The police department was also the subject of a motion by Fortenberry which was seconded by Marr. Chief Gilroy has been lent a computer by the district attorney's office and the motion was to allow him to purchase software to run police programs on the machine. The cost of the software was estimated at around \$200.00.

REQUEST TO PARK TRAILER

A request for a variance allowing Virgil Grant to move a trailer house into the city was granted by unanimous vote on a motion by Fortenberry with a second by Anderson. Grant will be parking the mobile home next to the Blondie Mathis residence on St. Joseph Street. According to city secretary Charlotte Hooten, the trailer house has been inspected by Dickie McCarty and has been passed. Grant must skirt and properly anchor the mobile home to comply with city regulations.

DORSEY BAKER MAKES OFFER ON TAX LOTS

A bid from Dorsey Baker for the purchase of two sheriff sale tax lots was considered by the council at the Thursday morning meeting. Baker had submitted a bid of \$250.00 on each of two lots (Original Addition, Block 2, Lot 5 and Brewster 1 Addition, Block 39, Lot 10). Hooten told the council that he had called back and said to change his bids to \$1.00 per lot. The lot in the Original Addition is located to the south of the old post office and the Brewster 1 Addition lot is the area downtown which is now devoted to the Wall of Pride project.

Both lots belong to all of the involved taxing entities and any disposition of the lots must be approved by all of the

taxing entities said Lyle. Council members took no action concerning the bid.

OTHER MATTERS

Mayor Wofford brought to the council's attention the fact that local cable TV rates would be going up in March. He told the council, "I just wanted to make sure you were all aware of it in case someone asks you about it. Our franchise agreement with the cable TV doesn't allow us to control rate increases."

Wofford also told council members of a recent meeting he had attended with Floydada and county officials. A representative of Alternative Resources spoke to the meeting, discussing possibilities for forming a corporation dedicated to securing grant funding for local government projects such as water and sewer renovations.

Lockney council members were receptive to a proposed joint meeting between officials of the two Floyd County cities and county officials to learn more about the service offered by the firm. Stated Mayor Wofford, "Floydada has been awful good to work with us and I feel like we owe them the courtesy of listening to the proposal."

Council members presented department reports. No one had a specific report to give, but councilman J. D. Copeland asked that the city check into having a controlled burn to rid the old landfill of weeds and keep them from blowing over into the cemetery. Alderman Marr told the council that Dickie's pickup is working better after getting the transmission replaced. He also said that the compressor and muffler are yet to be

replaced. Council member Terry Jones told the council that Police Chief Gilroy had recommended speed bumps to control traffic on Main Street in the area of the hospital. Council members agreed to allow Gilroy to handle the installation of speed bumps and the necessary warning signs and street painting to get the project completed.

Anderson had no report on the farm, but Jones told him that Kenny Hooten had indicated the sewer pits would need to be dredged out soon. Fortenberry had no report from the fire department.

Attending the session were Mayor Kenneth Wofford, council members Sam Fortenberry, J. D. Copeland, Gary Marr, Bil Anderson and Terry Jones, city secretary Charlotte Hooten, city attorney Paul Lyle and the Hesperian-Beacon reporter.

Courtroom Activities

In county court, February 5, Fernando Gonzales was charged with driving while his license was suspended. There was no disposition on this case.

Also on February 5, Carmen Suarez, 70, of Floydada, was charged with DWI. There was no disposition on this case.

F.L. Williams, 52, of Floydada, was charged with DWI and unlawfully carrying a handgun. There was no disposition on these cases.

February 8 Richard Stroud filed a speeding appeal. There was no disposition on this case.

County chooses new financial depository

Floydada EMS paramedic Paul McIntosh met with the court to seek reimbursement payment for gas and associated expenses incurred by himself and other paramedics when called to the county jail to assess or minister to a jail inmate. This occurs on an infrequent but regular basis according to McIntosh. When an inmate is injured or becomes ill while incarcerated at the jail, one of the paramedics is called to check out the situation and contact physicians at Lockney General Hospital for instructions as to the care to be provided or the action to be taken said McIntosh. If medication is prescribed, the paramedic goes to pick it up and returns to administer it to the inmate according to McIntosh.

McIntosh asked that the court reimburse the paramedics \$5.00 for such visits. He reminded the court that this type of service to the jail saves the county the cost of an office visit or a trip to the emergency room as well as making it unnecessary to utilize a deputy to transport an inmate to medical care and avoids the possibility of an inmate escaping. The service is available to the jail on a twenty-four hour basis said McIntosh.

The court was told that the request had first been made to Floydada EMS but had been denied, with the EMS stating that the county should provide the reimbursement.

County Judge Bill Hardin made the motion to approve payment in the amount of \$5.00 for paramedics service at the local jail. Bearden seconded the motion and the vote was unanimous. The court commended McIntosh for the dedication and service the paramedics provide, not only to the jail but throughout the community. The commissioners also had favorable comments concerning the money the service saves for the county. McIntosh was instructed to submit a bill at the end of each month detailing the jail visits and requesting reimbursement.

PARTICIPATION APPROVED

The court approved a resolution authorizing the county to participate in the

1993 Performance Rewards Program under the auspices of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice under the Community Justice Assistance Program. The approval would extend the current participation for another year.

Nathan Mulder serves as the fiscal officer for the program in Floyd County.

The program administers alternative forms of criminal punishment allowing an offender to remain at home and on the job instead of being sent to a state prison facility. This is designed to allow selected offenders to remain a productive part of the community during rehabilitation rather than being sent away and creating additional costs for taxpayer.

Motion to participate was made by Precinct 2 Commissioner Floyd Jackson and seconded by Bearden. Vote on the matter was unanimous.

Commissioners also voted to pay \$40.00 membership dues and join the Panhandle County Judges and Commissioners Association. The court will then be eligible to attend training sessions in the panhandle area instead of having to travel to Austin or College Station for the training. Motion for this was made by Precinct 3 Commissioner George Taylor and seconded by Jackson.

RIGHT-OF-WAY REQUESTS CONSIDERED BY COURT

A request from Cimmaron Land Services to allow Westar Transmission Company to install a cable along a county right-of-way in Precinct 1 was considered. The cable will be a low voltage electric line to disburse static buildup in the company's gas lines. Costs of the installation will be the responsibility of the company. Approval for the installation was unanimous on a motion by Bearden with a second by Bishop.

The court also considered and approved a request from F. L. Montandon that he be allowed to install an electric cable across a dirt road 1/4 mile west of Aiken. Montandon indicated that the cable will connect to SPS and operate a pivot irrigation system. He would pay all associated costs for the installation. Court approval was unanimously made on a motion by Jackson with a second by

Taylor.

PERSONNEL MATTERS

A motion by commissioner Bearden, seconded by Jackson, was unanimously approved the renewed deputation of sheriff's deputy Pam Meador, reserve deputy Lance Poole and tax assessor/collector's deputies Isabel Pena and Chris Taylor. The court also unanimously approved payment to custodial worker Leo Cisneros for six days vacation for 1992 in lieu of time off. Cisneros will be paid \$6.50 per hour for the time rather than taking six days off. Motion for this action was made by Bearden and seconded by Bishop.

Selection of a public members for a county grievance committee began again after Judge Hardin reported that only one of the names drawn for participation at last month's meeting had accepted the task. The others refused. Four more names were drawn and will be contacted to see if they will accept the appointment. This committee is designated to settle salary disputes for county employees.

OTHER MATTERS

Among the other items on the agenda was the payment of monthly bills and approval of budget amendments to transfer monies between designated budgeting accounts. Monthly financial reports submitted by elected official whose offices collect fines and fees were reviewed by the court and treasurer Glenna Orman presented her financial report for the previous month.

She told the court that the county began the month of January with \$300,634.84 in county coffers. Receipts for the month totaled \$167,094.38 and transfers between accounts were \$165,015.87. Disbursements, according to her figures, totaled \$221,648.47, leaving \$246,080.75 in county funds at the end of January.

Orman also reported \$375,000.00 in certificates of deposit which have earned \$3,146.81 in interest to date. Installment indebtedness at this time for the county is \$1,672.37 stated Orman.

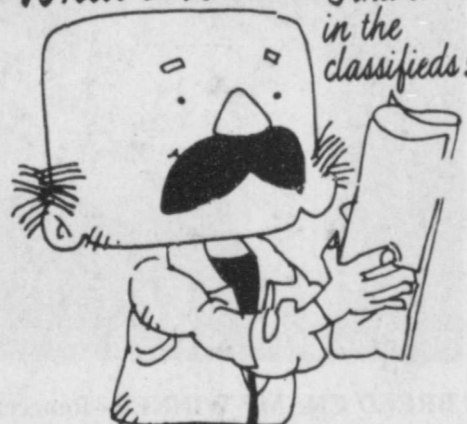

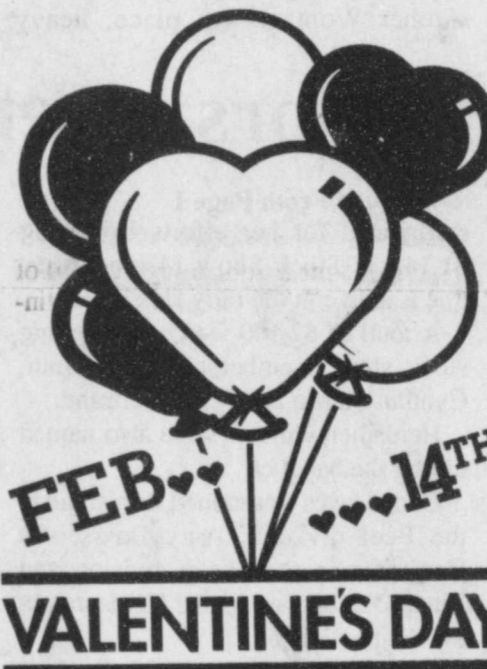

Center pivot sprinkler system purchase needs careful planning and decision making

"Buying center-pivot sprinklers for South Plains farms requires planning and careful decision making," says Robert Powers, soil conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Plainview.

Pivot sprinklers are popular for two reasons, to save labor and to conserve water, Powers added.

"Low energy, precision application package sprinklers are in great demand now," Powers says. "These are called LEPA systems."

However, LEPA is a combination of irrigation, tillage and management to save both water and energy. Energy is both fuel and labor.

To be a truly LEPA system, about eight components must be implemented with pivot sprinklers, Powers says.

"First, the nozzles must discharge water in single furrows on or very near the soil surface to minimize evaporation losses," Powers says.

Next, the discharge devices are positioned equidistance from each crop plant and with equal application time for each plant. This is essential for uniformity of crop growth and yield opportunity.

Also, zero irrigation water is lost with runoff from LEPA system fields. This is part of the precision application, Powers added.

"Rainfall retention and infiltration are most important in LEPA tillage and management," Powers says. "Soft fur-

row chiseling and furrow diking are used for this part."

A circular row pattern is nearly essential on flat land to further increase water infiltration. However, successful LEPA systems are being used on terraced slopes, Powers added.

"Terraces will still hold rainfall and reduce water erosion on sloping fields," Powers says. "And hold irrigation water, also."

Another part is wheel traffic control. Keep tractors, gage wheels, harvesters and sprinkler tower tracks in the same "hard" furrows when ever possible, Powers says. This will minimize soil compaction, thereby increasing both rainfall and irrigation water infiltration results.

The sprinkler should have drive towers spaced on even multiples of both row width and equipment width.

The most adaptable span width is 160-ft, because it fits the most combinations of equipment sizes and row widths used locally, Powers added.

The water application devices, call them nozzles or bubblers, should not cause water damage to soil surface. It must operate uniformly through variation in elevation and water pressure.

The devices need to have spray pattern modes, chemigation capability and have a narrow profile.

"These five features of application devices give good results and provide flexible uses for sprinkler systems," Powers says.

Lastly, the total LEPA system must have thorough operation and management by the producer. Good irrigation timing and proper amounts applied are essential.

"The best planned LEPA system will not make up for improper operations," Powers says.

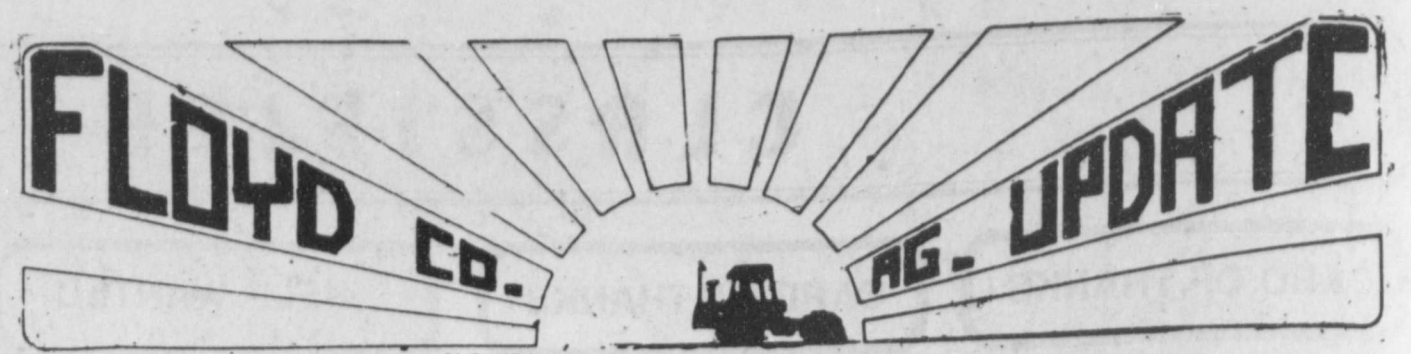
Agriculture is big business in Texas

The Texas agriculture industry is as diverse as the land that produces the state's abundant supply of food and fiber, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said. From the citrus groves in the Rio Grande Valley to the cotton fields on the High Plains, Texas farmers and ranchers are working hard to make the state a leader in American agricultural production.

* Texas leads the nation in Upland

cotton production and during 1991 produced 4.75 million bales, 28 percent of the total U.S. crop. That was enough cotton to make 1.6 billion pairs of jeans!

* Texas also ranks number one in the nation in the total number of cattle and calves (13.6 million head); all sheep and lambs (2.14 million head); and all goats (2 million head). If combined, these livestock inventories would be the third most populous state in the nation.



Morris places second in contest

LOCKNEY — Lyndon Morris of Lockney, has been named second place winner in the soybeans category of the SMART (Smart Marketing Adds Rewards Today) marketing contest sponsored by *Successful Farming* magazine, the Chicago Mercantile Exchange and the Chicago Board of Trade.

More than 1,000 farmers from across the country took part in the 6 1/2 month long contest that offered a hands-on

opportunity to learn how futures and options can be used to manage price risk.

The SMART contest worked like this: Every farmer-contestant was given two fictitious futures contracts each of corn, wheat, soybeans, hogs, cattle and feeder cattle. From last March through October, contestants marketed their commodities via postcard to *Successful Farming*, receiving prices from the real

futures market at the Chicago Board of Trade and the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. Winners were determined by the highest selling price in each of the six commodities, and the grand-prize winner was determined by the combined selling price of all six commodities.

As the second place winner in the soybeans category, Morris won a subscription discount on the FarmData2 network system.

Most SMART winners followed seasonal trends. Top corn, soybean and wheat prices all came in a three day window in early June; cattle and feeder cattle peaked in mid September. Hog prices held up stronger than expected in the fall, with the best October futures price actually occurring on the last day of the contest; 40 contestants were SMART enough to wait for it. The 40-way tie was broken by selecting the contestant who was the best overall marketer.

Because no real money was on the line, SMART provided a no-risk way to learn about futures. "Farmers have traditionally been skeptical of futures markets, but SMART offered a risk-free and fun way to sharpen their marketing skills," says Gene Johnston, managing editor of *Successful Farming*. "We're hoping to do it again sometime in the

Destroying habitat reduces insects

Certain crop pests overwinter in the soil. This allows producers the opportunity to manipulate the overwintering habitats of these insects, and thus greatly reduce survival and subsequent emergence of these pest populations the following spring.

Southwestern corn borer larvae overwinter in the stalk base or root crown, insulated by a frass plug and by the surrounding soil. Destruction of overwintering habitat of southwestern corn borers is a very important cultural IPM practice for reducing damage from this insect to High Plains corn. This habitat destruction can be accomplished either by disking or by shredding stalks near enough to ground level so as to remove the plugs from the end of the girdled stalks, thus allowing greater exposure of the insects to the winter elements. Shredding of stalks could be used in conjunction with minimum tillage practices so that overwintering corn borer populations might still be reduced without plowing. Populations are most ef-

fectively reduced when stalks are plowed before mid-February.

Cotton bollworms overwinter in the soil in the pupal stage. Greater winter survival of bollworms has been noted in conservation tillage and no-till fields than in conventionally tilled fields. It is important to realize that bollworm populations can migrate into our area, thus allowing potential for heavy bollworm pressure regardless of the number of bollworms that successfully overwinter in our area. However, research has indicated that even moderate soil tillage results in a high level of winter mortality for overwintering bollworms. Therefore, overwintering bollworm survival can be effectively reduced, even in conservation tillage systems.

Different species of aphids are identified

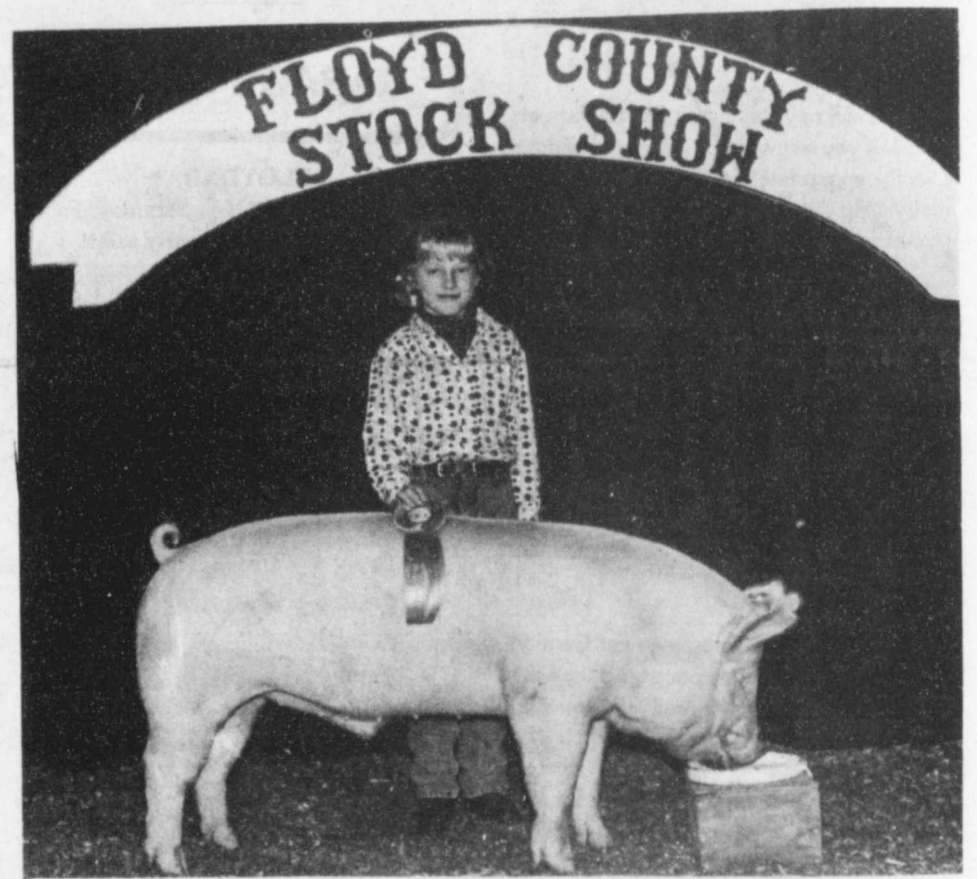
Several species of aphids can attack wheat. Wheat producers should be able to determine different species, and should be aware of the differences in the damage they can cause.

Greenbugs are pale green, approximately 1/16-inch long, and have a characteristic dark green stripe running lengthwise down the center of the back. The tips of the feet, antennae, and cornicles (tailpipes) are black. They can develop in large numbers under favorable conditions and may cause economic losses. Greenbugs inject a toxin while feeding that causes red spotting, and an eventual yellowing of leaf tissue.

The first appearance of the Russian Wheat Aphid (RWA) in the U.S. occurred in March, 1986 in the Texas High Plains. It has since extended its range throughout the Great Plains, into Canada and west to California. The RWA is relatively small, lime-green in color, with an elongated, spindle-shaped body. It is easily distinguished from other aphids by relatively short antennae, a projection above the cauda (tail) which gives it a "double tail" appearance when viewed from the side, and the absence of prominent cornicles. The RWA injects a potent toxin into the plant. Injured plants exhibit white or purple longitudinal streaks. Flattened plants and tightly rolled leaves are additional symptoms of RWA feeding damage. They exist in higher numbers and cause more damage in small grains that are stressed.

Bird cherry-oat aphids are particularly abundant on small grains in Texas. They are yellowish-green and characterized by a normally prominent reddish-orange spot on the back end. This aphid often occurs during the time greenbugs may be present. Control of the bird cherry-oat aphid is seldom required.

English grain aphids are green to bright green in color with black legs and antennae. This aphid can cause crop damage, but economic yield losses seldom can be attributed to the English grain aphid.
