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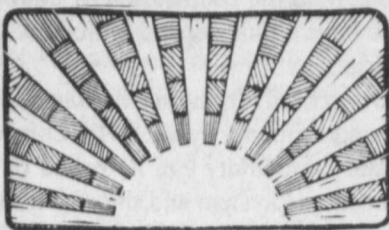

Athena's sponsoring pre-school clinic

The 43rd annual pre-school clinic, sponsored by the Athena Study Club of Lockney, will be held Thursday, April 15, 1993, from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. at the Lockney Elementary School Cafeteria.

The purpose of the annual event is to pre-register youngsters who will enter the Lockney School System for the first time in August 1993. Included in this category are children who will reach their fifth birthday on or before September 1, 1993, and who are attending school for the first time. Also children

who are six years old and who have never attended school previously, should be at this clinic.

As in the past children will receive a physical examination, vision screening, dental exam, and speech screening. Conducting the checkups will be Dr. Gary Mangold, Dr. Kevin Stennett, and Dr. Kevin Stuart. Dr. Stewart Webb will conduct the vision screening. Karen Quebe will hold the speech screening.

It is expected that regular immunization will be available.

The entire clinic is free to all those who have children who will be entering Lockney Schools in August 1993.

Commissioners hire new extension agent

Floyd County Commissioners met in special session on Friday, April 2, to hear a recommendation from Bob Robinson, District Director with Texas A & M Extension Service. Robinson brought with him Kerry Siders, whom the service has supported for the new county ag extension agent.

Motion to accept the recommendation and employ Siders came from Precinct 4 Commissioner Howard Bishop. The motion was seconded by Precinct 2 Commissioner Floyd Jackson. The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion with Bishop, Jackson and Precinct 3 Commissioner George Taylor voting in favor. Precinct 1 Commissioner Connie Bearden was not at the session.

Siders comes to Floyd County from Dimmitt and will be starting his new job

on April 15.

According to Judge Bill Hardin, four farm work contracts were approved by the court on a motion by Taylor with a second by Bishop. They were for: Ruby Muncy Trust by Mark Gilly; J.P. Taylor Partnership by Joe Taylor; Lorilla Bradley; and Barbara Barnard by Lyle Miller.

The subject of a special prosecutor to serve as county prosecuting attorney was discussed by the court during the Friday afternoon session. No action was taken on the matter.

A motion by Bishop, seconded by Jackson, gave Patterson Grain Company permission to cross a county road with a water line. The vote was unanimously in favor and all costs will be the responsibility of Patterson Grain Company.

The City of Floydada will officially dedicate the new baseball field in Floydada Park to the memory of Preston Watson on Tuesday, April 13, at 5:00 p.m.

This short ceremony will take place prior to the start of the Whirlwinds' first district home game this season.

April 6. Nine of the indictments were sealed.

James Oliver, 19, of Plainview, for the third degree felony of theft over \$750.00. The offense occurred on February 12, 1993;

Floydada resident arrested following weekend shooting

A Floydada man Robert "Babe" Jones, 57, was arrested Wednesday morning in connection with the Saturday night shooting of Ernie Torrez Jr., 32, of Floydada.

Floyd County Deputies were called to W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital in Lockney, April 3, at 7:18 p.m., in reference to a gunshot victim. Deputy Kyle Adams and Deputy Greg Pierce responded to the call and spoke to Ernie Torrez Jr.

Torrez told the deputies that he had been shot while sitting in his parked pickup, one mile north of Floydada.

According to Sheriff Charlie Overstreet, "The deputies were told that Torrez was shot with a rifle. It appears that the bullet traveled through the tailgate, through the back of the cab and fragmented inside. Two large fragments entered Torrez's left leg."

Jones has been charged with Attempted Murder and Unlawful Carrying of a Weapon.

"It's like walking through a spring garden," remarked one viewer as she looked carefully at the floral paintings on display at The First National Bank of Floydada. The watercolors are the work of Lubbock artist, Siva V. Chambers, who has displayed her paintings several times in past years.

Born in Bangkok, Thailand, Siva Chambers portrays in her work the beauty of nature and a love for all of creation. Through meticulous attention to detail, she exhibits the respect that she has for the colors, the formation, the purpose of nature's abundant beauty.

At an early age, Siva recognized her desire for artistic expression. She received training from various places and sources, beginning with the traditional brush and watercolor painting from Professor T.C. Pai in Tainan.

"Watercolor is my favorite medium because it gives endless and intriguing results. Most of my paintings are landscapes, flowers, an occasional bird or small creature because I am influenced and inspired by the wonder and phenomena of nature," said the artist.

Floydada Police Report

Floydada Police Chief James Hale reports that police have solved the burglary of the Junior High which occurred on March 23. "It involved one adult and three juveniles. All of the property has been recovered."

"During the investigation of this burglary, the burglary of the Junior High and R.C. Andrews which occurred in January 1993, was also cleared. One adult was charged by grand jurors in a sealed indictment, Tuesday April 6.

Police also cleared another burglary on March 30, which had occurred on March 21 at a residence in the 700 block of S. Wall. "Three juveniles—possibly 4 were involved in that burglary," said Hale. "Some items have been recovered and the juveniles have been turned over to juvenile authorities."

March 24, police received a report of a 16" BMX neon green bicycle stolen from a residence in the 400 block of W. Kentucky. The value of the bike was placed at approximately \$45.00.

March 26, at 3:30 p.m., a teacher at Floydada High School discovered a tire had been cut on her vehicle. The damage is estimated at \$125.00.

At 11:15 p.m., March 26, police received a report of another tire being cut. The vehicle had been parked at the Massie Activity Center.

March 27, a report was taken of four

fluorescent lights being broken at the Pizza Gold. The lights were on the outside of the building.

March 28, Floydada Police arrested Rose Ann Deltoro, 32, of Floydada, for Disorderly Conduct by fighting. Police had been called to a disturbance between two juveniles, at approximately 9:15 p.m. The juveniles were given citations and Deltoro was arrested.

Also on March 28, at 3:17 a.m. Sostenes Velasquez, 63, of Floydada, was arrested for public intoxication. Velasquez was seen driving a three wheel bike south on S. Main and according to police, "he was having a hard time staying up on the bike."

Police took a family violence report, March 28, at approximately 12:00 midnight, from a woman who told police her husband had assaulted her. Adrian Luna, 31, of Floydada, was arrested and charged with assault.

Floydada police were called to the Junior High School, March 29, in regard to two juvenile males fighting. Both were brought before the city judge and charged with disorderly conduct by fighting.

March 30, police charged Larry Richardson, 36, of Floydada, with theft of a video.

March 31, police were called to a disorderly conduct by fighting between

two females—one of them juvenile and the other an adult. Alicia Castaneda, 18, of Dougherty was charged with disorderly conduct by fighting and fined \$125.00.

Also on March 31, police took a report of a business located north of Floydada, on Hwy. 70 which had been burglarized. Cash and cigarette cartons were taken. The value of loss was placed at \$600.00.

April 3, Richard Billegas, 19, of Dimmitt, was arrested on warrants out of Randall County.

April 5, at 4:22 p.m. police received a report of a burglary of a building located in the 500 block of W. Virginia. Stolen from the building was wood finish stain and paint. The windows of the building were also broken. It is not known when the incident occurred.

Montford Invites Constituents to Austin for Governor Festivities

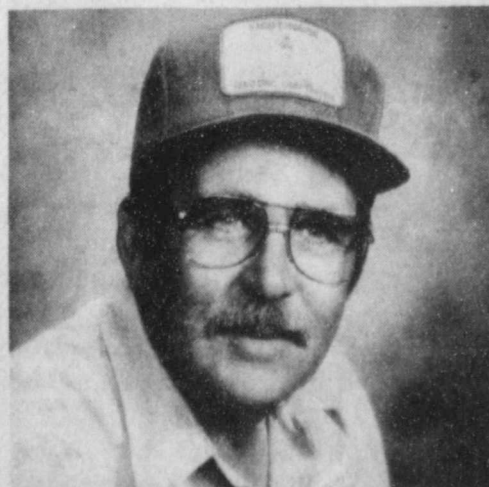

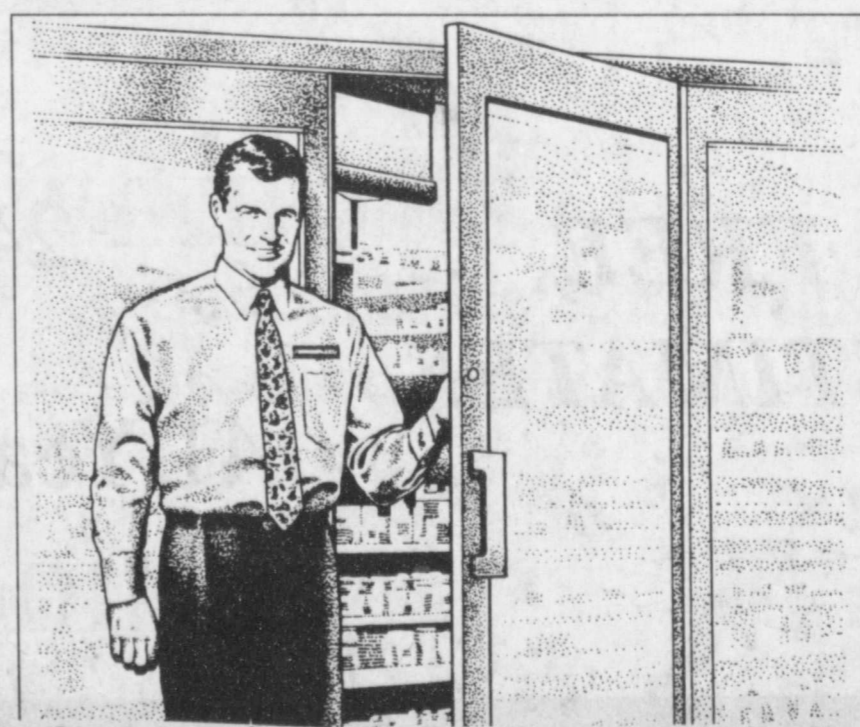

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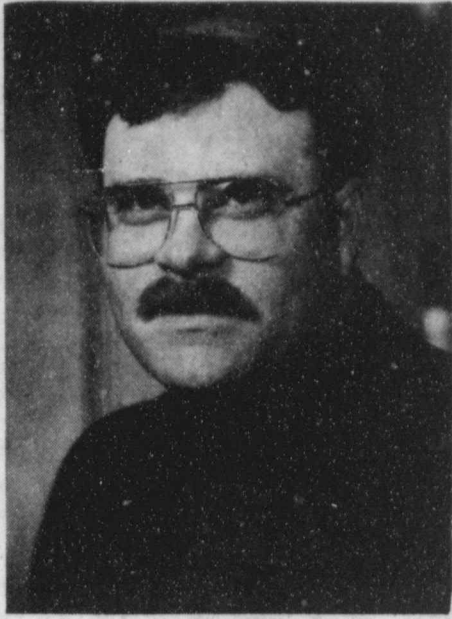

HULON CARTHEL

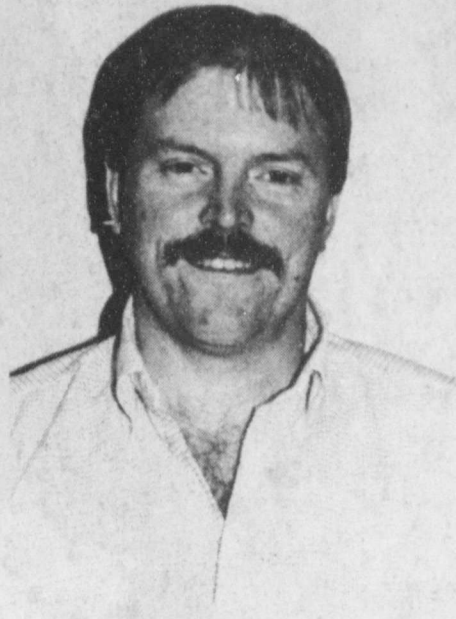

A graduate of Monterey High School, Nielson attended South Plains College. He majored in restaurant management.

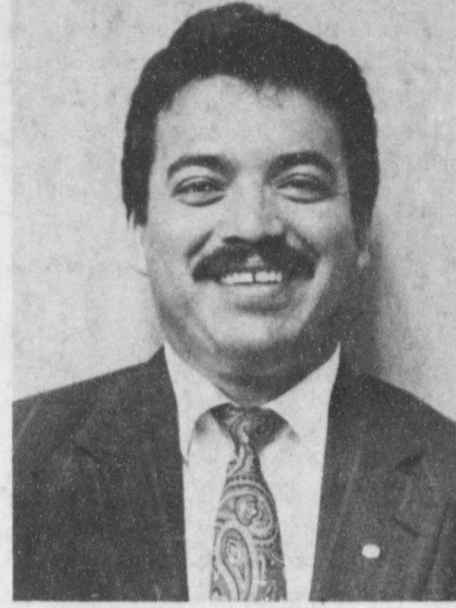
"I would like to be your next mayor and I would like to work at building a strong partnership with the entire community actively involved in making Floydada a better place to live and work," stated Nielson.

RUBEN BARRIENTOZ

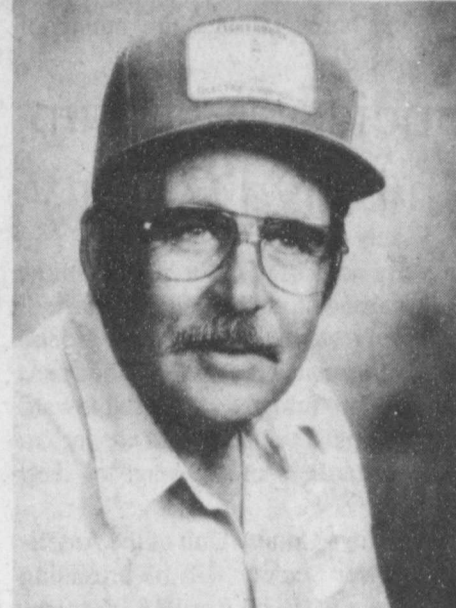

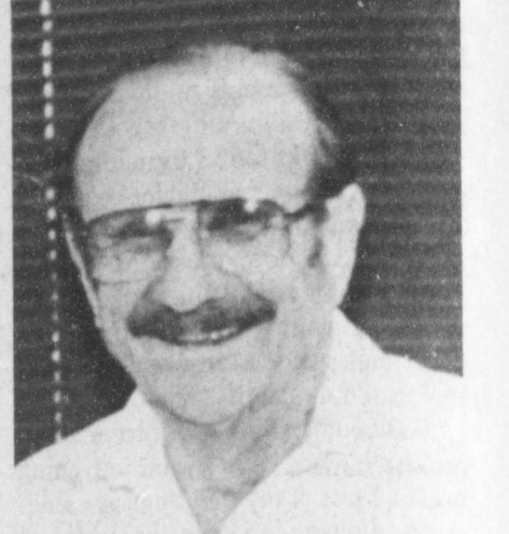

LEROY BURNS

Incumbent council member Leroy Burns is seeking reelection to his current post of city council member for District 3. He has served on the council since 1973.

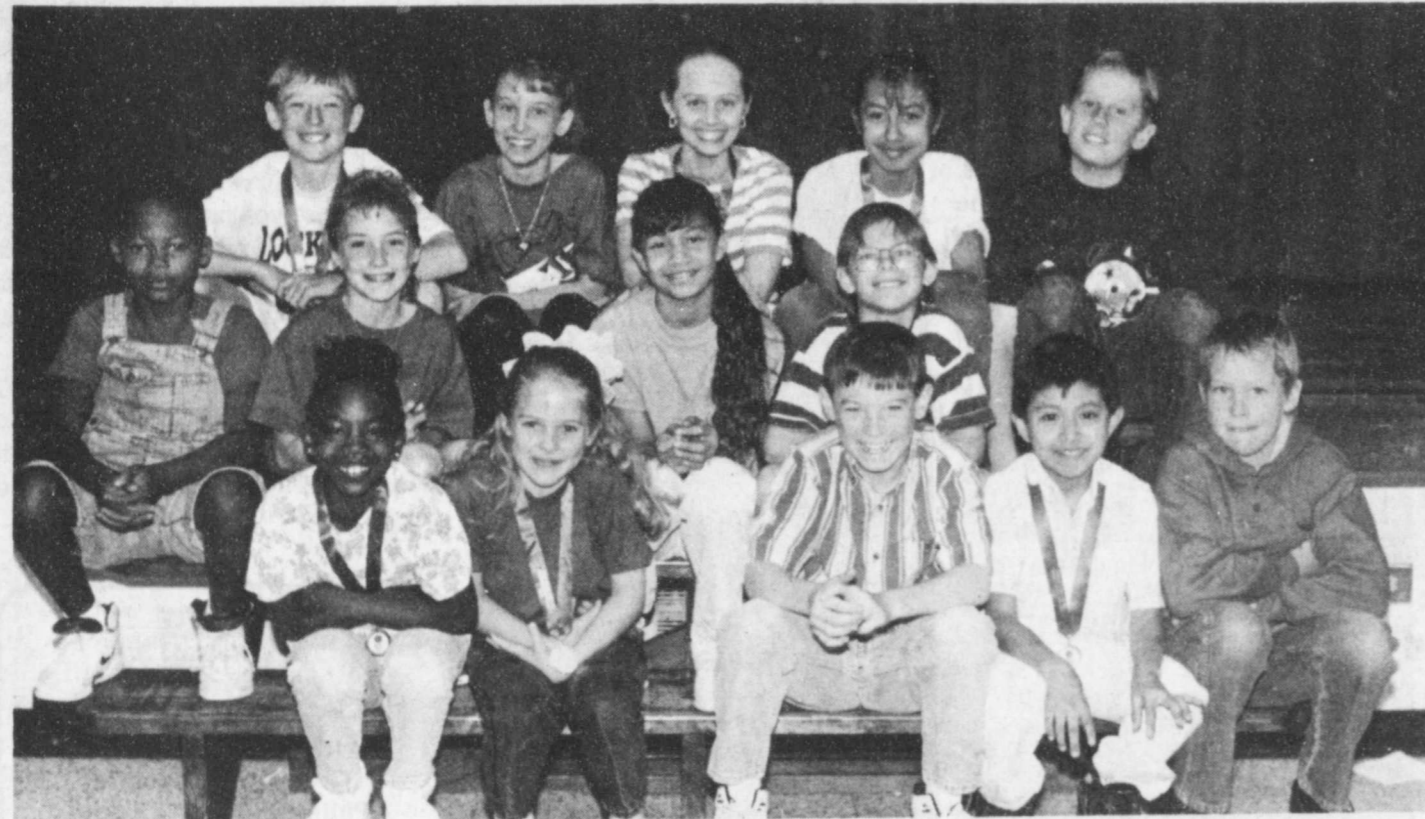

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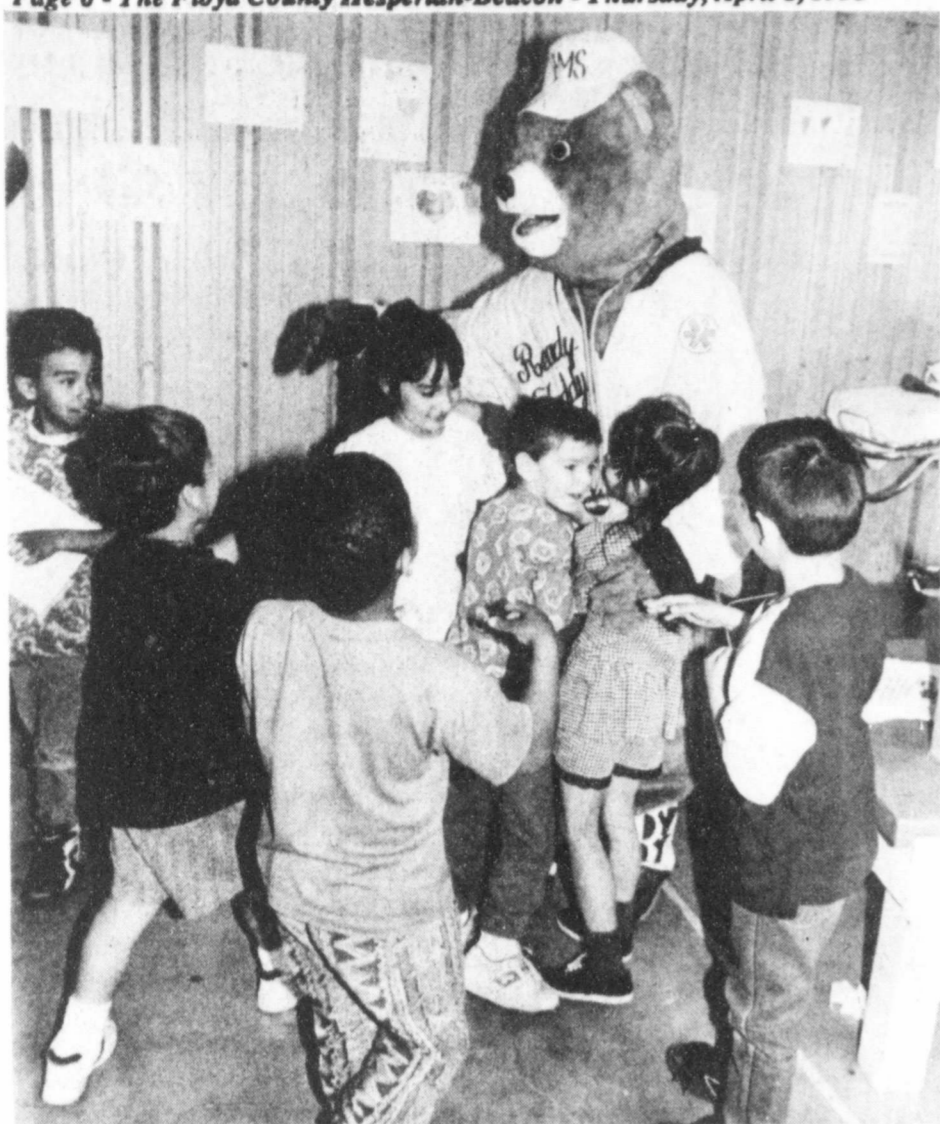

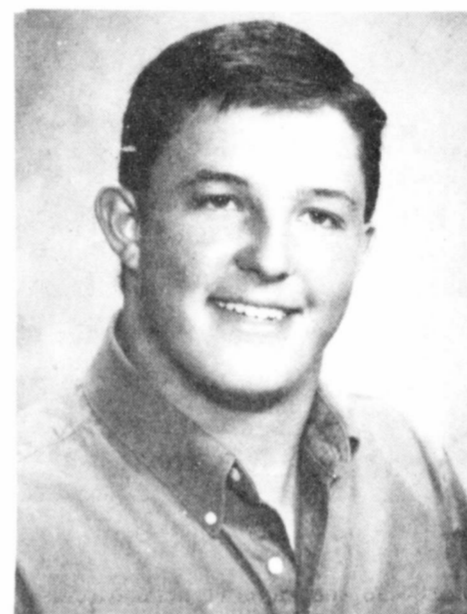

"As a board member," says Probasco, "I will do all that I can to see that FISD students have the benefit of the best education we can provide them to prepare them for life after they leave our school."

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
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Baseballers win one, lose one

Teams place in Idalou Invitational

In almost a virtual repeat of their performances at Springlake-Earth two weeks ago and at San Angelo last week, Floydada's Adam Gonzales and Scott Crader continued their 1-2 finishes in discus and shot put in area track meets at the Idalou Invitational on April 3. The Whirlwinds placed fourth overall for the team title, which was won by Brownfield.

The top five at the Idalou meet and their point output were: Brownfield 116, New Deal 87, Post 74, Floydada 71 and Lubbock Roosevelt 55.

Gonzales' toss of 53' 2-1/2" edged Crader's shot put effort of 52' 11-1/2". Shawn Hill of Lockney captured third in shot put at 50' 1-3/4". Crader reversed the finish in discus with a measurement of 156' 8" to Gonzales' 2nd place toss of 152' 11". Hill also placed third in discus with a 151' 9" effort.

The distances for Floydada's duo in discus and shot put can be compared with Kip Holt's of Canyon whose shot put effort on the same day at the Dimmitt meet was 49' 11-1/2". Another Region I rival in shot put, Crane's Cody McGuire, tossed for 46' 4" at Kermit's Permian Basin Relays. Canyon's Kip Holt tossed the discus 137' 2" at Dimmitt and McGuire had a 151' 8" effort at Kermit.

Michael Henderson won the 200 meters at Idalou with a time of 22.63 and placed second in long jump with a distance of 21' 3". District rival John Brookins of Tulia ran a 23.06 200-meters at the Dimmitt meet.

Floydada's Jason Pyle ran for second-place finishes in 110 hurdles and 300 hurdles with times of 15.81 and 42.07, respectively. Pyle also placed sixth in pole vault at 11' 6".

The Lady 'Winds fared a little better in team standings at the Idalou Invitational as they finished second with 98 points behind team champ Denver City's 133 points. Post 83, Lubbock Roosevelt 79, and Lubbock Cooper 76, were the other top girls' teams at Idalou.

Elisa Suarez placed first in long jump with a leap of 16' 0", and was an important part of the Lady 'Winds' winning 400-meter relay team. The Lady 'Winds also captured first place in the mile relay

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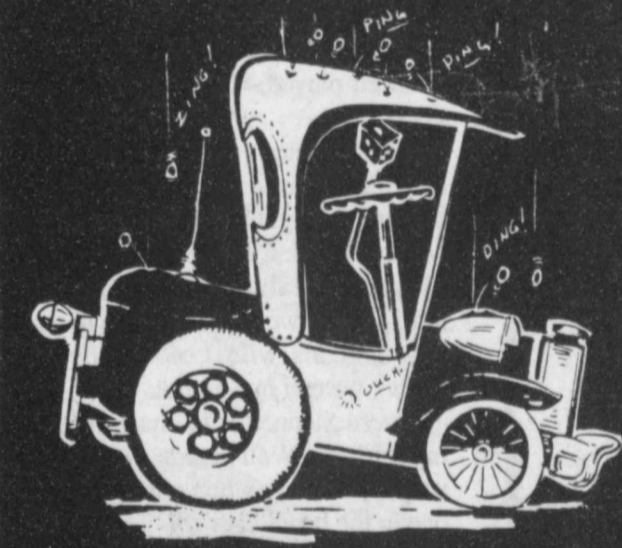
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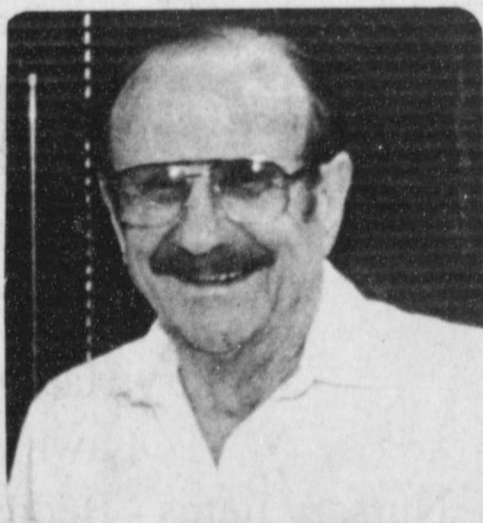

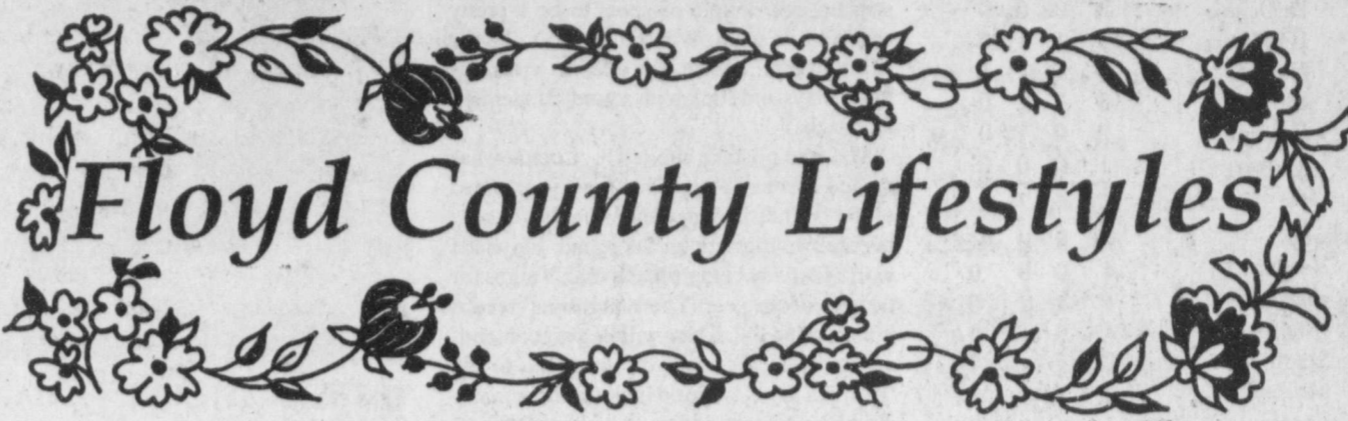

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Cook hamburgers and meats well-done to avoid raw deals

People who like their hamburgers rare or medium-rare instead of well-done may be setting themselves up for foodborne illness.

The recent rash of illnesses caused by tainted hamburger at a fast-food restaurant in Washington was more than likely abetted by inadequate cooking of food contaminated with the bacterium *E. coli*, said Dr. Peggy Gentry-Van Laanen, a nutritionist and food safety specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This bacterium, like others, naturally occurs in animals, but can be easily killed.

"Whether preparing ground beef products or any meat and poultry product at home, or purchasing them from commercial establishments, they should be adequately cooked to a 'done' status," she said.

According to Texas A&M food safety experts, ground beef products should be cooked to an internal temperature of at least 140 degrees — an industry standard that will adequately destroy *E. coli* bacteria as well as others that may cause foodborne illness. Ground meat products are most vulnerable to contamination because of the additional handling and mixing they receive during processing.

"Anytime we're dealing with rare or medium-rare meat products, there's some risk involved," Gentry-Van Laanen said.

The recommendation for people considered to be in high risk categories of contracting foodborne illness is to make sure that meats are cooked thoroughly. Those who are more susceptible to any foodborne illnesses are children, the elderly or people who have weakened immune systems because of chronic diseases such as cancer, heart disease, diabetes or AIDS.

"Pregnant women are also at a greater risk because their immune system is already weakened," Gentry-Van Laanen said. "We recommend that they do not eat rare meat."

Bloody diarrhea is the most common symptom of the illness caused by *E. coli*, she said, and the young and the elderly are particularly susceptible to the risks associated with this organism. Infection may cause a severe condition known as hemolytic uremic syndrome, the leading cause of kidney failure in young children. In elderly adults, the most dangerous situation is a condition where blood clots affect the brain.

Even so, it's not always easy for a customer to tell whether the hamburger presents a raw deal.

"There are spoilage bacteria and those that cause foodborne illness," she said. "If the meat is contaminated with spoilage bacteria, you usually can tell by the

smell, the appearance and taste. However, the problem with foodborne bacteria is that there may be no signs of danger."

Commercial establishments should have controls to monitor internal food temperature, but consumers can tell if meat is done by a brown color throughout the product.

The U.S. Food Safety Inspection Service recommends that consumers cook ground meat to a temperature slightly higher — 160 degrees F., Gentry-Van Laanen said. This temperature has a safety factor.

Besides cooking meat thoroughly, a second important step in avoiding foodborne illness is good hygiene, cleanliness and sanitation when handling food, she said.

"Another factor is time and temperature abuse," she said. "For instance, foods should not be left at room temperature for more than two hours."

According to Gentry-Van Laanen, the safety of foods at home boils down to this:

- * Cooking to a high enough temperature to kill the bacteria.
- * Preventing cooked foods from coming into contact with raw foods, and unclean hands and utensils.
- * Storing the leftovers in sealed containers and placing them in the refrigerator as soon as possible after the meal.

It's not always easy to tell whether an eating establishment is reputable. However, Gentry-Van Laanen offers a simple tip that could save you from something worse than heartburn — observe hygiene practices and cleanliness of employees, especially when they're handling your food.

Protein, vitamins, minerals supplied in variety of foods

Meat, poultry and fish supply protein, B vitamins, iron and zinc. The other foods in this group - dry beans, eggs, and nuts - are similar to meats in providing protein and most vitamins and minerals. The Food Guide Pyramid suggests 2 to 3 servings each day of foods from this group. The total amount of these servings should be equivalent to 5 to 7 ounces of cooked lean meat, poultry or fish per day.

Two to three ounces of cooked lean meat, poultry or fish is a serving. A 3-ounce piece of meat is about the size of an average hamburger or the amount of meat on a medium chicken breast half. For the other foods in this group, 1/2 cup of cooked dry beans, 1 egg, or 2 tablespoons of peanut butter are equivalent to 1 ounce of meat.

Here are some selection tips for choosing foods from the meat, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs and nuts grouping:

- * Choose lean meat, poultry without skin, fish and dry beans and peas often. They are the choices lowest in fat.
- * Prepare meats in lowfat ways by trimming away all the fat you can see and broiling, roasting or boiling these foods instead of frying them.
- * Go easy on egg yolks which are high in cholesterol. Use only one yolk per person in egg dishes. Make larger portions by adding egg whites.

* Nuts and seeds are high in fat, so eat them in moderation. Enjoying a variety of foods from the five major food groups represented in the Food Guide Pyramid is the best way to achieve a balanced diet.

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EPA grants emergency exemption

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has granted an emergency exemption allowing Texas onion growers to use cypermethrin to control thrips, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said Tuesday.

The Texas Department of Agriculture requested the exemption in January because available federally registered insecticides do not provide adequate thrip control.

Thrips are small sucking insects that reduce onion bulb size and cause yield significant loss.

The exemption has been granted for 17,520 acres of spring and summer dry bulb onions in 22 counties in the Rio Grande Valley, Winter Garden, High Plains and the Teans-Pecos regions.

Affected counties are Cameron, Castro, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Dimmit, Floyd, Hale, Hidalgo, Kinney, Knox, Lamb, Lubbock, Maverick, Pecos, Presidio, Reeves, Starr, Uvalde, Webb, Willacy, Zavala, and Zapata.

April 15 is deadline for planting food plots for pheasants

The deadline for planting food plots for pheasant habitat is April 15. Everyone is asked to get their contracts signed so that the planting process can be set up.

Pheasants Forever will pay the landowner \$30.00 per acre for planting on your own or the planting will be contracted by Mark Gilly at no cost to the landowner. Remember the deadline is April 15 for Food Plot Contracts.

Also, anyone wanting to lease their land for hunting, should turn in their name and price per gun per day that would be charged and organizers will submit a list to the Dallas chapter.

Naturally, prices should be comparable to the density of birds on the land.

"The money was flowing last year during pheasant season. The bird hunting was great and you can bet the hunters will bring their friends this year. So get in on the action by submitting your bid for lease hunting to the High Plains Chapter of Pheasants Forever," said Layne Kirk, president of the chapter.

Cypermethrin may not be applied within 300 yards of any body of water or where runoff is likely to occur. Use is also prohibited:

Within five miles of Leon Creek or Diamond-Y Springs in Pecos County. South of Interstate 10 in Reeves County.

Within a mile of the Uvalde Fish Hatchery with aerial equipment and within 300 yards with ground equipment.

Within habitats of endangered plant species in Hidalgo, Pecos, Presidio, Starr, Uvalde, and Zapata counties.

The exemption expires on March 19, 1994.

Money appropriated to fund Cotton Incorporated projects

Members of the Texas State Support Committee (TSSC) met Wednesday, March 30 in Dallas to give preliminary approval to research projects submitted for funding through the State Support Program of Cotton Incorporated (CI).

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) Texas is estimated to receive slightly over \$160,000 of this money was approved to fund regional projects.

CI State Support funds make up 5 percent of CI's overall yearly budget and are distributed to each cotton producing state based upon its percentage of the previous years crops. The committee selected projects and funding levels based on CI's estimate of Texas funds available in 1994.

The committee considered a total of 82 projects and selected ten for state-wide funding in 1994. Six proposals

were selected for funding as regional projects for the High Plains.

"This year we were once again under the gun to select a limited number of projects from an outstanding field of proposals," says Tullia, Texas producer Larry Nelson, Vice Chairman of the TSSC.

The amount of quality research that we are able to fund is definitely good news for producers in this area as well as those from other areas of the state, adds Nelson.

High Plains projects funded for 1994 range from a variety of profitability improvement projects to the evaluation of Texas cotton's spinning performance using modern textile equipment.

Representatives from High Plains certified producer organizations met March 24 to evaluate and rank proposals specific to this area in preparation for the meeting in Dallas.

TDA authorizes use of Lorsban 4-E

The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) has utilized its Section 18 Crisis exemption authority to allow the use of Lorsban 4E on wheat to control Russian wheat aphids (RWA). The Section 18 exemption is written under the provisions of the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act.

The TDA has submitted to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) an application for a specific exemption to authorize the above-noted use of Lorsban. The TDA crisis exemption will remain in effect until EPA renders a decision on the specific exemption application.

This crisis exemption is subject to the following conditions and restrictions:

*All applicable directions, restrictions and precautions on the EPA-registered label for Lorsban 4E Insecticide (EPA Reg. No. 62719-23) must be followed.

*The product may be applied with either aerial, ground or sprinkler irrigation equipment at a maximum rate of 0.5 pounds active ingredient (1 pt. of product) per acre per application. DO NOT make more than two applications of product per crop growing season. The application schedule must allow for a 28 day pre-harvest interval.

*Lorsban 4E Insecticide shall be applied only by certified applicators or licensed applicators or by persons under their direct supervision of a licensed applicator. The licensed applicator must be certified in the category applicable to the application of restricted use pesticide in wheat for insect control.

*The Texas Department of Agriculture shall be immediately informed of any adverse effects resulting from the use of this pesticide in connection with this crisis exemption.

*DO NOT graze treated wheat fields within 14 days following an application of Lorsban 4E Insecticide.

*DO NOT feed wheat straw to livestock for at least 28 days following an application of Lorsban 4E Insecticide.

*A 24 hour re-entry interval must be observed following an application of Lorsban 4E Insecticide.

*Due to high toxicity of Lorsban 4E

Insecticide to avian species, end users of Lorsban 4E Insecticide are obligated to monitor their wheat fields and report all known incidents of avian mortality resulting from use of product to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

*To reduce possibility of exposure of aquatic ecosystems, application must be restricted where run-off is likely to occur to aquatic habitats and when weather conditions favor drift or run-off from areas scheduled for treatment.

*Within the counties of Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Carson, Concho, Deaf Smith, Donley, Floyd, Hemphill, Potter, Randall and Swisher DO NOT apply chlorpyrifos by any method within one-

mile radius of an active, wintering bald eagle roost area or within 1/4 mile of the margins of a lake or river being utilized as a foraging area for the bald eagle.

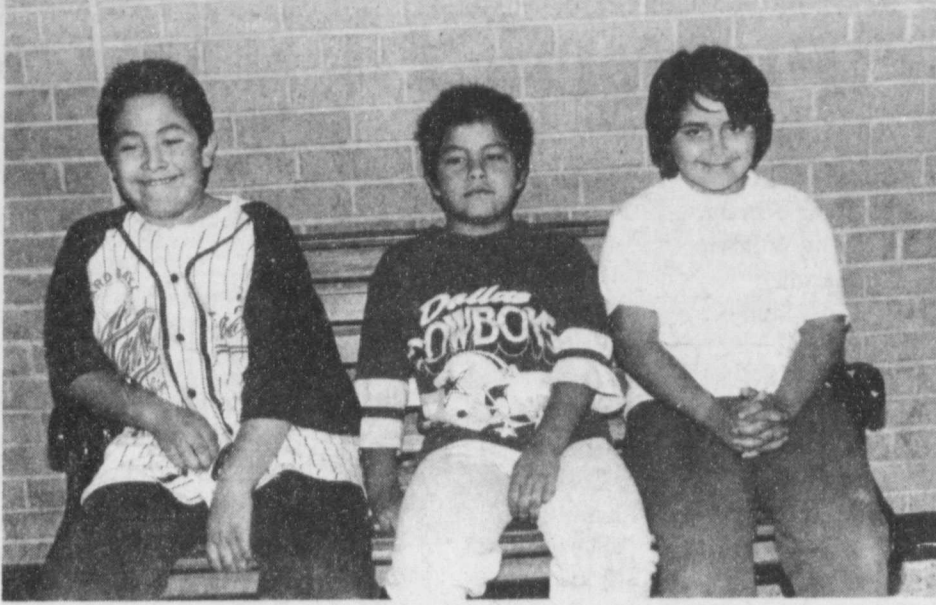

Dream Becomes Reality

Ribbon cutting and open house officially open W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital

LOCKNEY — A typical West Texas wind failed to blow away the spirits of

the crowd which gathered for the W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital ribbon cutting on Saturday afternoon. The ceremony, which was often-times emotional, began at 1:00 p.m. with opening remarks by Hospital Administrator Jeff

Reecer. After recognizing special guests, Reecer called on Congressman Bill Sarpalius to speak. Congressman Sarpalius thanked the Senate for filibustering a bill which enabled him to get away from Washington and attend the ceremony.

"I can recall last year coming over here and walking through this building with Dr. Mangold," said Sarpalius. "They were still putting up the walls and the roof had just been put on."

"I remember Dr. Mangold talking about what a tremendous asset this hospital had been to this community, and how much he had enjoyed working here. I remember him bragging about the 6000 babies that he had delivered."

"All of you that knew him couldn't help but be inspired by his energy, his love, his dedication and his big heart—and how much he cared for this community, his church and other people. I can't think of a more appropriate dedication than to dedicate and name this hospital in his honor."

"I've always thought that when the day comes that we go stand before the good Lord He will ask us two questions. I don't think that He will ask us how much money we made, how fancy a car did we drive, how many books did we write, what high of an office did we hold, how fast can we run or how much land did you farm."

"I believe that He will basically ask, 'In your lifetime what did you do to serve the Lord.' The second question will probably be—'In your lifetime what did you do to serve other people?'"

"You see, what you accomplish for yourself in life has no bearing. It's what you give of yourself, in service to Him and in service to other people."

Sarpalius stated that the answers to those questions could be found in the life that Dr. Mangold lived and his service to the community. "He has truly been a strong Christian example," said Sarpalius.

"I stood on the House floor and I read a speech in honor of Dr. Mangold and I have brought a flag that was flown over the United States Capital in honor of the hospital and also a flag for the family that I would like to present at this time."

Dr. Gary Mangold was presented with the flag for the hospital and the Mangold family. Mangold was also presented with a copy of the speech which was read on the House floor (the speech is being reprinted in this special edition.)

Sarpalius also commented on how blessed the community was in Dr. Gary continuing in his father's leadership. "This community has been touched in

In Memory of The Late Dr. W.J. "Bill" Mangold On the Occasion of the Renaming of Lockney General Hospital

Mr. Speaker, I would like to ask my colleagues to join me in honoring the late Dr. W.J. Mangold on the occasion of the renaming of Lockney General Hospital. On April 3, 1993 Lockney General Hospital will officially change its name to the W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital in recognition of the outstanding service Dr. Mangold provided West Texas during his lifetime.

Dr. W.J. "Bill" Mangold was born May 25, 1919 in Rio Vista, Texas. Bill's father died before he was born leaving his mother to raise two children on her own. Living in a home where the importance of education was stressed, Bill graduated from high school in Meridian, Texas and graduated from the University of Texas in Austin in 1941. In 1942, Dr. Mangold married Martha, his life-time sweetheart and friend.

Always proud to be an American and ever dedicated to his country, Bill joined the Navy in 1942 and became a test pilot. He resigned from his commission four years later at the rank of Lieutenant Senior Grade.

Along with his wife, and two small children, Bill went to the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School in Dallas where he mastered his trade. In 1950, Bill Mangold received his M.D. degree. He had achieved one of his goals in life — that of being a doctor.

In today's terms a doctor diagnoses, prescribes and charges, but Dr. Mangold demonstrated something far more important — he cared. He cared for people whether they were his patients, his community or his church. It did not matter what time of the night it was, Bill responded to each emergency call with the speed and attention as if a life was in danger in every instance. He also gave undivided attention to each of the 6,000 children he delivered into this world.

Remembered mostly for his kindness and devotion to his work, it is only fitting to see an institution such as Lockney General Hospital being renamed in his honor. A hospital stands for life, caring and love. All of these traits Dr. Bill Mangold lived daily in his 73 years with us. Mr. Speaker, I ask that my colleagues join me in honoring this outstanding American as Lockney, Texas, renames it hospital to the W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital.

Community remembers the late Dr. W.J. (Bill) Mangold

(Editor's Note: We felt it fitting to reprint portions of a Dec. 17, 1992 feature story on Dr. W.J. Mangold. The story was written following the death of Dr. Mangold and some of the memories of those who knew him were recalled in this feature.)

In January 1952, Dr. W.J. Mangold, his wife Martha, and their two sons, Bill and Howard, moved to Lockney.

For a period of seven years, Dr. Mangold served as the only doctor in the community and frequently saw over 100 patients a day, plus answering calls throughout the night every night.

Serving as a community leader, Dr. Mangold was active in his church, the Main Street Church of Christ; served as a trustee on the Lockney School Board, served on the Lockney Airport Advisory Board, and served on a committee to help secure a modern convalescent home in the community.

In 1966 Dr. Mangold was named Outstanding Citizen at the Lockney Chamber of Commerce Banquet. Dr. Mangold and his family were also honored by the chamber, as Family Of The Year, in 1987.

Those in attendance at the 1987 banquet were told, "With a constant whistle on his lips and the loving support of this woman — this couple, for the past 35 years has provided Lockney and the surrounding area with loving and caring

24 hours a day and seven day per week medical service.

"The gentle hands of this man and the tender strength of this woman will hold wonderful memories in our hearts and lives for many years to come."

Most Lockney citizens still reeling in shock at the death of Dr. Mangold were finding it very difficult to put into words their feelings for the man who had affected so many lives.

He was remembered mostly for his kindness, his devotion to his work, his community and his family, and his soft kindly whistle.

As longtime newspaper editor Jim Reynolds said, "I remember when he delivered my son. He came out of the delivery room holding my son in his arms and whistling a happy tune. I'll never forget it."

Thousands of people remember the same happy spirit of Dr. Mangold, for thousands of women were helped through the births of their children by Dr. Mangold. On Nov. 7, 1985 Dr. Mangold delivered his 5000th baby, a long way from his first baby delivered on January 14, 1952.

He continued to deliver babies at a rate of approximately 75 a year. At the time of his death approximately 6000 little ones had come into the world under the gentle hands of Dr. Mangold—"enough to populate two small towns!" as one hospital staff member explained.

Not only did Mangold deliver thousands of babies and also second generation babies, he considered himself fortunate in that he was able to deliver his own son, Gary; two grandchildren; Dr. Stennett (who later returned to work as a doctor at Lockney General), and cur-

"I am so sorry that he did not live to see the completion of our hospital addition which is the result of his great love for and dedication to his profession and in his belief in the future of this community.

without him."

Mr. Hull, minister of the Main Street Church of Christ, said of Dr. Mangold in the eulogy, "And so for you, When he was tired—he worked; When he was sick—he worked; When he was troubled—he worked."

Hospital Administrator Jeff Reecer also remembers Dr. Mangold as "a great man."

"He touched so many people's lives and yet he was the most humble, kind, gentle person I've ever known.

"From the hospital's perspective the biggest challenge is to continue his work with the same determination and humbleness. We want to continue his legacy."

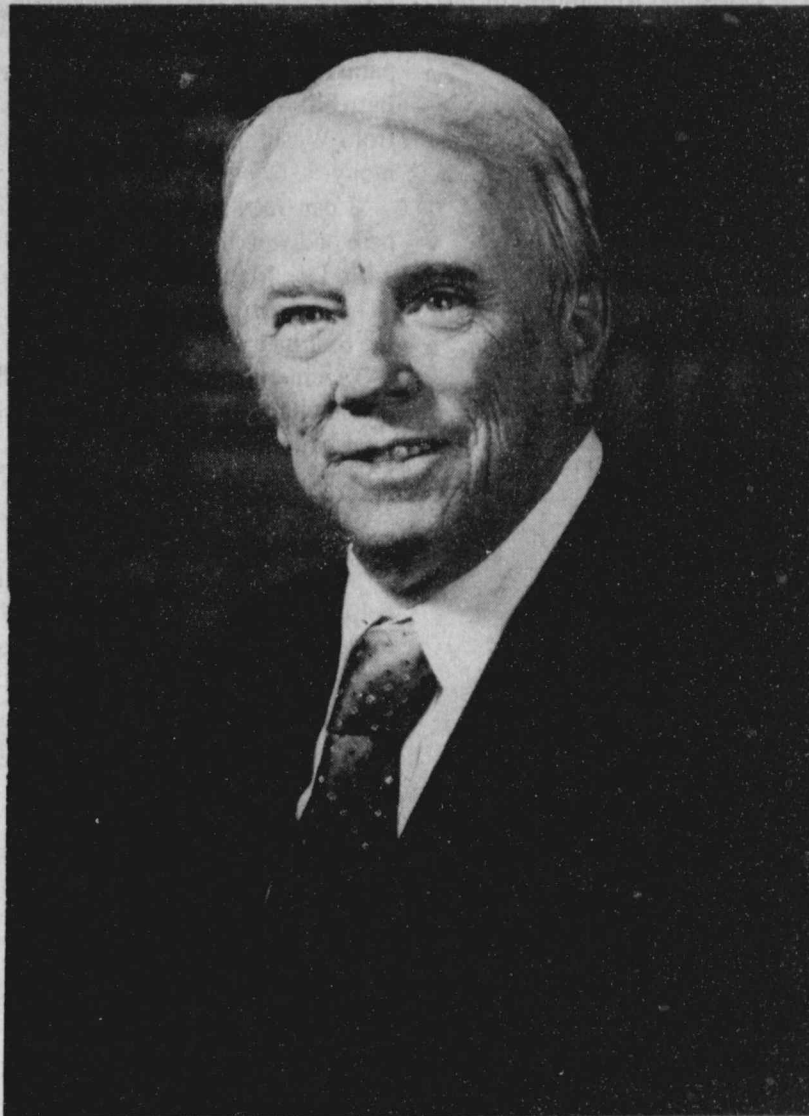
In an effort to describe the life of Dr. Mangold, Mr. Hull wrote, "Dr. Mangold patterned his life after the Master; one of quiet servitude.

"His faith was not a loud proclamation on the street corner; he was simply a man of God serving his fellow man to the best of his ability. There were no barriers to his service. It made no differ-

ence if you were black or white, Hispanic or Anglo, rich or poor. He simply set his heart to be your servant.

"And so by his example he proclaimed loud and clear the truthfulness that he loved God, his family and fellow man. His life's work was the proof. And, oh, how loud that proof is—for it shall resound for years upon years.

"Thank you Dr. Mangold for touching our lives."

rent hospital administrator Jeff Reecer.

Dr. Mangold was there at the birth of many of Lockney's current civic and church leaders. He even delivered the charge nurse who cared for him in the SICU at Methodist, during his last days.

Mangold was always eager to tell people how much he enjoyed his work and how blessed he felt he had been in his life. He considered himself fortunate that he was able to work with his first born son, Bill, for one year and then with his youngest son, Dr. Gary for over 17 years.

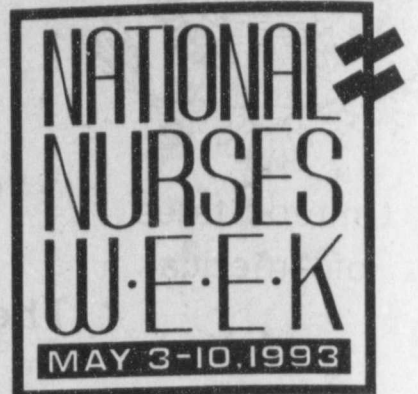
"Even in later years he was still whistling and enjoying his work," said Terry Keltz, who served as Lockney Hospital Administrator from 1984-1990.

"He never discussed or thought about retirement. Dr. Mangold told me that he had had two big goals in his life—being a pilot and a doctor, and he was able to do both. He always gave me so much encouragement by seeing his enjoyment of his occupation and his life. He cared for people first which made him the most unique physician I've ever met.

"Dr. Mangold is and forever will remain my hero, because as he once said he was the luckiest man on earth because he could do exactly what he wanted to do in his life and enjoy it."

Dr. Mangold will always be remembered for his dedication to the hospital and his constant determination to improve it, wanting always to have the finest staff and best equipped hospital for the community.

"No one was more loved and appreciated in this entire area than Dr. Bill," said Claude Brown, longtime friend and

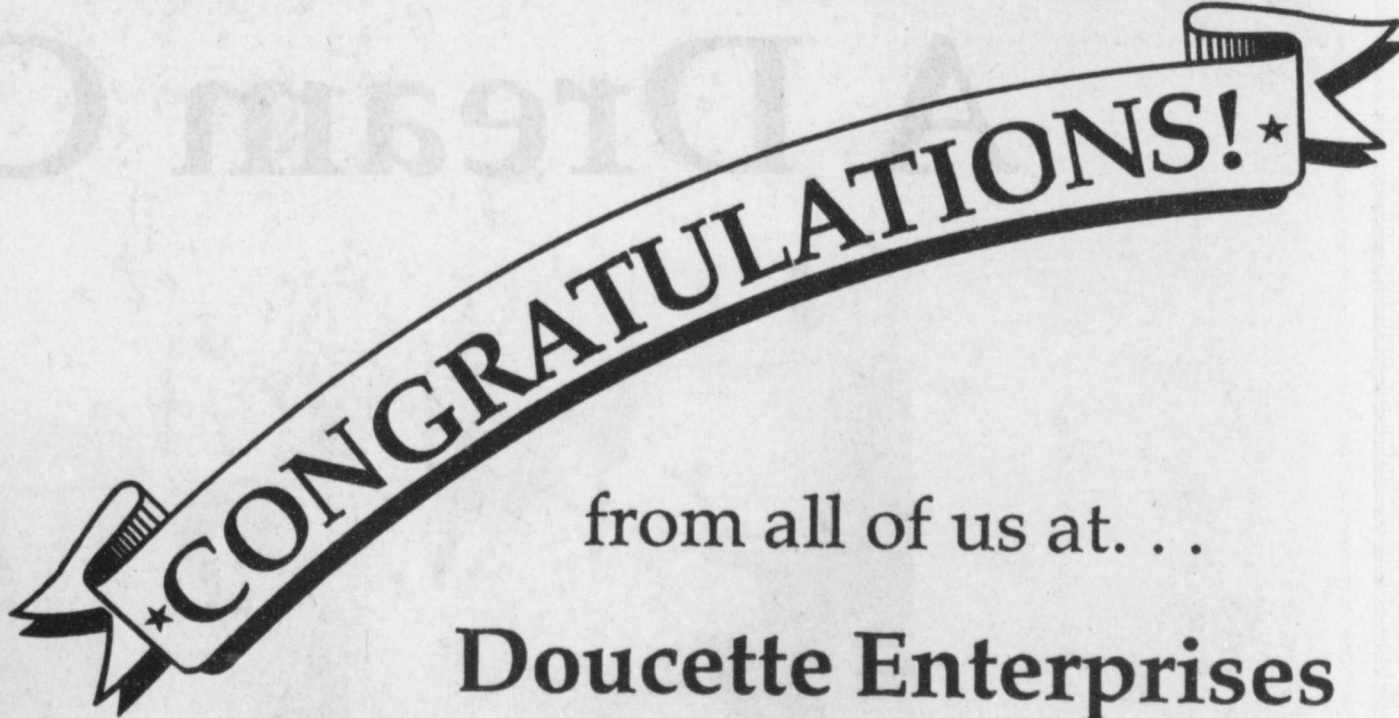

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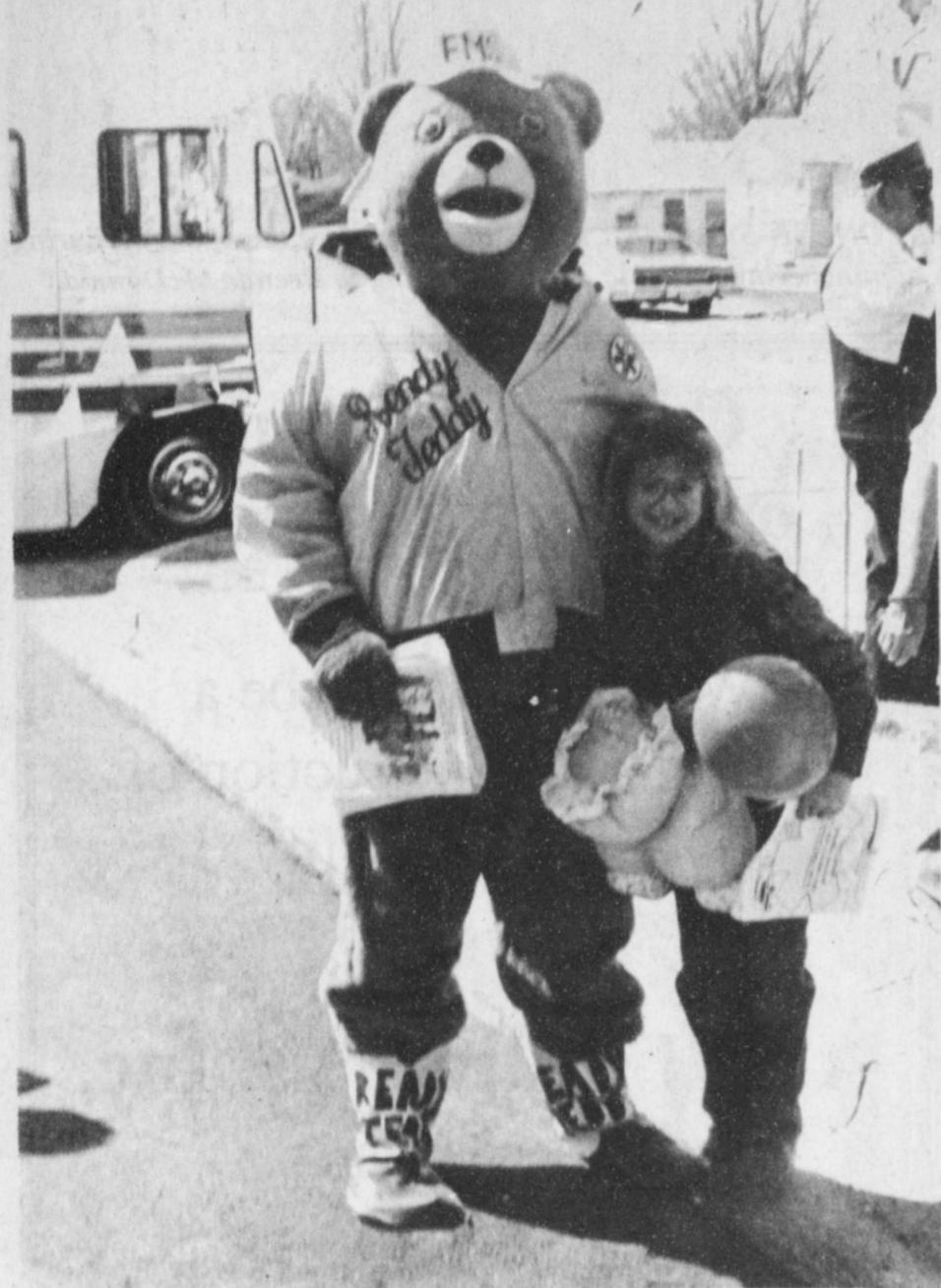

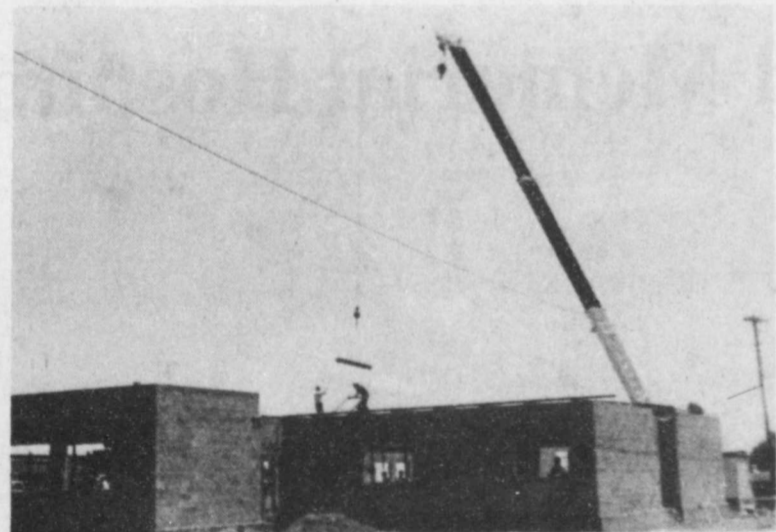

how much this man has given to each one of you. It is an honor for me to be with you here today in celebrating what his life has meant to each one of us.

"I've seen many rural hospitals close and here you are today dedicating an expansion and dedicating this building in honor of a man that gave so much to you."

After Congressman Sarpalus spoke, Reece introduced Dr. Gary Mangold, the youngest son of Dr. and Mrs. W.J. Mangold. Dr. Gary (as he is known by his patients and many friends), came to practice medicine in the Lockney hospital alongside his father, in 1979.

Dr. Gary thanked everyone for being at the ceremony and extended special thanks to Congressman Sarpalus. "I deeply appreciate the Congressman's words," said Dr. Gary. "I would also like to thank the Cogdell family. It would have been very difficult without their support to be in the position that we are in right now."

"Today is a celebration," said Dr. Gary. "It is a culmination of many years of hard work and dedication on the part of literally hundreds of individuals. This hospital has always enjoyed the support of Lockney and the surrounding communities in our tax district for many years. Without their support we

wouldn't be here. We deeply appreciate it.

"We will continue to constantly strive to earn and deserve your respect and support. Of course, as we are recognizing today, throughout the last 40 plus years there was always one person—one bright and shining example—at every fork in the road who helped guide us over that road. As a family we are honored and humbled at the recognition of this man's contribution.

"We are happy—we are sad—we are uplifted—we are determined and we are proud. None would be prouder of this day than my dad."

Dr. Bill Mangold, the eldest son of Dr. and Mrs. W.J. Mangold spoke next. Dr. Bill holds a license to practice law in the state of Texas and licenses to practice medicine in Texas and Arizona. He currently has a private practice in plastic and reconstructive surgery.

Dr. Bill also thanked those in attendance and also thanked the three physicians who are currently caring for the community. "I think that this is a celebration," said Dr. Bill.

"I didn't want to come in and give a eulogy from my perspective. I was thinking this morning, as we drove in from Lubbock, that as a kid of eight years old—how excited I was the first time we came to the City Limits sign of

Lockney, population 1,997. I was so happy that we had put them over the 2000 mark and I thought they would run out and erase the number and add four more.

"I think that the things Dad did added more than that additional four to the population and I think that clearly your presence here is testament to that.

"The last time I gave a talk in Lockney was at a high school graduation, and I quoted a poem, 'High Flight'.

"The poem starts off, 'Oh I have slipped the surly bonds of earth and danced the skies on laughter silvered wings.

"It ends—'I reached out my hand and touched the face of God.'

"I think my dad has done that as well and I thank you for being here to honor him and the three young doctors that are going to carry on that tradition."

Mrs. Mangold then took the podium and also thanked those in attendance.

"I want to thank everyone for all you have done—for your caring, your love and your support of the hospital and Dr. Mangold. He loved and cared for all of you and I know that all of you as well as myself are going to miss him."

"As you can see," said Reece, "Dr. Mangold had a tremendous impact on his friends, his family and his community. Dr. Mangold was instrumental in the planning of this facility which at his suggestion contains four birthing rooms. This room allows us to implement the concept of LDRP which is labor, delivery, recovery and post partum for obstetric patients all in the same room. The hospital has 27 beds, a new nursery capable of accommodating 10 bassinets and two out-patient exam rooms that will be used for minor surgical procedures. We are also proud of all the new equipment which is going into the facility.

"We are especially proud of the new cardiac monitoring and telemetry system which allows us to monitor a person's heart rhythms at the nurses station while allowing the patient to remain mobile."

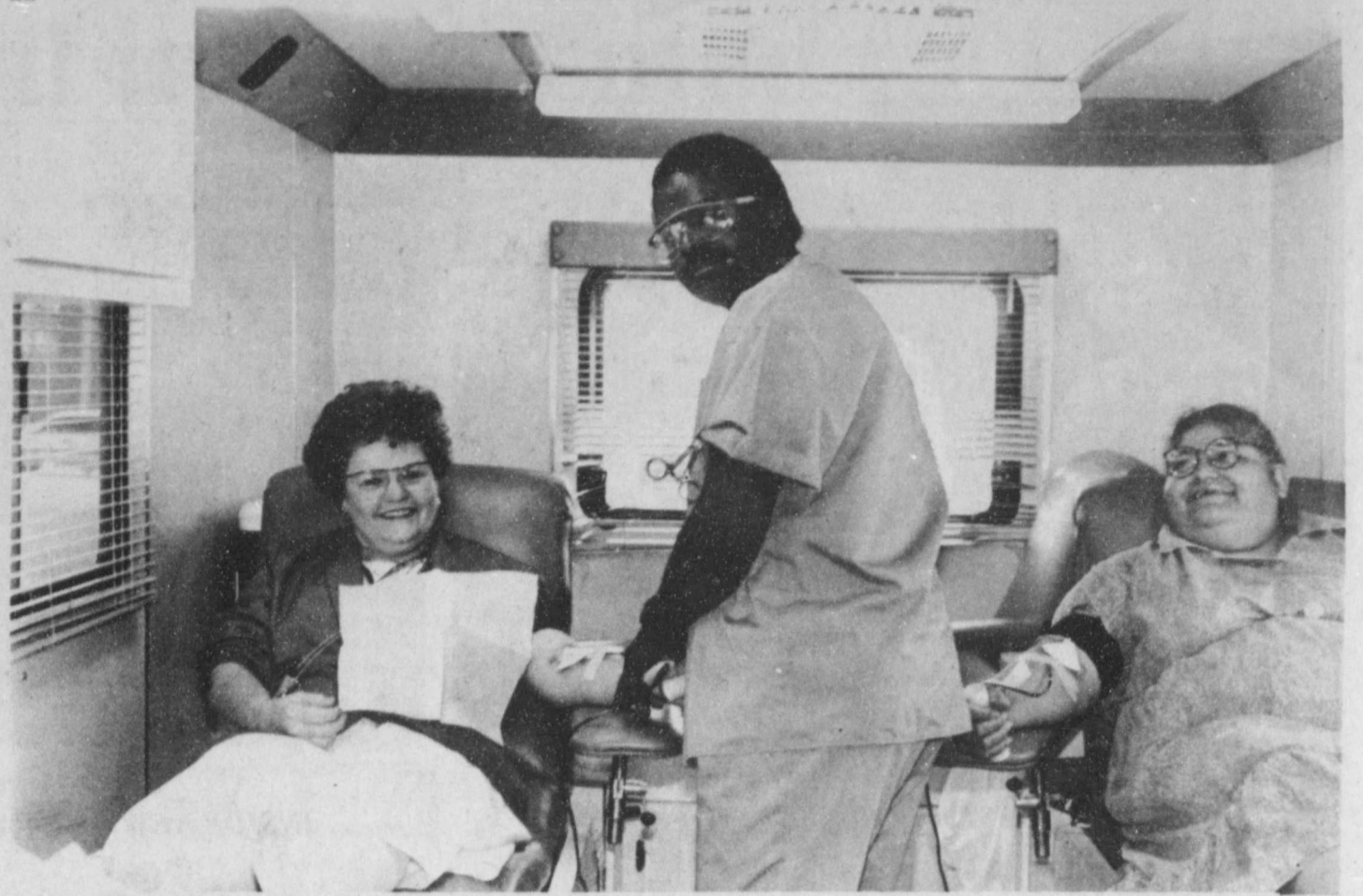

Lockney General Hospital incorporated in 1945

Lockney General Hospital was originally incorporated on October 8, 1945 as a community hospital under the name of "Floyd County Co-operative Hospital". Its temporary location was above Powers Pharmacy (now J & K Insurance, 102 S. Main Street) in Dr. Greer's clinic until July 15, 1948 when it was moved to the present location on 320 North Main Street.

Dr. D.R. Foster moved from Lubbock to set up practice in the hospital and clinic with office hours from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The first board of directors were: H.E. Frizzell, Mrs. V.E. Spears, Edgar Hayes, Ewald Quebe, Hilburn Casey, Berry Hooten and Bernard Harris. J.D. Copeland was appointed as the first business manager.

Plans began early in 1948 to secure \$20,000 in funds to complete a modern building and furnish it with modern equipment. Family memberships were sold for \$50, \$75, \$100 and donations were solicited throughout the county. Two surplus buildings, one a hospital infirmary and the other a mess hall, were purchased from Camp Bowie, Brownwood, Texas and placed on foundations in the shape of an L in March of 1948. Remodeling provided 11 patient rooms, kitchen, nurses station, clinic, x-ray, lab, surgery room, delivery room, and reception office.

With the help of local citizens providing furnishings for the rooms and the B & PW Club having a shower for the hospital it had its formal grand opening on Thursday, July 15, 1948 beginning at

2:30 p.m. This was quite a celebration for Lockney with 1,500 to 2,000 attending. Cecil Hunter, "Stuttering Sam", gave a performance, free movies were shown at the Plains Theater, free bar-b-que donated by local business men and ladies of the town, accordion solos given by Joyce Carthel and Mrs. Fred Huggins and the local band participated along with other entertainment. Dedication was at 7:30 p.m. with a short history of the hospital given by H.E. Frizzell.

The hospital remained Floyd County Co-operative Hospital with Dr. D.R. Foster, Dr. Charlie Pigford, Dr. K.O. Crum and Dr. Gene McClelland serving on the medical staff. Its corporate name was then changed to Lockney General Hospital by charter amendment effective April 9, 1951. Dr. W.J. Mangold joined the staff in 1952. In 1954 the hospital passed into private ownership with Dr. Mangold becoming the purchaser. Dr. T.L. Glenn later joined Dr. Mangold as a partner in the ownership. Other physicians serving on the staff were Dr. B.A. Simmons, Dr. Gene Hardy, Dr. Pat Williams, Dr. Bill Mangold, Jr. Dr. Larry D. Reed.

In 1955 it was necessary to add more bed space in order to take care of the patient load. A new kitchen, dining room and ward area with eight additional beds were added. In 1957 four semi-private rooms were added. Then in 1961 and 1962 the present operating room, delivery room, pharmacy space and basement were added as well as the clinic area being expanded.

In 1963, under the sponsorship of Athena Jr. Study Club, an auxiliary was

organized. A short time later a junior auxiliary was formed. About 40 ladies were charter members of the auxiliary and 25 girls in the junior auxiliary. Both disbanded about three years later. Another auxiliary was organized in 1980 and was active for about two years.

With Medicare becoming effective in September 1966, improvements were constantly being made to the building to comply with the National Safety Code. The building has had a sprinkler system since 1971, a fire alarm system installed in 1974, and an emergency generator to provide electricity during power failures. An incinerator for burning waste and solid core doors were also required. Many other requirements have had to be met through the past years and continue in order to comply with current regulations. The hospital and clinic areas were redecorated in 1974. The ward was converted into two double rooms and completed in 1976.

Effective August 1, 1973, Lockney General Hospital District took over the ownership and management of Lockney General Hospital, created by an act of legislature and by a vote of the residents of the district.

In October of 1978, the Martha Ann Cogdell Hospital Trust gave the hospital \$150,000 for the purpose of constructing the new clinic, renamed Cogdell Clinic, and the expansion of administrative offices which were completed in December, 1980. In April 1981, the Cogdell Trust again donated \$50,000 to be used for the enlargement and renovation of a new room of diagnostic radiology equipment and new surgical table for the operating room, completed in November and December of 1982, respectfully. On September 30, 1983 an unrestricted gift of \$100,000 was donated. The Board of Directors agreed that these funds would be used for improvement of patient care equipment and patient care facilities. In 1986, \$50,000 of this latest gift was used to purchase a new blood gas analyzer for the lab, a new electrocardiograph machine and a new fetal heart monitor. New equipment for the Cogdell Clinic consisted of a new copier, transcribing system and computer. In 1987, a flexible sigmoidoscope was purchased for early detection of colon cancer, an ultrasound system, an exercise electrocardiology system, a colposcope for use in abnormal pap smears and a "cryo-gun" or "freeze gun" for treatment of warts and various other skin lesions at a cost of \$83,000. The medical staff, employees and community continues to be grateful for the generous monetary gifts of the Cogdell Trust.

Renovation of the clinic waiting room, a project of Il Penseroso Study Club through donations and voluntary work from civic organizations and individuals, was completed in 1988. During this year a helicopter landing pad was put on the east side of the hospital grounds. This provides a landing sight for the "Flight for Life" helicopter from Lubbock to transfer emergency patients to St. Mary of the Plains and Methodist Hospitals in Lubbock for more extensive emergency care.

For several months Dr. W.J. Mangold was the only doctor on the staff to see patients in the clinic and hospital until Dr. Gary Mangold came in 1979. Dr. W.J. Mangold died Dec. 11, 1992 at the age of 73.

Current physicians on staff are: Dr. Gary Mangold, Dr. Kevin Stennett, who began practicing Aug. 1989 and Dr. Kevin Stewart, who came to the hospital Dec. 1991.

Dr. William Reed is also on staff as a consulting physician in Radiology.

Men who have served on the Board of Directors since the hospital district was formed in 1973 have been H.E. Frizzell, Gene Collins, Erwin Boyd, R.V. Webster, Helmuth Quebe, Chester Carthel, Leslie Ferguson, F.L. Montandon, Kenneth Tate, R.D. Baccus and Larry Golden.

Present board members are Claude Brown, Bill Sherman, H.E. Frizzell, Ronnie Hardin and Jerry Johnson.

J.D. Copeland, Wanda Baker, Elfie Sherman, Martha Couch, Gayle Reay, Guy Hazlett III, Terry Keltz and Tony Silipo have served as administrators. Current administrator, Jeff Reece started in 1991.

The hospital is member of the Texas Hospital Association and West Texas Rural Health Providers. In 1990, the hospital was licensed for 20 beds and 65 local and area employees who serve in the administrative, medical records, insurance, nursing, central service, laboratory, radiology, dietary, house-keeping, maintenance, respiratory therapy and pharmacy departments.

Present directors are: Accounting and Reception, Brian Cook; Insurance, Susie Frizzell; Medical Records, Shelda Rogers; Nursing, Deneen Marricle; Central Supply, Ofelia Hernandez; Lab and X-ray, Mazen Shehadeh; Dietary, Elionor Barrientoz; Housekeeping, Amelia Rodriguez; Maintenance, Mark Snell; Respiratory Therapy, Dimple Adams; Pharmacy Services, Jill Bennett; Quality Assurance and Infection Control, Trina Wilson; and Management Information Systems, Robin Satterwhite.

The hospital serves a substantial area of Floyd County and in addition receives a number of patients from Briscoe, Swisher, Hall, Motley and Hale Counties. Many times it was a struggle to have financial means to keep equipment and facilities updated to meet the medical needs of the local community ad surrounding areas. In the early days of the hospital office calls were \$2 and they are now \$13.00. Room rates were from \$8 to \$10 and are now \$210 for private rooms and \$205 for semi-private rooms. Your baby could be delivered for \$65 including the doctor's fee and the hospital and delivery room charges. Delivery charges are now around \$2400 cash delivery. The hospital continues to advance in knowledge and skills to aid in medical care of its patients, whether through the hospital or the clinic.

Previous administrator, Terry Keltz describes this well in the October 29, 1989 Lubbock Avalanche-Journal when he said, "the continuing success and stability of Lockney General Hospital is attributed to an excellent medical staff that dates back to 40 years of service; strong community backing and financial support; an excellent board of directors who think quickly and provide strong leadership; foresight from past administrators who saw the development of today's health trends; and financial contributions from the Martha Ann Cogdell Trust".

April 3, 1993 the new W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital was opened to the public after a 1:00 p.m. ribbon cutting ceremony.

Lockney General Hospital was renamed W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital, "in recognition of Dr. Mangold's 41

years of service to the people of the South Plains and this hospital," said Administrator Jeff Reece.

U.S. Representative Bill Sarpalius was a guest speaker during the ceremonies and Martha Mangold, wife of the late Dr. W.J. Mangold, cut the ribbon opening the new hospital.

An open house was held for visitors to show off the brand new 27 bed facility featuring state of the art equipment.

The hospital can now boast of four birthing rooms, Cardiac Monitoring and Telemetry, Expanded Nursery, Hydro Therapy Tub Room and two Procedure Rooms for out-patient care.

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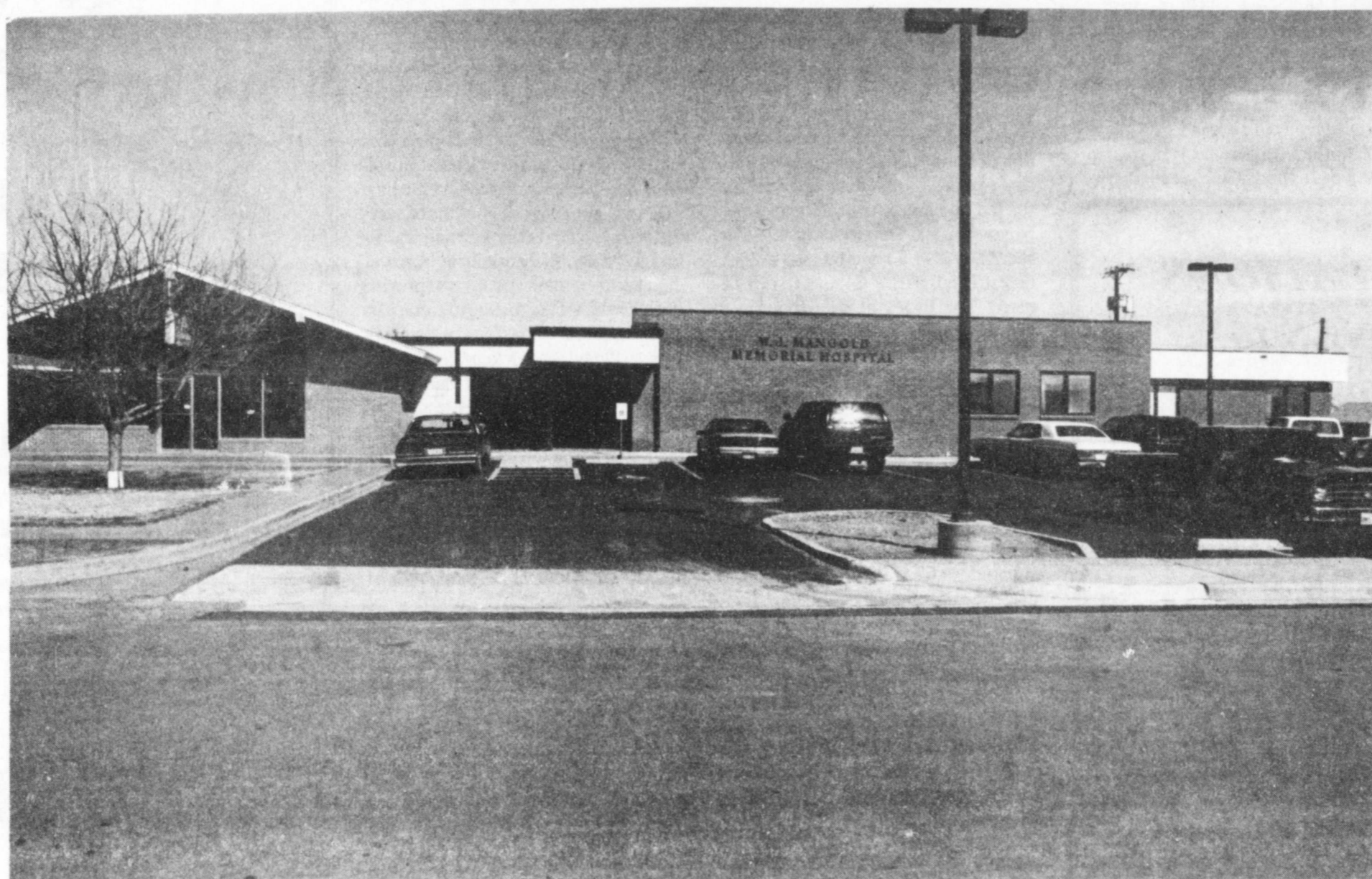
