Facility and a Home Health Care Ser Faciily and a Home Health Care Serv-

ting up and getting the service programs ting up and getting the service programs
on line and in service as soon as possible in Floyd County.
Motion for the action came from Tom
Farris and was seconded by Farris and was seconded by Kenneth
Pits. The vote was all in favor. According to the two-year contracts, the district will pay an upfront fee of
$\$ 7,500.00$ on the RHC and amonthly fee $\$ 7.500 .00$ on the RHC anda monthly fee
of $\$ 750.00$ for 24 months. The HHC contract calls for a fee of $\$ 4,500.00$
initially, followed by a monthly payinitially, followed by a monthly pay-
ment of $\$ 1,300.00$ for 24 months.
In return, the district will receive all
necessary services, information and assistance neecded to set up and inmple-
ment the programs. The first priority ment the programs. The first priority is
to get the Rural Health Care facility into operation according to hospital admin-

passed, compared to the state average of passed, compared to the state average of
$43 \%$. Last year $56 \%$ of the students passed Math.
"Math scores dropped statewide," said High School Counselor Diane Lowe. "Nobody knows why yet. We aren't allowed to see the test results or the questions to find out where the have missed a question." In the 10th grade, $79 \%$ of the students
passed passed the Writing portion of the test,
compared to $80 \%$ statewide. In 1992 compared to $80 \%$ statewide. In 1992
$74 \%$ of these same students, as 9 h graders, passed the Writing section. In the area of Reading, $56 \%$ of the students passed compared to $70 \%$ of
