Lockney School Board approves single member voting districts

Lockney School Board hired Wellman Superintendent Raymond Lusk during their regular school board meeting, June 17. Lusk will replace Superintendent Dub Hallmark who will retire this year (see separate story on Lusk).

Trustees also approved a new 5 single member districts and 2 At-Large districts for LISD.

Joe Perez, of Lockney, filed suit against LISD in August 1992 claiming that the current At-Large system was unconstitutional and diluted the voting strength of the minorities in LISD.

A realignment of voting districts has been in the process since that time and according to Hallmark, the School District and the plaintiff have agreed to a current plan of 5 single member districts and two at-large.

"There is still a lot of other processes

that have to be completed," said Hallmark. "We have to have a public hearing and after that it has to go to Washington D.C. for the Justice Department to approve."

TAAS test scores were also reviewed for the trustees.

In the 4th grade the areas of testing and the percentage of students passing were as follows: Writing—87%, compared to the state average of 81%; Reading—63%, compared to the state average of 56%; and Math—66%, compared to the state average of 47%.

According to Counselor Charlotte Mitchell, "This is the first time the 4th graders have been given the TAAS test. We can't compare it to another year to see if they have improved, but they are above the state average in every area."

On the 8th and 10th grade level, this year scores were compared to the last

year scores of this same group in the 7th grade and to this year's state average.

In the 8th grade, Lockney students scored 75% in Writing compared to the state average of 71%. This same group scored 59% in this area in 1992, showing a marked improvement.

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36th annual Rodeo begins Friday night

Adult admission to the rodeo is \$5.00. Adults may also dance to the music of Blake Kitchens at Saturday nights Rodeo Dance. The dance will be held after the performance on the slab at the rodeo grounds. Admission to the dance is \$5.00.

Rural Health Care approved by Caprock Hospital District

FLOYDADA — Caprock Hospital District board members authorized the implementing of a Rural Health Care Facility and a Home Health Care Service at a special morning session on Tuesday, June 22. The board approved signing contracts with consultants setting up and getting the service programs on line and in service as soon as possible in Floyd County.

Motion for the action came from Tom Farris and was seconded by Kenneth Pitts. The vote was all in favor.

According to the two-year contracts, the district will pay an upfront fee of \$7,500.00 on the RHC and a monthly fee of \$750.00 for 24 months. The HHC contract calls for a fee of \$4,500.00 initially, followed by a monthly payment of \$1,300.00 for 24 months.

In return, the district will receive all necessary services, information and assistance needed to set up and implement the programs. The first priority is to get the Rural Health Care facility into operation according to hospital administrator Ronald Ammons. This will provide a revenue source for the district and be an excellent tool for recruiting physicians said Ammons.

RHC visits by Medicaid and Medicare patients are reimbursed at a higher rate than visits to standard medical facilities are. All costs incurred in providing RHC services are also reimbursable according to the government provisions for payment to a rural health care facility.

A 90 to 120 day turn around is anticipated in the receipt of reimbursement funds said Ammons, "but once the money starts coming back, a steady income should result." Private pay and insurance patients will also be able to utilize the RHC.

The service must be supervised by a physician, but may be staffed primarily by a physician's assistant or, in some instances, by a nurse practitioner. The preceptor physician must be available by phone for consultation in emergency situations. Hours of operation for the RHC would be set by the board and may be any or all of the 24 hours in a day. An emergency room could also be a part of the facility.

Ammons stressed to the board that having the RHC and the Home Health Care Service in place would be an advantage when the hospital reopens because both could be a source of patients for the hospital as well as generating a regular income to the district along with the hospital. Staff members in the RHC could also be utilized in the operation of the hospital stated Ammons.

The HHC would allow patients at home to be assisted with necessary medical services in their home. This would include nurses monitoring re-

cently released hospital patients, administering periodic medication to patients such as diabetics, and simply checking in on those in frail health if referred by a physician. Other services available through the HHC service could possibly be provided by aides who could assist with necessary household chores during a patient recovery or for disabled patients according to Ammons.

A third program was discussed briefly, but not acted upon at this time. The possibility of instituting a skilled nursing facility area in the hospital once it is open would provide another avenue of incoming funds for the district. A SNF provides care for patients too ill to care for themselves at home or requiring some medical procedure not practical at home, yet not ill enough to be eligible for regular hospital admission.

Full implementation of all three programs was placed at \$63,000.00 over a two year period according to information made available to the board.

Ammons told the group that all of these costs would be recoverable under some form of government reimbursement.

Ammons emphasized that a lot of work would have to be done in public relations and promotion to make the services work and prosper. Contacts would have to be made with physicians in Lubbock who need to know the services exist so they can refer patients to them and the general public needs to be aware of what is available.

Board members entered an executive session to discuss personnel prior to adjourning the session. No action followed the closed portion of the meeting.

Dub and Peggy Hallmark have devoted twenty-five years to Lockney Schools. When school closed in May, Peggy left her desk and closed her classroom door for the last time. With the hiring of a new superintendent, Dub will also be retiring from his desk and turning over his responsibilities to someone else.

The Hallmarks came to Lockney in 1968. Dub went to work teaching Health, Driver's Education, P.E. and coaching. While Peggy stayed home to take care of their one year old son, Brent.

"We came with the intention of staying three years," said Dub. "We've stayed 25 years."

In the '69-70 school year, Dub was named Junior High Principal. With the birth of another son, Todd, in 1970, Peggy continued to stay home for another year to take care of children.

There are going to be some huge voids within the school with the departure of the Hallmarks. Voids that are not going to be easy to fill.

One of the areas in which Peggy is sure to be missed is in the area of Lockney High School's annual sponsor. Af-

ter going back to work as a Business teacher at Lockney High School, in the fall of 1971, Peggy also took over the Annual job from Mrs. Degge. When other teachers were going home to grade papers, Peggy stayed on the job taking pictures of almost any and every function the high school students were involved in.

"The first year was very hard," said Peggy. "Todd was little and I had five different preparations to do every night. I would put the kids to bed so I could stay up and study until 12 or 1:00 a.m. The second year was easier."

"I had some really good kids who worked for me. Dan Smith, Kevin Stennett and Ricky Gross always worked hard. But after awhile it was difficult for the students as they had so many things going on, so I wound up doing a lot of it myself. Covering all the sports was not bad because Dub and I are both big sports fans. We love it and never missed a football game."

Dub also stayed busy as Junior High Principal and then in 1977 he took on an even busier job as LISD Superintendent.

A tremendous amount of support has been shared by the couple in their perspective careers and child rearing. The Hallmarks have shared in each others

dreams and hard work even before they were married.

Childhood sweethearts and next door neighbors, Dub and Peggy both graduated from Hamlin High School in 1955.

Dub enlisted in the army in 1955 and was stationed in San Francisco. Peggy entered college at North Texas and earning her BBA graduating in 1959. She received her Masters in Education in 1965.

While Peggy was still in school, Dub returned from the army and the couple was married in 1958. Dub worked for about 1 1/2 years while Peggy finished school and then Peggy returned the favor.

In 1959, Dub entered North Texas while Peggy worked at the university. In 1962 Dub graduated with a BS in Physical Education and a 2nd teaching field of Science. "I pushed him to get through in 3 years," said Peggy.

After Dub's graduation, the team moved to Amarillo. Dub went to work for Eastridge Elementary and Peggy taught 6th grade at Sanborn Elementary.

Floydada man shot

Meeting in a special called session on Wednesday, June 16, the Floyd County Commissioners Court took action on three items. The county officials approved a farm contract, changed the route of an existing county road and approved an interlocal law enforcement agreement.

The change in the county road was approved for a county dirt road in the Barwise area which is located on a property easement belonging to Ann Belt Foster and her brother and sister according to Judge Bill Hardin. Foster had requested that the road be moved to the east 60 feet of an abandoned railroad easement which the landowners had recently purchased.

The commissioners approved the change on a motion by Precinct 1 Commissioner Connie Bearden with a second by Precinct 2 Commissioner Floyd Jackson. The vote was unanimous in favor of the motion.

The agreement sets forth the requirements and obligations of such action as well as specifying the legal liability of the agencies involved in specific situations. Motion to approve the agreement came from Precinct 4 Commissioner Howard Bishop with a second by Jackson. The vote was all in favor.

A farm work contract was approved on a motion by Precinct 3 Commissioner George Taylor with a second by Bearden. Old improvements will be buried for Homer R. Cypert at a location in Precinct 3 2 1/3 miles west and 1 mile north of Cedar Hill in order to return the land to cultivation.

Judge Hardin read the minutes of the previous meetings from April 12, April 19, May 3, May 10, May 19 and June 7 before the morning session adjourned. The county officials met again on

Thursday, June 17, at 4:00 p.m. to approve a motion allowing West Texas Gas Company, Inc. to cross a county road with a natural gas line for an irrigation well. The site is located in Precinct 2 (Block D-5 of the D & P RR Co. Survey between sections 4 & 8.

The gas company will be responsible for all costs involved. The new 2 inch line will be placed least 4 inches below the bottom level of the bar ditch to allow the road to be worked in the usual manner by county employees and equipment.

A Message to the Citizen's of Floydada from the City Manager

Waste management practices for residents of Floydada and others who use the Floydada Landfill will soon experience many changes. Due to continued changes in rule interpretation, the City of Floydada may be forced to close its landfill.

The city council is exploring various avenues on how to continue to provide the citizens of Floydada with sanitation service. One fact is certain, regardless of the means of service selected, changes will be mandatory.

Changes that will be required will range from what can be put in dumpsters, what is acceptable at a landfill, to what waste disposal is going to cost. Within these changes it is known that less items, such as yard waste or scrap building material, cannot be put in dumpsters.

Some items accepted at a landfill will have to be processed for recycling, such as appliances, tires and petroleum containers. Other items will be banned entirely from a landfill. Cost of handling waste will increase as more stringent rules are adopted.

For the near future the City of Floydada is considering using a private hauler to collect and dispose of waste. The selection of this method appears to be the best answer at this time. Until such time that all parts of Regulation D of the Federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act have been finalized, the city is uncertain about opening the new permitted site. This uncertainty has been brought about by recent court rulings.

The city council will continue to study means and methods of waste management and adopt those which are best for the citizens of Floydada.

If the Floydada landfill is closed, all citizens are asked to cooperate in disposing of their waste. Those people living outside the service area of the city of

Floydada need to start planning now on how they will handle their waste in the future. Various options are available to these citizens.

After his time in the army Lusk went back to school at Kansas State University and earned his masters degree in music.

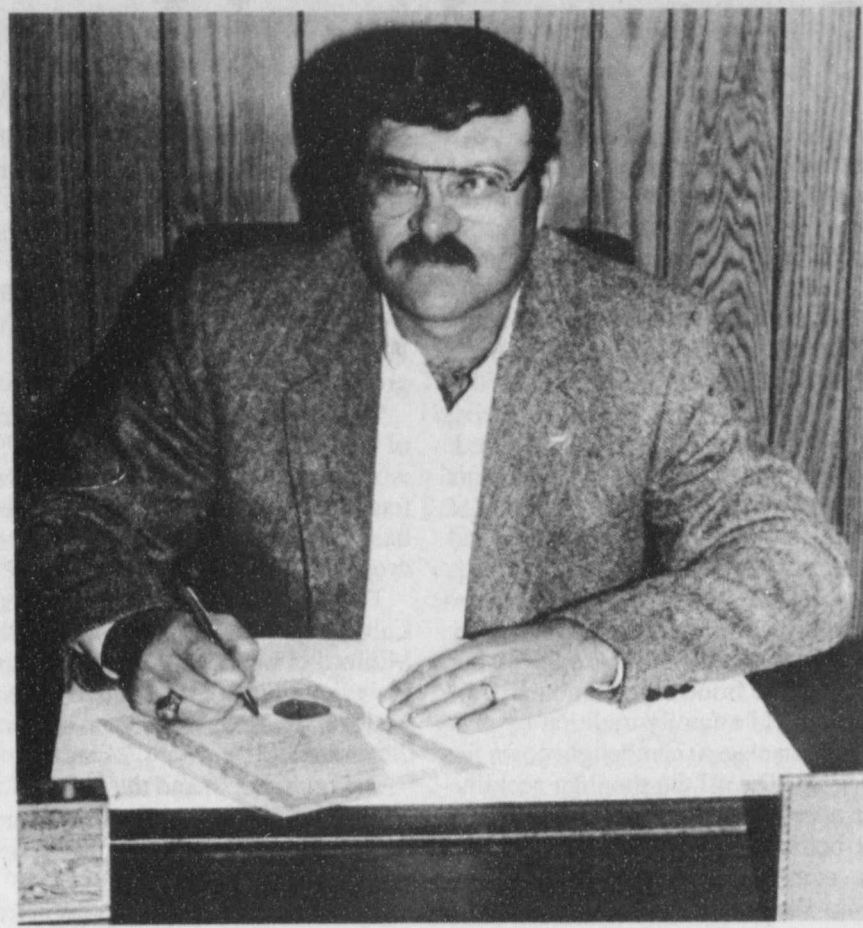

LISD approves single member districts

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In Reading, 8th graders scored 62% compared to the state average of 60%. In 1992 these same students averaged 66% in this subject.

In Math, 35% of the 8th graders passed, compared to the state average of 43%. Last year 56% of the students passed Math.

"Math scores dropped statewide," said High School Counselor Diane Lowe. "Nobody knows why yet. We aren't allowed to see the test results or the questions to find out where the weaknesses are or why the student may have missed a question."

In the 10th grade, 79% of the students passed the Writing portion of the test, compared to 80% statewide. In 1992 74% of these same students, as 9th graders, passed the Writing section.

In the area of Reading, 56% of the students passed compared to 70% of students statewide. Last year 57% of the students passed.

In Math, 59% of the 10th graders passed compared to the state average of 55%. These same students averaged 39% passing Math in 1992.

According to Lowe, all 11th graders who had to re-take the TAAS test this year scored above the state average in every area.

The trustees also discussed the school security and the recent vandalism and thefts at the school. It was decided that because of the increase in criminal activity the school would install a security system that would be in place as soon as possible.

Beside the new superintendent, trustees also hired Bobby Ventura as coach, to replace Coach Joe Pat Wright. Wright has moved to Crosbyton. Ventura will be moving to Lockney from Bovina and will be coaching in all areas of sports.

Also hired was Ruth Reed as kindergarten teacher and Lisa Collins as a speech therapist.

The president adjourned the meeting and refreshments were served.

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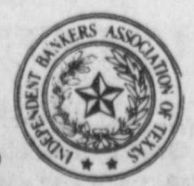

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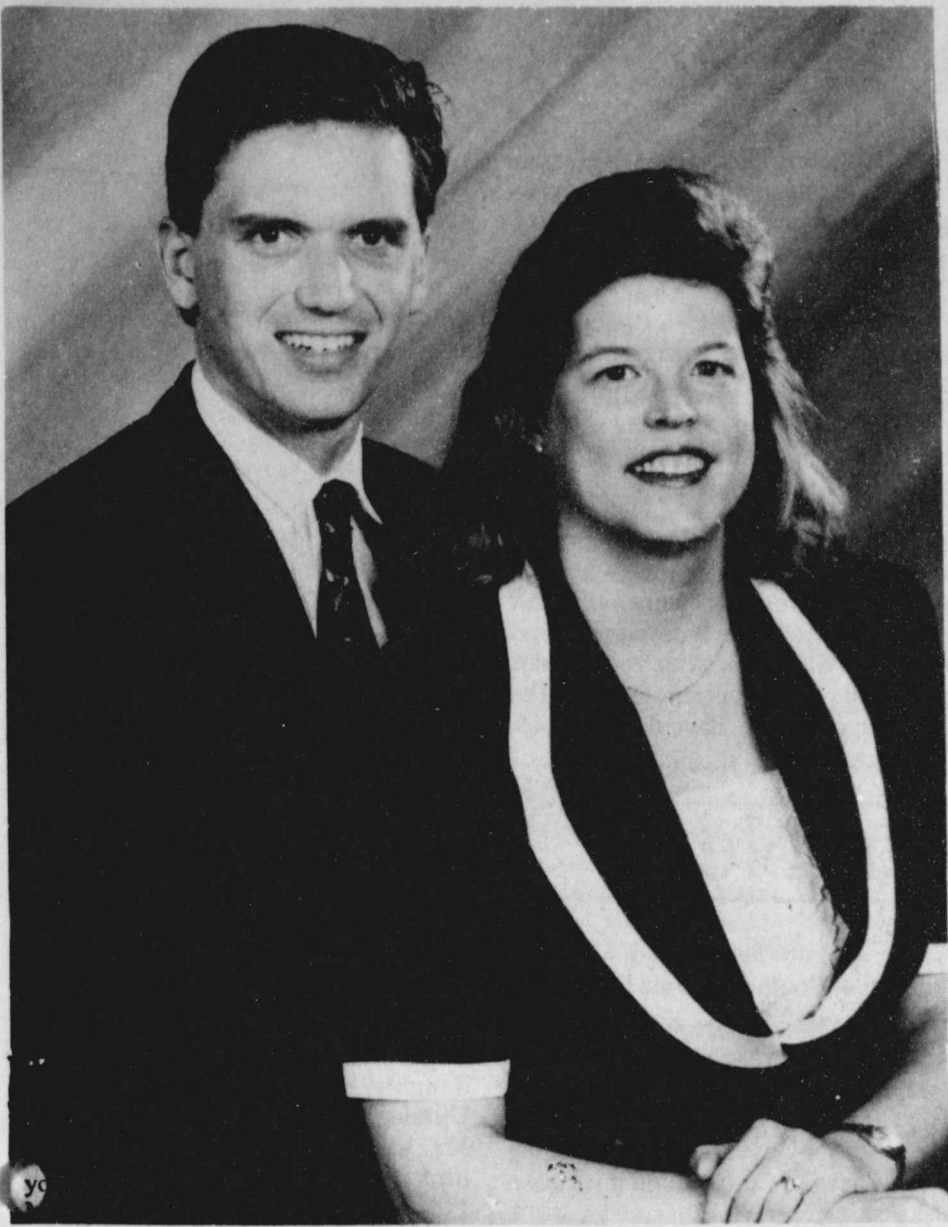

Garcia's initial training consisted of 12 hours of instruction over a 2-day period focusing on an intensive orientation to the Selective Service System, the major duties and responsibilities of Local Board Members, and procedures to be followed by the Local Board.
He will receive continued training in changes in the law, regulations, responsibilities, and related agency policies and procedures.

Paul McIntosh. A motion by Pitts during the June 17 regular monthly board meeting was seconded by Jerry Thompson and approved by unanimous vote to continue the current subsidies. Board members Joy Assiter and Faris expressed a desire to have the board consider increasing the salary for the fulltime paramedic. No increase was approved at this time. Ammons told the board that he felt the ambulance and the paramedic should be brought back under the supervision of the hospital in the future. He also expressed a desire to see

McIntosh utilized at the hospital since the hospital is paying his salary. Assiter has submitted her resignation from the ambulance supervisory board effective August 1, 1993. The new hospital district representative on the Ambulance Board will be Faris. Auditors from Durbin & Company of Lubbock presented the audit report for the 1991-92 fiscal year which ended in September 1992. Several suggestions were made at the early morning meeting concerning the establishment of more detailed record keeping, writing job descriptions and utilizing accepted ac-

counting practices in daily operation. According to auditors, the hospital is in better financial condition than it has been in several years. No comparison figures were included from previous audits because the comparison between a closed hospital and an open hospital would not be practical. The report will be issued in draft form at the request of the board. Issuance of a completed audit at this time would require the inclusion of a "going concern" statement according to the auditor. This statement would reflect the fact that the hospital was designed to provide health care to the area and as a closed facility, it is not meeting the purpose for which it was designed. A final audit will be approved after the hospital is reopened. Financial statements were reviewed. Current statements show the district with \$695,000.00 coming in to date this year. Expenditures were placed at \$352,000.00 so far this fiscal year. May expenses were placed at \$95,000.00. This includes \$21,000.00 expended on the heating and air conditioning system,

and a \$12,000.00 assessment for the new computer and building at the Appraisal District said Ammons. The administrator reported that the final cost to the hospital for a completely new phone system valued at approximately \$30,000.00 will be \$5,000.00. The system is being replaced due to flood damage and this is the insurance deductible according to Ammons. Ammons also reported that the computer is installed and the software people should be in on Monday to program it. Executive session was held from 9:20 a.m. to 10:10 a.m. for the discussion of personnel. No action was taken following that discussion. Other action taken at the regular June session were:

...Board approved sale of tax title Lots 13-16, Block 7, Floydada to Oscar Garza for \$100.00 each. Final sale is dependant on approval by all taxing entities involved. ...Annual renewal of contract with Floyd County Central Appraisal District was approved. Contract provides for assessment, billing and collection of hospital district taxes by the appraisal district with the fee based on the percentage of the total tax levy the hospital is responsible for. ...Board President Fred Thayer will work with the administrator to determine specific areas in hospital where replacement of ceiling tiles is necessary prior to having the work done. Estimates for replacing ceiling tiles run from a low of \$4,875.00 for installation only to \$9,000.00 for removing old tiles and installing new tiles.

...A rural scholarship application from a potential medical student named Damon Edwards was reviewed and rejected. ...A brief discussion concerning changing the CHD from operating on a fiscal year basis to operating on a calendar year basis was tabled with no action taken at this time. ...Reporting on physician recruitment, Ammons told the board that he was talking with two prospective physicians who do Obstetrics, one of the two is also a general surgeon. He added that two new firms have begun a physicians search on behalf of the hospital district and he will be meeting next week with another prospect from Midland.

"That's true," said Dub. "It was the middle of a school year and I had to take what I could get. I taught 4th grade arithmetic, 3rd grade Science and physical education. Elementary teachers EARN THEIR MONEY. I only did it one semester and never did it again." "He had lots of PTA programs where he would have to organize tumbling and folk dances," said Peggy. "It was an excellent learning experience for both of us."

left Amarillo and elementary schools and moved to Big Spring. Peggy team taught in Business at Big Spring High School, and Dub taught 7th-9th grade P.E., Health, Drivers Ed and coached at Goliah Junior High. "I enjoyed that," said Dub. "I like sports and I enjoyed coaching. My high school coach had a lot of influence over me, and I have always felt that coaching was a good way to work with kids." The couple stayed six years at Big Spring during which time their first son,

Brent, was born in 1967. Peggy stopped teaching and stayed home during the day. In the evenings when Dub was home, Peggy taught night school in Howard County Junior College. It was from Big Spring that the Hallmarks moved to Lockney in 1968. In their many years in academics, the Hallmarks have seen some big changes in the schools both in student discipline and attitudes and in the business aspect of running the schools. "As bad as things are around the state in the schools things are still better in a small city the size of Lockney," said Hallmark. "A small school such as this is still the last frontier of normalcy."

Peggy. "Some of our students are bused to Floydada now for VOCT classes." "The County Education Districts that were being used to collect taxes for the school was a Floyd County consolidation of taxes. There's no reason why that shouldn't work. "The only problem with consolidation," said Peggy, "is that the legislature always goes to extremes. They can't seem to find a middle road."

"There is a misconception among people that there is no discipline in the schools. Educators want to discipline but they do consider their options before taking action." School financing and student discipline are going to have to take a back seat on future Hallmark worries. This community and the support we have had as a family has convinced us that there is no place like it. We are not leaving. This is our home."

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"Not only has Hallmark dealt with changing norms among children but he has also fought for many years with the changing opinions of legislators and courts on school funding. "In my opinion," said Dub, "the plan the legislature has come up with now will probably end up being more unconstitutional than before. We will receive (as a poor school district) \$217,000 less in the 1993-94 than we did last year."

"I believe the only way to solve this problem would be for the state to fund it all. They could distribute it equally from monies collected through a tax, possibly a sales tax which is more popular than an income tax. They should do away with property taxes as a way to fund the schools. "This issue has been going on for a long time, and it will be a long time before it is solved," said Hallmark.

On the touchy topic of consolidation, Hallmark stated, "At some point there will be consolidation. Even if the schools consolidate there is no reason to do away with the high schools. Some programs could be consolidated like they are done now." "We have some real good programs which are already consolidated," said

Florence Nightingale played a major role in the evolution of the nursing profession. She was recognized for her nursing efforts in the Crimean War and later in Great Britain, as she brought order out of chaos and did her best to combat unsanitary conditions and high death rates. In Nightingale's era, most nursing duties related to housekeeping, meal preparation, and hygiene. By the 1940's, nurses were performing most of the procedures previously completed by doctors. Today, nurses perform many of the duties doctors carried out in the '40's. The idea of a nurse as simply the doctor's assistant is no longer accurate.

Today, nurses have almost unlimited career opportunities. A nurse can work in rural or urban areas, be a traveling nurse or even work on a cruise ship. Positions are available in clinical nursing, administration, research, community programs and even in consulting roles.

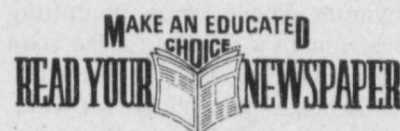
