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Lockney School Board, Council approve single member voting districts

LOCKNEY—Lockney City Councilmen and School Board Trustees have both reached compromise settlements in the separate lawsuits filed against the city and school board concerning their At-Large voting system.

The city's settlement creates five single member districts with the mayor being elected at-large. The school board settlement creates five single member districts with two members being elected at-large.

The plaintiff, Joe S. Perez of Lockney had filed the suit in August 1992, against the city and school board contending that the At-Large plurality elections were unconstitutional because it discriminated against minorities by diluting their voting strength.

Both parties agreed that the number of city council members would remain at five council members and a mayor. Seven school board members will also continue to be elected.

According to the settlement agreement, "A candidate for a single member district does not have to be a resident of the single member district he or she seeks to represent at the time of filing for the position."

Candidates for City Council must reside within the City of Lockney and school board candidates must reside within the LISD.

"Everyone that resides in a single member district will have the opportunity to vote for one person to represent them in that district," said LISD Superintendent Dub Hallmark. "Because of the size of the districts it would not have been feasible to require that only those living within the single member district could run for office representing that particular district."

The plaintiff and the city also reached an agreement on attorney's fees. The city shall pay to the plaintiff \$7,000 as total settlement of attorney's fees. The school district will also pay \$7,000 in plaintiff's attorney's fees.

CITY OF LOCKNEY DISTRICT BREAKDOWN

The population and minority breakdown of the newly created single member districts are as follows (a map of the districts will be published in next week's Hesperian-Beacon):

District 1: Total population is 445; Hispanic population is 347 (78%); Black population is 28 (6%); combined minority population is 375 (85%);

District 2: Total population is 441; Hispanic population is 268 (61%); Black population, 16, (4%); combined minority, 284 (65%);

District 3: Total population is 437; Hispanic population, 229 (61%), Black population, 16 (4%); combined minor-

ity, 245 (56%);

District 4: Total population is 449; Hispanic population, 95 (21%), Black population, 5 (1%); combined minority, 100 (22%);

District 5: Total population is 435; Hispanic population, 92 (21%), Black population, 6 (1%), combined minority, 98 (23%).

The plan must now be presented to the United States Attorney General's office for approval.

LISD DISTRICT BREAKDOWN

(A map of the districts can be found inside this paper):

District 1: Total population is 636; Hispanic population, 430 (68%), Black population, 34 (6.2%); combined minority, 464 (73%);

District 2: Total population is 628; Hispanic population, 388 (62%); Black population, 15 (2%); combined minority, 403 (64%);

District 3: Total population, 626; Hispanic population, 192 (31%); Black population, 20 (3%); combined minority population, 212 (34%);

District 4: Total population, 618; Hispanic population, none; Black population, none;

District 5: Total population, 631; Hispanic population, none; Black population, none.

This plan must also be presented to the U.S. Attorney General's office for approval.

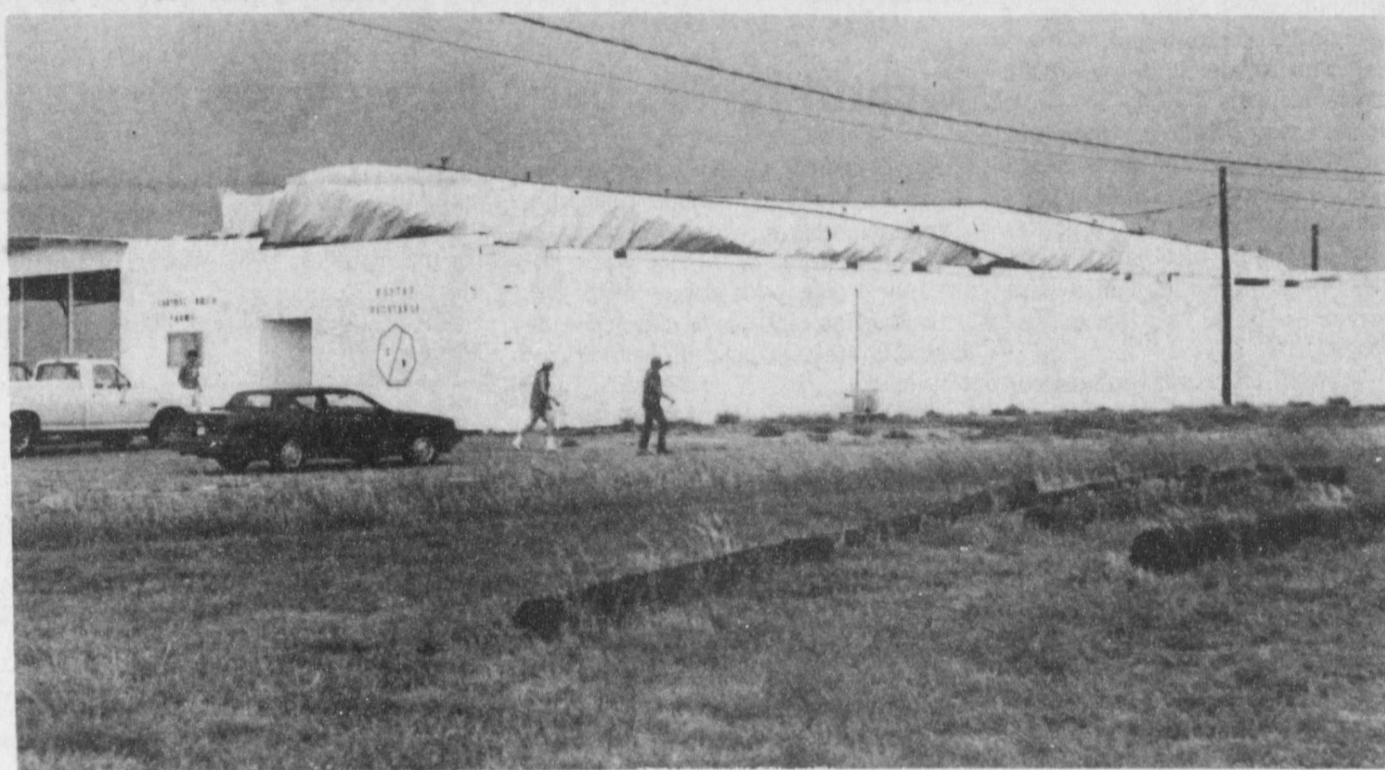
Garza Theatre presents lively tent show comedy

DPS troopers investigate accidents

DPS troopers stayed busy in Floyd County over the 4th of July weekend investigating accidents and administering intoxication tests for suspected DWI offenders.

July 5, at 8:30 a.m., Trooper Ron Parks was called to a one-car rollover accident on county dirt road 54, eight miles northwest of Quitaque.

According to Parks, a white GMC pickup, driven by Donna Dudley Pigg, 34, of Quitaque, was traveling east when it ran off the road onto the right shoulder. The truck went down into the deep bar ditch and rolled over. Pigg was not injured in the accident.

Also on July 5, Parks was called at 8:55 p.m. to a motorcycle accident on Hwy. 62.

According to DPS reports, Kerry Bradford, 35, was driving a Honda 250 north on Hwy. 62 about 7.4 miles south of Floydada. Tonya Bradford, 27, was a passenger on the motorcycle.

Bradford had just turned right onto Hwy. 62 off of county paved road 318 (Baptist Encampment road) and had reached speeds of approximately 20 miles per hour when a Rottweiler dog ran out in front of the motorcycle.

The front tire of the bike fell and slid down the pavement. The Bradfords suffered minor abrasions.

According to Parks, "The driver fled the scene leaving the passenger at the accident site. A motorist, who witnessed the accident, had a mobile phone and called 911."

Tonya Bradford was transported by ambulance to W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital where she was treated and released.

The driver was found in town and charged with no driver's license, no registration, no insurance and failure to report injury or accident.

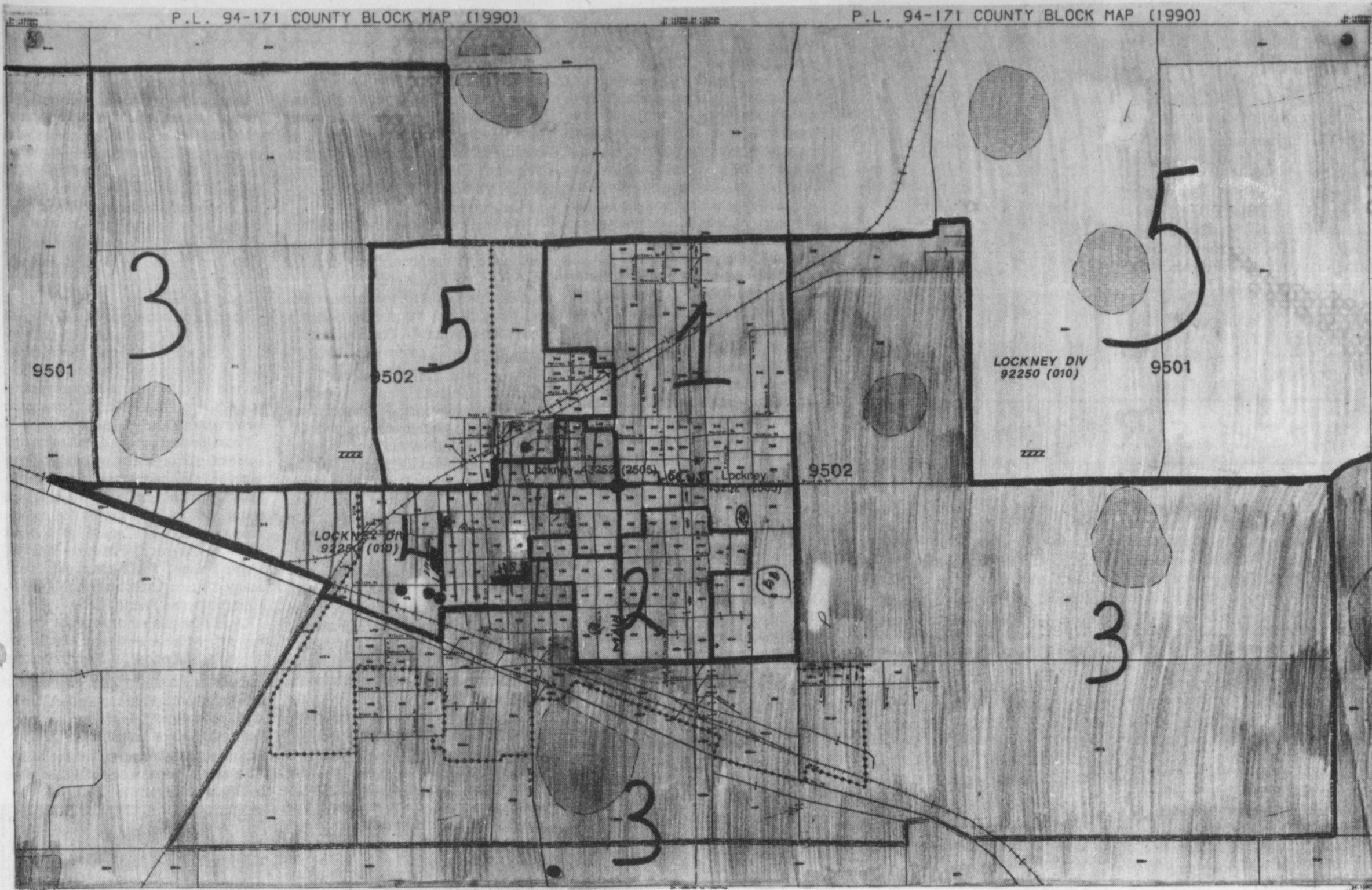

Tips from National Safe Boating Council

Weather or Not to Boat?

Weather is a major concern to boaters. There are many excellent sources of accurate weather reports. Local newspapers issue 1- to 3-day reports. Radio and television broadcasts give both short and long range forecasts. The National Weather Service broadcasts weather information continuously.

If you are planning a day on the water get the latest forecast, and HEED THE WARNINGS. Underway, notice if the wind strengthens. Look for cloud buildup. Bad weather can occur even with a fair forecast, with squalls and thunderstorms causing a dangerous situation to those caught off guard.

If foul weather finds you, have everyone don their PFD (life jacket). Reduce speed and head for the nearest safe shore or harbor. Head toward the waves at a slight angle to keep water out of the boat. Seat passengers low and near the boat's center. If the engine fails, use a sea anchor to hold the bow upwind in open

water. Consider beaching a small open boat on the nearest shore. As the operator, you are responsible for the boat and passengers.

Being weather wise is a basic rule of safe boating. Eoat Smart! Watch the weather and use good judgment when deciding what to do when the weather changes.

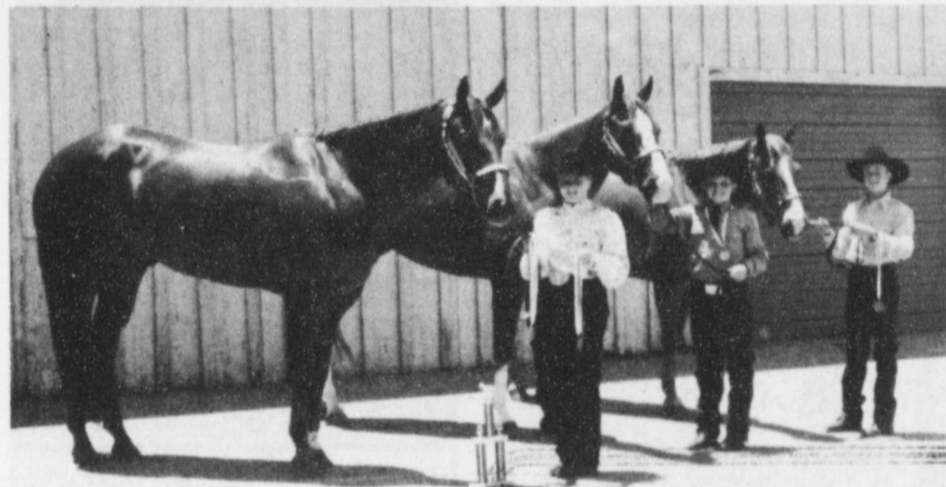
Three members of the Silver Spurs Horse Project competed at the District 2 4-H horse show in Lubbock on June 21.

The Bureau has been receiving calls from consumers who have been told they will be awarded a vacation package, watches, and diamond pendants if they will pay \$600+ for insurance, shipping and handling.

In our investigation of the 800 number consumers call, we found that IMPERIAL LIFE HEALTH is out of Burlingame, California, and according to the BBB in San Mateo, the company has been the subject of complaints.

While the company has responded to the complaints, the BBB/San Mateo rates the company's records as unsatisfactory since they have not eliminated the causes of complaint. The Bureau has been forwarding complaints received on this company to the U.S. Postal Inspection Srv. to aid them in a preliminary inquiry into the operations of this company to determine if there has been any violations of law.

If you have been involved with this company or similar companies, give us a call at 763-0459. Remember, if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is!

With money tight, many hopeful vacationers are looking for discounted airfares and accommodations to make their summer travel plans possible. But, the BBB warns that some travel offers may never get off the ground and only end up costing you a lot of money and grief.

Travel scam operators use many different devices to draw in victims, including postcards, direct mail letters,

900 telephone numbers and false newspaper and television advertisements. Most of these vacation certificates include hidden costs, such as registration fees, an expensive club membership, or requirements to buy high-priced products that the company is selling. If the airfare is for two, hotel accommodation prices may be greatly inflated. And, in many cases, travel is restricted to a very limited time. Often these operators use high-pressure tactics. Our best suggestion is to get all offers in writing, do some comparative shopping by contacting the airlines or hotels yourself, and always call your local travel agent and the BBB.

McKinney, Barrow ride 455 miles in the Texas Chaining Challenge tour

James McKinney and Frank Barrow recently completed the Texas Chaining Challenge, a seven day - 455 mile long bicycle tour organized by the Longview Bicycle Club, starting June 6 and finishing on June 12.

McKinney, a 1963 graduate of Floydada High School is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John J. McKinney of Floydada. Barrow, a graduate of FHS in 1962, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Barrow of Rockdale.

This was the fourth year for the tour. Each year the tour is ridden over a different route. This year, after registration and spending the night in Saledo, the tour went northeast through east Texas on farm to market roads stopping each afternoon at host town camps in Marlin, Worthum, Athens, Wells Point, Sulphur Springs, Pittsburgh and ending the sev-

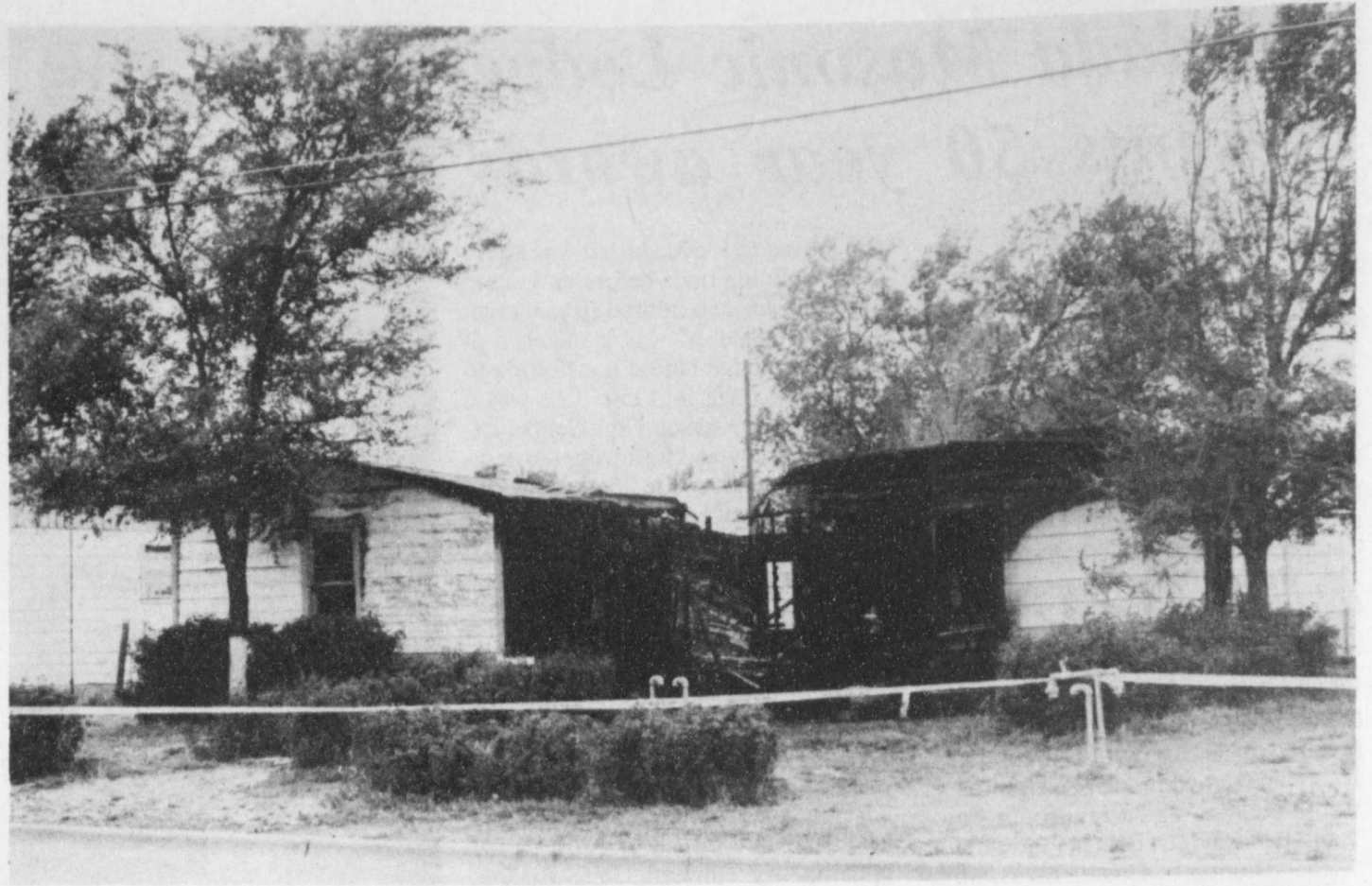
enth day in Longview. The daily mileage averaged 65 miles per day with two days mileage over 70 miles.

Showers and camping facilities were provided and breakfast and dinner was served by each host town. Water stops were provided at 15 mile intervals and lunch at the day's half way point by civic and church groups as fund raisers in the towns along the route.

The tour was limited to 300 riders and 198 riders started in Saledo. While not all riders completed the ride, only eight had to drop out for medical problems, including one lady with dehydration, one man with a broken collar bone and one man with a heart attack. A registered paramedic, a sports massage team and two bicycle shop vans with mechanics swept the route daily to keep the riders

on the road. Riders ages ranged from 9 years, for twins riding with their dad on a tandem with a trailer, to 79 years for the eldest rider making his fourth consecutive Chaining tour. The most common problem reported by the riders was "saddle sores" and sore muscles.

It was a coincidence that Barrow, a resident of Rockdale, and McKinney, a resident of Dallas, met in Saledo, since neither was aware the other was riding the tour. While they had run marathons together in the 70's, and stayed in contact during the 80's, they had not ridden together before this time. Both had trained for the ride averaging 140 miles a week for Barrow, and 220 miles a week for McKinney, for the month before the ride. They both finished the tour in better shape than when they started and hope to be able to ride in next year's tour.

This award is a prestigious honor very few students can ever hope to attain. In fact, the Academy recognizes less than 10% of all American high school students.

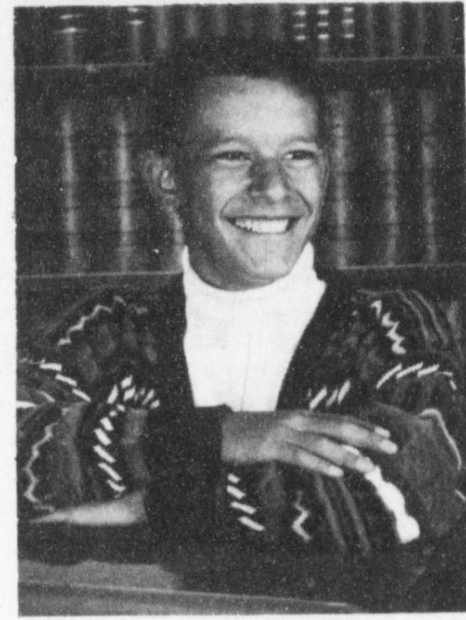

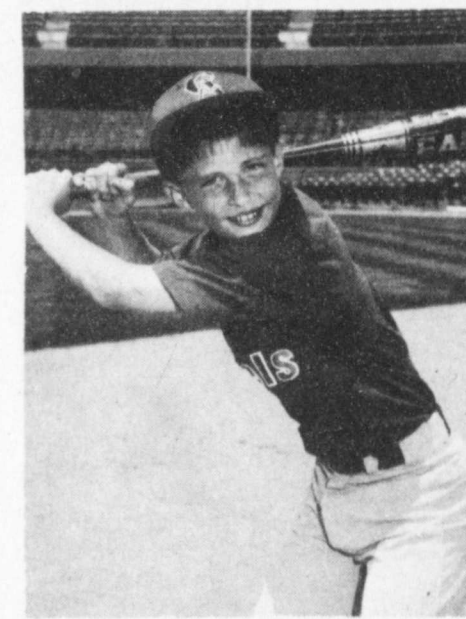
Anders in baseball contest

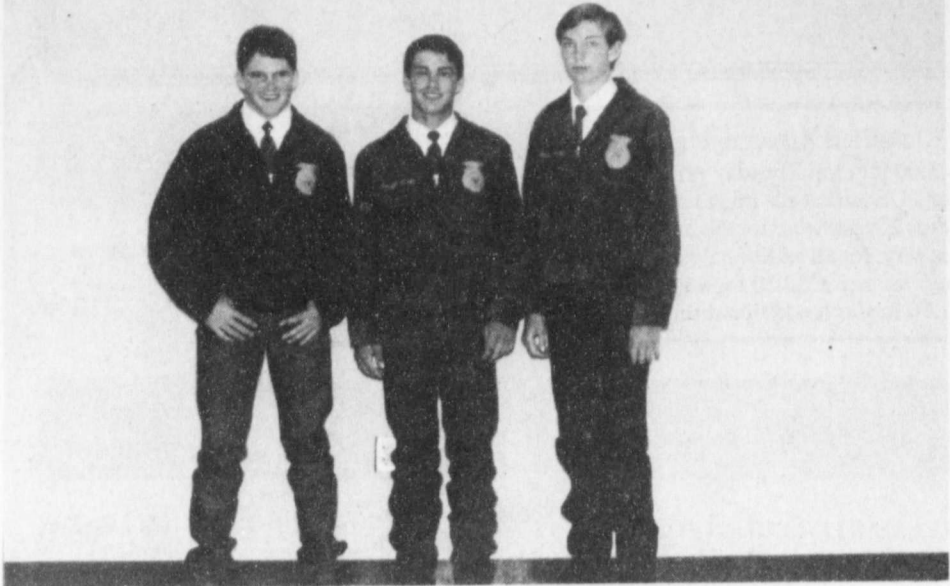
all levels of experience. Classes include: Halter, Showmanship, Horsemanship, Pleasure, Trail and Reining. Two English classes will also be offered.

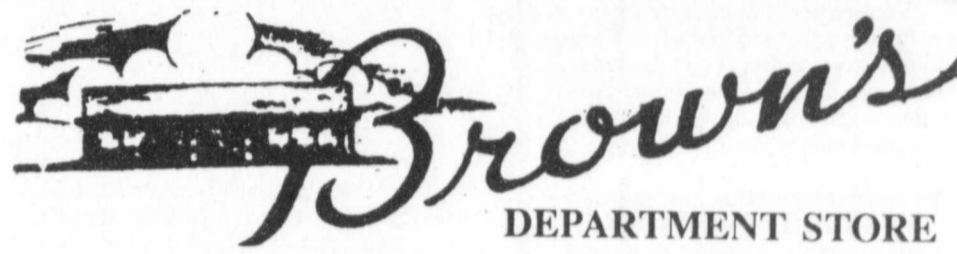
