Lockney School Board, Council approve single member voting districts

LOCKNEY-Lockney City Councilmen and School Board Trustees have both reached compromise settlements in the separate lawsuits filed against the ity and school board concerning their At-Large voting system.

The city's settlement creates five single member districts with the mayor being elected at-large. The school board settlement creates five single member districts with two members being elected at-large.

The plaintiff, Joe. S. Perez of Lockney had filed the suit in August 1992, against the city and school board contending that the At-Large plurality elections were unconstitutional because it discriminated against minorities by diluting their voting strength.

Both parties agreed that the number of city council members would remain at five council members and a mayor. Seven school board members will also continue to be elected.

According to the settlement agreement, "A candidate for a single member district does not have to be a resident of the single member district he or she seeks to represent at the time of filing for the position."

Candidates for City Council must reside within the City of Lockney and school board candidates must reside within the LISD.

Everyone that resides in a single member district will have the opportunity to vote for one person to represent them in that district," said LISD Superintendent Dub Hallmark. "Because of the size of the districts it would not have been feasible to require that only those living within the single member district could run for office representing that particular district."

The plaintiff and the city also reached an agreement on attorney's fees. The city shall pay to the plaintiff \$7,000 as total settlement of attorney's fees. The school district will also pay \$7,000 in plaintiff's attorney's fees.

The plan must now be presented to the United States Attorney General's office for approval.

DPS troopers investigate accidents

DPS troopers stayed busy in Floyd County over the 4th of July weekend investigating accidents and administering intoxilizer tests for suspected DWI offenders.

July 5, at 8:30 a.m., Trooper Ron Parks was called to a one-car rollover accident on county dirt road 54, eight miles northwest of Quitaque.

According to Parks, a white GMC pickup, driven by Donna Dudley Pigg, 34, of Quitaque, was traveling east when itran off the road onto the right shoulder. The truck went down into the deep bar ditch and rolled over. Pigg was not injured in the accident.

elected include Ella Jean Lee of Baytown, first vice president; Juanita Harmon of Lewisville, second vice president; Modesta Pena of San Diego, recording secretary; and Lynn J. Young of Saginaw, corresponding secretary. Sandy Whitney of El Paso will serve as parliamentarian.

A series of concurrent workshops concerning the past, present and future took place for members during the time of the executive board session. Decorations and programs for the various functions carried out the state president's convention theme: "A Positive Past . . .

A Fantastic Future."

Ceremonies during the birthday luncheon honored members joining over 50 years ago, along with recipients of the State Achievement Award, Members in Print Award and two new awards: the Golden Rose Award and the Chapter Excellence Award. In addition, the convention introduced participants in the state's first leadership workshop and recipients of state and international scholarships.

State personnel held committee workshops following the birthday luncheon. Friday night a tribute to the 303 Texas chapter presidents saluted the Fantastic Team, using fans and wildflowers of Texas during the presentation, which also honored state and international presidents.

The international society of women educators originated in Austin on May 11, 1929, when Dr. Annie Webb Blanton, a University of Texas professor, invited 11 other teachers from various parts of Texas to join her in forming the new organization.

From the nucleus of a dozen members in Texas, the organization has grown to nearly 19,000 members in Texas and to 164,000 members in 3,132 chapters throughout each of the United States, nine provinces of Canada, as well as Norway, Sweden, Finland, Iceland, Great Britain, The Netherlands, Germany, Mexico, Guatemala, El Salvador, Costa Rica and Puerto Rico.

One of the main thrusts of the honorary society is the awarding of scholarships for additional study to members and of world fellowships to teachers in non-member countries to enable them to study in various colleges and universities in the United States.

A regional conference for the southwest area member states will take place in Wichita, Kansas, in July.







Weather or Not to Boat?

Weather is a major concern to boaters. There are many excellent sources of accurate weather reports. Local newspapers issue 1- to 3-day reports. Radio and television broadcasts give both short and long range forecasts. The National Weather Service broadcasts weather information continuously.

If you are planning a day on the water get the latest forecast, and HEED THE WARNINGS. Underway, notice if the wind strengthens. Look for cloud buildup. Bad weather can occur even with a fair forecast, with squalls and thunderstorms causing a dangerous situation to those caught off guard.

If foul weather finds you, have everyone don their PFD (life jacket). Reduce speed and head for the nearest safe shore or harbor. Head toward the waves at a slight angle to keep water out of the boat. Seat passengers low and near the boat's center. If the engine fails, use a sea anchor to hold the bow upwind in open



* * *Pest Management Report* * *

GENERAL SITUATION

A much needed rainfall occurred Wednesday and produced 1.2 inches of rain in the Crosbyton area and .5 to 1 inch of rain south of Floydada. Unfortunately, some areas west and north of Floydada received less than half inch. Regardless of how much rain fell, all crops have taken a turn for the better.

Except for some replanted cotton, most fields have cotton with 6 to 14 nodes. Many of these fields have matchhead and some 1/3 grown size squares. Amazingly high square sets have been reported throughout both Crosby and Floyd Counties. Most square sets are still holding between 80 and 97%. "Blasted" or lost squares may be attributed to insect feeding, cultivation, and/ or environmental stress. Considering the insect pressure we have seen the past couple weeks, I feel that the latter two may be causing a majority of these lost squares.

Most cotton has outgrown the thrips stage. Replanted cotton will need to be watched closely, especially if no atplanting insecticide was put down. The next insect problem we will face is fleahoppers. Last week, fleahopper infestations were light. This week, fleahopper infestations have increased on fields scouted in the pest management program. The scouts have been finding 4 to 24% infestations on older cotton. Those fields that were approaching the threshold did, however, have 92% or greater square sets. Remember, the economic

threshold is 25 to 30 fleahoppers per 100 terminals combined with less than 90% square set.

Beneficial numbers are still on the ties have hit full bloom. It is important to rise. Minute pirate bugs (adult and watch these fields for sunflower head immature) are numbering almost 1 to 2 moth. At 20% blooming heads; an inper plant. We are also seeing ladybeetles, big-eyed bugs, spiders, and some lacewing eggs.

Some fields of corn in Floyd County are tasseling and will start pollination soon. We have started to pick up a few banks grass mites on lower corn leaves. Recent irrigation practices and rainfall will help in deterring this pest. We have also been seeing a few corn ear worms on whorl stage corn. Recently, Floyd County Extension Agent Kerry Siders and I set out southwestern corn borer (SWCB) pheromone traps on Leonard Knoll's place outside Barwise and near a corn field owned by Warren Mathis. Trap catches have not produced any SWCB adults.

SORGHUM

For the most part, sorghum is looking good. Corn leaf aphid populations are still heavy in the whorl. Remember these aphids are usually not injurious to the plant. Instead, they serve as an excellent food source for beneficial insects. An aphid we will need to watch carefully is the greenbug. Greenbug populations have remained small in size and still appear to be doing little damage. Look for these greenbug colonies on the underside of lower leaves.

The Texas Agriculture Hazard Communication Act, more commonly known as the Right-to-Know law, serves to protect farm workers when they work around pesticides. Under this law, administered by TDA, workers must be advised about the chemicals they are working around, pesticide exposure symptoms and ways to guard against contamination. Farmers must provide written information sheets on pesticides and read these sheets to workers in the field.






