By Ken Towery We never cease to be amazed by the hyocrisy yhat all 100 often shows up in media cousins.
They are capable of writing thunder-
ng editorials on behalf of "the liule gg editorials on behalf of "the liute
Interests," against the financial "special interests," against the giants of industry,
on and on ad nauseam. But, not unlike on and on ad nauseam. But, not unlike
he world of politics, what you see, gentle reader, is not necessarily what you get.
The res The result is that the "little people",
including little newspapers, quite often get it in the neck.
A case in point: During the most recent session of the Texas Legislature, a fight erupted between the Southweststate's newspaper industry over an issue long anticipataed by both sides. It was an
issue that didn't really involve the issue that didn't really involve the
smaller, community newspapers, but was of vital importance (we were told)
to the state's major papers. Leading the fight for the major papers was the very liberal, and very wealthy, Austin
American-Statesman, part of the massive Cox media empire. The Adanta-
based Cox corporation includes newspapers, television and radio stations, plus cable television companies (Lubbock among ohers).
Many of the state' were conned into joining the batule, on
grounds that they too had a vital interes at stake. Similar battles have been going on around the country
Without going too much into the intri-
cate details of the batule we can say it revolved around Southwestern Bell's efforts to move into areas that have
nothing to do with the reasons they are given monopoly status in those commu-
nities they serve. They wanted, in short, to use their government-granted monopoly phone lines to move into the
transmission of classified advertising transmission of classified advertising
and other "information services" previ and other "information services" prev
ously denied them by law. Obviously it would have been, and would be, an
unfair situation. There is no possible unfair situation. There is no possible
way smaller, independent mediaoutlets could compete with outfits having
monopoly powers in the field of com munications.
The Legislature bought the newspa per argument, partucularly the argumen
that such a development would be harm that such a development would be harm-
ful to the phone company's rate-paying consumers, which it would. The tele-
phone company's argument that the needed the additional source of revenue
fell flat on its face in light of the fact that is one of the most lucrative, money
aking businesses around. In fact Southwestern Bell has made so much money it has now invested heavily in Mexico, and in at least one professional
sports team. So the Legislature dragged its feet on Bell's proposal, and, at the behest of Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, the whole matter was put off for a couple of
years after an uneasy standown was years after an uneasy standown wa So then what happened? Press reports recently noted that Cox
Enterprises is now "close to agreeing" Enterprises is now "close to agreeing"
with BellSouth Corporation with Bellsouncorporation, one of the to deliver Yellow Pages informatio and classified advertising by telephone

means BellSouth will be doing what means BellSouth will be doing what
Southwestern Bell wanted to do Souhtester
also that Cox will be getting a piece of the action, a piece of the pie.
The report also noted that "Cox has been a leading opponent of telephone companies providing information serv-
ices."
Neither Cox nor Bell would commen officially, but the chairman of Cox sai "I think you'll see a lot of strategi partnerships develop."

This newly recognized hantavirus assoc ated with the deer mouse. In June, 1993, a fatal case of adult respiratory distress syndrome occurred in an individual in
East Texas. Hantavins was also fied as the cause even though this individual had not traveled outside the East Texas region.
Texas Department of Health staff have been receiving numerous calls mystery illness. The following list provides the most commonly asked questions and the appropriate answers:
What are the symptoms of a hantavirus infection? The symptoms are fever, body aches, dry cough, and within 3-4 days a rapid onset of severe respiratory failure.
How do p
How do people catch hantavirus in-
fections? Rodents are the naturu hos. for all known hantaviruses. Humans are thought to be infected from exposure to rodent droppings, urine, or saliva, either through aerosols or direct inoculation.
Rodents may be chronically infected with hantavirus and excrete the virus for months.
If If find dead rodents, rodent nests,
rodent dreppingsor urie do? Never touch the rodent, its droppings, or its urine with bare hands. Try not to disturb the rodents or their wastes in a manner that creates aerosols (small particles of matter suspended in air)
BEFORE cleanup, spray a contact insecticide that states on the label that it kills fleas on the surrounding area. Follow label directions. Use rubber or disposable gloves and saturate the area
with LiquidLysol (not aerosol Lysal) or bleach. Pour the liquid disinfectant on the rodent, rodent droppings, rodent bedding, etc. Use the disinfectant according to label directions. The proper dilution for laundry bleach is $1 / 2$ cup
bleach to 5 cups of water. Place the rodent or other material mentioned above in a plastic bag along with the items used in the clean up procedure
(gloves, paper towels, paper plates, et

According to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, light-
ning kills more people than tomadoes ning kills more people than tormadoes
and hurricanes combined. In the United States, more than 200 people die each year from lightning or from fires caused
by lightning. Thousands more are inby lightning. Thousands more are in-
jured. Interestingly, Texas ranks third in the U.S. for having the most lightning
fatalities.
To help you prevent coming in contact with lightning, the National Oceani
and Atmospheric Administration offer the following safety steps: ${ }^{*}$ When a thunderstorm threatens, take shelter in a home or large building, or
inside an all-metal (not convertible) *Inside a home, do not use a tele phone, except for emergencies.
*If ouside, with no time If oulside, with no time to reach a
safe building or an automobile, follow these rules:

- Do not stand under a natural lightning rod, such as a tall, isolated tree -Make sure you are not the tall-
estobiect on the landscape, such as in an open field, on the beach, fishing on a lake or standing on a hilltop.
- Do not stay in or

-Also getaway from other metal objects, such as bicycles, scooters, motorcycles and golf clubs. Golfers

make them a prime target for a lightning strike.
-Get away from metallic pathways, such as fences, clotheslines, pipes
and rails, which could carry electricity from some distance away to you. -Avoid standing in mall iso-

If you feel your hair stand on end,

Drop to the ground, bend forward and curl up in a ball with your hands on your knees. You want to make yourself as small a target as possible. Do not lie flat on the ground because you are more
