Breast cancer is a major health prob-
lem for American women. The statistics are alarming: One out of every 11 American women will face a diagnosis
of breast cancer in her lifetime. In 1985 of breast cancer in her lifetime. In 1985
alone there were 119,000 new cases of alone there were 119,000 new cases of
breast cancer, and this diagnosis continues to be the leading cause of cancer deaths for women in the U.S.
Although the cause of breast cancer remains unknown, early detection and treatment of atumor can save a woman's
life. However, even though public awareness of breast cancer as a major health problem is at an all-time high,
knowledge about screening methods is not widespread.
Another problem is that unlike other
beneficial health be beneficial health behaviors such as ex-
ercise and good nutrition of which are generally looked at begin yery positive, breast self-exam is often perceived by women as having a nega-
tive outcome . . that of finding cancer. Thus, many women avoid regular
screening. Screening is the process of looking
for unsuspected disease in people who have no symptoms. In the case of breast
