New Jersey has a history of shady, even corrupt, politics. Now a huge flap has erupted over comments by Mr. Ed Rollins, who had a hand in that state's recent, winning, Republican gubernatorial campaign. He evidently told some reporters, (in an obvious bit of self-promotion for which he has become somewhat famous) that a number of politically potent black preachers had been approached by his camp during the campaign, with offers of cash donations "to their favorite charities" in return for not turning out their constituency.

He said "we" (meaning, we suppose, some in his camp) had told the preachers, in essence, "look, you tell us how much the Democrats paid you to turn out the vote and we will pay you the same thing to ignore that agreement." Mr. Rollins was reported to have mentioned the sum of \$500,000 as having been distributed. Evidently the entire exercise was an effort to discourage a large turnout of black voters, who were expected to vote heavily Democratic if they went to the polls.

(He later retracted his comments, saying it never happened, but the genie was out of the bottle.)

Some black politicians were publicly furious. The Rev. Jesse Jackson, sensing an opportunity to get on national t.v., was predictably outraged. Congressman Rangel, of New York, was beside himself. He took the position, on t.v., that there is a vast moral difference between "encouraging" people to vote, with cash donations, and "encouraging" those same people to stay home and not vote, with cash donations. Mr. Rangel's argument, and logic, has been picked up by a number of politically correct columnists, t.v. commentators and editorial writers.

We fail to see the difference. If one (whether Congressman or common citizen) accepts the position that his vote is for sale, and if society accepts the proposition that vote-buying and vote-selling is permissible, what difference does it make, morally or ethically, to whom that potential vote is sold, or what is done with it?

After all, any other prostitute would probably be just as happy to take her money and go home as she would to deliver her services. She might even be happier. And she would, no doubt, benefit society much more if she did.

Mr. Clinton, when asked about it, took the proper position, in our view. He told reporters he was disturbed by the allegations, that it would be wrong to buy votes. And he went on to say it would also be wrong for people to sell their votes.

Come again? Present company expected, of course. The President obviously didn't have Congressmen in mind when he condemned the idea of vote-selling. Following the news conference he turned again to the task of rounding up Congressional votes for NAFTA, much as he had rounded up votes for the recent tax hike. There have been rumors, unsubstantiated of course, that certain Congressmen have seen the light after "discussions" with the President's emissaries.

We, being pure of heart and noble of spirit, (and having spent our childhood in South Texas) are always shocked to hear suggestions that the outcome of an election or a vote in Congress, might be swayed by the generous distribution of certain favors, including, sometimes, certain sums of money. Lyndon Johnson, were he alive today, would no doubt be equally shocked. As would George Parr, were he alive today.

That sort of behavior would never, no never, be tolerated in Texas. In fact, we are so shocked that we doubt it even happened in New Jersey. Surely, if the preachers had in fact been approached, they would have hastened to the proper federal authorities without a moment's hesitation.

Unless, that is, they didn't want to open a can of worms.

Now, hopefully, thanks to Ed Rollins, the can has been opened. Politics in New Jersey, and a few other states, may never be the same.

Floydada School Board hears alternative grading proposals

FLOYDADA — Board members for Floydada Independent School District heard two presentations regarding the methods in which students are graded and ranked during the regular board meeting on Tuesday, November 9. The information the board received came from FHS Principal Joe Christian and from Mac Willson, a science instructor at the school.

According to FISD Superintendent Jerry Cannon, Willson presented a multi-page report on a system called Mastery Learning. The system offers an alternative to traditional grading in chemistry and would be utilized to work towards having a 90% mastery in the subject by all students. Board members were asked to study the proposal and

Clappitt said, "We want this to benefit all of the businesses in Floydada." In an effort to help out local businesses the chamber is doing its best to bring crowds to town and the merchants will reciprocate by keeping their doors open until 9:00 p.m.

The committee chairman, Dendy Williams, said, "I've lived in lots of towns, but Floydada is just a unique community."

Clappitt said, "We want this to be something people look forward to every year."

return next month with questions and comments before considering approval of the alternative grading system.

Christian discussed possible changes in the current system for determining honor graduates and ranking graduating seniors. The changes he is proposing would effect the methods by which early graduates are calculated for ranking. Board members were again asked to study the proposals before considering approval of the changes. The matter will be discussed further at a later meeting.

LISD accepts Lowe resignation

The Lockney Independent School District board met Thursday, November 11 for their regular meeting and accepted the resignation of Athletic Director John Lowe. Also on the agenda was a presentation of the Energy Management System by Walt Wesley.

Lowe presented a written resignation to the board and will be leaving at the end of this year. "We will be advertising for a new athletic director," stated Superintendent Raymond Lusk.

Walt Wesley, owner of the W.D. Wesley Company of Lubbock, presented the board with an explanation of the Energy Management System.

He proposed a system which will regulate the heating and cooling of the buildings automatically. His company will program all the thermostats to come on at a designated time in order to have the buildings warm or cool when the teachers and students arrive at school.

The company will study the temperatures for the last several years and compile a historical energy usage chart and adjust it to take into account degree day differences. From this chart they will be able to program the system.

Wesley explained that the system could be overridden if needed.

He estimated the savings in electricity to be approximately \$6,900 and the natural gas savings at \$10,800.

The board members listened to the presentation and to the two proposals on shared savings. Alternate #1 included no charge for the Energy Consultant Fee, a five year contract with the company receiving 70 percent of the energy savings and LISD 30 percent of the savings. At the end of that time LISD has the option of renewing the contract at a 50%/50% shared savings and the opportunity to purchase the equipment on each one year anniversary at a cost of \$25,999.

Alternate #2 showed a one time energy consultant fee of \$12,499; a five year contract at 50%/50% savings and the option to renew the contract 50%/50% or to purchase the system at each

one year anniversary at a cost of \$12,499.

The board voted to accept Alternate #1.

With the Alternate #1 proposal of the 70%/30% shared savings the district will not be out any money on the system.

James Poole presented the members of the board with a list of teachers who had been selected as the textbook committee. The teachers and the books they will be reviewing are Zeldia Ellison, Business and Health Education; Linda Terrell, 7th and 8th grade Speech;

Holly Norwood, Speech Communications 9-12; Charlanne Burson and Cindy Ford, Supplementary Readers 1; Jontha Mercer and Mary Louise McCarter, Supplementary Readers 1 and 2; Wanda Rogers, Supplementary Readers 3;

Rhonda Lyles, Supplementary Readers 4; Marva Rasco, Supplementary Readers 5; Vickie Vandiver, Supplementary Readers 6; LaDora Aull, Pre-Calculus 9-12 and Analytic Geometry 9-12; and Kevin Myer, Life Science.

"The textbook committee will evaluate the textbooks that were suggested by the State of Texas and select those that will be best for this school system," stated Poole.

The board voted to accept the teachers on the list as the textbook committee.

Reports on what is being done on the three campuses to improve the TAAS scores were reported on by the principals of each of the schools.

Poole told those present about the meeting with the Sophomore students and their parents. "We were very pleased when all but three of the students and their parents were present for the meeting. We cooked hamburgers and then gathered in groups to explain our goals for the test and how we hoped to accomplish them. The parents and students were very receptive to the ideas on studying for the tests."

Terry Ellison, principal at junior high stated, "The students know the importance of the test and they work towards

mastering the activities.

Phil Cotham, principal at elementary school, explained which grades will be taking what tests this year.

The board discussed briefly plans for summer remodeling and maintenance. Lusk told the board that he had sent out a questionnaire to all the LISD teachers and staff and asked for their input as to what they would like to see done during the summer months. He told those present that at the next meeting he would have all of the information put together and that they could go over the suggestions as to what needed to be done. Members of the board tabled the discussion until the December meeting.

Regular business before the board included the reading and approval of the minutes of the previous meeting; and the paying of current bills. No one came to speak at the public forum.

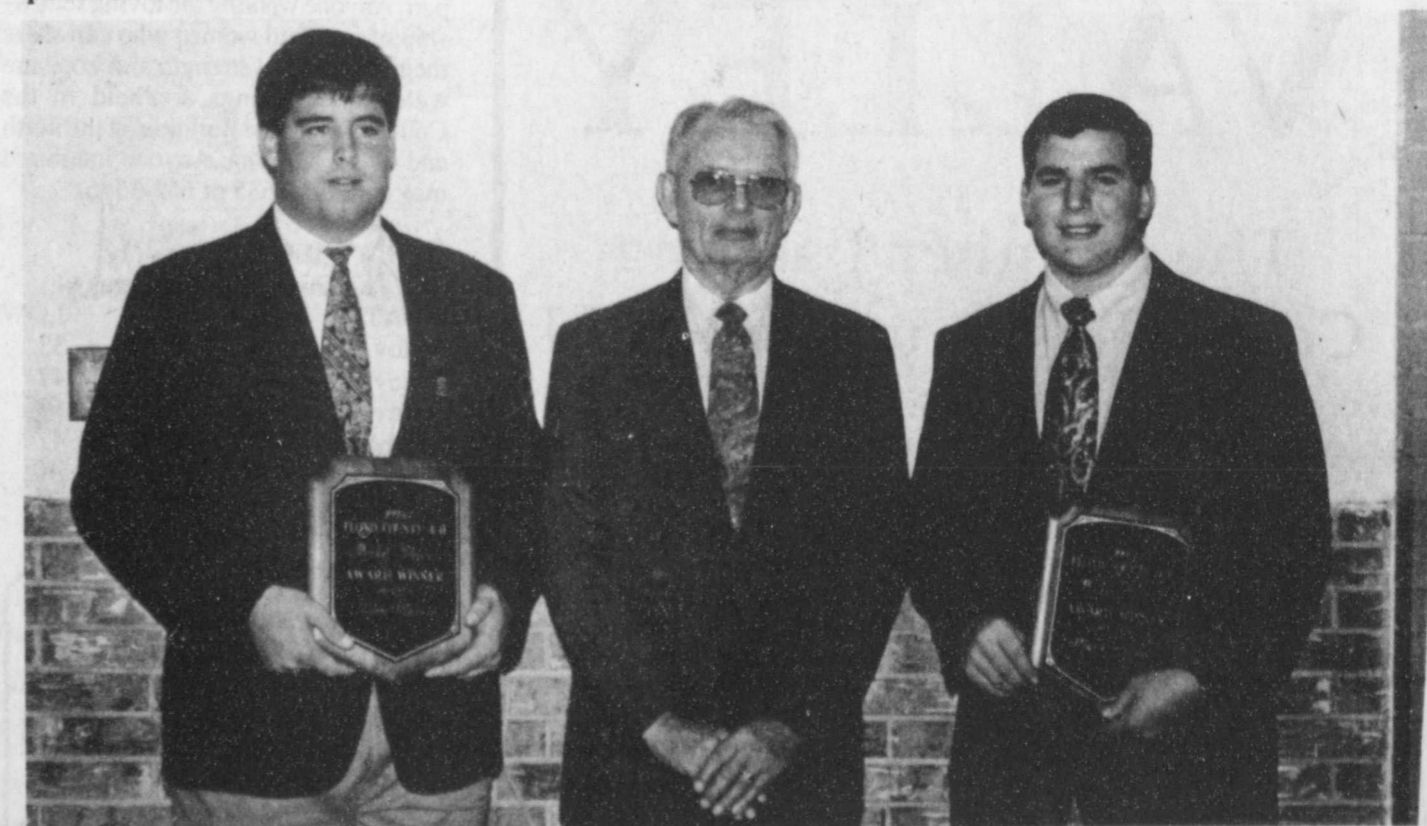

Water bill reviewed by council

LOCKNEY—Barbara Anderson met with Lockney councilmen on Thursday, November 11, to discuss her concerns over an exceptionally large water bill.

According to Anderson her last water bill was in the amount of \$1,040 due to a bad leak near her water meter. Because her meter is located far from her home the leak was not discovered until the meter was read. The bill was then doubled because Anderson lives outside the city limits and county residents who receive city water also pay a higher cost in water bills.

Anderson requested some considera-

tion in lowering the cost of the bill because of the extenuating circumstances and the councilmen agreed to look into the problem.

The issue was tabled until the next council meeting.

Alderman Copeland also moved to table the item of purchasing 280 feet of Block 16 in the Wilson Addition. This property is west of the city shop and is the site of the roll off boxes. The property is owned by the four taxing entities and the City of Lockney is considering purchasing the land from the other three entities.

At the advice of City Attorney Paul Lyle the councilmen agreed to table the vote on the purchase until the meeting, and after Lyle reviews the judgement on the property.

Councilman Anderson moved to pass an ordinance calling for an inter local agreement between the Lockney and Floydada Police Department. The

agreement calls for mutual cooperation between the departments and allows each department to assist the other when needed.

This motion was seconded by Councilman Jones and all were in favor.

Copeland also moved to appoint Libby Delgado and Kenneth Tate to the Lockney Housing Board for a two year term. Anderson seconded and all were in favor.

Councilman Marr made a motion to table the passing of the Southwestern Public Service rate change resolution until SPS could have a representative available at the next council meeting to discuss it.

Anderson seconded the motion and all were in favor.

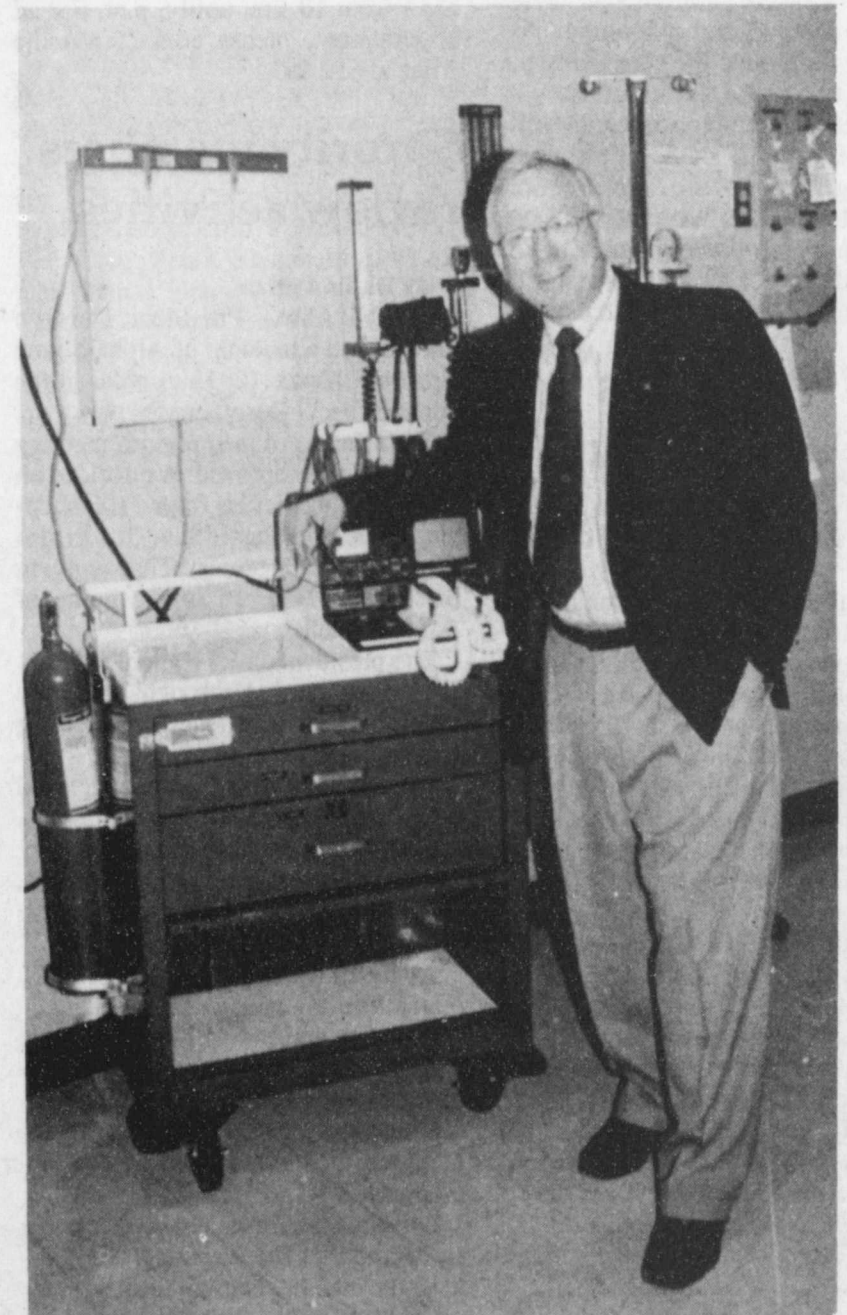

Your Health ★ Our Care

Breast cancer is a major health problem for American women. The statistics are alarming: One out of every 11 American women will face a diagnosis of breast cancer in her lifetime. In 1985 alone there were 119,000 new cases of breast cancer, and this diagnosis continues to be the leading cause of cancer deaths for women in the U.S.

Although the cause of breast cancer remains unknown, early detection and treatment of a tumor can save a woman's life. However, even though public awareness of breast cancer as a major health problem is at an all-time high, knowledge about screening methods is not widespread.

Another problem is that unlike other beneficial health behaviors such as exercise and good nutrition, the outcomes of which are generally looked at begin very positive, breast self-exam is often perceived by women as having a negative outcome... that of finding cancer. Thus, many women avoid regular screening.

Screening is the process of looking for unsuspected disease in people who have no symptoms. In the case of breast cancer, there are three widely recognized screening modalities (1) physical exam by a health professional, breast self-examination, and mammography, and x-ray technique for visualizing the internal structure of the breast.

Women should practice regular self-examination and, in addition, have mammography at the ages recommended by their physicians. As a general guideline, all women over the age of 20 should practice monthly breast self-examination. Women between the ages

of 20 and 40 should have a clinical examination by a health professional at least every three years, and women over 40 should be examined by a health professional annually. Between the ages of 35 and 40 a woman should have a baseline mammogram done. After the age of 40, a mammogram should be done annually.

Mammography has been increasingly recognized as an important screening tool. Because cancer tissue is dense, an x-ray can distinguish it from the less-dense normal tissue of the surrounding breast. When a woman goes for a mammogram, a radiology technician positions the woman so that her breasts are in a special device that flattens or spreads the breast tissue to give the best possible image. In general, two views are done, one from the top and one from the side.

Mammography has the advantage of being able to detect many tumors before they can be felt. Well-controlled studies are now showing a decreased death rate in mammographically screened populations.

Not as many Whirlwinds made the squad as a year ago, but that is expected since Littlefield and Tulia were the playoff representatives. There were some pleasant surprises as well as some surprising disappointments.

I'm not certain about all the criteria required to be considered for All-District honors. But (in my opinion), judging by what I observed, I would have thought that Tate Glasscock deserved to be selected to the first team defense. Tate made critical plays in just about every game from opening night on. He may not have had as many pass interceptions or unassisted tackles as some other secondary people, but very few passes were completed in his coverage area. Local pesticide applicators urged to take needed classes

Do you apply crop protection chemicals? Do you have your Private Applicator License? If not you need to attend a training and testing on one of the following dates:

1. Monday, Nov. 29, at the County Extension Office, Floydada, at 6:00 p.m., OR.
2. Tuesday, Nov. 30, at the First United Methodist Church Fellowship Hall, Lockney, at 8:00 a.m.

The training will be given by Kerry Siders, County Ag. Agent, and will take approximately two hours. You are encouraged to stop by the County Agents office and pick up a training manual for \$10 prior to the day of the test in order to study.

The test will be given by Darrell Rasco, with Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA).

There will not be any charge for the training or testing. However, you will have to submit a \$50.00 license fee to TDA at a later date.

A person is a private applicator and is required to have this license if the person uses or supervises the use of a restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticide to produce an agricultural commodity on property owned or rented by the person or the person's employer. Private applicators can apply pesticides on the property of another producer without compensation. The trading of services does not constitute compensation.

After receiving the license you are

required to obtain 15 continuing education credits including two credits in laws and regulations and one in integrated pest management every five years.

Furrow dikes are a must for Lockney producer's family farming operation

"Don't pray for rain if you don't take care of what you get."

Charles Huffman of Lockney strongly believes in making the most of the free moisture provided by Mother Nature. Since 1979, he has been using furrow dikes to harvest rainfall on the 1,200 acres he farms near Lockney.

Furrow dikes are mounds of soil mechanically installed in the furrow. The dikes create basins that hold rainfall until it can soak into the ground and prevent excess water from running off the field.

Huffman says he really doesn't remember why he started using furrow dikes in his field, except that they made good sense to him. The use of furrow dikes seemed to be a good way to improve his dryland farming operation by conserving precious rainfall.

The first furrow dike Huffman purchased did a good job of installing the furrow dikes, but there was one small problem. "It was just too slow, so I built my own," he says.

Huffman has since purchased two additional dikers and now uses all three dikers on his land. "I hardly ever go across a field without diking it," he says.

Since precipitation is unpredictable, it is important to keep the furrow dikes in place as much as possible — especially from June through August, when the High Plains area receives most of its annual precipitation.

Huffman leaves his dikes in place year-round, since he can straddle them with his cotton stripper. The dikes catch water in the fall and winter, which helps improve soil moisture conditions for spring planting. He even leaves the dikes in place when he plants winter wheat. Huffman says the planter does

not tear up the furrow dikes too badly, and they still help hold water on the field.

Furrow dikes have been called reservoirs of yield potential. Research has proven that cotton produces an additional 30 to 40 pounds of lint per acre for every inch of water received above the plant's basic water requirement. Water stored in the soil because of the furrow dikes can make the difference between losing money and making money on a crop.

Measurements of rainfall runoff made during a three-year study at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock on loam soils revealed that no runoff occurred on level land and that the average annual runoff was 1.74 inches for land with a 0.2 percent slope (two inches per 100 feet).

Runoff was 2.51 inches from soils with a 0.5 percent slope, 3.08 inches from soils with a 0.9 percent slope, and 3.61 inches from soils with a 1.2 percent slope. The average annual precipitation runoff during the three-year study for the four graded tracts was 2.73 inches per acre.

For the 1993 growing season, Huffman's dryland acreage is producing a little more than 600 pounds of cotton lint per acre. In years with more rainfall, his dryland cotton yield has been as high as 800 pounds per acre.

"The furrow dikes really saved me this year. We got a 3.7 inch rain in August, which my cotton crop really needed. The furrow dikes held the water on the field and allowed the crop to reap the full benefit of the rain," he says.

He added that he has seen the runoff from a big rain fill his playa lake. However, since he has been using furrow dikes, the lake has far less water after a rain — illustrating the amount of water that was previously lost as runoff.

In the 1970s, the Bushland Experiment Station conducted a five-year study of furrow dikes in grain sorghum fields. The diked areas had an average annual yield of 420 pounds more per acre than the undiked areas. The undiked area had an average annual runoff of 1.7 inches compared to no runoff from the furrow diked area.

Furrow dikes are also beneficial when used with irrigation, especially when used with Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) center pivot sprinkler systems. They hold water in the furrow until it has time to infiltrate the soil, and this provides a more uniform application of water across the field.

With furrow irrigation, the dikes are typically installed in alternate furrows which are not watered. This allows the producer to take advantage of any precipitation that falls.

"Furrow dikes are very cost-effective.

Pest management achievements in Crosby and Floyd Counties are detailed

The Crosby-Floyd Integrated Pest Management Program is one of 22 programs throughout Texas, each located in an area of intensive agricultural production. This program is a cooperative effort between Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Pest Management Association, and Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Integrated Pest Management assists producers in maximizing economic returns, while minimizing adverse impacts upon the environment.

The 1993 Crosby-Floyd Intensive Scouting Program involved 4265 enrolled acres and 25 participants. Crops scouted in the pest management program included cotton, corn, and grain sorghum. This program provided valuable field experience as well as part-time summer employment for three field scouts.

A soil sampling project for Pest Management program fields was conducted for the third year. The soil sampling program involved 5 participants and 41 field samples. Test results indicated fields were deficient in nitrogen and iron while phosphorus was adequate in many fields.

A two-day workshop, the Caprock Cotton Conference, was co-sponsored by the Crosby County Crops Committee, the Crosby-Floyd Pest Management Committee, and the Floyd County Ag Committee (154 attending). Topics included presentations on management of insects, weeds and diseases.

An educational conference concerning pesticide laws and regulations (2 CEU's) was held in January for county producers. Area agribusinesses and the Agricultural Extension Service co-sponsored the Floyd-Briscoe Private Applicator Laws and Regulations Conference (83 attending).

The Russian wheat aphid made its first appearance in the Texas High Plains in 1986. This pest can cause economic damage at high population densities. Information provided through office and farm visits concerning wheat freeze damage and Russian wheat aphid management.

A Crosby-Floyd Chemigation Workshop was held in March to educate producers on the benefits of applying crop protection chemicals while using pivot irrigation (17 attending). Topics included economics of pivot irrigation, insectigation, herbigation, fertigation and safety.

Due to pecan pest problems experienced in the past, commercial pecan producers were updated with newsletters on computer-predicted emergence dates for the pecan nut casebearer. Plans for 1994 include updated information on emergence dates as well as a pecan pest turnout meeting.

1994 pre-planting soil moisture survey is now in progress in 15 area counties

High Plains Water District and USDA-Soil Conservation Service (USDA-SCS) personnel are now collecting data for the annual pre-plant soil moisture survey.

The purpose of the survey is to determine the general soil moisture availability and deficit trends across the 15-county High Plains Water District service area.

Review of the pre-plant soil moisture survey information helps agricultural producers determine the amount of water they need to apply to bring their five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity without over-irrigating or under-irrigating.

Historical data shows that there is a better likelihood of producing above-average crop yields when the plant root zone of the soil is at or near field capacity prior to planting.

"Unless the area receives significant precipitation during the winter, we expect to find extremely dry soil conditions at most of the 310 soil moisture monitoring sites within the Water District," said Wilfred W. "Willie" Crenwelge, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist.

"Irrigation for the 1993 growing season ended in early August. Since that

time, there has been very little precipitation. Crops remaining in the field continued to deplete the available soil moisture from that time until first freeze," he added.

Three teams are now in the field collecting data for the 1994 pre-plant soil moisture survey. Weather permitting, they should complete their field work in early January.

Glenn Blackmon and Ken Carver started in Floyd County and will continue in Crosby, Lubbock and Lynn Counties.

The USDA-SCS soil scientist noted that 20 additional temporary soil moisture sites will be read in newly-annexed portions of Cochran and Hale Counties. Permanent sites have already been installed in the newly-annexed portion of Lynn County.

"Until permanent soil moisture sites can be established, five temporary sites in Cochran County and 15 temporary sites in Hale County will help us gauge soil moisture conditions in these new portions of the Water District," says Crenwelge.

Soil moisture sites are selected based upon soil types, the local saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which

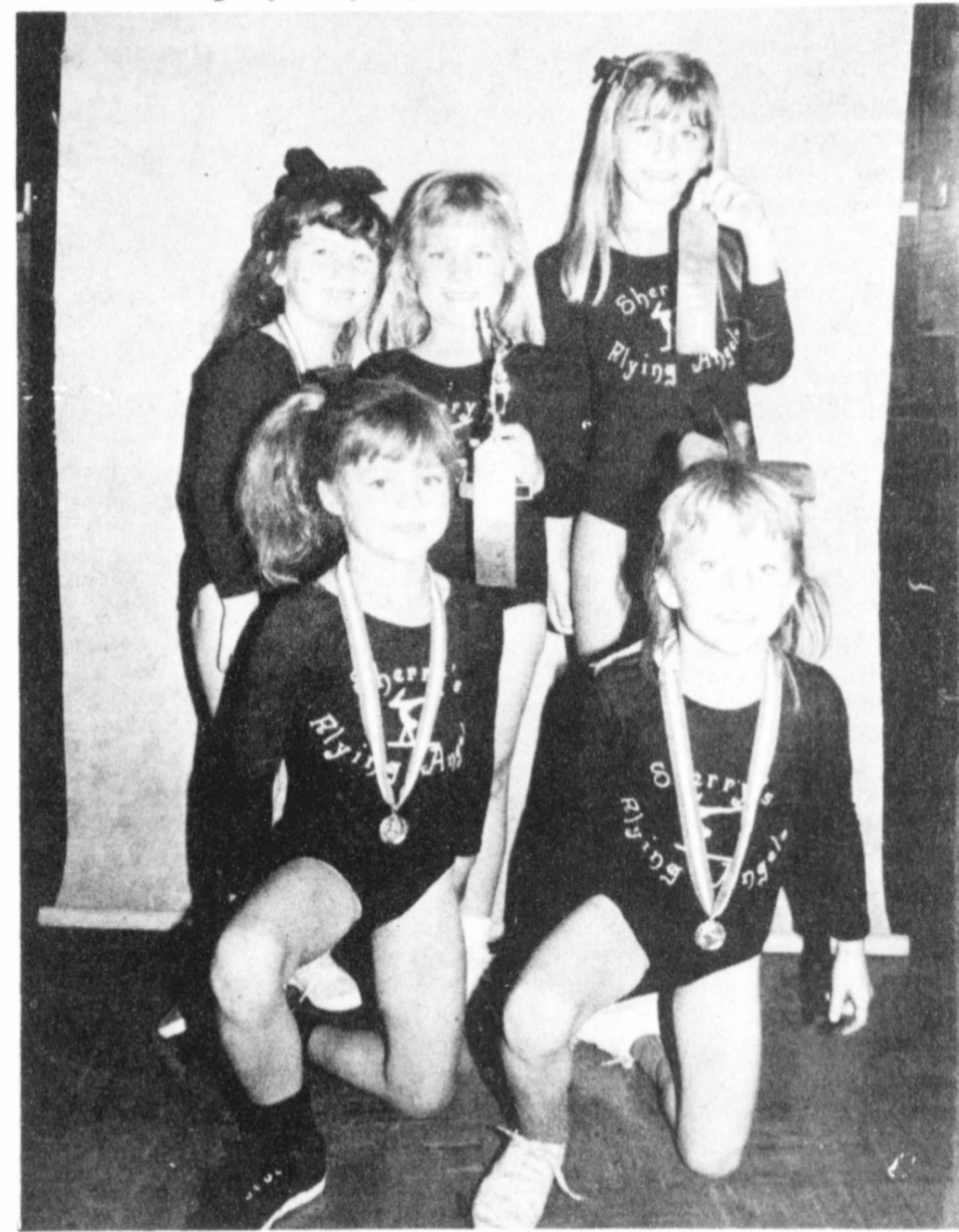
