Floydada man loses arm in farm accident

Arnulfo Muniz, 30, of Floydada, lost his right arm in a farming accident Thursday morning, November 25. He is currently listed in critical condition at University Medical Center in Lubbock.

Muniz, a farm laborer employed by Scott Simpson, had moved equipment to a farm northeast of town in the Fairview community, when the accident occurred. "We don't know how it happened," said Simpson. "We won't know until he is able to talk to us about it."

According to Simpson, Muniz' right arm was caught in the drive shaft of a boll suction machine about 11:00 a.m. "I think the goose down jacket he was wearing may have saved his life," said Simpson. "The machine couldn't get a good grip on the slick material and the coat was ripped off of him."

Another farm hand who had accompanied Muniz, and witnessed the accident, drove Muniz to Caprock Hospital unaware that the hospital was still closed. Linda Epps, LVN, was summoned from the nearby Floydada Nursing Home and administered first aid. The call to 911 was placed at 11:12 a.m. and Paramedic Mike Reeves arrived at

Reeves called for an Aero Care helicopter which transported Muniz to University Medical Center. At the same time Reeves was stabilizing Muniz other EMS members returned to the scene of the accident in an effort to locate the severed arm.

The arm was located and DPS Trooper Marty Lucke then started to Lubbock with the limb. Another Aero-Care helicopter was dispatched and after meeting Lucke at a Petersburg landing site transported the arm to UMC. Doctors were unable to reattach the arm.

Muniz also suffered a small tear in his spleen, a split in his liver, damage to his stomach, bruised lungs and two broken ribs on his left and right side.

According to Paramedic Reeves, "Muniz could have bled to death driving the almost 20 miles into town, but the way in which the arm was pulled off constricted the blood vessels and kept the external bleeding to a minimum."



Junked vehicle ordinance will be enforced

FLOYDADA-Floydada city officials have been receiving complaints from citizens regarding the number of junked/abandoned vehicles in Floydada. In response to these complaints, officers of the Floydada Police Department will begin enforcing Article 4477-9a, Sec. 5.08 of the Texas

The ordinance reads as follows:

"Sec. 5.08. Junked vehicles as public nuisance. (a) A junked vehicle that is located in a place where it is visible from a public place or public right-of-way is detrimental to the safety and welfare of the general public, tends to reduce the value of private property, invites vandalism, creates fire hazards, constitutes an attractive nuisance creating a hazard to the health and safety of minors, and is detrimental to the ecnomic welfare of the state by producing urban blight adverse to the maintenance and continuing development of the municipalities in the state, and is a public nuisance.

"(b) A person commits an offense if that person maintains a public nuisance as determined under this section.

"(c) A person who commits an offense under this section is, on conviction, subject to a fine not to exceed \$200. On conviction, the court shall order removal and abatement of the nuisance."

Before a citation is issued to the residents having a junked/abandoned vehicle, a courtesy letter will be mailed requesting they remedy the situation to avoid any fines.

"As strange as it sounds-when I looked into that gun before I screamed, I wasn't really scared to die. I am strong in my faith as a Christian and I knew the Lord would take care of me one way or

After police arrived, interviewed the couple and collected evidence the Floyd County pair packed their bags and immediately started back for home anxious to be around family and friends.

The attacker was described by the Hardin's as a "clean cut intelligent looking man". "He was cool and calm," said Roberta. "He knew what he was doing-his hand wasn't even shaking. He was a handsome white man with groomed black hair, clean shaven except for a moustache, about 6 feet tall and in his late 20's or early 30's. "We both got a good look at the man.

"I don't know what he would have done if it had been my husband who stood up to talk to him. Maybe he was thrown off guard to see a small gray haired woman stand up to him and

"It was a terrible nightmare for us. You have to have a lot of inner strength from your faith to get through it. This incident has made me very angry. He had no right to take away our freedom





-From Texas Farmers Union Joe Rankin, President of Texas Farmers Union (TFU) said that TFU supports the National Farmers Union statement that Farmers Union members will hold

President Clinton and members of Congress accountable for all the promises made in regard to the economic benefits of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). The Agreement narrowly passed the U.S. House of Representatives late last night and now goes to the Senate, where it is expected

Along with both the United States and Mexican governments, Corporate America spent in excess of \$30 million promoting the NAFTA, but it is receiving a cool reception, at best, from U.S. citizens. NFU President Lee Swenson said, "I suppose this ranks among the

best deals money can buy!"

TFU president Joe Rankin was particularly critical of the last-minute side deals made for sugar, peanuts, fruits and vegetables, wheat and border inspection, saying they are proof that the NAFTA was inadequately formed in the first place.

Rankin said, "Similar promises were made to members of Congress before the U.S.-Canada Free Trade Agreement (CFTA) was voted on, but they were not kept." "We will hold the presidnt and our members of Congress accountable for fulfilling these promises to the letter of the law."

The TFU president was very critical of the eleventh-hour deal-making used by President Clinton to gain votes. The President agreed to buy additional military planes, back various construction projects, repeal proposed taxes and fee hikes, and many other concessions in order to get the votes he needed to pass

The 250,000 family farmers and ranchers that make up the National Farmers Union will hold the U.S. govemment responsible for their assertions that the NAFTA is good for agriculture

and that it will increase producer prices. TFU President Rankin said, "History has shown us quite the opposite. For example, between 1984 and 1992, exports of agricultural products increased 12 percent. During the same time, corn prices have fallen 23 percent, soybean prices 8 percent, wheat prices 4 percent and milk prices 2 percent. I hope the President is right and these trends are reversed. We will be taking a good look

at commodity prices a year from now." Farmers Union also calls on the President to ensure that U.S. food safety and quality standards remain intact. "Not only is the safety and quality of the U.S. food supply of paramount importance to consumers, it also affects the reputation and marketability of U.S.-produced goods. Under the NAFTA, food products are not required to carry country-oforigin labeling," Rankin said.

Rankin stressed the fact that, "Our members are in favor of a trade agreement with Mexico. Our contention with the NAFTA has always been that it was not designed to improve the standard of living of citizens in both countries, nor to enhance environmental stewardship. Therefore, we urge the President and Lawmakers to continue to work toward these goals within the NAFTA frame-







New federal regulations set for pesticide applicators

-From Texas Department of Agriculture

Changes in federal pesticide regulations require private applicators to follow new guidelines and record-keeping procedures, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said. The Texas Department of Agriculture has mailed these new requirements to licensed pesticide ap-

"We sent out about 181,000 letters," Perry said. "Any certified or licensed

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pesticide applicator who did not receive a letter needs to let us know so we can forward copies of the new regulations, because failing to comply with the law will result in penalties.

The letter included information about record keeping requirements in the 1990 Farm Bill, federal worker protection standards, and applicator recertification requirements. Pesticide applicators who have not received the letter should write Pesticide Certification and Training, Texas Department of Agriculture, P.O. Box 12847, Austin, TX 78711. When submitting this information, include applicator's name and address as printed on certificate or license, Social Security number, license or certificate number, correct address and phone number. If the applicator has multiple licenses or certificates, include all

by that person or person's employer; a the High Plains. certified private applicator who can use but not supervise a state-limited or restricted-use pesticide to produce an agricultural commodity; a commercial applicator who operates a business that applies state-limited-use or restricteduse pesticides to land owned by another; a noncommercial applicator who is required to be licensed under the Texas Pesticide Laws who does not qualify as a commercial applicator or private applicator.

Effective May 10, 1993, certified and licensed private pesticide applicators must keep records of federal restricteduse pesticide applications. Records must include: brand or product name of the pesticide and its EPA registration number; total amount applied; size of area treated; crop, commodity, stored product or site to which the pesticide

was applied; location of application; date of application; and applicator's name and certification or license number. Spot treatments must also be recorded. There is no required form but all the above information is mandatory.

Records will be used to develop a data base on the use of restricted-use pesticides. This data base will be used to provide information for policy discussions, to inform consumers about pesticide use and to provide annual reports to Congress on the national use of restricted-use pesticides.


"While nobody wants to fill out another form, this policy should help the agricultural community," Perry said. "We maintain that farmers use pesticides judiciously and safely, and we expect this type of information to confirm that. There's a lot of misinformation and speculation floating around about pesticide use. The more we can get the 'maybes' answered, the better off agriculture and consumers will be."

PCG programs successful in controlling boll weevil spread

For the past one hundred years the Mexican cotton boll weevil has been "looking for a home" in American cotton. The boll weevil has never found that home on the High Plains of Texas thanks to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Boll weevil infestation across the state of Texas reached record proportions in 1993. However, the PCG program continues to successfully prevent this highly damaging insect from becoming established in cotton above the Caprock.

The suppression area contains parts of 15 counties and encompasses around 15,500 square miles. There are 5,097 cotton fields within its boundaries totaling 749,279 acres.

The PCG Boll Weevil Program has always been based on an integrated approach to pest management. Cotton producers in the control zone are encouraged to use all cultural measures possible to minimize field infestations. Uniform planting dates, early stalk destruction and short-season cottons help in the fight. The PCG program maps cotton fields in the control zone and carefully monitors boll weevil activity during the growing season using pheromone traps and field scouts.

During the six weeks or so before first freeze, the boll weevil starts to build fat deposits to enable its survival through winter hibernation. This stage of the insect's life cycle is called diapause.

A proven control strategy during this diapause period is to treat infested fields with light application of the insect control agent malathion.

The control phase of the 1993 program started in mid-September, and ended with the freezing temperatures that chilled the High Plains during the Halloween weekend.

The carefully run suppression program combines proven, safe treatment strategies with ultra-modern computer and satellite technology to control boll weevils. Aggregate acreage totals show 1,357,521 acres were treated to control boll weevil during four scheduled program applications. Total program cost this year is estimated to be \$3.7 million for a cost per treated acre around \$2.73.

A satellite based, parallel-swath navigation system that automatically tracks and records each aircraft's flight path was again provided to the PCG program by its developers, SATLOC Inc. of Casa Grande, Arizona. The system was first used during the 1992 program.



West Texas nursery provides steady flow of trees to plains area

West Texas, where trees often are few and far between, seems the least likely of places to house one of the 40 administrative offices of the Texas Forest Service. But since its beginnings in 1976, the West Texas nursery in Lubbock has provided a steady flow of trees

for windbreak plantings across the state. Bob Fewin, area forester at the Lubbock office, said business began slowly but has reached a point today where the Forest Service actually has more demand for trees than it can produce. The Texas Forest Service is an agency of the Texas A&M University System.

"Trees can be and have proven to be an excellent conservation tool," said Fewin, "In the Great Plains area, hundreds of thousands of miles of trees have been planted for conservation pur-

poses.'

Fewin began his job in 1971 with a survey of old windbreak plantings using records from the Forest Service nursery in East Texas. He examined what species of trees had been grown there and what trees seemed to survive over time. However the climatic differences between Alto and Lubbock made comparison difficult.

"The East Texas nursery grows 27 million trees a year, but it's over 600 miles away with a completely different growing season," said Fewin.

Thus, based on his findings, it was decided in 1976 that adequate demand



had been found for tree plantings on the High Plains in West Texas for starting a

The first crop of trees from the Lubbock greenhouse was sowed in 1978 and more than 11,000 trees were sold to landowners in the spring of 1979. Field nursery production followed green-

house planting the next year. Fewin said that as time has progressed, the program has increased. He estimates that in the 1994 planting season the Forest Service will produce and sell over 110,000 containerized evergreens from greenhouse production and the field nursery will produce over 200,000 bare root hardwood plantables.

All the trees produced in the greenhouse and field nursery are graded but not everything produced is sold.

"If we have a demand for 10,000 Austrian Pine trees, we would have to produce around 30,000 seedlings," said Fewin. "We have a very high cull rate, but it varies from species to species."

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





November 1993 sales tax rebates made to Floyd County cities from the state comptroller's office have been received and year to date totals once more display an increase from last year for both Floydada and Lockney. Figures for each of the two cities indicate increases in monthly rebates when compared to September 1992 rebates.

Total rebates received in Floyd County this month were \$19,122.47, an increase of 18.52 percent when compared to the \$16,410.47 received at this time in 1992.

Floydada's November check from the state comptroller's office was in the amount of \$13,813.04 showing an increase of 21.04 percent over the \$11,411.51 payment received in November of 1992.



it will be gathered up. The food will then be given to the local Salvation Army and will be distributed to needy families in Lockney.




