West Texas, where trees often are few and far between, seems the least likely of places to house one of the 40 admin-
istrative offices of the Texas Fores Service. But since its beginnings in 1976, the West Texas nursery in Lubbock has provided a steady flow of trees for windbreak plantings across the state. Bob Fewin, area forester at the Lub-
bock office, said business began slowl bock office, said business began slow the Forest Service actually has more de mand for trees than it can produce. The Texas A\&M University System. "Treescan be and have proven to be a excellent conservation tool," said Fewin. "In the Great Plains area, hur-
dreds of thousands of miles of been planted for conservation purposes.,
Fewin began his job in 1971 with a
survey of old windbreak plantigs records from the Forest Service nursery in East Texas. He examined what spe cies of trees had been grown there and what trees seemed to survive over time. However the climatic differences be
tween Alto and Lubbock made compari son difficult.
"The East Texas nursery grows 27 million trees a year, but it's over 600
miles away with a completely different miles away with a completely different
growing season," said Fewin. Thus, based, on his findings, it was
