provided with five 55.00 (minimum landifil tipping fee) coupons per year. Landfill tipping fees are to be paid to the landfill atendant prior to the disposal or unloading of solid wastes. Payment will be made in cash or submission of landfill tiping fee coupons. Landfill tiping fee prior to disposal or unloading of solid waste.
(g) All persons, firms, and organizations will be required to give the proper information to the landfill attendant prior to the disposal or unloading of solid waste.

They moved the dry cleaning operation to the rear of the store and started their men's retailing business at the front of the store. Claude, first order of merchandise was $\$ 66.00$ worth of Argyle socks. "I figured Claude would be wearing all those socks for a long time," laughed Wilma, "but they sold" Wima, "but they sold". "I remember right afier I put the socks on display,", said Claude. "Joe Cunyus was walking by and saw the socks. He

According to Lubbock-based Plains Coton Growers (PCG) the CI program was set up to provide 5 percent of Cr 's
annual operating budget to producers in annual operating budget to producers in
cotton belt states to fund cotton related research and promotion activities. Projects presented for review during

plants will still have glands, which some farmers prefer, because they help with insectresistance. In fact, he says farmers won't be able to tell any difference in
their cotoon crop, just an increase in its profit potential.

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
