WEDNESDAY WAS OBSERVED as "Past President's Day" at the Friona Star office.

Don't check your calendar. This isn't a new national holiday--or it would have come on Monday, don't your imagine?

Our "observation" was in conjunction with the special Friona Chamber of Commerce tabloid section which is included with this issue of the Star, promoting the Chamber's annual banquet.

This year, Chamber manager Kathy Beard has sold some extra advertisements, in order to expand on the customary tabloid section, which we mail out to all of our subscribers, as well as make copies which are placed at each plate at the banquet.

One of the things Kathy wanted to do was to include a section for pictures of past presidents of the Chamber of Commerce. We assured her that this should not be too much trouble, in light of the fact that the Star always publishes a picture of the Chamber president each year. Right? Well, at least it was a good theory.

We started out with the intention of publishing pictures of the presidents for the past 20 years, but we had a number of photos of earlier presidents. One thing led to another, so that it turned out that we located 34 photos of past presidents, or 33, or 35--somewhere in that neighborhood.

Our filing system at the Star is somewhere between the one at the Library of Congress and the one used by the character "Shoe" in the comic strip. In many respects, I suppose it leans a little more toward this latter concept than the former.

The only trouble with looking in our picture envelopes where a guy served as Chamber president, is that the picture rarely ever was in that particular spot. We almost always run his picture again the following year, when he serves in an "ex officio" position on the Chamber board.

Then, there are the ones who get some sort of other honor in later years, and they always say "Why don't you just use the picture you took of me for the Chamber?" So we do and the picture is once again moved.

At least, if we took the picture for the Star, there is a 99 per cent chance that the negative is on file, and thankfully that file is in somewhat better order than the "old picture file." We have negatives on file taken by Star photographers for more than 25 years. Most of the president photos are vintage photos--you may want to see how they have changed in looks.

So, we hope you enjoy this section of the chamber tabloid, since it required around 40 man hours (man hours and woman hours, mostly the latter) to produce. And congratulations to Kathy Beard for making the tabloid much larger this year.

In our search for the missing president, we kept finding certain people, connected with various things, such as club, city, school and church work, and it was surprising to note on occasion who has NOT served as Chamber of Commerce president.

We threatened to publish a "top ten" list of men who you probably expected had served as president of the Friona chamber, but in reality have not. But, if they have managed to avoid it this long, we'll just have to help them keep their little secret.

Also, in our hunt for pictures this week, we have been reminded that the Star has been fortunate in having some excellent photographers come their way down through the years. We recognized the work of such shutterbugs as Travis Harrell, Tyler Vance, Jan Turner, Hal Blackburn, Carol and Stanley Ellis, just to name a few.

Memorial Park Offered To City

The Friona City Council heard a request during its regular meeting Monday night from the Friona Memorial Park, whose membership would like to deed the cemetery to the City of Friona.

John R. Cook and Elvie Jennings represented Friona Memorial Park for the request, pointing out the changes the cemetery has undergone in its history. The park is located on Highway 60, just northwest of the Excel plant.

"The park is free of debt. There are 68 memberships--representing families--and 23 burials," Cook told the council.

A motion was passed by the council to table the matter until its April meeting.

In other business, the council adopted resolutions for the withdrawal of securities pledged and held in trust. One was in the amount of \$15,000 with the Texas American Bank of Fort Worth, and another was for \$30,000, with the Fort Worth National Bank.

Considerable discussion was held regarding a scraper which the city had leased from Peak Industrial Equipment for the past month.

In the meantime, the city had solicited bids on such a machine, and the Peak Company's bid was lowest at \$21,000. The company also

A request was heard from Kelly Harrelson regarding a variance for placement of a mobile home at the rear of her property, at 1007 Woodland. In light of the fact that signatures had been received from all adjacent property owners, the request was approved.

Court Approves Pact With MH/MR Center

Parmer County Commissioners approved a contract with the Central Plains MH/MR Center of Plainview on testing for alcohol or drug dependency as required for probation in DWI cases according to the new Senate Bill number one.

Laura Jacobs, County Extension Agent for Home Economics, reported that a new 4-H Club had been formed at Rhea, having 20 members.

Several certificates of deposit which were maturing February 29, 1984 were re-invested for short terms, to be available on short notice without a penalty and still earn income for the county.

CDs re-invested included \$150,000 from the General Fund; \$200,000 from Farm to Market Funds, another \$100,000 in General Funds expected to be received from new taxes before the next court meeting; \$30,000 in Right-of-Way funds plus \$100,000 in new tag receipts to be invested for Farm-to-Market revenue.

Discussion was held regarding a request to move an underground tile line alongside FM 3333. It was determined that the line in question was outside the county's right-of-way, and could not be moved by the county.

Motion was approved for soil work for a number of farmers using county equipment when available, such work to be reimbursed the county. Farmers

Ag Economist Enters Congressional Race

Gary D. Condra, 39, a Lubbock agricultural economist, has announced that he has filed for the Democratic nomination to the 19th Congressional District seat being vacated by Kent Hance.

Condra, who has over ten years experience as an economist and educator, brings a life-long involvement in agriculture to the race. Condra believes that his training and experience are particularly well-suited to representing this district because agriculture is such an important sector of our economy. He emphasized that "we must restore profit and stability to the U.S. agricultural economy; or West Texas agriculture, as we know it, will not survive." Condra also pointed out that "this is the real question which will face Congress when it addresses the 1985 Farm Bill."

Condra is also confident that his economic training and experience will enable him to more effectively represent the district in dealing with economic problems like oil and gas pricing and the budget deficit.

Condra recognizes the need to maintain a first-rate educational system for the youth of America. "Our young people are our most valuable resource," he said, "and we cannot maintain our greatness without a national commitment to their educational development." Condra also stressed that his experience and that of his wife, Betty, a former public school teacher, will

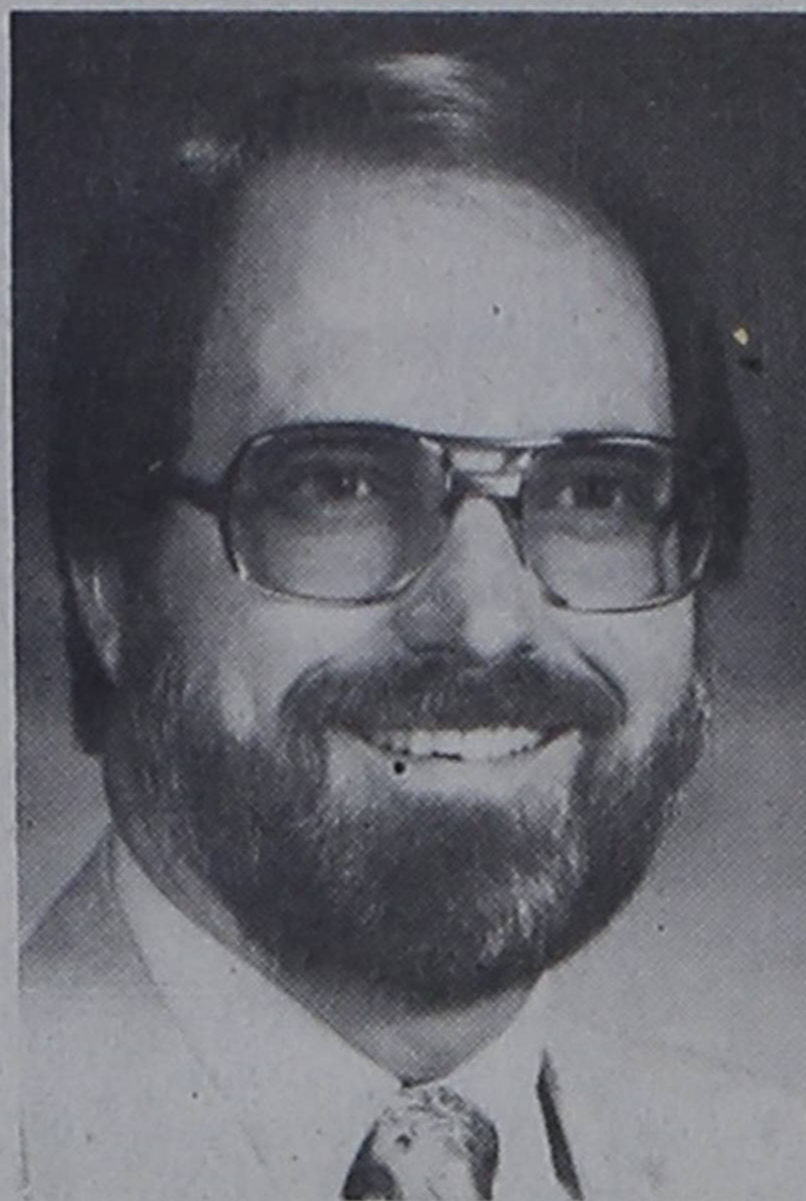
insure that this district is well represented in the area of education.

Condra suggested that we should elect our Congressman just like we would hire any other employee. "First," he said, "look at the job description and requirements. Then look at the training and experience of the applicants."

Condra graduated from Ballinger High School and received a bachelor's degree in animal science from Texas Tech in 1969. After a tour of duty with the U.S. Army in Vietnam, he returned to Texas Tech where he received a master's degree in agricultural economics in 1973. In 1978 he was awarded a doctorate in agricultural economics from Texas A&M.

Condra resigned his position as Extension Economist with the Texas A&M University System in September to evaluate this Congressional race. During his tenure with Texas A&M, he served with both the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Water Resources Institute. He also has experience as a private consultant, real estate appraiser, irrigated farm operator, and feed-lot office manager.

Condra is married to the former Betty Ann Moore of Plainview and they have two children, Clay, 14, and Merinda, 13. The Kondras are members of the Westmont Christian Church in Lubbock.

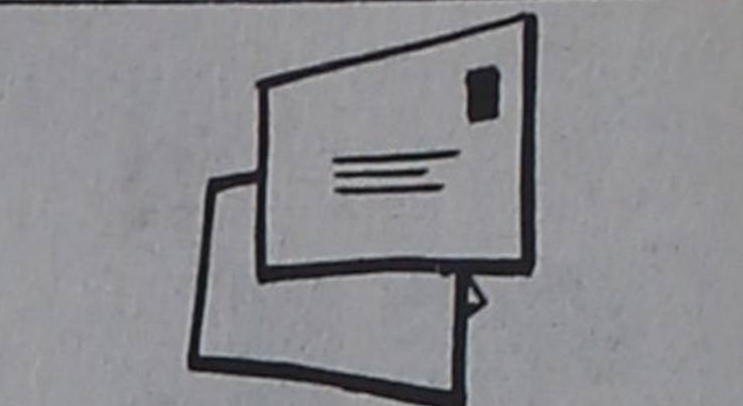

Letter To The Editor

Dear Bill,

"So near, yet so far"--a familiar phrase but cold comfort for children with Cystic Fibrosis and their families.

Improvements in medicine have resulted in longer, better lives for kids who inherit this fatal lung and digestive disease: instead of a five-year life span just a few decades ago, about half of the children now born with Cystic Fibrosis can expect to live into their 20s.

Still a cure is not in sight, and there is enormous pain, suffering and uncertainty. Cystic Fibrosis continues to kill more children and young adults than any other inherited disease. It slowly suffocates and starves victims by producing a thick mucus that ravages, and inevitably, destroys the body. Kids born with this disease face a lifetime of rigorous therapy and expensive medications. All this just to breathe and eat--which most of us take for granted.

It's both encouraging and frustrating for people with Cystic Fibrosis and their families to know that answers will soon be within reach. Media reports over the past several years herald discoveries of new information that may lead to identification of the gene that causes Cystic Fibrosis, or optimistically, to a cure or control.

But as the saying goes "close, but yet so far."

Hundreds of volunteers for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation here in Friona are to be thanked and praised for their tireless determination to help provide a better future for kids with Cystic Fibrosis. These volunteers have support of the community and will host a special Bike-A-Thon on March 17 at the High School Track.

Their goal is simple: to raise as much money as possible for more research. Let's all join them in this important quest to help scientists come even closer to the answers to Cystic Fibrosis.

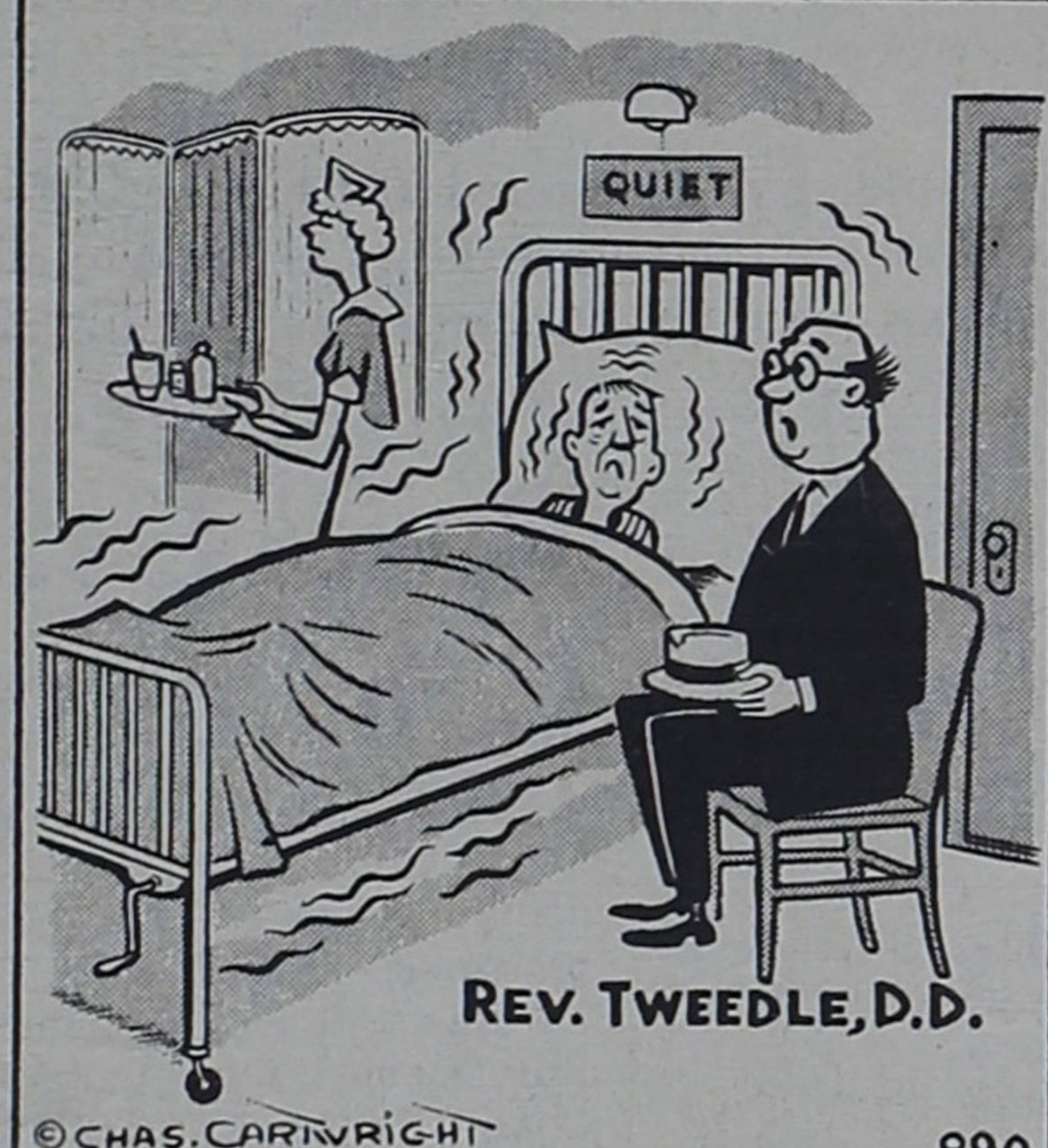

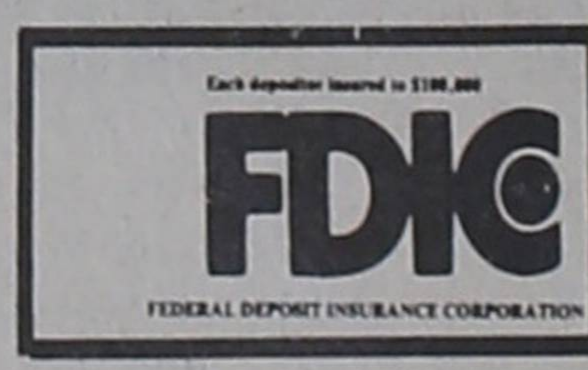

Girls' Track Team Does Well At LCC

The Friona Squaws scored seven first places, including four by the Osborn sisters--Nikki and Layce--at their first track meet of the season February 25 at Lubbock Christian.

Layce Osborn was a triple winner, taking titles in the high jump with a 4-6 leap, the 880-yard dash in 2:48.61, and the 440-yard dash in 69.25.

Wennetter Jackson was a double-winner, easily taking the shot put at 37-7, and the discus with a toss of 111-5. She won the shot put by ten feet and the discus throw by almost 20 feet.

Gayla Stowers won the 60-yard hurdles in 9.89.

Nikki Osborn won the mile run with a 6:21.66 clocking.

Jackson's shot and discus marks, and Miss Osborn's mile run were new meet records.

Nikki Osborn was second to Layce in the 880-yard dash in 2:44.92, as Friona swept first and second in the event. Dee Ann Harguess was second in the 220-yard dash in 30.15.

Robin Houlette placed third in the triple jump at 28-8 3/4. Miss Harguess was third in the 60-yard dash in 8.06; and Diana Cruz was second in the 220-yard dash in 31.14.

Amy Blankenship was fourth in the high jump at 4-4; Sharlene Parr was fifth in the 220-yard dash at 31.64; and Miss Houlette placed sixth in the long jump at 13-3.

The Squaws scored 108 points, good for third place behind Plains' 119 and O'Donnell's 108.

"We didn't even enter relay teams, since this was the weekend of the spring break. If we had had a full team, we could have won the meet," said Coach Donald Herbert.

"red water" which had been a problem in some areas of town. Field said he had taken the sample to a laboratory in Amarillo, which was unable to identify the problem.

The problem has not hindered the city's water from being approved by the state health department, but has officials stumped.

Council member Beth Thompson brought up the project by a Chamber

of Commerce committee on the possibility of purchasing the Santa Fe Depot, and re-locating it in the park for use by the Chamber.

Legalities of locating the facility in the park were mentioned.

Shannon's barrow made the premium auction sale after placing seventeenth in the mediumweight Yorkshire class.

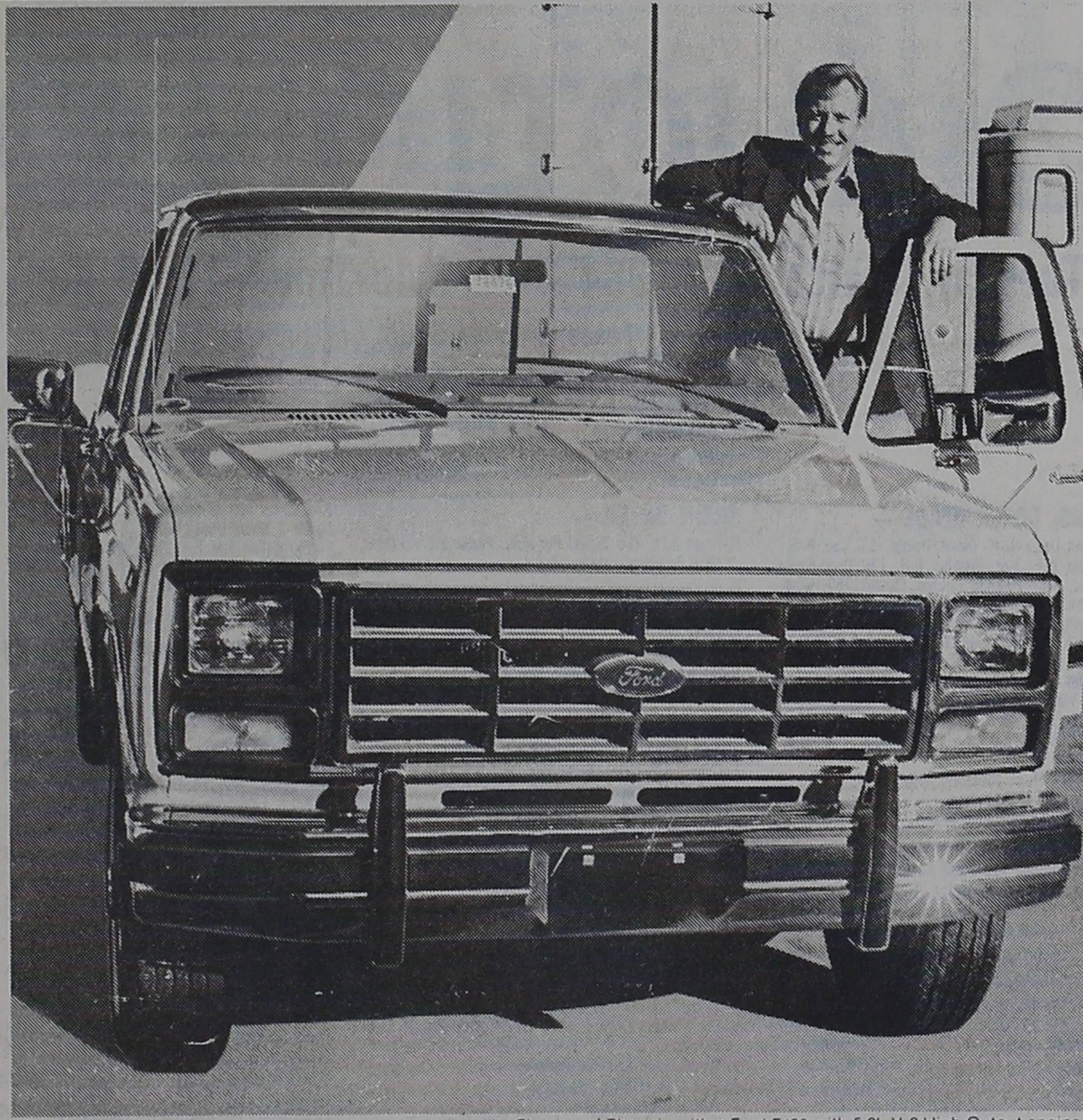
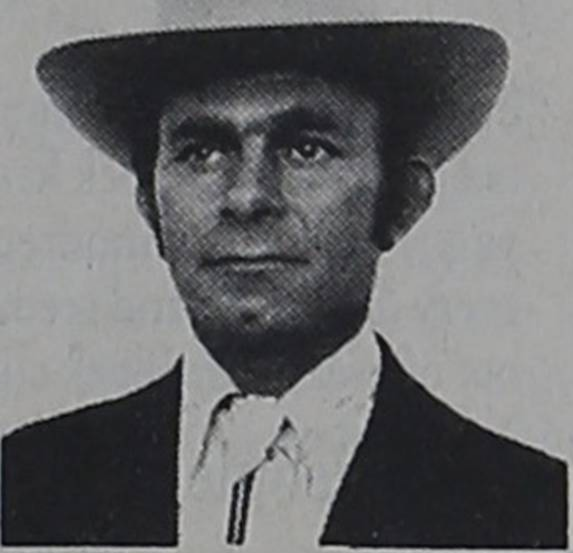

We at City Hall stand ready to assist the Chamber and the community in any way possible to further Friona's efforts toward Gearing For Growth.



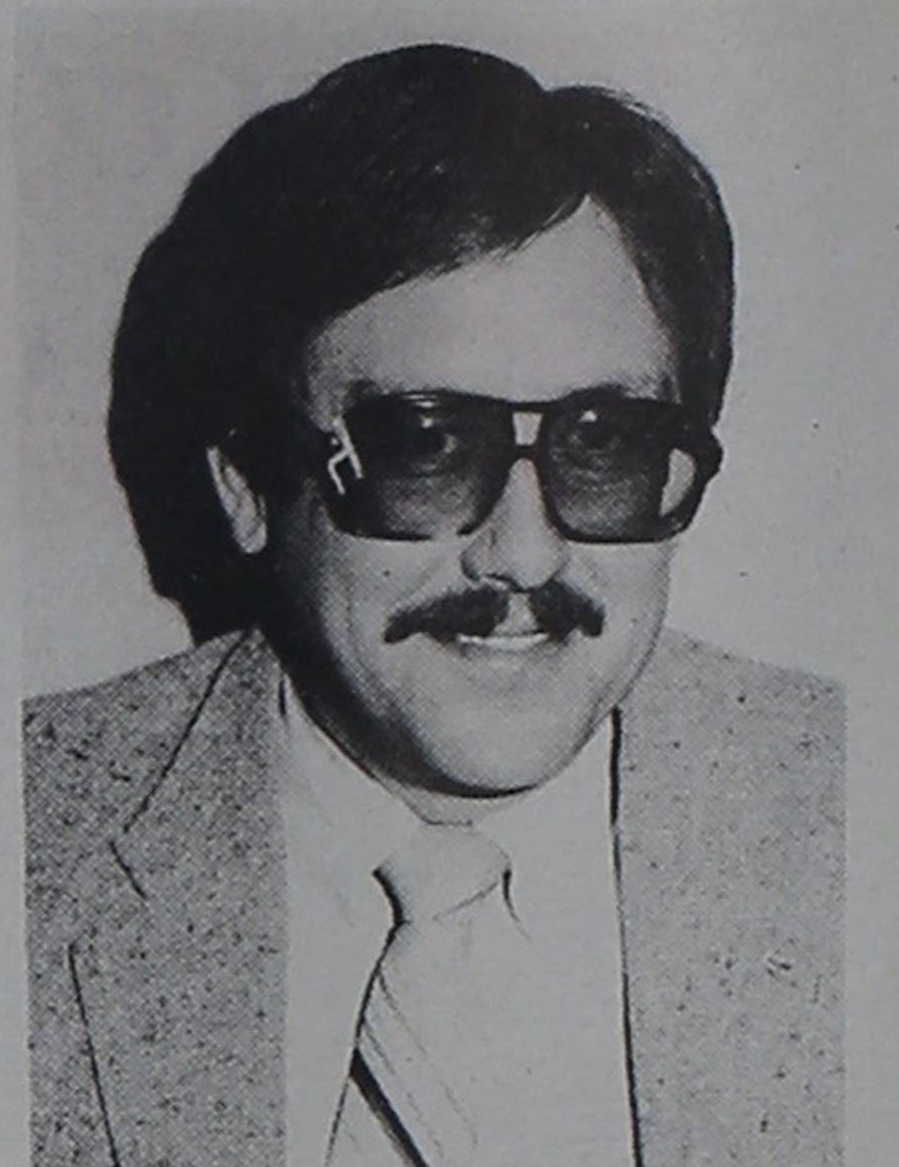
