

TWDB approves \$4,000,000 loan

ment Board (TWDB) approved a \$4,000,000 Agricultural Water Conservation loan to the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District located in Lubbock.

The District will use the funds to make loans to area farmers and rancher to purchase and install more efficient water conservation equipment. The District's loans will carry an interest rate of 4.8 percent with a five to eight-year term. The District will lend up to 75 percent of the value of the equipment.

The low interest rate resulted from the TWDB securing \$2 million in U.S. Department of Energy Oil Overcharge Funds provided through a grant from the state's General Services Commission. The funds were used to buy down the interest rate by two percent on a \$7

In January, the Texas Water Develop- million block of Agricultural Water Conservation bonds sold by the TWDB on February 2 for loans to this and other underground water conservation districts.

> The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District includes fifteen counties (all of Cochran, Hale, Lubbock, Lynn and Parmer counties; and parts of Armstrong, Bailey, Castro, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hockley, Lamb, Potter and Randall counties) covering more than 10,490 square miles in northwest Texas.



It's been awhile since I've been on a soap box, so for those of you who don't appreciate my soapbox columns—you won't want to read this.

I concerns the new high school health textbooks which have been "approved" by the State Board of Education.

Last November, the State Board of Education, with a vote of 10-5, placed its stamp of approval on five high school health textbooks with "possible changes" which will be discussed and voted on this Thursday and Friday.

The Board's vote included a provision that the publishers make changes based on the Board's recommendations and public testimony.

During hours of public testimony, many medical professionals, educators, parents and taxpayers opposed the books. They claimed violations of adoption rules and standards which say books cannot contain "offensive" content or "life-styles deviating from generally accepted standards of society. "Testifiers told the Board that the books promote homosexuality, contain inaccuracies, are too explicit and do not uphold premarital abstinence as a standard for students. (As a matter of fact, during testimony, some of the illustrations were so explicit Chairman Crawford refused to allow transparencies of them to be shown. It's too explicit for the adults in the room-but not for our children).

About the same number of individuals testified for the textbooks. Every advocate, except one, represented the homosexual movement.

Activities in the books and teachers resource material include:

*"Vocabulary Dice"—a game that uses terms such as foreplay, sexual orientation and other comments which I won't use in this family newspaper:

*Debate/Discussion about deviant sex, homosexual adoption of children, condoms on school campuses, surrogate

school board. (Your local school boards generally take the state board at their word, of course, and adopt the recommended books.)

Hasie said if he and other members lose the fight and the books are approved and then sent for approval to our local boards, then our school boards have to decide if they want them. If they choose not to buy them then your local board has to buy their own books and not use state funds to purchase them.

It is possible, Hasie said, that two or three books can be fixed—or at least one book will come out of this that he can recommend. Otherwise he will be sending a letter to every superintendent in the state telling them about the controversial material in the books.

In Hasie's opinion (and I agree), sex education should indicate there is only one way to be safe in relationships, and that's through abstinence. Sex education should not promote abnormal lifestyles or sexual practices.

"Saying sex is OK if you use a condom is the wrong message," said Hasie. "I want kids to know about contraceptives but I want them to know the risks and these books are not putting out that message."

Hasie said he is well aware of the conservative communities such as Lubbock, Lockney and Floydada. "It will create big problems if these books get into those towns," he said.

He also said that all of his recommendations will have to pass before he'll approve these books.

I appreciate Hasie's work and the others that have helped him out. Since the lines have been re-drawn Bill Hudson is our State Board of Education representative. Hasie (a conservative Republican) said, Hudson (a conservative democrat) also voted against adoption of these textbooks and has been a big help in proposing the changes.

Dance music will be performed by Country Nights of Plainview. Admission will be \$5 per person with children under 12 free when accompanied by their parents.



Hasie has been very very busy, along with some others, in studying these books and making recommendations. He has proposed 1,112 changes and of those only 608 have been accepted.

Hasie said that one of the topics in the Health books was euthanasia and Dr. Kevorkian's book was the reference for it.

According to Hasie if these books are adopted by the State Board of Education



tion between 1990 and 1993 within the 15-county High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area, according to a recent pivot inventory update by the district. This brought the 1993 total number of center pivot sprinklers in use in the District to 6,437.

According to Jon LaBaume, Floyd County's District Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, "Floyd County had a total of 82 systems installed in 1993. Currently 50 pivot systems are being installed with pipeline Jerry Patton earns degree at Tech

cost share assistance. In addition, at least 30-35 are being installed without pipeline cost assistance."

The 1993 tally showed Parmer County with 1,258 center pivots; Lamb County, 1,250; Castro County, 786; Bailey County, 671; and Hale County, 604.

The total in other counties in the District were Deaf Smith, 433; Hockley, 349; Cochran, 347; Lubbock, 304; Lynn, 170; Crosby, 141; Randall 39; Potter, 3; and Armstrong, 0.

The largest increase in center pivot use from 1990 to 1993 was found in Castro County where 230 new pivots were installed. This was followed by Hale County with 216; Parmer County, 197; Lamb County, 185; Lubbock County, 135; Deaf Smith, 109; Cochran County, 104; and Lynn County, 60. "Given an average price of \$30,000

per sprinkler system, the additional 1,513 sprinkler systems represent over a \$45 million dollar water conservation investment by irrigators within the Water District service area during the past three years," says A. Wayne Wyatt, High Plains Water District Manager.

Many producers have upgraded their irrigation systems to Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) center pivot systems, which can achieve an irrigation application efficiency of up to 95 percent. Since the water is applied at low pressure directly into the furrow, water losses associated with wind drift and evaporation are virtually eliminated.

In addition, use of a LEPA system can reduce labor costs, reduce fuel costs from 35 to 50 percent, and save from 20 to 40 percent of the water previously pumped for irrigation-when compared to conventional furrow irrigation.

them at risk for CVD, and even fewer know that the risk factors for heart disease, such as smoking lack of exercise and obesity, can actually be decreased with lifestyle changes.

The American Heart Association believes one of the best ways to reduce the more than 900,000 deaths each year from heart disease is to focus educational efforts on children; to reach them before behaviors such as smoking and lack of exercise become hard-to-break habits. The AHA hopes early education will help children live healthier lives as adults and decrease their risks for heart disease.

Every year, the American Heart Association launches a nationwide education campaign throughout February known as American Heart Month. This year's American Heart Month message emphasizes the importance of reaching children and families and educating them to take care of their hearts by engaging in regular physical activity. Consider the following facts:

Studies show that at least half of today's youth do not get enough regular exercise. Less than 36 percent of elementary and secondary schools offer daily physical education class, which means that many children are not receiving the training to nurture lifelong fitness patterns.


Some 25 percent of all children are obese, and obese children are at an increased risk for obesity as adults. A recent study indicates that U.S. children now spend as much time watching television as they do in school! In addition, watching television enhances the likelihood of weight gain by encouraging snacking and by substituting TV for active, energy-burning activities.

The AHA has a number of education programs for children and families on the issues of exercise, nutrition and smoking. Many schools in our community use these programs as they provide teachers with materials to help them incorporate AHA messages into their classroom activities.

This month, American Heart Association volunteers in Lubbock are raising money to support these school programs as well as many other AHA pro-



TULIA 73, FLOYDADA 57



Federal label changed on herbicides

FMC Corporation has announced changes to the federal label of Command® 4EC Herbicide for use on cotton in 1994. Registered for use on cotton for the first time in 1993, Command is a grass herbicide that also provides outstanding control of broadleaf weeds. *Restrictions on spray pressure, nozzle type, boom height, and wind speed.

As in 1993, dealers and distributors must also be qualified to sell Command under the new label. The new Command label requires the successful completion of a Command Qualification Training Meeting to buy, sell, or use the product in 1994. FMC is notifying all dealers, distributors, and growers throughout the South, with notice in the Delta, Southeast, and Southwest Farm Press publications as well as mailing them invitations

with all dates, locations and times for the meetings.

The label forbids aerial application and application through irrigation equipment, and requires the placement of an organophosphate insecticides in the furrow with the cotton seed as a seedling protectant. The recommended protectant insecticides are disulfoton (Di-Syston ®) or phorate (Thimet ®).

These insecticides must be applied infurrow at a minimum rate of 0.75 lb. ai/ acre.

EPA to allow use of propazine

On January 27, the Environmental Protection Agency, acting on a request by the National Grain Sorghum Producers, cleared the way for farmers in Texas and New Mexico to treat their grain sorghum fields with propazine this spring. The EPA used provisions of Section 18 of the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act to grant specific exemptions to allow use of the herbicide on grain sorghum in the two states.

"We are very pleased that EPA granted our request," said NGSP President Gary Bright, sorghum producer from Melrose, New Mexico. "And since EPA granted the exemption early in the year, producers will now be able to use propazine on this year's crop."

Producers in the Great Plains had used the herbicide on sorghum fields for more than 20 years before it was pulled

PCG announces 1993 Upland Cotton Deficiency Payment rate

Following the announcement of final marketing figures for calendar year 1993 Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers says the final 1993 Upland Cotton Deficiency Payment rate will be 18.6 cents per pound.

USDA has not officially announced the final payment rate, however, county ASCS offices have received the information and are in the process of printing checks to be mailed the week of February 7. It is expected that official word of the payment rate will come in the next few days.

"Based on an 18.6 cent final payment rate producers who asked for, and received, the 10.275 cent advance payment will receive a final payment of 8.3 cents per pound," notes Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President. "Coming on the heels of an excellent 1993 crop, the final payment should really help producers establish a firm financial basis for the 1994 crop."

Upland cotton deficiency payments are calculated as the lesser of the difference between either the 52.35 cent 1993

cotton loan rate or the weighted average price received by producers from January through December and the 72.9 cent target price set by the Secretary of Agriculture. The maximum possible deficiency payment rate for 1993 is 20.55 cents per pound.

PCG's calculations are based on final upland cotton marketing statistics released January 31 by the National Agricultural Statistics Service. The figures showed December marketings totaled 3.063 million bales. The weighted average price received by farmers in December totaled 57.1 cents.

Final marketings for 1993 totaled 14.509 million bales. The weighted average price received by farmers settled at 54.3 cents per pound for the year.

PCG officials also note that USDA has not announced all of the provisions that will make up the 1994 cotton program. Final word is expected in the next week to ten days.

Since then, producers have struggled to find an ef-

fective alternative. Other herbicides restrict rotation between sorghum and other crops such as cotton, wheat and soybeans.


"When the Griffin Corporation agreed to pursue the re-registration for propazine, we began explaining to EPA officials and to our legislators in Washington exactly why sorghum producers needed to use propazine," Bright said. "After several trips to Washington and with help from many people, we succeeded." Exemption requests must be made on a state-by-state basis with the state's agricultural department providing the technical information required by the EPA. A request for an exemption for

Oklahoma has been submitted to EPA, and requests for exemptions for Colorado and Kansas will be submitted soon. "Hopefully, EPA will grant the exemptions for the other states in time for spring planting," Bright said.

In order to comply with the Section 18 exemption and to ensure the long-term availability of propazine, growers should carefully read and follow all label instructions and use the herbicide only on grain sorghum crops.

Cotton conference examines problems for area producers —From Texas Agricultural Ex- of the USDA employees are in the U.S.

The recent North American Free Trade Agreement holds promise for Texas cotton producers, but environmental regulations and public perceptions will pose strong challenges, more than 300 farmers attending the two-day Caprock Cotton Conference in Crosbyton were told.

NAFTA means new opportunities for cotton farmers, Rick Perry, Texas commissioner of agriculture, told the group. "During the next 10 years (under NAFTA), Mexican tariffs against cotton will be phased out. U.S. exports of cotton to Mexico should increase," Perry said.

Perry said his Texas Department of

Forest Service, which he said is the nation's largest provider of recreational facilities.

He said that decisions on 36 million acres of land which will soon begin coming out of the Conservation Reserve Program "will be a major part of the debate in the 1995 federal farm bill."

Comments by an Environmental Protection Agency official from Dallas


on provisions of the Clean Air Act, worker protection standards and food safety drew pointed questioning from the audience. Asked about wording in the clean air act as it applies to emissions from irrigation pumps, Dr. Stanley Meiberg replied, "In my opinion, the irrigation engines we are talking about do not emit sufficient (toxics) to come under the enhanced monitoring requirement" of the act. Meiberg is director of the air, toxics and pesticides division of EPA at Dallas. Several producers questioned the wording of the rules, which they say would total the emissions from all the wells on a farm, not individual pumps, thereby requiring them to purchase expensive monitoring devices for each engine. On the worker protection standards, Meiberg said education is the key. He said EPA has received reports of 10,000 to 20,000 incidents of pesticide poisoning in the U.S. each year. When he believes, therefore, there are thousands more incidents which simply haven't been reported or not identified, he was challenged by one farmer to let producers "be presumed innocent until proven guilty."

Agriculture will focus on three strategies to help farm producers reach the consumers of Mexico. He said these include working with commodity groups to send trade missions to Mexico; encouraging Texas companies to pursue new markets in Mexico, and creating trade partnerships with Mexico.

Farmers need to actively combat the public misconception of agriculture and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, said Deputy Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Rominger. He said the streamlining of the USDA, now being fashioned by Congress and the department, is aimed at making it more cost effective and service driven.

Rominger said criticisms of USDA's \$53 billion annual budget — fourth largest among federal departments — as something making farmers rich "is ridiculous". "When you hear in the cofee shop about all this money spent on agriculture," the former California farmer said, "be sure to point out that over half of that budget is for the federal food and nutrition program" which includes food stamps, school lunches and assistance to women, infants and children.

Rominger also noted that 40 percent





What you can do about sex education

As a duly elected Republican member of the State Board of Education, I have certain beliefs about health education. I believe age-appropriate sex education is important. Sex education should indicate there is only way to be safe in relationships, and that's through abstinence. Sex education should not promote abnormal lifestyles or sexual practices. Schools should not use what arguably can be considered pornography.

"What can I do?" So many times I have been asked the question from parents and taxpayers concerned about the attempt to implement an apparent sexual agenda within the public school system of Texas.

First, we must answer the question: Does someone have an agenda to promote our students to unlawful abnormal sexual lifestyles and promiscuity? Here are some facts. You be the judge.

Fact 1: The Texas Statewide Health Council, appointed by the governor, wrote the State Health Plan. In a December 1992 letter, Gov. Ann Richards said the plan "Should assist in developing realistic solutions...to health needs of our citizens." On Page 105 of the report, the Sex Information and Education Council of the United States guidelines are recommended as appropriate for use in public schools. It recommends the following topics as being appropriate for grades kindergarten through 3: sexual intercourse, gay and lesbian relationships, masturbation. The report also recommends condom distribution on school campuses and explicit advice about abortion for teens.

Fact 2: In the spring of 1993, State Board of Education members were hearing rumblings of explicit and inappropriate sex program available in the schools. This kindergarten-through high school program -- "education for self-responsibility-AIDS prevention"-had not been approved by the state board. Nevertheless, it was distributed to all Texas elementary campuses without board member's knowledge.

In early October, I attempted to have this program listed as an action item on the State Board of Education agenda, hopefully to be voted out. Chairman Carolyn Crawford, an appointee of Gov. Richards' (both are Democrats), denied my request even though she was required to honor it.



Ironically, on Oct. 9, after George W.

Bush announced his Republican candidacy for governor and said we need to get "back to education and away from condoms in the schools, " I was contacted that same night for approval of a letter withdrawing the Texas Education Agenda's endorsement of the condom based "education for self-responsibility" curriculum. Although removal of the agency's endorsement was a major victory for parents, the battle is not over. The program is being revised and will come before the state board for approval early in 1994.

Fact 3: In November, the State Board of Education heard public testimony concerning the adoption of five high school health textbooks. Medical professionals, educators and a host of parents (approximately 22 individuals) cited the promotion of alternate lifestyles and explicit content in the books, such as a game using such terms as sexual orientation, wet dreams, masturbation, erection. So explicit were some of the illustrations that Chairman Crawford refused to allow transparencies of them to be shown. Even so, they could be used with our children.

About the same number of individuals testified for the textbooks. Every advocate-with one lone exception-represented the homosexual movement.

Space limitations prevent a closer look at Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders' agenda for condoms in schools, Gov. Richards' homosexual appointments, the Centers for Disease Control's master plan for comprehensive school health programs and Texas School Health Summit held (with carefully selected delegates) to develop an "action play" to implement comprehensive school health in Texas.

After much careful and deliberate thought, here are my suggestions as to what you can do:
