A view from The Lamplighter By Ken Towery

We were introducted to the ways of Washington thirty years ago. In January of 1963, in point of fact. When we arrived there in our nation's capitol, to begin a stint of learning that lasted (with mixed results) for many years, the leader of the tiny Republican contingent in the Senate was one Everett Dirksen, of Illinois. JFK was President, Bobby K was Attorney General, LBJ was Vice President, Teddy K was an inexperienced Senator and experienced skirt chaser from Massachusetts, a decent, pipe-smoking (but extremely pliant) Mike Mansfield of Montana was Senate Majority Leader, and Camelot was loosed upon the land.

Things were different. Senators and Congressmen had not yet become comfortable with speech involving "billions" of dollars. Dirksen once quipped, alluding to the propensity of liberal politicians to spend other people's money, that Congress ought to pay a little more attention to such matters.

"A billion here and a billion there, and pretty soon we are talking about real money," said Dirksen.

Everyone laughed. The phrase was picked up by the press, which also thought it was funny, and it stuck.

Would that our lawmakers still approached the spending of a billion here and a billion there with a little more apprehension. Now its the tens of billions, or the hundreds of billions. And its all done with a straight face.

Mr. Clinton has forwarded his budge proposal to the Congress, complete with his emphasis on where he wants more money spent, and where he wants less money spent. If he has his way, for instance, there will be substantial cuts (about \$3.6 billion) in agricultural programs and substantial increases in various social programs. Actually, he proposes a cut of seven percent in the overall agriculture budget (practically all of which will come from farm programs) and an increase of \$41 billion, or seven percent, in the budget for social welfare. (The budget for "social welfare and health" is \$673 billion. The budget for the Department of Agriculture is \$60.3 billion, but \$38.5 billion of the Agriculture budget, more than half, goes for such things as food stamps, school lunches, and things like that. In fact we've never understood why those expenditures end up in agriculture's budget anyway. Logically they ought to be included in the "social welfare" budget.

But that would reduce Agriculture's overall budget to \$21.7 billion, and increase the "social welfare" budget to \$711.5 billion, which wouldn't look good.)

Mr. Clinton also proposes that spending on AIDS be increased by seven percent, the same percent by which he proposes to reduce Agriculture. And while federal spending to support American agriculture is slated for a \$3 billion cut, there is no comparable reduction in federal spending to support the tiny state of Israel. That remains essentially where it has been for many years, at \$3 billion. Plus, of course, another billion or so for "security assistance." There is likely to be a good bit of argument in both the Senate and the House over such things as the level of spending for welfare, or for defense, or for agriculture, but there will be little mention of spending on foreign aid, since that might open up for debate the annual stipend of about \$1,000 for every man, woman and child in Israel.

We suspect the Clinton budget will survive pretty much intact. There will be much argument, and many votes, but in the end it won't be increased by any substantial amount, and it certainly won't be decreased. There may be some chairs moved around, but that will be about it.

Needless to say, if we were shaping the budget it would be somewhat different. We have never been a big fan of "foreign aid" in general. There was a time, when the U.S. Treasury was in good shape, and when we were locked in a world-wide struggle with the old Soviet Union, that foreign aid made at least a little sense. Now, with our Treas-

## Price of Hesperian-Beacon increasing April 1

Effective April 1, 1994, the newsstand price of this newspaper will increase to 50 cents per copy. Subscription rates will increase by \$1.00 per year, or about 2 cents per copy.

A year's subscription for in-county subscribers will cost \$16.00, out-ofcounty and surrounding counties subscription cost will be \$18.00 and out-ofstate rates will be \$19.00. Senior citizens will continue to receive a \$1.00 discount on their own subscription.

"We have not had a rate increase of any kind, either in advertising or subscriptions, since 1988," said Alice Gilroy, Editor of the Floyd County Hesperian-Beacon.

"We have absorbed many postal increases over the years and are expecting more next year. We have maintained our rates longer than most community newspapers in the face of rising costs, but it has come to the point where this move is necessary. We know that rate increases of any kind are hard on the public, no matter how modest, and we have taken that into consideration in keeping any price increase to a minimum."

crime and juvenile-related gang activity perpetrated by individuals under the age of 17 is the reason cited by the City Council for the proposed curfew.

If the proposal is passed, curfew hour will be 11 p.m. through 6 a.m. Sunday through Thursday and from 12:01 a.m. until 6 a.m. on Friday and Saturday.

Under the proposed curfew, "A person under the age of 17 violating the curfew will be told to go home for the first offense, taken home by the officer for the second offense and will be given a citation for the third offense."

'Right now we are real fortunate we only have one or two that are pepetual problems you might say. They're out to two, three, four o'clock in the morning," James Hale, Floydada Chief of Police,

Plainview will begin enforcing a curfew April 1. Other cities in the area are expected to adopt curfew ordinances in the near future.

The members of the City Council and the Chief of Police agree the curfew will prevent problem juveniles from surrounding towns from creating mischief

and trouble in Floydada.

The City Council also heard and discussed options concerning the playa lake that will become city property in the near future.

David A. Haukos, Ph.D., representing Texas Tech University's department of range and wildlife management, presented the council with four options that will offer the city assistance in maintaining the playa as a wildlife habitat.

No action was taken on the four proposals, and the council agreed to continue looking into options concerning

The mayor opened 28 sealed bids for the sale of two city vehicles: a 1981 Chevrolet pickup truck and a 1987 Chevrolet four-door car.

Wayne Tipton was awarded the pickup for the high bid of \$1250 and the car was awarded to City Auto for \$975. The council unanimously awarded

three bids for city improvements: Waterworks Improvements, Texas Community Development Program number 702199, was awarded to Rhodes Construction for \$126,509.50; Electric Distribution System Upgrade was awarded to Gill Electric for \$72,700.40; and Lipham Construction was awarded the bid for Seal Coat at \$41,480.

The council took action on two summer programs affecting the community's youth.

The swimming pool operator position was awarded to Ann Assiter. Assiter told the council the admission

## Carthel brothers bestowed Land Stewardship Award

Gary and Hulon Carthel, owners and operators of the Carthel Brothers Farm near Floydada, received the Texas Chapter of the Wildlife Society's Land Stewardship Award for 1994 at the Society's annual meeting in Nacogdoches on February 11. The award was presented by David Haukos, a wetlands biologist with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, which shared the costs of enhancing 200 acres of playa wetlands and 800 acres of upland habitats on the 4,000 acre farm, about 45 miles northeast of

"The Carthels have led the way in integrating wildlife concerns with farming and other agricultural practices on the High Plains," said Haukos. "Their work has served as a model, prompting other landowners in the region to include wildlife considerations in their farming operations." The Wildlife Society is a national

organization of professional wildlife biologists with chapters in 50 states. Only one Land Stewardship Award is presented each year in Texas. Since 1988, the Carthels cooperated

with the Department of Range and Widlife at Texas Tech University to conduct research on their property and since 1991, worked with the Fish and Wildlife Service to manage eight playas and adjacent upland habitat on their farm. They were also instrumental in forming the first chapter of Pheasants Forever on the High Plains, involving additional landowners in projects for

## Judge to hear lawsuits against Caprock

District Judge John Forbis, of Childress, agreed to hear the civil suit and Writ of Mandemus against Caprock Hospital District on April 25 in the Floyd County District Courtroom. The two suits have been consolidated and

will be heard as one, as Cause #8648. Derek Walls, a former hospital employee, filed the suits after he was terminated from Caprock Hospital. He was terminated on Dec. 21, along with 17 other employees. Walls claims he was

illegally fired. In his suit, Walls claims the board

violated the open meetings act, in that meeting, when they voted to "abandon all efforts to reopen the hospital."

Dr. Tommy Swate, who also has a suit against the hospital, pending in a Houston federal court, is representing Walls. Swate, who is also an attorney, was terminated from Caprock Hospital on Dec. 7, 1993, because of alleged contract violations. According to Caprock Board members, Swate was dismissed after an altercation between him and a vice president from St. Mary's Hospital.

A preliminary re-opening date for

Caprock Hospital had been set for January 9, 1994, however after Swate's dismissal the district was left without a doctor. The board then voted to abandon efforts to reopen the hospital. After his termination Swate filed

## Texas businesses have April 14 deadline for filing tax renditions

State Comptroller John Sharp has reminded Texas businesses that they must render their property with county appraisal district by a new deadline-April 14. Beginning in 1994, state law changed the rendition deadline from April 1 to April 14.

To "render" means to list the taxable property that businesses owned or managed as of January 1, 1994.

While state law requires business owners and operators to render, any property owner-including homeowners, farmers and ranchers-may render their property with county appraisal districts.

"Homeowners who render are in a better position to exercise their rights as taxpayers," Sharp noted. "They are ensuring that the appraisal district has their correct address so they will receive notices of any actions that affect their property or tax bills."

If the tax collector cannot deliver a tax bill because of an incorrect address, the property owner is responsible for paying the taxes, plus the late payment penalties, Sharp added.

State law requires anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 to render with the local appraisal district. An exception is a business that receives the freeport exemption for managing cotton stored in a warehouse.

"For example, businesses must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment and other tangible personal property by filing this annual report," Sharp said. "Appraisal districts use the reports to set business property values. When a business owner doesn't render his or her property, the chief appraiser estimates the value."

Sharp also announced that property owners who had property damaged by a storm, flood or fire last year may file a special decreased value report that could lower their final tax bills.

Property owners may ask the chief appraiser for additional time-through

The time has come for answers to be given to the public concerning the status of our hospital and the status of our tax money. We have not been given a lot of answers so far and the clock is still running. To date all we have received is the blame being placed on someone

Our hospital is ready and shining better than it has ever been. Not only is it a shame to have it in the condition we have, but to literally shut it down after all the money, time, and work have been put into this facility is a crime. I realize there are several taxpayers in

the county that want this to happen. They want the taxes to stop, but we are going to be paying taxes on the hospital for a while longer. If the district votes to dissolve the district, the taxes don't stop there. We will be paying to take care of patients in other area hospitals the county will be responsible for paying. We have all felt the crunch of the taxes. But, what about the taxes we have been paying all this time while the hospital was closed? What about the taxes used to remodel the hospital? Is there another reason why the court hearings are being delayed that we are not supposed to know about? What we need now is to have our questions answered. We elected the board members to serve and open the hospital. I don't recall a time limit being placed on the opening. In my personal

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opinion, at the December board meeting, the decision to close the hospital was made before the board arrived at the hospital that morning. We need an evening meeting of the board with room for the public to attend and ask the questions we have been asking each other. If the public can ask questions and receive answers from the board members, I believe we can get the ball rolling again and we can have a hospital and a clinic with doctors to attend to the needs of the taxpayers. It is our responsibility to tell the board we will not sit still any longer and be dictated to by them. I realize the board is an elected group serving without compensation, but remember they are spending our money.

There will always be persons electing to go out of town for hospitals and doctors, but that is their decision. They are not being forced to do this. If we sit back and allow ourselves to be forced to accept this decision, we deserve the taxes we will have to pay.



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

## Insecticide could cause cattle deaths

We are likely to see some insecticide applications for aphids in wheat as we move into late winter and early spring. If wheat is drought stressed at the time these applications are made, we could experience a situation with systemic insecticides similar to that in Oklahoma. Disulfoton and dimethoate are the only two organophosphate (OP) systemic insecticides labeled on wheat. According to label directions, disulfoton does not allow grazing whereas dimethoate has a 14 day no grazing interval.

There have been numerous reports in Oklahoma of cattle feeding on wheat pastures treated with OP insecticides and becoming sick or dying. Most reported poisonings are from areas of the state in which the wheat is drought stressed. Also, many of the reports indicate that cattle were not withdrawn from the wheat as required by the insecticide label or were put back on the wheat

before the label requirements permitted. Wheat which is being grazed with the proper stocking rate will generally have few-to-no greenbugs present because the cattle kill the greenbugs. Therefore, such fields very seldom require insecticide treatments to control greenbugs. All wheat fields should be inspected for the presence of greenbugs before any insecticide treatments are applied. When wheat fields are sprayed for greenbugs, the grazing statement on the insecticide label must be followed. It is both the applicator's and producers responsibility to follow the label.

Regardless of product chosen for aphid control, erratic results can be expected on drought stressed wheat. Improved control will not be seen until beneficial moisture occurs and wheat resumes growth.

If a producer believes cattle have been poisoned or died as a result of an insecticide application, the producer needs to contact a veterinarian to obtain the appropriate samples for confirmation. Cattle do die from other causes such as lead poisoning from batteries, magnesium toxicity, pneumonia, etc.

Organophosphate insecticides act in a way causing inhibition of a chemical, cholinesterace, that is responsible for the breakdown of acetylcholine. Acetylcholine is a chemical that acts at nerve endings to transmit nerve impulses.

Without cholinesterace, transmission of nerve impulses are continuous hence the organism undergoes a breakdown of the system. This breakdown usually results in death. This mode of action is true for insects, cattle, and even man at high


If cattle are in a weakened state for any reason or have been weakened from feeding on insecticide treated wheat, do not allow cattle to feed on the insecticide treated fields for 3-5 weeks after the last insecticide application. This is about the period of time it takes for cattle with suppressed cholinesterase to recover. Producers need to verify level of recovery by having a veterinarian take unclotted blood samples for cholinesterase

level determination before returning cattle to treated fields.

Dr. Bill Edwards, a veterinarian associated with Oklahoma State University Animal Diagnostic Lab, has reported 25-30 cattle deaths associated with OP poisoning. It is suspected that the OP is dimethoate, and the deaths have come as a result of not adhering to the grazing interval of 14 days for dimethoate. Dr. John Halliburton, toxicologist at Texas A&M Veterinary Diagnostic lab in Amarillo, indicated no cases of OP poisoning have occurred in the Texas Panhandle area, but the College Station lab has reported cases.

## USDA announces common provisions

## 1994 deficiency payment set

USDA announced the final components of the 1994 Acreage Reduction Program (ARP) Thursday beginning with a sign-up period from March 1 through April 29. According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers the information will help farmers across the High Plains finalize plans for the 1994

In addition to the sign-up period several other provisions were also announced. One of the most important was the setting of an estimated 1994 upland cotton deficiency payment of 12.9 cents

Unfortunately, producers were left in the dark concerning the percentage of the estimated payment rate that will be available at program sign-up. The estimated payment rate for 1994 is 10 cents below 1994's maximum possible payment rate of 22.9 cents.

According to PCG officials the 1990 Farm Bill stipulates that, if the Secretary of Agriculture determines a deficiency payment is likely to be made, an advance payment for upland cotton producers will be available at program sign-

The 1990 Farm Bill also sets parameters for the advance payment at not less

than 340 percent or more than 50 percent of the estimated payment rate. This means upland cotton producers can expect an advance payment somewhere between 3.87 and 6.45 cents per pound at sign-up.

"The announcement of the sign-up period and the estimated upland cotton deficiency payment means producers can finish some of the preliminary work that needs to be done to set up financing and finish land preparations for the coming year," says Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President.

Johnson notes that much of the information needed to prepare for the 1994 is now available.

In addition to those already discussed the following provision were also announced:

50/85/92 Provisions - Upland cotton producers that report at least 50 percent of their Maximum Permitted Acreage (MPA) planted to the crop may devote acreage in excess of 15 percent of the MPA to Conserving Use (CU) for payment and be eligible for deficiency

payments if the sum of the acreage does not exceed the MPA.

50/85 Exceptions - Producers that report at least 50 percent of the MPA as planted to the crop shall be eligible for deficiency payments on any designated acreage above 8 percent of the MPA that was: (1) planted to an IOC (industrial and experimental crops), or (2) if the rice or upland cotton crop failed or was prevented from being planted and the acreage was subsequently devoted to CU for payment.

Failed Acreage Reports - Acreage reported as failed or prevented planted must be in excess of the 50 percent planting requirement.

ACR/CU History Requirement -Land may be designated as ACR or CRU for payment if all other eligibility

"As the season progresses, the insects build, and by the late season, for the bud worm, that's third generation. It can be quite a heavy popoulation. 

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## upper hand on the boll weevil The fight is far from over, but cotton

producers and their allies in the scientific community seem to be getting the upper hand on the boll weevil. New techniques for controlling the boll weevil have been adopted in recent years, and more are on the way.

Scientists gain

Dr. Patricia O'Leary of Cotton Incorporated says one of these new techniques is a parasite that's now being tested. "The parasites would be massbred in the laboratory and then released into the field. If it's a successful release, the population would reproduce in the field on the boll weevils present there."

In some parts of the country, the battle against the boll weevil is still raging. But in other areas, the weevil has been all but wiped out, thanks to a variety of management strategies and the cooperation of growers in a unified program of eradication.

O'Leary says that in those areas, cotton has made a remarkable comeback. "For those states where eradication has been successful, such as North Carolina, cotton farmers are back in the business of producing cotton."

O'Leary says it's far too early to declare victory, but farmers and scientists are eventually going to win the war of the weevil.



## February sales tax rebates decrease in Floyd County

February 1994 sales tax rebates made bates and percentage of change are to Floyd County cities from the state comptroller's office have been received and both Floydada and Lockney are displaying a sizable decrease in sales reported for December and the final quarter of 1993. Floydada's check from the state comptroller's office was in the amount of \$13,699.07 showing a decrease of 11.06 percent from the \$15,403.68 payment received in February of 1993. Area cities, their February 1994 re-

## Soil testing is as important as spring showers in lawn care

Your lawn may still be brown, but according to Kerry Siders, County Extension Agent-Ag., it's not too early to plan your summer lawn care. One key to a lush, green lawn is timely application of the right fertilizer. Having your lawn's soil tested is the only way to make sure you buy and apply the proper amount of fertilizer.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has launched a new SOIL TEST program that helps homeowners determine the best fertilizer and the correct amount for their lawns based on individual tests, rather than general recommendations for geographic areas.

"Just as too much water creates problems for a lawn, too much fertilizer also can be damaging," said Siders. "If a lawn receives more nutrients (fertilizer) than it can use, the excess may run off and contaminate groundwater. We're more and more concerned about the environmental effects of using too much fertilizer.

"SOIL TEST now so you'll be ready for the growing season," said Soil Chemist Dr. Michael Hickey who directs the Plains Soil Testing Laboratory in Lubbock. "Odds are that it will need some fertilizer, but probably less than

you think. Find out for sure with a SOIL TEST."

The Extension Service is encouraging homeowners to pick up a SOIL TEST kit at retail stores where fertilizers are sold, or from county extension offices. The kit contains simple directions, a plastic bag for the soil sample, an information card and prepaid mailer.

The \$13 cost covers the soil analysis, preparation of the report and postage. "For about the cost of one bag of fertilizer, you can get information that could save you money on fertilizer expense," said Siders. "Allow ten working days to receive your personal SOIL TEST lab

"The report tells you what nutrients are already in your soil and which formula of fertilizer, if any, to use and how much you need to put on your lawn. The report both recommends how much fertilizer to apply at first, as well as the rest of the year. It takes all the guesswork out of fertilizing your lawn," Siders said.
