pipe-smoking (but extremely pliant)
Mike Majority Leader, and Camelot wa loosed upon the land.
Things were different. Senators and Congressmen had not yet become com-
fortable with speech involving "bil fortable with speech involving "bil-
lions" of dollars. Dirksen once quipped alluding to the propensity of liberal politicians to spend other people'
money, that Congress ought to pay little more attention to such matters. ere and a billion there, and prety soon we are tall.
Everyone laughed. The phrase was
picked up by the press, which also picked up by the press, which als
thought it was funny, and it stuck. Would that our lawmakers still ap proached the spending of a billion here and a billion there with a litle more
apprehension. Now its the tens of bilapprehension. Now its the tens of bil-
lions, or the hundreds of billions. And its all done with a straight face.
proposal to the Congress proposal to the Congress, complete with
his emphasis on where he wants more money spent, and where he wants less instance, there will be substantial cut (about $\$ 3.6$ billion) in agricultural pro-
grams and substantial increases in vari grams social programs. Actually, he pro poses a cut of seven percent in the ove all agriculture budget (practically all of
which will come from which will come from farm programs)
and an increase of $\$ 41$ billion, or seven and an increase of $\$ 41$ billion, or seven
percent, in the budget for social welfare. (The budget for "social welfare and health" is $\$ 673$ billion. The budget for the Department of Agriculture is $\$ 60.3$

ture budget, more than half, goes for
such things as food stamps, school lunches, and things like that. In fac we've never understood why those
expenditures end up in agriculture's expenditures end up in agriculture's
budget anyway. Logically they ought 0 budget anyway. Logically hey ought
be included in the "social welfare"
budget.
But that would reduce Agriculture's
overall budget to $\$ 21.7$ billion, and inoverall budget to $\$ 21.7$ billion, and in-
crease the esocial welfare" budget to
$\$ 711.5$ billion, which wouldn't look
good.) Clinton alsoproposes that spend
ing on AIDS be increased by seven ing on AIDS be increased by seven
percent, the same percent by which he percent, the same percent by which he
proposes to reduce Agriculture. And while federal spending to support American agriculture is slated for a $\$ 3$
billion cut, there is no comparable rebillion cut, there is no comparable re-
duction in federal spending to support duction in federal spending to support
the tiny state of Israel. That remains essentially where it has been for many years, at $\$ 3$ billion. Plus, of course,
another billion or so for "security assisanother billion or so for "security assisargument in both the Senate and the House over such things as the level of spending for welfare, or for defense, or
for agriculture, but there will be litte mention of spending on foreign aid, annual stipend of about $\$ 1,000$ for every man, woman and child in Israel. We suspect the Clinton budget will
survive pretty much intact. There will be much argument, and many votes, but in
the end it won't be increased by any substantial amount, and it certainly won't be decreased. There may be some
chairs moved around, but that will be
about it.
Needless to say, if we were shaping the budget it would be somewhat different. We have never been a big fan of foreign aid in C . Treasury was in good shape, and when we were locked in a world-wide struggle with the old Soviet Union, that foreign aid made at

April 14. Beginning in 1994, state April 14. Beginning in 1994, state law
changed the rendition deadline from April 1 to Aprill 14.
To "render" means to list the taxable property that businesses owned or managed as of January y $1,1994$.

property owner-including homeowners, farmers and ranchers-may render their pro

There have been numerous repor Oklahoma of cattle feeding on wheat pastures treated win OP insecticides and becoming sick or dying. Most re-
ported poisonings are from areas of the state in which the wheat is drought sressed. Also, many of the reports indicate that catlle were not withdrawn from label or were put back on the wheat before the label requirements permitted. Wheat which is being grazed with the proper stocking rate will generally have eew-to-no greenbugs present because such fields very seldom require insecticide treatments to control greenbugs. All wheat fields should be inspected for he presence of greenbugs before any insecticide treatments are applied.
When wheat fields are sprayed for greenbugs, the grazing statement on the insecticide label must be followed. It is
sponsibility to follow the label Regardless of product chosen for
aphid control, erratic results expected on drought stressed can be Improved control will not be seen until beneficial moistu
resumes growth.
If a producer believes cattle have been poisoned or died as a result of an insec ticide application, the producer needs $t$ contact a veterinarian to obtain the ap Cattle do die from other causes such as lead poisoning from batteries, magne sium toxicity, pneumonia, etc.
Organophosphate insecticides Organophosphate insecticides act in
way causing inhibition of a chemic way causing inhibition of a chemical,

Fighting insects with cultural management delays resistance

Every time cotton producers use a
chemical pesticide, they are increasing the chances that insects will develop a resistance to it. Dr. Patricia O'Leary of Coton Incorporated says farmers can manage their cropsto
delay - resistance.
"Part of the recommended management for resistance procedures are culcrop for earliness." According to O'Leary, this includes an early planting date, to get a head start on the insects.

## Soil testing is as important as

 spring showers in lawn careYour lawn may still be brown, but
according to Kerry Siders, County Extension Agent-Ag., it's not too early to
plan your summer lawn care. One key to a lush, green lawn is timely application of the right fertilizer. Having your lawn's soil tested is the only way to
make sure you buy and apply the proper amount of fertilizer.
The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has launched a new SOIL TEST program that helps homoowners deter-
mine the best fertilizer and the correct mine une best fertuizer and the correed
amount for their lawns based on individual tests, rather than general recommendations for geographic areas. "Just as too much water creates prob lems be damaging," said Siders. "If lawn receives more nutrients (fertilizer) than it can use, the excess may run of and contaminate groundwater. We're
more and more concerned about the more and more concerned about the
environmental effects of using too much fertilizer.
"SOIL TEST now so you'll be ready for the growing season," said Soil rects the Plains Soil Testing Laboratory in Lubbock. "Odds are that it will need some fertilizer, but probably less than
you think. Find out for sure with a SOII The Extension Service is encouraging homeowners topick up a SOIL TEST Kit or from county extension offices. The kit contains simple directions, a plastic card and prepaid mailer.
The \$13 cost covers the soil analysis, preparation of the report and postage. "For about the cost of one bag of fertilzer, you can get information that could
save you money on fertilizer expense," save you money on fertilizer expense,
said Siders. "Allow ten working days to receive your personal SOLL TEST lab results.
"The report tells you what nutrients "The report tells you what nutrients
are already in your soil and which formula of fertilizer, if any, to use and how much you need to put on your lawn. The report both recommends how much fertilizer to apply at first, as well as the rest
of the year. It takes all the guesswork out of fertilizing your lawn," Siders said. "No more confusion about the numbers on the bag. Instead use your SOIL TEST
report when you buy fertilizer. It's one more way you can protect the environmore way you can protect the environ-
ment while giving your lawn the best
