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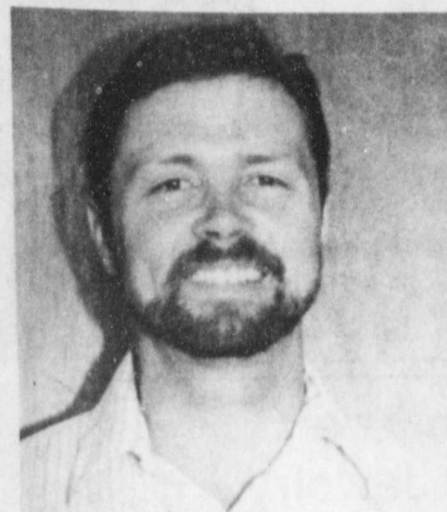

Meet Your Candidates



ERIC CORNELIUS
FLOYDADA—Eric Cornelius is seeking reelection to his position on city council. A total of four men are vying for two At-Large positions.

Cornelius has served two terms on the council, for a total of four years. He has lived in Floydada since 1975 when his father bought the Conoco Station on 2nd Street.

Cornelius took over the business in 1986 and has operated it since that time.

As councilman Cornelius has overseen the opening of the landfill and many park improvements.

"I hope to continue serving as councilman and do my part in seeing that the city maintain their financial condition," said Cornelius. "The city is in excellent condition right now and I would like to help keep it that way."

Cornelius has been married to his wife Julianne for 13 years. They have two children: Skyler, 8, and Jordan, 2.

A Lions Club member, Cornelius has also served as Lions Club President. He is also a past winner of the chamber's Extra Mile Award. The family are members of the First Baptist Church in Floydada.



CLAR SCHACHT
FLOYDADA—Clar Schacht is seeking reelection to one of the two At-Large positions of Floydada City Councilman, a position he has held for the past three years.

"During my years on the city council we have reopened the landfill, and reworked electric and water lines," said Schacht.

Schacht is particularly proud of the improvements made to Napoleon Park, Annie Taylor Park and the City Park. "I feel like parks tell people how we feel about the city," said Schacht. "We still have some improvements to be made such as new signs and new playground equipment."

"I want to be able to see projects through including the future improvements to city hall."

Clar has been married to his wife, Judy, for 17 years. They have two children, Meredith, who is in the 7th grade, and Spencer, who is a 1st grader.

Schacht has lived in Floyd County all of his life and has lived in Floydada for 8 years. He has worked with Floyd County Farm Bureau for 12 years and has served as the Agency Manager for 8 years.

Schacht is a Rotarian and a past president of Rotary. He is a deacon at First Baptist Church and was nominated Citizen of the Year in 1994.

"I have enjoyed serving with the council and the city employees over the years and I hope I will be able to continue in that service," said Schacht.

FLOYDADA—Jack Ochoa is one of four men seeking the At-Large position of City Council.

Ochoa has lived in Floydada since 1973. He has been an electrician for 14 years and owns his own business, Jack's Electric. He has also worked for the county by maintaining county roads.

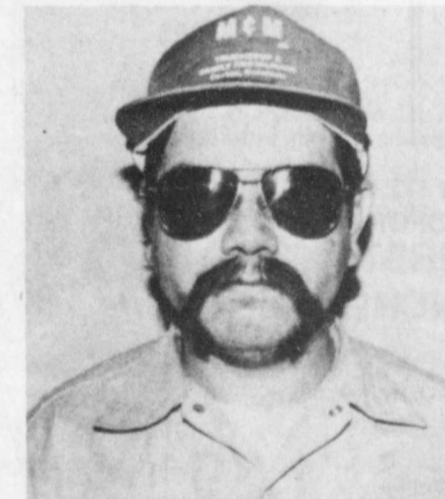
In 1991 Ochoa ran for City Council Pct. #1. He was defeated in that race.

"I have experience working heavy equipment and I believe my input could help improve the city's dirt and gravel roads and their alleys," said Ochoa.

"As city councilman I would also like to address the issue of charging to use the landfill and I want to continue in the efforts to beautify Floydada."

"I feel like I can participate in all monthly agendas and address what my constituents need. I also believe I can work well with the city council," said Ochoa.

FLOYDADA—Also seeking the At Large City Council position is Joe Ysasaga Jr.

He has been married to his wife, Yvonne for 17 years. They have three children: Joe, 16, Deborah Lee, 12, and Samantha Lee, 1 1/2 years old.

"I want a chance to be city councilman and to be a voice for the people," said Ysasaga. "Their concerns are my concerns."

Ysasaga also stated, "If I am elected city councilman, I would like to find a program for the kids in town to keep them off the streets and out of trouble."

Water customers noticed a drop in water pressure until Monday afternoon; no customers were out of water service at any time during the repair. It took approximately three hours to weld the crack in the bottom of the water tower, which was due to stress. After the repair, the tower had to be disinfected, washed out and refilled to capacity.

Athena Study Club slates Lockney pre-school clinic

LOCKNEY—The 43rd annual pre-school clinic, sponsored by the Athena Study Club of Lockney, will be held Thursday, April 20, 1994 from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. at the Lockney Elementary School Cafeteria.

The purpose of the annual event is to pre-register all 4 and 5 year old youngsters who will enter the Lockney school system for the first time in August, 1994. Included in this category are children who will reach their fourth or fifth birthday on or before September 1, 1994 and who are attending school for the first time. Also children who are six years old and who have never attended school previously should be at this clinic.

As in the past children will receive a physical examination, vision screening, dental exam and speech screening. Conducting the checkups will be Dr. Gary Mangold, Dr. Kevin Stennett, and Dr. Kevin Stewart. Dr. Stewart Webb will conduct the vision screening, Dr. Randall Griffin the dental examination

and Karen Quebe will hold the speech screening.

It is expected that regular immunizations will be available.

The entire clinic is free to all who have children who will be entering Lockney schools in August, 1994.

"It is very important that the parent bring the child's birth certificate social security card and immunization records," stated Phil Cotham, principal at Lockney Elementary School.

"In addition to be screened for health, vision, dental and speech problems, children will also be pre-enrolled in kindergarten. Pre-registration of children saves time both for the parents and school officials in that youngsters may come in on the first day of school with a minimum of fuss since all the usual first day of school paperwork is already filled out. Also by pre-registering school officials will know approximately how many kindergarten children to plan for," he continued.

Prisoner leads police on brief foot chase

Quite a bit of excitement was generated around the square in downtown Floydada, Thursday morning, when a man destined for the Floyd County Jail escaped from authorities and led police on a foot chase.

According to Sheriff Charles Overstreet, Reginald Mata, 25, of Floydada will be charged with escape. "Mata wasn't in the custody of a deputy at the time of the escape," said Overstreet. "Mata had gone to the Floyd County Courthouse to report to his probation officer, James Williams. Williams told Mata he was going to be placed in jail because the Sheriff's office had a petition for revocation of probation." Mata was on probation for a DWI charge.

According to Overstreet when Williams started walking Mata to the jail, Mata took off running across the courthouse yard.

"Officer Snell (of the Floydada Police Department) saw him running," said Overstreet. "He radioed the dispatcher to ask if there had been an escape. The dispatcher was on the phone with Williams when Snell called in and she nodded to us—so we all took off running out

the door and across the square looking for him."

Mata was stopped by Officer Snell in the alley between Virginia and Missouri.

Evidently Mata was unaware that his escape was known by officers because according to reports he simply opened the passenger door to Officer Snell's patrol car and asked for a ride.

Snell gave Mata a ride to the rear of the jail whereupon Mata jumped from the moving vehicle and again took off running. Jailers gave foot pursuit at this time and Mata was again stopped by Snell in the alley by the Breakfast Shop in the 200 block of S. Main.

Mata will now have to serve jail time for the DWI charge and faces jail time for the escape. A hearing has not been held to determine the length of his sentence.

Overstreet also reported an abundance of prisoners in the Floyd County Jail. "Monday morning, April 4, we had a total of 27 prisoners in the jail," said Overstreet. "We have 7 people admitted on Sunday alone for charges ranging from DWI to Public Intoxications. The incidents were separate and unrelated."

Floydada parents plan after prom party

FLOYDADA—Project Prom Night, which serves as an alternative for junior and senior students, will once again be undertaken by Floydada parents following this year's April 22 prom at Della Plains Gym. Project Prom Night, which was begun in 1993 by concerned parents, is an all-night alcohol-free/drug-free party for juniors and seniors.

The party provides a place for students to go and have a good time after the prom instead of going some place where they may be influenced into drugs or alcohol. The all-night party begins approximately 30 minutes after the prom ends. Students may stay as long as they wish, until about 6:00 a.m. However, if a student leaves the premises they will not be allowed back in.

Music presented by a DJ is being secured by parent sponsors. There will also be games, refreshments and lots of door prizes.

Landfill rules are real

FLOYDADA—For the citizens, who are bringing waste to the Floydada Landfill, to better understand what they are required to do, the following information is offered:

All loads must be properly secured. This means the items being brought in must be secured in a way that prohibits them from blowing or falling off. If the load is not properly secured, the unloading fee will be doubled or the load may not be unloaded.

All loads must be weighed before unloading.

All fees owed must be paid at the time of weigh-back unless previous arrange-

ments have been made.

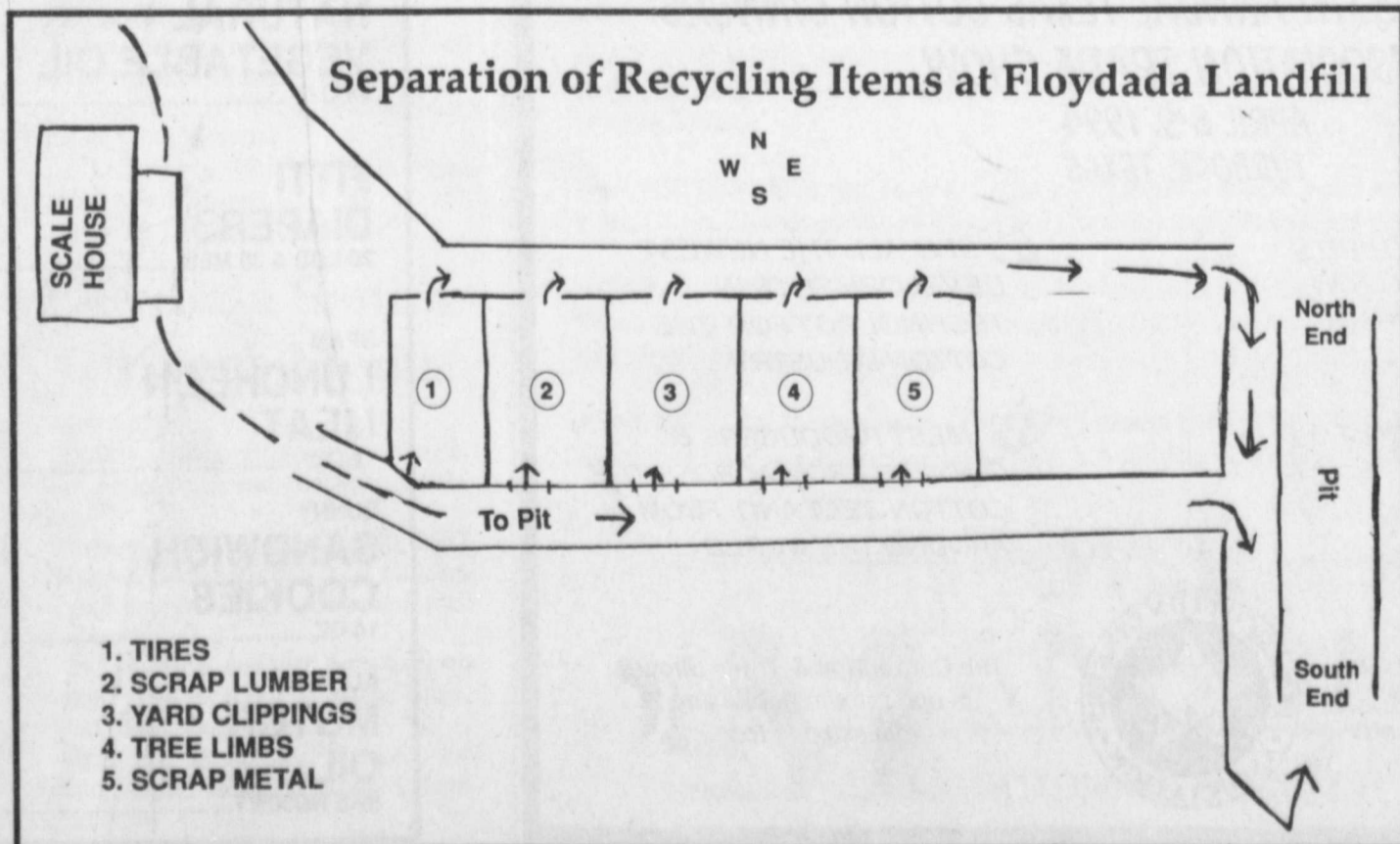
No change will be given back when a customer uses a coupon.

Fee for unloading is \$20/ton; 1 cent/pound with a minimum fee of \$5/load.

Recyclable material is to be unloaded by owner in the designated areas.

Users of the Floydada landfill must comply with the rules of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission. If found in violation of the rules, the T.N.R.C.C. has the authority to close the landfill.

The accompanying map (in this edition) shows where and what the landfill is currently recycling.



BY THE WAY!

Congratulations to us for our awards at the Panhandle Press Association—and congratulations to all the other papers who also brought home awards.

We love to go to this convention in Amarillo. We always learn a lot and eat great. We also love to sit around and talk to other newspaper people from large and small newspapers. It's nice to hear the same problems from all the papers. You realize you're not alone and the complaints are generally the same from readers and writers in every town.

My favorite workshop that I attended was "The Public Relations of Newspapering." It was a roundtable discussion of various problems encountered by editors and writers.

I won't go into everything that was discussed, but just to give you an idea on the seminar I'll show you the letter we received publicizing the event. It made us want to go. I thought it was funny so I'll pass it on and give you a laugh.

It was written by Kevin Bradford of the Clovis News Journal:

Just suppose the following "situation" walked into your office one morning:

A husband and wife, visibly upset that their 19-year-old son's attempted robbery of a local convenience store was duly reported in your newspaper, threaten to get nasty. The husband says

he knows the mayor, the sheriff, a local grocer (and even Ann Richards), and brags that he "can get things done, if you know what I mean." He then starts to mumble uncontrollably—something about being kin to Adolf Hitler and three years of studying full-contact karate.

The wife, not to be outdone, gets her 25 cents worth in: "After all," she said, "if I don't buy this rag you call a newspaper, you're not in business."

How do you handle this most adverse of situations?

A. You get in her face, call both of them and all their relatives idiots, and make them aware of the fact that income from circulation barely can pay for the cost of ink, let alone the rest of the bills.

B. You call the local authorities and have the pair arrested for "tampering with a newspaper professional on deadline"—a misdemeanor that, as you have noted in an editorial, really should be a felony.

C. You calmly explain a newspaper's role in the community, and point out that sometimes doing your job isn't always as pleasant as you'd like it to be.

I picked number B in the above scenario. Someone else that works here asked if we could do all three.

Also included in the advertising flier was the question, "What is the closest you have come to physically assaulting an irrational customer?"

Well—I've never come close to hitting anyone, but there have been times when I thought I was going to be hit. I would just try and nail my feet to the ground, close my eyes and grit my teeth. I think my expression must have scared them off.

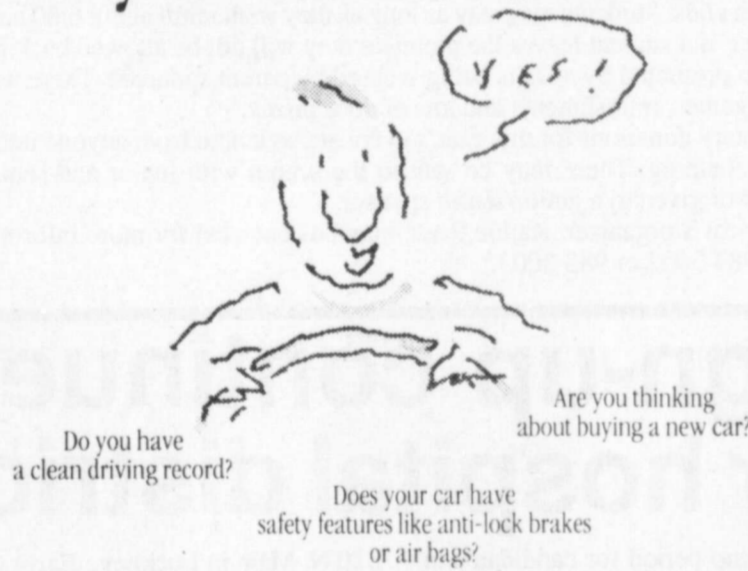
Or maybe it was the fact that I'm a woman. Everyone knows it's not nice to hit a girl.

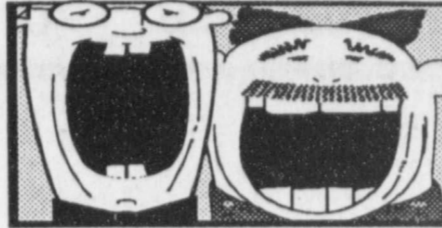

The young journalists will also interview their elected district representatives or designated congressional staff about issues of concern to their community and the nation.

Terrell will have his photograph included in the publication "One Day in Texas", which will be released at the national convention.

He is a member of the Lockney High School Annual staff and the *Informer*

newspaper staff. In 1993 he placed 1st in UIL District Editorial Writing; 6th in UIL Regional Editorial Writing and in 1994 he placed 3rd in UIL District Editorial Writing. Among other honors he has received, he was a winner in the Floyd County Centennial Writing Contest and in the Hester Office Supply Writing Contest.

Students will participate in a number of activities at the National Press Club, including a panel discussion with top journalists, as well as, an interview with Norma Cantu, Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights for the Department of Education, on the topic of multi-cultural education. The young journalists will also conduct their own mock press conferences at various executive agencies, including the Environment Protection Agency and the Department of Education. The conference will culminate in the production of the student-written *Washington Chronicle*, published by the *Washington Times*.

"For five days young journalists from high schools all across the country become part of the Washington press corps — covering stories, interviewing newsmakers and having real hands-on experience in the news industry. They ask the tough questions and get the answers they need to do a good reporting job, said Barbara Harris, Chairman, Youth Journalism Committee, National Press Club. "What makes this program so unique is the active involvement of member journalists of the National Press Club, who give generously of their time to work with the young people."

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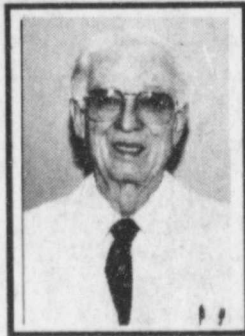

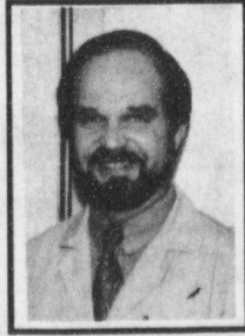

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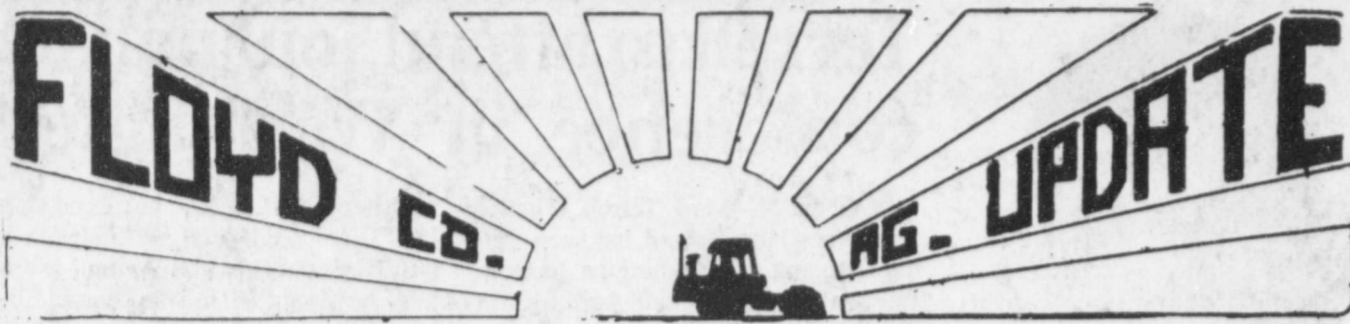

Water measurements show decline in county's ground water levels

--From High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1

Floyd County ground water levels declined an average of 172 feet in 1993 in 98 privately-owned wells in the observation well network maintained by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in its 579,400 acre service area within the county. This represents a decrease of 149,485 acre-feet of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer last year in the portion of Floyd County within the Water District service area.

"Below-average precipitation during 1993 across most of the Water District service area caused irrigators to apply heavier and more frequent irrigations than usual to replenish soil moisture for the 1993 growing season. This significantly contributed to the decline in ground water levels," said Don McReynolds, High Plains Water District Technical Division Director.

Ground water levels within the Water District's Floyd County service area declined 0.56 of a foot during the 10-year period from 1984 to 1994. An average annual decline of 0.84 of a foot was recorded during the five-year period from 1989 to 1994.

Ground water levels in the Ogallala Aquifer within the 6.7 million acre Water District service area had an average decline of 1.46 feet from January 1993 to January 1994. This is a net decrease of about 1,467,300 acre-feet of ground water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the Water District service area.

A zero average annual change in ground water levels was recorded for the first time in the Water District's history in 1985. Depth-to-water measurements revealed an average ground water level rise of 0.50 of a foot in 1986; an average rise of 0.90 of a foot in 1987; an average decline of 0.51 of a foot in 1988; an average decline of one foot in 1989; an average decline of 1.06 feet in 1990; an average decline of 0.73 of a foot in 1991; and an average rise of 0.14 of a foot in 1992.

A network of 1,174 privately-owned observation water wells is used to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the High Plains Water District. The depth-to-water measurements are taken in January and February of each year in order to allow water levels to stabilize from the pumping

during the previous growing season. By comparing the current depth-to-water measurements with those taken the previous year, McReynolds says Technical Division staff members can determine what changes have occurred in the ground water levels.

Of the 15 counties or portions of counties making up the High Plains Water District, only Cochran County recorded an average rise in depth-to-water levels in 1993. The counties with average declines in depth-to-water levels in 1993

Lack of moisture makes cotton yields look dismal on dryland

The dry conditions across the Texas High Plains make yield prospects in dryland cotton fields look dismal. Even, if plant rains occur, subsoil moisture will be minimal, making the crop vulnerable to summer drought as the pre-irrigated fields have moisture only in the surface. Producers are advised to check the soil moisture in all parts of the field as early pre-irrigated fields have lost much of the surface moisture and sprinkler irrigated fields have pushed water only into the top 1 to 1.5 foot level.

As far as indications of pest problems, fleahoppers could be light this year due to the lack of wild hosts to build on. Thrips are still a big question mark, with early indications from population in wheat. Beet army worms could also cause some concern, as they are often worse during drought years.

Herbicide carryover is a potential threat due to the lack of degradation in the dry soils. Command®, atrazine, Zorial®, and late applied 2,4-D could all pose some problems. Management

West Texas woman leads effort to promote U.S. made cotton products

If every American would switch just \$30 from a purchase of imported clothing or home furnishing to a U.S. made version, more than 100,000 U.S. jobs could be saved each year. That is what Sharon King and other wives and daughters of cotton industry members are asking West Texas women to do in a National Cotton Council-supported cam-

aign. They say consumers can make a difference. They want them to exercise their label rights and help preserve American jobs.

Mrs. King, the wife of a Midkiff, Texas, cotton farmer, said imports account for 62 percent of women's apparel, compared with only nine percent in 1967. That trend was a major reason why more than 3 million U.S. manufacturing jobs have vanished.

"Purchasing American-made cotton products helps preserve American agriculture and stems the loss of manufacturing jobs — jobs that create as many secondary jobs as the average retail job and almost three times as many jobs as the personal and business service sector," Mrs. King said.

"Few people recognize that the U.S. fiber, textile and home fashions industry accounts for 10 percent of all manufacturing jobs — over 18 million — and is the largest employer in the non-durable manufacturing sector."

That's why Mrs. King and other West Texas women spend much of their time these days urging consumers to buy cotton clothing and home furnishings made here in the U.S.A. That and getting retailers to stock more of these products are the major goals of "Grown and Made in the USA," a campaign being carried out by the National Cotton's Women Committee in the 17-state Cotton Belt.

Mrs. King, who serves as Southwest regional alternate director of the national volunteer organization, said consumers can exercise their label rights by asking for and purchasing products with the following labels: "Made in the U.S.A.," "Crafted With Pride in the U.S.A." and "Grown and Made in the U.S.A."

"We are encouraging women to factor where the item was made into their purchasing decision," Mrs. King said. "We find that many consumers want to buy U.S.-made clothing but they haven't formed the important habit of checking labels to see where the item was made."

To help Mrs. King and the other NCWC officers in the campaign, the National Cotton Council provides communications training during the officers' annual orientation. In late April, the women will receive training from Rebecca Dunn Shaw, a Seminole native, who is senior vice-president of Spaeth Communications in Dallas.

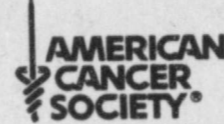

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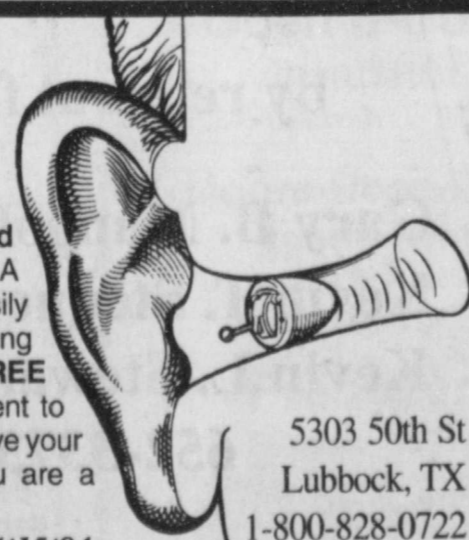

An ordinance amending section 14-21, "Loitering of minors; prohibited", Section 14-22, "Responsibility of parents," and Section 14-23, "Penalties," of Chapter 14, "OFFENSES" of the Floydada City Code, as amended; repealing Section 1, 2, and 3 of Ordinance No. 572; defining terms; creating offenses for minors, parents and guardians of minors, and business establishments violating curfew regulations; providing defenses; providing for enforcement by the police department; providing for waiver by the municipal court of jurisdiction over a minor when required under the Texas Family Code; providing a penalty not to exceed \$500.00; providing a saving clause; a severability clause; and providing an effective date.

WHEREAS, the city council has determined that there has been an increase in juvenile violence, juvenile gang activity, and crime by persons under the age of 17 in the city of Floydada; and

WHEREAS, persons under the age of 17 are particularly susceptible by the lack of maturity and experience to participate in unlawful and gang-related activities and to be victims of older perpetrators of crime; and

WHEREAS, the city of Floydada has an obligation to provide for the protection of minors from each other and from other persons, for the enforcement of parental control over and responsibility for children, for the protection of the general public, and for the reduction of the incidence of juvenile criminal activities; and

WHEREAS, a curfew for those under the age of 17 will be in the interest of the public health, safety, and general welfare and will help to attain the foregoing objectives and to diminish the undesirable impact of such conduct on the citizens of the city of Floydada; Now, Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA:

Section 1; That Section 14-21, "Loitering of minors; prohibited", Section 14-22, "Responsibility of parents," and Section 14-23, "Penalties," of CHAPTER 14, "OFFENSES" of the Floydada City Code, as amended; is amended to read as follows:

"Section 14-21. CURFEW HOURS FOR MINORS

(a) Definitions. In this section:

(1). CURFEW HOURS mean:

(a) 11:00 P.M. on any Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday until 6:00 A.M. of the following day; and

(b) 12:01 A.M. until 6:00 A.M. on any Friday or Saturday.

THIS ORDINANCE MAY BE REVIEWED IN ITS ENTIRETY AT CITY HALL.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall become effective after one public hearing is conducted and it is accordingly so ordained.

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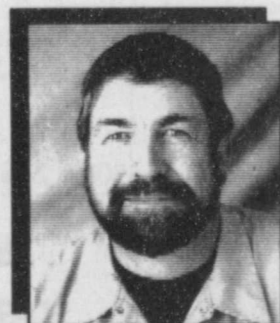
