**RANDY BEEDY**

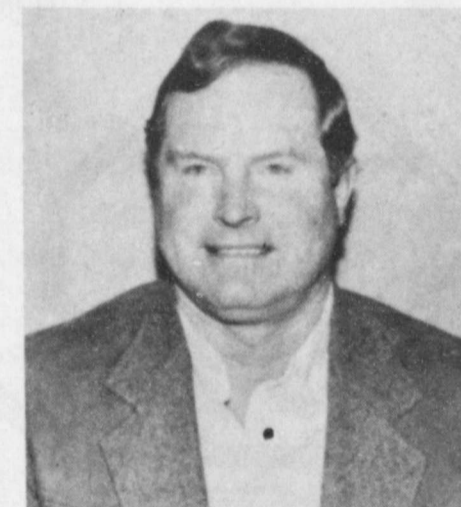
Randy Beedy is seeking the position of FUSD school board trustee of Pct. #1.

FLOYDADA — Members of the Caprock Hospital District took steps to reauthorize their actions during the December 21, 1993 session of the board at a monthly meeting held Tuesday, April 19. Reauthorization was the lead item on the agenda following a call to order, invocation and the approval of the minutes of the March 15, 1994 meeting.

Board President Tom Farris asked attorney Tom Riney to tell the board why this was being done. Riney stated that legal research by his firm had indicated that reauthorization of previous actions which might have been techni-

cally incorrect would make those previous actions correct. He also told the board members that taking the action to reauthorize previous actions was not an admission of any wrongdoing.

Four items from the December 21 agenda, part of the central issue of a lawsuit due to go to jury trial in the 110th District Court on April 25, 1994, were each considered separately by the board.

The agenda item as written, Retaining of legal counsel of Gibson, Ochsner and Adkins and Fullbright and Jaworski, was altered to include designations that Gibson, Ochsner and Adkins are retained to serve as general counsel for the district and to represent them in three lawsuits filed by Dr. Tommy Swate and Derek Walls. Fullbright and Jaworski were designated as legal counsel regarding the bankruptcy of Dr. Tommy Swate and the pending lawsuit also filed by Tommy Swate in Houston. Motion to reauthorize was made by Fred Thayer and seconded by Kenneth Pitts. The vote was unanimously in favor.

Pitts made a motion to reauthorize the approval of Caprock Hospital Board of Directors Bylaws as Revised. Second came from Thayer and the vote was all in favor.

A motion for approval of payment of bills and financial report of the December 21, 1994 meeting was made by Thayer and seconded by Joy Assiter. All voted in favor.

The final item to be reauthorized was stated as, "Decision to abandon efforts to open Caprock Hospital on January 9, 1994, and to direct administrator to make appropriate staff reductions, including discontinuance of all outpatient services." The original motion on December 21 was styled, "Abandon all efforts to open Caprock Hospital and direct the administrator to make appropriate staff reductions and secure all

property belonging to the district."

Motion for reauthorization was made by Kenneth Pitts who voted against the December 21 motion. Joy Assiter provided a second in December and again on Tuesday morning. All members voted in favor of the motion.

Next on the agenda was the ratification of renewal of officers and directors insurance policy. According to Farris, the insurance policy covers liability for board actions. He explained to the board that he was unaware the policy was due to expire until about two days before the expiration date and he took the liberty of negotiating a policy with Coregis Indemnity Company at a cost of \$8,200.00 which became effective on April 1, 1994.

Farris also said that the old company, Calvert Insurance, had already advised him that they would cover a substantial portion of the attorney bills incurred

with the pending lawsuits and that the company would not back out on their obligation regarding all legal action begun prior to the expiration of the policy. He added that the new company had been fully apprised of the situation before they agreed to insure CHD.

Administrator Ronny Ammons told the board that he had been in the process of arranging coverage with the Torch Company for a cost of about \$7,000.00 prior to the expiration of the Calvert Company policy. He also stated that Calvert had eliminated several items usually found in hospital directors and officers liability coverage.

Thayer made a motion to ratify Farris' action in arranging the coverage with Coregis Company and Carmel Eastham seconded the motion. All voted in favor.

## Early voting in municipal elections underway

Early voting for the 1994 spring elections in Floydada and Lockney is now underway. The early voting period for the local elections began on April 18 and will last until May 3. Each entity has scheduled a location for early voting and voters are urged to use the option of early voting if they will be unable to vote in the election on May 7 or if it is more convenient for them.

Voters in each of the elections are

asked to bring their voter registration card and another form of identification showing where they live when they come to vote.

### CITY OF FLOYDADA

The City of Floydada will be holding early voting at City Hall, 114 West Virginia, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday thru Tuesday, May 3.

Voters are asked to enter by the west door, near the police department as the voting will be held in the council meeting room on the west side of City Hall. Election officials will be able to assist anyone who needs to determine what district they should vote in.

All registered voters living in the city are eligible to vote for the at-large candidates. The four will be listed on the ballot in the following order: Joe Ysasaga Jr., Jack Ochoa, Eric Cornelius and Clar Schacht. Voters will choose two of the four.

In addition, registered voters residing in District 1 will select a councilman. Candidates, listed in order of appearance on the ballot will be Albert Hill Sr., Don Green and Adolfo Garcia. Voters in District 4 will be selecting a councilman with incumbent Wayne Tipton is seeking reelection unopposed.

### CITY OF LOCKNEY

Lockney voters will be electing three council members. Only residents of District 1, District 2 and District 3 will be eligible to vote in this election. Residents of the remaining two districts will not be electing a council member until next year under the new single member voting districts.

Early voting will be held at City Hall, 218 East Locust between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday until May 3. City Secretary Charlotte Hooten will be in charge of the early voting and will be glad to assist anyone who is not sure of their voting district.

Candidates as listed on the ballot are: District 1 - Terry Jones and Richard Zavala; District 2 - Gary Marr and Rosie Rendon; and District 3 - J. D. Copeland. Each district will elect one council member.

Jackie Holt is in charge of early voting for Lockney Independent School District. Early voting will be held Monday thru Friday from 8:30 to 12:30 and from 1:30 to 4:30 at 416 West Willow.

## Lockney School Board discusses future projects

Lockney School Board Trustees met for a regular board meeting Thursday, April 14, and discussed future projects for the district.

Superintendent Raymond Lusk reviewed four projects that he considered the most pressing needs for the campus. "I believe the High School and Junior High School are in desperate need of a new library facility," Lusk told the board.

"There are options to consider such as changing the old gym into a library and then using the current library facility for classrooms," said Lusk.

Lusk and Junior High Principal Terry Ellison also told the board that the junior high was in need of a new science lab.

"There are also people who feel we are in need of a new track," said Lusk. "I believe that the board should start setting money aside for different projects and do them one at a time instead of having to jump out and take care of them all at once."

Board members discussed at length the various options for a library and science lab and agreed to look into costs and to prioritize them.

Lusk and Ellison also reviewed the Junior High classroom refurbishing. Rooms needing refurbishing will be done one at a time and two rooms will be completed this summer.

After a discussion with High School Principal James Poole, trustees voted unanimously to approve another contract with BJR for drug dog security service. When asked his opinion on the effectiveness of the dogs, Poole said, "I believe that they are helpful in keeping

strangers away from the schools."

"I think we should keep the dog program because it sends a strong message to our children," said Trustee Dr. Gary Mangold.

Board members approved assisting the Woman's Softball League repair a light pole at the softball field, at a cost of \$225.00.

Other action by the board included:  
\* Ellison reviewed a Chapter I Campus Improvement Plan with the board to meet requirements for the Texas Education Agency.

\* School board members elected Jim Bob Martin as a delegate to the 1994 TASB Delegate Assembly.

\* Trustees discussed salaries and bonuses and set coaches bonuses.

\* All campus principals reported on recent UIL competition. Phil Cotham, elementary school principal, reported that the elementary campus had 56 children competing in UIL and led in most competitions.

Ellison also reported that the Junior High competitors also did very well in competition and Poole stated the High School finished fourth overall.

In regular board activities the minutes of the previous meeting were approved, all bills were approved to be paid and the financial statement was reviewed.

Present at the meeting were: Superintendent Raymond Lusk, Trustees Jim Bob Martin, Paul Glasson, Mike Mathis, Gary Mangold, Dan Smith, Eddie Teeter and Dickie Lambert; Principals James Poole, Terry Ellison and Phil Cotham.

## Board reauthorizes actions

Board members also voted to ratify the actions of their legal representatives in requesting an attorney general opinion concerning whether legal bills pertaining to litigation are excepted from disclosure. A motion by Thayer with a second by Pitts was approved by unanimous vote.

The board then went into executive session to confer with their attorney concerning pending litigation and other matters in which the duty of the attorney to CHD under the Texas Disciplinary Rules of Professional Conduct conflicts with the Open Meetings Act and to discuss the appointment, duties, evaluation, reassignment, discipline, or dismissal of the administrator of CHD.

Following the executive session, Farris announced that there would be no board action on the first item, and that he would entertain a motion to authorize the CHD counsel to continue to negotiate with Ronny Ammons' counsel on all matters regarding the administrator. Motion was made by Thayer, seconded by Pitts and approved by unanimous vote.

Board members next reviewed the financial report which placed CHD account balances at \$640,000.00 and approved payment of monthly bills to

tating \$34,000.00 on a motion by Thayer, seconded by Eastham.

Payment of indigent health care billing was briefly discussed with Ammons telling the board that they may be liable for payment of approximately \$51,286.83 in health care costs on three applications dating back to March of 1993. When board members asked why they had not been made aware of these pending applications earlier, Ammons told them that the applications had not been worked in a timely manner because the staff member responsible for assessing and coding them had been dismissed along with other hospital personnel in December.

Getting professional help in dealing with these applications was suggested since assessing and coding the applications requires specific knowledge. The item was tabled for further review on a motion by Thayer, seconded by Pitts.

The administrators update was short, with Ammons stating only that there had been an inquiry from some Lubbock physicians who were interested in coming here to practice. He told the board that he had asked them to make the inquiry in writing and had not received anything at this time. He also told the board that he had not heard anything from Dr. Sanders, another potential physician.

Attending the early morning session were board members Tom Farris, Joy Assiter, Kenneth Pitts, Fred Thayer and Carmel Eastham. Others present included administrator Ronny Ammons, attorney Tom Riney, Bob Ericson, Ralph Jackson, Karen Lawson, Joe Stepp and the Hesperian-Beacon reporter.

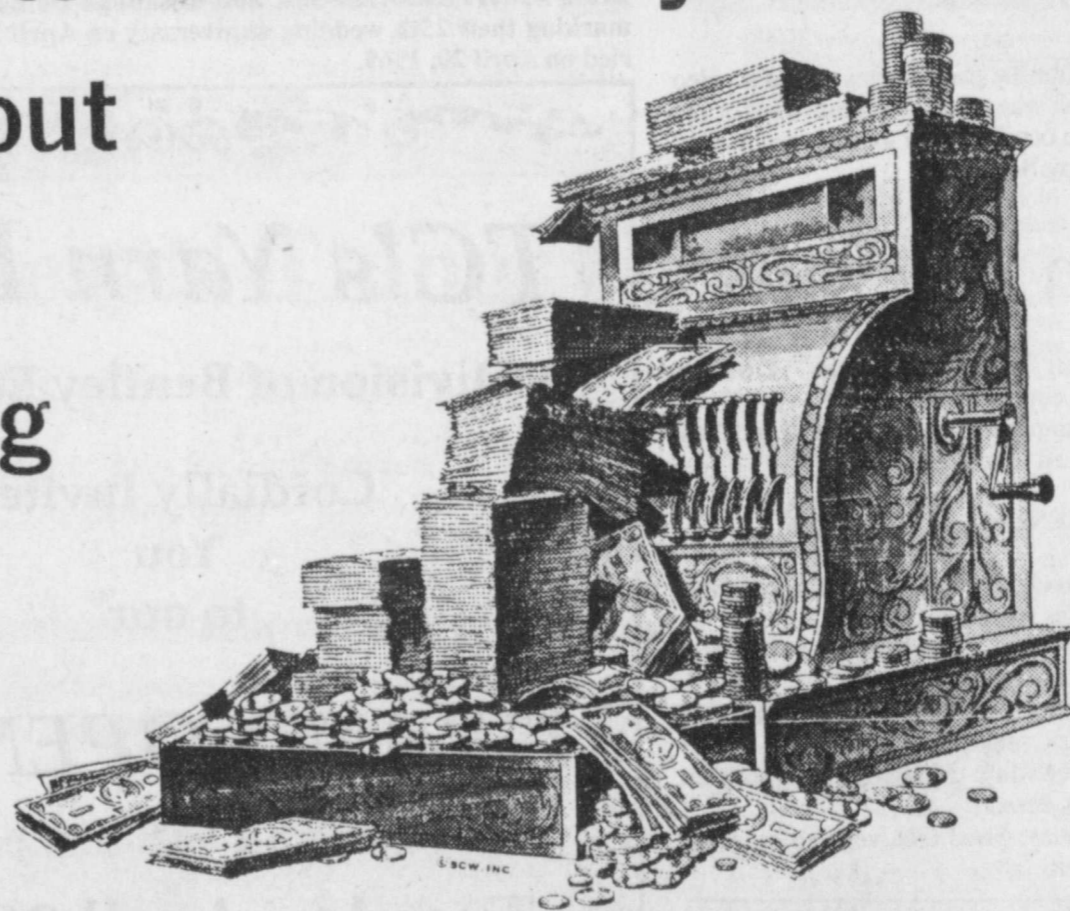

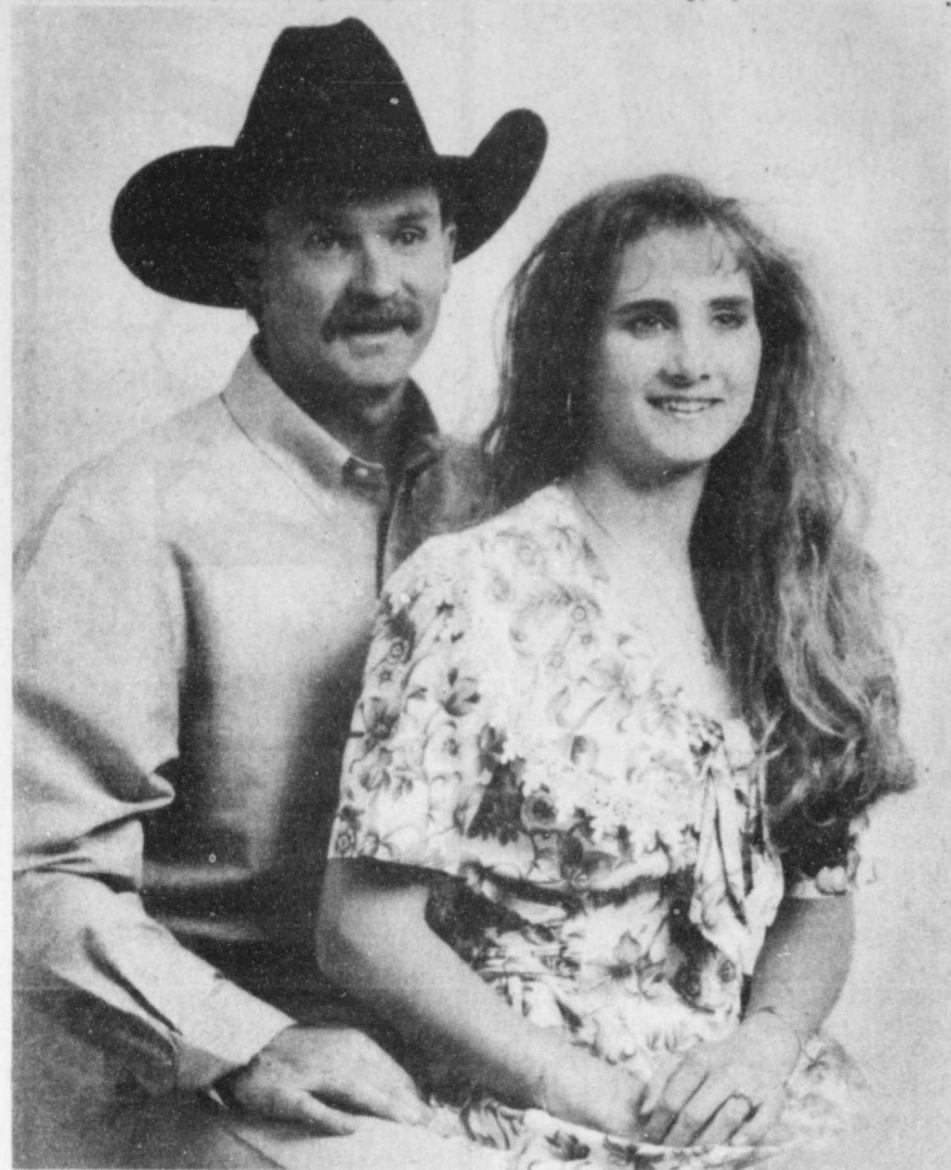

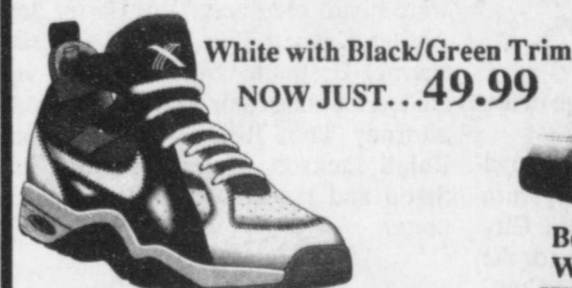

## Extension service holds planning meeting

Approximately 40 Floyd County community leaders took part in a long range planning session to help identify and prioritize the needs of the county and to develop a report on those needs.

The report will be included in the Texas Agricultural Extension Service 1995-1999 Long Range Extension Program.

The meeting was held on Thursday, April 14 at the Massie Activity Center. Those present were welcomed by County Agent Kerry Siders and Home Economist Melissa Long.

Presentations of conditions in Floyd County were made by Mina Pesina, Jon LaBaume, Hulon Carthel, and Ellen Enriquez.

"Health, Safety and Well Being" was the presentation made by Mina Pesina. She stated that Floydada needed doctors and that the clinic and hospital needed to be opened. She is concerned about the number of teenage pregnancies and teenage violence.

Jon LaBaume spoke on the "Stewardship of the Environment and Natural Resources." He told those present that a lot has been said about the environment in the last ten years and that we need to prove that agriculture is not a major part of the cause.

He reported that there are 450,000 acres of farm land in the county. One half of those acres are irrigated and the other one half is dryland. There are 110,000 acres of rangeland, and 51,000 acres of playa lakes. He reported that the 1700 playa lakes in the county have been designated as wetlands and that are 105 highly erodible land plans (CRP) are ahead of schedule.

Hulon Carthel's topic was "Eco-

nomically Competitiveness, Visibility and Stability." He commented that the stability of Floyd County is in those 450,000 acres.

He then discussed Value Added Products and the fact that Floyd County citizens could sell so many of the things that are taken for granted.

He continued that a community that doesn't have a 3, 4 or 5 percent increase yearly in the tax base is going downhill. "We need capital coming in to counteract the capital that is flowing out everyday," he said.

"Floyd County has sent 1.4 million dollars to Austin in the form of lottery tickets that have been bought since the beginning of the lottery. That is \$61,000 a month that is leaving our county," he stated.

He continued, "We need to all band together. We have a lot going for us, but anything that doesn't grow goes downhill."

Ellen Enriquez spoke on "Development of Life Skills and Leadership Qualities."

She told the group that peer pressure is the number one problem with teens and that it can get them into drugs and gang violence.

"We have a large population now who do not read English or Spanish well. We are living in a world where it takes two parents to make a living. We need more educational resources available. We need for organizations to try to foster and reinforce our youth. We need to tap into any resources that are available to help our youth," she stated.

Those present were organized into four groups to discuss and prioritize the issues. When they had completed their charts a spokesperson for each group reported the results.

JoLynn Dean reported that the main "Health, Safety and Well Being" issues were: 1. Concern for the youth, 2. Health care facilities, 3. Continuation of Meals on Wheels, 4. Concern for the senior citizens and their center, 5. Support of the EMS, 6. Farm safety, and the well being of employees.

Debbie Shatley gave the priority list for the "Stewardship of the Environment and Natural Resources". 1. Water - to preserve and protect, 2. Soil - Conservation issues, 3. Air - pro-active

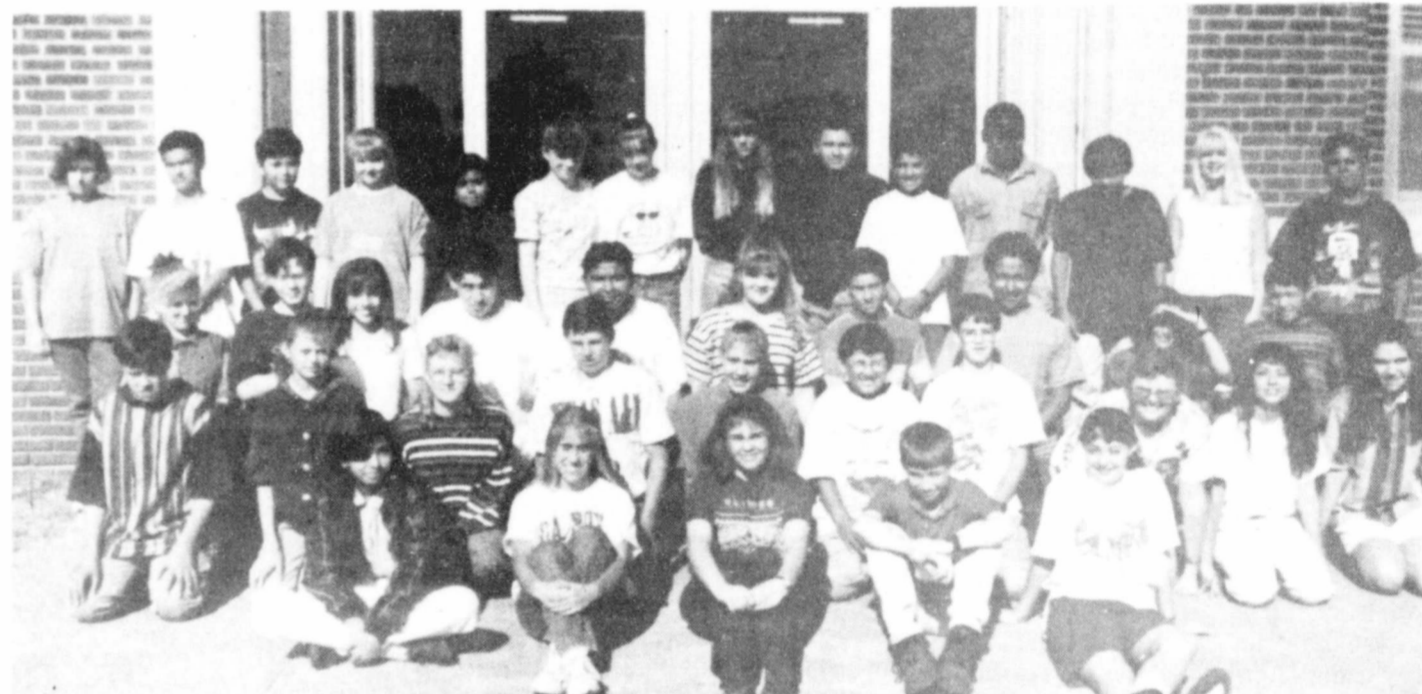

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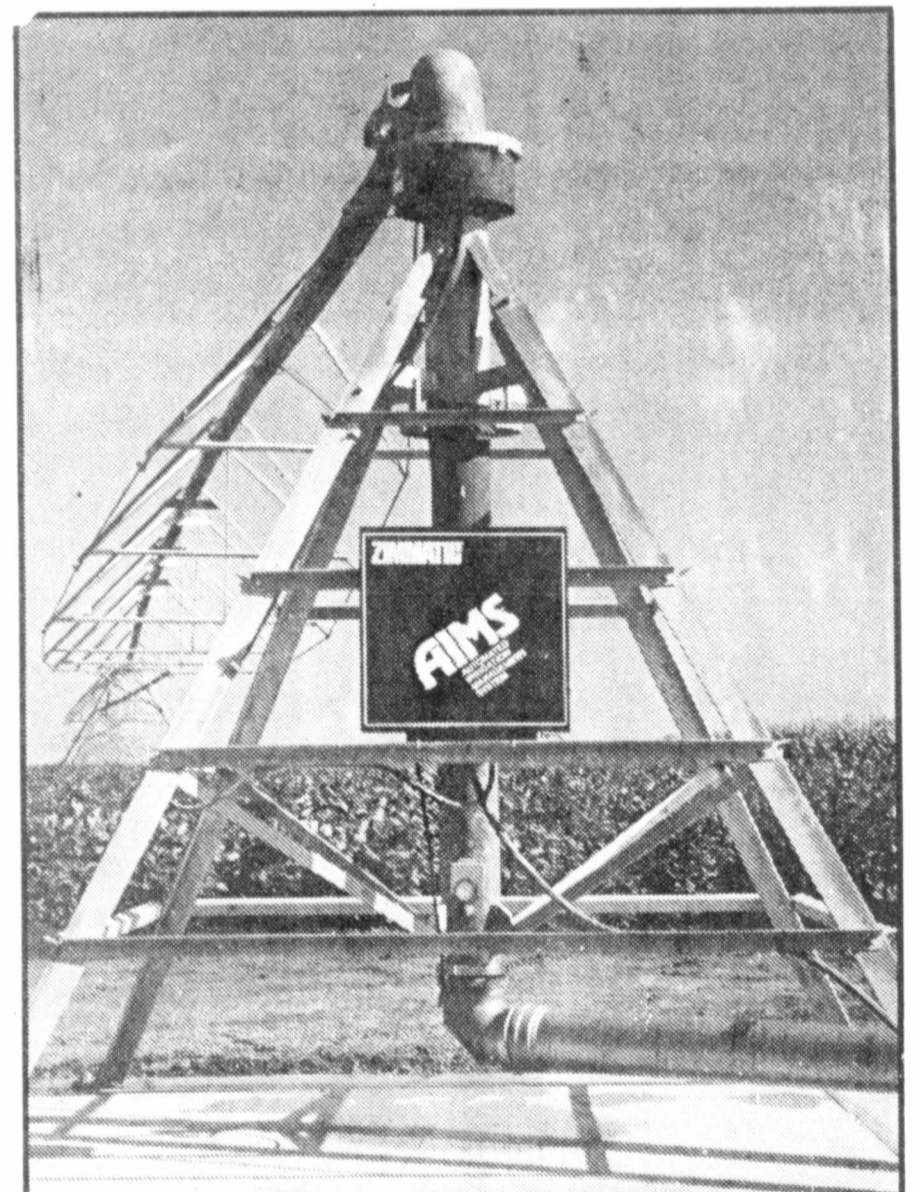
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**Martin places first in state**

**Bob Bullock sees way to shake Texas schools of federal control**

In a recent press release, Lt. Governor Bob Bullock said Texas might have a rare chance to free its public schools from burdensome federal regulations if the state moves quickly and boldly to take advantage of a new federal education law.

"The timing could not be better. Texas is in a unique position to take the weight of federal mandates off the backs of teachers, students and taxpayers," Bullock said in a letter urging the Texas Education Agency to apply to be one of six states chosen as pilot projects in the new federal law.

Under the new law—Goals 2000: Educate America Act—the federal Secretary

of Education will select six states to be freed of most mandates on federal education grants in return for flexible state programs designed to improve the quality of education.

Bullock urged Texas to compete for the pilot project in a letter to Texas education Commissioner Lionel "Skip" Meno.

"Texas is in the unparalleled position of re-writing all of our education laws, reviewing the state's central education agency and looking at new and innovative ways to run our schools," Bullock wrote. "Our search for excellence through flexibility and innovation goes hand-in-glove with the spirit of the new federal act."

**TDCJ opening boot camp in Childress**

It's official--Texas Department of Criminal Justice will open a 500-bed boot camp in Childress in the South Lancer warehouse building, adjacent to the T.L. Roach, Jr. Unit, by the end of May.

"It will bring an additional 112 correctional officer positions plus 53 jobs for the expansion of the Roach Unit, and a multi-million dollar annual payroll to this community," said Mayor Pat Steed.

The Childress boot camp will be operated in conjunction with the T.L. Roach, Jr. Unit; Warden Robert Treon will be in charge. Some facilities will be shared.

The Lancer warehouse building will be modified to accommodate the boot camp. Details of the modification will be released later.

Robert Hibbard, assistant regional director, Northern Region, said plans call for accepting boot camp inmates by June 1.

Childress Economic Development Corporation, Larry Norton, executive director, Childress City Council, City Manager David Galligan and many others worked diligently to make the expansion reality.

The T.L. Roach, Jr. Unit, a 1,000 bed minimum security unit, is built on several thousand acres offering plenty of space for even more expansion.

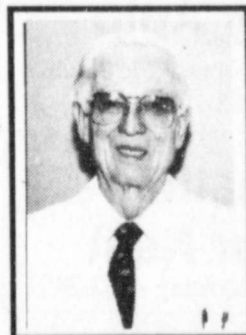

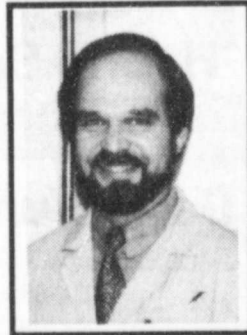

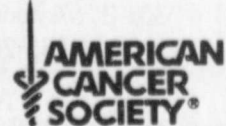

## Now is time to wage war on pine tip moth

The pine tip moth can be serious pest of young pine trees planted by homeowners on the South Plains. And right now is one of the few times homeowners can effectively fight back, says Kerry Siders, County Extension agent for agriculture.

The larvae of this moth bore in to the growing tips of pine trees, causing them to turn brown. Severely infested trees develop a bushy appearance over time. The tip moth passes the winter as a pupa within the injured terminals and twigs of the tree. Moths emerge in March and April and begin the first of several generations which will occur during the summer.

Female moths lay eggs on the needles and stems. After hatching, the young larvae bore into the tip and begin feeding. After several weeks of feeding and constructing a tunnel in the tip of the stem, the larvae pupate. The adult moths then emerge from the pupal cases, and a new cycle or generation begins.

Properly timed application of an insecticide is the best way to reduce pine tip moth populations and damage, the Extension agent said. "Since this pest spends most of its life cycle protected inside the pine tip, foliar sprays are most effective when the young larvae are just hatching from the egg," he said.

To properly time these applications pheromone traps are used to detect the presence of adult moths and determine when eggs are being laid by the first cycle of moths. Traps being monitored of the South Plains this spring indicate that now is the time to spray trees for this pest.

Foliar-applied insecticides recommended for homeowners include Orthene Dursban and dimethoate. Adding a small amount of liquid soap of surfactant to the spray solution will improve control because it helps the insecticide adhere to the treated trees, the Extension Service agent said.

delays maturity, causes reduction in yield, and may even cause total stand loss, resulting in replanting.

The three components necessary for disease development include: host, pathogen, and conducive environmental condition. The seedling disease complex affecting High Plains cotton is made up of various soil-borne fungi. The major pathogens in the High Plains include *Rhizoctonia solani*, *Fusarium*, *Pythium*, and sometimes *Thielaviopsis basicola*. Cool, wet weather is conducive for infection of seedling cotton and for development of these disease pathogens.

Seedling diseases often occur in combinations, thus the term "seedling disease complex". Seedling infection occurs either pre-emergent or after seedlings emerge from the soil. Damaged seedlings may show stunting, slow growth, and chlorosis. Plants pulled from the soil often have rotted roots and sunken dark lesions on the hypocotyl (the area between roots and stems). The greatest loss from seedling disease may not necessarily be from a thinner stand, but from poor vigor or surviving seed-

lings. Seedling diseases are most severe when poor quality seed are planted.

Control is best achieved by utilizing both cultural and chemical practices. Planting should be delayed until the 10-day average of the minimum soil temperature at the 8-inch soil depth is 60 degrees F or greater and the 5-day weather forecast is favorable for planting. Use high quality seed preferably acid delinted.

Plant the most vigorous seed first, as indicated by the cool-warm vigor germination index. Plant on raised, well-prepared seed beds and at a minimum depth. Practice crop rotation to the extent possible. Treat seed with at least one recommended seed-protectant fungicide.

Fungicide treatments are available as seed treatments, in furrow treatments, and hoopbox treatments. In-furrow treatments are generally more effective than seed treatments, but are much more expensive to use. Various combination of seed treatments can also be a very effective means of control since different seed treatments are specific for different pathogens.

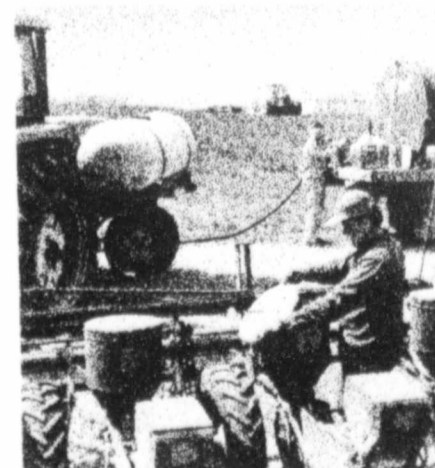

## WPS law delayed until 1995

--From Kerry Siders, CEA-Ag. Most Worker Protection Standards (WPS) were due to take effect on April 15, 1994. However, this April, legislation was enacted which delays implementation of some but not all of the WPS until January 1, 1995.

The new law provides more time for the agricultural community to learn about the WPS and to prepare for imple-

mentation. Most of the WPS requirements appear on the labels of the pesticides used on the agricultural establishments where your employees work. There are two types of WPS provisions that appear on the label: those that are fully spelled out, and those that are referred to but not thoroughly described on the label.

During 1994, you must comply with

the WPS requirements that are spelled out on the label. These include the label requirements for personal protective equipment (PPE), the restricted-entry interval (REI), and the requirement for "double notification", if this requirement is on the label.

You do not need to comply with the "referenced" requirements until January 1, 1995. These requirements include pesticide safety training for agricultural workers and handlers, decontamination sites, notification of workers about pesticide applications, display of information about pesticide applications, emergency assistance, and display of a safety poster.

The legislation also provides optional PPE requirements for some irrigation work in 1994 and excludes crop advisors from WPS coverage until January 1, 1995.
