Those present were welcomed by County Agent Kerry Siders and Home Economist Melissa Long. <br> Presentations of conditions in Floyd County were made by Mina Pesina, Jon LaBaume, Hulon Carthel, and Ellen Enriquez. <br> "Health, Safety and Well Being" was the presentation made by Mina Pesina. She stated that Floydada needed doctors and that the clinic and hospital needed to be opened. She is concerned about the number of teenage pregnancies and teenage violence. <br> Jon LaBaume spoke on the "Stewardship of the Environment and Natural Resources." He told those present that a lot has been said about the environment in the last ten years and that we need to prove that agriculture is not a major part of the cause. <br> He reported that there are 450,000 acres of farm land in the county. One half of those acres are irrigated and the other one half is dryland. There are 110,000 acres of ranchland, and 51,000 acres of playa lakes. He reported that the 1700 playa lakes in the county have been designated as wetlands and that are 105 highly erodable land plans (CRP) are ahead of schedule. |
