ous actions correct. He also told the board members that taking the action to reauthorize previous actions was not an admission of any wrongdoing.

Four items from the December 21 agenda, part of the central issue of a lawsuit due to go to jury trial in the 110th District Court on April 25, 1994, were each considered separately by the board.

The agenda item as written, Retaining of legal counsel of Gibson, Ochsner and Adkins and Fullbright and Jaworski, was altered to include designations that Gibson, Ochsner and Adkins are retained to serve as general counsel for the district and to represent them in three lawsuits filed by Dr. Tommy Swate and Derek Walls. Fullbright and Jaworski were designated as legal counsel regarding the bankruptcy of Dr. Tommy Swate and the pending lawsuit also filed by Tommy Swate in Houston. Motion to reauthorize was made by Fred Thayer and seconded by Kenneth Pitts. The vote was unanimously in favor.

Pitts made a motion to reauthorize the approval of Caprock Hospital Board of Directors Bylaws as Revised. Second came from Thayer and the vote was all in favor.

A motion for approval of payment of bills and financial report of the December 21, 1994 meeting was made by Thayer and seconded by Joy Assiter. All voted in favor.

The final item to be reauthorized was stated as, "Decision to abandon efforts to open Caprock Hospital on January 9, 1994, and to direct administrator to make appropriate staff reductions, including discontinuance of all outpatient services." The original motion on December 21 was styled, "Abandon all efforts to open Caprock Hospital and direct the administrator to make appropriate staff reductions and secure all

property belonging to the district."

Motion for reauthorization was made by Kenneth Pitts who voted against the December 21 motion. Joy Assiter provided a second in December and again on Tuesday morning. All members voted in favor of the motion.

Next on the agenda was the ratification of renewal of officers and directors insurance policy. According to Farris, the insurance policy covers liability for board actions. He explained to the board that he was unaware the policy was due to expire until about two days before the expiration date and he took the liberty of negotiating a policy with Coregis Indemnity Company at a cost of \$8,200.00 which became effective on April 1,

Farris also said that the old company, Calvert Insurance, had already advised him that they would cover a substantial portion of the attorney bills incurred

with the pending lawsuits and that the company would not back out on their obligation regarding all legal action begun prior to the expiration of the policy. He added that the new company had been fully apprised of the situation before they agreed to insure CHD.

Administrator Ronny Ammons told the board that he had been in the process of arranging coverage with the Torch Company for a cost of about \$7,000.00 prior to the expiration of the Calvert Company policy. He also stated that Calvert had eliminated several items usually found in hospital directors and officers liability coverage.

Thayer made a motion to ratify Farris' action in arranging the coverage with Coregis Company and Carmel Eastham seconded the motion. All voted in favor.


#### **Lockney Scouts** plan fundraising cake auction



# Lockney School Board discusses future projects

Lockney School Board Trustees met strangers away from the schools." for a regular board meeting Thursday, April 14, and discussed future projects for the district.

Superintendent Raymond Lusk reviewed four projects that he considered the most pressing needs for the campus. "I believe the High School and Junior High School are in desperate need of a new library facility," Lusk told the

The meeting was held on Thursday, April 14 at the Massie Activity Center. Those present were welcomed by County Agent Kerry Siders and Home Economist Melissa Long.

Presentations of conditions in Floyd County were made by Mina Pesina, Jon LaBaume, Hulon Carthel, and Ellen Enriquez.

"Health, Safety and Well Being" was the presentation made by Mina Pesina. She stated that Floydada needed doctors and that the clinic and hospital needed to be opened. She is concerned about the number of teenage pregnancies and teenage violence.

Jon LaBaume spoke on the "Stewardship of the Environment and Natural Resources." He told those present that a lot has been said about the environment in the last ten years and that we need to prove that agriculture is not a major part of the cause.

He reported that there are 450,000 acres of farm land in the county. One half of those acres are irrigated and the other one half is dryland. There are 110,000 acres of ranchland, and 51,000 acres of playa lakes. He reported that the 1700 playa lakes in the county have been designated as wetlands and that are 105 highly erodable land plans (CRP) are ahead of schedule.

nomic Competitiveness, Visibility and Stability." He commented that the stability of Floyd County is in those 450,000 acres.

He then discussed Value Added Products and the fact that Floyd County citizens could sell so many of the things that are taken for granted.

### Now is time to wage war on pine tip moth

By Kerry Siders, C.E.A, Ag

The pint tip moth can be serious pest gens. of young pine trees planted by homeowners on the South Plains. And right now is one of the few times homeowners can effectively fight back, says Kerry Siders, County Extension agent for agriculture.

The larvae of this moth bore in to the growing tips of pine trees, causing them to turn brown. Severely infested trees develop a bushy appearance over time.

The tip moth passes the winter as a pupa within the injured terminals and twigs of the tree. Moths emerge in March and April and begin the first of several generations which will occur during the summer.

Female moths lay eggs on the needles and stems. After hatching, the young larvae bore into the tip and begin feeding. After several weeks of feeding and constructing a tunnel in the tip of the stem, the larvae pupate. The adult moths then emerge from the pupal cases, and a

new cycle or generation begins. Properly timed application of an insecticide is the best way to reduce pine tip moth populations and damage, the Extension agent said. "Since this pest spends most of its life cycle protected inside the pine tip, foliar sprays are most effective when the young larvae are just hatching from the egg," he said.

To properly time these applications pheromone traps are used to detect the presence of adult moths and determine when eggs are being laid by the first cycle of moths. Traps being monitored of the South Plains this spring indicate that now is the time to spray trees for

Foliar-applied insecticides recommended for homeowners include Orthene Dursban and dimethoate. Adding a small amount of liquid soap of surfactant to the spray solution will improve control because it helps the insecticide adhere to the treated trees, the Extension Service agent said.

# WPS law delayed until 1995

Most Worker Protection Standards (WPS) were due to take effect on April 15, 1994. However, this April, legislation was enacted which delays implementation of some but not all of the WPS until January 1, 1995.

The new law provides more time for the agricultural community to learn about the WPS and to prepare for imple-

ments appear on the labels of the pesticides used on the agricultural establishments where your employees work. There are two types of WPS provisions that appear on the label: those that are fully spelled out, and those that are referred to but not thoroughly described on the label.



mentation. Most of the WPS require- the WPS requirements that are spelled out on the label. These include the label requirements for personal protective equipment (PPE), the restricted-entry interval (REI), and the requirement for "double notification", if this requirement is on the label. You do not need to comply with the

"referenced" requirements until January 1, 1995. These requirements include pesticide safety training for agricultural workers and handlers, decontamination sites, notification of workers about pesticide applications, display of information about pesticide applications, emergency assistance, and display of a safety poster.

The legislation also provides optional PPE requirements for some irrigation work in 1994 and excludes crop advisors from WPS coverage until January
