A view from The Lamplighter

So now Richard Nixon, our 37th President, is dead. He won many battles, great and small.

He lost many battles, great and small. The last, his greatest, he lost, as we all must finally do.

He was, any way we look at him, a most remarkable man. Full of paradoxes, full of contradictions. A man whose consuming desire for a unique place in history destroyed his Presidency, but finally raised him up from among the living dead to become among our most influential living ex-Presidents.

During his active political life Nixon was never what we would call a muchloved figure. Certainly not on the order of a Dwight Eisenhower or a Ronald Reagan. He was, in many respects, a "loner", uncomfortable in the drawing rooms of Georgetown, uncomfortable among this nation's political elite, as they were uncomfortable with him. But few, very few, had his understanding of the political landscape around the world. Few had his understanding of how that world political landscape impacted the political landscape in our own country, or how the political landscape here impacted upon the politics of the world.

It was that understanding, and his skill in maneuvering in that landscape for the benefit of America, that caused him to be such a hated figure among America's political Left, including this country's dominate liberal media establishment. His early political campaigns, in which he went toe to toe with darlings of America's Left, set the tone for a lifetime of opposition by the liberal media. His later exposure of Alger Hiss, the revelations in Whittiker Chambers' famous "pumpkin papers," merely solidified that hatred among the Left.

I would have to say that Mr. Nixon and I were not complete political soul mates. We knew each other. I shared his distaste for Communism, and was worried about the threat that ideology, backed up by the Soviet Union's massive Red Army armed with nuclear missiles, posed to America. I did not share all his domestic initiatives, where he was much more "moderate", even liberal, than I.

We once shared a speakers platform before the Texas Press Association, during the fifties in Galveston, when he was Vice President. We subsequently visited briefly and on occasions. Once during the sixties, I ran into him in Manilla, in the Philippines, when he was a private citizen on his way to India, and I was attending a reunion of Bataan and Corregidor veterans. It was at the old

Manilla Hotel, overlooking Manilla Bay. He had heard a reunion of the veterans was in progress, and came down that evening to shake hands and voice his appreciation for what we had done. I was surprised, even startled, that he recognized me in that unfamiliar setting and remembered. We had a good visit about Texas politics and various Texas politicians of whom he inquired. I asked if he was going to make another run at the Presidency. He wasn't sure, it was too

Caprock Hospital District Meet Your Candidates and Walls settle out of court

An out of court settlement was reached April 21, between Caprock Hospital District and Derek Walls, in which Caprock Hospital agreed to pay \$4,500 to Walls.

Both parties agreed this settlement would release all claims against Caprock and would include attorney's fees and court costs paid by Walls. Court costs are estimated at approximately

Carter, Attorney at Law representing Walls, agreed to a settlement, in principal, moments before the jury was to be selected for the trial.

Prospective jurors were dismissed and an emergency meeting of the Hospital District was posted at the courthouse in order for the Board of Directors to consider the proposal worked out between Riney and Carter.

The board convened at 1:40 p.m. and entered into an Executive Session. At

senting Caprock Hospital, and Eric 2:10 p.m. the board came out of executive meeting and Director Fred Thayer moved to accept the settlement offer and Kenneth Pitts seconded.

Before entering into executive session, Carter addressed the board and stated, "I want it to be clear that this money is being paid to Walls as a standard by which to measure his loss of wages. I do not represent any other employee and have no intention to rep-

Lockney passes curfew

In a special called meeting, April 26, Lockney Councilmen passed a curfew to curtail juvenile loitering and crime within the city limits.

Police Chief Lennie Gilroy appeared before the council and showed the councilmen pictures of recent graffiti damage to private property. "We are having more of a problem from out-of-town youth than we are with the kids in our own town," said Gilroy. "There is a curfew now in Plainview and Floydada and the kids are coming here to hang out. A curfew would help us control this

Gilroy presented the councilmen with an ordinance used in Floydada. The

TDH investigates health cases at Floydada school

Texas Department of Health officials have been in Floydada investigating concerns of parents and FISD faculty over what appeared to be a large amount of dysentery cases in Duncan Elementary students.

The investigation is continuing, but according to Robert M Badger, R.S., Chief Sanitarian of Public Health Region 2, "There is an inordinate number of diarrheal illnesses among the children, however we do not believe the bacteria is coming from the food they eat at the school. There would have been more reported cases all at the same time instead of spread out over a period of

"The pattern of the outbreaks does not lead itself to the theory of a single source exposure. It appears it started with one person who may not even know they are a carrier. It is then passed on from one person to another. The bacteria is almost always carried from fetal to oral-by not washing your hands after using the

According to Badger the organism that causes the diarrhea is Shigella. Symptoms of Shigella are elevated Continued On Page 2

FLOYDADA — Candidates for Caprock Hospital District are profiled this week. Four Candidates are vying for two board positions. They are listed in alphabetical order.

ROB HEFLIN

Seeking a seat on the board of Caprock Hospital District for the first time is Rob Heflin. Originally from Plainview, he is 57 years old and is a farmer. He is a graduate of Plainview High School.

Heflin has lived in the Floydada area for 29 years. He and his wife Linda have three children and six grandchildren. He has served six years on the Producer's Cooperative Elevator Board and a year on the Chamber of Commerce.

"I will base all of my decisions on what is best for the people of the community if I am elected," said Heflin.



KENNETH PITTS

The only incumbent seeking election to a board post is Kenneth Pitts. He has been a member of the board since his election in 1989. He currently serves as the secretary of the board.

Pitts has lived in Floydada for 23 years, coming here from Matador. He graduated from Texas Tech University and is a self-employed farmer. He served on the Farm Bureau Board where he was a past president and has been active in the Whirlwind Booster Club and the local FFA Chapter. Pitts is a member of the First United Methodist

"I feel that as a taxpayer, I would like to see quality affordable health care in Floydada," said Pitts when asked why he is running for reelection to the CHD board. "I think my past experience on the board would be an aid in going from this point forward in establishing that type of health care and in dealing with a changing medical field."



JOSEPH STEPP

Joseph Stepp, 50, is seeking election to the hospital board for the first time. He has been a resident of the area for ten years, four in Floydada and the last six in the Dougherty Community. He was born in Indiana and graduated from Irvin High School in El Paso, Texas.

Stepp owns and operates Joe's Mowers and More in Floydada. He is a certified, bonded Locksmith. He also sells and services lawn mowers and small engines. He and his wife, Juanita, have two daughters and two grandsons.

Asked why he is running for hospital

board, Stepp said, "I have been attending the meetings for some time now and I think the taxpayers of the district deserve more for their money than two empty buildings and a stack of legal bills. In my view, medical care in this community is very important and needed."



J.R. TURNER

J.R. Turner, 65, a first time candidate for hospital board, is a farmer and has been a resident of Floyd County for the past 45 years and lived in Floydada since

He and his wife Wanda are the parents of three daughters. The couple has five grandchildren. The Turners attend First Baptist Church where he serves as a Deacon.

Turner is a past president of the Floyd County Farm Bureau Organization. He was also a member of the board of directors for Producers Cooperative Elevator and served on the Floyd County Tax Equalization Board.

In stating his reason for running for a place on the CHD board, Turner said, "The situation out there seems to be stagnant. I want people to know I will try to do my best to do what I think is right for the community if I am elected."



JESUS "JESSIE" GARZA

LOCKNEY-Jesus Garza, known as Jessie, is seeking a term on the Lock-

ney School Board, District #1. This will be the second time Garza will vye for a position on the board. Garza ran approximately 10 years ago At-Large and was defeated by one vote.

Garza was born in Pearsall, Texas, and raised in a small community known as Frio Town between Pearsall and Uvalde. He has lived in Lockney for 36 years. He and his wife, Irene, have been married for 43 years and have five children; Linda Gonzales of Nocona, Yolanda Continued On Page 13

temperatures, cramps and diarrhea. "Shigella is serious," said Badger. "A child can dehydrate very quickly. It is very important for a parent to get the child to a physician and be treated with an antibiotic.

"Shigella can be stopped if people practice good hygiene. In my opinion this is not a problem at the school but a rather a problem in the community. If a child gets exposed at school and then practices poor hygiene at home it will be passed on.

"We are following the chain of the sickness to make sure that no one exposed to Shigella is preparing food for

Some parents have also expressed a fear of possible contaminated water in Floydada. According to City Manager Gary Brown, "The City of Floydada had its public water supply tested and results show no irregular bacteriological qualities with no coliform organisms present. In other words—our water supply is fine and is safe to drink."

According to Badger the first reported case of Shigella occurred in Duncan the first week in April. At this time there are only 3 confirmed cases, however some people may have been treated by a physician who did not send the lab work to the Department of Health for confirma-

TDH is now working with area physicians to track reported diarrhea cases.

Parents of Duncan children were recently notified by letter of the steps being taken at the school to stop the spread of Shigella. Parents are encouraged to reinforce concepts already being taught at Duncan Elementary.

Children should be instructed not to put things such as pencils, crayons, blocks and fingers in their mouths. Youngsters should be told not to eat after each other and to wash and dry their hands after using the bathroom and before eating or handling food.

Duncan restrooms are being monitored to make sure toilet paper is available at all times and handwashing is also monitored by a teacher or a teacher's

Classrooms manipulatives (blocks, small items) are soaked in bleach water each afternoon at the end of the day. The

paign for the Presidency he sent an emissary, Senator Bellmon of Oklahoma, to request that I come into the operation as campaign spokesman. We met in the old Smith Hotel on Pennsylvania Avenue, about a block from the White House. I declined, having just been given some unwelcome news by the doctors. I did not feel I was up to the

But subsequently I agreed to run his campaign in Texas during the 1968 Presidential election, and, after he had won the Presidency, ended up in his Administration as Deputy Director of USIA (the United States Information Agency), doing ideological battle with the world-wide Communist apparatus during that most difficult period of the Cold War. In that capacity I was able to experience, first hand, his remarkable grasp of foreign affairs, his decision making process, and his proclivity for hanging tough in the face of adversity. From that, the nation benefitted.

I was also able to watch, as was the nation, his strange, inept, unexplainable handling of the Watergate affair, where he crossed the line in his attempts to hide illegal acts of subordinates who should have been fired forthwith. From that, and for that, the nation suffered.

And, for that, the historical record of Richard Nixon's Presidency will always carry an unfortunate and unwelcome

For many years, the American political establishment has felt the presence of Richard Nixon. Sitting Presidents of whatever party have sought his counsel, mostly in private. His books have offered advice and guidance to statesmen and budding politicians of whatever stripe. In fact, his place in history is as apt to be established by his writings as it is by his years in the Presidency.

Other Presidents have come, gone, and faded, despite the very best efforts of sympathetic biographers and flacks in the media and in academia. Richard Nixon came, went, came back and finally stayed, despite the very best efforts of his adversaries.

We suspect, but have no way of knowing, that future historians will treat Nixon more kindly than the politically

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nation well in terms of our own place in the world-wide scheme of things. It was during his watch that the Soviet Union and Red China were split apart, to the benefit of America. It was during his watch that the Cold War entered a period of "detente", paving the way for the ultimate collapse of the Soviet Union. And it was during his watch that a hopelessly divided country saw an end to the Vietnam war, inglorious as that end may

I wish I could say as much for many of his domestic initiatives. In terms of social programs, "affirmative action" and other assorted Great Society ills, he was not all that much different, fundamentally, from Lyndon Johnson. But for his sake, and for the sake of those of us who were part of America's efforts during that Cold War period, we hope he at least gets credit for his rightful place in history, all other things notwithstanding.

So now he has finally been laid to rest. He will no longer be with us. But the reshaping the world's political landscape, to which he contributed so much, has, in our opinion, benefitted America greatly. Our hope can be that present and future political leaders don't fritter it

An afternoon auction is also planned at Larry Ogden's Auction Barn across from Higginbotham Bartlett.



Walls has been represented in this lawsuit in the past by Dr. Tommy Swate(who is also an attorney), however Swate was not present on Thurs-

Walls, a former hospital employee, filed suit against the hospital after he was terminated along with 17 other employees, on Dec. 21. In his lawsuit Walls had contended that the board had violated the Open Meetings Act and terminated him unlawfully.

Walls and the other employees had been fired after the board voted in that Dec. 21 meeting to "abandon all efforts to reopen the hospital."

PENDING LITIGATION AGAINST CAPROCK HOSPITAL

With this lawsuit behind them, Caprock Hospital now has to settle another lawsuit in a Houston federal court. The federal lawsuit has been filed against Caprock Hospital by Dr. Tommy Swate. Swate had also been employed by the hospital and was terminated on Dec. 7, 1993.

After his termination Swate filed bankruptcy and on Dec. 20, 1993 filed a federal suit against Caprock. In this suit, Swate also claims the hospital board violated the Open Meetings Act, vio-

According to the Texas Open Meetings Act, Boards are allowed to remedy violations of the Texas Open Meetings Act by meeting again in a properly held meeting and reauthorizing actions.

Caprock Hospital has been unable to address Swate's contract in another meeting because of the stay on the contract in Bankruptcy Court.







Suggestions offered for preventing food-borne illness

The recent publicity about "putbreaks" of illness in Texas has created a new interest in prevention of food-borne illness. There are many illness-producing organisms in the gastrointestinal tract of man and many other warm- you in controlling food-borne bacteria

blooded animals. As such, they are always present in our surroundings; the trick is to keep these organisms from getting into our prepared foods. The following suggestions may be helpful to

1. If you learn only one thing about food-borne illness, remember that good handwashing techniques can prevent more illness than all other techniques combined.

2. Buying safe food:

a. Buy packaged foods in undamaged, whole, labeled cans/containers/packages.

b. Buy cold foods just before you go home and put them away immediately.

c. Buy food from approved sources; if you choose to buy "bargain" foods (damaged, roadside vendors, unlabeled, etc.), remember that you pay for what you get. 3. Storing food safely:

a. Keep refrigerator at 40 degrees F. or below, and freezer at 0 degrees F. or below.

b. Thaw meat in the refrigerator, in cold running water, or in the microwave or oven as part of the cooking process.

c. Foods in refrigeration should not be placed too close together, allow air circulation for better cooling.

d. After cooking, never leave food out to "cool down" before placing in refrigeration; refrigerate or freeze immediately after a meal. Large volumes of food should be placed in shallow containers for

e. Store room temperature foods (cans, boxes, dry food packages) above and away from cleaners and other toxic materials.

Safe food preparation: a. WASH YOUR HANDS OF-

TEN AND WELL. b. Wash cutting board after each

use with detergent and a stiff brush, rinse; if raw meats are cut on the board, follow rinse with a bleach solution (one tablespoon of bleach to each gallon of water).

c. Wash tops of cans and bottles before opening.

d. Wash fruits and vegetables with warm water and dip in a solution of one tablespoon bleach to each gallon of water.

e. If you taste food while cooking, use a clean spoon for each

f. Keep uncooked and cooked foods separate during preparation. g. Heat or re-heat foods quickly; don't let them "warm up" on a

kitchen counter. h. Keep your counter tops clean and dry during food preparation. Use disposable paper goods or disinfect-able cloth goods to clean counter tops.

i. Throw away any food that looks or tastes funny.

When in doubt, throw it out. 5. "Non-food" sources of illness associated with food related pathogens.

It is a common occurrence for people to be able to transmit a disease to which they have been exposed before they even realize that they are becoming ill. People handle many items every day. If someone who has been infected with a disease-causing organism fails to wash their hands very thoroughly after going to the toilet, anything that he touches can be contaminated with those organisms which might still be on his hands. If a non-infected person handles an item which has been contaminated and then places the item or his hand in his mouth (or touches food which he eats), then he has infected himself. Strict observance of good hand-washing techniques after going to the toilet and before eating is the best tool available to avoid the spread of these diseases.

Young children should be closely supervised to assure that they wash their hands thoroughly after the toilet and before eating. Toys which are shared by young children should be cleaned and sanitized frequently with a bleach water solution of one tablespoon of household bleach to one gallon

The Garza Theatre in Post, Texas, will present its 1994 tribute to the "Harley Sadler Show" for five weeks starting June 30, marking the historic theatre's fifth year of commemorating one of the all-time show business greats. This year's production, The Trail of the Lonesome Pine, is a bittersweet story about feuding hillbilly clans in Virginia and will feature the traditional "Toby" character made popular by Harley Sadler and a number of other stage performers.

The late Will McCrary, founder of the Garza Theatre, conceived the idea of reproducing the tent show theme during the 1990 season. The annual event has developed into a traditional Summer affair at the theatre.

The Trail of the Lonesome Pine, a novel written by John Fox in the early 1900s, was adapted for the Broadway stage by Eugene Walters and produced in New York City during the 1912 season. The original cast included Charlotte Walker, Berton Churchill, Willard Robertson, and William S. Hart. Hart later became a prominent western star in silent films.

The screenplay of The Trail of the Lonesome Pine was released in the late 1930s, with film immortal Henry Fonda cast in the role of "Dave Tolliver." It was Fonda's first starring role. The motion picture also starred Sylvia Sidney.

Noted playwright-comedian Neil Schaffner adapted the story for repertoire theatre in the 1920s. According to historian Dr. William L. Slout, "I know that it was done on the Cotton Blossom showboat in 1929, but, of course, every rep show that ever trouped did the piece at one time or another. The last time the Slout Players used it was around 1946."

The Neil Schaffner script of The Trail of the Lonesome Pine will be used by the Garza Theatre in this year's production. Neil and Caroline Schaffner are credited with creating the two featured characters of "tent rep" theatre -- "Tobias T. Tolliver" and "Susie B. Sharp." In addition to touring the Schaffner Players, they produced a syndicated daytime radio program called "Toby's Corntussle News." Mrs. Schaffner lives in Mount

Former students and faculty in the Division of Mathematics and Sciences at Wayland Baptist University have announced plans to establish a \$25,000 endowed scholarship in honor of Dr. W. Harold Reese, who retires this spring after 28 years on the Wayland faculty.

Plans for the scholarship will be formally unveiled at a dinner honoring Reese on Friday, May 20, in McClung University Center on Wayland's Plainview campus. Reese will also be recognized for receiving the rank of professor emeritus of biological sciences, an honor granted him by the Wayland Board of Trustees at its March 24 meet-

"Dr. Reese has been a stabilizing influence in the lives of many former students and faculty in the Division of Mathematics and Sciences," said Dr. Harold Temple, professor of chemistry at WBU. "With the help of former students, friends and faculty, we feel the minimum goal of \$2,500 to initiate an endowment can be reached by May 20."

Reese, professor of biological and earth sciences, came to Wayland in 1966 after completing the doctor of philosophy degree at Oregon State University. He attended Wayland Baptist College from 1944-45 and 1946-47 before completing the bachelor of science and master of science degrees at Texas Tech in 1952 and 1961, respectively.

Born in Stonewall County, Reese graduated from Plainview High School in 1944. Following a term in the U.S. Army and undergraduate education at Texas Tech, Reese taught in Abernathy from 1952-54, Dalhart from 1954-57, and Plainview from 1957-62. He then did doctoral work at Oregon State, conducting research for the U.S. Public Health Service and Pacific Cooperative Water Pollution and Fisheries Laboratory in water pollution abatement. Reese has also completed National Science Foundation institutes at Texas Tech and the University of Oak Ridge (Tenn.).

Author of numerous publications, Reese has delivered scientific papers at the International Eutrophication Symposium in Madison, Wis., and Agri-Energy Symposium in Princeton, Ill. He invented several items of field equipment for research in earth science and has also developed simple, homemade equipment that secondary school students can construct for study in the earth sciences, with emphasis in astronomy and meteo-

rology. Reese is a life member of the Texas Academy of Science and Southwestern Association of Naturalists, sustaining member of Ecological Society of America, and is a member of American Society of Limnology and Oceanography, Alpha Chi, Alpha Zeta, Phi Sigma, Sigma Xi and Phi Cappa Phi. He has also

been recognized by American Men of Science, Who's Who in the Southwest, Who's Who in the West, and many other professional organizations.

Reese has won research grants from EXCEL Corporation, High Plains Research Center and Terra Vite Corporation in Texas; Northwest Research Laboratory in Oregon; and Soil Enterprise Corporation in Mississippi. Most recently, Reese has been involved in investigating recent meteoric showers in Hale County as well as weather trends on the Llano Estacado.

In addition to his many teaching, counseling and committee assignments, the former division chairman has been instrumental in developing mineral and other scientific collections and in obtaining gem cutting equipment for science laboratories. For his contributions, the Wayland community has recognized Reese with the institution's Distinguished Alumni Faculty Award and Outstanding Teacher Award.

Reese and wife, Carol, are members of the First Baptist Church in Floydada. He is president of Whirlwind Sams Travel Association and vice president of the Hi-Plains Gem and Mineral Society. Reese has two children, daughter Sheryl and son Hal.

Many high school seniors will soon be receiving solicitations from publishing firms offering an opportunity to be listed in a "Who's Who" type publication. The student is usually required to buy the book; and many times, pay an additional fee to be listed. While some companies may do as they promise, the BBB considers many such books as "vanity publications."

They are published for very limited distribution and few, if any, will be found outside the personal bookshelves of

those listed. When receiving an opportunity to be listed, students and parents should consider whether such a listing is a genuine form of recognition or simply a display of vanity for a price. If you are in doubt, call your BBB at 763-0459 for a reliability report on any publication that you are considering. Also, you might want to check with your school counselor's

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



On February 22, 1994, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company ("Southwestern Bell" or "Company") filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("Commission") to restructure the Company's Local Transport and Directory Transport categories of its Switched Access Service. This matter has been assigned to Docket No. 12784. The tariff sheets in Southwestern Bell's application, if approved, will bring the Company's intrastate Access Service Tariff into structural parity with the Company's interstate Tariff No. 73 for Local Transport. Southwestern Bell's companion interstate tariff became effective on January 1, 1994.

The transport rate elements provide for the transmission facilities between the cutomer's premises and the end office switch(es) where the customer's traffic is switched to originate or terminate the customer's communications.

Southwestern Bell proposes to implement the revised tariffs on a revenue neutral basis. Although the proposed tariff changes will affect all customers subscribing to Switched Access Service, the Local Transport and Directory Transport categories of Southwestern Bell's Switched Access Service is primarily for interexchange carriers. If approved, this application will result in an increase in Southwestern Bell's revenues of approximately \$1682.00 during the first year. Southwestern Bell proposes that the changes be effective on December 1, 1994.

Residents requesting the service will be charged the usual fee of \$20.00 per ton with a \$5.00 minimum for dumping at the landfill if they separate recyclables and load the trailer.







Cattle feeders announce environmental award

Perception is reality, the saying goes. And the bottom line for cattlemen, operating in a climate of increasing scrutiny over business that use natural resources, is public perception.

"Cattle feeders throughout the TCFA three-state region of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico have long known that environmental stewardship is not only the right thing to do, but that it makes good business sense, too," says Les McNeill, president of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association (TCFA). "That's why we're going to recognize the outstanding environmental stewardship efforts of our members with the TCFA Environmental Stewardship Award."

The award will recognize cattle feeders whose natural resource stewardship practices contribute to the environment and enhance productivity and profitability of their operation, McNeill says.

The award is competitive and cattle feeders will be judged on their stewardship and educational efforts. The TCFA Environmental Stewardship Award is patterned closely after a similar award given by the National Cattlemen's Association to allow the TCFA winner to go on to national competition.

"The TCFA Environmental Stewardship Award winner will be selected by a

committee made up of representatives from state and federal government agencies, environmental organizations and past national stewardship award winners," McNeill says. The TCFA winner will be chosen later this spring.

The TCFA Environmental Stewardship Award is the latest in many efforts that cattle feeders have undertaken to protect the environment. "One of the first committees that TCFA established when it was formed in 1967 was charged with sponsoring research to help cattle feeders do a better job of environmental stewardship."

"Early station officials recognized that not all agricultural research should be handled at the College Station headquarters," Eddleman said. "In a state as varied as Texas, regional conditions brought unique farming and ranching problems and unique opportunities to solve them."

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station itself was founded in 1887 by the Texas Legislature, and by 1888 its researchers were conducting experiments on the campus of Texas A&M University in College Station.

Other regional research was conducted on state prison farms or temporary research sites, but the Beeville station became the first permanent regional research facility.

It is now part of the regional research and extension center based in Corpus Christi and directed by Eddleman. There are also regional research centers located in 12 other Texas cities, as well as several adjunct facilities in various regions.


The Beeville station has undergone several additions and improvements, including the donation of 873 acres by the Kathryn Stoner O'Connor Foundation in 1974 and the building of an animal reproduction laboratory in 1985.

In the past 100 years, the station has made numerous contributions in animal reproduction, beef cattle management and forage utilization research and focuses primarily on those areas now.

by Kerry Siders, CEA-Ag Producers in Floyd County have really got on the center pivot band wagon. According to the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District #1 (HPUWCD#1), Floyd County only had 78 pivots as recent as the summer of

Although there is not an exact count of new pivots since that time, because there are pivots in all stages of construction, myself and Jerry Funck, Ag Engineer with HPUWCD#1, agree that there are at least 250 pivots as of this month. We still have a ways to go when compared to counties as Parmer and Lamb which have +1200 pivots. Clearly, pivtos are providing growers with benefits in their irrigation management. Another benefit that the whole county will see, besides efficient use of water is a stabilizing effect on the economy due to more consistent yields.

One reason for the growth in pivots numbers is quality of the equipment and service available today.
