

In fact, Kinder was here when most people in Floyd County arrived on the scene. He was a presence in the community, a presence, in our opinion, that benefitted the community greatly.

In fact, we might not have gotten involved here, and invested here, had it not been for Kinder. We did not then know him, but we did know that there are many things that can draw a community together, hold it together, assure and improve its quality of life.

The first, of course, is the quality of its citizens. Here, there was no shortage of quality citizens. Then there is the question of leadership within the community. That, to us at that time, was where Kinder came in.

It has always been our thought that a good, community-minded bank, and a good, community-minded newspaper, can be of tremendous benefit in this regard. Both are in position to be misunderstood at times. That is probably the most difficult aspect of either position. And it is probably the most difficult aspect of any leadership position.

But sometimes that is the best answer for all concerned, though it might not seem that way at the time. And, when it came time to support those projects or endeavors that benefitted the community a whole, Kinder's answer was always "yes." We will miss him. We will miss his, at times, hard-nosed "crustiness". We will miss the frequent visits on affairs of state and national politics. We will miss his good-natured wisdom and counsel on affairs concerning the community at large. We will miss his friendship.

County voter turnout is good in Saturday's municipal elections

Voter turnout at the May 7 Municipal Election for Floydada City Council was average according to city election officials who report a total of 751 voters in the election at the final tally. Floydada's District 1 chose Albert Hill as their representative on City Council. Hill received 78 votes. Don Green got 23 votes and Adolfo Garcia received 39. District 4 incumbent Wayne Tipton drew 151 votes to retain his unopposed seat on the council. Elected to the two At-Large positions were incumbents Clar Schacht and Eric Cornelius. Schacht earned 493 votes and Cornelius got 520 votes. Challenger Joe Ysasaga got 135 votes and Jack Ochoa received 201 votes.

Floydada Independent School District voters re-elected incumbent Steve Lloyd in Precinct 1 with 169 votes. Opponent Randy Beedy received 94 votes. Incumbent Trena Simpson, the only candidate in Precinct 2, received 138 votes. The total number of voters casting ballots in the school district election were 401.

Elected to the two seats on the Caprock Hospital District Board of Directors were newcomers Rob Heflin and J. R. Turner. Heflin garnered 397 votes and Turner got 386. Incumbent Kenneth Pitts received 304 votes and challenger Joseph Stepp got 121 votes. A total of 715 people voted in the elec-

tion between the early voting and the Saturday balloting.

City of Lockney voter turnout was relatively low. City officials report 106 voters in the election. District 1 voters elected challenger Richard Zavala with 30 votes while incumbent Terry Jones received 5 votes. In District 2, voters, returned incumbent Gary Marr to his council seat with 33 votes and challenger Rosie Rendon received 24. J. D. Copeland, the unopposed incumbent candidate in District 3, was reelected with 14 votes.

Bernie Ford, the sole candidate for an At-Large post on the Lockney Independent School District board received 157 votes. Jesse Garza received 51 votes to claim the Precinct 1 seat on the board. Challenger Tina Graves got 21 votes. Incumbent Jim Bob Martin, unopposed in Precinct 2, was returned to his seat with 23 votes. 185 people cast votes in the May 7 school district voting.

Incumbents Claude Brown and Bill Sherman, unopposed on the ballot for two places on the board of directors for Lockney General Hospital District were returned to office with 158 and 152 votes, respectively. A total of 164 people voted in the Saturday balloting.

Taxing entites are required to canvas and certify the votes from the May 7 election during the week of May 9-13.

'Wonder Dog' alerts to rattler

LOCKNEY--Judy Macha is giving her dog, Freckles, all the credit for warning her of a nearby rattlesnake and preventing her from the probable outcome of a snakebite.

According to Macha, she was measuring a wheat field 2 1/2 miles S.W. of Providence, Monday afternoon at approximately 12:00 noon. She was pushing a measuring wheel, walking fast and "not paying any attention to anything around me". Freckles, a mix breed of half Cocker Spaniel and half Springer Spaniel was bouncing along

at Judy's side. When Judy got to the other side of the field and was marking her spot she heard Freckles let out a sudden yelp. "I looked up and saw her staring down into the wheat," said Judy. "Freckles was less than 6 feet away from me. I was wondering what she had found when she started to bark and then I heard the buzzing of a rattlesnake. I couldn't see it because of the wheat but I called Freckles to me and pulled her with me to an area of the field where the hay baler had already been through. I didn't walk back to the truck through the wheat field."

Judy said it took her several hours to "quit shaking". Macha says, "This field is not anywhere near the Caprock. I will never doubt that rattlesnakes are a danger around here too. According to the Macha's, other neighbors in the area have also had encounters with rattlesnakes.

Freckles has now been affectionately named "The Wonder Dog" by Judy and her husband Ray Macha.

Oath of office administered to new LISD board members

LOCKNEY--After the votes were canvassed on Monday night Bernie Ford and Jessie Garza were sworn in as new board members of the Lockney Independent School District. They will each serve two year terms. Retiring from the board are Eddie Teeter and

Gary Mangold. The board discussed the 20 hours of training required of new board members and how those hours are acquired. It was reported that the meetings and seminars at the state school board convention are enough to fill the requirements if they

are all attended. After the swearing in ceremony Mike Mathis made a motion to leave the officers of the board the same as the previous year. Dickie Lambert seconded the motion and it carried. Jim Bob Martin will serve as president and Paul Glasson

secretary. D'Lynn Mathis, representing the Floyd County Child Welfare Board, introduced Denise Ochoa and she told the board, "We all hear about the bad things children do and I wanted you to know about the positive things our students are doing.

"The welfare board invited the students in the area to enter a Child Abuse Logo Contest and out of several hundred entries the design entered by Denise was chosen to be made into book markers."

Phil Cotham, principal at Lockney Elementary School, presented Miss Ochoa with a framed copy of her logo which read, "Do Not Abuse Us, It Hurts

Raymond Lusk was selected as the LISD Region 17 E.S.C. Regional Advisory Committee representative for On the agenda was the item to con-

sider approving participation in the West Texas Food Service Purchasing Cooperative. Lusk explained that the service center has formed a purchasing cooperative which approximately 40 schools have joined so that food items can be bid out in quantities for better prices. He explained that it will save money and also help the schools bidding

process. He stated that the ordering process by the cafeteria will be the same. Paul Glasson made the motion to join the cooperative and Bernie Ford made

the second. All voted in favor. Also approved was the use of the Regional Media Services. Lusk stated that the teachers made good use of the media services and that it was well

worth the fee to join. Jim Bob Martin was chosen as the

delegate to the 1994 Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) Delegate Assembly and Bernie Ford was chosen as alternate.

Lusk reviewed Policy Update #45 and the board voted their approval. A copy of the update is available in the school office and the principals offices for anyone who would like to study it.

County reviews finances during monthly session

Floyd County Commissioners examined accounts and reports relating to county finances and authorized the payment of monthly bills at the regular session for the month of May. The court also approved one farm work contract for Martin Bradley. The request is for clearing old improvements to return land to cultivation at a site 1 mile north and 1/2 mile east of Aiken in Precinct 2.

Several budget amendments were approved to transfer funds between county accounts and \$10,000.00 was transferred to each county precinct from the Road and Bridge fund. Treasurer Glenna Orman presented her monthly report on the county finances for April.

She stated that the county began the month with \$331,038.24 in county funds and took in receipts of \$365,584.32. Disbursements totaled \$303,434.63, leaving balances totaling \$393,187.93 in county coffers as of April 30. Orman also reported certificates of deposit in the amounts of \$250,000.00 in undivided taxes. \$165,000.00 for Precinct #3 and \$40,000.00 for Precinct #4. The CD's have earned interest amounting to \$10,463.05 to date.

The commissioners reviewed and accepted the monthly reports for elected officials who collect fines and fees. The selection of an emergency management coordinator was not considered at this

time. The current coordinator is Bobby Welborn and he will remain in the appointed position.

Floydada Police Chief James Hale met with the court to present documents concerning interlocal agreements between the county, the City of Floydada and the City of Lockney for mutual assistance in the event of a natural or manmade disaster. The court will review the material and make a decision at

Judge Bill Hardin was authorized to sign a joint safekeeping agreement allowing the Federal Reserve Bank in Dallas to hold the securities safe guarding county deposits in the First National Bank of Floydada. The agreement replaces a previous agreement for the securities to be held by the First National Bank of Lubbock.

Commissioners granted a request from Eugene Beedy to cross a county road with the installation of a water line. Beedy will bear the cost of the work in Precinct 3 and must return the roadway to it's original condition at the work site.

Attending the session were Judge Bill Hardin, Commissioners Connie Bearden, Floyd Jackson and George Taylor. Precinct 4 Commissioner Howard Bishop was absent. Also attending were Glenna Orman, James Hale, Amado Morales and the Hesperian-Beacon reporter.

First National Bank chairman of the board dies at the age of 78 was elected president and served possessed by Kinder as: "Christian love

Thomas Kinder Farris, longtime chairman of the board of The First National Bank of Floydada died Saturday. May 7, 1994 at 5:30 a.m. at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. He was 78 years

Born December 28, 1915, to John Newton and Lora Rucker Farris, Kinder had served on the board of the First National Bank since 1949. He was named chairman of the board in 1960 and held that position until his death.

Kinder and his brother, John Newton, Jr., and sister, Audrey, were all born in Floydada, at the old Farris home on the corner of Missouri and Fourth Streets.

A graduate of the University of Texas, Farris met his future wife, Martha White, in Houston while he was working for the Texas Company. They were married December 13, 1947, after Kinder served 3 1/2 years with the U.S. Air Force in World War II and Martha had taught school.

The Farris' made Floydada their home and Kinder pursued farming and

ranching as an occupation. Kinder's father, John N. Farris was an original stockholder of the First National Bank when it received it's charter on November 27, 1903. In January, 1911 John Farris was elected president of the bank and held that position until

his death in December of 1918. Kinder's mother, Lora Rucker Farris was elected a director in 1919, secretary of the board in 1920 and vice president of the bank in 1923 (serving as vice president through the lean depression years). In January, 1943, Mrs. Farris through the years of WWII.

It was after the war and serving in the Air Force, that Kinder returned home and continued in the interest of the bank that had played such a major role in his

Farris was involved in getting the Floydada Airport and the Floydada Development Board started. He was also instrumental in building the Floydada Inn.

He was named Employer of the Year at the 1991 Chamber of Commerce Banquet. In a statement read at the banquet, the employees of The First National Bank listed outstanding qualities

for his family and friends, being faithful, practical, compassionate, honest, fun and dedicated. The employees also said Farris had fortitude and stamina, was civic minded, proud, patriotic and one

Farris was a member and elder of The First Christian Church in Floydada and served on the official Board of Trustees of the church. He was also a teacher of the Willing Workers Sunday School

heck of a guy."

Memorial services were held for Farris on Monday, May 9, at 2:00 p.m., at The First Christian Church in Floydada. Rev. Phil Carpenter officiated.

Farris was buried at Floyd County Memorial Park under the direction of Moore Rose White Funeral Home.

He is survived by his wife; three sons, George Russell of Houston, Thomas Kinder Jr., of Floydada, and John Charles of Dallas; one daughter, Anne Elizabeth Figari, of Dallas; one brother, John Newton Farris, Jr., of Floydada; and nine grandchildren, Tamala Jo, John Vincent, Elizabeth Leigh, Lindsay Doherty, Robert Kinder, Lora Kathryn, Virginia Anne, John Charles Jr., Farris and Alexandra Caroline Figari.

I know what I'll remember about Kinder. I'll remember how he always made a point of leaving his desk to come shake my hand whenever he saw me in the bank.

It didn't matter if he had someone in his office or not—he always made a point to come and give me a cheery

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greeting and a TWO HANDED and WARM handshake. His words were always encouraging and I always left smiling. I always appreciate people who leave me smiling after even a short visit.

He was an honest and sincere man who appreciated and loved people who

were honest and sincere with him. Martha said that he told her once how much he enjoyed farming because he could get on his tractor and be alone with God. Kinder told Martha that in the peace and quiet of the open fields he could talk to God one on one.

I know Martha and the Farris family will be able to find comfort in knowing that Kinder is now at perfect peace talk-

FISD approves election results

FLOYDADA - FISD board members selected a canvassing committee consisting of Assistant Superintendent Jimmie Collins and board members John Campbell and Don Hardy to review the results of the May 7 election. Following their review, the board accepted the results of the election and certified the election as complete. The action was taken during the May regular session of the board.

Re-elected board members Steve Lloyd and Trena Simpson each signed the statement for elected officials and were sworn in by Floyd County Judge Bill Hardin on Tuesday evening, May 9. The election of officers for the coming year was then held with no change in personnel. Charlene Brown will again be president of the board with Steve Lloyd as vice president and Trena Simpson as secretary.

Bids for the proposed paving of a parking lot at Floydada High School were opened and read. Four bids were submitted, giving base and alternate bids. High Plains Pavers of Plainview bid \$23,700.00 for the base bid which calls for asphalted concrete paving and curb and gutter. The alternate bid was \$20,810.00 for three course penetration pavement without curb and gutter.

Jar-Con (Jarnigan Construction of Lubbock) bid \$24,800.00 and \$19,840.00. Jordan Paving (Appian of Hereford and Jordan of Irving) bid \$31,186.00 and \$28,500.00. Lone Star Construction of Amarillo bid \$48,280.00 and made no alternate bid.

The board accepted the low base bid By High Plains Pavers. The work is slated to begin after school is out this May and should be completed in 30 consecutive calendar days.

The single bid received on the proposed purchase of a school activities bus was opened and accepted by the board. The bid from Bridges-Hemphill of Dallas offered four options ranging from \$66,473.00 to \$77,461.00 and the board voted unanimously to purchase the least expensive package offered. The bus approved will be a 72 passenger front engine model T-2000 from Bluebird with a 190 horse power motor. The board requested that the bus be painted white with green trim and that the overhead luggage racks be deleted (with an accompanying deduction of \$520.00 from the purchase price). The seats which come in the bus as standard

equipment will be switched out for the

seats on the current Whirlwind bus. Scott Greenway, a fourth grade teacher at R. C. Andrews Elementary School and the spokesperson for the campus Improvement Committee, presented the school's proposed budget for the coming year and addressed proposals for correcting deficiencies cited by state accreditation authorities. The committee recommended the employment of an additional fourth grade and fifth grade teacher to allow the school to reduce the teacher/pupil ratio to increase teacher effectiveness and student performance concerning the academic excellence indicator system determining school status for accreditation.

According to the report accompanying the budget proposal, Andrews has been found to have unacceptable student performance based on the fact that 20 percent or fewer of the students in at least one of the student populations (African-American, Hispanic, White, or economically disadvantaged) passed all TAAS tests taken. The report went on

to say that should the performance level of any group remain at or below the 20 percent passing level for any population, the campus will be designated as "low performing" at that time.

Factors Greenway said influenced the requests included the mandated mainstreaming of special education students. He said that these students would now be required to spend no more than 50 percent of their time in special education classrooms. The remainder of their school day will be spent in classrooms with the other student body and would mean less time and attention to devote to the general students.

The overall budget request for day to day operation of R. C. Andrews Elementary School totaled \$43,050.00 and is a basic list of supplies and materials needed to function throughout the 1994-95 school year. It does not include capitol improvements nor salaries. Capital improvements the school requested included lockers for the 6th grade (\$9,300.00), blacktop for playground areas (\$2,830.00) and additional playground equipment (\$5,000.00). No board action was taken on the requests at this time.

Board member Campbell discussed with the board his views concerning board policy for early graduation and honor graduates. Campbell stated that he had voted to approve the policy which allows early (three year) graduates to be awarded honor status, based on a wish to be fair to 1994 graduates who might be effected. He told the board that he would not have voted in favor of the policy if the vote had been taken prior to the beginning of the school year since he felt it was unfair to students who worked all four years to achieve honor status and might be forced out by a student who was graduating in three years. No board action was request by Campbell and none was discussed.

Other actions at the meeting included: ... Board members authorized the payment of monthly bills.

... Minutes from the previous board meeting were read and approved as presented.

Collins presented the tax report stating that \$1,401,489.36 had been collected, representing 95.75 percent of the current tax roll.

... The board voted to approve TASB Policy Update 45 on a motion by Lloyd, seconded by Hardy and passed unanimously

... Joining the Region 17 Co-op for purchasing cafeteria supplies was also approved by the board on a motion by Lloyd, seconded by Billy Joe Villarreal. This will be the third year of participation in the co-op in order to secure more economical prices on food supplies.

... Resignations were accepted from Billie Peden (high school home economics teacher), Connie Bertrand (speech and theater arts teacher at high school), Debra Lloyd (home economics teacher at high school), Jimmy Burleson (coach), Joy Whitaker (special education trainable teacher at Andrews Elementary). Deanna Logan (earth sciences teacher at junior high), and Criselda Alaniz (special education teacher assistant at junior high). Dick Van Hoose was approved for employment as the principal for the alternative school due to begin operation in the fall. Motion for the action came from Mitch Probasco, with a second by Campbell.

... Superintendent Jerry Cannon reported that the school district is to be a recipient of a \$30,000.00 energy grant and that the alternative school cooperative is applying for a \$150,000.00 grant to offset the cost of it's operation.

... Collins reported that information concerning asbestos removal and bids for the work would be available at the next meeting.

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



Warning signs of stroke include: sudden weakness or numbness of the face, arm or leg on one side of the body, sudden dimness or loss of vision, loss of speech or trouble talking or understanding speech, sudden severe headaches with no apparent cause, unexplained dizziness, unsteadiness or sudden falls.

Approximately 10% of strokes are preceded by "temporary strokes" (transient ischemic attacks or TIAs). A TIA has many of the same sympstoms of a stroke but lasts a short time (24 hours or less). TIAs should not be ignored; they may signal a problem leading to a disabling or fatal stroke.

Some risk factors for stroke are inherited. Others are a function of aging. Others result from lifestyle habits that can be changed by the help of a physician. The risk factors that cannot be changed are: age, heredity, male gender, race, diabetes, or prior stroke.

Two bids were opened on the 1989 ag pickup. Ramon Ortegon bid \$2500 and James Poole bid \$6000. The bid made by James Poole was accepted.

A list of transfer requests was presented to the board members and after being reviewed the list was accepted.

Approval was made on the sale of Lot 5 and the north 1/2 of Lot 6 to Olga Rodriquez. The bid request on the tax sale was made by the City of Lockney who is the managing entity. Rodriquez bid \$2,200 for the property.

A request for a sprinkler system for the baseball field has been made and the board agreed to gather information on what it will cost. Baseball coach David Norwood said that the present system would not cover the field and that they were spending a lot of time carrying pipe to water the outfield. The City of Lockney has agreed to pay \$2,000 toward the purchase of the materials and several individuals have offered to donate their time to install the pipe. The baseball field is owned by the city but the school takes care of the maintenance.

A discussion was held on building improvements and building projects and it was reported that several classrooms will be renovated this summer. Also discussed was the moving of the high school library into the old gym and making much needed classrooms from the present library space.

James Poole reviewed the results of the 10th grade Exit Level TAAS test. He told the board that the school had received a letter stating that an improvement plan to upgrade the percent of students passing the exam had to be implemented. "Our teachers have really made an effort to help the students and we are very pleased. We have made good gains in all areas," he stated.

Of the 10th grade test 67% have met the expectations on all tests taken. This is up from the 35% in 1992 and 42% in 1993. Only 7% did not meet the expec-

tations on one test; 20% on two tests and 7% on all three. This was down from 25% on one test, 23% on two tests and 10% on all three tests in 1993.

In Writing 85% met the minimum expectations which was up from 74% in 1992 And 79% in 1993.

In Reading 76% met minimum expectations; up from 57% in 1992 and 56% in 1993. 50% master all objectives.

In Math 74% met the minimum expectations. This was up from 39% in 1992 and 59% in 1993; 28% mastered all objectives.

Group performance ratings given

White - 95%; up from 64% in 1992 and 75% in 1993.

Hispanic - 43%; up from 26% in 1992 and 31% in 1993.

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

Farmer's Life As He Lives It." In 1951, along with partners Marshall Formby and B.A. Robertson, they owned the first radio station in Floyd County, KFLD, "Voice of the Caprock." After

the radio station went on the air. "Friday, April 13, 1951, was a great day for the Ed Holmes family," said Alma Holmes. "That was the day KFLD, Floydada's first radio station went on the air. KFLD was a 250 watt station, located in the middle of the dial at 900. We were on the air from sun-up to sundown. The "F" in our call letters stood for Floydada, the "L" stood for Lockney....We hoped to make our station truly a Floyd County and regional organization."

She was also a well known historian and author. Materials published included: "Della Plain, The Beginning Settlement," "Favorite Stories of Floyd County," "The Lockney Christian College", and numerous articles in The Floyd County Hesperian.

She was instrumental in the founding of the Floyd County Historical Museum and was one of the first women to serve on various boards such as Floyd County Fair Board, American Cancer Society and Floydada Chamber of Commerce. She was voted Floydada's Woman of the Year in 1959 and Citizen of the Year in 1963. She served on the Floyd County

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

Good time to control prairie dogs

By Kerry Siders, CEA-Ag.

I was visiting with Ronnie Smith, specialist with the Animal Damage Control Service, on controlling pigeons under the pavilion on the courthouse square, when I was also thinking about the several calls on controlling prairie dogs. Well, I'm not exactly sure what will happen on the pigeons, but as far as controlling the prairie dogs that is pretty well cut and dry.

Since we do have some soil moisture, now is an excellent time to control these critters. Phostoxin tablets are the weapon of choice. These tablets are available at Coops, farm stores and other businesses. Ron says the larger tablets work best. It takes from 2-4 tablets per hole dropped down as far as possible, using a 2-3 inch PVC pipe about 3 feet long will help inject it further down.

The holes should be covered with soil and packed to seal it. Some use newspaper, prickly pear pads, broken cinder block pieces, cow patties, etc. first to stuff the hole then fill with soil. The cement block and prickly pear pads will

also help in keeping the prairie dogs from digging back out. The cans of phostoxin run about \$36-\$40 and can treat around 10 acres. So there is a cost of about \$4.00 per acre to control these pests depending on infestation.

I know several people have commented that they have used this method and it did not work. Well, it will work when done correctly and systematically. As large an area as possible must be treated in one day and continue to treat until the whole town is complete. It is important to continue to go back and retreat those holes that were broken in or out of and also to treat those missed.

Another important point here that Ron made is that those treating these areas should have good insect repellent on because of health concerns with fleas and ticks that are found in conjunction with prairie dogs.

Phostoxin is a restricted use pesticide and an applicators license is required for purchase. For more information, call the Floyd County office of the Texas Agri-

Sorghum growers fight to keep granular carbofuran

-- From National Grain Sorghum as baiting for predator control. Producers

Sorghum growers, angry over the Environmental Protection Agency's proposed ban on granular carbofuran, an important insecticide used in sorghum production, have taken their story to Washington and they are gaining support in their fight against the ban. Senator Bob Kerrey of Nebraska recently pushed EPA Administrator Carol Browner for a reasonable explanation as to why EPA wants to ban the pesticide.

Kerrey challenged the EPA proposal during a recent hearing on the agency's budget before the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on VA-HUD-Independent Agencies, of which Kerrey is a member. Kerrey pointed out that EPA wants to ban granular carbofuran because of its toxicity to birds when EPA's own records show only one bird kill-which happened in Texas--from granular carbofuran use on sorghum in the past 20 years. He said that other reported bird kills have been documented as being caused by misuse or illegal acts, such

Tips given on safe use of pesticides

Crosby/Floyd Counties During the spring and summer months, pesticides are used more frequently by agricultural producers and homeowners alike. Pesticides include chemicals such as insecticides, herbicides, and fungicides. Although cultural control, use of resistant varieties, and other methods are used to help control pests, chemical control is still our best

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line of defense in the event of a pest outbreak. Misuse of pesticides causes problems not only for the applicator, but for others as well. The elements of pesticide safety include purchase of the proper chemical, proper handling, use, storage, disposal, and recognition of environmental situations.

The primary source of information for use of a pesticide is the product label. The label is the end product of research development, and the federal and state registration process. The label provides such information as directions for use, specific uses, the specific pests controlled by the product, environmental hazards, hazards to humans and domestic animals, precautionary statements, and storage and disposal instructions.

Pesticide users should always read the label carefully and completely before using a product. One should not rely on memory when using a product. One should not rely on memory when using a familiar product.

Pesticides may enter the body through the skin, lungs, or mouth. Dermal exposure (through the skin) is the most likely route of exposure. Skin exposure is minimized by use of protective equipment. Minimum requirements include wearing a long sleeved shirt and full length trousers, or a cover-all type garment. A wide-brimmed hat offers some protection of the face and neck. Always wear trouser legs over boot tops to reduce the possibility of spilling liquid or dust formulations down into the boots. Unless the label states differently, unlined, natural rubber gloves will protect applicators from a good deal of dermal exposure, since pesticides are often spilled onto the hands and then transferred to the face or neck by wiping one's face or neck with his hand. If a spray tank is elevated, do not allow others in the immediate vicinity at ground level during mixing or loading.

Avoid pesticide inhalation by insur-

ing adequate ventilation and working upwind of the pesticide. If the label calls for a respirator, a good-fitting one with the correct filter type should be used. A mechanical filter, such as a dust mask, will not take the place of a cartridge type respirator. Change filters twice a day and whenever breathing becomes difficult. Change cartridges after 8 hours of actual use or whenever any pesticide odor is detected.

Pesticides may enter the mouth through wiping one's face on an exposed sleeve, cuff, or hand, or by accidental splashing, or trying to clear clogged nozzle tips by blowing on them. Risk from splashing can be reduced by wearing a face shield to protect the eyes. nose, and mouth. Also, one should be mindful not to use tobacco products until he has thoroughly washed any pesticide residues from the hands and face.

Do not mix chemicals unless specified by label directions. Always store pesticides in the original container with a legible label. Store pesticides in an area meeting the storage requirements on the label, and dispose of empty containers according to label directions.
