ance of ihe notice and the key informa tance of the notice and the key informa"A property owner has the right to ap-
peal to the Floyd County Appraisal Review Board on any disagreement with the property's value, exemptions, own-
ership and other areas," she said. The appraisal review board, more
commonly called "ARB", is an independent panel of citizens responsible for reviewing the appraisal district's values.
The ARB also hears and setules protests from property owners who disagree with
some action by the appraisal district. What should a property owner look for on the notice? "Take special note of the proposed value for 1994," Faulkenberry said. "The notice shows the land's value and any hercurent year" An improvement is a building, structure, fence or any other type of fixture to the land.
The appraisal notice also includes The appraisal notice also includes current year information on exemptions
granted to the property. It provides last year's value, too.
Notices to property owners whose values went up or increased more than
$\$ 500$ will also include "estimated" taxes $\$ 500$ will also include "estimated" taxes.
These "estimated" taxes are based on the new value and estimated tax rates if the taxing unit set tax rates for the same amount of operating dollars as last year
Generally, taxing units set final 1994 tax Generally, taxing units set final
rates in August and September Faulkenberry asks that a property owner look carefully at the legal description and mailing address to be sure that
there are no errors. "If the notice con there are no errors. "If the notice con-

## Irrigation of the home garden

Adequate soil moisture is essential for good crop growth. A healthy plant is composed of 75 to 90 percent water,
which is used for the plant's vital functions, including photosynthesis, support (rigidity) and transportation of nutrients and sugars to various parts of the plant. During the first 2 weeks of growth, plants are becoming established and
must have water to build their root sys-
While growing, vegetable crops need
about an inch of water per week in the about an inch of water per week in the
form of rainwater, irrigation water or both. Keep a rain gauge near the garden then supplement rainfall with irigation water if needed. However with the cur-

Committee met March 29 in Dallas to give preliminary approval to research projects that will receive funding in 1995 according to Lubbock-based Plains Coton Growers, Inc.
Support for the statewide research

Incorporated's State Support Program The program returns 5 percent of CI's yearly operating budget to states for use on cotton related research projects. Approximately $\$ 600,000$ is estimated
to be received by Texas for 1995 . These funds will be used to supporta a variety of statewide and regional projects approved by representatives from each of
the nine cotton growing regions in the nine cotton growing regions in
Texas. Funding for regional projects is Texas. Funding for regional projects is
based on the percentage of the Texas crop produced in each region. Projects selected for funding in 1995
