Local prospect better than other areas

County's cotton looks good after recent rains

"The cotton crop in Floyd County is a very mixed bag," states Kerry Siders, County Extension Agent for Floyd County. "Dryland cotton that has received timely rains is doing extremely well. Rains around Floydada, Lockney and the Cedar Hill community came at the right time and some of that cotton looks as good as some irrigated cotton."
"We also have some popcorn cotton out there that is setting fruit but if we do not receive rains in the next two weeks the yield will be poor. The next seven to ten days will be critical as this is the peak water use time. We need some help from Mother Nature," Siders continued.
One good thing that has come from the weather is the insect problem. The days that have topped the 100 degree mark and the hot winds have kept the thrip and fleahoppers from multiplying.

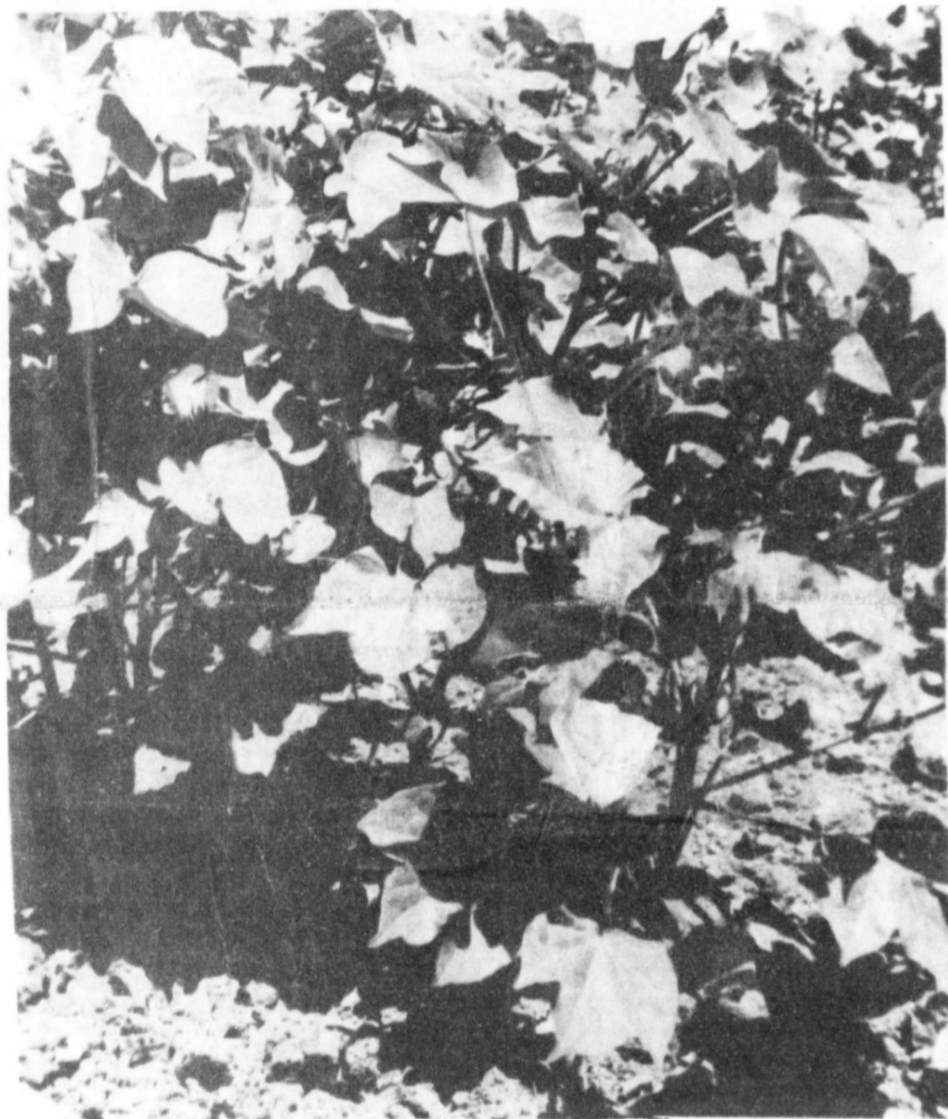
According to Siders, "The infestation of bollworms will have to be watched. They are beginning to show up in isolated spots around the county."
Approximately 160,000 acres have been planted in the county for the 1994 crop year. A complete count is underway at the Floyd County ASCS office and the breakdown between irrigated and dryland acres will be available in a few days. The number of acres planted in 1994 will be fairly close to the number of acres planted in 1993.
With cooperation from the weather the irrigated crop has a fair chance of production close to that of last year. Overall the 1993 crop turned out to be one of the best in several years. Floyd County ranked number nine in the amount of upland cotton raised on the Texas High Plains.

According to Kater Hake, Cotton Agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, "The majority of dry-

land cotton on the southern portion of the South Plains is severely stressed. Many acres of cotton, though still alive,

is water stressed and the yields will be low. The lack of subsoil moisture has contributed to this condition. However

the irrigated cotton is coming along fine and with some timely rains the crop has a chance to rival that of last years."

Haying and grazing approved

According to Trent Johnson, CED of Floyd County ASCS office, Floyd County has been approved to hay or graze CRP acreage as of July 7, 1994. Producers may hay or graze CRP acreage from the date they are approved until September 30, 1994.
The following requirements must be met in order to qualify:
Producers must follow SCS's Storage Inventory and Annual Grazing Plan. The specifications cannot be exceeded. Anyone with questions about this plan should contact the ASCS office.
The cost to hay or graze the CRP acreage will be 25% of the annual CRP payment per acre hayed or grazed. This cost may be paid by the individual in advance or may be withheld from their annual CRP payment. Example: CRP annual payment=\$40.00 x .25 \$10.00 per acre cost for haying or grazing.
"All individuals who receive a share of the CRP payment must sign in agreement to the 25% reduction of their 1994 CRP annual rental payment," said Johnson, "and must agree to the condition of the emergency haying and grazing of the CRP acreage."
Participants must leave at least 25% of each field or contiguous fields unharmed or ungrazed for wildlife cover.
According to Johnson, any CRP cover destroyed or damaged as a result of the haying and grazing shall be reestablished at the expense of the CRP producer.
Only one cutting of hay may be removed.
Grazing may be used to feed livestock owned or leased by the CRP participant who has suffered a 40% or greater loss in hay and pasture production. CRP participants may rent or lease the grazing privilege to a livestock producer who has suffered a 40% or greater loss in hay and pasture production, as determined

by this office on an individual basis.
All applicants must file an application to determine that a 40% loss has occurred before haying or grazing the CRP acreage.
According to Johnson, all fields that will be hayed or grazed must be specifically designated by the producer. This provision allows for haying OR grazing, Not Both. The same acreage cannot be hayed AND grazed.
The term (haying) means one cutting only and the bales must be removed from all the CRP acreage by December 31. This does not allow you to tack the hay on the corner of your CRP acreage.
"Participants will be required to sign a register, meet all the requirements and be approved before any haying or grazing is started," said Johnson.
"Participants must report acres actually grazed, and number of livestock owned or leased, and the number of livestock grazes, to the Floyd County ASCS office by COB October 14, 1994."

TURNROW MEETING

A turnrow meeting will be held Friday, July 22, 10:00 a.m., 2 miles West of Lockney on Hwy 70. Two CEUs for private, commercial and noncommercial pesticide applicators will be available.
The meeting will be at the cotton variety trial on the Warren Mitchell Farm. This is one of seven locations in Floyd County in the cotton plant survey, and also petiole analysis. Kater Hake, Jim Leser, David Kostrum and Kerry Siders will present the information.

Grants lead to improvements

Over 1 1/2 million dollars has been committed to be spent in Floydada, this year, through grants and matching funds, according to City Manager Gary Brown. This money will be channelled back through the community in the areas of materials and employment.
"The re-landscaping of the Jimmie Lou Stewart Park (located on Georgia between 4th & 5th Street), was made possible through a \$42,688 grant from the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department," said Brown. "The City of Floydada matched the grant with labor and equipment."
The grant provided for new grass, 50 trees and a sprinkler system. Playground equipment was also installed along with four covered picnic areas with grills. Off street handicapped parking is also available at the park.
According to Brown, Floydada has also been awarded a \$275,000 Home Grant from the Texas Department of Commerce. The city had to match this grant with 15% of the funds.
The grant will be used by the city to rehabilitate 21 sub standard houses. Eight homes are either currently being rehabilitated or have been completed under this program.
"Rehabilitation of these homes includes bringing the houses up to HUD living standards," said Brown. "We look first into the areas of safety such as electrical, plumbing, weatherization and preservation."
Storm windows have been installed, houses have been leveled and new wiring and plumbing has been installed. New kitchen cabinets and new paint and shingles have all been possible through this grant.
The City of Floydada also put up 15% of matching funds toward a \$227,000 water grant from the Texas Department of Commerce. The money is currently being used for replacement of old 2 inch water mains with 6 inch water mains. Fire hydrants were also being added in areas where needed.
The Federal Housing Authority has given a \$765,000 Upgrade Grant to the local Housing Authority to be used to upgrade the original rental housing units

which are more than 20 years old. No matching funds are needed for this grant.
The new EMS Building will be possible with \$65,000 from the Caprock Hospital District. This new building will house an ambulance, supplies and a training room.
"The city hall addition," said Brown, "will cost approximately \$120,000. We will spend as much as that money as possible on the local level. The work on this building will begin in the fall."
"Besides the city hall addition, local contractors will be used on the EMS building and the Home Grant," said Brown. "These are just some of the areas where you can see the economic activity that is going on in Floydada."
Brown's work on the park grant led the way for the city being awarded that

grant, however the other grants have been awarded through the work of the city's grant consultant, Kay Howard, of Lubbock. "There is no charge to the city for Howard to apply for these grants. Payment is only made if the grants are won and the cost is taken from a percentage of the grant amount. These grants are available to many cities who need only to make the effort to apply for them."
... Discussion and possible action concerning the proposed purchase of a second ambulance to be operated by Floydada EMS was tabled by board president Farris as no specific information is available at this time.
... Financial reports were reviewed by the board and payment of monthly bills was authorized on a motion by Assiter with a second by Eastham. All voted in favor. Farris reported that the district currently has \$450,000.00 in deposited funds. He also said that future financial reports would more accurately report on the expenses and income of the clinic operation. Among the bills authorized for payment were about \$4,400.00 according to Farris, who added, "We are not quite through with that yet."
... A report presented by the clinic administrator stated that the accounts receivable for the month of June at Cogdell Clinic totaled about \$32,000.00. Collections were about \$10,000.00 and the remainder has been billed, mostly to Medicaid, or will be billed to Medicare as soon as the computer billing system is installed and functioning said Ericson.
... Minutes of the previous meeting were reviewed and approved as presented.

CHD discusses health care claims
FLOYDADA — Outstanding indigent health care claims were approved for payment in an amount not to exceed \$12,503.23 during the July 19 regular session of the Caprock Hospital District Board of Trustees. According to clinic administrator Bob Ericson, this is the total amount that Caprock Hospital District is liable for on indigent health care claims at this time.
The board was told that this liability stems from three claims which were submitted in the past. "All other claims made for indigent health care against the district have been denied," said Ericson. "Based on the districts rules concerning residency, income and family size, none of the other applications could qualify."
Payment of the three claims will be made directly to the providing physician or hospital, not to the individual submitting the claims. All three claims were reduced by at least half according to Ericson. These reductions were the result of negotiations between the district and the providers under the Texas Department of Health guidelines.
Motion to pay the claims was made by Rob Heflin and seconded by Carmel Eastham. All voted in favor.
A planned executive session for the purpose of discussing litigation with the districts attorneys was passed over following an objection by Joseph Stepp. Stepp told the board that he objected to the session because the attorneys were not present. It was pointed out that for the purpose of discussing litigation with the attorneys, the attorneys should be present.

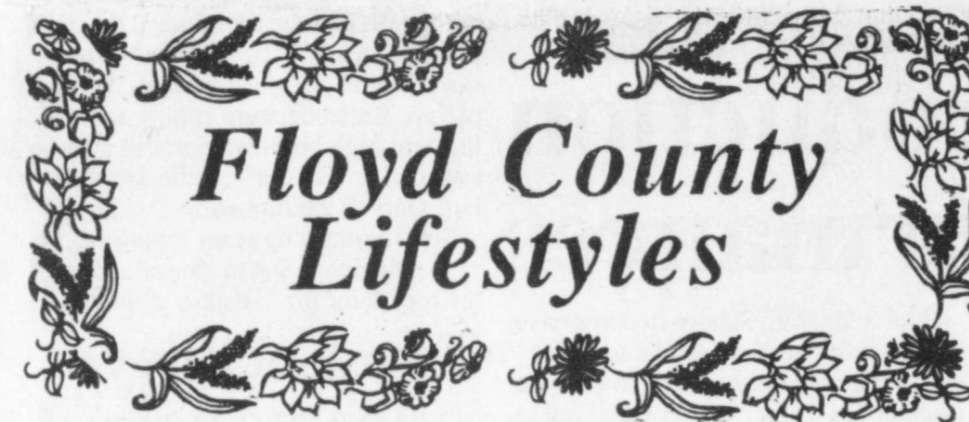

Food safety strategies for backyard cooking

There's something about spring and summer seasons that brings out the backyard chef in even those who don't normally like to cook. But cooking out requires extra precaution to prevent foodborne illness.

Grilling carefully also can prevent excessive smoke and charring that may be unhealthy. To keep your cookouts both safe and fun, follow these simple tips in proper food preparation and grilling:

Select high quality fresh meat, poultry, or seafood products for the best results in outdoor grilling.

Keep meat products at a temperature of 40 degrees Fahrenheit or less until right before grilling. Thaw frozen meat products in the refrigerator—not at room temperature. At room temperatures, the outer layers of meat may reach a temperature that promotes bacterial growth before the inner layers are thawed.

Keep marinating foods in the refrigerator. Do not use leftover marinade as a sauce on cooked meat. Marinade may contain bacteria from raw meat that could contaminate cooked meat.

Always wash your hands before and after working with raw meat or poultry. Handle raw foods and cooked foods separately.

Wash work surfaces and cutting boards thoroughly with hot, soapy water before and after preparing meat for

Drowning is leading cause of rural deaths

Farm and rural families have busy lives, but they also have many leisure opportunities. However, accidents sometimes intrude to spoil the fun. Thousands are hurt and hundreds killed in rural recreational mishaps.

"During the hot summer months, drowning is the leading cause of recreation-related deaths," Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said. "According to the National Safety Council, swimming or boating are the usual activities contributing to drownings, though many victims fall into the water unintentionally."

Most people should be able to swim or at least float. Nonswimmers should stay out of deep water and walk with care around docks, pools, or ponds. Both swimmers and nonswimmers should be encouraged to wear personal flotation devices while in boats.

And whether it's the local swimming pool or small farm pond, swimming areas should be equipped with a "rescue station." This should include a flotation device, such as a ring buoy or inner tube, a rope and a long pole. Include instructions for mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and where to go for help.

Other water safety rules that should be observed include:

Don't swim alone or let small children go swimming without adult supervision, even in shallow water.

Keep swimming places clean and free of debris. Fence your pool or pond.

If someone in the water is in trouble, act quickly. Throw anything that floats. Do no attempt a hand-to-hand rescue unless you are a strong swimmer trained in rescue techniques.

Make sure your boat is seaworthy. Never overload a boat. In small boats, encourage passengers to stay seated and not move around.

Encourage all boat passengers to wear personal flotation devices and have a throwable personal flotation device available for emergency use.

"Medical help usually takes longer to reach the scene of an accident in isolated rural areas; therefore it is a good practice for farmers, their families and their employees to be trained in first-aid and to be prepared if an accident occurs," Perry said.

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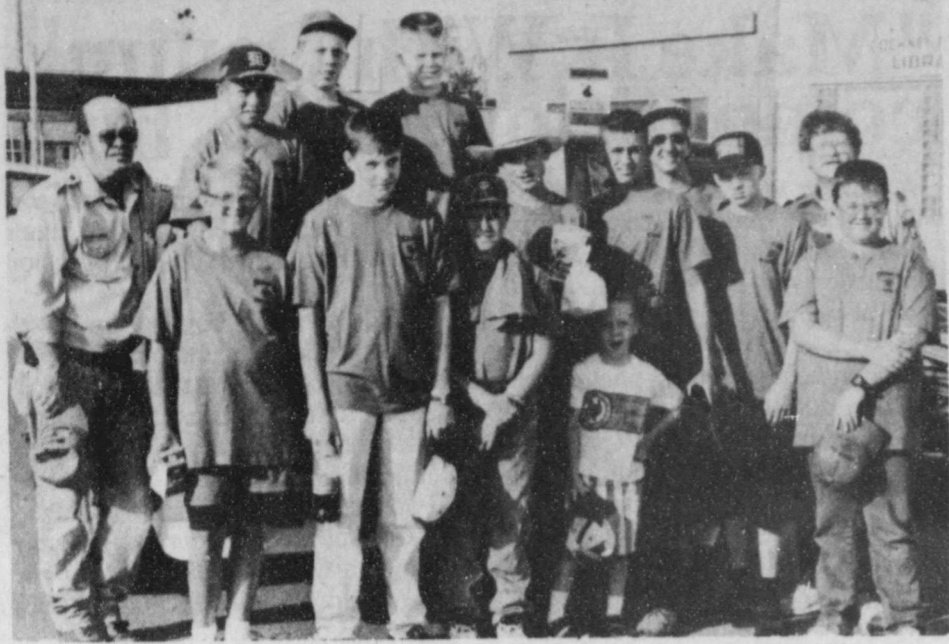

P.I.E. has also been invited to participate in a special government-funded program to bring scholarship students from the Newly Independent States of the former Soviet Union to the United States. P.I.E. is a non-profit educational organization that has sponsored more than 18,000 students from 23 countries since its founding in 1975. HELP WANTED

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Forms for failed acreage credit must be filed at ASCS office

For failed acreage credit, forms ASCS-574, (Application for Disaster Credit), and ASCS-578, (Report of Acreage), must be filed within 15 days after disaster conditions affect a farm. These two forms must be filed in the ASCS Office, and in inspection of the acreage performed before acreages are plowed up, destroyed, or grazed out. Crops will not be considered planted, or

eligible for ASCS benefits if the proper records are not established in this office. Appraisal of program crops can be performed for a nominal fee. Prevented Planting must also be filed within 15 days of the final considered planting date in the county. It can only be approved if other similar farms and crops were prevented from being planted.



SIDERS' SIDELINES

Recently, I have had several calls on "dying trees." Few situations have been disease or insect related, most have been weather. We have had two dry winters and two dry summers. Twenty year old tree planting that have had little water are burning up. So if you start having tree problems, do not be surprised. Some of us have been getting away with less than proper tree care, but this kind of weather will expose us in a hurry. You cannot "mess up" even once, because one dry time hurts a tree for a long time. Watering trees in a basin around the trunk is only effective for about the first two years. As the tree enlarges, the water should be placed beyond the "dripline" edge of the branches. If hoses are allowed to run slowly by the trunks of large trees, the water is just wasted. Evergreens like pines and junipers have their needles or leaves all winter. If it gets hot in the afternoon, they pump water to their leaves to cool off. Evergreens that do not get water during warm


dry periods will be damaged and lose many roots. Evergreens usually do not wilt to tell you they are in trouble. They just turn gray-green and then turn brown. Another tree note-avoid planting trees and shrubs during the heat of the summer. When it cools off in September or October would be a much better time.

Cotton Update
Some recommendations that producers may want to consider at this time:
Keep irrigation moving rapidly, 7 day cycle in sprinklers and if possible also in alternate turjrow irrigation. A frequent irrigation cycle will minimize water deficit stress induced boll shed.
Avoid cultivating pivot irrigated fields during bloom, roots are very shallow and do not adequately regrow during the bloom period.
Check the depth of moisture to anticipate when the field may enter stress. Use this guide to any additional expenditures for PIX™ or nitrogen.

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Texas Department of Agriculture offering pesticide safety training session in Floydada

Farm workers who want to learn more about pesticide safety are invited to a free Texas Department of Agriculture training session Thursday, July 28 in Floydada. This training provides farm workers the information they need to work safely around chemicals and treated areas. Workers completing the training also receive certification in pesticide safety. The training is scheduled for 7 p.m. at the Floydada Migrant Council Head Start, 702 North 2nd Street. Workers will have an opportunity to ask TDA employees questions during the training session, which lasts about one hour. "Texas is a pioneer in farm safety programs," Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said. "This training allows farm workers to keep up to date on the latest information about pesticides and safe ways of handling them." Workers will have an opportunity to learn more about the Texas Agricultural Hazard Communication Act, more commonly known as the Right-to-Know law, which serves to protect farm workers when they work with pesticides. Under this law, administered by TDA, workers must be advised about the chemicals they are working around, pesticide exposure symptoms and ways to guard against contamination. Agricultural employers who use pesticides are encouraged to send their employees to the training, which will also cover the Environmental Protection Agency's new Worker Protection Standard requirements that go into effect January 1, 1995. After taking this one-hour course, participants receive new EPA certification cards verifying that the trainee received both WPS and RTK training that they can present to employers. Plains Cotton Growers approve budget and select committees for 1994-95

Board members of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers unanimously approved a new operating budget for the 25-county producers organization at its July 13 Directors meeting in Lubbock. The PCG Board approved a budget totaling \$319,950 for Fiscal Year 1994-95, which began July 1. In presenting board members with the recommendations of the PCG Finance Committee, Chairman Don Langston congratulated the PCG staff for trimming approximately \$25,000 from budgeted expenditures during the previous year.

In addition to approving the new operating budget PCG Board Members also heard reports on the status of PCG's two ongoing projects: The High Plains Boll Weevil Control Program and the Plains Cotton Improvement Program. Reports were also given detailing the status of several important pieces of agricultural legislation by PCG President Frank Jones and Executive Vice-President Donald Johnson. Among the topics discussed were Federal Crop Insurance Reform, the Plant Variety Protection Act and the USDA Reorganization Bill.

Members of the 1994-95 Executive Committee are: PCG President Frank Jones, Vice-President Jackie Burris, Secretary-Treasurer Don Langston, Board Chairman Wayne Huffaker, and Past President Larry Nelson. District Representatives on the PCG Executive Committee are as follows: District 1 - Mark Williams, Parmer County; District 2 - No member selected; District 3 - Dan B. Smith, Floyd County; District 4 - Benny Robertson, Dickens County;

most recent Past Presidents and four members elected from the PCG Board. Current PCG officers are not eligible to serve on the Nominating Committee. The PCG Executive Committee is made up of the current PCG Officer corps, the two most recent Past Presidents and one member selected from each of PCG's six districts. Nominating committee members for 1994-95 are: PCG Chairman Wayne Huffaker, Past Presidents Larry Nelson and Steve Verett, Castro County Director Kevin Riley, Hale County Director Ronnie Hopper, Lubbock County Director Rex McKinney, and Dawson County Director Lloyd Cline.

"Right now there are several important pieces of legislation being considered by Congress that will have a significant effect on the manner in which farmers are allowed to do business and the manner in which USDA farm programs are delivered," says PCG President Frank Jones. "Farmers and agribusiness people across the High Plains have a vested interest in the outcome of the many legislative issues currently being considered."

The Board of Directors and staff of Plains Cotton Growers are dedicated to serving the interests of the High Plains Cotton Industry, adds Jones. Without such an organization the High Plains cotton industry would not have a way to ward off potentially damaging new legislation or overly burdensome new regulations. In other business, the PCG Board approved President Frank Jones to represent the organization at the upcoming National Cotton Council, Cotton Incorporated, and Cotton Board Caucus to be held in Dallas on August 5. Rounding out action taken by the PCG Board was the selection of new members to the PCG Nominating and Executive Committees. According to PCG Bylaws the nominating committee is composed of the organization's three

U.S. Fish and Wildlife proposal would affect many

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said that a meeting convened by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for all federal agencies concerning water use from the Edwards Aquifer should have never happened. "How Central Texans plan their water use from the Edwards Aquifer is a matter to be decided by Central Texans - not by bureaucrats from Washington, D.C., and not by bureaucrats from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service," Perry said. "This is a state matter and it should be left to the state of Texas to address."

At the meeting federal agencies were asked to begin to develop a water management plan for themselves and their constituents. "I think the eyes of people were opened at the meeting, where it was made clear that not just the City of San Antonio and not just agriculture are impacted by this plan," Perry said. "When a Veterans Affairs hospital has to do an environmental impact study just to add toilet something clearly has gone wrong with our system."
