We herewith quote his recent column, which was written for Harris News Service, and recently printed in our Texas Press Association's monthly bulletin. He says some things a number of newspaper people have felt for some time:

"Dan Rather is not a newsmen. Neither are his counterparts on other networks. They are celebrities, showmen, or entertainers who read news reports. Behind the scenes, there are hundreds of reporters digging out the news and feeding them.

The TV folks who poke microphones into the face of interviewees and ask inane questions are not newsmen. Neither are the camera men and tape-recorder carriers who push and shove and jockey for position in the milling crowd.

Radio broadcasters who lift news stories out of newspapers aren't newsmen. Neither are the disk jockeys or ad salesmen who rip paper off news wires and breathlessly read the latest headlines on the air. Of course, I'm not saying all radio broadcasters do this, but many of them do.

But the public confuses these people with newsmen. They lump them all together and label them the "press." Or they toss all newspeople into one pile called "media."

The difference between the electronic media and the press remains unappreciated by an indifferent public. The definition of media should be confined to electronics. The press should be defined only as print journalism.

To put the two in the same bed tarnishes one with the image of the other. Print journalists look down their noses at the media even though they themselves often are mistakenly called the media.

True news reporters don't shove microphones in the face of victims and ask them how it feels to hurt. They don't clutter the scene with massive cameras, floodlights and tangled wires. They don't attract crowds or create riots or spontaneous demonstrations with their presence.

True newsmen work quietly behind the scenes with little or no recognition. They don't thrust themselves into the story. They don't insist that the cameras focus on them as they work.

Yet a portion of the public ill-will toward the press stems from the stigma of the electronic crowd, especially television. The public has failed to separate the press from the media.

But (with some exceptions) they are two distinctly different creatures. One, a glittering, show-biz, superficial media; the other, a quiet, unglamorous, dedicated press.

Don't get me wrong. The Dan Rathens may have been newsmen. Walter Cronkite was once a hardworking UPI reporter.

But once they hit the shimmering air waves of TV tinsel-town, they became wealthy entertainers playing the ratings game.

They transformed themselves into objects of press coverage, with almost no kinship to print journalism."

Flaw Discovered At Land Site

Senate, Congress Races In Runoff

The battle for the United States Senate nomination will highlight the Democratic runoff election on Saturday. There are four races on the Democratic ballot, and one on the Republican ballot.

Congressman Kent Hance continues his quest for the U.S. Senate seat to be vacated by Senator John Tower, meeting state senator Lloyd Doggett in the runoff.

This has been a hard-fought race, after Hance edged Doggett by less than a percentage point of the votes

statewide on May 5. The larger cities have been the main battleground in the runoff election, and the Hance backers have accused Doggett of a mud-slinging campaign.

Hance's efforts in the race were helped at mid-week by the announcement by the third major candidate in the May primary, Bob Krueger, that he endorses the Dimmitt native. Also, Congressman Jack Hightower of Childress came out in favor of Hance.

Other races on the Democratic ballot include the race for U.S. Congress, where Don Richards and Thomas M. Richards are the candidates.

Former Hance aide Don Richards led the voting in May, but did not get an overall majority. He carried Friona and Parmer County by a wide margin.

Democrats will also make choices for two spots on the Court of Criminal Appeals. Trying for the place 2 nomination are incumbent W.C. (Bill) Davis and challenger Roy E. Greenwood.

Candidates for place 3 on the court are Thomas B. (Tom) Thorpe, and challenger Bill White.

The only race on the Republican ballot is for the congressional seat, where Larry Combest, Lubbock wholesaler and former aide to Senator John Tower, and Ron Fleming, Lubbock CPA, are after their party's nomination.

Hance Needs Big Turnout

Congressman Kent Hance, who was given overwhelming support by the voters of Parmer County in the May primary, is needing at least as many votes in the June 2 runoff, if he is to take the nomination from his liberal opponent.

Hance received over 90 per cent of the county's votes in the May 5 primary, and his totals went as high as 94.5 per cent at Friona, and 100 per cent in the Rhea voting box.

It behooves everyone who voted for Hance in the primary to return to the polls this Saturday, and those who did not vote the first time around can still help his cause.

Hance's opponent is Lloyd Doggett of Austin, termed a "super liberal, who is promising more of everything to those who feed at the public trough."

Doggett is heartily endorsed by labor union bosses, feminists, militant teachers' organizations, nuclear freeze advocates, and some consumer, environmental and minority activists.

Hance has achieved a solid record of achievement in the public interest, and his record in congress is an outstanding one. However, he will not be able to continue this good record unless his supporters match the get-out-the-vote effort of the special interest groups.

It has been stated that the hardest-fought local runoffs on June 2, the ones that normally result in heavy balloting, are in areas where Doggett is favored.

However, Hance surprised the experts with his razor-thin margin in the six-man field on May 5, having been touted to finish out of the money.

Let's everyone vote in the runoff election Saturday--and once again lend a good neighbor a helping hand.

And, while we're at it, voters need to finish the job they started on May 5, by voting for Don Richards for the Congressional nomination.

Don's opponent in the runoff, Thomas Richards, has further confused the name-identification issue during the past month by attempting to hang a "liberal" label on Don Richards.

However, those of us who know Don Richards know him to be the type of person who would represent this area well--in the same mold as Kent Hance.

So remember, DON is the "right Richards" for the job, when you vote in the runoff election on Saturday.

Polling Sites Given

Polling places for the Democratic runoff June 2 were announced this week by Richard Collard, County Democratic party chairman. The polls are as follows:

Precinct 1 (Black) Old Tri-County Elevator office; Precinct 2: Friona Junior High; Precinct 2-1: Friona High School; Precinct 2-2: Friona Community Center; Precinct 3: American Legion Hall, Bovina; Precinct 4: County Courtroom, Farwell; Precinct 5: Lazbuddie High School; Precinct 6: Oklahoma Lane Community Center; Precinct 7: Rhea Community Center; Precinct 8: Dee Willard residence.

The precinct conventions will be held at 2 p.m. at each place.

In the Republican primary, voters in Precinct 1 and 2 will vote at Reeve Chevrolet-Olds.

Polls are open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Saturday, election day.

"We knew that America was big, but we didn't know how big until we came to Friona," Okamoto said. He was impressed by the flat country, and the straightness of our roads.

Although the Okamotos had planned their trip for quite some time, they almost had to cancel due to his business conflicts. But at the last minute, he was able to re-schedule an item, so the couple could visit their daughter in America.

Okamoto is in the export industry in Japan, dealing with the manufacturing and exporting of items dealing with the shipping industry.

Of all the exchange students Friona has had, it is believed that the Okamotos are the first parents to visit their child while the student was still here. They were introduced at the FHS commencement exercises.

In reflecting back over her year in Friona, Masayo said she had made a lot of friends while she had been here, and would miss them--the students and teachers at Friona High School.

They were very impressed with Friona during their short visit. "I believe that Friona should be the best place for people to live and stay," Okamoto stated.

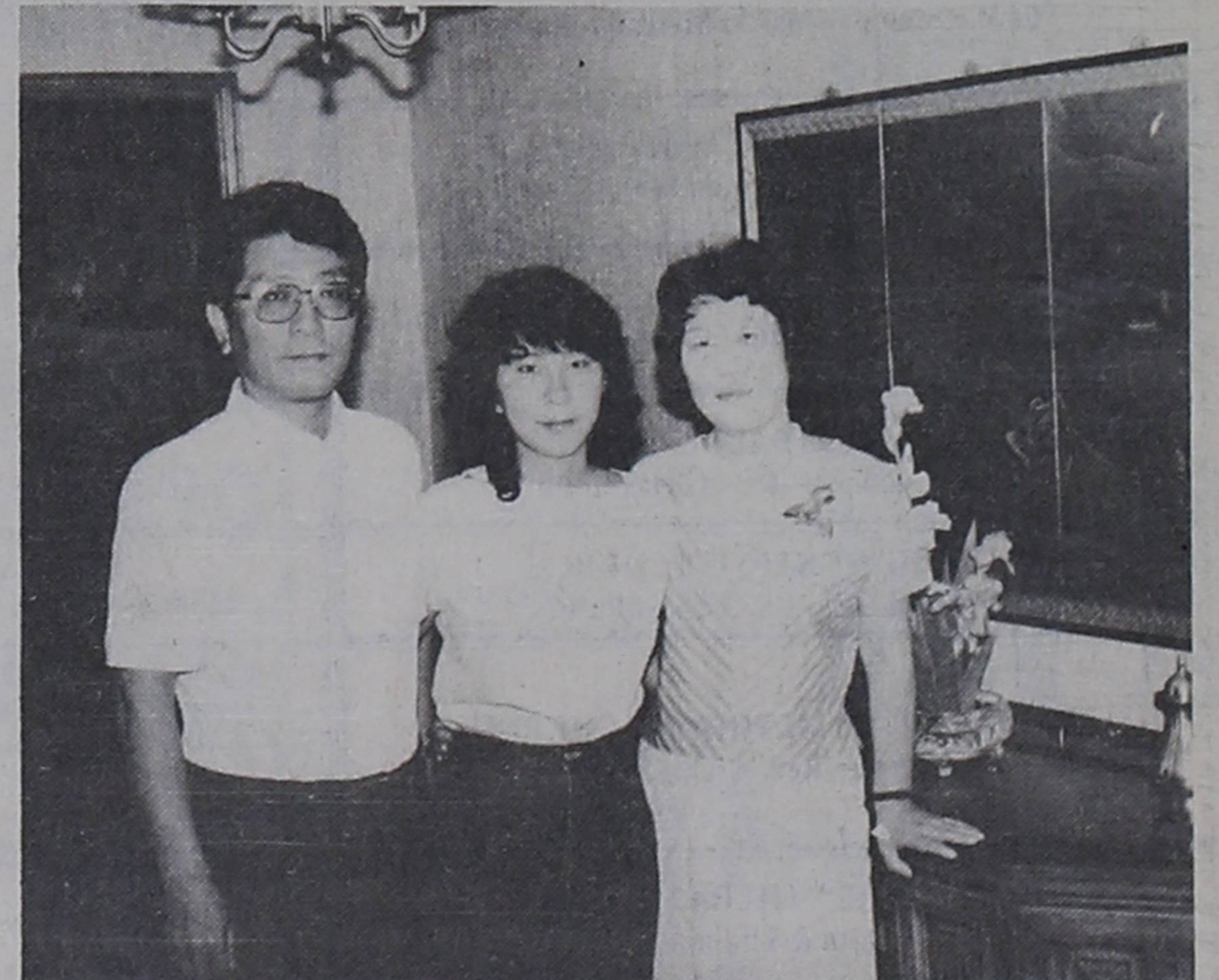
Prior to their coming here, the family said that their ideas about what Texas might be like had come mainly from movies, so this was somewhat distorted.

City Gets Sales Tax

The City of Friona received its monthly sales tax check this week from the state comptroller's office, in the amount of \$13,529.61.

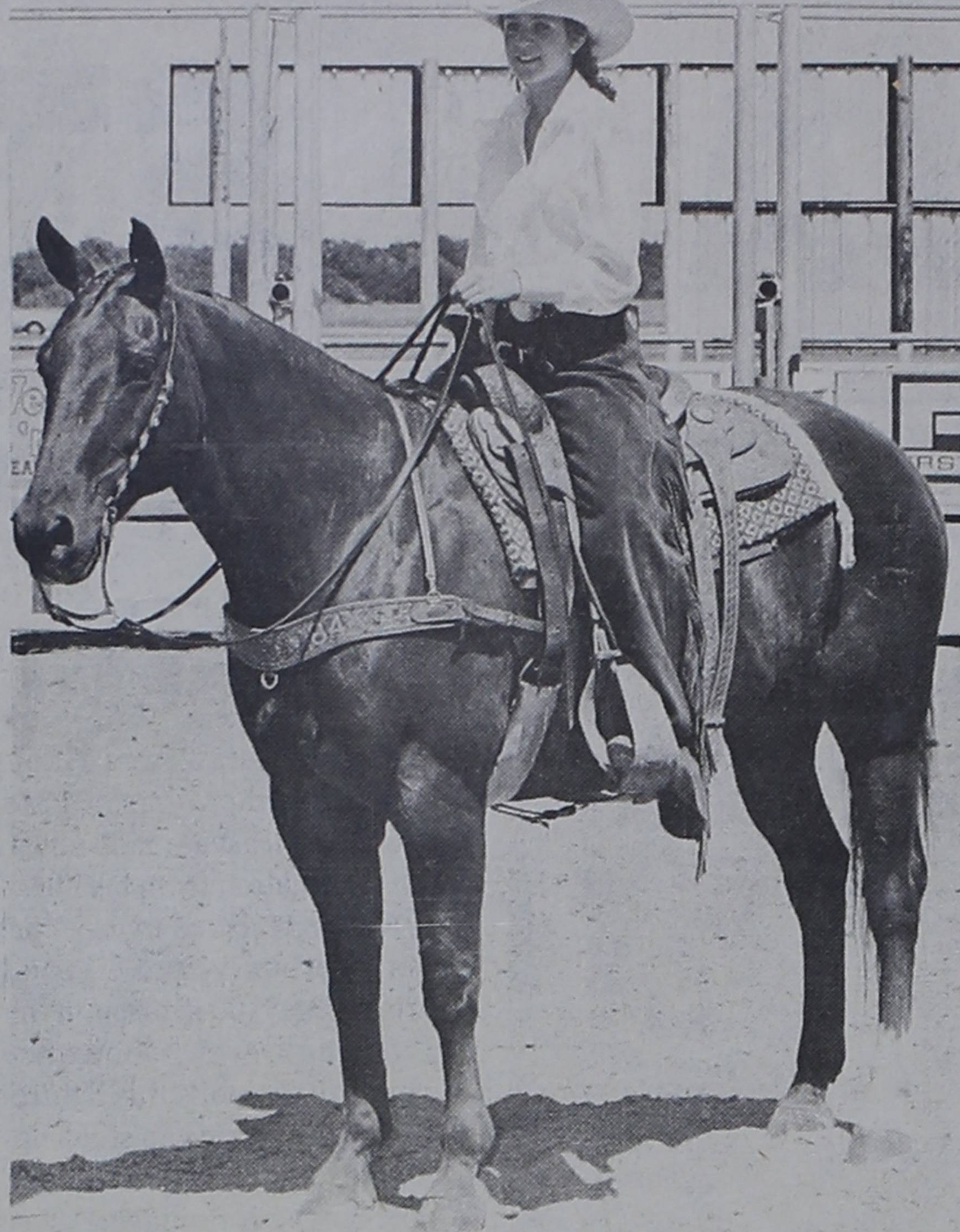
The receipts reflected sales made during March, and completed the first quarter of 1984 in receipts.

The check amount for Friona was down \$3,178.01 from the same month a year ago. However, for the first quarter, the city had received a total of \$43,902.73, and this is an increase of \$1,861.38 over the total of \$42,041.35 (4.43 per cent) for the first quarter of 1983.

Parmer County's total receipts from the March sales period (Friona-Bovina-Farwell) totalled \$20,510.06, down from the \$24,352.37 for the same month a year earlier. The county's total for the year now stands at \$65,213.80, up 3.38 per cent from the \$63,083.92 which had been received at this point in 1983.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said that statewide, the payments are running 12.5 per cent ahead of last year's figures. "And, for the first time this year, we can say that virtually all of this increase came from growth in tax collections and not from the changes in our bookkeeping the legislature made when they moved up the due dates for the sales tax last year," Bullock said.

For the current period, Bullock mailed checks totaling \$98.5 million in local sales tax payments to 988 cities which levy the one per cent tax. This is an average of almost \$100,000 per city, helped along by a check for \$17.9 million to Houston, the state's largest city.

At the present rate, the building will soon be ready for occupancy. So far, it is only conjecture as to what line of business will occupy the building.

45 YEARS AGO--MAY 26, 1939

E.W. Boedecker, principal of Friona High School, announces that the coveted Reader's Digest Award for scholastic achievement has been won by the valedictorian of the class of 1939, Martin Todd.

Dan Ethridge has had the north half of the office which he has occupied for the past two years handsomely decorated and has his office arranged there. The other half has been leased by Smiley Fulks for his cafe, which has been in several years located in the O.G. Turner building on Main Street, two doors north of the Friona State Bank.

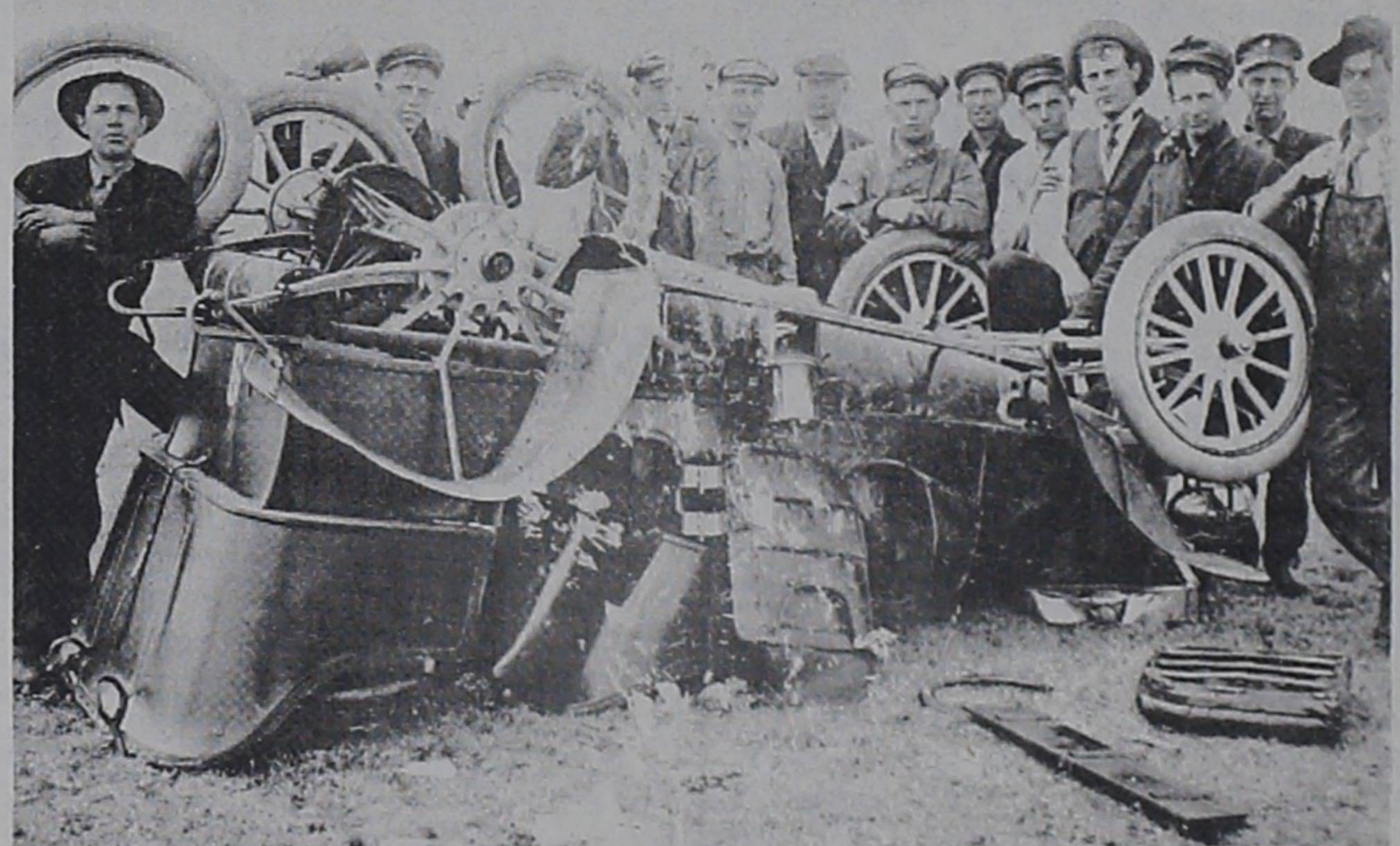

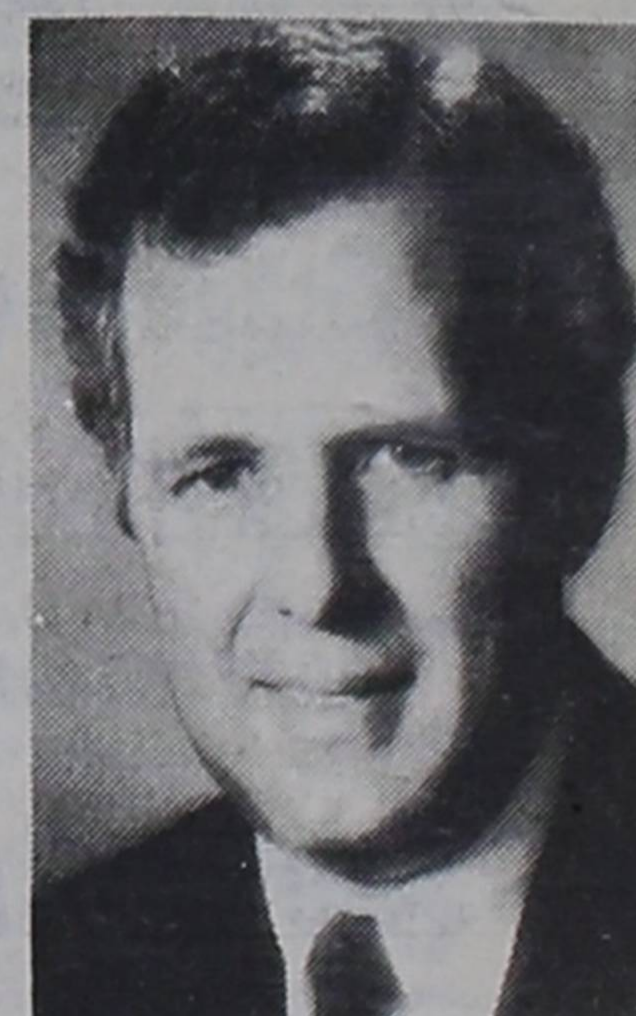

CONTACTS AND PERIPHERAL VISION
QUESTION: I can see straight ahead with my glasses
 with no problem. However, they tend to disturb by
 peripheral vision. Would contact lenses help improve
 this problem?
ANSWER: When someone is looking at a handsome
 old tree in a stand of pines, he's not just seeing the tree.
 He's seeing part of the forest, too. That is, if he has
 normal vision or corrective contact lenses. If you wear
 glasses and look straight ahead, you get the full straight-
 ahead view. If you want to see things to the left or right
 you have to turn your head to see them clearly. Contact
 lenses provide peripheral vision without the obstruction
 of eyeglass frames. All you have to do is move your
 eyes. That's where the contact lenses rest. As your eyes
 move, so do your contacts.

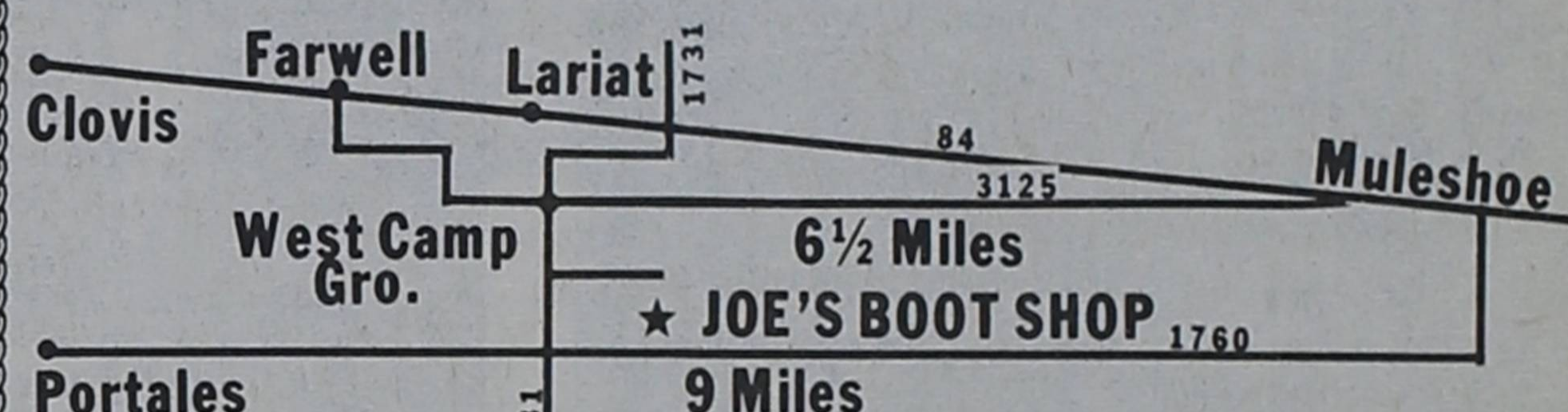

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by 1983 adverse weather conditions are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Farwell, FmHA county supervisor Billy R. Boling said today.

Parmer County is one of 67 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

Boling said farmers may be eligible for loans up to 80 per cent of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrowed is five per cent; interest rate is eight per cent on the balance borrowed over that amount. For farmers who can obtain commercial credit but who choose to borrow from FmHA, the interest rate is 13.74 per cent.

farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens, and to farming partnerships, corporations, or cooperatives in

which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Farwell is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30-percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan, Boling said. Farmers participating in the PIK or federal crop insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until December 4, 1984, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly carry over into the new farming season, Boling said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on

Seright is employed by the national firm of Main Hurdman, Certified Public Accountants as a tax specialist.

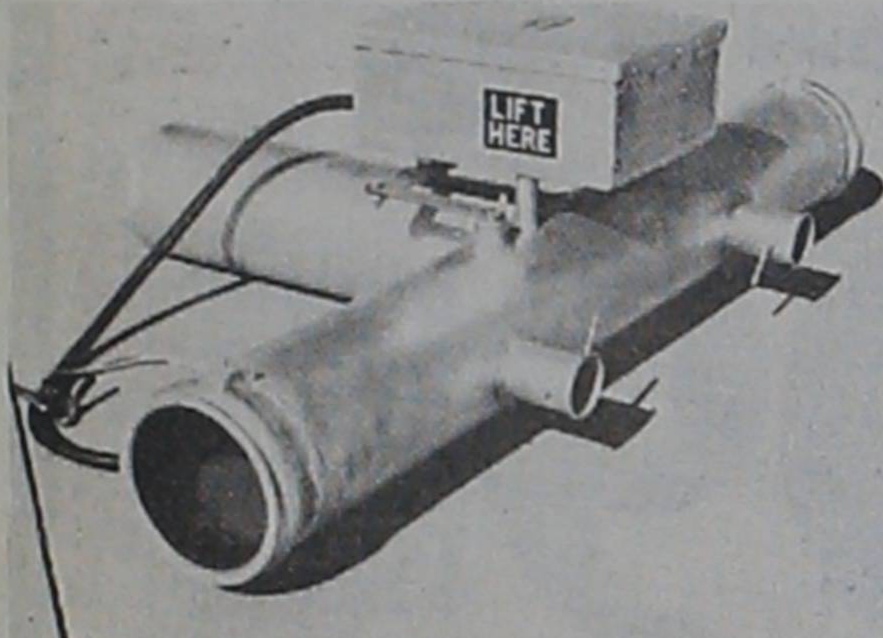

Bullock Says Estimate Good

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that if and when there is a special session of the State Legislature, his estimate of available revenues will not change.

Bullock predicted last year the current state budget of \$30.9 billion would leave \$15 million available for spending at the end of the budget period running September 1, 1983 through August 31, 1985.

"Today, with eight months of actual experience in this budget

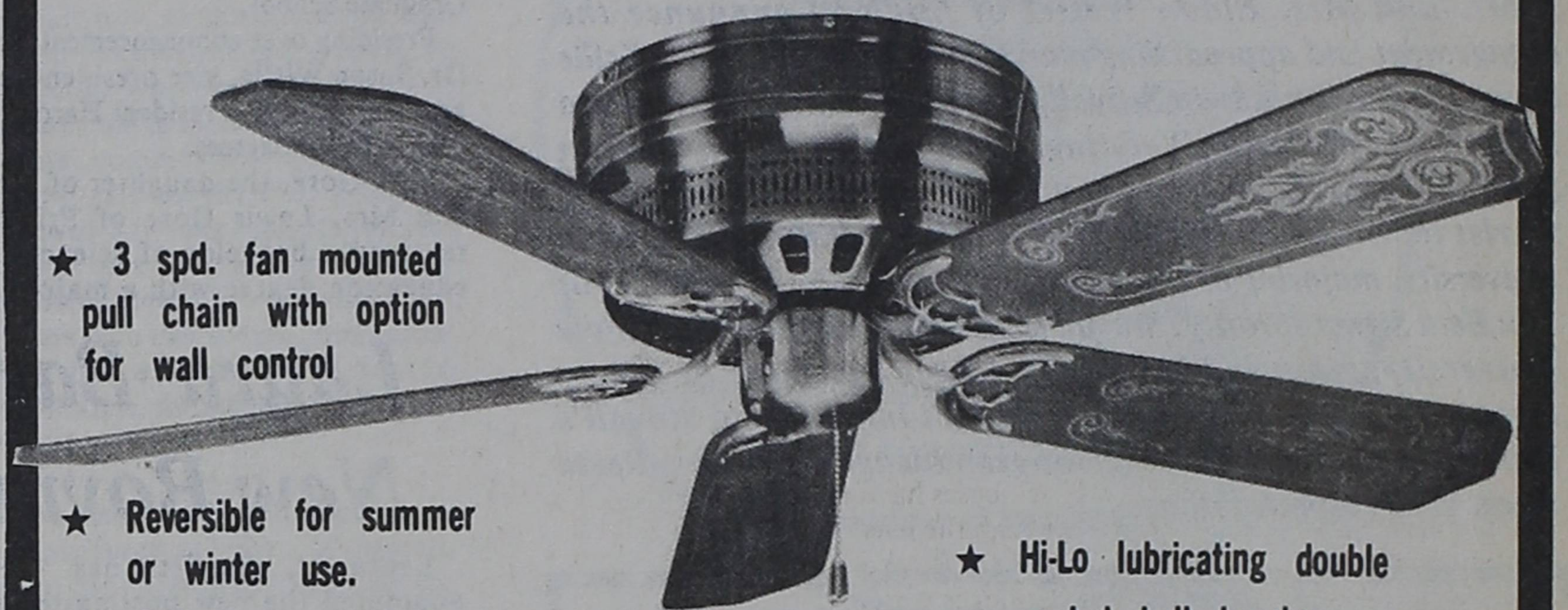
period, actual revenues are running within four-tenths of one per cent of what we estimated," Bullock said. "That means there is absolutely no reason for me to adjust the bottom line up or down."

"Fifteen million dollars isn't much, compared to the price tags attached to the spending proposals being talked about. Every education reform package proposed so far will cost more than a billion dollars. That

means every nickel of spending over \$15 million will be followed by a tax increase as surely as night follows day.

"And, even if our lawmakers do pass a tax bill in a special session, it will only be a dress rehearsal for the grand finale next January. That's when the Legislative Budget Board says we'll need at least another \$2 billion just to maintain state government services at their present level."

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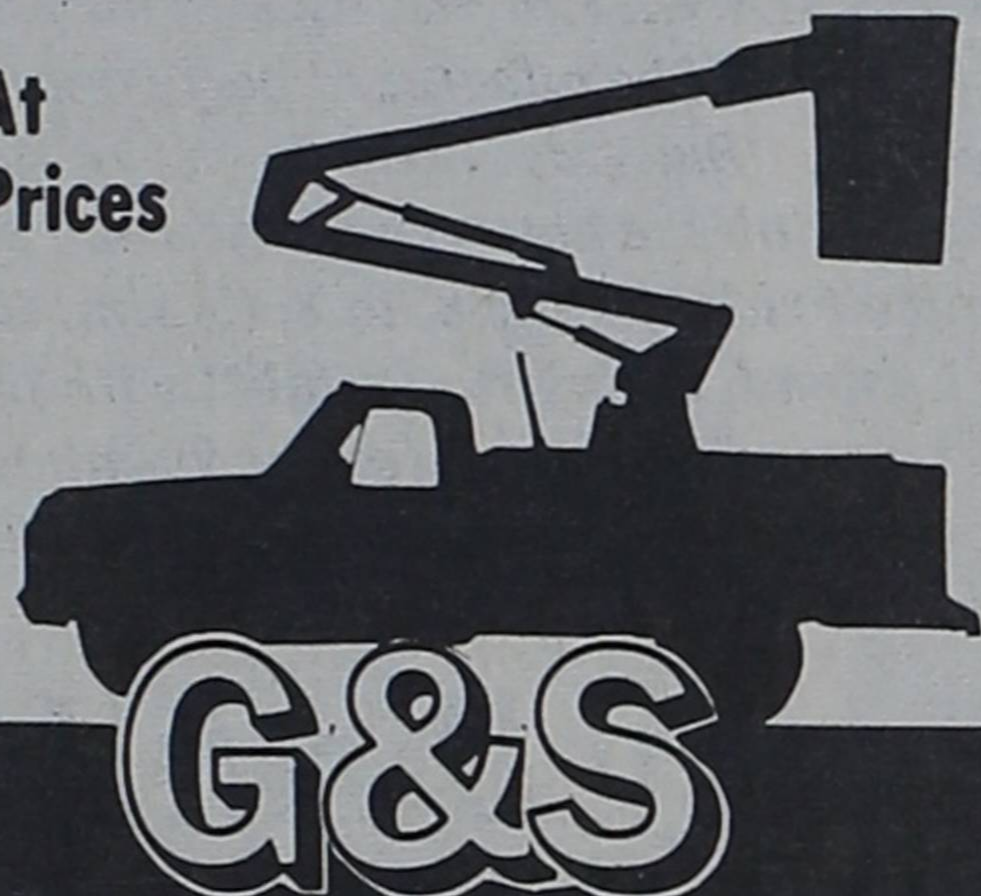

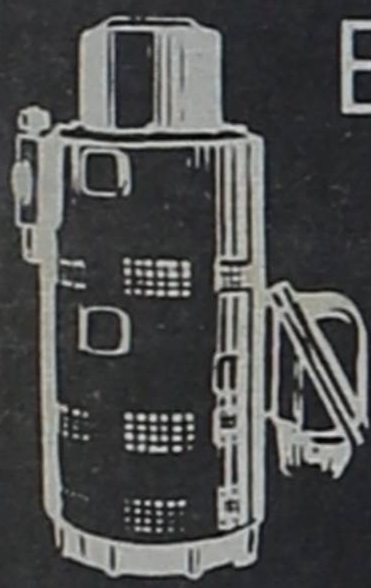
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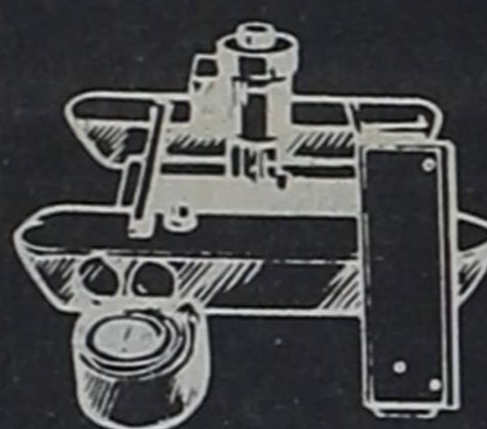

Eye Openers

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THE FASCINATING HISTORY OF EYECARE-PART VIII

Many important technical developments in the eyecare world were happening in the late 1930's. The most significant development occurred in 1936, when Dr. William Feinbloom created the first contact lens made of plastic. During that same year a Philadelphia company developed a tough plastic for aircraft windows and soon contact lenses were being made with it. Modern plastic contact lenses have been improved greatly. They will allow oxygen to pass through the lens to the cornea. Contact lenses made out of these new materials are called oxygen-permeable.

By 1938 all of the Optometric Colleges were teaching courses in the fitting of contact lenses. In 1939, Dr. Reuben Greenspoon, used tinted contacts to change actor Henry Hull's eyes from brown to blue for the MGM movie "Miracles for Sale?" Plastic eyeglass lenses did not fare as well. Introduced in 1937, they proved to be of such poor quality that they were pulled off the market.

After World War II, eyeglass fashions changed dramatically. Plastic frames abounded. Women wore them in many colors, but men still preferred imitation tortoise plastic frames. Aviator style sunglasses were by far the most popular (the type issued to our aviators during the war). Rimless eyeglasses were beginning to lose out in favor of the other styles. By 1948 American manufacturers were making high quality optical glass and good quality plastic lenses. The harlequin lens shape became popular with the ladies in the mid-1940's and remained popular until the late 1950's.

It was during the 1950's that eyeglass wearers were given advice on selecting eyewear to flatter facial features, skin tone and hair color. People wanted to have several pairs of glasses to wear with different clothes and for different occasions. Even men were affected. President Harry Truman wore three different frame styles during his years in office.

Dealing With Old Age Is Matter Of 'Practice'

Every May we salute older Americans--their achievements, wisdom, courage and strength--but what really makes a person "old" in this era of increasing longevity?

Time Magazine quotes comedian George Burns, now 88, as saying, "A lot of people practice getting old. They start practicing when they're 70, and when they're 75, they're a hit. They've made it. They are now old."

Burns then added, "Who wants that?"

More than 1,000 Texans aged 55 and over who work for the Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb program certainly don't want that. One of the myths accompanying the "65 is old" myth is that older persons are simply not productive. Yet these Green Thumbers, who work with non-profit organizations in 111 counties, prove daily that their dependability is very good relative to other age groups, and that their capacity to be productive is high.

"Green Thumb workers have decided not to practice being old," said Green Thumb State Director Diane Parrish. "They've decided to

practice staying active instead. Medical and social advances have given us longer lives; why waste those extra years when there are so many contributions to be made?"

According to Robert Butler of the National Institute of Aging, there's been a 26 year gain in life expectancy in just the last 80 years, which has given the nation a population of 26 million people over the age of 65.

In previous centuries, a person in his 30s could look old and be old because of disease. Now, people are living longer and looking younger. Experts feel that we have not really extended the inherent life span, which is probably genetically determined--we have simply improved our chances of survival to enjoy the full extent of that life span.

Today, 83 per cent of newborn babies will live into their 60's compared with one-third just 150 years ago. What's more, the over-65 age group is increasingly vigorous and healthy. Older people are working longer and taking better care of themselves than ever before.

New Program Begins At Area Colleges

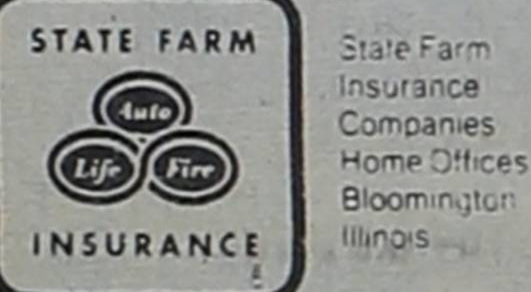
by the Job Training Partnership Act.

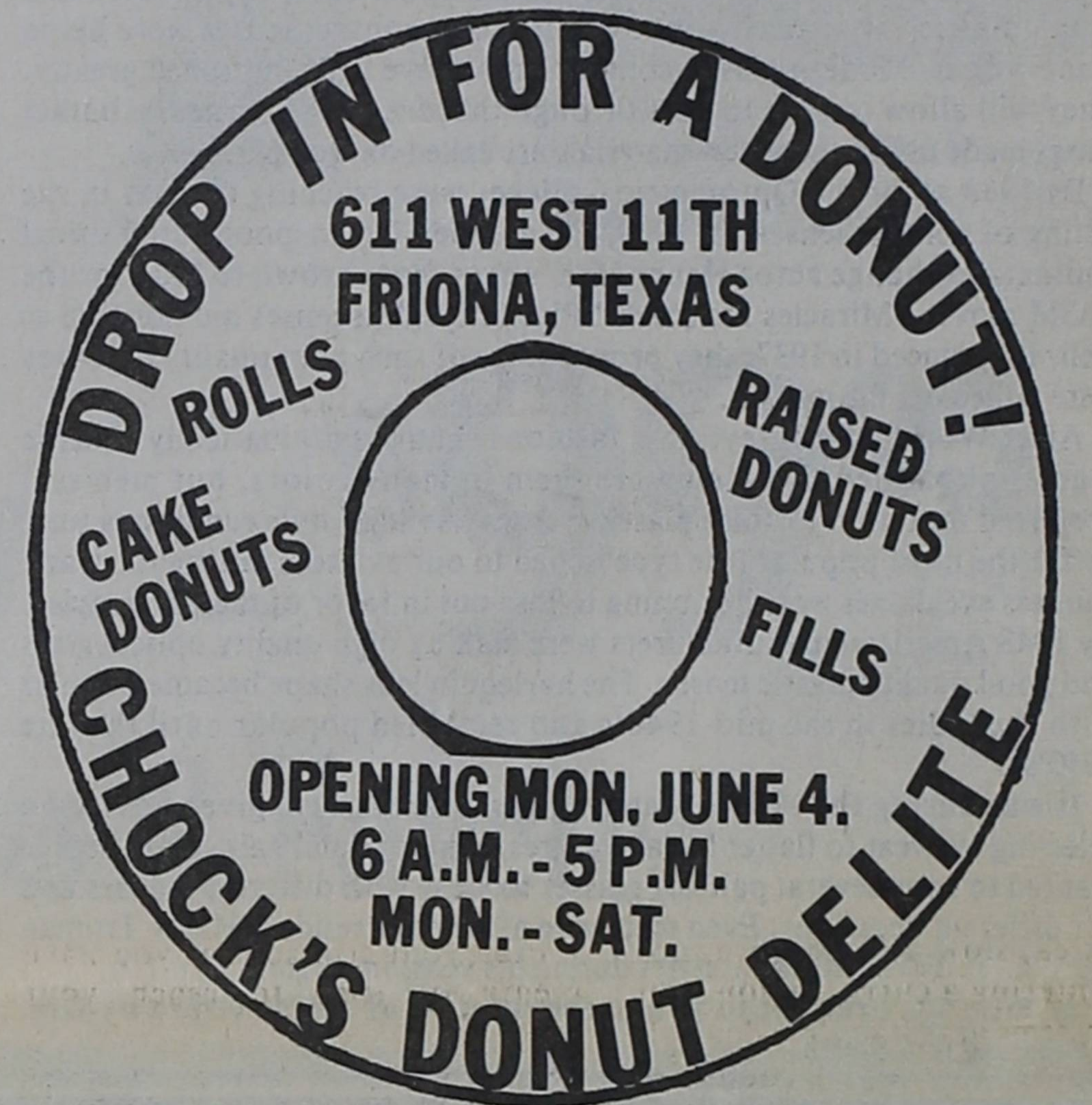

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County Among Those Brucellosis-Free

About one-third of the counties in Texas--76 to be exact--are free of brucellosis, figures from the Texas Animal Health Commission reveal.

Most of the counties free of the disease are in the Class B Area of Texas, which contains 141 counties in the western half of the state. In Class B, there are 72 counties free of brucellosis, which is more than half of the Class B Area.

Four counties are free of the disease in the Class C Area which is the eastern half of the state made up of 113 counties. The four counties free of the disease in Class C are Marion, Newton, McMullen and Jim Hogg.

In the Class B Area, there are almost 60,000 cattle herds; of that number only 145 are under quarantine.

In the Class C Area, there are more

than 102,000 herds; of that number 1,710 are under quarantine.

This is a very talented group and the public is invited to attend this free concert.

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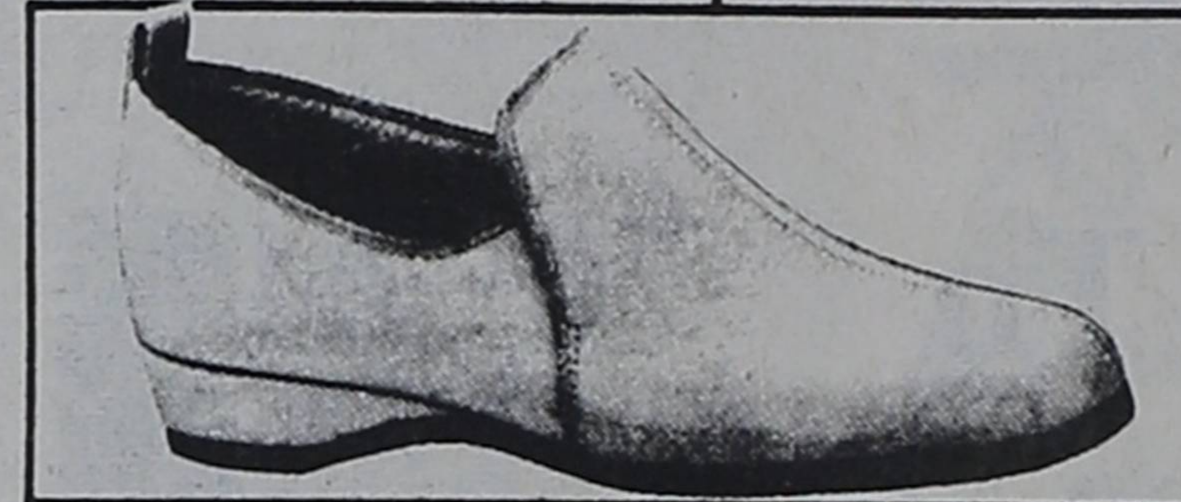
