Floyd and Surrounding Counties Fair opens

LOCKNEY--The Floyd and Surrounding County Fair opens today at 1:00 p.m. and will close Sunday after a four day run. The annual event will be held at the fairgrounds east of Lockney and admission is free.

The building will be filled with exhibits, food, entertainment and much more. The carnival will be located on the grounds west of the building and tickets for the rides are 75 cents each.

The entry books for all departments and exhibits are open Thursday (today) from 9:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon. Judging of Community Exhibits, Women's Department and the Agriculture Department will begin at 1:00 p.m.

The "Old Time" Auction begins at 7:00 p.m. Thursday. Sam Fortenberry Auctioneers will be selling the many donated items. There is something for everyone.

On Friday the Women's Division of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a Bridge Tournament. The games will start at 10:00 a.m. and continue until 4:00 p.m. There will be a small fee to cover expenses and everyone will be responsible for their own lunch.

At 4:30 the Peddle Pullers Tractor Pull is scheduled in the Entertainment Building. The event is sponsored and conducted by the Cagill, Inc. employees. Winners

of this event will qualify for the State Peddle Pull which will be held in Lockney the last Saturday of August, 1995.

A Gospel Jamboree will finish the Friday events. Entertainment will be provided by "The Perrymans", "Texas Praise" and "Holy Ghost Express". The singing will start at 8:00 p.m.

A Fun Run will kick off Saturday morning at 8:30 a.m. and the 5-K Run at 9:00 a.m.

Registration for the parade will begin at 9:00 a.m., on the west side of D&J Gin. The parade will start at 10:30 a.m. on the south end of Main Street and continue north.

For safety reasons there can be no candy thrown from any float or entry. Anyone doing so will be disqualified.

The Khiva Kart Patrol from Lubbock will be here to entertain parade viewers with their Karts and the danger of children running into their path is great. Parents are asked to see that their children stay out of the street and watch from a safe distance.

The Khiva Kart Patrol represents over one million Shrine Masons in the United States, Canada and Mexico. This outstanding unit has won first place against similar units from 12 other Texas Shrine Temples nine times in the past 12 years, including 1994.

Shriners spend two millions dollars a day in their crippled children hospitals and burn units throughout North America. Their nearest hospitals are the childrens hospital in Houston and the burn hospital in Galveston.

These guys love to ride and do their best to please the crowds. Their youngest rider is 26 and the oldest 63.

After the parade events scheduled are the Tug-O-War at 11:00 a.m. and at 1:00 p.m. the Lamb Classic Show, Trap Shoot, Washer Pitching Contest, Little Miss Pageant, Volleyball Tournament, Team Penning, and the Horseless Rodeo.

The Chuckwagon Supper is at 5:00 p.m. Tickets are \$5.00 per person and there are only a limited number of tickets available. The tickets need to be purchased in advance.

Miss Floyd County will be crowned in a pageant to be held at the Entertainment Building beginning at 6:00 p.m.

Dancing to the Country Nites band will begin at 9:00 p.m. and continue until 1:00 a.m. in the Entertainment Building.

On Sunday the Steer and Heifer Show will begin at 1:00.

At 2:00 p.m. entrants can pick up their exhibits, ribbons and prize money. The theme for this years fair is "The Panhandle's Best Farming, Ranching & Agribusiness."

"Quality" is the key with Ellis

(Editor's Note: Research for the following article, by Texas Tech journalism student Dianna F. Dandridge, was made possible by a grant from the Reader's Digest Foundation.)

Experts stress quality, uniform product and eye appeal in the home canned goods, which will be displayed this week at the Floyd County Fair.

Yreva Mai Ellis of Plainview ought to know. She has been involved with fairs and 4-H for 70 years.

Mrs. Ellis has also served as a county home extension service agent for years.

"When I was young, my father agreed to buy all the glass-topped canning jars that I could fill," Mrs. Ellis remembers.

"That year I filled 350 jars and had 57 different items at the fair," she said. "My first award was in 1937."

Ellis has canned meat - guinea, fish and fowl - as well as the traditional jams, jellies and fresh garden vegetables.

This year, like many years in the past, Mrs. Ellis will judge the products of this year's contestants.

Mrs. Ellis explains that sunspots or other imperfections of table food don't change the nutritional value, but "If you're going to go the trouble to can, then quality products have to be used."

"Quality," Mrs. Ellis said, "can be seen in several ways. The product should always be uniform size and color."

Shaking her head, she adds, "Never use a mayonnaise jar. You'll never get a good seal with that curved rim."

"Other signs of quality are clear, clean liquids and firm fruits. Sediment or flakes will disqualify a jar immediately."

As a judge, Mrs. Ellis has her favorites in all classes.

"Pickles are my favorite. Sweet pickles make pretty jars, and pickled okra adds variety," she said, "but dills are all the same bright color."

Curing dill pickles removes a film from the rind of the cucumber, Mrs. Ellis said, "Sometimes they look like they were put up only yesterday instead of being allowed to age. I can always tell."

Jams, jellies and preserves also catch Ellis' attention and she readily explains the differences.

Jelly, made from the fruit juice, "ought to be so clear that you can read the label on the other side of the jar," she said.

Ellis tests the consistency of jelly by placing a spoonful on the plate and cutting it across the

middle. "If it folds out flat like a book, I consider it to be perfect."

Jam is crushed fruit and must be of a spreadable texture with a color that closely resembles the natural color of the fruit.

Preserves are whole fruit and should look as natural as possible. A stiff or sticky texture means the fruit has been overcooked and loses quality.

Assorted pies, cakes and other baked goods add variety to the display and Mrs. Ellis knows which have been baked with shortening, butter, lard, or butter-flavored Crisco.

According to Ellis, lard makes a grayish pastry, shortening bakes lighter than lard but, it is still gray. "The best is the butter-flavored Crisco," she remarks. "It makes higher, thicker cookies and flakier crusts."

All baked goods must have even coloring and smooth uncracked surfaces. Cakes should have slightly rounded, evenly raised tops.

Displayed items should be pretty and attractive. "If it looks pretty, then I'm interested," Mrs. Ellis said.

Newer, better varieties of produce make for better home-canned goods she notes. "You can only get out the quality that you put in."

Mrs. Ellis explained how canning has changed over the years. "When I first started canning we

used the open kettle method for most of our products and the jars and the lids were glass. They were sealed with a rubber ring and held in place with hinged metal loop."

People use standard, sterilized Mason or Kerr jars and rings today and often add attractive labeling.

Many of today's fruits and vegetables have less acid than in the past. "This makes them taste better as well as being easier to work with," Ellis said.

Mrs. Ellis believes that fewer people are canning because of lack of time. "With both parents working, most younger people find it easier to stop at the store rather than put up their own products." Mrs. Ellis has seen it all.

She lived through the dust bowl era and saw people can anything and everything. Now she is seeing the decline of what was once a lifestyle.

If anyone is interested in home canning, then Mrs. Ellis advises that you should find out as much as possible. Read some books or talk to someone who knows what they are doing.

"Frustration results when people use the trial-and-error method," said Mrs. Ellis.

"Fairs are a good place to find out what a good home canned product looks like and an even better place to find people who do it well," she said.

County discusses funding for paving project

Floyd County Commissioners discussed proposed financing for acquiring the right-of-way on a state paving project in Precinct 3 during their regular session for September. No decision was made at the Monday morning meeting.

Precinct 3 Commissioner George Taylor asked that the commissioners from the other three precincts abide by a Commissioners Court resolution passed in 1963, stating, "The cost of purchasing right-of-way for Farm to Market and

County Roads and maintenance of paved county roads be paid out of the Road and Bridge Fund." According to Taylor, the resolution is still in effect and he asked that the county meet the obligation to secure the right of way for the proposed highway in northeast Floyd County by honoring the resolution as has been the case in the past.

Said Taylor, "Since 1963, Floyd County has had 58 miles of road paved. In each case, Precinct three has paid it's

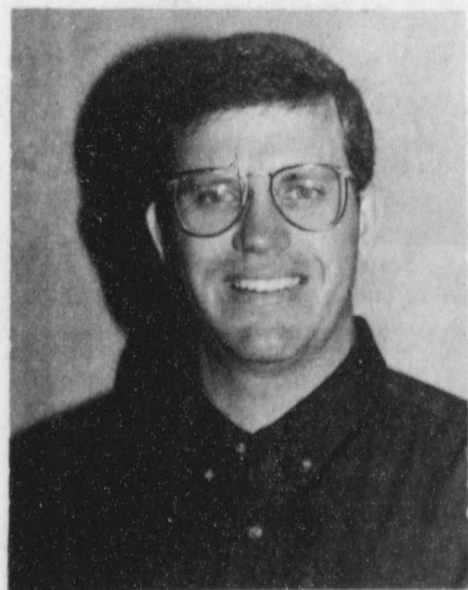
share of the cost, whatever that may have been as the money was withdrawn from the Road and Bridge Fund before money was divided out to the precincts. All I am asking is that the other three precincts pay their share of this project. Of the 58 miles of paving done in Floyd County in the last 30 years, only 6 miles have been in Precinct 3. The rest was in the other three precincts."

In view of the fact that paved road maintenance was taken out of the county

budget a couple of years ago, Taylor suggested allowing \$4,000.00 per

Jon Jones, 34, of Floyd County, declared his intentions Friday, to be a write-in candidate for Commissioner Pct. 4.

Jones will face democratic challenger, Amado Morales, in the November 8 election.

The son of Travis and Gladys Jones, Jon is a native of Floyd County, having been raised on the family farm in the Dougherty community.

After graduating from Floydada High School in 1978, Jon attended West Texas State University. He graduated in 1982 with a degree in Ag Business & Economics.

Jones returned to farming with his father until 1988 when he changed his career objectives and decided to attend mortuary school. Jones completed his

apprenticeship in Abilene in 1990 and then moved to San Antonio to work at Porter Loring Mortuary.

In April of this year, Jon returned home to Floyd County and went back into the farming business with his father, Travis.

"I hope to get out and meet as many people in my precinct as I possibly can," said Jon. "We need to get out the word that if you choose to vote for a write-in candidate you must be sure and write in the candidate's name and check the box beside his name."

"I want the people in Precinct 4 to have a choice and if they choose me, I'll work for all the people in the precinct."

"I won't make promises I can't keep but I will always do the best that I can," said Jon.

Lockney council approves budget

The City Council of Lockney approved a budget for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994 and ending September 30, 1995 during the Thursday, September 8, regular session. Approval was made following the notation that no citizens came to the meeting for a scheduled public hearing concerning the proposed budget. Motion to approve the budget as presented was made by Gary Marr and seconded by Bill Anderson. Voting in favor were Marr, Anderson, J. D. Copeland, and Richard Zavala. Council member Rodger Stapp was not present.

Anderson pointed out that increased revenues in the estimated budget for the water and sewer department were the result of the previously approved rate increase. He said, "This increase, which affects all Lockney residents, allowed the city to continue the same tax rate and not levy another increase in taxes on the local property owners."

The budget as improved, estimates income at \$850,791.50 for the city from all sources. This includes \$83,000.00 in tax and \$24,500.00 in delinquent tax collections, \$38,000.00 from franchise taxes, and \$51,000.00 from sales tax. Other items on the plus side of the balance sheet include \$12,000.00 in interest income, \$2,000.00 in fines, \$3,951.50 from the City Farm, \$9,000.00 from Floyd County, \$11,000.00 from mosquito control, \$363,100.00 from Water and Sewer, \$12,000.00 from the swimming pool, \$113,000.00 from the Sanitation Department, and \$8,240.00 in miscellaneous other income.

Expenses are estimated at \$850,553.38, leaving an estimated balance of \$238.18 in city funds at the end of the next fiscal year. Administrative expenses were calculated at \$114,083.50. Police expenses were placed at \$121,156.00, and Fire expenses at \$36,946.00. Expenditures for streets were set at \$99,100.00, and sani-

tation costs estimated at \$90,150.00. Water and sewer expenses were tabbed at \$237,717.88 and all other items were estimated at \$31,400.00.

Council members voted unanimously to approve the contract with Triple C Sanitation. Motion for approval was made by Anderson, pending a final review of the contract by city attorney Paul Lyle to ascertain that the changes he recommended have been made. The motion was seconded by Copeland. Under the terms of the contract, the city will retain four percent of the total billing each month and 96 percent will be forwarded to Triple C for their services in city trash collection.

Council members agreed to participate in a fund raising venture for the PTA by purchasing a listing on the caricature map of Lockney. The cost was \$115.00 if paid now, saving \$32.00. Hooten told the council that PTA representative Debbie Montandon said that money generated by the project will be utilized in Lockney. Motion to purchase a spot on the cartoon map was made by Marr and seconded by Copeland. All voted in favor.

The council opened a sealed bid on a tax title property, Lot 5, Block 2, Original Addition, Lockney. The bid, \$1.00, made by Wes Day, was for a building and lot in downtown Lockney. After considering the bid, the council elected to reject the bid. Motion to deny the sale was made by Zavala with a second by Anderson. The vote was unanimously in favor of the rejection of the bid.

Payment of monthly bills was unanimously approved on a motion by Anderson and seconded by Copeland. Financial statements for the month of August were reviewed and budget amendments authorized on a motion from Copeland with a second by Anderson. All voted in favor.

Minutes of the previous meetings were read by City Secretary, Charlotte

Hooten, and approved as presented with noted corrections.

Departmental reports included Copeland telling the council that he has secured oral permission from Tommy Hutton to cut weeds on the front section of the Mary Hutton property across the street from City Hall. This will be done to make the area less of an eyesore.

Marr told the council that the city needs to consider purchasing a pressure washer to be used to clean street signs and equipment. The machine would pay for itself in a short period of time based on the cost of doing necessary cleanup without a pressure washer according to the councilman.

Anderson and Zavala had no report this month. Mayor Wofford asked the council to consider selling an old worn-out air compressor tank for a minimal amount. He told the council that an interested party had offered to purchase the tank from the unused air compressor setup. The council members told the mayor they would approve the sale if he thought it would be okay.

Consideration of the approval of Baccus Subdivision was delayed until such time as a report can be obtained from the city engineering firm concerning the area. The item on the agenda for Energas manager Percy Edwards to meet with the council concerning proposed rate increases was passed as Edwards was not present. The item for approval of Jonelle Lynn's request to move a trailer home into the city was struck from the agenda as Lynn has purchased a home in the city instead.

Attending the session were Mayor Kenneth Wofford, Council members J. D. Copeland, Gary Marr, Bill Anderson, and Richard Zavala. Also attending were City Secretary Charlotte Hooten, Ron Coomer and Vickie Coomer of Triple C Waste Sanitation, and the Hesperian-Beacon reporter.

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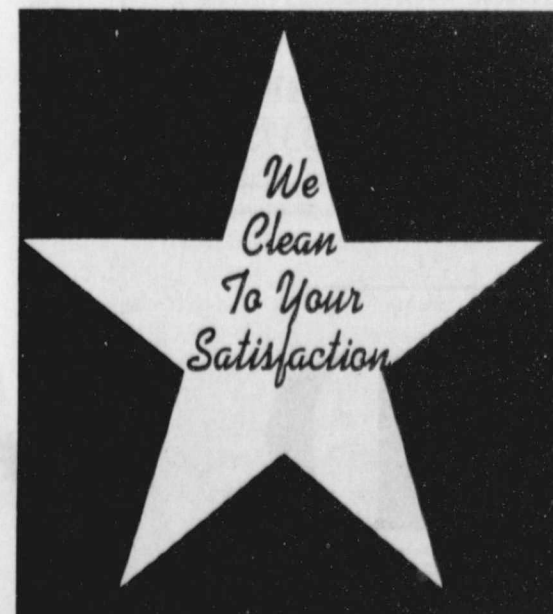

Always looked forward to the chicken and dressing, the many casseroles, the great desserts. Never was much on desserts or sweets, except for one, and that was Lillie Dee's Osgood Pie! It was always my favorite, and the only time of the year that I ever got to taste it.

Last Friday, almost three weeks to the day, I was once more in Floydada, and once more attending the funeral of a loved one. The minister knew her pretty well and did a wonderful job with the service.

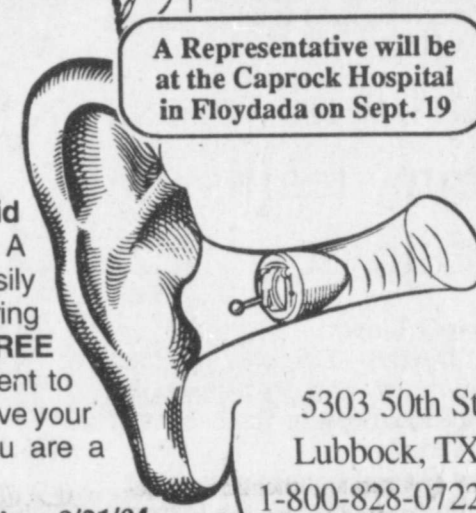
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Horns stumble against the Buffs

LOCKNEY—The Horns offense never got untracked Friday night and the defense just finally wore out. Offensively we were very sluggish and turnovers just killed us. You cannot turn the ball over five times and expect to beat a good team, and Petersburg has a good solid football team.

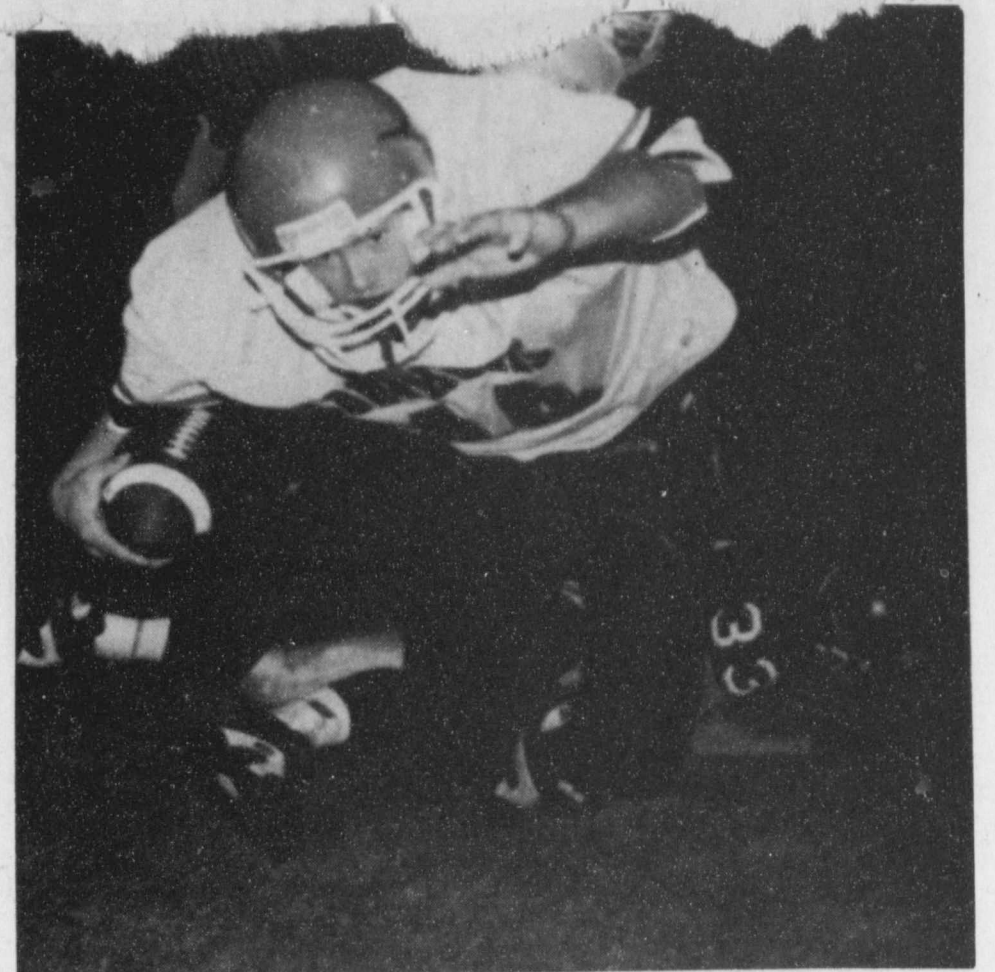

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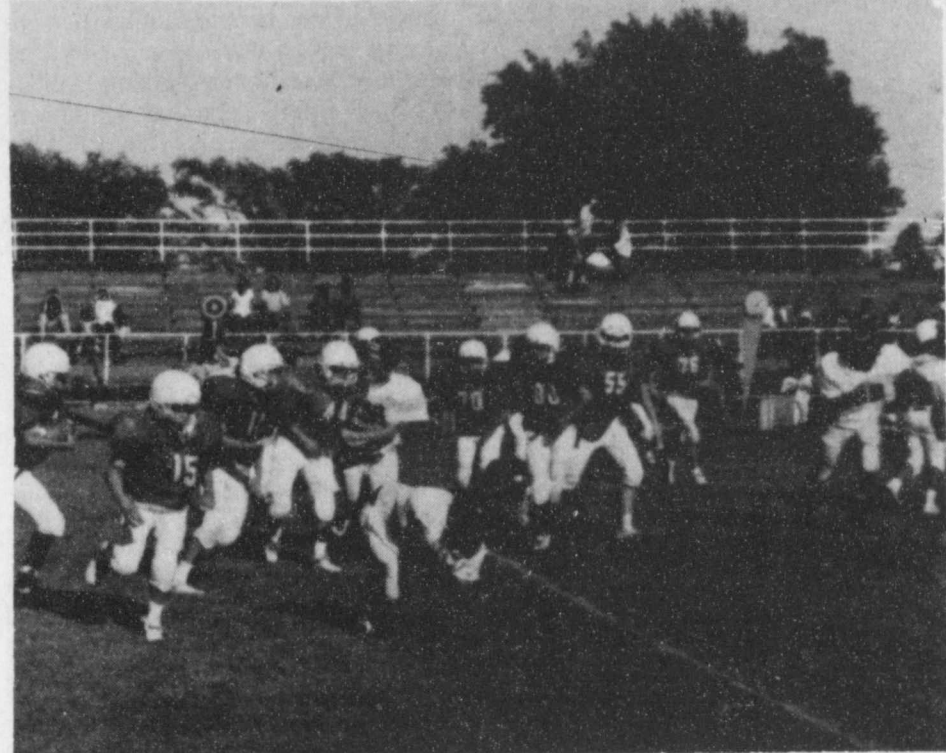

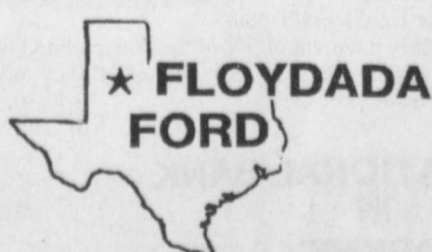
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Cubs' late score topples 'Winds

FLOYDADA--Brownfield's James Pauda scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns to pace the Cubs' 20-13 comeback victory over Floydada at Wester Field on September 9. It was the third consecutive year that the winning margin in this series has been by a touchdown or less. It was also the third straight year for the visitors to capture a win at the other's home field.

Brownfield's massive line (which outweighed the Whirlwinds by about 18 pounds-per-man) was the difference as the Cubs rolled up 260 yards on the ground. Pauda led all rushers with 23 carries for 142 yards and two touchdowns. Teammate Kevin Flournoy added 99 yards and a TD on 21 rushing attempts. The Cubs' ground attack allowed them to control possession for ten minutes longer than Floydada.

The Cubs improved to 1-1 while the Whirlwinds dropped to 1-1 on the season. Brownfield hosts 4A Fort Stockton (a 36-12 loser to Midland Greenwood last week) Friday night. The Post Antelopes, who were blanked 36-0 by state-ranked Slaton last Friday, will travel to Floydada this week.

The visitors converted three fourth-down attempts in their first offensive series following Floydada's opening kickoff. Pauda and Flournoy accounted for all but 4 yards in the 15-play, 70-yard scoring drive, which consumed 7 1/2 minutes of the initial period. Flournoy, a sophomore 1-back, subbing for injured starter Russell Perkins, carried in from 13 yards out with 4 1/2 minutes remaining in the stanza.

Floydada, a 14-point underdog according to the Harris Rating System, wasted little time in getting back into the game. Pete Cooper returned the ensuing kickoff 28 yards to give the 'Winds good field position at their own 38-yard line. Brownfield was flagged for a major penalty on third down, moving Floydada to the Cubs' 37-yard line.

Floydada quarterback Sammy Rodriguez spotted receiver Ken Cummings streaking a step ahead of a defender deep down the east sidelines. Cummings hauled in the perfectly-thrown 36-yarder and was brought down at the Cubs' 1-yard line. Pete Cooper carried over the double stripe on the next play, Zach Abshier's PAT was perfect, and Floydada pulled ahead 7-6.

The Cubs consumed yardage and time in their next series. A 22-yard pass from Rhett Graham to Johnny Quesada moved Brownfield to midfield and the end of the first period. Graham surprised the 'Winds with a 22-yard gainer on a fake punt to move deep into Floydada territory. Just as it appeared that the Cubs would power their way to another score, Zach Abshier crashed through from his defensive end position to sack Graham for a seven-yard loss from Floydada's 9-yard line. Micky McCalib's 33-yard field goal attempt was wide to the left, and the 'Winds took over at their own 20.

Three plays for zero yardage forced an Abshier punt. Graham's 30-yard pass to Quesada moved the Cubs into Floydada's "red zone," and Flournoy

carried to the Whirlwind 4-yard line. Brownfield's touchdown on the next play was nullified by a holding penalty and Graham was flagged for an illegal forward pass on a toss into the end zone. Sammy Rodriguez picked off Graham's next aerial to shut the door on the scoring threat.

Floydada mounted its first sustained drive in the final two minutes of the first half. The 'Winds motored from their own 21 down to Brownfield's 25-yard line, but back-to-back passes to the Cooper brothers, Vernon and Pete, barely missed their marks. The halftime horn sounded with Floydada holding a narrow one-point lead.

The Whirlwinds received their first big break of the game midway through the third quarter. Brownfield punter Johnny Quesada inadvertently touched his knee to the ground while attempting to field a low snap, and the 'Winds took over on downs at the Cub 34. On second down, Rodriguez lofted a 31-yard touchdown pass to J.J. Ysasaga at the southwest corner pylon. The junior wide-out reached over Brownfield's Johnny Quesada for the 6-pointer. A low snap prevented the conversion attempt, but the 'Winds extended their lead to 13-7.

Rance Barnett recovered a Cub fumble to give possession back to Floydada two plays later, but the 'Winds were unable to capitalize on Pauda's miscue. Vernon Cooper failed to pick up a first down on a fake punt, and the Cubs took over on downs at midfield in the final moments of the 3rd period.

Fullback James Pauda's number was called six consecutive times as Brownfield's ground game shifted the momentum. Pauda capped the 6-play, 47-yard drive with a 3-yard plunge for a score on the second play of the fourth quarter. Floydada prevented the Cubs' 2-point attempt, but the Whirlwinds' 13-12 lead was soon in jeopardy.

The 'Winds were unable to keep their next drive alive and were forced to punt. Pauda again led the Cub ground attack

with slashing runs behind the blocking of his big line. Peter Luna spilled Pauda in a jarring tackle on a first-down attempt. It was one of the only times all evening that Pauda was tagged for minus yardage. Flournoy scampered for 10 yards to set up a 35-yard pass from Graham to Reagan Riemer.

Pauda crashed into the Floydada end zone from 6 yards out on the next play. Graham added the two-point conversion to put a stop to the Whirlwinds' hope of an upset. Now trailing 20-13, Floydada had but six minutes remaining to pull out its second straight come-from-behind victory. Pete Cooper came close to doing it on the ensuing kickoff.

Vernon Cooper fielded McCalib's kickoff at the 12, handed to Rodriguez who broke into the clear for 20 yards, and then pitched to Pete who was following the play. Pete was unable to avoid the last two Cub defenders, but gave the 'Winds excellent field position on the Brownfield side of the 50-yard line.

Frankie Luna carried for 11 yards on first down and three plays later Rodriguez scrambled for 11 more big yards to just outside Brownfield's 20. Micky McCalib dashed the 'Winds' final threat when he blind-sided Rodriguez, forcing Floydada's only turnover of the night. The 'Cubs took over at their own 29-yard line, and ran out the remaining two minutes to seal the hard-earned victory.

BILL'S NOTES

I expect the 'Winds felt kind of like Texas Tech must have felt against the massive Nebraska front. Although they were physically superior and outgained Floydada by almost 200 yards, the 'Cubs were still not certain of a win until the final minutes. It was a real credit to the Whirlwinds the way they battled "in the trenches." Granted, the Cubs were their own worst enemy in the first half (with a number of penalties and a crucial turnover), but with the time of possession they had it's a wonder they didn't score at least a couple more times. Brownfield has a lot of talent, but their lack of discipline is going to cost

FLOYDADA--According to Whirlwind head coach Bryan Davis, "We were pleased with our overall performance against Brownfield. Of course, we were disappointed with the loss, but we gave a good effort. Brownfield wore us out physically, but we weren't supposed to give them much competition according to the so-called 'experts.' We still made mistakes, but our effort was there."

The coach added, "We had a chance to win there at the end, but gave up a turnover with two minutes left when Sammy (Rodriguez) was blind-sided. We had a chance to win up to that point. Nevertheless, we established we could play with them by coming back for a quick score after their 7 1/2-minute opening drive for a touchdown."

The coach said that several players, including Neal Nelson, Terry Harris, and Pete Cooper are nursing some injuries from the very physical game with Brownfield. "Pete has a strained knee and bruised back... it's just a day-to-day basis if he'll be able to go against Post this week," said Davis.

According to defensive coordinator David Carr, "Post is explosive with two talented and quick tailbacks. They also have a solid returning quarterback (junior Bodie Simpson, 6-2, 170) and all kinds of speed at the wide-outs and in the backfield. They were shut out 36-0 by Slaton, but we know how good Slaton is. Offensively, we're looking for a real head-knocker."

Offensive coordinator Lee Hurt, in praising Post, said, "They cover and disguise their blitzes very well. They have good size in their front four of their 4-4 stacked defense. Due to their quick and agile linebackers, we're going to have to run and go with short passes." Hurt added, "They aren't as big overall as Brownfield, but they are a lot quicker on both sides of the ball."

month to remain in the Road and Bridge Fund for the purpose of funding the as yet undetermined costs the county would be responsible for when the road receives final approval. Much of the discussion concerning the project centers on the amount and type of fencing that will have to be moved or erected to make way for the road.

In 1917, Floyd County elected to become a closed range. This means that land adjacent to highways must be fenced to keep livestock in. A county-wide vote would be required to change this and a partial change for a section of the county would require both a county-wide vote and a vote of the people in the area to be altered.

Precinct 1 Commissioner Connie Bearden voiced his opposition to Taylor's request, saying, "I don't feel it is right to take money away from Precinct 1 to pay for something in Precinct 3. I don't believe the people in my precinct would want me to."

Taylor responded, "I think the people in your precinct would want you to meet your obligation under this resolution, the way Precinct 3 has met its obligation under this resolution for over 30 years."

Bearden pointed out that getting the paving in Precinct 3 would save Precinct 3 money on road maintenance as the new road would be state maintained. He told Taylor, "The rest of us would still have the same amount of road to work, while you would have less."

Bearden said that it doesn't take the same thing to work all the precincts. He pointed out that Precinct 3 works only two road hands while his precinct has four. He also said he needs all his funding because he needs to buy a new machine.

Taylor offered to undergo a reapportionment of county maintained roads so that each precinct would have an equal amount of roads to work. He added, "This is a chance to get a paved road. The commissioners that passed that resolution in 1963 were willing to work together. We should be too. We can't afford to pass up the paved road."

Responded Bearden, "I am not passing it up, I'm just leaving it up to you since it is in your precinct. I don't think that the commissioners who passed the resolution had this in mind."

Taylor asked Precinct 4 Commissioner Howard Bishop and Precinct 2 Commissioner Floyd Jackson what their feelings were on the subject. Jackson stated, "I kind of agree with Connie, I've got my boat loaded with my own roads, without paying for another one."

Bishop's reply was that he didn't feel that he should commit funds to the project since he would be leaving office at the end of the year and the project would be carried out under a new commissioner.

Taylor stated, "When I was a kid and it was hog-killing time, all the neighbors got together and helped get the job done. Well, fellas, it's hog-killing time in Precinct 3 and where are my neighbors?"

Taylor asked that the issue be placed on the agenda next month for further discussion.

County Treasurer Glenna Orman presented her monthly report, stating that the county began the month of August with \$478,770.62 in funds.

Receipts for the month totaled \$158,234.75 and transfers in were \$219,183.93. Disbursements were \$223,739.688 and transfers out were \$219,183.93, leaving a total of \$413,265.69 in county accounts as of August 31, 1994.

Orman also reported certificates of deposit in the amounts of \$160,000.00 for Precinct 3 and \$40,000.00 for Precinct 4. To date, CD's have earned \$19,377.98 interest to benefit the county.

Commissioners approved authorization for the county judge to sign a mutual aid agreement as part of the county's obligation concerning the handling of natural or manmade disasters in the county. The agreement will allow the county to assist or be assisted by the cities of Lockney and Floydada should such a situation occur. Motion was made by Taylor and seconded by Jackson.

Three farm work contracts were approved by the court. They included: #1500 in Precinct 1 to rebuild a terrace 9 miles southwest of Floydada for W. F. Daniel Jr.; #1499 in Precinct 2 to cleanup old improvements and return land to cultivation 8 miles north and 2 1/2 miles west of Lockney for Trent Cowart, as requested by Charles Huffman; and #1470 in Precinct 2 to cleanup old improvements and return land to cultivation 4 miles north of Lockney for Kenneth Jackson.

Also approved was contract #1477 to replace Contract # 1463 which was previously approved, but has been lost or misplaced. This contract is for Eugene Beedy and the work is blading a ranch road 2 miles north and 6 miles east of Cedar Hill. Contract #1343 for Eugene Beedy which was approved on April 14, 1993, was voided by the same motion.

Motion for farm contract action was made by Taylor and seconded by Jackson. The vote was all in favor.

... One agreement to accept donated

materials was approved by the court.

... Fees for service were approved as they now stand for services rendered by the sheriff's office in connection with the service of warrants, summons, and other legal papers. This is an annual item. A second annual item addressed at the meeting was the setting of the terms of the court, meaning that the regular commissioners court meeting day will remain the second Monday of each month.

... The court voted unanimously to accept the audit proposal from Davis, Kinard and Company of Abilene to conduct the annual financial audit for the 1993-94 fiscal year. Costs were placed at \$4,800.00 for county records and \$500.00 for district attorney records. Motion was made by Bishop and seconded by Bearden.

... The court examined and approved reports concerning county finances. The commissioners authorized payment of monthly bills and approved budget amendments necessary to facilitate payment. A transfer of \$10,000.00, \$40,000.00 total, from the Road and Bridge Fund to each of the four precincts was also approved.

... Monthly reports from elected county officials who collect fines and fees were reviewed and accepted as presented. Reporting were County Clerk Margaret Collier, District Clerk Barbara Edwards, and Justices of the Peace Dottie Stansell and Tim Burge.

... An agenda item concerning a request to cross a county road was passed as the requester, Durrell Fortenberry was not present and the court had no information concerning the request and the location and type of work being done.

Attending the session were Judge Bill Hardin, Commissioners Connie Bearden, Floyd Jackson, George Taylor and Howard Bishop, treasurer Glenna Orman and the Hesperian-Beacon reporter.

Administrative assistant Jimmie Collins presented the monthly tax report, saying that collections at this time total \$1,444,800.00 on the 1993 levy plus \$18,915.00 in delinquent taxes from the two years under the County Education District levy. This represents a collection rate of 97.51 percent at this time as compared to a 96.75 collection rate at this time last year.

Board president Charlene Brown made a motion to sell two sets of tax title lots as presented by Superintendent Jerry Cannon. Cannon's presentation informed the board that a previous action to donate lots to Mt. Zion Baptist Church was not permissible. The board, or any taxing entity, cannot give away

property belonging to a tax supported unit. The church has made an offer of \$10.00 per lot for the four lots they want for location of a church building.

The second set of lots, Lots 8 and 10 in Block H of the Andrews Addition (615 W. Grover), were sold for a bid of \$400.00 each. Second for the motion was made by Steve Lloyd and all voted in favor.

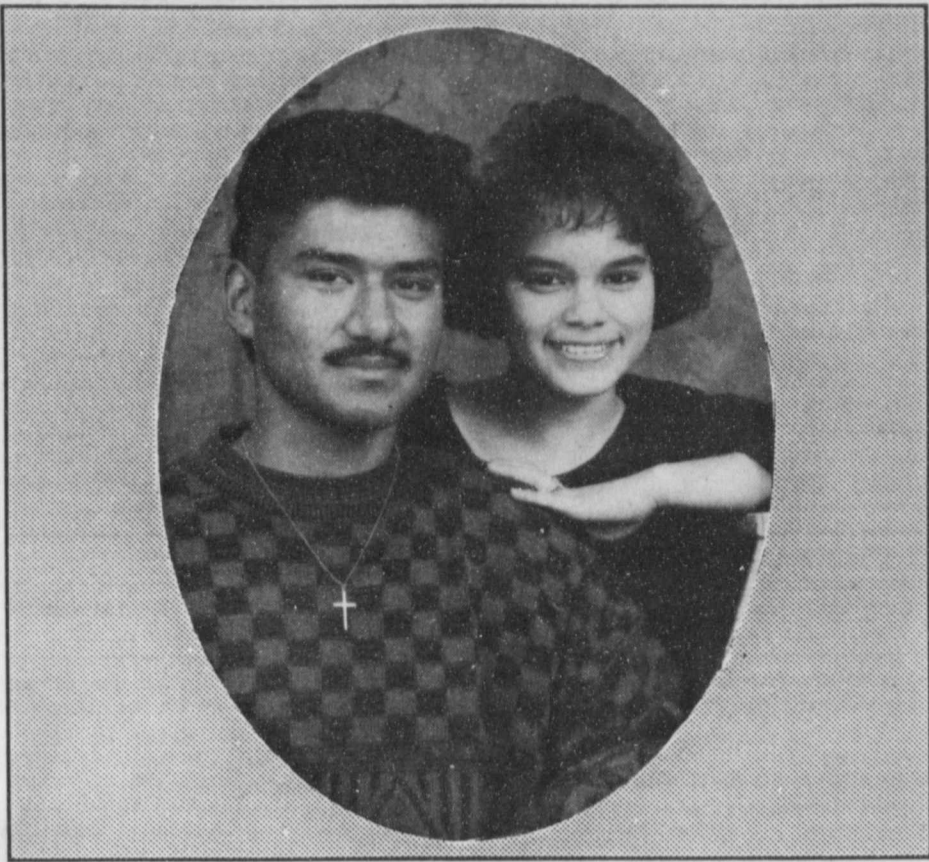

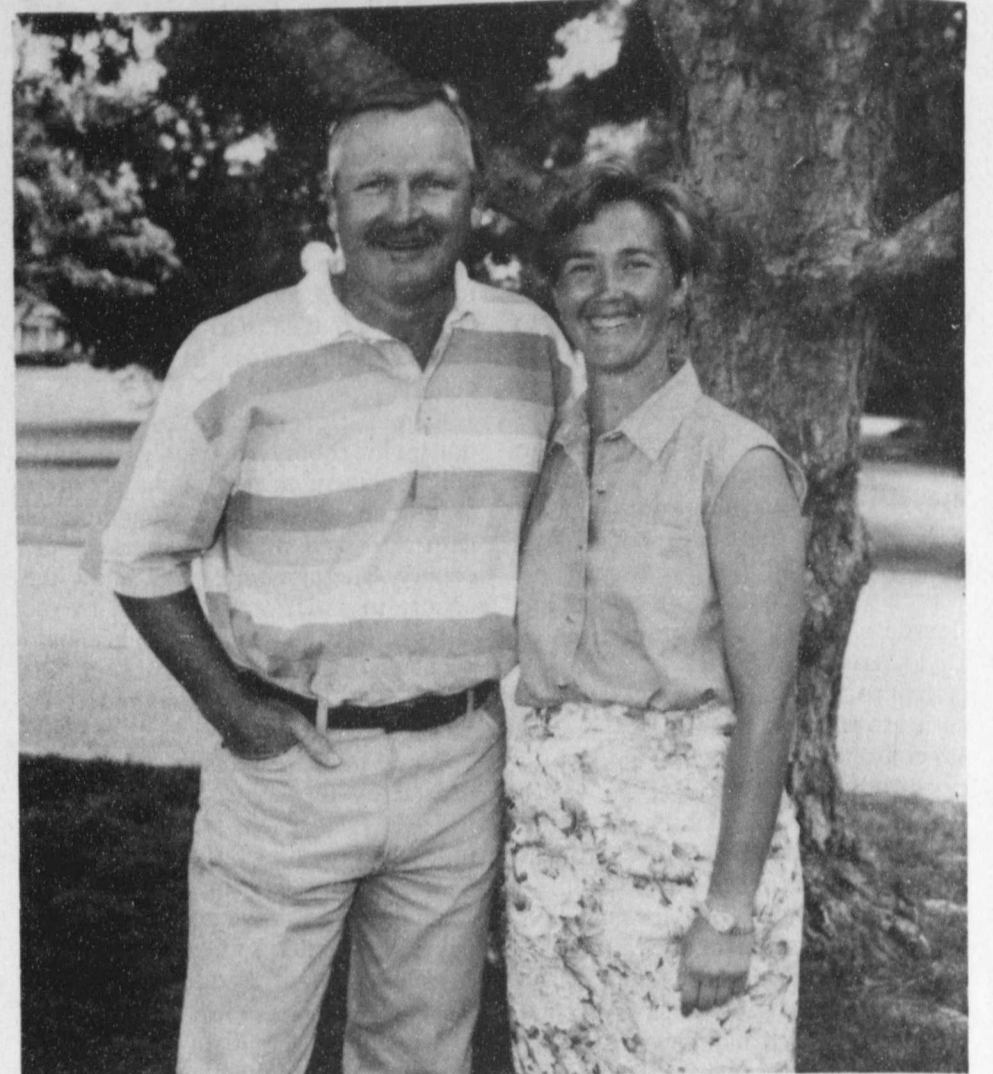

FLOYD CO. AG. UPDATE

Cooperative members elect directors and review finances

Members and directors of Floydada Cooperative Gins met for their annual meeting, Tuesday reviewing financial statements and electing new board members.

After a vote by members, A.C. Pratt was returned to another term as a director and Melvin Lloyd was chosen as the new director.

The financial report was presented by Phil Gunderman of Williams, Rogers, Lewis accounting firm.

The net earnings for 1994 were shown in the report to be \$ 807,063. Operating revenues were \$3,286,970 and operating expenses were \$2,483,672 giving the coop a operating income of \$803,298.

Other income (revenue from local cooperatives and interest income from the Oil Mill) was \$78,054; other expenses (interest expense, bad debt expense) were \$66,789 which brought the net earnings before federal income tax to \$814,563. Federal income taxes was paid in the amount of \$7,500 and the rest was paid to patrons through cash

and book credits on qualified stock. Board President A.C. Pratt reported to the members that the 1993 crop had set a record of 4,401 bales with a net margin of \$814,000.

"We will be ginning 40% or more of burr extracted cotton this year," said Pratt, "and this is a really big help as far as air pollution and improving the capacity of the gin." "We should expect this year, with both plants running, to average around 900 bales of cotton every 24 hour period. We started with one module truck and now we are running seven trucks."

Retiring Director Tom Lyles was presented with a plaque and thanked the members for voting for him three times.

Remarks were made to the members by representatives from Plains Cotton Growers, Producers Exchange, Plainview Coop and Compress, Plains Coop Oil Mill and PCCA.

Door prizes were presented to members throughout the meeting and refreshments were served at the conclusion.

Siders Sidelines

By Kerry Siders

A road survey of center pivot irrigation systems was completed in July and August of 1994 by my summer assistant Jayson Lusk. This survey noted the location on a map of the pivot, the size, if it was a conventional system or had LEPA capabilities, whether or not it utilized chemigation or fertigation, orientation of rows, approximate age of system, manufacture name, and acres covered by those pivots.

The total number of pivots as of August 1994 was 148. This was lower than was anticipated. The vast majority of the center pivots are located in the western portion of Floyd County. Very few pivots are located east of Floydada. The highest concentration of pivots is in the Aiken area. Providence contains a large concentration of pivots as well as the area between Barwise and Sandhill.

There were seven pivots out of 148 which were one-half mile pivots or 4.7 percent covering approximately 3,920 acres. There were 141 pivots out of 148 which were one-quarter mile pivots or 95.3 percent covering approximately 16,920 acres. Sixty-two and one-half

percent of the pivots were equipped with LEPA. Pivots also were noted to have 22.8 percent chemigation or fertigation rigs present at the time of the survey.

The majority of the pivots, or 83.1 percent, were farmed in a circle, with 12.8 percent straight rows, and the remaining 4.1 percent, a combination of the two, or contained pasture.

The estimation of the age of the pivots is more correlated to the condition of the pivot. It was estimated that 58.1 percent were less than 3 years old, 20.9 percent were 3-5 years old, and 20.9 percent were older than 5 years.

A definite increase in pivots over the past few years can be seen in the data

provided from 1986 to 1993 from the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District #1. In 1986, there were

33 pivots in Floyd County, by 1990 there had only been an increase to 41. By 1993, it had almost doubled with Floyd County having 78 pivots. Then this year from our survey, we noted 148 pivots, which is a 260 percent increase from 1990, and a 90 percent increase from 1993.

The tractors feature a John Deere-designed-and-manufactured powertrain. They use proven electronic technology to provide fingertip control of the transmission, SCVs, PTO, and hitch; precise engine performance; self-diagnostic capabilities; and complete compatibility with options like row guidance and electrohydraulic depth control.

"The chassis design gives these tractors the shortest turning radius (17 feet) in narrow rows of any competitive MFWD tractor in this size class," said Higley.

FINGERTIP CONTROLS AND A COMMANDVIEW CAB

One of the most distinctive features of the tractors is the CommandARM that places the controls for the transmission, throttle, SCVs, hitch, and PTO in the armrest of the seat for convenient fingertip operation.

The secondary tractor controls and the vehicle monitors are located on the right-hand console, within easy view and reach of the operator.

The 8000 Series CommandView cab provides unobstructed visibility to the front tires, over the hood, to the sides, and to the rear hitch with 62 square feet of glass area.

POWERTRAIN AND HYDRAULICS

The model 8100, 8200, and 8300 are powered by a six-cylinder 7.6-liter John Deere diesel. The 8400 features a new six-cylinder 8.1-liter Deere diesel. Both engines have a 40 percent PTO torque rise and feature air-to-air intercooling for increased performance.

The engines feature an electronic governor. The tractors develop as much as 10 percent PTO power bulge within the constant power range for additional horsepower to pull through tough spots. The electronic governor also provides a Field Cruise feature that works like the cruise control on an automobile for maintaining a consistent ground speed in light-load operations.

The MFWD axle driveline, located above the axle housing, delivers power from the transmission through two drop gears in the axle's differential. This eliminates driveline universal joints and their associated maintenance, and increases clearance for crops and crossing levees.

An independent 1,000-rpm PTO with a 1-3/4 inch stub shaft is standard. A 540/1,000-rpm PTO with a 1-3/8 inch stub shaft is available as an option. A torque limiting collar is provided to prevent overpowering the 1-3/8 inch shaft.

The pressure-and-flow hydraulic system on the 8000 Series Tractors features a pump for the steering and brakes and a

separate pump for the hitch and selective control valves.

Standard hitch lift capacity is 10,400 pounds for the 8100 and 8200, 11,700 pounds for the larger models. Optional lift capacities increase to 14,165 pounds for the two smaller models and 15,650 pounds for the 8300 and 8400. All four models can be ordered with a no-hitch option for dedicated drawbar applications.

The electrohydraulic SVCs are electronically adjusted with the TouchSet panel in the right-hand console in the cab.

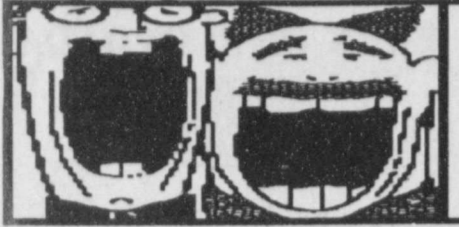
Citizens to gather at Lockney flag pole for time of prayer

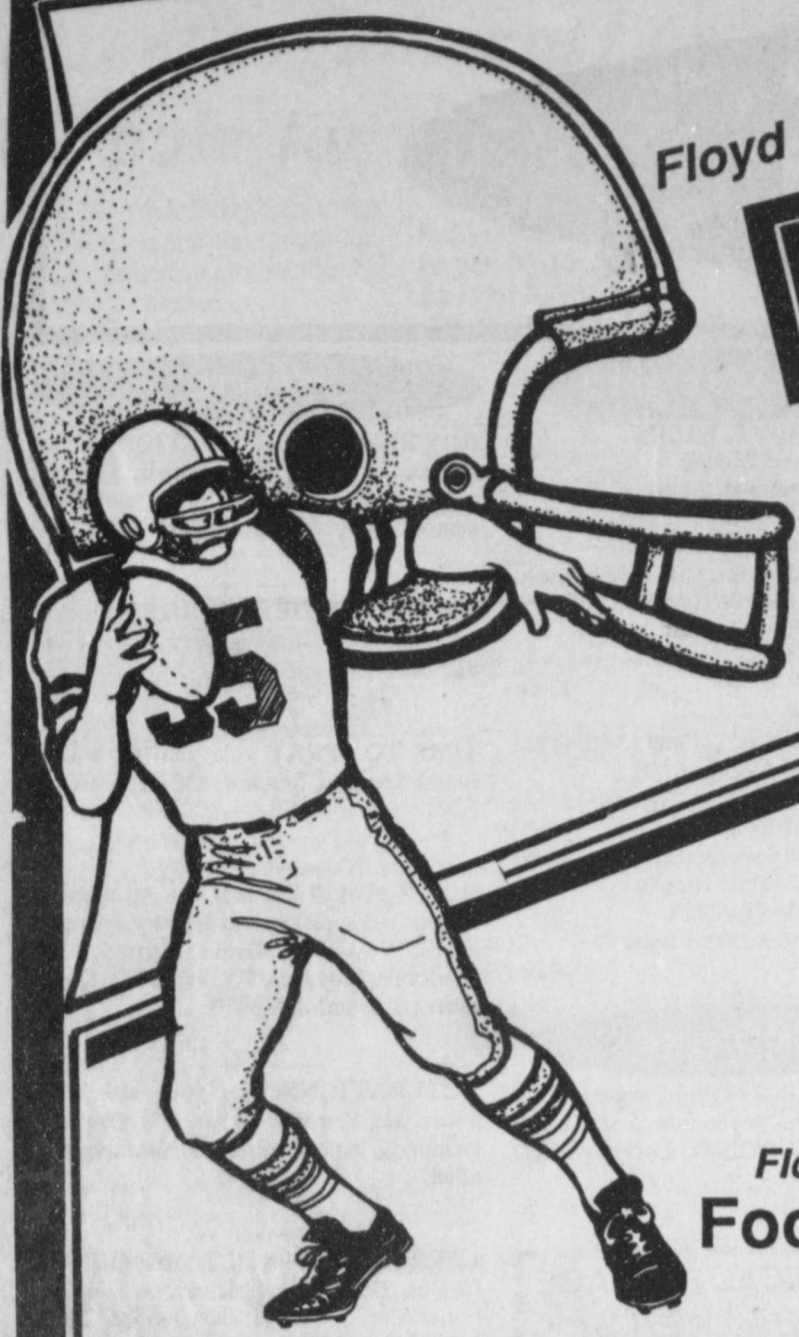

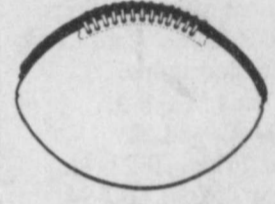
