Beginning next week, at the request of the Floyd County Appraisal District, and with the approval of all taxing entities, this newspaper will begin publishing the names of those individuals who have had suits and judgements against them for delinquent taxes.

New principal joins junior high school staff

Eddie Sneed, has been busy learning everyone's name at Floydada Junior High School, as well as becoming familiar with his new duties as principal.

Before coming to Floydada, Sneed was the principal for three years at Hamilton High School. His wife, Pat, taught freshman and junior English at Hamilton.

The Sneeds are both graduates of Canton High School. They married in 1968, after graduating, and Eddie joined the army while Pat continued her education at East Texas State University, eventually earning a Master's in Educa-

After military service, Sneed earned a living as a carpenter before he too went back to school. In 1974, while his wife taught school, Sneed attended East Texas State University and earned his Bachelor of Science.

After graduation he taught at Tyler Middle School and continued to work on his Master's Degree in Education.

After five years at Tyler, Sneed bought his own service station. After a short three years out of the field of education, in 1986 Sneed went back to teaching Physical Science, Physics and Chemistry at Mabank High School. He also coached boys basketball at Mabank.

In 1988 Sneed became assistant principal at Mabank and then in 1991 moved to Hamilton High School.

Pat, who has been teaching for over 20 years, is now teaching 6th grade Social Studies at Andrews Elementary School.

The Sneeds have two children, a 19 year old daughter, Sheridan, who is a student at MCC in Waco, and 15 year old Josh who is a freshman at Floydada High School.

"The secretary and staff that I have, have this new job very easy for me," said Sneed. I can't say enough good things about them.

Terrell's unique teaching style leads to award

LOCKNEY--For many years the students, teachers, administrators and parents associated with Lockney Junior High School, have known there was something special about language arts

teacher, Linda Terrell.

Those who know her feel that it's about time she was recognized as special. No one was surprised, except maybe Terrell herself, after she was chosen to represent Region 17 as the 1994

Regional Secondary Teacher of the Year. Region 17 represents 61 school districts, 80,000 students and 6,000 teachers.

Terrell's name was then advanced for consideration in the state Teacher of the Year competition in which she competed

though she did not place as a finalist in that competition, it did not stop her peers and her students from honoring Terrell with an award ceremony Monday after-Joe Neely, Executive Director of Region 17, and Phyllis Kinnison, Coordi-

nator of Communications in Region 17, presented Terrell with a plaque in recognition of her award. "This is not an easy award to get," said Neely as he addressed the assembly.

"Students usually don't get to the point you want to tell teachers how much you appreciate them until later in life." Lockney Superintendent Raymond

Lusk said, "In Mrs. Terrell's room you never know what will be going on. It is an exciting class...crazy and wild at times." "If you hear the sound of Linda's heels

High Principal Terry Ellison, "you know she is hurrying from one place to an-And hurry she does-just to keep up

with her students. If you stop in for a visit, you find

yourself caught up in the enthusiasm of Terrell and her students. You can't help Terrell's rooms (both in junior high

and high school) reflect not only her personality but the personality of every student in her class. Artwork lines the walls from top to bottom. Terrell's students don't just write a

book report—they illustrate it. You don't just learn punctuation—you illustrate it They don't just learn how to write—they write their own books (four each year for each student).

"I realize students learn best through hands-on experience," said Terrell, "so I have created a kinesthetic environment. My classroom becomes a visual showcase of students' work, with posters hanging from wires around the room and blanketing the ceiling. I consider art an extension of literature and I believe art is a natural expression of learning.'

A 7 1/2' tree in Terrell's classroom is adorned with green leaves cut from construction paper. Each time a student finishes a book, he or she cuts out their own leaf and places it on the tree.

In the first five weeks, 68 eighth grade students have read 82 books (the books are checked out of a library within

Silent reading time is set aside the last Education Service Center Regions. Al-15 minutes of Monday-Wednesday-Friday classes. During this time students can sit on the floor, on bean bags or in the famous 8' X 4' loft built in the class-

National Merit List recognizes J.W. Poteet II

FLOYDADA--1994 Floydada High School graduate, J.W. Poteet II, has made the 1995 National Merit Semifinalists list for the National Merit Scholarship Program. More than one million juniors in more than 19,000 U.S. high schools entered the scholarship program in 1993 by taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test. The list of semifinalists tallies 15,000.

Floydada High School principal, Joe Christian, said, "This was the first student to qualify in as long as we can remember. We're very excited for J.W. and wish him much success."

Poteet graduated from Floydada High School in three years and is now attending college in Oklahoma.

High school students who are designated as semifinalists in the National Merit Scholarship Program have an opportunity to advance in the competition by qualifying as finalists. Finalists are considered for some 6,700 Merit Scholarships that are offered annually and . supported by 600 independent organi-

The Merit Program is conducted by National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC), a privately financed, not-forprofit organization that operates without government funding. In the 39 annual competitions completed to date, more than 148,500 distinguished students have won Merit Scholarships representing expenditures and commitments totaling \$48 million. Next spring, NMSC will announce the 1995 class of Merit Scholars who will receive awards worth about \$26 million for college undergraduate study.

Floydada City Council votes to set 40¢ tax rate

for the City of Floydada voted unanimously to set the 1994 tax rate at \$0.40 per \$100.00 valuation. The rate has remained unchanged for more than a dozen years. The tax rate was set following a scheduled public hearing on the budget. Motion to continue the tax rate at 40 cents was made by Councilman Wayne Tipton and seconded by Councilman Dale Lawson. All voted in favor.

Two public hearings were conducted during the session. No citizens were in attendance to voice comments at either hearing. The first hearing concerned the proposed application for a TCDP grant to fund additional water line improvements within the city. With no one in opposition, the city will submit the application. Proposed work will be in the general area of 10th to 12th Street and Virginia to Georgia Street.

The second hearing was on the proposed budget for the 1994-95 fiscal year which will begin October 1, 1994. Following the hearing, the council approved the budget as submitted. Motion for the approval was made by Councilman Clar Schacht with a second by Councilman Albert Hill. All voted in

The budget places the revenue for the

FLOYDADA - Council members Expenses are estimated to equal the revenues with \$1,071,228.00 being spent from the General Fund, \$689,300.00 from the Water Fund, \$57,450.00 from the Farm Fund, \$158,979.00 from the Sewer Fund, \$964,500.00 from the Electric Fund, \$9,600.00 from the Health Fund, and \$459,500.00 from the Sanitation Fund.

The City of Floydada will participate in a proposal from the Floyd County Central Appraisal District to publish the names of delinquent taxpayers in the local newspaper as a means of making collections more timely and efficient. 

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

Their meeting included recognition of Linda Terrell as the Secondary Teacher of the Year, a records retention proposal, policy updates, resolutions, maintenance projects and reports by the principals and athletic director.

Linda Terrell has been chosen as the 1994 Teacher of the Year for Educational Service Center for Region 17. The board members signed a recognition letter stating, "We are fortunate to have you as a member of the faculty of Lockney Schools and are proud of the honors you have brought to yourself, to your students and to the Lockney Independent School District.

Members of the board voted to accept the waiver.



to make students quit reading and leave

her class when the bell rings. "Since 1988, I have not used a textbook," said Terrell. "Students learn best when they use language. They read and write; write and read!

"I believe that innovation, motivation, high expectations, humor and patience are the most important traits of a

"My classroom," said Terrell, "is a beehive of activity in which students have deadlines and are self-paced to meet them. In the same class period, some cut out vocabulary pictures from magazines while others write stories. Some define spelling words while others design word usage posters.

"This works for my students and they never have time to get into trouble."

Terrell got rid of her textbooks after articipating in the Texas Tech University's Caprock Writing Project, but an internship in New Zealand changed her whole outlook on methods of teaching.

"When I walked into Bayfield Elementary in Auckland," said Terrell, "I felt like I was in education heaven. The visit was the fulfillment of a dream.

"I didn't realize the trips full significance until I arrived. I thought, this was everything I had ever looked for in education. I'll never be the same."

The year after completing her studies in New Zealand, Terrell returned and was given permission to put her new

teaching skills to work. One student, jumped 7 grade levels on the language usage section of the

In the past 6 years, 5 students have published writings in national magazines. Twenty-three students have won

national writing contests. "The first year after I completed the Caprock Area Writing Project Summer Institute, my 8th graders improved from 42% to 61% nationally on the SRA language arts test," said Terrell. "The TAAS test, the year before last, 8th graders jumped from 53% passing in the 7th grade to 78% passing in the 8th. Last year 83% of my 8th graders passed the writing portion. Eighty-six percent of

Terrell grew up in Mason, Texas, and says that her mother was the greatest influence in her becoming a language arts educator. "As she read countless books to my sister and me, she taught us to love the sound of language, long before we could read.

"Another influence was my Mason High School English teacher, Mrs. Lillie Kay Brown. She used a college textbook and challenged us to become writers."

The moments that make teaching special to Terrell are the times she sees excitement about learning in the actions of her students.

Terrell has been married to Buster Terrell for 22 years. The couple has two children, Mark Todd, 17, and a daughter, Lisa Kelley. Linda is particularly proud of the fact that her daughter has chosen to follow in her mother's footsteps and is now teaching English at a junior high school in Austin.

Linda received her bachelor's degree from Texas Christian University and a master's degree from Baylor University. She has been teaching 15 years, 13 of them in Lockney. She taught one year in La Marque and another year in Waco ISDs.

Besides teaching English, Terrell also teaches speech and theater arts and is the University Interscholastic League literary coach.

In addition to her classroom teaching, she is a frequent presenter at teacher workshops and has authored three articles about innovative teaching techniques for professional journals. She was also one of three finalists for the 1991 Teacher of the Year in the Association of Texas Professional Educators.

Terrell also recently attended Texas Christian University and became certified to teach Advanced Placement. Along with Tonda Jolley, Terrell is currently teaching a two hour high school advanced placement course that combines literature, history and government

"There are only two schools in Texas combining courses such as this," said Terrell. "One of the schools is outside Fort Worth and Lockney is the other

The most important education issue to Terrell is meeting the literacy demands of our times.

"Because literacy affects our economic and social climate, increased literacy of young people can lower the drop-out number, curtail the crime rate, and increase the number of productive citizens."

Terrell credits television with creating a literacy problem in society.

"Television has replaced reading books," said Terrell. "In Roald Dahl's 'The Terrible TV', he says it rots the sense in the head, it kills the imagination dead!

Another student rushes in one day to "Another villain that has stolen time ask her, "May I check out 8 paperbacks from mother-to-child reading is our economy. Because today's families require two salaries, mom comes home to duties that leave no time for reading.

"I believe one of the best cures for reading failure is intervention in the early grades. When I visited New Zealand schools, I observed their successful Reading Recovery Program, a burst of one-on-one help for the 5 to 6 year old reader who lags behind. It corrects the literacy problem at an early level and returns the child as a competent reader to the mainstreamed classroom. Considering New Zealand's 99% literacy rate, Reading Recovery merits a try in our country."

Although Terrell knows the impact a good teacher can have on a child's life, she also realizes that school cannot solve all of society's ills. "Families have to take responsibility for their children and themselves," said Terrell.

As a teacher Terrell feels a tremendous responsibility dealing with children who have few clothes, who come to school hungry, who are victims of physical or sexual abuse or who are afraid to

"As educators, we must remember our classrooms are sometimes the best-and the safest part-of a child's day. We teachers are band-aids for children with broken hearts; however, we are not physicians equipped to heal the wounds of today's society," said Terrell.

"We must become a nation of readers. If a child can't learn to read, he or she can't read to learn. I challenge everyone to go a step further and teach today's children to love to read.'



has filed with the Texas Public Utility Commission a notice of intent to apply for a certificate of convenience and necessity for construction of a new 400 megawatt generating plant.

A final site selection has not been made, but two preferred sites are currently under consideration. One site is located in Moore County south of

Golden Spread Electric Cooperative Sunray, and the other site involves properties in Yoakum and Gaines Counties east of Denver City.

> Approval by the Texas Public Utility Commission of the notice of intent will only give Golden Spread the right to file an application for a certificate of convenience and necessity, which is the authorization needed before the project could be constructed.

> In its filing, Golden Spread advised the Commission that it also intends to solicit proposals from other utilities and independent power suppliers for both new capacity and demand side control options. The solicitation will be made in about three months and will include a request for purchased power or other supply options.

> Golden Spread currently purchases wholesale power from Southwestern Public Service Company and from West Texas Utilities Company. SPS' 1993 load and capacity resource forecast, which includes the Golden Spread loads, shows a need to construct 486 megawatts of new gas turbine generating capacity to serve area loads.

> Golden Spread President Robert W. Bryant said, "Our proposal does not duplicate any existing generating facilities. It simply means that SPS can defer the construction of additional generating plants on its system, and that will benefit SPS retail consumers."



By Order of the United States District Court for the Southern District of Alabama, a class action has been conditionally certified for settlement purposes on behalf of Settlement Class Members (as defined below) who may now or later have claims against Ciba-Geigy Corporation arising out of work-related exposure to Galecron®. On January 30, 1995, a fairness hearing will be held at the Courthouse, United States District Court, Southern District of Alabama, 113 St. Joseph St., Mobile, Alabama, 36602, at 9:00 a.m. Central Time, so the Court can determine if the class action should be finally certified and if the Settlement summarized in the Notice should be approved as fair, reasonable and adequate. This hearing may be continued without further notice.

DEFINITION OF CLASS

Under the Settlement, Galecron® is defined as chlordimeform or any chlordimeform-containing product, either manufactured, formulated, packaged, distributed or sold by or on behalf of Ciba-Geigy Corporation or related parties, regardless of the trade name of the product; or any metabolite of Galecron®, including the substance known as 4-COT or 5-CAT.

The Settlement Class is defined as: (1) All persons who fall into one of the following categories, and who reside in the United States as of the date of filing of the Class Action Complaint, who have been exposed in

the United States to Galecron® ("Exposed Persons") Plant Workers: An individual (whether or not employed by Ciba-Geigy Corporation) who in the course of his or her employment at Ciba-Geigy Corporation's St. Gabriel, Louisiana or McIntosh Alabama sites, was exposed to Galecron®, including, without limitation, individuals who worked in manufacturing, formulating or packaging Galecron® or in the waste disposal of Galecron® or worked in the construction, demolition or maintenance of any facilities used for the foregoing activities at such St. Gabriel, Louisiana or McIntosh, Alabama sites; or

Formulators: An individual (whether or not employed by Ciba-Geigy Corporation) who in the course of his or her employment was exposed to Galecron® while at a plant or site which was involved in mixing, blending, packaging, handling or otherwise formulating pesticides which contained, in whole or in part, Galecron®; or

Applicators: An individual (whether or not employed by Ciba-Geigy Corporation) who in the course of his or her employment, was exposed to Galecron® while involved in the application of pesticides which contained, in whole or in part, Galecron®, including, without limitation, aerial and land applicators, flagmen, mixers, blenders, loaders and other individuals who handled such pesticide prior to or during the application process; and

Other Covered Workers: An individual (whether or not employed by Ciba-Geigy Corporation) who in the course of his or her employment was exposed to Galecron® at the Clean Land, Air, Water Corporation or Environmental Purification Advancement, Inc. disposal sites located near Bayou Sorrel, Louisiana; at Empak, Inc. in Deer Park, Texas; or in a testing or research laboratory, whether or not owned by Ciba-Geigy Corporation; or

(2) The spouses, parents, children or other relatives of the Exposed Persons described above.

(Collectively "Settlement Class Members"). Note: If you are an Exposed Person, you are a Settlement Class Member whether or not you have been diagnosed with an illness. Spouses, parents, children or other relatives are Settlement Class Members but the claims they are settling are limited to those arising from an Exposed Person's exposi

Workers exposed to Galecron® should participate in a medical monitoring program because early detection of bladder cancer can result in more effective treatment. As part of the Settlement, Ciba-Geigy has agreed to establish a medical monitoring program for the detection of bladder cancer for those individuals who do not exclude themselves from the lawsuit. Within six months, this program should be available free of charge to all Exposed Persons who do not exclude themselves from the lawsuit

If you had on-the-job exposure to Galecron®, it is recommended that you or your doctor call 1-800-565-3126 to learn how you can obtain further medical information or enroll in the medical monitoring program.

BRIEF SUMMARY OF LITIGATION

On February 8, 1994, a class action lawsuit was filed against defendant, Ciba-Geigy Corporation ("Ciba-Geigy"), in Alabama State Court, which lawsuit was later removed to the United States District Court for the Southern District of Alabama. The Complaint, as amended, alleges that the Settlement Class as defined above is entitled to damages for medical monitoring and other compensation as a result of Exposed Persons' exposure to

Ciba-Geigy has filed an Answer denying all essential allegations of the Complaint, and asserting affirmative legal defenses. The Court has decided that the case can proceed as a class action for purposes of settlement only. This does not mean that the Class Representatives would have been successful had the case gone to trial. The Court has made no such determination, and the proposed Settlement is not to be construed as an expression of any opinion by the Court as to the merits of any of the claims asserted against Ciba-Geigy.

PROPOSED SETTLEMENT

A Settlement has been entered into between the Class Representatives, Class Counsel and Ciba-Geigy, which will resolve all past, present and future claims against Ciba-Geigy arising out of Exposed Persons' exposure to Galecron®. The Settlement provides for the establishment by Ciba-Geigy of two funds to provide medical benefits and compensation to Exposed Persons or their legal representatives.

(1) The Medical Monitoring and Treatment Fund ("The MMT Fund"). If the Settlement is approved, Ciba-Geigy will make an initial deposit of \$5,000,000 into the MMT Fund, and will thereafter make additional deposits on an as-needed basis. There is no limit to the amount of money Ciba-Geigy can be required to contribute over the life of this Fund.

The MMT Fund will pay for a medical monitoring program designed to detect at an early stage the form of bladder cancer alleged to be associated with Galecron®: specifically, primary urothelial carcinoma of the urinary collecting system, i.e., renal pelvis, ureter, bladder and urethra. The MMT Fund also will pay for all medically necessary treatment not paid for by Medicare or Medicaid if the Exposed Person has been or in the future is diagnosed with such bladder cancer.

The MMT Fund will pay for medical monitoring to Exposed Persons for a period of 20 years, and will pay for medical treatment until one full year passes with no claims for treatment being filed but in no event less than 20 years. Ciba-Geigy will have no obligation to continue the medical monitoring and treatment program if the Settlement is not approved. Only Exposed Persons, i.e., eligible Plant Workers, Formulators, Applicators and Other Covered Workers, as defined in this Notice, will be

entitled to medical monitoring and treatment (2) The Disease Compensation and Administration Fund ("The DCA Fund"). If the Settlement is approved, Ciba-Geigy will also make an initial deposit of \$30,000,000 into the DCA Fund. In addition to medical treatment paid for by the MMT Fund, the DCA Fund will make cash payments of up to \$410,000, as set forth in more detail below, on behalf of an Exposed Person who, after exposure to Galecron®, has developed or in the future develops the form of bladder cancer alleged to be associated with Galecron®: specifically, primary urothelial carcinoma of the urinary collecting system, i.e., renal pelvis, ureter, bladder and urethra. Cash payments will vary depending upon the Exposed Person's age, smoking status and participation in the health screening program. For Exposed Persons who are nonsmokers and participants in the health screening program, the cash payments will be as follows: (a) \$10,000 in the event of treatment involving an invasive procedure (this is a one-time payment regardless of the number of procedures); (b) up to \$150,000 in the event of a radical cystectomy (bladder removal) with diversion of the urinary tract, which amount will decrease with a person's age to a minimum of \$10,000 if the Exposed Person is 85 years or older; and (c) up to \$250,000 in the event an Exposed Person's death is found to be caused by bladder cancer, which amount will decrease with age to a minimum of \$17,500 if the Exposed Person is 85 years or older. An Exposed Person may collect separately for (a), (b) and (c) above, so that the maximum payment to an Exposed Person is \$410,000. The cash payments described above will be reduced by 12.5% if the Exposed Person had smoked in the five years prior to diagnosis. A separate 12.5% reduction will be made if he or she had failed to participate in the health screening program in each of the three years prior to diagnosis (or in each year that the program was available, if less than three years). The DCA Fund also will pay \$1,000 to any Exposed Person who was diagnosed with hemorrhagic cystitis within three months following exposure (this is a one-time payment regardless of the number of manifestations). In addition, the DCA Fund will pay for administrative costs, and class counsel's attorneys' fees, costs and expenses as determined by the Court. All cash payments from the DCA Fund are paid only on account of a compensable claim of an Exposed Person, i.e., an eligible Plant Worker, Formulator, Applicator or Other Covered Worker, as defined in this Notice. Cash payments to a spouse, parent, child or other relative will only be made if they are the legal representative of an Exposed Person. The benefits of the DCA Fund will continue as long as the

MMT Fund continues, or until the DCA Fund is exhausted as set forth below. Ciba-Geigy has agreed to pay up to a maximum of \$45,000,000 for the benefits afforded by that Fund. If the DCA Fund is exhausted, Ciba-Geigy may continue paying for compensable claims. If Ciba-Geigy does not continue to pay. Settlement Class Members will be able to opt-out of the DCA Fund and will regain their right to pursue any legal claims they may have, except for claims for medical monitoring, medical treatment, fear of illness or cancer, or increased risk of illness or cancer, because medical monitoring and treatment will continue

(3) Other Conditions. The Stipulation of Settlement presently provides for medical monitoring, treatment and compensation payments for certain medical conditions set forth in this Notice. In the event, however, that a Court approved Epideany other medical condition is caused by Galecron® exposure. that condition will be deemed a compensable claim, and will be eligible for medical monitoring (if feasible); medical treatment; and cash payments. The cash payments will not exceed the maximum amounts payable for the covered medical conditions set forth above.

(4) Administrator. A nationally recognized entity or entities with substantial investment and medical claims administration experience will be appointed by the Court to administer the Settlement. The Administrator will determine whether a Settlement Class Member is eligible for benefits under the settlement. Any disputes concerning a Settlement Class Member's entitlement to benefits will be resolved by a Medical Advisory Panel or by a single arbitrator, depending upon the issue in dispute. The decision of the Medical Advisory Panel or arbitrator each have the effect of an arbitration decision and shall be binding upon all parties, including the Settlement Class Member.

(5) Release. Settlement Class Members who do not exclude themselves from the Class release all past, present and future claims: (i) relating to the covered medical conditions listed above; and (ii) relating to an Exposed Person's exposure to Galecron®, including all claims alleging that any other cancers, personal injuries or risks are caused by exposure to Galecron®. This means that claims that Galecron® exposure caused any condition other than those medical conditions listed above will be released, but will receive no compensation or treatment, unless the Court approved Epidemiology Panel finds that such other condition is caused by Galecron® exposure. The release is effective as against Ciba-Geigy and certain additional releasees as defined in the Stipulation of Settlement, including Ciba-Geigy, Ltd., the parent of Ciba-Geigy.

V. CLASS REPRESENTATIVES AND





Post turns big plays into victory over Whirlwinds

FLOYDADA--The Post Antelopes capitalized on three pass interceptions, scored three times in a 6-minute span of the second quarter, and glided to a 40-8 victory over the Whirlwinds at Wester Field on September 16. Although the total games statistics were fairly close (Floydada actually held a 16-14 edge in first downs and 26:25 to 21:35 time-ofpossession advantage), it was the Antelopes' ability to make the big plays which catapulted the visitors to the lopsided results.

Post, a pre-season selection as one of Region I's premier Class 2A grid squads, improves to 2-1 on the year. The Antelopes will open District 4-2A action at Ralls this week. The Whirlwinds take a 1-2 season mark into their home encounter with the Childress Bobcats tomorrow night.

The game started without much fanfare. Following an exchange of punts, the Whirlwinds mounted a 9-play, 46yard drive to the visitors' 40-yard line. Zach Abshier's first punt gave the Antelopes poor field position at their own 3. However, it took Post only four plays to cover the 97 yards to the Whirlwind end zone.

Post junior quarterback Bodie Simpson hit wide-out Cody Bain with a perfect aerial at the Post 45 on first down from his own 19-yard line. Bain avoided the would-be Whirlwind defender and raced untouched for 55 yards down the east sideline to pay dirt. The pass-andrun covered 79 yards and was a preview of the Antelopes' 2nd-quarter fireworks.

Following a Floydada turnover, Post covered 54 yards in 10 plays. Brad Lawson carried in from 3 yards out, Simpson ran the two-pointer, and the Lopes were on their way to their biggest-ever winning margin over the

Floydada's Sammy Rodriguez suffered his second interception three plays later when Simpson snagged an almost unbelievable one-handed catch and returned it to the Whirlwind 28-yard line. Casey Hart's halfback pass found Javier Saldivar all alone in the end zone, Simpson kicked the conversion, and Post was up 21-zip.

Floydada was "three and out" late in the second period, and Abshier again was forced to punt. Post gave up its only turnover of the evening when Vernon Cooper recovered to put Floydada in possession at its own 39-yard line. The Whirlwinds moved toward the visitors' end zone shortly before the halftime break. It was during this series that Sammy Rodriguez was blind-sided after handing off to Frankie Luna. Sammy had to be assisted from the field and was unable to return to the contest.

It appeared that the Whirlwinds were on the verge of putting points on the board in the final minute of the quarter. Any Floydada hopes for a rally were dashed moments later when Brad Lawson stepped in front of a Floydada receiver, picked off an Abshier pass at the goal line, and breezed for the north end zone. The 100-yard return for a touchdown, as time elapsed, gave the Antelopes an almost insurmountable 27-O halftime lead.

The Whirlwinds opened the second half with a determined drive from their own 30, but had to relinquish possession on downs at Post's 12-yard line.

Post JV team upends 'Wind Junior Varsity

Post on September 15. The 'Lopes scored on a 10-yard run in the first quarter, but Floydada answered on a 75-yard pass from Monty Anderson to Robert Cuba in the last minute of the second period. Neither team was able to convert and the score remained a 6-all deadlock at halftime.

The Antelopes scored on a five-yard run in the third period, and capitalized on a Floydada turnover with a 27-yard TD pass several minutes later. The JV Antelopes closed out the game with a 1-yard TD run in the final period.

The coaches named Monty Anderson, Robert Cuba and Frankie Maldonado as the outstanding offensive players. Defensive players of the game were Chad Benjamin and Julian Hernandez.

Antelope fullback Russ Bird's 71-yard sprint was cut short of a score by Monte Quisenberry's saving tackle at the 2-yard line. However, Bird crashed through on the ensuing play to extend Post's margin to 33-0.

Floydada moved 52 yards on eight plays in its next series, but again gave up the ball on downs at Post's 25. Brad Lawson broke into a long gainer into Whirlwind territory, and Floydada was flagged for a face mask infraction at the end of the play. Bullish tailback Alvin Reed then covered the final 38 yards for the Antelopes' sixth TD of the game. Simpson added Post's 40th and final point with a perfect kick.

The Whirlwinds averted their first regular-season shutout since a 21-0 blanking by Littlefield in 1990 by staging a touchdown drive in the final three minutes. Abshier's 16-yard pass to Ken Cummings moved the ball to Post's one, and Abshier's QB sneak blasted through on the next play. Abshier added the twopoint conversion to cap the 60-yard scor-

BILL'S NOTES

From looking at the final score, one might think that the Antelopes administered a "good country lickin'." Maybe it was. Floydada's offense sputtered at times, but the blitzing 'Lope defense had something to do with that. Post is a solid, well-balanced squad that should live to its pre-season expectations. If there is a better 2A squad in Region I (including Springlake-Earth) I would hate to tangle with it.

The 'Winds had some key people missing, and that had a lot to do with the runaway - especially on defense. There were at least two plays that could have gone either way (which contributed to a 28-point swing). some positive points for the 'Winds . . . the kind of things that keep 'em coming backi regardless of the circumstances or the score.

Zach Abshier did a pretty good job, under a lot of pressure, and had an entire half of additional experience. I'll bet he wishes he had that pass back that went 100 yards the other way. He did another fine job of punting -- he nailed the 'Lopes down at their own 3 on one occasion (this is getting to be a game-to-game occurrence). Vernon Cooper, subbing for brother Pete, ran well and ran tough . . . plus had another good defensive outing. Monte Ouisenberry made a couple of nice touchdown-saving tackles. Neal Nelson was missed on both sides of the line -- hopefully he'll be back in full form this

My choice for offensive player of the game goes to Vernon Cooper -- his 119 yards on 16 carries was his best effort as a Whirlwind. We'll see a lot more of this talented sophomore in the years to come. The offensive play of the game was Casey Hart's halfback toss for a TD which caught the Whirlwind defense totally of f-guard.

Post's Brad Lawson gets my nod for defensive player of the game, and his 100-yard interception return for a score is my favorite for defensive play of the game. I didn't detect a "headhunter" hit. The lick given to Sammy, which put him out of action, came close . . . but I don't give my "headhunter" mention to an opponent.



We are now (December 31, 1994) ompleting the first 5-year cycle during which the initial wave of private appliator licensees will have to have cometed 15 CEU's in order to renew their cense for 1995. Do not confuse this with the old certified or "Grandfather" certificate, which was issued prior to 1990. Those applicators with the old certificates have until December 1995 to obtain 15 CEU's.

Some clever licensees with few (if any) CEU's have already thought of the possibility of not getting their CEU's but rather just let their license lapse and start all over with the 3 hour training, the TDA test, and a check for \$50. That would, after all, be less time consuming and less problematical than trying to get 10-15 CEU's within the next few

Local harvest aid test results

Preliminary results from the harvest aid test on the Jimmy Kemp farm in Lockney, which was applied on September 10 and rated September 17, are in. These plots are a cooperative effort of Rhone Poulenc, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and Jimmy Kemp. The treatments and their percent open bolls and defoliation are as follows:

Clearly the Prep + Folex is performing better seven days after treatment. We ust however, consider the weather which was cloudy and cool during those days. Given 10-14 days, which would be about the time you read this paper changes will have occurred. One should also consider the price of treatment and yield potential. The one critical factor is to not wait too long and allow for degradation of quality. 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Preparations are underway for start of weevil control program

-- From Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Preparations are well underway for the start of PCG's 1994 High Plains Boll Weevil Diapause Control Program according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers. PCG official announced that Kubin Air Inc. of Bovina, TX, was licensees can only get their license re- awarded the 1994 aerial spraying contract with a bid of \$5.16 per gallon of chemical applied.

Kubin Air Inc. will provide 7 turbine powered aircraft for the program, each equipped with a satellite-based guidance CEU delinquent private applicator lic-system from Satloc, Inc., of Casa keeping for program operations.

"The 1994 program will kick off September 27th," says Roger Haldenby, PCG Boll Weevil Program Coordinator "Weevil pressure has been high again this year following yet another mild winter. However, the dry, hot summer conditions have helped some."

Trap catches show weevil numbers are currently below levels seen in 1993. This is good news for the 1994 program but not much comfort for some producers who have seen more boll weevil activity in the past two years than they remember seeing before.

"Weather records were shattered in July '94 with temperatures soaring to as much as 119°F," adds Haldenby. "Boll weevil numbers in 1993 similarly broke records across our area bringing home to us the desperate need for a cold winter to aid us in the fight against this terrible pest."

Wayne Huffaker, Chairman of PCG's Boll Weevil Steering Committee commented, "PCG is pulling out all the stops again this year in the battle against the boll weevil. 1993 was the largest, best effort in the program's history. We will do what it takes again this year and pray for a cold winter. The South Plains cannot afford to lose this battle."

COTTON DEFICIENCY PAYMENT UNCHANGED THROUGH JULY

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) decreases in both the average price received by growers and monthly marketing left the estimated 1994 upland cotton deficiency son.

payment unchanged through July.

The projected cotton deficiency payment settled at 7.77 cents per pound through July leaving a 1.32 cent final payment rate after subtracting the 6.45 cent advance payment. Earlier in the season producers were able to apply for and receive the 6.45 cent advance on the 1994 deficiency payment.

Through July, 1994's cumulative marketings totaled 5.28 million bales. Marketing during the same 7-month period in 1993 were slightly higher at 5.69 million bales.

Preliminary calculations through July project the final payment around 7 cents. However, significant changes in either marketings or prices received could still effect the final payment rate. The maximum deficiency payment possible in 1994 is 22.9 cents, the difference between the upland cotton loan rate of 50 cents and the 72.9 cent target price established in the 1990 Farm Bill.

Deficiency payments are calculated as the lesser of the difference between the target price and either the Commodity Credit Corporation Loan Rate or the average price received by growers weighted by total marketings for the preceding calendar year.

NEW GROWTH ON COTTON

Kater Hake, Cotton Specialist with the Texas Ag Extension Service, says producers who see regrowth in their dryland and irrigated cotton may be close to missing a prime opportunity to get the 1994 crop out of the field.

According to PCG, Hake is still encouraging producers to take action to terminate their crops, including dryland fields with only marginal yield potential, in order to take advantage of the crop's earliness and maintain the highest quality possible.

He notes that plants that have started to show signs of regrowth are no longer sending any resources to developing bolls, instead they are putting all their efforts towards growing new stems, leaves and squares that will not contribute anything to yield. An added benefit of terminating the crop early is the ability to prepare fields to store as much moisture as possible for the 1995 sea-



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


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
