# Fires claim 1,200 acres of grassland

Fires fueled by 40 mph winds burned hard work. more than 1,200 acres of CRP grassland in fields along Texas 207, about 6 miles north of Floydada, and threatened the homes of Joe Richard Noland and Tom Floydada Airport were reported at 62 Pierce Thursday night.

said the fires started about 5 p.m., November 17. Firefighters from Floydada and Lockney fought the blaze for more than three hours before bringing it under control at 8:30 p.m.

"But there was a couple of houses that were probably in jeopardy at one time," said Welborn.

"It came within 40 feet of my yard and approximately 80 feet of my house before the firemen got the fire out," said bly didn't even know he had a flat," said Noland. "I was very grateful for their one resident.

"My house wasn't damaged by the fire but when the high winds picked up again on Sunday (wind gusts at mph on Sunday), the ashes from the fire Floydada Fire Chief Bobby Welborn were blown throughout my house. The ashes seemed to come through the walls. I've got black walls, black curtains, black carpet and black furniture."

Welborn said it's unclear what caused the fires. "Separate fires ignited along a stretch on Texas 207 indicating that a No homes were damaged in the fires. vehicle on the road may have thrown off sparks that were fanned by the high winds," said Welborn.

"There hasn't been an increase in the dues in the last twenty years that I can find," said Meyers. We are looking for a real solution to a problem that has existed for a number of years and trying not to just pass it on to the next board."

Councilman Eric Cornelius made a motion to provide an office in City Hall for the Floydada Chamber of Commerce for a period of one year then review the arrangement and see if it is working out. City Manager Gary Brown pointed out that there is no room for the chamber at this time and that housing them will have to be delayed until the renovation of City Hall is complete, in late January or early February. This was agreeable with the chamber.

City Secretary Sharon Quisenberry asked that the Chamber set consistent hours to be in their office each day so that city employees will be able to direct inquiries to them in an efficient manner. Griffin told the council that the chamber goal is to have consistent parttime hours

for the office. The council briefly discussed the possible plans being formulated by Mackenzie Water Authority for handling the water situation. No new ideas have surfaced according to City Manager Brown who attended the Mackenzie board meeting on Tuesday, November 15. Any solutions will be long range and the water situation will remain critical for the four area cities involved for at least the next year unless there is heavy rainfall.

Brown said, "The best we can hope for now is that it rains. We will definitely not be looking at cutting water rates to encourage use in the summer and we will probably have to do something

The Health Fair will kick-off with an American Heartwalk. In this event teams of walkers from businesses, clubs, schools, etc., as well as individual walkers, collect donations for the American Heart Association from their friends and relatives who wish to sponsor them in the Heartwalk. Walkers turn in their packets the day of the walk, then everyone walks together, at their own pace, as many miles as they wish.

Since we are a weekly there are lots of times I feel like we are scooped by the dailies. We can't help it—it just seems like so often the big stories happen on Wednesday afternoon just after the paper gets in the newsstands.

The big CRP fire on Thursday was a good example. After it was all overthe Plainview Daily Herald and The Lubbock Avalanche Journal both had stories. Now we were reduced to writing old news once again. The pictures of those big fires aren't very good most of the time because of all the smoke and your little view from the ground—so we were trying to think of a new "angle".

Rosemary Gonzales thought of something. She figured it would be a good idea for me to go up in a plane and take an aerial picture of the burned acreage.

She knows how I feel about flying especially in those big jets. I might be alright if I could just go into the cockpit and interview the pilots and get to know them real well before we took off. For some reason I worry about what or who is behind the pilot doors and what or who serviced the plane I happen to be on. I do not like turning my life over to strangers.

Rosemary kept encouraging me (or bugging me) until I finally agreed to turn into the airport and see if Mitch Probasco (the famous crop duster) was busy. I didn't want to call ahead because then he would have had more of a chance to set aside some time for me.

Rosemary was with me just to make sure I went through with it.

Unfortunately Mitch was not busy. Not only was he not busy but he was more than happy to take me up in the plane and let me take some pictures. He even asked Rosemary to come too!!

There was no way to get out of if. It was her idea in the first place. What was she going to say. "Alice I think it is perfectly safe for you to fly but not for

I asked Mitch if he was sure the wind wasn't blowing too hard to fly. He told me very gently that wind was what made

He has a very nice smile-although there was at least one time his smile looked a tiny bit sadistic. Before we took off he pulled out a clipped out yellowed article from The Hesperian from back in

the 1980's sometime. It was a picture of when he crashed in a cornfield. He thought the cutline was sarcastic. I thought it was funny-but who was I too argue with a man about to

take me up in his plane. I told him I was sorry—even though I'm not even sure I worked here then.

Mitch said the picture taker should sit in the front passenger seat-so Rosemary sat right behind me and kept patting my head for encouragement (that stopped pretty quick).

# Resident escapes injury in home fire



HARDLY A TRACE--On Monday afternoon, smoke was still rising from the ashes of this Sunday afternoon fire which completely destroyed a house 4 miles north on Hwy. 207 and three miles east. The house was owned by Floyd

Montgomery and being rented by Charles George. George was asleep at the time of the fire and was awakened by the crackling of the fire. He escaped unharmed.

Charles George, 25, narrowly escaped with his life Sunday afternoon after he awoke to the sound of "crackling fire" in his wood frame home, four miles north and three miles east of Floydada.

According to family members, George was sleeping late when the sound of fire woke him up around 12:00 noon. The house was full of smoke and George hurriedly grabbed a few clothes and some pictures of his children before fleeing the house.

By the time firefighters arrived the high winds (62 mph gusts were reported at Floydada Airport) had fanned the flames which engulfed the house. The home burned completely to the ground destroying all of George's belongings. George's cat also died in the fire.

George believed it started in the bathroom while others have theorized that high winds caused electrical wires to touch and set off sparks.

It is unknown what caused the fire.

The house was owned by Floyd Montgomery and was being rented by

According to family members, George returned to his parent's home in Dallas on Monday.

# Overall county sales tax

made to Floyd County cities from the state comptroller's office have been received with Floydada showing a decrease and Lockney displaying an increase. Total rebates received in Floyd County this month were \$16,744.16, a decrease of 12.43 percent when compared to the \$19,122.47 received in November of 1993.

Lockney displayed an increase of 0.02 percent from the same period in 1993 in over all receipts. The city's November check was in the amount of \$5,310.51 compared to \$5,309.43 received in November 1993.

Floydada's check from the state comptroller's office was in the amount of \$11,433.65 showing a decrease of 17.22 percent from the \$13,813.04 payment received in November of 1993.

Area cities, their November 1994 rebates and percentage of change are listed below.

Tulia; \$20,708.96, -4.50% Payments totaling \$195.3 million in local sales tax rebates went back to 1,072 Texas cities, according to the state comptroller's office. This month's sales tax payments include taxes collected on September sales and reported to the comptroller by businesses filing monthly returns in October and for sales made in July, August and September by quarterly filers.

Sales taxes are collected by merchants and forwarded to the state which retains a 6.25 percent share and returns the city sales tax portion to each city, county, hospital district or transit system. Neither Floyd County nor Lockney


Floydada Chamber of Commerce will once again be sponsoring the family favorite, "Come Home For Christmas". in downtown Floydada.





Brown reported that tentative plans call for applying for grants and loans in excess of \$1,750,000.00 and restructuring the current bonded debt to easy the payment burden on the member cities. First strike plans include the drilling of Mackenzie owned wells at Tulia and Floydada to offset decreases in allotments from Mackenzie. It will be close to a year before this phase of the plan can be implemented stated Brown.

Bids were opened for the proposed demolition of dilapidated structures on two properties in the city. Submitting bids on the project at 310 W. Marivena Street were: Gordon Adams of Lockney, \$725.00; Horacio Favela of Floydada, \$875.00; I. S. Construction of Floydada, \$900.00; and Vernon Wickware of Floydada, \$475.00. The work was awarded to Wickware on a motion by Burns with a second by Hill. All

voted in favor. Bids submitted on the demolition project at the corner of Ross and 3rd Street included: \$1,750.00 from Adams; \$3,000.00 from Favela; \$1,300.00 from I. S. Construction; and \$1,200.00 from Wickware. The work was unanimously awarded to Wickware on a motion by Hill with a second by

# Wide variety of scholarships available to graduating seniors

LOCKNEY — Several scholarship 1994, Key Asthma Ath. for athletes with opportunities are available for graduating seniors this year according to Patsy Ulmer of Lockney ISD. They require a variety of qualifications and the deadlines for applying are also varied.

Texas A&M offers scholarships for Hispanic and African-American honor students. The deadline for applications is January 14, 1995. Southwest Texas State also offers scholarships to Hispanic and African-American students. Their application deadline is February 1, 1995. In addition, Southwest Texas State has scholarship money available for students in the top 10 percent of their class who have a 3.5 grade point average and score 1000 on the SAT or 24 on the ACT and apply by February 1.

Many scholarships are available for athletes including the FINA Scholar-Athlete for students in the top ten percent of their class who earn a Varsity UIL Letter and apply by December 14,

asthma who apply before March 31, 1995, and Milky Way for high school athletes who maintain high grades and are involved in community service and apply before January 9, 1995.

Children of school employees can qualify for a Horace Mann Scholarship with a B average and a score of 32 on the ACT or 1000 on the SAT. Application deadline is February 28, 1995. Cargill scholarships are waiting for students whose family derive 50% of their income from farming. The application deadline is Febrauary 15, 1995.

Ed Communications scholarship money is available for students who are U.S. citizens and score well on the ACT or SAT and apply before June 1, 1995.

Devry offers scholarships to students who wish to attend Devry and take the SAT or ACT by December. Application deadline is March 20, 1995.

The University of Texas awards

scholarships to top students in their class who apply before December 1, 1994. Angelo State has CARR scholarships for students in the top 15% of the class who maintain a 90 average and score 25 on the ACT or 1000 on the SAT. Application deadline is March 1, 1995.

Baylor University has COLLINS money available for students who write a qualifying essay and score 1150 on the SAT or 28 on the ACT. Deadline for applying is January 31, 1995.

South Plains College offers scholarships for students in the top 50% of their class and exhibit leadership qualities. They must apply before March 1, 1994.

Texas Tech offers a variety of scholarships with the application deadline for most of them March 1, 1995. Incarnate Word College also has scholarships to award. Postal Inspectors have this advice for potential investors. Be wary of high pressure sales tactics, promises of high investment returns and minimal risks. Take the time to check out the reputation of the offeror by contacting state and federal regulatory agencies. Seek advice from a trusted friend or family member and seek professional counsel before investing.

Remember, when it comes to making sound investment decisions, nothing returns more on your investment than doing your homework before you part with your cash. You can call the BBB, 24 hours at 763-0459.

Telemarketing has become an increasingly popular way to legitimately contact numerous potential customers quickly and easily in an effort to sell a variety of products and services. At the same time, however, it has also become a common mode of defrauding thousands of consumers who may be called about sweepstakes and prize promotions, "free" vacations and travel certificates, "no-risk" investment opportunities or "charitable" donations.

Your Better Business Bureau, in answer to the many questions that we receive every day about these types of gimmicks, has published a brochure called "TIPS ON AVOIDING

# Politically correct policy is invading Smithsonian

In case you hadn't heard, the forces of "political correctness" (PC) want to do for "America's museum," the Smithsonian Institution, what they have done to colleges and universities: prohibit all knowledge that doesn't fit the 'multicultural," "diverse," "inclusive," 'tolerant" PC view of the world.

On a recent visit to the National Museum of Natural History, I went straight for the mammal exhibit, mammo-centrist that I am (that means I prefer mammals to insects). A sign with the heading "What's Wrong?" greeted me as I entered. "The world and our perceptions of it have changed since 1960 when these mammal exhibits were installed," I was informed. pressed are now "prohibited." A few samples of the new thoughtcrime:

 "Humans are the standard. Humans are treated as more important than other mammals, which are judged as good or bad depending on their interaction with us." I thought, wait a minute for anything to be intelligible there has to be some standard of reference. Humans are what we know best, since that's what we are right? So, we measure things by what we know best-us. Is that wrong? Is it "species bigotry?" What standard are we supposed to use? Giraffes? Twotoed sloths? Bumble bees?

Besides-humans are important. I don't think I've ever heard of whales or cape buffalo organizing to study the environment so it can be protected, or to save endangered species or put out forest fires. Heck, mammals probably didn't even care when the dinosaurs

died. I think they were glad! · "Males are the standard. Female animals are portrayed in ways-that make them appear deviant or substandard as compared to male animals." But the only differences between males and females in the exhibits were those that actually exist in nature—in coloring and size. Like it or not, males frequently are larger and more colorful than their female counterparts. Why? Well, for one thing, females need to be less visible to predators since they bear the young. This "inequality," apparently, is a PC no-no. And from now on, whenever the world doesn't jibe with PC orthodoxy, the

Smithsonian is going to "cleanse" it. · "Gender bias. Man is used to refer to both women and men, reinforcing the impression that men are more important in society." But in English, the term man always has served as generic shorthand for distinguishing human beings from animals. It never has signified one sex or the other, hence it cannot imply greater importance for either. PCers choose to hear "man" in a way it isn't meant. And when they choose to take offense, they impose that choice on the rest of us. We must be offended as well. Once again, anything conflicting with PC ideology takes a back seat. The victim this time: the English language.

As I read a recent spate of articles in The Wall Street Journal, U.S. News & World Report and elsewhere about PC outrages throughout the Smithsonian, it occurred to me that the PC curators are placing humans on an even higher pedestal than they currently occupy.

After all, the PC prohibitions betray the curators' fear that from the facts of nature humans might draw parallels to humanity that violate PC orthodoxy. That orthodoxy is obsessed with removing all distinctions between human beings. And if a factual accounting of the animal world reinforces the idea of distinctions, the PC thought police are perfectly willing to alter that account in favor of something less factual.

Sounds to me like the animal kingdom is taking a back seat to human poli-

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



# Failure to use pesticides properly can be dangerous to wildlife and their habitat

Most producers appreciate wildlife. They enjoy seeing wildlife on their farms and some benefit economically by leasing hunting and fishing rights to

sportsmen. Fields provide food and cover for several species of wildlife. Quail and other birds, for example, nest along fencerows or in rangeland/CRP surrounding fields and enter the fields to feed or pick up grit. Pesticides applied to these areas can potentially harm wild-

CONFUSION STILL **EXISTS IN LICENSE** 

During the past few weeks several of you who have pesticide applicator's license received a letter\_from the Texas Department of Agriculture telling you that you had to have 15 hours of continuing education units (CEU's) by December 31, 1994. Well this is a bit incorrect. If you obtained your current \$50 private pesticide applicator's license during the calendar year 1990, the law requires you to\_complete 15 CEU's before February 28, 1995, in order to renew your license.

Licensees who have completed the minimum 15 CEU's can renew their license for another 5 years by simply submitting the \$50 fee when they are notified by the TDA later this year. If you are presently a 1990 licensee, but have not completed 15 CEU's yet, you should do so before February 28, 1995. You will not be allowed by TDA to renew your license until the 15 CEU requirement has been\_met! After March 1, 1995, license renewal will include a penalty fee in addition to the requirement of removing the CEU deficiencies. Of the total 15 CEU's required, two (2) must be in laws and regulations and one (1) in IPM.

"Old" certified private applicators who obtained their certification prior to January 10, 1989, and who have elected not to obtain a license have until February 28, 1996, (December 31, 1995, may be seen\_on some correspondence), to obtain their 15 CEU's.

Private applicators who obtained their license in 1991 to the present have 5 years from the year\_of issue to obtain their 15 CEU's. A 1991 licensee, for ex-

With USA Grown Cotton!

In recent years the public has become more concerned about pesticides and their effects on the environment. From 1987 to 1989, Texas farmers and ranchers treated an average of 15 million acres with insecticides and 20 million acres with herbicides. As stewards of the land and natural resources, farmers and ranchers should strive to use pesticides properly in order to minimize environmental risks.

The proper use of pesticides helps ensure that Americans have a safe, abundant and inexpensive supply of food and fiber. Pesticides improve crops yields and quality, and help to make farming practices profitable. However, improper use of pesticides can threaten wildlife and wildlife habitat.

Wildlife are directly exposed to pesticides when they eat plants or seeds with chemical residues or when they swallow the pesticide granules themselves. They are exposed indirectly when they eat insects or other animals killed by chemicals. Wildlife that are in fields when pesticides are applied, or that enter fields shortly afterward, may inhale vapors or get pesticides on their skin or in their eyes. Pesticides on an animal's skin or feathers may be swallowed when the animal grooms or preens itself. Pesticides washed by heavy rains into streams, ponds or other wetlands can harm aquatic animals.

Reducing pesticide use is one of the best ways to protect wildlife. However, pesticide reduction must be coupled with good pest management practices so that crop yields and profits do not suffer. Integrated pest management (IPM) is the most effective method of accomplishing this objective. IPM is a system that monitors pest populations and uses biological, cultural and chemical controls to keep insect pests below economically damaging levels. In an IPM program, pesticides are used only after other tactics have failed to keep pest numbers or damage below levels with cause economic crop loss.

Crop rotation is another important cultural control which can be used to suppress certain disease and insect pest.

In an effort to protect fish and wildlife, keep the following in mind when using pesticides.

· Use IPM practices in your production practices.

 Choose the pesticide least toxic to fish and wildlife · Protect field borders and other

noncrop habitats from pesticide. · Completely cover pesticide granules with soil, especially spilled granules at

the ends of rows. · Minimize chemical spray drift by using low-pressure sprays and nozzles that produce large droplets, and properly calibrating and maintaining spray equip-

· Don't spray over ponds and drainage ditches.


· Never wash equipment or containers where rinse water could enter ponds

· Properly dispose of chemical con-

· Read and follow pesticide label di-

Every pesticide user has a legal duty to use the chemical according to label directions. Using pesticides contrary to label directions jeopardizes wildlife and exposes the user to criminal prosecution. It may ultimately result in further restrictions on pesticides.

Personnel from the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 and the Natural Resources Conservation Service (formerly the USDA-Soil Conservation Service) are now in the field collecting data for the 1995 preplant soil moisture survey.

"This survey is conducted each year to determine general soil moisture availability and deficit trends prior to planting," says Ken Carver, Water District Assistant Manager. "The preplant soil moisture survey results help local agricultural producers determine the amount of water they need to apply to bring the five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity without over-irrigating or under-irrigating."

Historical data shows there is a better opportunity to produce above-average crop yields when the plant root zone of the soil is at or near field capacity prior to planting.

"Most of the 15-county Water District service area is experiencing very dry soil conditions as a result of below-average precipitation during the past two years. Unless significant precipitation is received during the winter and early spring, producers will likely have to apply heavy irrigations to bring the soil profile to field capacity prior to planting," says Carver.

Three teams are now collecting data for the 1995 pre-plant soil moisture survev in the northern counties of the High Plains Water District.

Jerry Funck and Scott Libby are making soil moisture readings in Armstrong, Potter and Randall Counties. Glenn Blackmon and Arnold Husky are measuring soil moisture in Castro and Deaf Smith Counties, and Gerald Crenwelge and Brian Houston are gathering data in Bailey and Parmer Counties. Weather permitting, they should complete their field work in early January.

Precipitation information will also be gathered from the rain gauges installed at each of the 300 + permanent soil moisture monitoring sites.

"Precipitation was distributed very unevenly during the 1994 growing season. This should be reflected in the rain gauge readings taken at each soil moisture monitoring site," says Carver.

Soil moisture monitoring sites are selected based upon soil types, the local saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which indicates possible well yields, and crop water requirements in the area. Each site represents typical dryland or irrigated farming practices in the area.

"Water District personnel have installed about 60 percent of the permamonthly newsletter, The Cross Section, prior to the pre-plant irrigation season.

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
