## Clinic roof repair discussed

FLOYDADA — Meeting in regular second by Eastham. session on January 17, Caprock Hospital District Board of Trustees discussed December were also reviewed. Farris that the physician recruiting firm has pairing or replacing the roof on the

Cogdell Clinic building. According to board president Tom Farris, "The roofers I have talked to have told me that the current roof is made of inferior materials and repairing the roof would only last until the next hail." He added that taking the repair route would result in an expenditure of \$5,000.00 now (the deductible under the insurance policy that is responsible for handling this roof damage) and an additional expenditure after the next hail to meet the \$1,000.00 deductible for repairing or replacing the roof under the

new insurance policy. Clinic administrator Bob Ericson told the board that he felt this was the way to go for financial reasons. "If we spend the \$5,000.00 to repair the roof now, the new policy will have to replace the roof if it is damaged again and we will only have to pay the deductible. This will be less expensive in the long run than re-

placing the roof now." Board member J.R. Turner expressed the view that the new insurance company would be reluctant to cover such a loss unless the roof is replaced prior to further damage. He also questioned whether or not the interior of the clinic and the contents of the building are currently covered if it rains and roof leaks cause water damage.

Ericson stated that after talking with Goen & Goen, the local firm handling the new policy, he was of the understanding that the building and contents were fully covered at this time.

Farris told the board that he had hoped to have bids for them to consider at the Tuesday morning meeting, but had received only one bid after talking with two roofers, Carr Roofing of Shallowater and Texas Roofers of Lubbock. He asked that the board table the matter until the other bid is received before making a decision.

Board member Joy Assiter made a motion to table the item at this time. Trustee Carmel Eastham seconded and the vote was unanimously in favor.

## FISD holds annual contract review of superintendent

FLOYDADA — The annual review of Floydada Independent School District Superintendent Jerry Cannon's contract was held by the FISD Board during executive session on January 12 during the regular monthly session. Cannon had submitted a letter to the board asking that his current three-year contract not be extended due to his plans for retirement at the end of his contract

The board honored his wishes. Cannon plans to retire following the 96-97 school year. No plans have been announced at this time for seeking a replacement. The board will address that issue during the last year of Cannon's

Superintendent Jerry Cannon told the board on Thursday evening that a letter had been received from the Texas Education Agency Commissioner of Education, Lionel R. Meno, informing the district that Floydada High School TAAS scores met the accountability indicator at a threshold of 65% or above.

The letter noted that even though the rating is not recognizable under the 1994 campus rating guidelines, it represents a "truly commendable level of performance." The school community was complimented on efforts to achieve excellence and the dedication and commitment of the campus educators.

bushel for the grain. Camels are not used much as work animals just mostly for racing and trading. They are tied down in a kneeling position and transported in the back of modern day pickups. Falconry is also a big sport. Some of the birds sell for as much as \$10,000.

The women do most of the chores including herding the sheep. Women never show their faces in public. There is a strict gender separation. She told the group that their main foods are lamb, goat, chicken, rice and fruits.

She also explained that all the time that they were there that mail was closely censored.

## Cottonseed production up 18.2%

From Cotton Incorporated, Inc. The U.S. Department of Agriculture

said recently that this year's cottonseed crop is likely to be the largest in 50 years. Based on the size of the crop and predicted dairy feed use, Tom Wedegaertner, associate director of cottonseed research at Cotton Incorporated, Raleigh, North Carolina, says, "Whole cottonseed feeding in dairy cow rations is likely to approach the 3-million ton

According to Wedegaertner, U.S. cottonseed production is estimated at 7.568 million short tons, 18.2% greater than the totals last year and the most since 1934. Cottonseed crushing and exports are expected to increase, so there may not be as much cottonseed for use in dairy rations as would be ex-

## Size of deficiency payment uncertain

By Shawn Wade

Preliminary marketing and price figures through the month of November show the size of the 1994-crop Upland Cotton Deficiency Payment is still un-


The size of the Upland Cotton Deficiency Payment is of particular concern to producers who will want to know if the final payment rate will fall below the 6.45 cent advance payment rate many received at program sign-up time. A final payment rate below the 6.45 cent advance rate means producers would have to repay at least a small part of the advance payment.

PCG officials note that efforts are underway to develop alternate ways for producers to make such payments, if it become necessary to do so, that will not create an undue financial burden for the producer.

The November figures, released by USDA December 30, indicate that the U.S. cotton producers marketed over 4.3 million bales and received an average price of 69.3 cents per pound. The cumulative volume of cotton marketed through November climbed to 13.569 million bales and the weighted average price received by growers also increased to 66.48 cents per pound. The new figures produce a calculated total Deficiency Payment rate of 6.42 cents through November, 0.03 cents below the advance payment rate.

The 66.48 cent weighted average price means that the deficiency payment could still go either way depending on the December figures and any revisions to previous monthly figures. Because of the possibility of revised monthly figures there is no sure way to estimate what combination of marketing's and price would keep the payment rate equal to or above 6.45 cents.
