## Dear Bill,

 I would encourage the voters tocast a vote "For" Constitutional cast a vote "For" Constitutional Amendment 5 on the November 8
ballot. This amendment will allow the Permanent School Fund and income from this fund to guarantee bonds issued in future year by school districts in the state. This guarantee
could easily assure every district a could easily assure every district a Aaa or Aa bond rating, thus reducing
interest costs to taxpayers on school buildings built in future years. This amendment will in no way
remove any local control from patrons in shol control from in every school district will still determine whether or not to approve the issuance of bonds. IT will not cost money, but save tax money. As an example of the savings, a $\$ 1,000,000$ bond issue for 15 years at an A bond rating would cost about $\$ 825,690$ in interest. With the passage of amendment 5 , there would be a saving of about $\$ 79,250$ if the district has a Aaa rating.
The Permanent School Fund was The Fund was made a perpetual state trust fund by the Constitution of 1876. The present size of the Fund is about four billion dollars and the General Land Office has estimated hat by year end 1989 the Fund will interest and dividends generated from investments of the Fund flow immediately into the Available School Fund, from which money is
distributed to the schools on per distributed to the schools on a per
capita basis. This will in no way change with the passage amendment 5 .
Should a school district default in payment, the amendment calls for
payment of the defaulted payments payment of the defaulted payments
from the Fund, but the defaulted payment would be recovered, along with any statutory interest, from first state monies payable to the school district. It should be noted that no defaulted on any of its bonds.
It makes good sense that a savings uture years can be insured without placing the Fund in jeopardy. I join
with the elected officials serving on the State Board of Education in supporting the passage of
Constitutional Amendment 5 on
November 8 .
