Commissioners approve new phone system for jail

FLOYDADA — Members of the Floyd County Commissioners Court approved the purchase of a new telephone system for the Floyd County Jail during their regular meeting on Monday, April 10. The new system will be provided by Valuline, Inc., the current long distance service provider for the county at a cost of \$1,937.00.

Motion to purchase the new system was made by Precinct 2 Commissioner Lennie Gilroy and seconded by Precinct 3 Commissioner George Taylor. All voted in favor.

The purchase follows several months defective phones. The Floyd County Sheriff's Department has been experiencing problems such as interrupted calls for some time according to Sheriff Charles Overstreet. Commissioner Gilroy stated that had happened on a couple of occasions when he called the department recently.

The Sheriff's Department will also be having some repair and maintenance work performed on the radio system and tower equipment used for communication between patrol cars and the office as well as other law enforcement agencies and EMS departments. Lubbock Communications submitted a proposal for renovating the equipment and bringing it into a state of good repair at an estimated cost of \$695.00.

A middle of the night break down during March resulted in a partial repair to some of the equipment in order to get back on line said Overstreet. This cost \$315.00 and should lower the \$695.00 repair estimate a bit as some of the items included were already done.

Repair or replacement of the antenna on the tower is also anticipated according to Overstreet. He told the commissioners that the technician had indicated the antenna may have been struck by

lightening and might need to be repaired or replaced. An estimate for that will not be available until the antenna is in-

Motion to allow Lubbock Communications to do the work was made by Gilroy with a second by Precinct 4 Commissioner Jon Jones. All voted in

County Treasurer Mary Shurbet made her report for the previous month stating that the county began the month of March with \$445,475.49 and took in receipts of \$123,757.54. Transfers in totaled \$217,445.07 and transfers out were \$221,217.90. Disbursements were of telephone difficulties attributed to \$142,742.64, leaving funds totaling \$422,717.56 as of March 31.

"Most years there has been 3-5 department stores in Floydada, but as the population dwindled so have the stores," said Bill.

Hales Department Store is now the only department store in Floyd County. Bill Hale married his wife Carolyn in 1952. In the early 70's after the twin sons, Mike and Steve, had gone to college, Carolyn came to work in the store. Their son, Richard started working at Hale's in 1977.

"I was running for the office of state representative," said Bill, and Richard came to work at the store. He has managed the store for the last 10-12 years."

Together the family has kept the store operating and filling the needs of residents all over the South Plains. Carolyn buys the womens clothes and Richard does the buying of shoes and mens

Since the first day it opened Hales

Over the years the store has employed approximately 180 people. Current employees are: Irene Irby, since 1952; Martha Williams, since 1970's: Lisa Suarez, since the early 1990's; and the current DECA student is Zacha Harris.

The store will celebrate their 50 years this week with a storewide sale, Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Salina Shorter was one of two Lady 'Winds to improve over her opening day score as she shot 103 in the second day at Muleshoe. Other Floydada scores at





Fertilized management program necessary for good home gardens

Extension Agent-Ento. (PM) Crosby/Floyd Counties

Home gardens provide high quality vegetables for fresh use, canning and freezing if the crops are supplied with adequate nutrients. All vegetables require relatively large amounts of plant nutrients. Most home gardeners will have to provide additional plant nutrients by applying fertilizers and/or compost. If your soil is naturally rich in nutrients, you are lucky; however, you may find it necessary to give your garden a nutritional boost through the use of fertilizers. In West Texas, a fertilizer management program is essential for successful home gardens.

The soils of this region contain an adequate supply of the essential plant nutrients generally, with the exception of nitrogen and phosphorus. In some soils and situations, iron and/or zinc are needed in small quantities.

Over-fertilization can cause gardening problems, especially with any of the 'complete fertilizers". On many older gardening sites in our region, we find hat excessive fertilization with phosphorus has induced zinc and iron deficiency

Additional organic matter (compost, peat moss, and manure) can have beneficial effects on the home garden. Organic matter serves to "open up" a clay soil, thus improving drainage and aeration. In sandy soils, organic matter increases the water holding capacity. In any soil, the general soil fertility status will likely be improved.

Care must be taken with manure; nutrients will be added (in particular phosphorus), but so will salts which can have an overall harmful effect on the garden if too much manure is applied. Do not exceed a rate of 10 lbs. of dried manure or 50 lbs. of feedlot or stable manure per 100 square feet.

The objective of composting is to convert refuse into a "synthetic manure." Leaves, grass clippings, weeds, and vegetable matter from the kitchen can all be used. In our region, grass clippings will predominate. Depending on your lawn fertilization practices, compost from grass clippings will be high in ni-

When new clippings are added to the pile, they should be mixed in with some of the older material, finishing with a layer of older material placed over the top. To utilize the compost or peat moss, spread about 5 bushels of the material over 1000 sq. ft. and mix thoroughly into

Floyd County Ag Update

Rainfall shortage troubles **High Plains cotton growers**

Lack of rainfall and a declining water table pose problems for cotton growers on the Texas High Plains as they begin preparing their fields for planting. Some 6.4 million acres of cotton are expected to be planted in Texas this year, with some 4 million of that on the High

Since Jan. 1, the 25-county area around Lubbock which annually produces about half of the state's cotton has received less than an inch of rain. Lubbock has recorded only 0.97 inches of precipitation — about half its long-term average for the first three months of a

Combined with the below-average precipitation last year, fields are without adequate subsoil moisture for planting and for a good growing season, said Kater Hake, cotton agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Fields without some deep water could suffer severe loss if July rains (during the peak of the growing season)

aren't timely," Hake said. Some farmers who irrigate from wells are running into problems as they water fields in preparation for planting in the next few weeks, he noted.

"Well capacity is down substantially from 1994, and many wells are pumping dry during the prewatering," Hake said. He said that the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District Number One reports that the average pumping depth dropped about two feet from last year. The water district noted that the year before, the average water depth dropped one foot, while the 10year average annual decline has been half a foot.

"Although producers are working their fields, applying herbicides and prewatering, conditions are less than optimum," Hake said. He noted that high winds and unusually high temperatures are resulting in evaporation losses of pre-plant irrigation water.



Fertilized management program necessary for good home gardens

Extension Agent-Ento. (PM) Crosby/Floyd Counties

Home gardens provide high quality vegetables for fresh use, canning and freezing if the crops are supplied with adequate nutrients. All vegetables require relatively large amounts of plant nutrients. Most home gardeners will have to provide additional plant nutrients by applying fertilizers and/or compost. If your soil is naturally rich in nutrients, you are lucky; however, you may find it necessary to give your garden a nutritional boost through the use of fertilizers. In West Texas, a fertilizer management program is essential for successful home gardens.

The soils of this region contain an adequate supply of the essential plant nutrients generally, with the exception of nitrogen and phosphorus. In some soils and situations, iron and/or zinc are needed in small quantities.

Over-fertilization can cause gardening problems, especially with any of the "complete fertilizers". On many older gardening sites in our region, we find nat excessive fertilization with phosphorus has induced zinc and iron defi-



Additional organic matter (compost, peat moss, and manure) can have beneficial effects on the home garden. Organic matter serves to "open up" a clay soil, thus improving drainage and aeration. In sandy soils, organic matter increases the water holding capacity. In any soil, the general soil fertility status will likely be improved.

Care must be taken with manure; nutrients will be added (in particular phosphorus), but so will salts which can have an overall harmful effect on the garden if too much manure is applied. Do not exceed a rate of 10 lbs. of dried manure or 50 lbs. of feedlot or stable manure per 100 square feet.

The objective of composting is to convert refuse into a "synthetic manure." Leaves, grass clippings, weeds, and vegetable matter from the kitchen can all be used. In our region, grass clippings will predominate. Depending on your lawn fertilization practices, compost from grass clippings will be high in ni-

Rainfall shortage troubles **High Plains cotton growers**

Lack of rainfall and a declining water table pose problems for cotton growers on the Texas High Plains as they begin preparing their fields for planting. Some 6.4 million acres of cotton are expected to be planted in Texas this year, with some 4 million of that on the High

Since Jan. 1, the 25-county area around Lubbock which annually produces about half of the state's cotton has received less than an inch of rain. Lubbock has recorded only 0.97 inches of precipitation - about half its long-term average for the first three months of a

Combined with the below-average precipitation last year, fields are without adequate subsoil moisture for planting and for a good growing season, said Kater Hake, cotton agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Fields without some deep water could suffer severe loss if July rains (during the peak of the growing season)

aren't timely," Hake said. Some farmers who irrigate from wells are running into problems as they water fields in preparation for planting in the next few weeks, he noted.

"Well capacity is down substantially from 1994, and many wells are pumping dry during the prewatering," Hake said. He said that the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District Number One reports that the average pumping depth dropped about two feet from last year. The water district noted that the year before, the average water depth dropped one foot, while the 10year average annual decline has been

"Although producers are working their fields, applying herbicides and prewatering, conditions are less than optimum," Hake said. He noted that high winds and unusually high temperatures are resulting in evaporation losses of pre-plant irrigation water.


