

Now the heavy lifting begins in Washington. For the sake of our children and grandchildren, we can only hope the new majority does not weary of the task before them, and we can hope as well that they have the support of all concerned Americans in process.

The new, younger, (and somewhat different) Republicans who took over the Senate and House made impressive changes during their first 100 days in power. Probably the biggest single change was that they kept their promise. That is something the American people are not accustomed to.

Most Republican candidates for Congress promised, if elected, to apply to themselves the laws they pass for all other Americans. They kept that promise. They promised to open up the processes of government. They kept that promise. They promised to force a vote in the House on a variety of proposals (including term limits, a balanced budget amendment, and the line item veto, that had been bottled up in committees by the Democrats for many years. The term limits proposal failed in the House, and the balanced budget amendment failed in the Senate, but they at least forced members to publicly vote on the matter, thereby allowing the voters themselves to see who represents their wishes and who doesn't.)

All in all, they did well, in our view. And the people responded accordingly. Congress, as an institution, has come up in voter approval polls, higher than any time in recent memory. It still has a way to go, but nevertheless people generally approve of their record so far. Now debate will begin on how to balance the federal budget over the next seven years. Budget resolutions calling for that balance have now passed both the House and Senate in slightly different forms, but details will be spelled out in the give and take of the legislative process.

There will probably be many areas where we will disagree with those details as proposed and finally enacted. Some of our own pet programs might get hurt. But we know for certain that if something is not done we will eventually end up like Germany after World War 1, with a worthless currency and people rampaging through the streets.

The Medicare thing is a good example. Under current projections the fund that pays for Medicare treatment will be absolutely broke by the year 2003, which isn't all that far away. At that point, if nothing is done, any elderly ill person will have to shift for them-

Any sane person would conclude that something must be done. Either the rate of growth in Medicare expenditure must be reduced, or taxes on an already overtaxed populace must go up. Or the whole thing will go bust.

President Clinton and the Democratic leadership in Congress have essentially taken a walk. Every day we hear the same refrain from them. "I'm in favor of a balanced budget, but..." Or, "I'm in favor of reforming welfare, but..." Or, "I'm in favor of saving Medicare, but ... "Or, "I'm in favor of cutting back on the size and expense of government, but..." There's always a "but."

Our own hope is that the Congress will find a way to cut back on the horrendous growth of expenditures in a variety of "entitlement" programs. If they have to put a "cap" on what the American people can afford, well and good. That would be better than passing the cost along to our grandchildren, and impoverishing them in the process.

And make no mistake about it. Much of the growth in Medicare costs is brought on by two factors: the threat of lawsuits in this day and age of plaintiffs attorneys, (which requires unnecessary "defensive medicine" practices on the part of doctors,) and the escalating costs attendant to running big city hospitals. Congress is in the process, finally, of enacting "tort reform", which may help the area of lawsuits, but the problems of escalating health care costs are still with us, and solutions are still in the offing. Perhaps Congressional debate on, and improvements in, Medicare can address that problem.

But the debate over budget matters should not in turn, in our view, strictly

Floyd County Commissioners approved a tax exemption for taxpayers who are over the age of 65 or are disabled. The action was taken during a special meeting held on Thursday, May 18. The exemption will be in the amount of \$3,000.00 of the assessed valuation of qualified taxpayer property.

The exemption takes effect for the 1995 tax year which began on January 1, 1995. This exemption is in addition to a previously approved homestead exemption of \$5,000.00. At the current county tax rate of 40 cents per \$100.00 valuation, each taxpayer eligible for both exemptions will see a savings on their county tax assessment of approximately \$32.00 for the year when the tax statements are distributed this fall.

Motion for the exemption came from Precinct 2 Commissioner Lennie Gilroy. A second was provided by Precinct 4 Commissioner Jon Jones. All voted in favor of the motion.

Items addressed at a meeting held on Friday May 12, included approval of farm contract #1505 for Clayton Pigg on a motion by Precinct 3 Commissioner George Taylor. The motion was seconded by Jones and approved on a inanimous vote.

on Medicare. The Medicare Trust Fund, which finances the program, is separate from the regular budget, and would now be in trouble regardless of the condition of the rest of government.

Nor should the budget debate be conducted strictly along party lines, although that seems to be the way things are shaping up. Medicare is only one of many government programs that have gotten out of hand. Any number of agencies and departments could be, and should be, taken to the cleaners. The practice of affording a vast array of government services to aliens, legal or illegal, ought to be stopped. Whole departments and agencies ought to be scrutinized carefully, with an eye to-

ward the budget ax. The creating of the Department of Education under Jimmy Carter, for instance, has done absolutely nothing to improve the quality of education in this country. The presence of the Department of Commerce has done nothing to reduce this country's trade deficit with the rest of the world. We see absolutely no evidence that the necessary functions of the Department of Energy could not be transferred to the Defense Department, or some other agency. In short, things can be changed, improved and made more efficient in the process.

We can hope that this Congress, unlike Congresses before, will stay the course. They were elected to change things. Let's hope they do. If so, our youngsters may have a chance. And their youngsters.

Then we can all applaud those who had the courage to make the tough votes.

Brown reviewed the successes of the City of Floydada in obtaining 2 million dollars from 9 different grants.

He gave an example of a community southwest of San Angelo with 23 houses. The community received 1/2 million dollars for water system. Brown also told the members of the town of George West which received 2 1/2 million dollars to build a fair ground.

Brown stressed to the members that "it can be done." He encouraged the members not to give up. The Foundation is currently working on obtaining a grant for a multi-purpose center.

"You will get turned down," said Brown, "but the key is to find out why you got turned down so you can go back and re-apply. You need to find out through this process if this would even be a legitimate source for your grants. You must have perseverance

Jon LaBaume told the board members the West Texas RC &D will help with grant searches or grant submissions whenever they are needed. The RC &D is currently doing a grant search for the Foundation in search for operating

Council approves exemption

FLOYDADA - The City Council of Floydada approved a motion to offer taxpayers an exemption for those over 65 or disabled. Discussion and action occurred during the May 18 regular session of the council.

The decision was not a unanimous one. Council member Eric Cornelius told the council he would rather see the council give all taxpayers an across the board cut in taxes by lowering the tax

"I feel like we are asking one group of people to pay a little more so that we can give another group of people a break on their taxes," said Cornelius. "I think it would be more fair to just lower taxes for everyone."

Figures presented by Brown indicate that the city will be able to reduce taxes across the board as well as offer the over-65 exemption. Cornelius told those in attendance that he would still prefer seeing a little larger tax decrease instead of offering exemptions.

Councilman Leroy Burns made a motion to approve a \$5,000.00 exemption. The motion died for lack of a sec-

Motion to approve a \$3,000.00 exemption for those over the age of 65 or who are disabled was made by Councilman Clar Schacht and seconded by Burns. Voting in favor were Schacht, Burns, Dale Lawson, Albert Hill, and Wayne Tipton. The motion carried with Cornelius voting against it.

... A request for a zoning variance was granted by the city for Victor and Deores Mata. The Planning and Zoning Commission for the city recommended approval of the request following a review of the situation.

Motion was made by Schacht and seconded by Hill. All voted in favor of allowing the construction of a carport in the area specified by the Matas.

... Joe Buck representing Safe Ag (Strategic Alliance For Economy Action Group of the Llano Estacado) and NTS representative Robert Steele met with the council to present a proposal for combining the purchasing power of cities in Crosby, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, and Lynn Counties. The plan would offer economy of services and savings to benefit residents of cities located in the area. It is based on each area implementing the extended calling option on telephone service and utilizing the NTS long distance service for calls outside their extended calling

Local communities participating in the proposed plan would then receive a rebate on the long distance charges paid by participating residents. Each city would have the option of utilizing the rebated monies to benefit their residents

in whatever manner they designate. No action was taken on the matter at this council session.

... Floydada Housing Authority Director Cindy Jeffries came before the council to present an annual report of the activities of the public housing facility. She gave an overview of the financial condition of the housing authority and also of the five types of housing handled by the facility which supervises 292 rental units in Floydada.

... Frank Breed was reappointed to serve another two year term as the Municipal Court Judge for the City of Floydada. Motion for the action was made by Schacht and seconded by Hill. All voted in favor.

.. The firm of Parkhill, Smith & Cooper was awarded the contract for engineering services on the 1994 Texas Community Development Program Water Grant project. Selection was based on individual scores following rating of each company under consideration. Oller Engineering scored 98, Hibbs & Todd Engineering scored 96, and Parkhill, Smith & Cooper Engineering scored 99. Areas rated included experience, work performance, capacity to perform and affirmative action.

Motion to award the contract was made by Tipton and seconded by Cornelius. The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion.

... No action was taken on signing a contract with the Floyd County Central Appraisal District for services in appraising property, assessing taxes and collecting them. City Attorney Karen Houchin is still revising the contract submitted by the district. She told the council that some of the statutory citations do not coincide with current regulations and asked the council for direction concerning items the city wants included in the contract.

Tax appraiser explains rise in county property evaluations

By Shelia Faulkenberry

Section 11.86 of the Texas Education Code requires the State Comptroller to conduct an annual study to estimate the total taxable value of all property within each school district. This requirement is of primary importance because the state's distribution of several billion dollars in school aid depends in part on the Comptroller's total taxable value findings.

As a part of the Comptroller's Study, the level and uniformity of property in each appraisal district is examined. The "level of appraisal" shows whether the district has appraised typical properties at 100% of market value. The "uniformity" measures indicate whether the appraisal district is appraising property uniformly within each category of property.

In accordance with Section 25.19 of the Texas Property Tax Code, property is appraised every three years by the Appraisal District. A mass appraisal is conducted in all categories of property to arrive at market value, which is used for tax purposes in each county.

Annually, an Onsight-Reviewer from the State Comptroller's Office conducts a Property Value Study which is used to determine the ratio of property values to the market value.

As mentioned above, this study affects the amount of state funding given to each school district for their operation. Recent studies have indicated that Floyd County residential, as well as commercial, property values are at a low ratio. Due to the low values, the Appraisal District is required to increase the values of residential and commercial property to prevent the school district from losing any state aid.

Shelia Faulkenberry, Chief Appraiser, has discussed with the taxing entities the available options, which are reducing tax rates, allowing homestead exemptions and allowing over-65 exemptions. Following are the taxing entities of Floyd County along with the exemption amounts and estimated effective tax rates:

In addition to the exemptions, the taxing entities may also choose to lower the tax rates for 1995 when set in August. An entity's effective tax rate, as seen above, produces the same tax levy as the prior year.

The Appraisal District will mail Notices of Appraised Value to all taxpayers by May 30, 1995. Upon receiving the notices, taxpayers are welcome to contact the Appraisal District if they feel there is an error or if their property is valued higher than market value. thing-just don't ask me to do that

And "Hazel" does just about anything and everything. She is responsible for teacher's files, secretarial duties to Cannon, getting things in order for school board meetings, cooking great desserts for the board meetings, reserving football seats, helping with elections and early voting-and the list goes on.

"We have had a tremendous increase

in paperwork since I first started," said Darlynn. "I used to be the payroll clerk and the school used to collect their own

Darlynn's last official day with the school will be June 30. Laveta Morren will be assuming the duties and has already started "learning the ropes."

"The best part of working here," said Darlynn, "has been the association with the school faculty and board members. I've also enjoyed the pleasant atmosphere here with my co-workers. Everyone has a positive attitude and I think it is important that we pass that on to visitors to our office.

"The first impression of our school very often starts right here in this office. We want to do everything we can to promote our school district."





without her," said Dispatcher Linda Edwards. "She is the only one the men will listen to," laughed Linda. "She can get them to do anything."

The dispatch duties have changed quite a bit since Lewis began. The work load has increased and the calls now come in with a greater frequency than they used to.

"When I first started," said Lewis, "we used ticker-tape teletype. Now we have separate radios for 911, fire and ambulance and deputies, city police and highway patrol.

"The jail did not hold as many prisoners when I first started as it does now. I cooked for the prisoners and I was here all night by myself.

"We had a water boiler heating system in the jail and at night we would have to go into the basement and put water in it."

For eight years Lewis worked the swing shift and then settled into the evening shift (3:00-11:00 p.m.).

Lewis says she has never been frightened being in the jail alone. "I'm not a person who scares easily. However, I do worry. I worry over the officers when I've sent them on a bad call—such as a domestic disturbance or a person with a gun. I worry until they call me back and tell me that everything is OK.

"Things get hectic in here when they call for back-up and I worry about the officers then too."

Besides the natural concern Eunice has for her officers, the most nerve wracking time in the dispatch office, according to Eunice, is during bad weather.

The phone is almost in a continual ring and Lewis is keeping track of the whereabouts of all the storm watchers, plus the weather reports coming to here for various agencies and individuals.

But no matter what the emergency, all the officers who work in Floyd County, and in the surrounding counties, have come to depend on the sound of Lewis's voice on the radio.

Her experience at the radio and her calm and steady voice has helped many officers through a variety of dangerous situations. As all good dispatchers know the voice coming over the radio is very often the only help a lone officer will have for what may seem like an eternity.

No matter how frightening the situation, it has always been Lewis's job to make sure the help at the other end of the radio always sounds calm and in com-

plete control. It is because she has done her job so well that the law enforcement officers all over the South Plains hold her is such

high regard. Not that there haven't been a couple of times that Eunice hasn't always reacted with calm and self control-but you never heard it on the radio.

Eunice still laughs at the times someone has managed to shake her compo-

"When Ray Macha was a city policeman he used to play practical jokes on me. The back door would not close good at one time and Ray would go by and scratch his fingernails on the screen to

make me think someone was outside. "I would go open the door and look all around and never find anyone. Then there was the times he would sneak in and hide in a closet in a gorilla mask. It was pretty funny to hear different people's reactions when they opened

the door." Eunice intends to enjoy her retirement visiting her son Steve Arney, his wife Debbie and their children Heather and Amber. She also plans on visiting friends and family that she has not seen in a long time.

"I'm going to miss the work," said Eunice, "and I know there will be some days that I'll be bored to death. I'm also going to miss the officers and their wives-but they all know where I live."



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

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

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Lower Installation Costs Nu-Flex Pipe is a long seamless tube packaged in convenient rolls which can be unwound from the back of a truck, tractor, or even by hand by two men if necessary. Ideally, it should be laid in a clean shallow furrow 3" to 5" deep to prevent it from rolling when filled with water. The pump end is easily fastened to the discharge pipe (which must be at ground level) with a rubber tarp strap or a large clamp. Elevate the open end 2 to 3 feet and never tie it off.

After being laid and while pumping toothpick size holes should be made in the top of the pipe where air pockets are visible to bleed off excess air. This will prevent rupture. Then small holes or gates can be installed in the pipe at alternate furrows. The holes can be punched in one or both sides. After each use, puddled water remaining in the pipe holds it in place.

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

Floyd County receives agriculture water conservation grant of \$2000

The Texas Water Development Board awarded ten matching grants (75 percent board/25 percent local district) from the Agriculture Conservation Grants to Districts Programs.

This program allows local conservation districts to purchase equipment unsed in district programs to promote agricultureal water conservation or water-quality testing.

Ten grants totaling \$46,800 were approved for nine districts. Floyd County Soil and Water Conservation District received \$2,000 for electronic elevation equipment.

Other districts receiving grants were: fiddle Concho S&WCD (Irion, Regan, and Upton Counties), \$8,125 for

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computerized elevation equipment; Hockley County S&WCD, \$2,025 for electronic elevation equipment;

Maverick County S&WCD, \$1,500 for software for electronic elevation equipment: Duck Creek S&WCD (Dickens County), \$1,000 for a flow meter and water level equipment; Lubbock County S&WCD, \$1,950 for electronic elevation equipment;

Hill Country UWCD (Gillespie

County), \$2,750 for flowmeters; North Plains GWCD #2 (Moore, Dallam, Hansford, Hartley, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Ochiltree and Sherman Counties) \$13,950 for water quality testing equipment and for water quality mapping equipment;

Cotton loan rate increased

Announcement of the 1995-crop Commodity Credit Corporation Upland Cotton Loan Schedule on May 8, went almost unheralded in the face of high cotton prices and producer concerns about the weather.

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) the new loan schedule, with an increase in the base loan rate to 51.92 cents per pound includes a mixed bag for High Plains cotton producers.

On the good side of the coin is the drop in the discount for bark content in cotton from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. The 1995 loan schedule has a level one bark discount for these states of -195 point, 40 points below the level one bark discount included in the 1994 loan schedule. Level two bark discounts also dropped from -600 points in 1994 to -550 points in 1995.

"This years loan schedule should be good news for most producers," says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson. "While there is no identifiable trend toward either higher premiums or lower discounts, loan differences are now beginning to more closely resemble actual market values."

Other changes in the 1995 schedule include revisions to the Strength and Micronaire premium and discount

The 1995 Strength table contains

26.5 grams per tex.

The 1995 micronaire table contains lower discounts for all micronaire readings, outside of the 3.5 to 4.9 base range, for cotton with staple lengths measuring 32 (1 inch) and shorter. Discounts for cotton with staple lengths 33 (1 1/32 inch) or longer were higher for readings 5.0 and above and lower for micronaire readings 2.7 and below.

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mittee (BWSC) met May 2 and voted unanimously to set the 1995 per-bale assessment at zero cents. The voluntary rs (PCG) Boll Weevil Steering Comper-bale assessment is used to provide operating funds for PCG's High Plains

> Boll Weevil Suppression Program. According to PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson a total of 13 cotton producers from across the High Plains serve on the BWSC. He adds that the Steering Committee lowered the perbale assessment to zero in order to allow area compresses, where the voluntary assessment is normally collected,

to set their 1995 tariffs. Johnson also noted that during the recently approved High Plains Boll Weevil Eradication referendum one of the Steering Committee's goals was to keep the per-bale assessment at the lowest level possible and maintain the collection mechanism to provide for a monitoring program after the boll wee-

vil is eradicated from the area. "Producers have been very supportive of the BWSC's management of their funds throughout the 31 year history of the PCG program," says BWSC Chairman Wayne Huffaker of Tahoka. "I believe that trust will be further strengthened by the Committee's action May 2."

Preparations for the expansion of the PCG program's operational area have also begun. Program personnel have put out traplines to monitor boll weevils as they emerge from overwintering habitat.. In addition to PCG's regular traplines additional weevil information will be collected through two other

The first is in conjunction with Dr. Jim Leser of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, through the Agri-Partners program. Dr. Leser will be operating a grid trapping program designed to determine where boll weevils are located going into the 1995 crop.

The second source of early season boll weevil trap information is from producers and consultants who purchased traps through their county extension agents and PCG. Individuals who participated in the program and received traps to monitor their own fields for early season weevil populations are being encouraged to forward the data they col-

lect to their county extension office. Each office will then forward the data to PCG for further dissemination and for use during the Enhanced Diapause pro-

"We are encouraging all producers and consultants to take a few minutes to send their trap information to their county extension office," explains PCG Boll Weevil Program Coordinator Roger Haldenby. "This data will be an invaluable tool for us as we identify heavy weevil populations that will need to be addressed during this year's diapause treatment program."




